## RULES:

1. Exhibitors must read and be familiar with, and comply with, the Boulder County Fair General Rules and Regulations, Open Creative Living General Rules and Regulations, and any applicable division or class rules.
2. Walk-in entries are allowed for this division.
3. Entries must have been produced by the exhibitor.
4. Commercially grown cut flowers will not be eligible.
5. Entries will be exhibited until they are released after closing of the fair. Pick up of ribbons, jars, and any displays that have not fully expired will be Monday, August 12, 2024 4:00pm - 6:00pm only. Anything left after 6 pm will be tossed.
6. Classes 1 through 68 are open to all ages. Classes $69 \& 70$ are only open to children ages 12 and under as of December 31, 2023.
7. An exhibitor may have only two entries per class.
8. Follow rules of presentation for requirements such as stem, spray or spike as defined below.
9. Size designations vary by class and are indicated with the class descriptions below. Overall size means in all directions.
10. Containers/planters do not count toward height in potted plant classes.
11. Marijuana is prohibited in any entry.
12. Pre-registration is requested. All other entries MUST be entered between 8:30am and 11:30am on Thur, Aug 8, 2024. NO LATE ENTRIES will be accepted.
13. Exhibitors and the public are encouraged to watch the judging, but will not be permitted in the display area until judging is complete.
14. Entries may be assigned to another or new class at the discretion of the judge or superintendent.

## FLOWER DEFINITIONS:

Contemporary Arrangement: A modern floral design with architectural features, artistic qualities, and structural design.
Heritage and Old Garden Roses: Varieties of rose introduced prior to 1867 or of unknown introduction date.
Spike: A single-branched specimen with multiple blooms attached directly to the stem. Spray: A multiple-branched specimen with at least two open blooms and with or without buds.
Stem: A single-branched specimen with a single bloom and no other buds.
Traditional Arrangement: Bouquet of cut flowers arranged in container.

## HELPFUL HINTS FOR ALL ENTRIES:

1. To prepare flower exhibits properly, cut with a sharp knife after sundown or in early morning. Cut at peak of maturity, that is, when the main bloom(s) is/are $3 / 4$ open.
2. Plunge immediately into tepid or warm water ( 100 degrees $F$ ) and place in a cool dark place away from drafts for at least 8 hours prior to showing to allow time for the flower to recover full turgor.
3. Flowers that wilt easily should be collected the morning of the show.
4. Plants and cut flowers may be cleaned/groomed, though leaf dressing/shine is not allowed. Do not show plants with damaged leaves or spent flowers; they should be removed or trimmed as inconspicuously as possible. (A small blemish on an otherwise perfect specimen will not disqualify it.)
5. All specimens should be clean and free from insect and disease damage or other blemishes.
6. No leaves should be submerged in the display vase.
7. All jars needed for displaying of entries must be provided by the exhibitor. Water is available in the Exhibit Building if needed. Jars must be large enough to support the item exhibited.
8. Plants must be properly labeled on the entry tag. Genus species (botanical name) is preferred to aid in classification, but common names are acceptable. Provide as much information as possible, including variety name. (Remember to save those nursery tags and seed packets for reference.)
Examples: Acceptable: Marigold

| Good: | Marigold, Dwarf Sparky |
| :--- | :--- |
| Better: | French Marigold, Dwarf Sparky |
| Best: | Tagetes patula "Dwarf Sparky" |

9. How Judges Evaluate Entries: Entries are not judged against one another directly, but are judged according to how closely each approaches the "ideal" for the variety. If no entries in a particular class are sufficiently close to the ideal standard, top placings may not be awarded at the judge's discretion. In general, judges look at:
a. Condition: Plants are at peak bloom and free from disease, insects, or other damage, including dirt, stain, and blemish.
b. Form: Plants and flowers are at proper maturity and correct shape for variety.
c. Stem and Foliage: Stems should be straight and in proportion to flowers, not damaged.
d. Color: Color should be true to type, intense, and brilliant.
e. Size: Blooms and foliage should be the proper size for the variety and proportional. Where multiple specimens are required, they should be as uniform as possible.
f. Additional criteria for certain classes are listed below.

## HELPFUL HINTS FOR ARTISTIC ARRANGEMENTS:

1. Judging will include container and decoration depicting the theme.
2. How Judges Evaluate Entries:
a. Design: Overall design (balance, scale, composition, and proportion) is seen as one complete piece, pleasing to the eye and enjoyable to look at.
b. Color Harmony: Harmony of color used to create attractiveness.
c. Conformance: Suitability to the class description.
d. Originality: Creativity, self-expression, and interpretation of the class theme.
e. Texture Harmony: Relationship between the elements used (flowers, foliage, container, and accessories).
f. Container Relation: Proper scale and proportion to container.
g. Condition: Freshness and quality of all materials used (flowers, foliage, containers, ribbons, etc.).

## HELPFUL HINTS FOR CUT FLOWERS:

1. How Judges Evaluate Entries:
a. Ornamental Grasses are judged on the flower spike or the seed heads.
b. Culinary Herbs are judged on floral quality.
c. Ornamental Fruits are judged on aesthetic value. Fruits should be entered on stems (not detached). Choose fruits that are symmetrical and well proportioned, with brilliant color appropriate to variety. Fruits in this class may be dried or fresh, as appropriate for variety and ornamental value. Examples include, but are not limited to: Lunaria (money plant), Cephalanthus (buttonbush), and Viburnum.
