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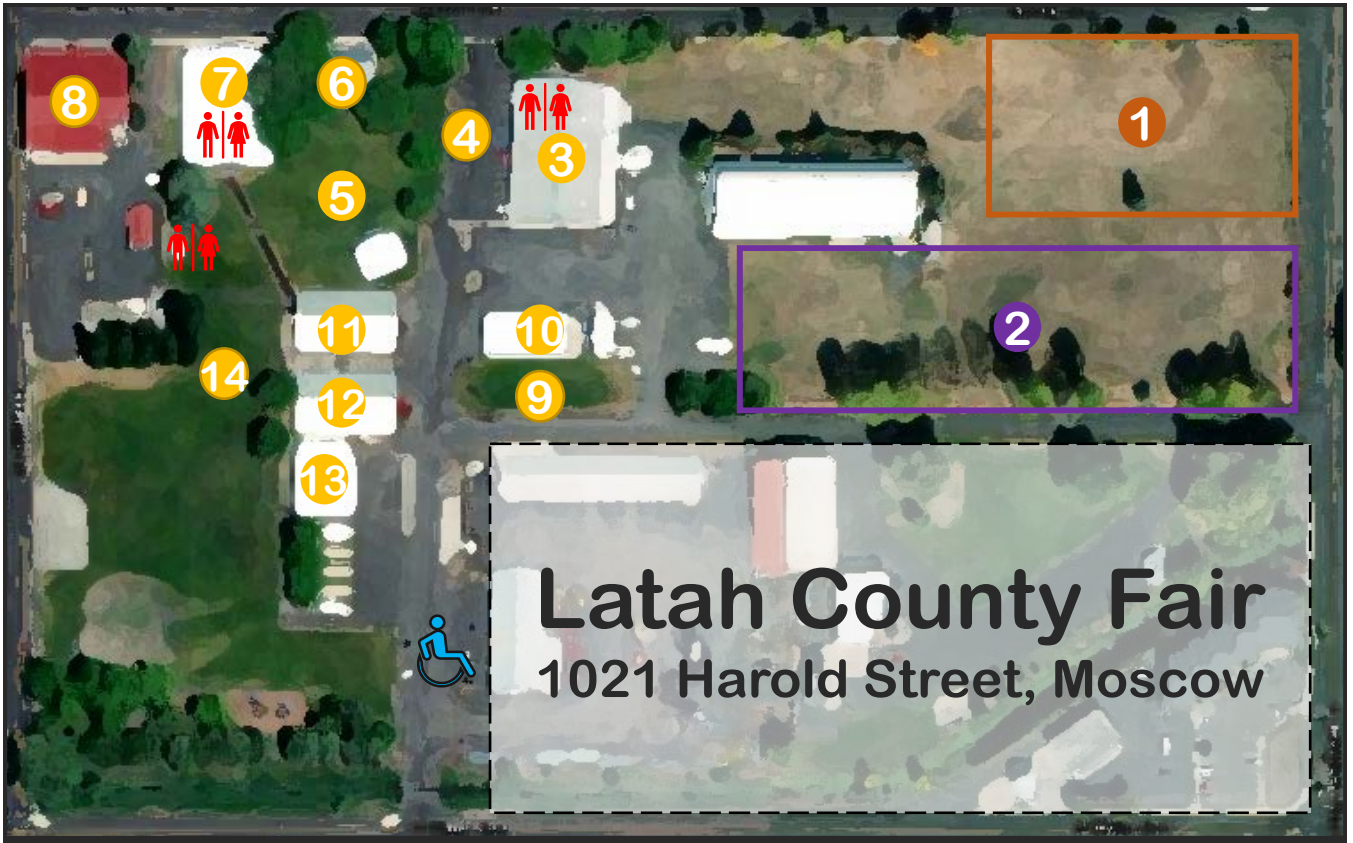

GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

The Board of Directors of the Latah County Fair have endeavored to make this Fair representative of the agricultural interests, as well as the growing number of other interests, in Latah County, and to provide wholesome entertainment for the patrons. The board welcomes suggestions for improving the Fair. Plan to attend the Fair and pass along a good word. Exhibit your products and suggest your neighbors do the same.

ENTRIES, ENTRY FORMS, AND FEES

- Entries, unless stated in Special Rules, are open to residents of the Palouse region.
- All exhibits must be entered by & released through respective department superintendents.
- All exhibits are under the control and direction of the Fair Board, Fair Staff and superintendents while on exhibition.
- Management reserves the right to limit entries to facilities available, & to limit the number of entries of an exhibitor.
- Entries must be in place and must be removed only at the times specified; any exception to this rule shall be at the discretion of Management.
- **Exhibits will be released at 5:00 p.m. Sunday**
- **All animal entries must turn in an official entry form by August 16. Animal entry forms are available at: www.latahcountyfair.com and in the Fair Office.**
- General entries require an entry tag to be filled out at time of entry. Premiums and awards can not be awarded to incomplete entry tags.

Return address labels are recommended for entry tags.

CODE OF CONDUCT

- Anyone attending the Latah County Fair either as an exhibitor, relative, spectator, superintendent, judge or Fair official must conduct themselves in a manner that demonstrates the utmost respect for all other Fair attendees. They are to follow all rules and regulations outlined in the Fair book and by judges, superintendents and Fair officials.
- No Panhandling, Solicitations, Distribution of Information, Vending of Products or Information is allowed on the Fairgrounds Campus with out express permission of the Fair Office and assignment of a Vendor Booth.

EXHIBITS AND EXHIBITORS

- Management reserves the right to reject any exhibit offered if it is deemed objectionable in any way, or requires excessive space.
- Every exhibitor shall indemnify the Latah County Fair Board from and against all claims for damage to persons/property caused by them or by their exhibits.
- Exhibitor names and exhibit photos may be published.
- Management will take reasonable precautions to insure safety of exhibits while on the grounds, but will in no way be responsible for loss, damage, theft or injury of any kind to exhibits or exhibitors.
- Exhibitors found in violation of rules, or in practices unethical or adverse to the Latah County Fair, shall be penalized by forfeiture of awards and/or privileges.

JUDGING

- All classes and sections shall be judged under the Danish System of Judging unless another system is specifically indicated.

- A judge shall disqualify or transfer to the correct section any exhibit or animal which is not a true representative of the class or section in which it is entered.
- A judge may disqualify any exhibit not of show quality.
- No person attending the Fair shall criticize or interfere with judges, sponsors, Fair officials, or exhibits at any time during the Fair. Violators may be excluded immediately from the event and/or the fairgrounds and may be subject to further penalties, including cancellation of awards and loss of future Fair privileges.
- It is understood that the act of entering an exhibit or contest at the Latah County Fair is asking the Fair Management and Department Staff to secure a qualified judge to place a judgement on the exhibit or performance. It is therefore courteous to gracefully accept the decision of the judge, realizing that it may be in conflict with your set of standards. Every reasonable effort will be made to secure highly qualified and conscientious judges. If you feel you are not willing to accept this judgement, please write "exhibit only" on your entry. The decision of the judge is final. Any concerns should be directed to the Superintendent of the Division.
- Protests may be filed by exhibitors in writing to the Latah County Fair Board within 24 hours of the judging. Protests must be accompanied by a \$20 deposit, a sum which may be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Protests shall be adjudicated by the Fair Management.

RIBBONS

- All competitive static exhibits are judged for initial quality and ribbons are awarded as follows: Blue is the best followed by Red, White or Green.
- All the Blue Ribbon exhibits in a class are judged again and ribbons are awarded as follows: Best of Class, followed by Silver then Bronze.
- All Best of Class exhibits are again judged and one Best of Show ribbon is awarded per show.

AWARDS

AWARDS MAY VARY FROM BOOK LISTING.

- No more than one money award per class will be allowed per exhibitor, unless otherwise stated.
- Only the judges' results as recorded in the official entry books will be used as evidence for payment of awards. Ribbons and tags will not be accepted.
- Premiums are paid in this order for youth and adult divisions. Best of Class, Silver, Bronze
- Awards donated by our Fair sponsors are given to Best of Show winners, some Best of Class winners, or the sponsor's choice.
- Sponsored awards may vary from book listings.
- 2024 Premiums will be PAID IN CASH from the Fair Office during Fair. Friday 12pm to 6pm, Saturday 11am to 6pm, Sunday 1pm to 4pm and the week after Fair from 9am to 1pm. NO CHECKS WILL BE MAILED. All premiums or prizes not picked up by October 18, 2024 will be donated back to the Fairgrounds.

Commissioners' Award

Each Latah County Commissioner will award a special Rosette and a \$50.00 personal gift from the individual commissioner to an outstanding exhibit, display, individual or presentation which they feel best portrays the true spirit of the Latah County Fair.

Ribbons... Explained

For the Competitive Exhibit Shows,
Latah Fair uses the "Danish System"



The Judges look at each entry in a particular CLASS and award each entry ONE of the following, based on *individual merit* of the entries:

- BLUE:** Excellent; exhibit most nearly meets the standard (does not indicate perfection).
Example of numerical score = 90-100
- RED:** Good; relative to established standards, a few specific shortcomings have been identified. Example of a numerical score = 80-89
- White:** Fair; improvements are needed in order for the exhibit to meet the established standards. Example of a numerical score = 70-79

Then the Blue Ribbon entries are judged against each other and the Judges award a:



- Best of Class** = Best exhibit in the class
- Silver** = Second best exhibit in the class
- Bronze** = Third best exhibit in the class



Then the Judges look at all of the Best in Class Entries and pick a
BEST OF SHOW.

Which is their pick for the best exhibit in the show.

The stand alone contests (such as Potato Family Adventure or King Arthur Baking) do not use the Danish system. Entries are judged, and awarded prizes as provided by the contest sponsors.

The Floriculture Show is Judged using the National Garden Club Flower Show Guidelines.

The 4-H & FFA animal projects are judged using the Danish System, but Class winners are given a Grand Champion, Reserve Champion, and Bronze Ribbons.

Cash awards, also called Premiums, are paid to the top three winners in each class.

4TH ANNUAL HISTORIC RECIPE CHALLENGE

POTATO CAKE

4 eggs
2 C. sugar
2 C. flour
1 C. warm mashed potatoes
1 C. butter
1/2 C. milk
2 T. cocoa
2 tsp baking powder
1 tsp nutmeg
1 tsp cinnamon
1 tsp cloves

Cream sugar and butter. Add egg yolks, well-beaten. Add spices then add alternately milk, flour, potatoes, nuts, then beaten egg whites. Ice or decorate as desired.

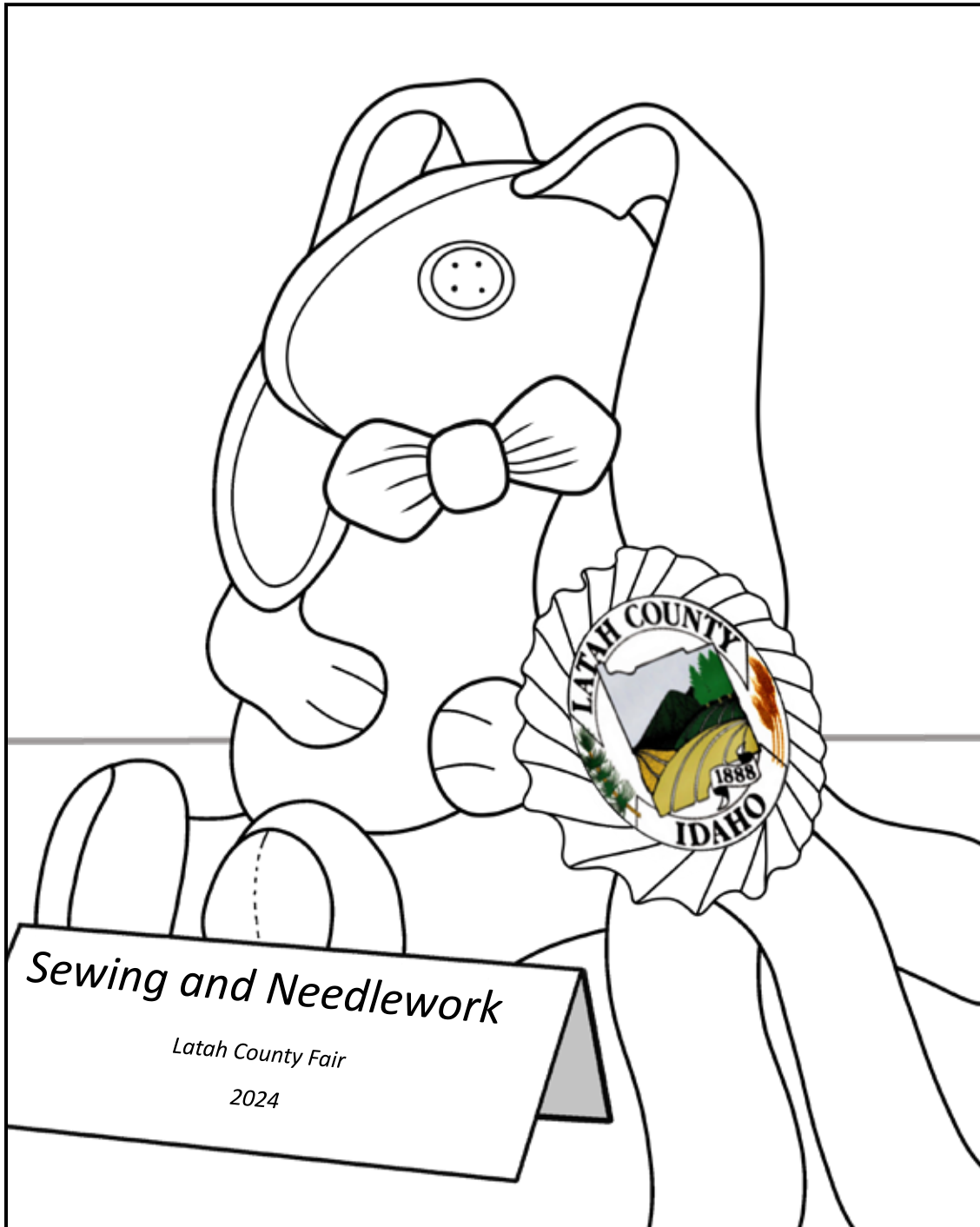

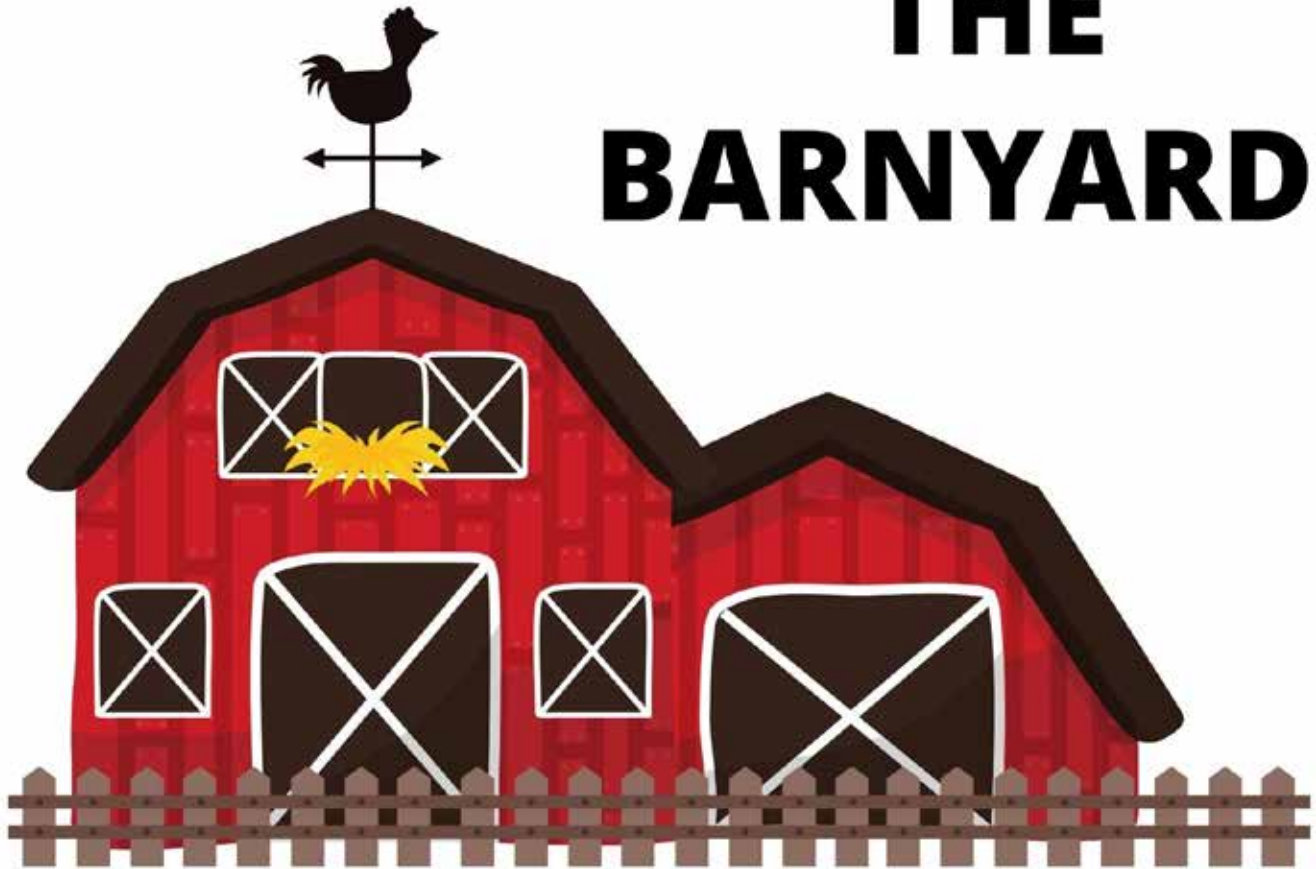

Mardi Gras King Cupcakes

INGREDIENTS

Cake

- 1 cup (198g) granulated sugar
- 1 2/3 cups (200g) King Arthur Unbleached All-Purpose Flour
- 1 1/4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon table salt
- 6 tablespoons (85g) butter, softened
- 2/3 cup (152g) milk, at room temperature
- 1/4 teaspoon King Arthur Fiori di Sicilia, or 1 teaspoon vanilla + 1/8 teaspoon lemon oil
- 2 large eggs, at room temperature

Icing

- 3 tablespoons (43g) butter, at room temperature
- half an 8-ounce package (113g) cream cheese, at room temperature
- 1/2 teaspoon King Arthur Pure Vanilla Extract
- 1/8 teaspoon lemon oil
- 2 cups (227g) confectioners' sugar
- 1 to 2 tablespoons (14g to 28g) milk, enough to make a spreadable icing
- colored sugars, preferably purple, yellow, and green

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Preheat the oven to 350°F. Lightly grease and flour a muffin tin. You can also line the muffin tins with papers, and spray the insides of the papers.
2. To make the cupcakes: In a large mixing bowl, whisk together the sugar, flour, baking powder, nutmeg, and salt.
3. Add the butter and beat with an electric mixer at low speed, until the mixture looks sandy.
4. Combine the milk and vanilla and add, all at once. Mix at low speed for 30 seconds, then increase the speed to medium and beat for 30 seconds. Scrape the bottom and sides of the mixing bowl.
5. With the mixer running at low speed, add 1 egg. Increase the speed to medium and beat for 30 seconds. Add the second egg, again beating for 30 seconds.
6. Scrape the bottom and sides of the bowl, and beat briefly, just till smooth.

7. Scoop the batter by heaping 1/4-cupfuls into the prepared muffin tin. A muffin scoop works well here.
8. Bake the cupcakes for 23 to 25 minutes, until they've domed, and are a light golden brown around the edges. They'll spring back when pressed gently on top, and a toothpick inserted in the center will come out clean.
9. Remove the cupcakes from the oven, and place on a rack to cool completely before icing.
10. To make the icing: Combine the butter, cream cheese, vanilla, and lemon oil in a medium-sized bowl, and beat them together until light and fluffy.
11. Add the sugar gradually, beating well.
12. Beat in the milk a little at a time, until the frosting is a spreadable consistency.
13. Spread each cake with icing, and immediately dip in gold, purple, and green sparkling sugars, covering about 1/3 of the cupcake with each color sugar.

Mardi Gras King Cake

INGREDIENTS

Cake

- 8 tablespoons (113g) unsalted butter, melted
- 3/4 cup (170g) milk, lukewarm
- 2 large eggs plus 1 large egg yolk, white reserved; at room temperature
- 3 1/2 cups (420g) King Arthur Unbleached All-Purpose Flour
- 1/4 cup (50g) granulated sugar
- 1/4 cup (28g) King Arthur Baker's Special Dry Milk or nonfat dry milk
- 1 1/4 teaspoons (8g) table salt
- 2 1/2 teaspoons instant yeast
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/8 teaspoon King Arthur Fiori di Sicilia or lemon oil, or 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind

Filling

- one 8-ounce package (227g) cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup (99g) granulated sugar
- 3 tablespoons (21g) King Arthur Unbleached All-Purpose Flour
- 1 large egg, at room temperature, lightly beaten
- 2 teaspoons King Arthur Pure Vanilla Extract, 1/8 teaspoon King Arthur Fiori di Sicilia, or lemon oil

Icing

- 2 cups (227g) confectioners' sugar
- pinch of table salt
- 1 teaspoon King Arthur Pure Vanilla Extract
- 2 to 3 tablespoons milk, enough to make a thick but pourable glaze

Garnish

- yellow, purple, and green fine sparkling sugars
- candied red cherries, optional

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Lightly grease a baking sheet, or line it with parchment.
2. To prepare the dough: Using a stand mixer, electric hand mixer, or bread machine, mix and knead all of the dough ingredients together to form a smooth, very silky dough. You may try kneading this dough with your hands, if desired; but be advised it's very sticky and soft.
3. Allow the dough to rise, covered, for 1 hour. It'll become puffy, though it probably won't double in size.
4. Transfer the soft dough to a lightly greased work surface. Pat and stretch it into a 24" x 6" rectangle. This won't be hard at all; it's very stretchy. Let the dough rest while you prepare the filling.
5. To prepare the filling: Beat together the cream cheese, sugar, and flour until smooth, scraping the bowl once. Add the egg and flavor, again beating until smooth.
6. Dollop the filling down the center of the long strip of dough. Then fold each edge up and over the filling until they meet at the top; roll and pinch the edges together, to seal the filling inside as much as possible.

7. Place the log of dough onto the baking sheet seam-side down. The dough will be very extensible, i.e., it'll stretch as you handle it. So pick it up and position it on the pan quickly and gently. Pinch the ends together.
8. Cover and let rise for about an hour, until it's puffy. Preheat the oven to 350°F while the dough rises.
9. Whisk the reserved egg white with 1 tablespoon water (egg wash), and brush it over the risen cake.
10. Bake the cake for 20 minutes, then tent it lightly with aluminum foil. Bake it for an additional 30 minutes, until it's a rich golden brown.
11. Remove the cake from the oven. After about 15 minutes, transfer it from the baking sheet to a rack to cool.
12. To make the icing: Beat together all of the icing ingredients, dribbling in the final 2 teaspoons milk until the icing is thick yet pourable.
13. Pour the icing over the completely cooled cake. While it's still sticky, sprinkle with alternating bands of yellow, purple, and green sugars. Space candied cherries in a ring around the top.

HORTICULTURE

All specimens must be fresh, untreated plant material grown by the exhibitor in the Palouse Region. Entry Limit of One Per Class/Section per Exhibitor. The Flower Show Committee reserves the right to subdivide or add sections if the number of entries warrants.

Division: Adult & Youth (17 & Under)

Conditioning. Water your plants early in the day and cut specimens in early evening for best quality. Place in tepid water and store in cool dark place for several hours.

All exhibits must be in clear glass bottles. Label specimens with the correct botanical name and the variety or cultivar when possible. Common name may also be added. Only named exhibits will be eligible for the top awards. Remove any foliage that may be under water in the display bottle. Remove buds from single stem exhibits. Plant material must be fresh, free of debris, disease, pests, and insect damage. Wedging is permitted (plastic wrap, floral foam, stems, and/or cork).

Roses (Rosa)

Single (such as Hybrid Tea): display one bloom about 3/4 open, with one stem, attached foliage, no side buds. Spray: should have more open blooms than buds, buds should be in all stages of development. Show at least two sets of leaves attached to stem.

SPECIAL RULES: All canned & dried foods must be exhibited in standard canning jars. A standard jar is a container designed for canning purposes.

Exhibits must be accurately labeled as to content, type of pack (raw or hot), processing method, time processed, date of processing, the percent acid in vinegar used to make pickles and salsas (**MUST BE 5% ACID**), type of pressure canner used (dial or weighted) and altitude processed at. Labels must be placed on lower half of jar.

All products must be processed according to the most recently recognized USDA recommendations. USDA methods are used in Kerr and Ball Canning Books. No Colored Jars.

Judges may open any jar for inspection; however, if other visible characteristics of product eliminate the product from consideration of award, the judge is not obligated to open for further evaluation.

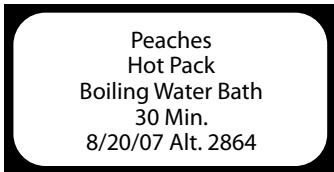

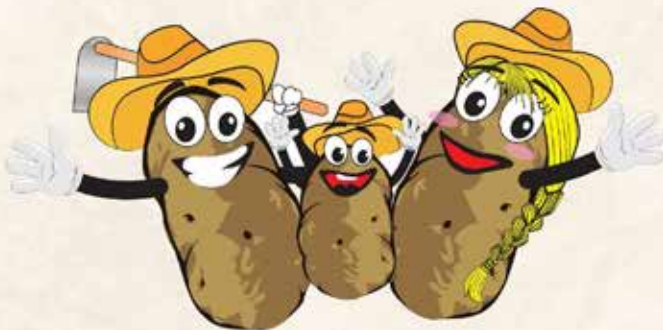

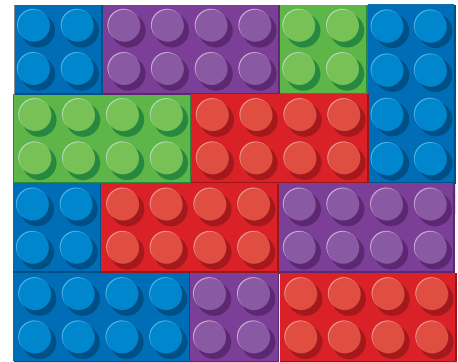

LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR RULES:

1. All exhibitors must be fully enrolled in their respective Latah County 4-H or FFA Program in the current year to attend and exhibit at Fair
2. Exhibitors enrolled in both programs must clearly designate the project animal that will be exhibited for each program during initial weigh-in and on fair entry forms. Members may not show the same project animals for both 4-H and FFA at the same contest/fair/show
3. Youth members of both 4-H and FFA must meet the requirements of both programs, including maintaining separate project records for each organization.
4. All animals must remain at the Fair until 5:00pm on Sunday
5. Livestock exhibitors may remove chutes and large tack boxes before 8am or after 5pm on Sunday
6. Take down, including decorations, may not start until 4:30pm on Sunday
7. No vehicles or trailers may enter the grounds between 8:00am and 5:00pm on Sunday
8. No campers may leave until 5:00pm on Sunday

4-H LIVESTOCK PROJECTS:

Unless otherwise specified, all breeds in all categories will compete in Quality and Fitting and Showing Classes. Members must compete in Fitting and Showing to complete the project.

Quality: Animals will be judged and shown according to breed standards, and classes for market animals will be based upon the weight of the animal.

Fitting and Showing: Members are judged on fitting of the animal, training of the animal, and appearance of the exhibitor. Fitting and Showing classes will be based upon the exhibitor's age as of January 1 of the current year. If further classes are needed, the exhibitor's experience

will be considered. Age divisions are as follows:

- Junior - 8 - 10 years old
- Intermediate - 11 - 13 years old
- Senior - 14 - 18 years old

A completed and signed Market Animal livestock record book is due to the Extension Mobile Office from 2:00 – 4:00 pm on Sunday

4-H GENERAL PROJECTS:

- All 4-H projects exhibits shall be completed as outlined in the "Idaho 4-H Project" Requirements.
- General 4-H Projects are due in the 4-H area of the Events Center Building Wednesday from 3:00pm – 7:00pm.
- All 4-H volunteers, youth members, and their parent(s)/ guardians, shall abide by the 4-H Code of Conduct and Idaho 4-H Policies and Procedures.

LIVESTOCK CARE & SHOWING:

- It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to feed, water and care for any animal they have entered in the Fair throughout the entire fair.
- Exhibitors are responsible for all their animals care until close of fair at 5:00 p.m. Sunday.
- Animal pens or stalls must be kept clean.
- Animals NOT PROPERLY cared for may be sent home and premiums forfeited.
- Exhibitors NOT PROPERLY caring for their animals will not be allowed to enter future livestock projects. Sheep and goats should not be washed without permission from their superintendent.
- Any animal that appears ill or injured while at the Fairgrounds must be reported to the Superintendent/Fair Management. A veterinarian must check any animal considered unhealthy. If it is determined that the animal is carrying a communicable disease, the animal will be removed from the Fairgrounds. The Fairgrounds will not assume the cost for this action. The exhibitor will assume the full expense of the veterinarian's services.
- Any animal that is determined to be unmanageable, or could be a safety hazard to the public, will be removed from the Fairgrounds. The Superintendent/Fair Management makes this decision final. Fair Board to make final call.
- Swine projects can ONLY be shown using a flexible driving device (NO canes, pipes, rods ect).

Market Animal Sales Rules & Regulations

1. All consignors must be enrolled in a Latah County 4-H club or be a member of an FFA chapter in Latah County. Only one market project may be sold by each consignor.
2. The market animals accepted, and the order of the sale, will be determined by the Latah Market Animal Sale (LMAS) Committee.
3. Market projects must be weighed the Wednesday of the County Fair on certified scales at the Fairgrounds during the times listed below. No Late Weigh-Ins.
 - Market Swine: 6:00 a.m. – 11:00 a.m.
 - Market Beef: 11:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.
 - Market Sheep/Goat: 1:00 p.m. – 2:00 p.m.
 - Small Animals- at the direction of the superintendent
4. All market projects must meet the following weight and/or age restrictions to be sold through the 4-H and FFA Market Animal Sale. Beef, sheep, swine, & goats sell by the pound; poultry and rabbits are sold by the each or pen. Beef, sheep, swine and goats weighing over the listed maximum weight will sell at the maximum weight.
 - Beef: 1100-1550 lbs. (beginning in 2025 under 30 months)
 - Stocker/Feeder Beef: 550-900 lbs.
 - Lambs: 110-150 lbs., and under 1 year of age
 - Goats: 70-120 lbs., and under 1 year of age
 - Swine: 240-295 lbs.
 - Rabbits: 3.5lbs. – 5.5lbs each, and under 10 weeks of age
 - Turkey: at least 15lbs (hen), 20lbs (toms) and recommended under 20 weeks of age
 - Chickens: Minimum of 5.5lbs each and recommended under 12 weeks of age
5. All youth must complete an LMAS Consignment/COOL Form part of the online Fair Registration.
6. Animals consigned to the sale must have been entered and judged for quality in the 4-H and FFA Show of the Latah County Fair.
7. Market and Stocker/Feeder beef project animals must have Brand Inspection papers, Hauling Permits and Bill of Sale to present to the Superintendent prior to weigh-in.
8. It is the responsibility of 4-H and FFA exhibitors to understand and abide by the floater animal policy and the sale procedure guidelines as found at <https://www.latahcountyfair.com/p/fair/sale>
9. Animals awarded a white ribbon in the quality show will not be eligible for the sale.
10. All Sheep/Goat Market Projects must have a Scrapie Tag.
11. There will be a 3% commission deduction of the gross sale price on all sale animals.

Livestock 4-H & FFA Quality Show

Show groups will at the discretion of the Superintendents, 4-H Director, and Fair Management and dependent on entry numbers. Market animals not making minimum weight will only show in an exhibition class and receive a participation ribbon only.

BEEF

All cattle must be doubled tied when in the barn with rope halters and neck ropes. NO chain halters or neck chains. Only de-horned or naturally polled cattle will be eligible to show. Horns over 2 inches from the skin at the base of the horn to the tip will be disqualified. Straight bred dairy steers, stags, and cryptorchids are not eligible.

ENTRY LIMIT: An exhibitor may only exhibit one Market animal, only one animal per Breeding Class Section, and one animal per Dairy Class.

Only barrows and gilts are eligible; any hogs showing evidence of scars, hernia, sores, bruises, cryptorchids, or any blemishes that impair the value of carcass will be disqualified. Show groups will be at the discretion of Superintendents, 4-H Director, and Fair Management and dependent on entry numbers.

ENTRY LIMIT: An exhibitor may only exhibit one Market animal.

SHEEP

Only wether and ewe lambs are eligible for Market Class. Rams lambs and cryptorchids will be disqualified. All market animals must be officially identified. Show groups will be at the discretion of Superintendents, 4-H Director, and Fair Management and dependent on entry numbers.

ENTRY LIMIT: An exhibitor may only exhibit one Market animal, and one animal per Breeding Class.

Only wether and does are eligible to be shown. Bucks or cryptorchids will be disqualified. Horns must have blunt ends or be covered. ENTRY LIMIT: An exhibitor may only exhibit one Market animal, and a maximum of one animal per other Class. A single animal can't be show in multiple classes.
