ALL EXHIBITS MUST BE PRE-REGISTERED.

NO-SHOW STATIC EXHIBITS—If an exhibitor fails to bring more than TWO (2) pre-registered exhibits on judging day, a \$5.00 fee will be assessed. This fee will be subtracted from the exhibitor's premium check.

The last day to register exhibits is Monday, June 17, 2024. No entries will be accepted on Static Judging Day. **NO EXCEPTIONS!**

Fair Admission Information

Youth members exhibiting live animals will receive one (1) season pass plus one (1) adult season pass to the Red River Valley Fair, with a limit of two (2) adult season passes per household.

Youth and adults will receive one (1) single-day pass to be used when volunteering in the food stand. Confirmation or sign up for volunteering will be used prior to receiving passes.

Animal exhibitor passes will be the only passes allowed through Gate 4.

Any lost, misplaced or stolen passes will not be replaced.

Exhibitors/Exhibit Requirements and General Rules

The rules in the 4-H exhibit list apply to the 4-H events at the Red River Valley Fair. These rules supersede other rules that may be printed in project manuals or are otherwise assumed. Show management has the right to make decisions regarding the operation of a show as needed.

- The 4-H Department is open to all youth in North Dakota, Minnesota and South Dakota subject to the rules, classes and entry dates listed herein.
- The Red River Valley Fair Association assumes no responsibility other than that stated in these rules, for the conduct/welfare of the 4-H exhibitors and contestants. This is the duty of parents, club leaders and individual 4-H exhibitors. The fair cannot be held responsible for stolen or lost articles.
- To enter static exhibits, each member must:
 Have attended at least six (6) meetings and be a Cass
 County 4-H member.
- 4. All exhibits must be made or prepared by the 4-H member enrolled in that 4-H project during the previous or current 4-H Club Year. Exhibits should reflect the age of the member and the number of years enrolled in a project.
- Static exhibits may only be shown in 4-H, not in open class or FFA.
- 4-Her's may enter a maximum of FOUR (4) entries per group or subgroup, whichever is lower— unless stated otherwise.
- Classes with an asterisk (*) will not be taken to State Fair.
- 8. <u>Important:</u> All pieces of an exhibit must be labeled before exhibit day with name, address, and club in the event that the exhibit tag becomes detached.
- NO-SHOW FAIR EXHIBITS If an exhibitor fails to bring MORE THAN TWO (2) OF THEIR PRE- REGISTERED EXHIBITS on judging day, a \$5.00 fee will be assessed. This fee will be subtracted from the exhibitor's premium check.
- 10. IMPORTANT NOTE: THE LAST DAY TO REGISTER EXHIBITS IS MONDAY, JUNE 17, 2024. NO ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED ON JUDGING DAY! NO EXCEPTIONS!
- 11. Absentee Exhibitor: 4-H youth who are unable to attend interview static judging on Thursday will need to obtain an Absentee Exhibitor's form from the Cass County Extension Office at 241-5700 or the 4-H website: https://tinyurl.com/ RRVF4-H. The form MUST be completed by the youth (not parent). One form is needed for each item exhibited. If your project does not include this form, you will be dropped a ribbon placing. If ages 5-7, complete the Cloverbud Absentee form. Parents are allowed to complete Cloverbud Absentee Forms.
- 12. Award Eligibility for Absentee Exhibitors: Absentee exhibitors will be eligible for Grand and Reserve Champion ribbons if the appropriate paperwork is filled out and with the exhibit. The judge will have the discretion to select the champion placement. If all other factors are equal, the preference will be given to the exhibit with the quality interview.
- 13. Youth will be awarded blue, red, white or participation ribbons. Cloverbuds will receive a Cloverbud participation ribbon. RRVF Overall Grand & Reserve Champions and Honorable Mention ribbons will be awarded.

- 18. Premium checks will be mailed to exhibitors.
- 19. Blue ribbon exhibits are eligible to go to State Fair –unless otherwise noted, the exhibitor is limited to two exhibits per group or subgroup—whichever is lower. Cloverbud exhibits are not eligible for State Fair.
- 20. Blue ribbon static exhibits will be transported to the North Dakota State Fair in Minot after the close of the Red River Valley Fair. 4-H members are not required to transport or attend the ND State Fair with their static exhibits.
- 21. Static exhibits not going to the North Dakota State Fair will be picked up by the club representative. This will take place on Monday, July 15, 2024.
- 22. Static exhibits that went to the North Dakota State Fair will be picked up by the club representative. This will take place on Monday, July 29, 2024 at the Cass County Annex Building.

NDSU Extension 4-H Participation Expectations

A goal of the North Dakota 4-H program is to provide opportunities for children and youth to build character. North Dakota 4-H supports the CHARACTER COUNTS!* Six Pillars of Character: Trustworthiness, Respect, Responsibility, Fairness, Caring, and Citizenship.

In order to ensure that North Dakota 4-H programs provide positive environments for all individuals to learn and grow, North Dakota 4-H participants, staff and volunteers agree to abide by these expectations of behavior when enrolling:

I will be trustworthy. I will be worthy of trust, honor and confidence. I will be a model of integrity by doing the right thing even when the cost is high. I will be honest in all my activities. I will keep my commitments by attending all sessions of a planned event. If I am not feeling well or have a schedule conflict, I will inform my chaperon or a person in charge. I will be in the assigned area (e.g., club meeting room, building, dorm) at all times. I will not be absent from a program site without authorization. North Dakota 4-H does not permit dishonesty by lying, cheating, deception, or omission.

I will be respectful. I will show respect, courtesy, and consideration to everyone, including myself, other program participants, and those in authority. I will act and speak respectfully. I will treat program areas, lodging areas, personal property and transportation vehicles with respect. I will follow all published dress code guidelines for an event and/or activity. I will not use vulgar or abusive language or cause physical harm. I will appreciate diversity in skill, gender, ethnicity, and ability. North Dakota 4-H does not tolerate statements or acts of discrimination or prejudice. I will respect the personal space and choices of other participants and will not participate in inappropriate displays of affection or physical contact.

I will be responsible. I will be responsible, accountable, and self-disciplined in the pursuit of excellence. I will live up to high expectations so I can be proud of my work and conduct. I will be on time to all program events. I will be accountable by accepting responsibility for my choices and actions. I will abide by the established program curfew. I will be responsible for any damage, theft, or misconduct in which I participate. I will follow hours and room rules established before the event begins and will respect the rules established for each event. An adult designated by the 4-H program may inspect luggage or rooms when there is a reasonable suspicion that there is a violation of law or NDSU Extension event or camp regulations.

I will be fair. I will be just, fair, and open. I will participate fairly by following the rules, not taking advantage of others and not asking for special exceptions. I will not cheat or misrepresent project work.

I will be caring. I will be caring in my relationships with others. I will be kind and show compassion for others. I will treat others the way I want to be treated. I will show appreciation for the efforts of others. I will help others to have a good experience by striving to include all participants. I understand that bullying behavior of any kind (ex. physical, social, emotional, sexual, or electronic) is prohibited. Bullying behavior may include, but is not limited to, negative actions such as: verbal aggression, emotional attacks, sexual harassment, racial discrimination, physical aggression, isolating others, or electronic harm.

I will be a good citizen. I will be a contributing and lawabiding citizen. I will be respectful to the environment and contribute to the greater good. I will not have in my possession, use or distribute any illegal substances such as tobacco, alcohol, or non-prescribed drugs. I will not misuse prescription drugs. If I am found to have any of these items with me or if I have taken any illegal substances, notification of law enforcement will be conducted by adult staff/volunteers. I will not have in my possession or use weapons or dangerous materials.

North Dakota 4-H Code of Conduct Policy and Procedures

North Dakota 4-H expects youth participating in programs to behave in an acceptable manner in accordance with North Dakota 4-H Participant Expectations.

You are expected to behave in a way that reflects positively on you as an individual as well as the North Dakota 4-H program. You need to understand the meaning of the North Dakota 4-H Participant Expectations as well as the North Dakota Code of Conduct Policy and will abide by them. If you do not abide by the items named in the North Dakota 4-H Participant Expectations, you may experience the following consequences:

- 1. Lose privileges at the event.
- Be dismissed immediately from meeting, activity, event or other program (for example: remainder of the fair, camp, judging trip.) Notification to parents/ guardians will occur and you will be sent home at your own expense prior to the conclusion of the activity.
- 3. The possible forfeiture of future participation in state wide and out-of-state events as well as possible forfeiture of future awards and premiums at the county level. If this step is considered, input and determination will be made by event staff, county staff, state staff and the parents/guardians of the involved 4-H member(s).
- Possible dismissal from the North Dakota 4-H
 program. Be aware that your actions and
 decisions affect yourself as well as others. Be
 aware that violations may result in consequences.

Parents and legal guardians attending or participating in 4-H youth development programs are also expected to conduct themselves according to the North Dakota 4-H Participant Expectations and the North Dakota 4-H Code of Conduct Policy and Procedures, and assist and support youth in their efforts to adhere to the Expectations and Code.

Alcoholic Beverages and Illegal Drug Use

It is expected that adults working in Extension youth programs be positive role models for participating youth. Adults must obey the laws of the state and the rules of the organization. We strive to help youth make good choices by modeling healthy behavior, therefore no tobacco use in any form (including e-cigarettes) will be allowed at 4-H events.

The influence of alcohol or illegal drugs can inhibit reasonable judgment and reduce one's ability to provide a safe environment for youth. The liability coverage carried by NDSU will not provide protection to an employee or volunteer who violates state or local laws or ordinances concerning alcohol or illegal drugs.

Since consumption of alcohol or illegal drugs is not acceptable for young people in Extension youth programs, adults <u>will not</u> consume these substances while working with youth. <u>This also includes any parents, guardians or other adults attending Cass County 4-H events.</u>

Any Extension volunteer or paid staff can be liable both criminally and/or civilly if underage drinking associated with an Extension youth activity is condoned, ignored or accepted. It is important that adults recognize and continue to help communicate the powerful and negative health and safety consequences of drug and alcohol use.

Adult Behavioral Expectations

A goal of the North Dakota 4-H program is to provide opportunities for youth and adults to build character. North Dakota 4-H supports the CHARACTER COUNTS!* Six Pillars of Character: trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and citizenship.

To ensure that North Dakota Extension youth programs provide positive environments for all individuals to learn and grow, staff and volunteers agree to abide by these expectations of behavior:

I will be trustworthy. I will be worthy of trust, honor and confidence. I will be a model of integrity by doing the right thing, even when the cost is high. I will honor others' privacy. I will arrive on time for my commitments. I will strive to build others' confidence. I agree to not steal or misuse property or equipment. I will not allow youth to cheat or misrepresent their work.

I will be respectful. I will conduct myself in a courteous, respectful manner, exhibiting good sportsmanship and being a positive role model. I will respect the individual rights of all youth and adults. I will appreciate diversity in skill, gender, ethnicity and ability. I will not tolerate statements or acts of discrimination or prejudice. I will respect the personal space and choices of participants and will not participate in inappropriate displays of affection or physical contact. I will accept support and/or supervision from an Extension volunteer or paid staff. I will respect the educational mission of the NDSU Extension and adhere to and enforce the policies and guidelines established for county and state youth programs.

I will be responsible. I will be responsible, accountable and self-disciplined. I will be accountable by accepting responsibility for my choices and actions. I will work to create a safe environment and will act quickly to report any threats regarding the safety and well-being of youth or adult participants. If I observe abuse, I will report it as outlined by the NDSU Extension Youth Protection Policy. I will handle animals and operate machinery, vehicles and other equipment in a safe and responsible manner. I will manage time and resources wisely.

I will be fair. I will be just, fair and open. I will follow rules and share knowledge, and not take advantage of others or ask for special exceptions. I will be a team member and work to be free of bias. I will make decisions based on facts and strive for win-win situations for all involved. I will be willing to negotiate and exercise give and take to achieve youth or group success.

I will be caring. I will treat others the way I want to be treated. I will promote and model a positive attitude. I will be kind and show compassion for others. I will show appreciation for the efforts of others. I will help others have a good experience by striving to include all participants. I will take time to talk to people face-to-face about issues. I will not commit, permit, condone or tolerate bullying behavior of youth and adults. I will not abuse any youth or adult program participant by physical, verbal, or emotional means.

I will be a good citizen. I will be a contributing and lawabiding citizen. I will be respectful to the environment and contribute to the greater good. I will not use alcohol or illegal drugs or be under their influence while at youth programs or while having responsibility for youth in NDSU Extension Service programs. I will inform others that alcohol or illegal drugs are not allowed at Extension youth programs. I will comply with equal opportunity and anti-discrimination laws. I agree I will not have in my possession or use weapons or dangerous materials.



4-H Dress Code Required

All 4-H participants/exhibitors must wear a solid white, gray or green shirt/blouse with a 4-H emblem prominently displayed and securely fastened on the front. **NO CLUB SHIRTS ARE ALLOWED!**

4-H dress code t-shirts for \$10, polo shirts for \$14, or 4-H Emblem patches for \$1 can be purchased from the County Extension Office or at the 4-H Info Booth on static interview judging day on Thursday.

If you do not wear the 4-H dress code, you will be dropped a ribbon placing.

Guidelines for Posters

**DO NOT USE SPRAY ADHESIVE TO ATTACH
ITEMS ON POSTERS. DURING THE HOT WEATHER
AT THE FAIR THE SPRAY ADHESIVE DOES NOT
HOLD.**

Posters often are used to show what has been learned or how to do something when the item made does not make the best exhibit or display of what was learned. Judges evaluating the poster will focus on two aspects: the appearance and the content. Both should be considered in the final placing.

Readability

- 1. Letters should be read easily.
- 2. Printing should be consistent with general rules for style, weight, size and case, Hand lettering should conform to a generally practiced style.
- The title should be in larger lettering than the content.
- 4. The size should not exceed 36 x 48 inches for trifold display boards and must be a minimum of 18 x 23 inches. Keep the posters to a maximum size of 14 x 22 inches if possible. Poster board exhibits may be hung with thumbtacks.
- 5. Have sufficient space around the edges and between the areas of lettering.

General Appearance

- Copy should be brief, appropriately placed and have comfortable margins.
- 2. The poster should be illustrated effectively. The illustration should have appropriate impact.
- 3. Posters should attract attention. The color should have a pleasing effect.

Message

 The message should be appropriate, brief and clear to the viewer. A single thought should be conveyed.

Materials

- 1. The poster should be made on high-quality poster board using good lettering devices or techniques and using good-quality poster paints or markers.
- 2. Three-dimensional items should be attached securely so they do not fall off.

Tips for Effective Posters

- Posters should be easy to read. Words should be spelled correctly.
- 2. Posters should have a theme; illustrations should emphasize and support the theme.
- 3. Use different shapes, sizes and colors.
- 4. Lowercase letters are easier to read than uppercase letters. A few uppercase letter are all right for emphasis and variety.
- Posters should be just large enough to carry your message—no larger.
- 6. Use as few words as possible.

Fair Etiquette Guidelines

- Please allow enough time to get your exhibits judged. Do not expect to be done in an hour especially if you have several exhibits.
- Please come at your club's scheduled judging time unless you have a conflict.
- Keep an appropriate distance from the judging table while you wait. Give others their privacy.
- No more than two exhibits judged at one time by the same judge. If you have more exhibits, you must get back in line.
- The interview judging experience is for the 4-H member. Parents--please relax. Have a cup of coffee.
- Please leave the Butler Building at the 4:00 pm closing time unless you are working!

4-H Static Judging Day

Thursday, June 27, 2024—Butler Building

Static exhibit cards can be picked up by the youth exhibitor at the registration desk. It will be the responsibility of the 4-H member to attach the appropriate exhibit cards to their corresponding preregistered exhibits prior to judging.

Enter the main doors of the Butler Building and check in at the registration desk located in the gazebo to pick up your:

- Purchase 4-H discounted gate passes and ride passes. See page 4.

Locate Your Project Judging Station(s): After judging, your exhibit will remain with the judge and be on display during the entire fair.

<u>Parking:</u> Enter fairgrounds through Gate #3. Park on the North side of the Exhibit Buildings.

You **MUST** be registered by the time registration closes at 3:00 pm or your exhibits will not be judged.

Independent and members NOT from Cass County can come to be judged at any time of their choice.

Please allow up to a couple of hours to complete the judging of your exhibits.

Judges and their assistants will take staggered lunches.

Please come at your assigned judging time to help avoid long lines developing. If you have a conflict, you may come at a different judging time.

No use of copyrighted original works is allowed. **Examples: cartoon characters, Mickey Mouse, notable** artwork.

In addition to the required photo label, the name of the exhibitor is required to be legibly printed on the back of each photograph and completed exhibit in case the photo label comes off.

8-by-10 photos are required for the enlargement classes. All other photos are recommended to be 5-by-7-inch photos. Original photos exhibited in computer-enhanced subgroups must be 4-by-6 inches.

Prints may be cropped to improve composition but must meet sizes indicated above.

Exhibits with multiple photos must be mounted on the same board, not to exceed 16 by 20 inches. Please label each photo in the exhibit (e.g. 1 of 3, 2 of 3, 3 of 3).

No hangers or frames are allowed. All photos are recommended, but not required, to be in a plastic sleeve or zip-top plastic bag to prevent damage.

Slight computer editing is permissible with any photo exhibit. For example, cropping, eliminating red eye, and changing of the saturation rightness and contrast.

An exhibitor may enter one 8-by-10-inch photo and must include a digital file of the photo saved in JPG format on a flash drive. Digital memory card or CDs will not be accepted. Entries without the digital photo file will be displayed but will not receive a ribbon or a premium, and will not be selected for display in public offices. Approximately 10 photos will be selected.

Include required photo exhibit label on the back of the photo. The label must include the location where the photo was taken.

Print may be cropped to improve composition, provided it meets the size requirement of 8 by 10 inches.

To protect the exhibits in transportation to and from the State Fair and while they are in the preparation phase before display, place photos with cardboard for stability in a zip-top closure bag (gallon size works well for 8-by-10-inch photos).

Place a duplicate exhibit label in the bag for the digital file.

The digital files for the selected photos will be kept to print a copy that will be framed and placed on display in the 4-H Youth Development or other public offices across the state. Entry in class 5379 means the exhibitor agrees to allow the photo to be placed on display in public offices. The 8-by-10-inch print submitted will be returned to the exhibitor.

General Rules

To exhibit at Achievement Days each member must:

- 1. Have attended at least six meetings and be a Cass County 4-H member.
- 2. Be enrolled in the projects in which they have exhibited and follow rules outlined in the project area.
- 3. Have completed minimum requirements for the project.
- 4. The 4-H leaders must be able to verify that your records are up-to-date.
- 5. Leaders must submit names of ineligible 4-H members before Achievement Days.
- Exhibitors must provide their own hay, grain and bedding for animal and poultry exhibits. For safety concerns, all animals must be dehorned.
- 7. All 4-H animals must be tagged or identified with a proper ID and submitted to the Extension Office by May 1st.
- 8. Submit online registration at http://4HRRVF.fairentry.com using their 4hOnline credentials. Registration opens June 1st and closes June 17th.

Cloverbuds

- 1. Youth 5-7 years of age as of September 1, 2023.
- 2. Exhibitors must be enrolled in the Cloverbud Project.
- 3. Each youth will receive a participation ribbon and premium. All lots are non-competitive for Cloverbuds.
- 4. Parents should be present (near the ring) when the larger animals are shown as a "back up" for safety reasons. They may not show the animal.
- Cloverbuds are not eligible to sell their animals in the market sale.
- 6. All other general rules and guidelines apply to Cloverbuds who choose to participate.

4-H Dress Code

- 1. All 4-H participants/exhibitors must wear a solid white, yellow, gray or green shirt/blouse with a 4-H emblem prominently displayed and securely fastened on the front.
- 2. It is recommended that 4-H members wear dark or black full length jeans.
- 3. For professional appearance by 4-H members, it is recommended that a shirt or blouse be a solid colored crew neck t-shirt, polo shirt, or Henley-type. The clover can be stitched, silk-screened, fused or securely fastened using a Velcro type fastener or fabric spray adhesive. Visible pins (safety and stick) are not an acceptable method of attachment.
- 4-H members should NOT wear short shorts or short skirts, tops that are sleeveless, low-cut, or ones that show the midriff.
- 5. Shirts should be of sufficient length to be tucked into the jeans or slacks.
- 6. 4-H Emblem patches can be purchased from the County Extension Office for \$1.00 or at the registration desk on static judging day.
- If you do not wear 4-H dress code, you will be dropped a ribbon placing. Dress Code is also required for the livestock sale.

Animal Housing and Bedding

- 1. No bedding will be provided to beef and dairy cattle, you must bring your own (cannot use straw).
- Straw hay will NOT be permitted as a form of bedding. You may bring wood shavings from home or purchase bags on site from the RRVF.
- 3. Beef and dairy cattle will be housed in Livestock Barn 2 along with other livestock.

Care of Animals

- All animal owners are responsible for the welfare of their animals. Exhibitors are expected to provide adequate feed, water, bedding and housing for the comfort of their animals. Making arrangements is the responsibility of the exhibitor for appropriate care if they are unable to be present.
- 2. We require the humane treatment of animals and abuse will not be tolerated. The comfort and safety of the animal must be addressed throughout the show. Non-stressed animals will perform better for the handler. Exhibitors are expected to handle their animals in a gentle and calm manner and not create undue excitement in the vicinity of other livestock or persons.

Livestock Stall and Cage Contest

- 1. Exhibitors may begin decorating stalls at 5:00 pm on Thursday, June 27th.
- 2. Exhibitors may decorate their stall/cage as an individual, family or 4-H club.
- 3. Animals must be in their stalls/cages by 10:00 am on Friday, with decorating complete by 8:00 pm.
- Judging will be ongoing from 8:00 pm on Friday through Monday.
- Judging will be based on USE OF THEME, APPROPRIATENESS, CLEANLINESS of stall and aisleway and OVERALL APPEARANCE.
- 6. Themes are encouraged. Be creative!
- Stalls/Cages must be cleaned and maintained. Parents or other adults who help clean the stalls/sweep aisles will be penalized.
- 8. Results will be announced at the Premium Auction on Monday, July 1st. Special awards will be provided.

**Interview Judging

- 1. This is **REQUIRED** for all animal exhibitors, large and small animal.
- Project record books will be interview judged. You are required to bring your 4-H animal project records with you.
- 3. The records must be up-to-date and filled out as completely as possible.
- 4. The interview judge will ask you about your project animal and records.
- 5. 4-H DRESS CODE IS REQUIRED FOR INTERVIEW JUDGING AT THIS EVENT.

Herdsmanship

- All livestock (sheep, goats, beef, swine & dairy)
 exhibitors may enter herdsmanship competition. There
 is no pre-entry required for this class and all exhibitors
 are automatically enrolled by exhibiting at Achievement
 Days.
- 2. Exhibitors will compete for champion herdsmen in each species (one individual/family winner per specie).
- The purpose of this competition is to reward the exhibitor who exemplifies animal husbandry skills by maintaining a clean stall, tack area and animals appear clean and comfortable.
- 4. Judging will take place through-out Achievement Days, Saturday through Monday. An individual will be chosen by the Extension Office to score herdsmanship.
- 5. Results will be announced at the Premium Auction on Monday, July 1st. Special awards will be provided.
- 6. Consideration will be given to the general appearance, sanitation, neatness and club's name above exhibits.

- 4-H members are to fulfill the herdsmanship duties.
 4-H leaders, advisors or parents cannot help on herdsmanship during the fair.
- The show arena is for show purposes only. Any exhibitor feeding or grooming in this area will be scored down.
- 9. Scoring based on:

Cleanliness of alleys/stalls or pens—50 points

- Bedding adequate, bright, dry, clean and in place.
- Manure hauled out and deposited in designated area
- Alleys swept clean, free of dust and straw.

You will need to let staff know your intention during the small animal check in process.
- 6.. Breeding animals are entered as examples of breeding new stock, whether for market or for show. Market animals are entered as examples of meat (or egg) production and are judged according to meat quality. Exhibitors should be able to recite to the judge the steps in processing for classes 1653 and 1757.
- 7. Pens of three for poultry or rabbits: Pens of three should be the same breed and variety (color), and if possible, they should be the same sex and size.
- 8. Exhibitors must be present during judging. Animals will be brought to the judging table for show. Exceptions may be made by the judge or Extension Office.
- 10. We strongly encourage each youth enrolled in the poultry/

- rabbit projects to enter one animal in the market class and to participate in the livestock auction.

Preparing for the Sale

- All blue and red ribbon animals will be appraised prior to the sale.
- A 4-H member is only allowed to have one animal in the auction.
- If a 4-H member has two market animals eligible for the auction, the exhibitor must let the show committee know which animal will be auctioned at the conclusion of the Large Animal Achievement Day show on Saturday, June 28, 2024.
- It is recommended 4-H members invite potential buyers to attend the sale. Think about all the locations you and your family do business: greenhouses, feed stores, implement dealerships, etc.

How the Sale Works

- All animals are sold for premium only (unless prior arrangements are made), meaning it is the responsibility of the exhibitor to bring the animal home at the conclusion of the sale.
- Arrangements made with buyers who want to purchase the animal for harvest are the responsibility of the seller.
- All species will be sold starting with the Champion animal first, followed by Reserve, then Blue Ribbon, and finally Red Ribbon animals.
- All bids taken are final.

How Youth are Paid

- The financial institution clerking the sale will collect the money from the bidders and send 4-H members their premium check.
- A 6% assessment is taken by the 4-H Council on the total dollars of the premiums. This money will be used for paying 4-H Achievement Day expenses, ribbons and other ribbon premium for livestock not sold.
- 4-H members will NOT receive a ribbon premium if they sold their animal at the livestock auction.

- The 4-H Horse Show will be held at the Red River Valley Fairgrounds at 9:00 am on Saturday, July 13, 2024 with Western and Game Events and Sunday, July 14, 2024 with English and Trail Events, in the Indoor Horse Arena.
- Open to any 4-H member currently enrolled in the 4-H Horse Project in North Dakota, Minnesota and South Dakota counties. If you are not a Cass County 4-H Member, you will need to create a new login when registering.
- This is a 4-H show. All horses must be lunged and warmed up by the participants. Parents/trainers are not allowed to mount the horses or warm the horse up.
- Pre-registration is due through online registration by Monday, June 17, 2024. A fee of \$2.00 per class will need to be paid online at the time of registration. No entries accepted day of show.
- Exhibitor will compete only in his/her respective age group. Age group is determined by age on Sept. 1, 2023. Age groups are: 8-11, 12-14, and 15-18. Cloverbuds (age 5-7) can participate in any of the division where a cloverbud class is available. An 18 or older handler may lead a Cloverbud if desired. Participation ribbon awarded.
- Each 4-H member is limited to a maximum of two horses for showing at the 4-H Horse Show. If there is a change in horse entries due to an injury or illness, a written letter from the attending veterinarian must be sent to: 4-H Horse Show, Cass County Extension, PO Box 2806, Fargo, ND 58108. No substitutions will be allowed without previous notice.
- A horse may be exhibited only once in any class. This
 also applies to joint ownership of a horse. A horse
 owned or leased by more than one person may only participate in an event once in an age division. If two youth
 own or lease the horse, but are in different age divisions,
 they may both use the horse for the same event.
- Red Ribbon Rule—If you know that your horse is a kicker, please place a red ribbon on the horse's tail to inform participants, helpers and the judge of this behavior.
- Participants have three gate calls and 60 seconds maximum time to enter the arena or they forfeit the event.
 Should a horse become unruly in the arena or on the premises, the horse & exhibitor will be dismissed from the ring or premises. Stallions may not be shown.
- Premiums will be offered on all classes.
- In timed classes, all starts & stops must be made within designated area. Exhibitors must be entered and exited at a walk (Except for Cloverbuds, horses cannot be led into the arena). The gate is to be closed while contestant is running, but need not be closed before starting. Bats and quirts are allowed.

- General rules governing horsemanship project requirements will apply. (GBH092 North Dakota 4-H Horse Show Rules & Judging Guide, blue revised 2020). Show management reserves the right to interpret the rules as necessary for issues not clearly defined. Un-sportsmenlike conduct or abusive language or actions on the part of any 4-H exhibitor, parent, family member, or leader may result in penalization determined by show management.
- There will be a Grand & Reserve Champion named in each class with the remaining class placing blue, red or white. There will be NO end of day high point award given.
- There will be a Grand & Reserve Champion named in each class with the remaining class placing blue, red or white. There will be NO end of day high point award given.
- Dress Code: All exhibitors will be neatly dressed and must wear a long sleeve solid white shirt with a 4-H emblem on the front. The clover can be stitched, silk -screened, fused or securely fastened using a Velcro fastener or fabric spray adhesive. (Using safety pins to attach clover patch will not be acceptable.) In addition, exhibitors must wear ASTM-SEI approved harness helmets for all mounted events (western hats are permitted for showmanship), western boots, blue or black colored jeans (dark colored), and a belt. Jewelry or ties are not permitted. Gloves are permitted only in English events. Exhibitor numbers must be clearly visible on the center of the back, pinned top & bottom, or on both sides of the saddle. If you are not in proper dress code you will not be allowed to participate in the show.

- Stalls are available for \$20 per day (one horse per stall). Request stalls when registering online. Horses can NOT be tied or ridden in barn alleys. If you do not rent a stall, you must tie your horse at your trailer.
- The Walk Trot Class is for beginner 4-H members. Any contestant may enter the Walk Trot, however, they may not ride in any other class that requires a canter or lope. If they enter Walk Trot they are limited to Showmanship at Halter & Walk Trot classes.
- Safety Rule: The road between Schollander and the barns is a safety zone, and horses cannot be ridden in that area.

Horse Stall Contest


- Exhibitors must enter in this class to be eligible for the contest.
- 4-H'ers who fulfill the requirements and rules of the contest will not be required to pay the stall fee.
- Stalls are available on a first-come first-serve basis.
- Exhibitors may begin decorating stalls at 4:00 pm on Friday, July 12, 2024 of the fair.
- One horse per stall is allowed.
- An exhibitor may decorate up to two stalls plus one tack
- A tack stall may be requested if at least 3 exhibitors with horses are sharing.
- The tack stall must be decorated, but not judged.
- Horses must be in stalls and decorated completed by Monday, July 10, 2023 at 2:00 pm.
- Judging will be ongoing from 2:00 pm on Monday through the end of the show on Tuesday.
- Judging will be based on USE OF THEME, APPROPRIATENESS, CLEANLINESS of stall and aisle-way and OVERALL APPEARANCE.
- Themes are encouraged. Go wild and be creative. Points are awarded to those exhibitors whose display is both educational and creative.
- Horses should always be provided enough bedding, water and feed.
- Stalls must be cleaned and maintained. Parents or other adults who help clean stalls/sweep aisles will be penalized.
- Loud noise is prohibited. Limit electricity.
- To be eligible, horses must remain in stalls through the completion of the show.
- Results will be announced at the conclusion of the horse show on Tuesday. Special awards will be provided by the Cass County 4-H Council. All exhibitors who enter the contest will receive a \$5.00 premium.
- Exhibits will be released immediately following the conclusion of the horse show.
- Stalls must be cleaned and bare ground at the time of check-out or premiums and awards will be forfeited.
