Administration of Rules and Regulations

The Ellis County Livestock Show and Rodeo reserves to its Board of Directors the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of or connected with or incident to the Show, and the right to amend or add to these rules as its judgment may determine. An exhibitor who violates any of the following rules will forfeit all sale proceeds. Special rules or conditions are published in each department where necessary; if there is a conflict between the special rules of any department and the general rules and regulations, the special rules will govern. If any of the rules, or any provision of any single rule, is later held to be legally invalid or otherwise unenforceable, all other rules, and all other provisions and terms of any rule containing a provision or term later held to be legally invalid or unenforceable, shall remain in full force and effect.

GENERAL RULES

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Board of Directors oversees the business development and future growth of the Ellis County Youth Expo and Rodeo ground. They will host the Ellis County Livestock Show & Rodeo in March or April of each year. Each Director serves a 3-year term and can serve unlimited terms, but no more than two consecutive terms. Directors of the Board shall nominate and approve 5 candidates in a regular meeting and then present them to the Show Committee, Rodeo Committee, and Fair Committee. From these 5 candidates, the respective committees will return their Top 3 for selection. These 3 will then be voted on for election by a quorum of the Show Committee at its annual meeting held in May of each year. The election shall be conducted by Slate Ballot and the Show Chair, and each affiliated club will have one vote per open position and must come from the representative or alternate. Write-In candidates are not permitted. Proxy votes shall not be allowed.

SHOW CHAIRMAN

The Show Chairman is appointed by the Board of Directors no later than May following the previous spring show. The Show Chairman shall serve two consecutive terms and will oversee the Show Committee and annual Ellis County Youth

Expo Spring show and Sale. The Show Chairman will hold monthly meetings. This person is responsible for submitting a contract to and the hiring of judges, and classifiers. The judges will come from a list nominated by the show committee. Any conflicts of interest shall be avoided and is at the discretion of the show chairman. The chairperson is also responsible for attaining species superintendents of their choosing.

SHOW COMMITTEE

The Show Committee's purpose is to assist in creating a show schedule, nominate judges, and assist in the running of the show. Ag Science Teachers (AST) and County Extension Agents (CEA) shall appoint committee representatives to serve as primary and alternate voting delegates. These voting delegates must be selected and in place by the second meeting of the school year. The duties of these delegates are to vote on matters that require action. Only one vote per chapter is allowed. The Show Chairman will appoint Superintendents and Classifiers.

Judges will be nominated electronically by the Show Committee. No more than two nominees per chapter/per species is allowed. The chapter must specify which nomination is their primary and alternate. This form will be made available to AST/CEA's no later than 7 days after the conclusion of the Sale of Champions. Chapters will have until 5:00 p.m. the day before the next scheduled meeting in April to have these nominations sent in. No other nominations will be considered after the submission deadline. At this meeting, the Show Committee will rank in order dictated by the number of nominations.

Conflicts of interest should be avoided and are at the discretion of the Show Chairman. This method shall apply to market and breeding animals. Ag Mechanics and Fine Arts will be nominated in the same fashion, but the superintendent will rank and contact judges. The list of judge nominations will be made available to everyone once judges have been selected.

SHOW SECRETARY & OFFICE PERSONNEL

The Show Secretary, Species Superintendents, and any office personnel are appointed by the Board of Directors and Show Chairman. Their purpose is administration and assistance of show operations.

PROTESTS

In the event of a protest, the Show Chairman and Superintendents of the species will enforce the rules.

All protests must be filed in writing, citing the specific rule in question. This protest must be accompanied by a fee of \$250.00 CASH (two hundred and fifty dollars). Protests must be filed within (1) one hour following the selection of the reserve grand champion in the division in question.

- Decisions of the Judges, Weigh Master, and Classifiers are not subject to protest
- Committee to hear protests will consist of the general show chairman and at least a majority of the specific species superintendents. Their decision is FINAL.
- Decisions of the Superintendents may be appealed only to the Board of Directors and Show Chairman.
- Conflicts of interest shall be avoided.
- If the protest is found to be validated, the \$250.00 will be refunded.
- If an exhibitor or person representing them does not comply or fully cooperate with any investigation related to the rule violation(s), that exhibitor can be expelled from show, sale, any proceeds, future proceeds, and a ban from future shows.
- If you have more than one project entered in the show and one is disqualified because of a major rule violation, your other entries are not eligible for the sale, and any earned proceeds could be forfeited.

PARTICIPATION

Participation in the Ellis Co. Youth Expo is limited to students who are enrolled in an Ellis County school district, and members of a 4-H Club or FFA Chapter within Ellis County. If they are home-schooled or attend a private school, they must show proof that their primary residence is in Ellis County. The exhibitor must be a member in good standing of FFA, 4-H, or FCCLA. They must have continuously and personally participated in preparing their project for show under the direct supervision of a CEA or AST. They must be in the 3rd Grade and 8 years of age, but not more than 19 years old as of August 31 of the previous show year.

Exception: In the case of a student needing to participate in Ellis County as a resident of *an adjacent* county, per Texas 4-H guidelines, that participation will need to be approved by Texas 4-H and kept on file in their system. The form must be submitted a minimum of thirty (30) days prior to the show. As a member of Ellis County 4-H, this student is no longer eligible to participate in any other county's livestock show.

ELIGIBLE EXHIBITORS

All eligible students must show and sell their own projects that were validated in their names. Any exceptions must be reviewed by the Show Chairman and Show Secretary. Exhibitors must submit a substitution showman form 24 hours prior to the respective show and sale for review. Acceptable exceptions are medical (with doctor's note), UIL event, and death in the immediate family only. Forms will be available in the show office and online.

INELIGIBLE EXHIBITORS

Ineligible exhibitor's projects are NOT eligible to show or sell AND MUST NOT BE ON SHOWGROUNDS. There WILL NOT be any refunds on entry fees if an exhibitor becomes ineligible. You are defined as ineligible if your school has deemed you that way. If an exhibitor's school has deemed them ineligible, they may not switch from FFA to 4-H for any reason.

DOGS

NO DOGS ARE ALLOWED ON SHOWGROUNDS. Any person with a dog will be asked to leave. If the request is denied, you will be asked to leave the premises within 15 minutes. If you are present after this time, the show chairman will call law enforcement. This is a zero tolerance policy.

MARKET & BREEDING SHOW VALIDATION PROCEDURES

State validation rules for cattle, swine, lambs, and goats will be followed. Possession deadlines and validation deadlines will be set and conducted by the Validation Chair. The validation chair(s) will coordinate and share dates with CEA's/AST's in which to get their groups tagged. After the last posted validation date, there will be no more validated animals of any kind. Please check individual species for registration requirements. Show Chairman and Species Superintendents have the authority to check validation at any time after validation, through final disbursement after the Sale of Champions. Bio-securities will be in place. If the results prove it is not the same animal, the animal will be disqualified from the show, sale, and/or forfeiture of any proceeds. Market animals should have no tags other than the validation tag at weigh in. All validation records shall be turned into the show office by the validation chairperson no later than 30 days past the state validation deadline. For 2025 only, there will be county validation for steers. Market Rabbits will continue to be county validated. All others will be state validated only.

LOST TAGS

If an animal's validation tag is lost or becomes unattached after tagging dates, the owner must notify the supervising CEA/AST immediately. The CEA/AST must, in turn, notify the validation chair(s) in writing. AFTER MARCH 1, follow the same procedures, however, retagging will be considered on a case-by-case basis. Retagging will be coordinated between the validation chair, Superintendent, and respective advisor. All retags conducted at the county level must collect and submit new DNA to the state office. Superintendents must be notified, and animals retagged BEFORE weigh-in begins. If found altered or incorrect, the exhibitor may be disqualified from show, sale, and any proceeds.

ENTRIES

We will use an online entry process. The entry deadline will be established each year by the show committee and will be approximately one month prior to the show's begin date. Entry fees are due and based on online entries submitted. Entries and fees must be made and turned into the CEA/AST so that a SINGLE club payment can be made. Single club payment, along with signed entry cards and an invoice copy is due to the Executive Board Treasurer no later than 16 days after the entry deadline. These payments and entries shall be mailed to the P.O. Box. If the entries are not received by the start of the show, no exhibitor will be allowed to show until both are received. It is the responsibility of the person(s) responsible for submitting entries and payment to send them to the correct address.

Quality Counts verification will be REQUIRED for all youth exhibiting livestock (market and/or breeding). Your Quality Counts number shall be reported on your entry form. The verification process will require junior exhibitors to pass an online test that measures their knowledge on quality assurance and character education content items. All exhibitors and parents of said exhibitor acknowledges they have read and understand Quality Counts in its entirety.

Projects must be owned and validated by the exhibitor. There will not be co-op projects except for Ag Mech. If more than one student of a family is listed on the entry card, the correct student's name and tag number must be declared and

corrected by the end of day on the day that the respective species weighs in. A paid entry only constitutes that an exhibitor is entered, and that not until they are declared "checked in" by the show office, are they allowed to show.

MARKET SHOW ENTRY LIMITS

There is a limit of THREE market projects (Premium Sale Eligible) per exhibitor. This includes projects entered in ANY Market Animal Division or Ag Mech Projects for sale. Of the maximum of three market entries, no more than two may be entered in the same division, but any other combination of 3 is allowed.

BREEDING SHOW ENTRY LIMITS

Beginning in 2025, there will be no limit on entries. No females will be allowed in the Sale of Champions. Prize money will be as follows for all breeding divisions:

Class Top 3 -

- 1st \$25.00
- 2nd \$15.00
- 3rd \$10.00

Division Champion - \$150.00

Division Reserve - \$100.00

OVERALL GRAND CHAMPION SCHOLARSHIPS

The ECLSR will award a \$500 scholarship to the Overall Grand Champion in all the market livestock divisions unless an exhibitor has previously been awarded the scholarship in the same division. In that case, the next highest placing exhibitor who has not previously won will be awarded. (Ex: Exhibitor previously won steer show - they win again. They are not eligible to receive a 2nd scholarship.) Additionally, any exhibitor that has won their respective division scholarship and has NOT graduated from high school will be eligible to receive the difference between the two, if any. No more than \$500 will be awarded to any exhibitor in the same division.

Additionally, ECLSR will award a \$500 scholarship to the Overall Grand Champion in all the breeding livestock divisions unless an exhibitor has previously been awarded the scholarship in the same division. In that case, the next highest placing exhibitor who has not previously won will be awarded. (Ex: Exhibitor previously won heifer show - they win again. They are not eligible to receive a 2nd scholarship.) No more than \$500 will be awarded to any exhibitor in the same division.

LATE ENTRIES

\$100.00 late fee in ADDITION to the standard entry fee will apply. No entries will be accepted after the respective division check in is complete. The only late entries that will be allowed are those that occur when a student from outside the county enrolls in one of our programs. The animal must be a state or county validated animal and a letter verifying it to have been owned by the student, supervised by a CEA/AST from the student's previous school and current school is presented to the office. This must be done within ONE week of the student enrolling in Ellis County.

HEALTH REGULATIONS

No health papers are required.

STALLING

Each animal entry does NOT guarantee a stall/pen. Animals will be stalled by club/chapter. Animals must remain in the barn when not exercising, with the exception to cattle.

COLOR RULE

Artificial coloring will be prohibited on all animals except for restoring the natural color on the head, legs, tail and tail head.

SHOWMANSHIP

Showmanship will include Market steers, swine, lambs, goats & rabbits and Breeding heifers, gilts, ewes, does & rabbits.

- Pee-Wee 2nd grade and under
- Junior 3rd grade to 8th grade
- Senior 9th grade to 12th grade

Exhibitor must show the animal/project in showmanship that the exhibitor showed in the actual show. You shall not show another exhibitor's animal/project. This includes siblings regardless of if it was cross validated. No substitutions are permitted.

Pee-Wee is only for kids that cannot show as a Junior. They must live in the county or have siblings that are in 4-H or FFA. They must use an animal that is entered in the show. The exhibitor of said animal shall accompany the Pee-Wee. No parents/adults are allowed in the ring. Prizes will be awarded.

For MARKET SWINE Junior and Senior Showmanship, a separate judge, from a list provided by the CEA/ASTs, will observe the market classes and select individuals to qualify for their respective Showmanship class. Those individuals will be announced during the market classes and will be invited/eligible to return to the ring for showmanship using the hog they qualified with to compete for the Showmanship award. If more than 13 individuals are selected per age division, heats will be created to avoid overcrowding in the show ring.

For AG MECHANICS PROJECT SHOW & MARKETPLACE SHOW, Chapter and Individual Showmanship awards will be awarded. Both the project show & marketplace show will be combined for showmanship only. Shop Superintendents will judge based on actions of participants during all phases of the show.

CLUB/CHAPTER RESPONSIBILITIES

It will be the responsibility of the ASTs and CEAs to monitor, organize and verify that the grounds are kept clean and attractive during the duration of the show. Areas should be checked periodically each day and left clean at the end of every day. Details, schedules and assignments will be assigned by the show committee.

It will be the responsibility of the ASTs and CEAs to SET UP & TAKE DOWN the weigh-ins, shows, opening ceremonies, sale day events and animal disbursements.

Clean up of the grounds will be held "after school" on the Monday following the show & sale.

ALL CLUBS/CHAPTERS ARE EXPECTED TO PARTICIPATE IN EITHER THE SET UP OR CLEAN UP FOR THE COUNTY SHOW. Participation from each club is paramount for tear down. Any chapter not represented during this procedure can be removed from next year's show.

RELEASE OF ANIMALS

All dropped, non-sale, or non-floored animals will be released immediately following the conclusion of their respective shows. Projects that make sale and choose not to drop will be required to remain on premises until the animal has walked through the auction ring and sale slip is in hand.

In previous years, there has been some holdover for the Day in the Ring event. This year we will NOT HOLD any animals unless they are sale qualifiers or are awaiting an official drop card as determined by the DROP RULES below.

Animals that are removed from the show grounds will NOT be allowed back on the premises, regardless of being "Bumped Up".

GROUNDS

Cooking on the grounds is subject to designated locations. This includes "cookouts" and social gatherings during the show dates by individuals or groups. Use of the BBQ Barn must be reserved in advance and requires Executive Board approval.

No alcohol will be allowed inside the main Expo building during the show week.

SALE of CHAMPIONS

The Ellis Co. Youth Expo is a market sale only. No Breeding animals may go through the sale ring. Shop Projects (other than Ag Mech Marketplace that are deemed sale eligible, and Creative Arts are not sale eligible. You may only sell one project, excluding ag mech sale eligible items.

Grand and Reserve Champions in each market division and those designated Ag Mech Marketplace Champions and Reserves MUST SELL AS CHAMPIONS. This could dictate a drop for an exhibitor.

Included in your entry packet will be the rules of the sale. They are also listed below.

It is your responsibility to know these rules. *Any* violation to these rules will forfeit your spot in the sale.

Rules violation shall result in dismissal from the show/sale and could result in being banned from next year's show.

Based on the total number of animals assigned to a class and respective placing the TOP 40% of each class will go through the sale ring.

"Bump Ups" will only occur for the OVERALL GRAND and RESERVE CHAMPIONS by species and will only affect the class that each was selected from. Drops will continue - rules below. (i.e. - if the Champion Lamb was in class 3, then only class 3 will have a bump up.) Drops DO NOT create a pathway for "bump-ups" or quarantee a sale slot.

Sale places are determined as follows, using the number of animals on the list prepared for the show ring: TOP 40% (Sale Qualified)

In the event of a class size larger than 25, a maximum number of placings to 10th will sell.

Exhibitors in the market division can receive premium (sale) money for only one project with the exception that the OVERALL Grand Champions and Reserve Champions for each division MUST sell.

Animals that go through the sale cannot be bought back from the floor. If the animal is given back to the student, animal disposition MUST BE MADE BEFORE the animal leaves the ring. (see "Sale Disbursements" below)

Buyers shall <u>NEVER</u> be asked to "give back" or return an animal purchased in the sale. From the time an entry is validated until the exhibitor cashes their ECYE auction/add-on check, the exhibitor or persons representing the exhibitor shall not ask the buyer for an animal to be returned to the exhibitor. "Persons representing the exhibitor" includes, but not limited to parents, relatives, breeders, or CEAs/ASTs. The penalty for this infraction includes but is not limited to removal from the sale, forfeiture of sale proceeds, and/or a ban from participating in the show to any of the parties involved.

No gifts are to be given to buyers on sale day. Thank you notes shall be delivered to buyers before premium money is received.

DROP RULES

Exhibitors with more than 1 entry in the market show and/or declared Ag Mech Marketplace projects, have (1) one hour after grand & reserve judging of each division, to fill out a drop card telling which animal from that division you want to be considered for possible sale.

EXAMPLE 1: if you have 2 goats, you need to fill out a drop card after the goat show is complete, listing both goats.

EXAMPLE 2: if you have a hog and a lamb, you need to fill out a drop card after the hog show is complete, listing both the hog and the lamb.

EXAMPLE 3: If you have an ag mech marketplace project (declared sale eligible) and a steer, you need to fill out a drop card after the steer show is complete, listing both projects.

If no card is presented by the respective deadline, the office will decide. Once an animal has been dropped (either by exhibitor or office) NO CHANGES will be made. further, no verbal drops will be allowed. In the event of a protest, the drop card will be held by the Show Chairman and/or Superintendents until the protest has been resolved. Depending on the outcome and severity of the protest, the animal and exhibitor may be subject to disqualification.

SALE CATALOG

The Sale catalog will be produced by Show Secretary & Office Personnel at the conclusion of the final market show. In the event the office identifies a missing drop card for an exhibitor, the office will make the determination based on the following guidelines:

• Drop lowest placing project.

The Draft Sale Catalog will be posted as early as possible. It is the Advisor/Exhibitor responsibility to identify any errors in the catalog by 10:00 A.M. FRIDAY MARCH 28, 2025. After that time, no changes will be made as the final catalog has a firm print deadline.

Any exhibit listed on the FINAL Catalog MUST sell. Failure to present the exhibit at the appropriate time during the sale will result in forfeiture of sale privilege AND disqualification for the next year's show. An automatic appeal to review circumstances will be accommodated. The appellate board will consist of a Show Superintendent, Show Chair and a CEA/AST from a club other than that of the exhibitor.

FLOOR

Buyers may floor ANY purchased market animals. Animals may not be purchased from the floor.

Students may qualify to sell their animals on the floor. An animal is considered "qualified" to floor only if the animal was entered, weighed and exhibited at the ECYE and fits into one of the three categories below:

- 1) Animals not making the sale, including drops
- 2) Animals making the add-on group
- 3) Animals sold where the buyer returned ownership ("Gave Back")

Students may floor qualified animals by filling out the provided floor cards and presenting the card and animal at the designated area where a representative will sign the card and provide further instructions. It is the responsibility of the student to get & keep their copy of the floor card and sale invoice from the ring as this will serve as a receipt for future payment.

Non-sale, floored animals will be loaded between the conclusion of your respected show until 9:00 P.M., the day of your show.

There will be no floored animals loaded after 9:00 p.m. except for ones that qualified for the sale and were later dropped due to another qualifying project.

No animals may be removed from the floor truck once on it. Doing so will result in the loss of floor payment and subsequent disqualification from the show for the following year.

A sifted animal may receive a lower floor price than show animals. All animals must be shorn, as for the show, or they will not sell. These animals must be weighed before they are put in the pens for floored animals. They must also be tagged.

THE SWITCHING OF ANY ANIMALS BETWEEN THE SHOW AND SALE WILL RESULT IN DISQUALIFICATION, LOSS OF PREMIUM MONEY AND EXPULSION FROM THE FOLLOWING YEARS SHOW.

ADD ON MONEY

Any exhibitor, regardless of placing may receive add on money. This does INCLUDE Breeding and all Ag Mechanics.

SALE DISBURSEMENTS

All sales, including add-ons and floor proceeds are subject to a sale commission. The sale commission is set each year by the Board of Directors and shall not exceed 10%.

Exhibitor's checks will be distributed through the supervising AST or CEA. Any lost checks must be reported to AST or CEA. There will be a \$ 50.00 per check charge to stop payment & re-issue new checks to an exhibitor.

In order to expedite sale proceedings, exhibitors qualifying for the sale, must complete a disbursement form prior to entering the sale ring and keep it with them until the sale of their project is complete. It will then be presented to the disbursement team once through the sale ring. This is MANDATORY. These forms will be available at the office for the duration of the show and available online.

Species/Show Specific rules violation shall result in disqualification of entry.

Possession deadlines and validation deadlines will be set and conducted by the Validation Chair(s) and their respective committees.

- ALL birds will be ordered through the ECYE via the extension office. Either 50 OR 100 broilers per exhibitor will be ordered (no more/no less per person).
- Birds will be from the same hatch. Birds will be wing banded. Each exhibitor will list the band numbers of the birds they receive, BEFORE leaving the building. A copy of this list will be held at the office. The day of the show, the exhibitor that enters the birds will only be able to check in the birds that are on their list. Any bird without a wing band will be disqualified.
- Birds will be sifted for bruises and broken bones. Any occurrence of these defects after check-in will not be considered by the judge.
- If an exhibitor has 2 pens and they die, he/she can combine what they have left to make a pen. If the exhibitor only has 1 pen, then they will show what they have, unless they decide to pull the entry.
- NO WEIGHT CLASSES STRAIGHT RUN SHOW
- Exhibitors will be allowed to substitute a qualified bird at the time of check in if one or more of the 3 original birds are sifted for bruises & broken bones. YOU WILL HAVE 30 MINUTES TO RETURN WITH A SUBSTITUTE.
- An additional volunteer bird holder will be allowed if they are an exhibitor or parent.

This division IS SALE ELIGIBLE

- Overview
 - Project Workmanship/Quality 70%
 - Team or Individual Sales Presentation 20%
 - Marketing Materials 10%
- A Grand Champion of the Ag Mechanics Marketplace Contest & a Reserve Grand Champion of the Ag Mechanics Marketplace will be Selected for the Sale. Additionally, the Grand & Reserve in each of the divisions will sale for a total of 8 sale spots.
- The judges will act as a real customer which may include not buying the project. Participants will have to establish rapport with the judge and ask probing questions to ensure they meet the judges' needs.

- Teams may only use the following items during the team sales presentation: the team, the project and Marketing Flyer. No slide shows, electronic presentations, videos, computer demonstrations, etc. are required during the team sales presentation, these items may be part of the display in the Marketplace but will not be considered during the team sales presentation.
- Teams will have seven (7) minutes to interact with the judge. All members of the team must be present, and all must participate.
- Teams should present themselves with a professional appearance.
- Teamwork and involvement of team members in the construction of the item will be judged during this event.
- All Projects should be complete at the time of Check In for the show.
- All projects must include the below documentation at a minimum:
 - Bill of materials
 - Drawings (hand sketched or computer drafted)
 - Photos of student/students completing the work
 - SDS/Technical Data Sheets for products used
- Market Value: All projects are required to be sell eligible in this division and the team should assign a realistic market value to their product. No matter what type of product is sold, the price charged to customers or clients will have a direct effect on the success of the business. Though pricing strategies can be complex, the basic rules of pricing are straightforward:
 - All prices must cover costs and profits.
 - Assured price for product reflects the dynamics of cost, market demand, response to the competition, and profit objectives.
 - o Prices must be established to ensure sales.
- Breakdown of Judging Criteria:
 - Project Workmanship/Quality Judging Criteria (70% of Overall Score):
 - Workmanship 60%
 - Innovation 20%
 - Marketability -20%
 - Sales Presentation (20% of Overall Score)
 - Students will design & give sale presentations as if giving a sales pitch to "sell" their project to the judges. This will be done at the time of judging and throughout that day. This should be rehearsed, and the students will need to have technical knowledge of the processes & tools used to construct the project.
 - Marketing Materials (10% of Overall Score)
 - Each team will develop an 8.5" by 11" one or two-sided flyer promoting and detailing the product. The flyer should be designed to be utilized as an advertisement for and an overview of

the product to be shared with customers. This will always be on display and used in the team sales presentation to "sell" the project to the judges.

- Teams should plan to accomplish the following tasks during the sales presentation:
 - o Introduce themselves to the customer at the opening of the presentation.
 - o Introduce the product to the customer.
 - Point out the features of the product.
 - Explain how the product would benefit the customer. Ask for the customers' reaction to the product.
 - The customer will object to some element of the sales presentation. Teams should try to overcome the objection (price, size, color, etc.) with a positive solution to the customers' objections.
 - The customers will also give the teams a chance to close the sale during the presentation. Ask for the business and be prepared to finalize the order.
- Teams should try to include the following in their presentation:
 - First Impression Team identifies themselves with a good first impression, creates customer attention.
 - Sales Approach Team asks questions and utilizes information from answers to build a personal rapport. Teams ask questions to learn about the customers' interests.
 - o Needs and Wants Team confirmed and discovered customer needs and wants.
 - Trial Close Team uses appropriate sales techniques to confirm customer interest and/or identify buying signals.
 - Objections Teams listen and clarify customers' objections. Team applies and discusses the features/benefits of the product to address the customers' objections.
 - Close or Advance Sale Team closes or attempts to close the sale.
 - \circ Active Listening Team actively listens to comments and answers from the customer throughout the presentation.
 - Teamwork How well did each team member participate/communicate in the presentation?
 - Knowledge What level of knowledge did the team have of the product they were selling?
 - Principles Did the team present using sound sales principles?
 - Professionalism Was the presentation delivered professionally?

Market Place Divisions:

- a. Livestock and Farm Equipment: Includes items such as hay handling equipment (ex. hay spears, single/double bale hay trailers, bale pickup equipment, etc.), squeeze chutes, restraining equipment and crowding or working pens, and universal fit truck and ag equipment accessories (i.e.: tool box, storage, ATV rack, receiver hitch carrier, hitch & towing accessories, quick attach skid steer attachments It is encouraged that items have the ability to be utilized on a wide variety of operations regardless of size or type. This also Includes Trailers such as utility bumper pull trailers (must be 16 ft. and under) Small trailers for hauling basic equipment such as lawnmowers, and material are encouraged.
- b. Wildlife: Includes items such as equipment used in managing wildlife and exotic game (i.e.: Feeders, Observation stands, Cleaning Stations and equipment used in the management, raising and caring for animals such as deer, turkeys, quail, fish, etc.). Items meeting the basic uses of a hunter or fisherman are encouraged.

AG MECHANICS PROJECT BUILD-OFF

PURPOSE: The purpose of the ECYE Ag. Mechanics "Build Off" is to provide a hands-on, real-world approach to the Ag. Fabrication industry. This contest will facilitate an opportunity for students to demonstrate their ability to read blueprints, fabricate in the field, read, interpret and apply basic weld symbols, perform oxyfuel and abrasive cuts and perform multi-process welds.

Rules:

- Teams will be provided with a set of professionally drawn blueprints prior to the contest date.
- A team will consist of 3-5 members.
- Substitutions MUST be made 24 hours prior to the start of the contest.
- Materials will be provided to each team on the day of the contest and only the materials provided may be used to complete the project.
- Each team is responsible for all equipment needed to complete the project including electrical power.
- Team members are required to follow all safety requirements of OSHA throughout the contest.
- Teams are not to be coached or instructed during the contest.
- Workspace will be designated.
- Teams will have 8 hours to complete the project and clean-up.
 - o 15 Minute "Timeout" at the two hour and six-hour mark. This allows teachers to coach and adjust plans for better student success.
 - 1 Hour lunch.

Judging:

- Judges will be selected by ECYE
- Teams will be judged on the following aspects:
 - Completion: Projects that are not completed at the end of the allowed time will not be judged.
 - Accuracy: project should be built as indicated by blueprints. Allowable tolerance will be +/- 1/8"
 - Weld Quality: all welds are to be left visible. No ground welds are to be left uncovered.
 - Safety: Members will always wear proper PPE and work safely during the contest, including keeping the work area clean.
 - Overall Appearance: Finish, clean welds, no spatter, excessive grinding, etc.
