It is mandatory to help with pre-fair barn set up and post- auction clean up. Any ribbon qualifies to auction.

The Market Livestock and Quality Milk Auction will be held at 4:45 p.m. Thursday of the Fair in the Cow Palace.

## **Quality Milk Auction**

The mission of the Dairy Youth Auction is to recognize the dairy youth of Fond du Lac County that excel and achieve top honors during the Fond du Lac County Fair. Six (6) lots, represented by a dairy basket, will sell in the auction. Live animals will NOT be sold. Five (5) lots will feature an individual youth in the dairy program that received recognition during the Fond du Lac County Fair Jr Dairy Show. If selected to participate in the auction, each youth will be limited to a maximum of one (1) lot in the Dairy Youth Auction. The 6th remaining lot in the auction will be sold with funds supporting the Dairy Youth Fund, a fund that supports the educational opportunities for Fond du Lac County 4-H, FFA, and Junior Holstein Association members.

Once selected, each participant will receive a letter from the Dairy Youth Auction chairperson(s) listing activities required prior to the auction. The five youth participating in the sale will receive a majority of the final bid, with the remaining funds being distributed to continue supporting the WI State Fair Junior Dairy Exhibitors, the Fond du Lac County Holstein Scholarship, and the Fond du Lac County Milk House Fund. The final bid for each of the 5 baskets will be distributed as follows:

- **50%: individual youth selling the lot**
- **20%: Wisconsin State Fair Junior Dairy exhibitors representing Fond du Lac County**
- **20%: Fond du Lac County Holstein Scholarship Fund**
- **10%: Fond du Lac County Milkhouse Fund**

Youth participating in the auction must be presentable in the ring, wearing a collared shirt, belt, presentable pants, and adequate footwear. The cattle coming to the ring must also be clean and presentable, but do not need to be show ready.

Youth may sell in both the Dairy Youth Auction and the Market Livestock Sale. Youth will need to help set up and/or tear down for the Dairy Youth Auction/Market Livestock Sale.

The sale order and selection of the five individual lots selling in the Dairy Youth Auction sale will be selected as follows:

## **Lot 1 Intermediate Quality Milk Award & Lot 2 Sr Quality Milk Award:**

1. Application deadline for the Quality Milk Awards will be announced each year. Youth can submit multiple cows for Quality Milk Awards but will only be able to sell one basket in the Dairy Youth Auction. Each application will include exhibitor name, cow name, breed, age/class, birthdate, linear score, and copy of DHIA test report, or equivalent.
2. All breeds will be combined when selecting the individual award winners. Selection of award winners for the Intermediate (2- and 3-year-old lactating and dry) and Sr (4 years and older lactating and dry). Cow classes will be based on the lowest linear score.
3. The lowest linear score will be determined by the cow's last completed lactation's average linear score with a minimum of five (5) tests, except 2-year-old cows which must provide the past three (3) monthly consecutive linear scores prior to the Fair. The cow must be on a dairy herd improvement testing program which indicates her linear score. A cow cannot use the same linear score from a completed record used in a previous year's auction competition.
4. Tie breakers of lowest linear score will be determined by the lowest somatic cell count average.
  - a. Example: Exhibitor A submits and shows a Jr 2-year-old cow with a 0.7 linear score and a 70,000 SCC. Exhibitor B submits and shows a 3-year-old cow with a 0.7 linear score and a 92,000 SCC. Even though both cows have the lowest linear score of all cows in the 2- and 3-year-old lactating and dry cow classes, Exhibitor A's cow has the lowest somatic cell count, allowing them to win the Intermediate Milk Quality Award and to sell in the Dairy Youth Auction.
5. In the event an exhibitor is awarded the Quality Milk Award for both the Intermediate and Sr Cow awards, the exhibitor will sell the basket from the cow with the lowest linear score between the two, and the exhibitor with the second lowest linear score from the opposite division will sell a basket.
  - a. Example: Exhibitor C's 3-year-old cow had the lowest linear score (1.1 LS) for the Intermediate Division and their

5-year-old dry cow had the lowest linear score (1.6 LS) for the Sr. Division. Since the Intermediate Division award winner had the lowest LS between the 2, Exhibitor C will sell the basket for the Intermediate Division and the 2nd lowest LS from the Sr. Division will sell to represent the Sr. Cows.

6. The chairperson(s) will review submissions and determine who qualifies for the Dairy Youth Auction. Once selected, each participant will receive a letter from the Dairy Youth Auction chairperson(s) listing activities required prior to the auction.
7. All dairy cows selected for the auction must be entered to show and checked in by 1:00 p.m. on Wednesday, of the Fair by the Dairy Superintendent(s), and enter the showring or they will be disqualified from the Dairy Youth Auction. In the unlikely event of a disqualification, an alternate will take their place. Alternates will be determined by the chairperson(s) when submissions are reviewed and will be notified if they will need to take the place of the disqualified animal/exhibitor.

**Lot 3 Supreme Champion Dairy Showperson (from the previous year):**

1. In 2023, the Dairy Youth Auction will sell a basket for the 2022 Supreme Champion Dairy Showperson. In 2024, the 2023 Supreme Champion Showperson will sell a basket, and subsequent sales will continue with the previous year Supreme Champion Dairy Showperson selling a basket in the current Dairy Youth Auction.
  - a. In the event the Supreme Champion Dairy Showperson graduates and is no longer eligible to show at the county fair, thus unable to participate in the Dairy Youth Auction, the Reserve Supreme Champion Showperson from the previous year will sell a basket in the auction. If the Reserve Supreme Champion Dairy Showperson also graduates, the Honorable Mention Supreme Dairy Showperson will sell a basket.
  - b. In the event the Supreme Champion Dairy Showperson is already selling one of the Quality Milk Awards in the auction, the exhibitor of the Reserve

Champion Supreme Dairy Showperson will sell a basket.

- c. In the event the Reserve Supreme Champion Dairy Showperson is already selling one of the Quality Milk Awards in the auction, the Honorable Mention Supreme Champion Dairy Showperson will sell a basket.

**Lot 4 Supreme Champion Dairy Cow (of current fair):**

1. The exhibitor of the Supreme Champion Dairy Cow of the current county fair Jr Dairy Show will sell a basket in the Dairy Youth Auction.
  - a. In the event the exhibitor of the Supreme Dairy Cow is already selling a Quality Milk or a Supreme Dairy Showperson basket, the exhibitor of the Reserve Champion Supreme Dairy Cow will sell a basket.
  - b. If the Reserve Supreme Champion Dairy Cow exhibitor is also already selling a Quality Milk, Supreme Champion Dairy Showperson, or Supreme Champion Dairy Heifer basket in the auction, the spot will be filled by the Honorable Mention Supreme Champion Dairy Cow exhibitor.

**Lot 5 Supreme Champion Dairy Heifer (of current fair):**

1. The exhibitor of the Supreme Champion Dairy Heifer of the of the current county fair Jr Dairy Show will sell a basket in the Dairy Youth Auction.
  - a. In the event the exhibitor of the Supreme Dairy Heifer is already selling a Quality Milk, Supreme Dairy Cow, or a Supreme Dairy Showperson basket, the exhibitor of the Reserve Champion Supreme Dairy Heifer will sell a basket.
  - b. If the Reserve Supreme Champion Dairy Heifer exhibitor is also already selling a Quality Milk, Supreme Champion Dairy Showperson, or Supreme Champion Dairy Cow basket in the auction, the spot will be filled by

the Honorable Mention Supreme  
Champion Dairy Heifer exhibitor.

## Lot 6 Dairy Youth Fund

1. The final basket to be sold in the Dairy Youth Auction will support the Dairy Youth Fund for 4-H, Jr Breeds, and FFA dairy project member activities. One member (minimum) from each exhibit should be in the ring while it is being sold. These youth should also have a presentable appearance.

information (See IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics on page 7).

An exhibitor cannot show an animal that was entered or exhibited by another person except in the case of an unforeseen circumstance (sickness, injury, etc.) The substitute exhibitor should be a relative or from the same 4-H club or FFA Chapter and changes must be previously confirmed with the superintendent. Also, an exhibitor must be recognized as a member of an acknowledged Fond du Lac County Organization.

All animals being shown must be able to walk in a normal fashion, or they will not be allowed to be exhibited or sold in the market livestock sale. All market and breeding animals must have proper care for the duration of the Fair. If the barn superintendent rules that animals are not being adequately cleaned, fed, bedded, or cooled, a warning to the exhibitor will be given. A second violation of this rule will result in loss of fair premiums and the privilege to participate in the market animal sale for the subsequent year. The superintendent and a member of the Fair Board will rule on second offenses. All decisions will be final. Exhibitors are expected to keep all walking alleys and feed areas clean and to keep trash or other foreign material out of manure piles. All exhibitors and their parents or guardians must sign a form attesting to proper withdrawal of all additives and injections administered to the animals being shown. Any questionable carcass will have tissue samples collected by the state meat inspector to be submitted to the state laboratory. The exhibitor will pay the cost of the analysis.

Junior exhibitors are required to fit their own animals.

- All clipping chutes will be placed in a designated area.
- For safety reasons, no fitting of cattle will be allowed in the aisles of the barns.
- Fitting will be permitted in the bedding pack area within a club exhibit for that club only. Fitting in the bedding pack areas will only be allowed if it does not crowd the exhibit animals.
- Fitting is limited to the exhibitor, relative to the exhibitor, and a club member/leader participating in the Fond du Lac County Fair.

## FOND DU LAC COUNTY 4-H AND FFA MEAT ANIMAL PROJECT

### Project and Sales Guidelines, Entry Information

### Project and Sales Guidelines, Entry Information

#### General Guidelines

All market animals must meet regular Wisconsin County, District and State Fairs Animal Health Rules and Regulations (reference previous section pertaining to animal health requirement.)

**All livestock animals shown at the Fond du Lac County Fair are required to have a Livestock Premises ID number, which should be submitted to the Fair Office with entries. To get a Premises ID number, see [www.wiuid.org](http://www.wiuid.org).** A market animal can only be exhibited in one department. The same animal cannot be exhibited in both the junior and open show nor can a female market animal be shown in both market and breeding class.

Exhibitor may only show an animal in the showmanship class if they have shown that same animal in a junior show market or breeding stock class.

When purchasing market animals for exhibition and sale, exhibitor must obtain a signed and dated receipt of purchase from the seller. The receipt must include any identification information that is available (for example, birth date, ear notch, etc.). If needed at a later date, the burden of ownership proof will be on the exhibitor and will include an original receipt of purchase. Home raised animals need to be able to present records of ownership and identification

#### Release of Animals

All market animals and breeding stock must remain on exhibit until 6:00 p.m. on Sunday.

Exceptions will only be made for state breed shows and illness. Sick animals may be removed only by a written or oral authorization by the attending veterinarian. All other removal of animals is a privilege and must be approved by the Fair Board.

### **Complaints and Appeals**

Any complaints regarding eligibility of entries shall be filed in writing. Before any exhibitor is disqualified, he/she will be granted the right to meet with the Fair Board regarding the potential disqualification. If a market animal dies during the Fair, or is condemned by meat inspection, the exhibitor must refund the sale buyer the current stockyard value or supply an equivalent animal in replacement.

Exhibitor must have liability insurance in the event of injury to people and/or the animal, while at the Fair, causes damage to personal property.

**Meat Animal Sale Requirements** The Meat Animal Sale will be held on Thursday evening beginning at 4:45 p.m. for qualifying animals and their exhibitors.

Market livestock sale participants and exhibitors must play a significant role in the care and training of their project animals from the time of initial weigh-in through the duration of the Fair. This should be the case regardless of where the animal is housed.

All market sale animals must have been exhibited in their appropriate market animal class. Exhibitors may show market animals in more than one department but may sell only one animal in the market livestock sale. An exhibitor has the responsibility of informing the Market Livestock Committee within 15 minutes of the completion of their animal species show which animal is to be sold. Failure to inform a Market Livestock Committee member will result in being placed at the end of the sale and not placed in the program, regardless of ribbon placing.

All animals competing for Champion or Reserve Champion will do so with the intention of being sold. Any exhibitor with two or more champion/reserve champions will need to choose which animal to sell and forfeit the right to sell the second champion/reserve champion. This will have the Reserve Champion move into the Champion designation and the Honorable Mention to be moved into the Reserve Champion designation.

Absolutely no stags, boars, bulls, rams, or bucks (knowingly) will be sold in the Market Livestock Sale.

### **Educational Requirements:**

- To qualify for the Market Livestock Sale, participants are required to complete eight (8) educational credits. There will be no educational requirement for youth who graduated from high school the previous year.
- Each exhibitor, including those showing their last year, must be Youth for the Quality Care of Animal (YQCA) certified.
- The calendar year for completing eight (8) credits begins July 1 (before the previous fair) and ends on July 1 of the current year. Educational credits earned July 1 prior to the current year's fair will be applied to the following year's market livestock sale qualification.
- All educational classes/shows/YQCA Certification must be submitted within 10 days of event or completion for meeting credit. After 10 days, NO points will be counted.
- All approved events will be posted on the Fond du Lac County Meat Animal Project Website at:  
<http://fyi.uwex.edu/fdlmeat/calendar-ofevents/>.
  - Events not listed on the Meat Animal Project Website must be first pre-approved by the Market Livestock Sale Committee. It is up to the exhibitor to provide documentation (agenda, brochure, etc.) regarding the event for approval. A livestock project activity form must be signed by the event coordinator and submitted to UW-Extension for credit. Criteria used for points determination are:
    - 2 points-meetings 1 to 2 hours in length, exhibit livestock at any show
    - 3 points-meetings ½ day in length (3 – 6 hours)
    - 4 points-judging teams, quiz bowl teams, meetings 1 day in length (6 or more hours)
    - 6 points-meetings 2 or more days in length
    - 1 point-any meeting in conjunction with a show, sale or livestock event (i.e. World Beef Expo, World Pork Expo, etc.)
    - 4 points-high school or college meat animal related class
    - 2 points-livestock related public presentation (i.e. Day on a farm, Civic groups, etc.)

### **Weigh-ins**

#### *Initial Identification:*

- During initial identification multiple names may be indicated for an individual animal only in the case where it is within a family (brothers & sisters) and the animals are housed in the same location. No "switching" of animals may occur



outside of immediate family members between initial and final weigh-in.

- Dates for initial identification will be set by the MLC.
- At initial identification, the maximum of animals an exhibitor can identify are:
  - 3 steers
  - 5 hogs
  - 5 goats
  - 5 lambs
- Upon the time of initial identification, all male animals must be castrated by excisional or banding methods. Crimping will not be allowed. Animals must have no physical sign of viable testicles at the initial identification. If there is any question at the time of initial identification as to if the animal is castrated, the animal will not leave the grounds until it is examined by a veterinary clinic not associated with the exhibitor. The exhibitor will be responsible for all costs incurred as a result of examination.

Veterinary prognosis is final.

- All beef must be dehorned and healed by initial identification.
- All goats must be disbudded or dehorned. If a scur occurs it must be kept to two inches or less with a blunt end.
- Photos of inserted ear tags must be submitted at the time of initial identification paperwork deadline.

Exhibitors will be told the weight of their animal at the time of the weigh-in (initial and final). All livestock animals will be double-tagged at initial weigh-in. One tag will be a RFID tag and an additional tamper-proof tag. Scrapie tags will be used as secondary identification on sheep and meat goats if already tagged. If an animal loses a tag, the MLC needs to be contacted to re-tag the animal. If an animal loses both tags, the animal will be disqualified from the competition.

#### *Final Weigh-in:*

All market animals will be weighed during designated weigh-in times on Tuesday of the Fair. Exhibitors will be informed at the time of the final weigh-in if their animal does not meet the minimum weight requirements, as outlined below, for the market livestock sale.

#### **Weight eligibility requirements for the sale are as follows:**

**Beef Steers:** Final minimum weight of 1200 lbs.

**Dairy Steers:** Final minimum weight of 1500 lbs.

**Dairy x Dairy Crossbred steer: Final minimum weight of 1200 lbs.**

**Dairy x Beef Crossbred steer: Final Minimum weight of 1200 lbs.**

**Market Swine:** Final minimum weight 230lbs.

No final maximum, but sale price at auction will be paid for a maximum weight of 300 lbs.

**Lambs:** Final minimum final weight 100 lbs.

**Market Goats:** Final minimum weight 55 lbs.

Exhibitors will not be allowed to reweigh underweight animals. No drenching allowed.

Animals must be dry at time of final weigh-in. If an exhibitor disputes the weight of their animal at the time of weigh-in, the scale will be checked using standardized weights and the animal will be reweighed. Weight is final.

#### The Sale:

There will be a 5% maximum deduction from the selling price of each animal to promote and finance the meat animal sale, purchase equipment, and conduct overall educational programs. An animal will not be eligible to sell if it has been disqualified by the sale committee and/or is judged as not in a saleable condition.

The Fair Board and Market Sale Committee does not guarantee sale price. It is up to the project member to solicit prospective buyers.

Animals can be sold only once during the Livestock Sale.

Exhibitors leading their animals into the sale ring must be wearing collared shirts (no tee shirts) and clean pants or skirts. The Market Livestock committee reserves the right to prohibit sale of an animal if the exhibitor is not properly dressed.

**The sale is a terminal sale.** All animals sold in sale are to go to slaughter.

Buyers take ownership of the animals after the sale but understand the animal will go to slaughter after the fair.

A Market Animal Identification Card, provided by the Fair Office, must identify all livestock sold. It shall be the exhibitor's responsibility to have this card or a similar card properly displayed over the animal's pen or stall by noon on Friday.

#### Project Record:

All market livestock sale participants must complete an official Market Livestock Production Record Form. Forms are located at <http://fyi.uwex.edu/fdlmeat/forms/> and must be completed and mailed back to the UW-Extension office by the Friday following Labor Day. Failure to

successfully complete and turn-in the form on time may result in loss of sale privileges for the subsequent year. The Market Livestock Committee will check forms and all decisions will be final.

#### Thank You Cards:

It is expected that the exhibitor sends a thank you letter to the buyer for their animal and/or award sponsor(s) at the time/before collecting their sale check from the MLC.

#### **HOLSTEIN FUTURITY**

The Holstein Futurity, held Friday evening of the Fair in the Cow Palace, is organized by the Fond du Lac County Holstein Association.

The premier show features men and women dressed in formal attire, leading two-year-old and five-year-old animals. Special decorations adorn the building.

Everyone showing will be given a monetary award. Medallions will be awarded to the top ten animals. Special awards will be given to best udder; first place bred and owned; and best dressed show person. For more information, contact Richard Julka (920-979-2400).

#### **FAIREST OF THE FAIR COMPETITION FOND DU LAC COUNTY**

Winner will be selected during a separate competition prior to the Fond du Lac County Fair.

##### Eligibility and Rules

Contestant must be over the age of 18 as of January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year.

Contestant must have been a resident of Fond du Lac County for at least one year or be an active member of a Fond du Lac County youth organization involved in exhibiting at the County Fair. Contestants agree that time, manner and method of judging shall solely be within the discretion of the rules and regulations set forth by the Fairest of the Fair Committee of the Wisconsin Association of Fairs with the decision of the judges being final.

Contestants will be judged wearing business professional attire. Judging on the county level will be based on the following assets: Personality, Poise, Appearance, Community Activities, Speaking

Ability, Radio Interview and a 30-second Public Service Announcement. To apply, contestants need to fill out an entry form which is available at [www.fonddulacountyfair.com](http://www.fonddulacountyfair.com). Contestants also need to submit a 2"x3" wallet-sized photo (head and shoulders). A 30 second Public Service Announcement is also required when applying. As Fairest of the Fair, you will be the ambassador

for the fair. You will be expected to attend various events where you will be asked to promote the fair and its many functions. Fairest of the Fair is expected to attend all five days of the fair and be on hand for impromptu appearances as needed. As Fairest of the Fair, you will compete for the State Fairest for the Fair at the State Convention which is held in January. For more information contact Tiffany Venne (920-979-0508).

#### **Overnight Rules and Regulations**

1. Campsites will be provided for campers.  
There will be a fee for each camper unit. Each camper and any individual staying in a camper must be registered in the Fair Office. There must be an adult staying in each camper. This will be strictly enforced for the safety and well-being of all persons. Each camper unit will receive a number upon registration & must be clearly displayed on the camper. Fond du Lac County Fair Code of Conduct and Disciplinary Action Guidelines will be enforced. No campers before noon on Monday. The Fair Board is not responsible for any damages, stolen or lost items that may occur while at the Fond du Lac County Fair.
2. A 12:00 midnight curfew will be strictly enforced for all. A person that must be out after midnight curfew must inform the Sheriff's Department that are on duty of such a need or face disciplinary action.
3. All overnight people must have Fair issued ID with them at all times.
4. No youth exhibitors will be allowed to stay on the grounds without a parent or chaperone.
5. Chaperones must be at least 21 years of age by January 1<sup>st</sup> of the Fair year, register with the Fair, and be accepted by the Fair.
6. No chaperone will be responsible for more than 10 youth exhibitors.

#### **CODE OF CONDUCT**

##### **Good Conduct Policy**

**All exhibitors are expected to conduct themselves in a cooperative and curious manner while participating in events associated with the Fond du Lac County Fair.** Exhibitors who wish to have the privilege of participating in Fond du Lac County Fair activities must conduct themselves in accordance with the Good Conduct Policy. Youth exhibitors having the use or possession of alcoholic beverages, tobacco, or illegal drugs by any exhibitor, regardless of age, on the Fond du Lac County Fairgrounds (barns, exhibiting facilities, campgrounds, etc.) will result in the following:

- A. If the violation occurs before or during exhibiting, the exhibitor is ineligible to

participate in Fond du Lac County Fair activities and must remove his/her exhibit(s) from the Fairgrounds.

- B. If the violation occurs after exhibiting, the exhibitor forfeits his/her premium money, trophies/banners and/or sale of champions money, and must remove his/her exhibit(s) from the Fairgrounds.
- C. The violation will be reported to the exhibitor's youth organization for further action under the organization's Good Conduct Policy.
- D. A meeting of the member, parent, and advisor with Fond du Lac County Fair officials will be held to determine future member eligibility.

#### **Code of Show Ring Ethics**

Exhibitors participating in Fond du Lac County Fair will be obligated to understand and abide by the Code of Ethics described as follows: Youth are expected to be sincere, honest and act in sportsmanlike ways at all times. Youth represent the entire program and their behavior reflects on their parents, leaders, school, and the entire program. All adults involved with a youth program, leaders as well as parents, are expected to set positive examples and serve as positive role models by what they say and do. Any exhibitor who breaks the Code of Ethics or allows another person (adult or peer) to talk to them into violating the Code of Ethics agrees to forfeit all prizes, awards, and premiums. The exhibitor may also be prohibited from exhibiting at this fair. Exhibitors agree to follow these guidelines:

- A. I will do my own work, appropriate for my age and physical and mental development. This includes research and writing of exhibit explanations, preparing exhibits (building, refinishing, etc.) care and grooming of animals, etc. Assistance should help guide and support me, not do it for me.
- B. All exhibits will be true representations of my work. Any attempt to take credit for other's work, alter the conformation of animals, or alter their performance is prohibited. Copyright violation or allowing others to complete my exhibit is considered misrepresentation and is prohibited.
- C. I will treat all people and animals with respect. I will provide appropriate care for animals.
- D. I will present exhibits that are safe for consumption. All exhibits will be safe for judges to evaluate and for exhibition.
- E. All food animals that may be sent to market immediately following the show shall be safe for consumers, and shall have met all withdrawal times for all medications, and be free of violative drug residue.
- F. If any animal requires medical treatment while at the Fair, only an official Fond du Lac County Fair Veterinarian may administer the treatment. All medications that are administered shall be

done according to the label instructions of the medication used.

- G. My animal's appearance or performance shall not be altered by any means, including medications, external applications and surgical procedures. Any animal that is found to have changed its appearance or its performance shall be disqualified from the show, and have penalties assessed against me, my parent(s) and/or guardian by the Management of the Fond du Lac County Fair.
- H. I will follow all ownership and possession rules, and if requested, will provide the necessary documentation.
- I. I will follow all livestock health requirements for the Fond du Lac County Fair, according to the state health requirements as printed in the Premium Book. I will provide animal health certificates from a licensed veterinarian upon request from the Management of the Fond du Lac County Fair.
- J. By entering an animal in this Fair, I am giving consent to the Management of the Fond du Lac County Fair to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. If the laboratory report on the analysis of any sample indicates a presence of forbidden drugs, this shall be evidence such substance has been administered to the animal(s) either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on me, my parent(s) and/or guardian to prove otherwise.
- K. I am responsible for my exhibit and I will not allow others to violate this Code on my behalf. By entering an exhibit in this Fair I will accept any disciplinary action take by the Management of the Fond du Lac County Fair for any violation of this Code of Ethics and any other rules of competition of the Fair without recourse against the Fond du Lac County Fair.
- L. I want my exhibit to be an example of how to accept what life has to offer, both good and not so good, and how to live with and learn from the outcome.
- M. I will not be involved in any illegal activities while participating in Fond du Lac County Fair events, including but not limited to alcohol, tobacco, or drug use.

- N. Actions of parents/guardians are a reflection of the exhibitors, therefore, parents/guardians are required to abide by the Good Conduct Policy and Code of Show Ring Ethics.

### **Fair Disciplinary Guidelines**

Below are disciplinary actions to be taken if a youth exhibitor or parent/guardian violates the Code of Ethics. The degree of violation will dictate the disciplinary action.

1. Individual to be sent home immediately and overnight privilege suspended for the remainder of the current Fair.
2. Individual and exhibits to be sent home, withdrawal of all premium money and auction money and suspended from further exhibiting at current Fair.
3. In addition to #2, individual will be placed on probation for the next year's County Fair.
4. In addition to #3, proper authorities will be notified if a violation of applicable federal, state, or municipal law is involved.

### **Fond du Lac County Fair Youth Organization Expectations/Requirements**

1. Organizations must apply for Fond du Lac County Fair approved status annually by completing a youth organization application and submitting it to the Fond du Lac County Fair for approval by January 1<sup>st</sup> of the upcoming year's Fair.
2. Approved organizations must have adult leadership who will serve as a Fond du Lac County Fair liaison to communicate with membership, authorize member status compliance, provide exhibition guidelines and provide organizational leadership and accountability for members leading up to, during and after the Fond du Lac County Fair. Organization must notify the Fair office of any changes to adult leaders within 30 days.

3. Organizations must consist of at least 4 members from at least 2 different families. Organization membership age requirements may vary but must be open to members between the ages of 8 to 19 years old as of January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year to meet the Fond du Lac County Fair eligibility requirements. Membership outside of the Fond du Lac County Fair age requirement (8 to 19) is allowable but those members are not eligible to exhibit in the Fond du Lac County Fair Junior show. Organizations may set their own members in good standing rules or additional restrictions for youth to be able to represent their organization as an exhibitor at the Fond du Lac County Fair.

4. Youth must be official members of the respective organization by March 1st of the current Fair year. The Fair office will send a list of exhibitors who completed Fair entries to the respective organization's adult leader listed on the application after the entry deadline verifying if the potential exhibitor is in good standing.

5. Approved organizations must provide/offer educational curriculum/components. The following are examples of educational components:

- Project related events: Ex.)

Meetings, Demonstrations,  
Clinics, Industry exhibitions,  
Meetings, Competitions •

Recreation/Social

Activities (roller-skating,  
bowling, fundraising event, etc.)

- Organizational Meetings (monthly, committee, conventions/conference)
- Community Event Participation:

acts of community involvement or good will

6. It is each individual organization's discretion how they will monitor/document member compliance to determine member in good standing status. All potential Fond du Lac County Fair exhibitors must meet their organization's membership expectations/requirements and the above Fond du Lac County Fair listed expectations/requirements which includes date compliance for Fond du Lac County Fair program/entry submittal and rules/entry requirements as outlined in the premium

book. Fond du Lac County Fair reserves the right to audit at any time an organization for documentation of organizational activities and member compliance. Evidence of noncompliance may disqualify a member from Fond du Lac County Fair participation and/or revoke an organization's future Fond du Lac County Fair approved status.

## JUNIOR AND OPEN EXHIBITS

### GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Rules and regulations of the bylaws of the Fond du Lac County Agricultural Society will be enforced and will govern all exhibits, copy of which may be secured from the Fair Board. **Exhibitors**

#### **and Exhibits**

1. See Fond du Lac County Fair Youth Organization Expectations/Requirements
2. All exhibits must be in place after the designated date of judging and must stay in place until 6:00 p.m. Sunday evening of the Fair.
3. Entries are made online.
4. Exhibitors will confer a favor on the officers of the Society by making their entries as early as possible.
5. Entry tags will be picked up by a designated date set by the Fair Office. When you get your entry tags, see that they correspond with the entries you have made and that you have the right number of tags. Corrections need to be made by the designated date.
6. Make sure all items have their entry tags securely attached to the project prior to arriving at the Fairgrounds. The Fair Board will dispose of exhibit

not called for by the end of the day on Sunday evening.

7. Exhibits must keep their stalls open and their stock uncovered between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m. during each day of the exhibition. All dairy and livestock barns will be closed at 9:00 p.m.
8. No leader or organization may withhold a Fair Premium check; the Fond du Lac County Fair Board is the only one that may withhold a premium check.
9. Any emergency not provided for in these rules and in the Bylaws of the Society shall be referred to the Fair Board and their decision shall be final.
10. All exhibitors in Open Class must pay an exhibitor fee. All exhibitors must be five years of age by January 1<sup>st</sup> preceding the Fair to exhibit any animal in the Open Show.
11. All premium checks will be distributed to exhibitors Sunday evening when projects are dismissed. Checks must be cashed within 60 days after they are received. Any questions regarding Fair checks should be directed to the Fair Treasurer. If state aid is reduced, premiums may be reduced accordingly.
12. Exhibitors are requested to pay particular attention to their article or animal on exhibition and at the close of the Fair take charge of the same. The Fond du Lac County Agricultural Society, Fond du Lac County, etc. will take every precaution for their safe keeping, but will not be responsible for any damage or accident that may occur. Exhibitors will be held responsible for any accident, which may be caused by their entries.
13. The Fond du Lac County Agricultural Society (Fair Board) should be notified immediately in regard to exhibitor and/or entry complaints.
14. Appeals: Before any exhibitor is disqualified he or she shall be granted the right to meet with the Fair Board on the potential disqualification.
15. Late entries can be granted at the discretion of the fair board and are subject to: a \$50 late fee, a minimum of 4 hours of volunteer hours, and potential forfeiture of premiums and sale proceeds.
16. Exhibitors who have entered incorrectly will be allowed to show for ribbon only, but will not receive a premium. They are not eligible for Champion awards.

## REFRESHMENTS

The Fond du Lac County Agricultural Society will lease grounds sufficiently large enough for refreshment stands, shows, etc., upon payment rental.

## ADVERTISING MATTER

No person shall be permitted to distribute advertising matter upon the grounds except for their place of business or exhibit. The tacking or posting of any advertisements bills, cards, etc., other than within space occupied by exhibitors is strictly prohibited. The distribution of handbills, fliers, heralds, etc., will not under any circumstances be permitted. Anyone violating this rule, hereby referred to the "booth rule", is liable to fines or expulsion from the grounds, as the County Fair Officials may elect. No person/persons, firm or corporation shall sell, solicit sales, and offer for sale or otherwise dispose of stocks, in any corporation, concern, or organization of any name or character, upon the County Fairgrounds.

## REGULATIONS FOR STATE AID

The Fond du Lac County Ag Society operates by the rules set forth by the Department of Ag, Trade, and Consumer Protection. Below is the version of this rule as of the date of print of this premium book. Any changes or updates to this code will become rules for our Fair. Reference [https://docs.legis.wisconsin.gov/code/admin\\_code/atcp/140/160/Title](https://docs.legis.wisconsin.gov/code/admin_code/atcp/140/160/Title) for the most up to date version of ATCP 160.

These regulations for premiums, judging, accounts, and reports have been drafted with the aid and cooperation of the directors of the Wisconsin Association of Fairs and in compliance with the state laws regulating county and district fairs. Their enforcement is one of the duties of the Division of Fairs of the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture. We solicit the cooperation of officials of every fair carrying out these regulations, which your directors have considered to be in the best interest of the county and district fairs of Wisconsin.

**ATCP 160.01 Definitions. Definitions.** As used in this chapter:

- (1) "Breed class" and "breeding class" mean a specific breed within a class such as Holstein in the dairy class.
- (2) "Class" means a grouping in which exhibits may be entered, including an animal breed or age group for animal exhibits; a type of produce, crop or food; or a specific age, age group or educational grade level of exhibitor.
- (3) "Danish judging system" means a judging system that allows for multiple first, second, third and fourth class selections as provided in s. ATCP 160.91 (4) (b).
- (4) "Department" as it relates to the organizational structure of a fair, means an animal species, production group, or other principal classification of exhibits. As used in any other context, "department"

means the state of Wisconsin department of agriculture, trade and consumer protection.

- (5) "Division" means one of 3 exhibitor group classifications for a fair and is limited to junior division, open division and senior citizens division.
  - (6) "Entry class" means a class in which the fair allows exhibitors to submit entries.
  - (7) "Exotic domestic animal" means an animal that is not a common farm animal.
  - (8) "Lot" or "lot number" means the numerical designation assigned by a local fair for a specific category of exhibits within a class.
  - (9) "Market class" means a class that includes animals of a certain weight for the breed class that can be sold for slaughter.
  - (10) "Premium" means a monetary prize that a county or district fair awards to an exhibitor after judging all competing exhibits in the class to which the premium pertains.
  - (11) "Regular judging system" means a judging system that allows for one first, second, third and fourth class selection as provided in s. ATCP 160.91 (4) (c).
  - (12) "Self determined project" means a project that meets all of the following criteria: (a) It is approved by the fair board. (b) Its subject matter is related to any of the junior fair departments 9, 10, 13 to 16, 18, or 20 to 29.
- (c) It does not fall into a defined entry class within any department.
  - (d) It is carried out by a 4-H member enrolled in a designated 4-H project or alternative project that follows 4-H guidelines, or by a member of another youth organization that does equivalent work.

#### **ATCP 160.02 Premium requirements.**

##### **(1) GENERAL.**

- (a) The state aid authorized by s. 93.23 (1), Stats., may be paid on net premiums paid by a county or district fair. The department may withhold state premium aid from any fair that does not enforce animal health provisions under ch. ATCP 10 that are applicable to animals exhibited at the fair. State aid will be paid only on premiums actually paid by bank check or draft.
- (b) No deductions may be made from premium money won by an exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition rules established by the fair association are violated. A written statement of violation shall be submitted to the department to justify action taken by a local fair.
- (c) Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of the financial condition or the

organization or for any other reason. (d) State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open division individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits, and no more than one premium in all other classes, including poultry and rabbits.

(e) No county or district fair may receive state aid for a premium awarded to any exhibitor in the open division if that exhibitor entered the same exhibit in the junior division at the same county or district fair. This paragraph does not apply if the exhibit was entered in the junior division only as part of a herd group, carcass class or performance class. (f) No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups, trophy prizes or entertainment contests.

(2) PREMIUM LISTS. (a) Premiums for which state aid is requested by county and district fairs shall conform with the uniform premium list and other requirements set forth in these rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net premiums shall submit to the department a printed copy of the premium list used at the fair, as required under s.

ATCP 160.92 (3) (c).

(b) The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the premium list to other associations, societies, or boards conducting a fair in Wisconsin upon request.

(c) Sections ATCP 160.01 through 160.07 and 160.91 shall be published in premium books used by a fair for which state aid is requested.

(3) ENTRY FEES. (a) A county or district fair may charge an exhibitor an entry fee. The entry fee may not exceed 10% of the sum of all premiums offered to exhibitors in the same class for which the entry fee is charged. In lieu of an entry fee, a county or district fair may charge stall rents for horses, cattle, sheep, goats, swine, poultry, rabbits or pets. (b) Exhibitors in department 35 shall not be required to purchase an exhibitor's ticket. Any other exhibitor may be required, if no entry fee is charged, to purchase an exhibitor's season ticket at a price not to exceed that charged for a non-exhibitor's season ticket.

(4) SPLIT FAIR DATES. (a) For purposes of this subsection, "split fair dates" occur when a fair organization judges exhibits or contests and pays premiums at more than one time or at more than one location during the calendar year. (b) Except as provided under par. (c), the department may not pay state aid for a fair having split dates unless the department gives advance written approval for a split fair. The department may approve split fair dates only if the fair organization justifies the split dates based on extreme hardship. If the department approves split dates, all blue ribbon winners shall repeat their demonstrations or exhibits at the



regular fair dates unless the department grants a hardship exemption. An exhibitor may use audio–visual media, still photography or an educational display to repeat a demonstration or exhibit.

(c) The department may pay state aid for the following exhibits or contests in a fair having split dates, regardless of whether the department approves those split dates in advance:

1. Clothing revue.
2. Demonstrations.
3. Favorite foods revue.
4. Dogs.
5. Small animals.
6. Rocketry.
7. Shooting sports.
8. Other exhibits and contests that are similar to those identified in subds. 1. to 7.

**ATCP 160.03 Exhibition requirements.**

A county or district fair shall meet all of the exhibition requirements of this section to be eligible for state premium aid.

- (1) No fair society or other organization sponsoring a county or district fair shall require an exhibitor to become a member of the organization in order to enter an exhibit at the fair, nor shall the sponsoring organization make any deduction from an exhibitor's premium as a donation to the fair society, or require an exhibitor in any other way to make a donation to the society.
- (2) State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aid may not be approved for payment of premiums to an exhibitor having an out-of-state address but claiming Wisconsin residency unless the fair secretary provides the department with an affidavit that the exhibitor's residence is geographically located within the state.
- (3) State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in an exhibit building or actually shown in the show ring on regular fair dates unless approval for split fair dates is obtained under s. ATCP 160.02 (4). State aid may not be paid on Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, transportation aid, production contests or other special educational exhibits unless prior approval is obtained under s. ATCP 160.04 (8).
- (4) State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the fairgrounds before 4 p.m. of the last day of the fair, or such other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior approval of the department. Authority for earlier removal may be granted by the department in case of meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before

the beginning of the fair. In other hardship cases, approval may be granted by the local fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes may be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain present during the entire fair. The local fair may prescribe the length of time junior fair exhibitors of horses shall keep their animals on the grounds.

**ATCP 160.04 Junior fair division; general.**

(1) In the junior fair division, the department may pay state aid on prizes offered to exhibitors who are under 20 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year. A county or district fair board may establish subgroups within a junior fair entry class based on the exhibitor's

grade in school. The department may not pay state aid on prizes for club parades, club floats, song contests, or a project which is not an exhibit or demonstration at the fair.

(2) All exhibitors in the junior fair division shall be members of 4-H, FFA, a scouting program, a breed group, or another recognized youth organization under adult leadership that has an education program appropriate to that organization and is approved by the fair board.

(3) Exhibits in the junior fair shall be the product of the exhibitor's own labor. An exhibit may include a study project, merit project or other special project, a skill area, or a supervised occupational experience in which the exhibitor is regularly enrolled, provided that the fair board approves the project, skill area, or supervised occupational experience as an exhibit.

(4) State aid may not be used to award more than one premium to any exhibitor in any department in the junior fair division, except that:

- (a) A premium may be awarded to each member of a group that collectively owns and enters a livestock exhibit in departments one to 5 of subch. IV. (b) An exhibitor may receive a separate premium for showmanship where authorized under subch. IV. (c) An exhibitor may receive more than one premium in a department for which additional premiums are specifically authorized under subch. IV.

(5) Under subch. IV, within each of the junior fair departments 9, 10, 13 to 16, 18, and 20 to 29, a fair board may establish one or more entry classes for self-determined projects that are related to that department. The fair board may establish class entry criteria, including student grade level criteria. Entry classes are open to 4-H members enrolled in a designated 4-H project or an alternative project that follows 4-H project guidelines, and to members of other youth organizations that do equivalent work and apply equivalent guidelines. Exhibits may be judged using the regular or Danish judging system. For each entry class, a fair board may pay



first–place to fourth–place premiums at any of the following levels designated by the board:

- (a) Premium level one: \$2.00, \$1.75, \$1.50, \$1.25.  
(b) Premium level 2: \$2.50, \$2.25, \$2.00, \$1.75. (c) Premium level 3: \$3.00, \$2.75, \$2.50, \$2.25. (6) If 16 or more animals, items or articles are entered in any junior fair class, the class may be divided into 2 or more approximately equal groups according to weight, age or other identifying characteristic and each group judged as a class.

(7) Special educational exhibits may [be] established if the proposal is presented to the Wisconsin association of fairs before October 1 of the year preceding its proposed establishment and the exhibit is approved by the department. (8) Within any junior fair department under subch. IV, a county or district fair may establish special classes where none are specified under subch. IV. Special classes may include classes for grade and crossbred females in the beef, swine, sheep and horse departments. Premiums for special classes created under this subsection shall be equal to premiums for comparable classes established in the same department under subch. IV.

#### **ATCP 160.05 Open division; general requirements.**

- (1) The total maximum premiums set forth for all places in any open division livestock class, excluding poultry and rabbits, may be divided into premiums for a greater number of places, but the maximum premium offered for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum for last place in the class.  
(2) All animals in any open division class shall be owned by the exhibitor, except as provided in s. ATCP 160.09.

#### **ATCP 160.06 Senior citizens division; general requirements.**

- (1) The age of exhibitors in the senior citizens division is limited to persons 62 years of age or over.  
(2) Exhibitors in the senior citizens division may not enter identical items or articles in both the senior citizens division and the corresponding classes of the regular open division.

#### **ATCP 160.07 Classes; general requirements.**

- (1) Classes may be combined if the number of entries in several single classes is insufficient. If any classes are combined, state aid shall be limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class of animals, items or articles in that department.

(2) (a) Except as provided under par. (b), no county or district fair may receive state aid for premiums awarded for sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, goats, swine or horses unless those animals are registered purebreds. Registered purebred status shall be documented by a certificate of registry from the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the application for registration.

(b) Paragraph (a) does not apply to dairy cattle exhibited at a county or district fair if a national breed association certifies that those dairy cattle are recorded in that breed association's qualified herd book which records the genealogy of that breed.

(3) Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be exhibited in a class for individual animals. (4) Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine department unless their tusks have been removed.

(5) The age of an animal, for purposes of determining its entry class under this chapter, shall be determined as of the opening day of the fair.

#### **ATCP 160.91 Judging regulations.**

- (1) Judging shall be done at county and district fairs by individuals who are registered with the department and who have knowledge, training or experience in the specific class or classes to be judged as determined by the department. Judging shall be done in accordance with the requirements of s. ATCP 160.92 (3) (a). In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair; nor shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department.  
(2) Each judge at a county or district fair shall be provided with a copy of the fair's premium book or list of entry classes at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair.  
(3) No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class.  
(4) (a) No state aid will be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any classes except in the junior and educational departments. (b) When classes in the junior and educational departments are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placings shall be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first 2 groups and not more than 6 in the first 3 groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the

class, there shall not be more than 25% in the first group, not more than 50% in the first 2 groups, and not more than 75% in the first 3 groups.

(c) The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.

(5) If any class of exhibits at a county or district fair is judged according to the regular system, the judges for that class may give only one first-place, one second-place, one third-place and one fourth-place award in that class.

**INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS  
AND  
EXPOSITIONS (IAFE) NATIONAL CODE OF  
SHOW RING ETHICS  
The Fond du Lac County AG Society adopts  
this code for our animal shows.**

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1) All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.

2) Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.

3) Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows. 4) Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of, consent by the owner,

exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory, to which it is sent, is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5) Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of

protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited. **6)** The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

**7)** Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

**8)** No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

**9)** The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics. **10)** The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including *Fairs and Expos* and any special notices to members.

**11)** The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

## **REGULATIONS/REQUIREMENTS FOR FAIRS AND SHOWS IN WISCONSIN: 2023 SEASON**

This is a summary of animal health requirements for fairs, shows and exhibitions only. They are not necessarily the same as requirements for importing animals into Wisconsin or moving them within the state for other purposes. They may change if animal diseases occur in Wisconsin or elsewhere, so you should always check our website or contact us for current information.

Exhibitors are encouraged to check with their veterinarian to make sure vaccines for respiratory, shipping fever, diarrhea, etc. are up-to-date. Any health rule changes will be updated through the Fond du Lac County Extension Office.

### **General requirements for show organizers**

All fairs or exhibitions of any length must obtain, review, and keep for five years all required records and test results:

- Exhibitor's name and address
- Animal identification (number, type, description)
  - Compliance with disease testing and other health requirements
  - Livestock premises number, if any, where animals originated
  - If requested by the fair or show organizer, the documentation showing legal importation (if applicable) and movement to the event

**Fairs or exhibitions lasting more than 24 hours** must appoint a licensed veterinarian to inspect all animals daily and review the above-required records. Diseased animals that show evidence of having contagious or infectious diseases may not be commingled (or housed/kept) with other animals at a fair, show, or other exhibition in such a way as to allow disease to spread. Such animals should not attend the fair, show, or exhibition. Animals may be denied entry if they arrive at these events with contagious or infectious diseases, isolated and/or removed if they develop disease after arriving, or be subject to other action as would be necessary to control disease. Bovine animals with ringworm, mange, warts or scab will be removed from the fair or exhibition premises, unless the veterinarian in charge finds warts or ringworm lesions are incapable of transmitting disease.

## **ANIMAL HEALTH**

## **Cattle and Bison**

**Cattle from within Wisconsin** have no requirements for tests or health documents. **Cattle from outside Wisconsin must:**

- Be accompanied by certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) documenting official animal ID and all required tests and certifications

- Have at least one form of official individual ID (including steers)
- Meet all of Wisconsin's normal requirements for import (see [https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs\\_Services/CattleBison.aspx](https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/CattleBison.aspx))

### **Acceptable animal IDs for all cattle from outside Wisconsin**

- USDA metal ear tag number that is part of the National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) (starts with state 2-digit code, also known as "brite" tag); this includes the orange brucellosis vaccination tag
- 15-digit "840" tags (visual or RFID)
- Valid only if applied before March 11, 2015:
  - o Manufacturer-coded RFID tag - 15-digit number with the first three digits in 900s
  - o American ID tag – 8 to 12-digit number prefaced with "USA" AH-FR-100-P (01/2017)

### **Brucellosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin**

No cattle from outside Wisconsin are currently required to be brucellosis-tested or vaccinated to come to fairs and shows in Wisconsin.

**Tuberculosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin** For requirements by state, see:

**Cattle from Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone (for cattle from Michigan's TB Free Zone, see requirements by state above) also need:**

- Import permit
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older
- Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin
- To return directly to the state of origin after the show, and there must be a statement on the CVI that they will be doing so

**Cattle from Canada** must meet current federal requirements to enter the United States. ## **Swine**

**ALL** Swine need a certificate of veterinary inspection that includes the following:

- A statement of the PEDv status of the herd of origin (if known)
- A statement of the PRRS status of the herd of origin (if known)
- A statement that the veterinarian has inspected the entire herd of origin within the past 30 days and that no apparent disease was present at the time of inspection, and official identification number.

Acceptable methods of ID for swine are:

- USDA silver ear tag
- USDA 840 ear tag, either visual or RFID.
- Breed association tattoo if the pig is a purebred and the tattoo is registered.
- An ear tag with the premises identification number and a unique identifier
- Ear notch (if the pig is a purebred and the notch is registered)

## **Sheep and goats**

**Sheep and goats from within Wisconsin** need:

- If sexually intact, need official individual ID at any age
  - If not sexually intact, need official individual ID if they are 12 months or older
- Official ID includes scrapie ear tags or tattoos, USDA 840 ear tag, approved microchips if a reader is available and if accompanied by breed registration papers

in the owner's name, or breed association tattoo if accompanied by registration papers in the owner's name · Cannot be under restriction for movement to fairs and shows AH-FR-100-P (01/2017) Sheep and goats (cont.)

### **Sheep and goats from outside Wisconsin**

#### **need:**

· Certificate of veterinary inspection and official individual ID: scrapie ear tags or tattoos, USDA 840 ear tag, approved microchips if a reader is available and if accompanied by breed registration papers in the owner's name, or breed association tattoo if accompanied by registration papers in the owner's name

### **Goats from Michigan's TB Modified**

#### **Accredited Zone also need:**

- Import permit
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older · Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin
- To return directly to the state of origin after the show, and there must be a statement on the CVI that they will be doing so

### **Equine**

**Equine animals from within Wisconsin** need documentation of a negative EIA test done within the previous 12 months, which clearly identifies the animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip (if a reader is available). Documentation may be:

- Official test report VS 10-11, or
- USDA-approved electronic test form, or

- Global Vet Link EIA electronic form, or
- Certificate of veterinary inspection with the test results listed

### **Equine animals from outside Wisconsin**

**need:** · Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) which clearly identifies the animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip

- Negative EIA test done within previous 12 months that is reported on the CVI

**Equines from Minnesota** are exempt from the CVI requirement if:

· Ownership does not change while the animal is in Wisconsin

· The animal remains in Wisconsin no longer than 7 days

· Proof of a negative EIA test in previous 12 months accompanies the animal Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. ### **South American camelids: llamas, alpacas, guanacos**

**South American camelids from within Wisconsin** have no requirements. **South American camelids from outside Wisconsin** must have a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) and official animal ID. Official ID may be:

- Approved USDA ear tag number
- Microchip number
- Breed association registration number
- Breed association tattoo Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant.

### **Exotic Ruminants**

**Note:** Exotic ruminants are ruminants that are not native to Wisconsin, and are not cervids – for example, Old World camels, yaks, water buffalo, pronghorn antelope, giraffes, and non-domestic sheep and goats.

**Exotic ruminants from within Wisconsin** have no requirements. **Exotic ruminants from outside Wisconsin** must have:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI)
- Official animal ID (one of the following)
  - o Approved USDA ear tag number

- o Microchip number
  - o Breed association registration number
  - o Breed association tattoo
    - o Import permit
  - Proof written on the CVI that they meet requirements for:
    - o Bovine TB – negative test required within 60 days before entry
    - o Brucellosis – negative test required within 30 days before entry
- Please call 608-224-4872 beforehand to determine which TB test to use.

**Poultry and Waterfowl** (Pigeons are not considered poultry for fairs and shows)

**Poultry and waterfowl from within Wisconsin need:**

- A NPIP certificate stating that the birds originate from a US pullorum-typhoid clean or NPIP affiliate flock and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum, or
- A DATCP-issued certificate stating they are from a Wisconsin Tested or Associate Flock and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum or
- Individually test sexually mature birds within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band ID. All birds must test negative for pullorum-typhoid, and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum.

**Poultry and waterfowl from outside**

**Wisconsin** need a certificate of veterinary inspection or equivalent (such as form VS 9-3) that states:

- They originate from a flock classified pullorum-typhoid clean under NPIP or an equivalent state program and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum, or

- If they are sexually mature, that they have tested negative for pullorum-typhoid (and

Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band ID. Not required:

- Import permit number

**Small animals: Dogs, domestic cats, and other household pets (ferrets, pet birds, rabbits, gerbils, guinea pigs, hamsters, domestic mice and rats)**

**Note:** These rules do not apply to animals that are part of menageries. For those rules, see below. Potbellied and miniature pigs fall under rules for swine. **Dogs from within Wisconsin** that are 5 months or older need proof of current rabies vaccination. **Cats and other household pets from within Wisconsin** have no requirements. **Dogs and cats from outside Wisconsin** that are 5 months or older need to be vaccinated for rabies by a licensed veterinarian, and regardless of age, need certificates of veterinary inspection stating the age of the animal and for animals 5 months and older the date of last rabies vaccination and revaccination due date. **Other household pets from outside Wisconsin** need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs) but have no testing or vaccination requirements. Small animals from other nations need to meet requirements of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (608-662-0600) and Centers for Disease Control (1800-232-4636). Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. **Exotic small animals (any species not covered by "small animals" above), exotic large animals, and other wild animals**

**Note:** Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here. **Animals from within Wisconsin** do not have any requirements as long as they are legally possessed in Wisconsin. **Animals from outside Wisconsin** generally have no testing or vaccination requirements, but do need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI)
- Import permit number

**Note:** Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin. These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice.



Others may require permits from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. See <http://dnr.wi.gov>.

### **Circus, rodeo, racing and menagerie animals**

**Note:** Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here. **Animals from within Wisconsin** must meet vaccination and testing requirements for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document. **Animals from outside Wisconsin** need certificates of veterinary inspection and vaccinations and tests required for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document. They also need import permit numbers if they are:

- Circuses and individual circus acts ·

Rodeo stock other than individual participants' horses

- Multi-species menageries (defined as any animals kept in a collection primarily for purposes of exhibition or competition)
- Petting zoos

They do not need import permit numbers if they are:

- Rodeo horses owned by individual participants

- Single-species groups

**Note:** Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin. These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice. ### **Guidelines for Housing and Managing Animals**

#### **The State Veterinarian recommends that exhibitors:**

- Vaccinate breeding cattle against bovine viral diarrhea (BVD) at least 30 days before the event
- Test cattle for BVD-PI by immunoperoxidase test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- Test cattle for Johne's disease by ELISA test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- Clean and disinfect vehicles used to transport animals to and from the show, and vehicles used at the show, before and after the show
- Isolate exhibited animals returning to their farms or animals purchased at the show for 21 days before mingling them with other stock

#### **The State Veterinarian recommends that show organizers:**

- House cattle separately from South American camelids and other exotic ruminants
- House cattle separately from small ruminants, especially sheep
- House ostriches, emus, rheas and cassowaries separately from domestic poultry
- House swine separately from any other mammals
- Include a space for the premises registration code on livestock entry forms
- Provide hand-washing stations near all livestock facilities
- Provide individual watering and feeding troughs rather than common ones

### **JUNIOR EXHIBITORS**

#### **Junior**

#### **Rules and Regulations**

Entry deadline will always be June 17 at 11:59 P.M. Check [fonddulaccountyfair.com](http://fonddulaccountyfair.com), Fond du Lac County Fair Facebook or Fair Office.

1. See Fond du Lac County Fair Youth Organization Expectations/Requirements

2. Proof of membership/any project records or registration forms and other evidence must be furnished upon demand at the time of exhibiting at the County Fair.
3. Exhibitors will be allowed only one entry for each class number unless otherwise stated under the regulations for each class.
4. Exhibitors are expected to keep all walking alleys and feed areas clean and trash or other foreign material out of manure pile.
5. All livestock shown in the Junior Department must conform to the same health regulations as required for livestock exhibits in the Open Classes.
6. Exhibitors are required to feed and bed their livestock. It is requested that the barns be kept neat and clean at all times.
7. Each exhibitor must exhibit their own livestock. The Superintendent may appoint another club member to assist in showing an animal when assistance is deemed necessary.
8. All exhibits, including barn decorations, must remain in place until 6:00 p.m., Sunday of the Fair. The Fair Office will not be responsible for any exhibits that are not claimed on Sunday. Livestock animals will be released at 6:00 p.m. on Sunday of the Fair. Livestock club displays can be removed after project load-out.
9. No trailers around the cattle barns until release time at 6:00 PM on Sunday.
10. Garments made in project and worn in the Dress Revue may be shown as individual exhibits in the clothing classes.
11. All exhibits must be in place according to the schedule set by the Fair Office. All classes except Open class require the exhibitor to bring the exhibit to the judge for face-to-face judging.
12. Many of the Junior Classes will be judged face to-face. Exhibitors are requested to carefully study the premium list, at the time of making entries, to avoid all possible mistakes and misunderstanding.
13. If an exhibitor cannot make judging day, you must fill out a card and explain your project, or virtual judging is an option. Call the fair office for more information.
14. When classes specify the grade of exhibitor, the age will have reference to the grade completed the year of the Fair.
15. Absolutely no water tanks for watering dairy and livestock animals will be permitted at the Fair.
16. Newspaper bedding is not permitted at the Fair.
17. Bedding must be clean of paper and garbage.
18. Selection of fair entries & requirements should be followed from this Fair Book. If you have questions contact the Fair Office.
19. All exhibitors must abide by the Code of Conduct and the Show Ring Code of Ethics.
20. **NO PARENTS are allowed in the show or sale rings.**

#### **Fitting/Clipping Regulations for all Animals**

1. All clipping chutes will be placed in a designated area.
2. For safety reasons, no fitting will be allowed in the aisles of the barns.
3. Fitting will be permitted in the bedding pack area within a club exhibit for that club only. Fitting in the bedding pack areas will only be allowed if it does not crowd the exhibit animals.
4. Fitting is limited to the exhibitor, a relative, or a club member/leader in the Fond du Lac County Fair or project leader.
5. Treating the animal, particularly the udder, internally or externally, with an irritant or counterirritant, or using a device to artificially create or enhance the udder crease or other substances as detected by testing that causes changes in the udder to artificially improve the conformation will not be allowed.
6. Externally sealing the teat end with a preparation that does not harm the animal's skin is permissible.
7. Administration of an injected or applied anesthetic to alter the carriage of the tail or body parts will not be allowed.
8. The maximum allowable length of naturally growing hair anywhere on the topline is not to exceed 2 inches. Exhibitors will be required to comply with this rule before the animal is allowed to enter the ring.
9. Addition of foreign objects, including but not limited to hair or hair substitutes, cloth or fiber, to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body is prohibited.
10. Surgical or unethical insertion of any matter under the skin or into body cavities, performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body though not to preclude practices required or involved in normal management i.e. administration of fluid via a stomach tube or other similar apparatus to fill the rumen will not be allowed.

#### **DEPT. 1 – JUNIOR DAIRY CATTLE**

##### **Junior**

Be sure to read "Animal Health Regulations." Refer to index page. In order to qualify for the Fond du Lac County Fair Jr. Dairy Show, individuals must attend a minimum of one fitting/showmanship



workshop. All grade animals must have a metal ear tag of some kind to be used for identification purposes. All dairy cattle must have identification forms submitted with the County Fair entry forms at the Fond du Lac County Fair office to be eligible to exhibit. All Junior dairy exhibitors must tie their dairy animals with a recognized youth organization, i.e., 4H Club, FFA, etc. Unruly animals will be set aside from the other animals and placed as the judge sees fit.

### **Release of Dairy Animals:**

All dairy animals are to remain on exhibit through the duration of the Fair except for state breed shows and illness. Only dairy animals with valid entries will be released a maximum of 48 hours before the state or district show time. Sick animals may be removed only by a written authorization by the attending veterinarian. All removal of animals is a privilege and must be approved by the Fair Board Dairy and Livestock Committee.

### **Stall Assignment**

All stalls fees for cattle will be \$1.00 per head and must be paid when entry tags are picked up. Club Leaders and Open Class exhibitors must notify the dairy superintendent one-week in advance of the Fair with the exact number of animals needing stall space. Dairy superintendents will allocate stall spaces based on the following widths: calves 3 feet; yearling 4 feet; cows 5 feet. The assignments will not be based on the number of rings. These allotments may be factored down if space is limited.

### **Display and Tack Areas**

Prefair set-up is allowed and encouraged for displays. All displays and dairy animals must be in place by Wednesday at 9am. A map for barn assignments will be displayed in each barn. Dairy superintendents will assign tack area on an equal basis to all clubs and open class exhibitors based on availability. Tack area can be used for exhibits, show boxes, feed, forks, pails, etc. If room is not available, all show boxes and materials must be stored in front of the animals or in trucks and trailers. All animals and barn decorations must remain in place until 6:00 pm Sunday of the Fair.

### **Exhibitor's Rules**

All cattle must be hornless except calves born after December 1<sup>st</sup>. Outgrowths from horn-removal will not constitute a horn unless it is pointed and

deemed hazardous by the superintendent in charge.

Newspaper bedding is not permitted.

It is recommended that dairy exhibitors should wear white bottoms: (White pants or skirts) with the top: (shirt or blouse) being white, colored or plaid. Farm logos or other advertisements of products on clothing will be considered inappropriate dress during the dairy show.

The first two blues in every class are eligible for champion awards. Ring entry in the champion class start with youngest blue, youngest second blue and continue by age to the oldest class. Animals showing for ribbon only are not eligible to show in the championship classes.

Color Breed champion awards will be offered only when 3 or more animals of the same breed are exhibited. Registered Holstein Grand and Reserve Grand Champion and Grade Holstein Grand and Reserve Grand Champion will be selected from those animals named Jr./Reserve, Jr. and Sr./Reserve, and Senior Champions from their respective breed show. A Supreme Champion Female Award will be selected from each of the respective grand champion breed winners. All cows must be adjusted to 2x milking for the duration of the Fair. Additional milking hours will be available only for preparation of show. Milking hours will be posted.

No covered "butt" huts/barns/storage areas are allowed in the barns. Sides are acceptable. All dairy animals need to be in place by 9 am on Wednesday of the Fair.

There will be 2 age divisions:

- a) Junior Fitters-Grades 3 to 8
- b) Senior Fitters-Grades 9 to 13

Contest Rules:

- Any Fond du Lac Junior Dairy Exhibitor may enter.

- You can use any animal that is entered at the Fair.
- The animal used **MUST NOT** be clipped after June 30<sup>th</sup>.
- Only the head and legs (up to hocks) may be clipped prior to the contest.
- Fitters are responsible for their own equipment, halters, clippers, extension cords, etc.
- You may have one junior dairy project member help HOLD/HANDLE the animal while fitting. That person is not to help clip or give advice during the contest.
- An area of the dairy barn will be provided for clipping. No chutes are available or to be used. You may use a 2x4 with rings to tie the animal to or tie the animal to the gates provided.
- Each contestant will have 1 ½ hours to get the animal show ready.
- At the conclusion of the contest the dairy exhibitor will parade the animal for the judge to do the final placings. No whites are needed.

#### **Dairy Age Classification**

- a) A spring calf is one born on or after March 1 of the exhibit year.
- b) A winter calf is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year.
- c) A fall calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- d) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between June 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- e) A spring yearling is one whose date of birth is between March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- f) A winter yearling is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- g) A fall yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.
- h) A 2 Jr. year-old is one born between March 1 and August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year. A

2-year-old includes a yearling that has freshened.

- i) A 2 Sr. year-old is one born September 1 and February 28 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.
- j) A 3 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.
- k) A 4 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.

A dry cow is any cow that was fresh 280 days or more, prior to the date of the show, may be shown at the option of the exhibitor in the Dry or Milking Cow Class. If the exhibitor wishes to make the selection on the day of the show, the cow must be entered in both the appropriate milking class and dry cow class. The exhibitor is also responsible for notifying the clerk and dairy superintendent of his/her choice prior to the start of the show. A cow milked less than 280 days must show in the milking class, unless she is recorded as dry on the DHIA Production Report and this must accompany the animal to be shown in the Dry Cow Class.

Junior Exhibitor Group is a group of three females including one calf, one yearling and one two year old or over.

Produce of Dam shall consist of two animals of any age, which are the produce of one cow. Dam and Offspring shall consist of a cow and one of her offspring.

Open class exhibitors stalled with junior clubs, or dairy-related youth organizations will be judged as a part of the Junior Dairy Exhibits.

The Dairy Superintendents will divide 4-H clubs or FFA chapters into half-large and half-small groups. Top 3 in each group will receive a ribbon award. If a club does not judge according to the posted schedule, they are not eligible for awards. No Fair entry required. Guidelines: Judging will be completed during the County Fair by as many clubs and agribusiness professionals as possible. Judging will be between 9:00 a.m. and must be completed by 9:00 p.m.

#### **DIVISION 16 – Market Beef**

A dairy steer is defined as a single dairy breed (ex. Holstein).

A beef steer is any steer that is a beef breed (ex. Angus) or beef cross, including dairy x beef crosses.

All market beef must be exhibited as steers without horns (1 inch stub limit). All steers must be weighed during designated final weigh-in times. Classes will be determined based upon weight.

Once you have entered into a Novice class or Backyard class, you must remain in the Novice class or Backyard class for the entire show. This pertains to horse/rider combination only.
10. Novice and Backyard classes are English and Western. They are for all grades. Judging is based on cleanliness, fitness, health, handling abilities, and on the relationship between the horse and the exhibitor, not on conformation or precise showmanship or horsemanship or pleasure classes. Horse and rider combination can only show in a Novice class for 2 years.
  - a. Novice exhibitor classes are meant for kids who are just beginning to show. Exhibitor is only allowed to participate in these classes for a maximum of 2 years.

- b. Novice horse classes are meant for horses with very limited experience in the show arena.
2. Showmanship and horsemanship classes will be judged on the exhibitor's performance as demonstrated.
  3. No stallion born before January 1<sup>st</sup> of the exhibit year shall be exhibited.
  4. Abused or mistreatment of animals or failure to properly care for them shall be grounds for expulsion from the fair.
  5. Horseless horse classes MUST only be entered by a project member who meets the following criteria:
    - a. A horseless horse project member is defined as a member who has no one on one access to a horse. (They do not own a horse).
    - b. Horseless horse project members may only show in horseless horse class.
    - c. The horseless horse person must be working with a current horse project member or leader. Both members (or member or leader) may show the same horse. This is the only horse the horseless horse member may show.
    - d. The horseless horse member may not be a sibling that resides in the same household. (If two siblings are showing the same horse, that is family owned/leased, both siblings are classified as horse project members.
    - e. Horseless horse members are expected to work with the horse member or leader to learn about exhibiting the horse, (including grooming, clean up, tack, riding, etc.)
    - f. Horseless horse members are expected to participate in horse project activities.
    - g. The horseless horse project member cannot manage or lease a horse owned by someone else while they are enrolled in the project
    - h. Only one horseless horse member per horse can qualify for the State Horse Expo.
  11. Restricted Walk/Trot classes are meant for youth who are overqualified for novice and backyard, but who are not ready to canter. Horse and rider combination are not allowed to cross enter into canter classes.

### **Grade Classification**

Grade of an exhibitor is the grade they have completed during the current 4-H year. The year goes

from October 1<sup>st</sup> to September 30<sup>th</sup>. You must have completed Grade 3 in order to show a Horse or Pony at the Fair.

### **Size Classification**

Height measurement at the withers should be carefully determined when making entries as class changes are not allowed and the entry could be disqualified. Ponies must be 56" and under, Mini must be 38" and under.

1. Be sure to read "Animal Health Regulations."
2. Exhibitors are limited to one entry for each entry number.
3. All stalls fees for poultry will be \$.75 per head and must be paid when entry tags are picked up.
4. Exhibitors are open to all youth enrolled in an organization that carries the Poultry Project.
5. Each exhibitor can show up to a combination of 18-bird limit in divisions 80 and 81.
6. All exhibitors of poultry, ducks, geese and turkeys must have legs bands on their poultry for identification. Leg bands will not be supplied at the Fair Office. Exhibitors of poultry are encouraged to provide bands for their own birds before entry. Record every number on entry tag on your own entry sheet for your records.
7. Exhibitor or representatives appointed by exhibitor, as each class is called, must bring all poultry to the judging bench on judging day. Animals not brought up will be judged in cage and will not be eligible for blue premium award.
8. Divisions 80, 81, 82, 83, and 84 are judged face to face. Classes 85 and 86 are also judged face to face, but exhibitors must be present and the birds should not be taken out of their cages.

#### **Rules for Rabbit and Poultry Barn**

Fair entries (animals) will be accepted on

Tuesday before the Fair from 8:00 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.

All entries need to be in place by 9 am on

Wednesday of the Fair.

The pen number given at entry time must appear in one ear of each rabbit with a permanent marking pen.

***The exhibitor will care for all exhibits.*** All exhibits will be grouped by family and club. Feed and water is provided, although exhibitors are encouraged to bring their own feed and water. It must be kept clean and in neat containers. Carriers, crates and boxes must be taken out of the barn after entry day. Do not store them under or on top of cages.

Feed and water will be provided if the need occurs. Please bring your own feed dishes, water dishes or crocks, put your name on all items that you bring from home.

All feeding, watering and cleaning of pens must be completed by 8:00 p.m. each day. Pens are to be kept neat in appearance. Fresh bedding will be provided. Wire bottom pens will be provided for wool breed rabbits.

Ducks and geese should not be fed high protein grower while in the cage, unless they are very young.

No does that are bred more than 3 weeks are to be brought to the Fair. Leave them home and give them a nest box there.

No does with litters or heavy milk are allowed. Wean young and have doe dry before fair time. No baby bunnies or baby chicks. Bring only the animal that is entered for the class or showmanship. Baby bunnies or baby chicks may be placed on exhibition, but you must bring your own pen.

***No animals other than what you have entered can be brought into the barn. If you have others to sell, post it on the bulletin board set up in the barn.***

***Poultry exhibitors are asked to keep their pen doors secured with wire ties at all times. Ties will be furnished.***

Cavies or other small animals can be brought in their own housing, such as aquariums, which work the best. Small-secured pens are provided if other housing is not suitable.

To make our judging go well, any exhibitor that is in Dairy or any other face to face judging on Thursday or Friday can have a family or club member carry their exhibits when the class is called, or must come before judging time to sign up with the superintendent, who will see that your rabbit, poultry or small animal will be brought to the table for judging.

Open class exhibitors are able to have their animals cared for by the superintendent if they wish.

Animals brought to fair for just showmanship classes should state so on fair entry form, so a pen will be allowed at set-up time.

Animals purchased at the Small Animal Auction may be taken by the purchaser immediately following the auction. There is no need to wait until Sunday release time.

All pictures in one entry must be mounted on one piece of sturdy 11”x14’ sturdy poster board. **The poster board MUST be white. NO COLOR.** Do not use mat board for any pictures, as they will be stapled when displayed at the Fair. Rubber cement is recommended for mounting pictures. **The exhibitor’s name should be written on the back of each photo before they are mounted.** Pictures may be cropped, please make sure you follow your literature instructions on how to crop or contact a professional judge or photographer on how the cropping procedure should be done.

**An image CAN only be used once, unless used a second time for a portfolio or book.**

**Therefore even though it may fall into multiple categories, it can only be used in one entry. Using an image as a color photo and a black and white photo is NOT permitted.**

All exhibitors should be prepared to talk with the judge about the time of day, camera, and setting for each picture. **No one may sit in place of another exhibitor for judging.** Pictures will be judged on the basis of technical quality, composition, and storytelling ability. Exhibitors can exhibit in no more than 5 categories within their division. Pictures may be black and white or color, but not mixed within any one entry number, except where specified.

- Canned products must be labeled (include the method of preservation, date and contents) and canned in standard glass canning jars. Those that are purchased specifically for canning purposes, not those that have had store bought in them previously
- All canning must be done by 4-H or members currently enrolled in Fond du Lac County.
- Judges will open cans only in case of doubt. Note: Jams and jellies may be opened and tasted by the judge.
- Jams and jellies need to be processed using water bath method. Jars should not be sealed with paraffin or by inverting sealed jars as a final step. All other items are to be processed according to the Ball Blue Book or UW Extension guidelines.
- **Remove rings from jars.**
- All foods must have been canned since last year's Fair.
- All jars must be labeled using the following outline:
  - a.) Name of product \_\_\_\_\_
  - b.) Date processed \_\_\_\_\_
  - c.) Method of preparation (hot or cold pack) \_\_\_\_\_

## **OPEN CLASS EXHIBITS**

**No duplicate entries will be allowed in Open Class.**

Entries in the Fond du Lac County Fair are open to residents of Fond du Lac County. In addition, entries in the cattle, swine, and sheep departments are open to residents of adjoining counties that permit Fond du Lac County breeders to exhibit at their county fair. The Fond du Lac County Fair Board reserves the right to reject entries because of lack of space or for other reasons. Duplicate entries in the same Department, Division and Class Number are not allowed.

All exhibits must remain in place until 6:00 p.m. Sunday of the Fair.

Items that fail to meet designated check-in times will be judged for ribbon only. After judging

has been completed for a class, judges are not permitted to re-judge a class due to a project arriving late.

### **Rules and regulations for cattle, sheep and swine classes:**

A livestock exhibitor is an owner, whether it is an individual, a farm, a firm, joint owner or other specific ownership, which fills in the required entry blank, has paid the required expense charge of season ticket and stall rent and displayed livestock at the Fair.

All exhibitors will be required to pay a head fee and to purchase an exhibitor's season ticket. All animals shown must be purebred, with the exception of goats. All animals must be registered in recognized American Registry Books.

Certificate of Registry for all purebred animals on exhibit must be registered in the Fair Office, and must be available if called for any time before entering the show ring. Failure to produce such registry papers, if called for, will bar exhibitor from exhibiting and competing for premiums and will forfeit any and all rights to premiums. Only the owner who has possession of animals a minimum of 30 days can enter and show livestock at the County Fair. If the transfer is in process, the exhibitor must furnish evidence such as a bill of sale or letter from the breed registry that the application for transfer has been received.

In case of progeny of animals in the Get of Sire and Produce of Dam classes, exhibitors other than the owner may show animals. However, each such animal needs to be entered at the Fair under the bonafied owner's name.

Entries must specify owner's name and post office address and in case of animals; the name, age, sex and breed or description with registry number. An exhibitor will be allowed only two entries under each lot number. Not more than one will be awarded an exhibitor in team, group, or herd numbers. Exhibitors must keep their stalls and pens clean and stock uncovered at the hours designated by the Superintendent.

No animals having hereditary unsoundness will be allowed to compete for premiums in any division.

Exhibitors of livestock must keep the space in the rear of their stalls clear and clean, and manure must be placed where indicated by the Superintendent. Exhibitors must also keep animals well bedded at all times.

Exhibitors must inform themselves when their stock will be judged. Stock must be in the show ring promptly after being called.

All stalls fees for cattle will be \$1.00 per head and must be paid when entry tags are picked up. All cattle exhibited must be hornless, except calves born between December 1<sup>st</sup> of the year preceding the exhibit year to March 31<sup>st</sup> of the exhibit year.

Breeding cow must have produced a living calf within the two years next preceding exhibit day.

All animals must be judged in the show ring.

Exhibitors must own herds.

Base date for computing ages is

September 1<sup>st</sup> and March 1<sup>st</sup>.

**All exhibitors must be five years of age by January 1<sup>st</sup> preceding the Fair to exhibit any animal in Open Class.**

Newspaper bedding is not permitted.

The Dairy Superintendent will allocate stall space based on the following widths: 3 ft. – calves, 4 ft - yearlings, 5ft. – cows. These allocations may be factored down if space is limited.

#### **Dairy Age Classification**

a) A spring calf is one born on or after March 1 of the exhibit year.

b) A winter calf is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year.

c) A fall calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

d) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between June 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

e) A spring yearling is one whose date of birth is between March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

f) A winter yearling is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

g) A fall yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.

h) A 2 year-old is one born between September 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year. A 2-year-old includes a yearling that has freshened.

i) A 3 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.

j) A 4 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.

A dry cow is any cow that was fresh 280 days or more, prior to the date of the show, may be shown at the option of the exhibitor in the Dry or Milking Cow Class. If the exhibitor wishes to make the selection on the day of the show, the cow must be entered in both the appropriate milking class and dry cow class. The exhibitor is also responsible for notifying the clerk and dairy superintendent of his/her choice prior to the start of the show. A cow milked less than 280 days must show in the milking class, unless she is recorded as dry on the DHIA Production Report and this must accompany the animal to be shown in the Dry Cow Class.

#### **Dairy and Beef Group Classes**

Produce of Dam shall consist of two animals of any age, which are the produce of one cow. Dam and Offspring shall consist of a cow and one of her offspring.

#### **Little Britches Class**

The Little Britches Show was expanded to include all species and will be held during Family Day on the Sunday of the Fair. A separate set of rules and entry form can be found on the Fair's website or at the Fair Office for this show. A formal exhibit entry is no longer required. This class is for ribbon only. *A trophy sponsored in memory of Francis and Betty Bebow will be awarded to the top show person.*

Exhibitors showing in this class will be required to purchase a junior exhibitor season ticket.
