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THE LAKE COUNTY FAIR SUPPORTS THE NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS IAFE (International Association of Fairs and Expositions)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more then avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in any event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.
 - If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.
 - At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns or animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal is prohibited.
- 6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions

Exhibitor Eligibility & Responsibilities

PLEASE NOTE: The Lake County Fair Association reserve the right, at its discretion to change, modify, add or cancel the rules, schedule of events, and the right to disqualify any exhibitor for any reason.

1-Exhibitor Eligibility

- 1A. All exhibitors must reside within the Boundaries of Lake County and/or attend a Lake County School or home school. Anyone having graduated high school or dropped out is ineligible to register or show at the Lake County Fair. LCF management and/or superintendents have the right to ask for proof of school records and residence.
- 1B. All exhibitors must be a registered member of a chartered Lake County 4-H Club or Lake County FFA Chapter. Their membership must be in good standing and exhibitors must have met/meet all Club or Chapter requirements.
 - a. A FFA Chapter or 4-H club shall be considered an eligible exhibitor.

1C. Age breakdowns are as follows. As of September 1, 2024

a. Junior: 8-10 years old

b. Intermediate: 11-13 years oldc. Senior: 14-18 years old

2-Rules and Regulations

- 2A. All animals **MUST** be registered through Lake County Fair website (www.lakecofair.com) using the online ShoWorks system.
 - a. Completion of registration indicates you have read, understand, and agree to abide by ALL rules set forth in this premium book.
 - b. All entries will be subject to a Non-Refundable entry fee charged at the time of online registration.
 - c. Exhibitors will be prompted to complete a W-9 during registration, this **MUST** be entirely filled out to complete registration.
 - d. Registration will close at 5:00pm on the date of deadline. Exhibitors who have **NOT** registered through online system by the deadline will **NOT** be eligible to show at the Lake County Fair, **NO EXCEPTIONS** will be granted.
 - e. ShoWorks confirmation receipt should be kept by the exhibitor for their records. Should any registration issues arise, it is the exhibitors responsibility to provide proof of registration.
- 2B. An official entry form for **EACH** animal registered must be completed and accepted in order to exhibit at the Lake County Fair.
 - a. Entry forms must be signed by the exhibitor, exhibitor's parent or guardian, and exhibitor's FFA advisor or 4-H Leader.
 - b. Entry forms must be presented at initial weigh-in/tag pick up for market animals.
 - c. Entry forms must be presented at Fair Check-in for non-market animals.
 - d. Acceptance of Entry forms in no way guarantees animals will be eligible to show and/or sell at the Lake County Fair.
 - e. All Entries must be accompanied by a Health Certificate/Or Coggins stating they are disease free at time of fair check in (with the exception of Swine, Poultry, and Rabbits)
- 2C. Bill of sale for Market animals **MUST** be turned in at initial check-in/tag pick up. It is the exhibitors responsibility to keep a copy for their records. No Copies will be given from the office after January 1, 2025.

- 2D. An exhibitor may show and sell only (1) one market animal, with the exclusions of Market Meat Goat and Market Lamb projects. Exhibitors may be registered and show/sell a Market Meat goat, a Market Lamb project AND ONE (1) other Market project.
- 2E. Exhibitors must personally show his or her own animal they registered for both show and showmanship. FFA chapter or 4-H Club animals may be exhibited by any member of the organization who would otherwise qualify as an eligible exhibitor. FFA Chapter/4-H Club animals **MUST** be exhibited by the **SAME** exhibitor for both show and showmanship.
 - a. If at any time you are found to be exhibiting an animal that is **NOT** your entry, you will be dismissed from the ring. If this information is found AFTER placing, placing and premiums will be forfeited. In the event that an exhibitor is exhibiting in multiple classes and more than one animal makes it to the final drive, the second animal may be shown by another eligible exhibitor with superintendent approval.
- 2F. Each exhibitor assumes all liability in the case of death or injury to their animals until sold. The purchaser assumes liability at the time of sale. At no time does the Lake County Fair assume responsibility or liability for health or injury of any livestock exhibited at the fair.
- 2G. All animals must have official identification number from the State of Florida (rabbit and poultry excluded). This ID must follow USDA office requirements. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to obtain this ID.
 - a. EID (also referred to as RFID) is **REQUIRED** for all Market Steer, Market Swine, AND Beef Breeding entries. Animals must be tagged with this EID at time of fair check in and MUST match health certificate.
 - b. Official ID on the animal must correspond with the number on Health Certificate at time of Fair Check-in.
- 2H. Record Books MUST be completed by EACH exhibitor to show at the Lake County Fair.
 - a. 4-H Club/FFA Chapter animal exhibitors **MUST** complete a record book to show at the lake county fair.
 - b. Record books must be signed by exhibitor, parent or guardian, and FFA Advisor/4-H Leader.
 - c. Failure to turn in Completed Record Book will deem an exhibitor disqualified
 - d. Record books will be turned in at the Lake County Fairgrounds.
 - e. Deadline to turn in record books will be March 17, 2025 from 5:00 8:00 PM. Horse Show Exhibitors will be given a different date and time for Record Book Turn in. (2024-2025)
 - f. Unacceptable or incomplete records as determined by Lake County Fair screening committee WILL be cause for exhibitor disqualification of showing.
 - g. Should an animal be unable to show or disqualified for reasons other than disciplinary or unacceptable record book, record book will remain eligible for record book contests, awards, and premiums.
 - h. Record books are available on the Lake County Fair website(www.lakecofair.com)
- 2I. Grooming, feeding handling, and other care of an exhibitor's animal at the fair is part of the livestock project and is the responsibility of the exhibitor.
- 2J. Barn Superintendent will assign animal quarters to each exhibitor.
- 2K. Each exhibitor is expected to maintain, clean, and keep the quarters of his or her livestock

attractive at all times. Feed, hay, equipment, tack, and tools necessary for the maintenance, care, and proper display of animals must be provided by the exhibitor. Said items must be removed from the barn promptly after show/sale.

- 2L. All exhibits must stay until the removal date and time of that exhibit given by the superintendent. If an animal is removed early exhibitors will be charged a \$100 fine, all premiums will be forfeited and exhibitor will NOT be eligible to show ANY animal at the Lake County Fair the following year.
- 2M. All animals with the exclusion of swine, rabbit, and poultry MUST be halter broken and kept under the control of the exhibitor. Animals that cannot be properly led and managed by the exhibitor will be disqualified from show and sale.
 - a. Show collars are permitted to be used for Breeding, Dairy, and Meat Goats as well as Market Lambs.
 - b. Exhibitors us halter of their choice on their animals.
 - i. Superintendents have the authority to require exhibitors to use chain halters if deemed necessary.
- 2N. If an animal is unable to walk on its own accord from the pen to the show ring, the animal will be ineligible to show and/or sell.
- 20. Before any procedure is performed on an animal due to bloat, or other medical emergency, a Lake County Fair Management member or Livestock superintendent MUST be notified.
- 2P. Grooming is the responsibility of the exhibitor.
 - a. Professional fitters are PROHIBITED.
 - b. Cooperation among and between exhibitors and Advisors/Leaders in the same event is permitted and encouraged.
 - c. Lake County Fair livestock shows are a "Clip, Blow, and Go" ONLY show (Shampoo, water, and blower only. Shampoo may be waterless or liquid)-no adhesives, paint, extra hair, sheen, etc. is permitted. Failure to comply will result in disqualification from show and/or sale and premiums forfeited.
 - d. Fly Spray will be provided by Lake County Fair Superintendents.
 - e. Metal combs are prohibited at the Lake County Fair.
 - f. No graffiti will be permitted on animals. Any animal with graffiti will be disqualified from show and/or sale.
- 2Q. Exhibitors are expected to conduct themselves as ladies and gentlemen at all times. Each exhibitor is responsible for their own behavior. Conduct that violates the laws of the State of Florida, Lake County Fair Rules, or in a manner that brings discredit to the Lake County Fair or it's livestock shows will lead to disqualification from showing and/or selling at the Lake County Fair as well as be barred from any future exhibition.
- 2R. All Exhibitors are required to wear appropriate attire while in the livestock barn.
 - a. 4-H/FFA official dress must be worn during show and sales. (White dress shirt (Tucked in), black pants (no blue jeans), boots/closed toed shoes above the ankle (No boat shoes, clogs or sandals will be permitted during manageability, shows and sales.)
 - b. Horse Show Exhibitor attire will follow 4-H Horse Show Rules-Copy of these rules is

available on the Fair Website.

- c. No Hats or cell phones will be permitted in the show ring.
- d. Opened toed/ended shoes (ie, slip-on, clogs, sandals) are prohibited in the barn at all times.
- e. No inappropriate shirts/sayings will be permitted.
- f. "Bling" belts and pants are not permitted.
- g. Failure to adhere to attire requirements will result in disqualification.
- 2S. Any exhibitor going under, over, or through the perimeter fence of the Fairgrounds or livestock panels will be automatically disqualified.
- 2T. Glass bottles are not permitted at the Lake County Fair.
- 2U. No alcoholic beverages are permitted on Lake County Fair premises. The Lake County Fair has a Zero Tolerance Policy for alcohol or drugs, any evidence of drug or alcohol use will result in the elimination of participation in both current and future Lake County Fair shows/sales or events.
- 2V. Smoking/Vaping is not permitted in any Lake County Fair building, tent, pavilion, or barn at any time.
- 2W. Golf Carts, Utility Vehicles, and/or ATVs are to be used by authorized personnel ONLY. Personal Golf carts, utility vehicles, ATVs or other motorized vehicles and bikes are NOT permitted.

3-Show and Sale

- 3A. Livestock exhibitors will be issued a colored armband and parking pass that corresponds to their respective show and sales.
 - a. Exhibitors will be permitted to park in Livestock Exhibitor Parking ONLY, you will be allotted a specific range of time to drive into gates for unloading/loading tack. Exhibitor's parked inside the gates after cut-off time will be towed.
 - b. The Lake County Fair does not issue passes/tickets for exhibitor's parents/families, tickets must be purchased for entry.
 - c. Livestock 10 day passes will be available for purchase for Lake County 4-H/FFA family members at the fair website (www.lakecofair.com) February 14-March 28, 2025.(Limit 8 per family) Please note after March 28th these tickets will **NOT** be available for purchase and individual full priced entry tickets will be required.
- 3B. The following number of days will be used to calculate weight gain.
 - a. Steer-180 days
 - b. Swine- 96 days
 - c. Meat Goats-94 days
 - d. Market Lamb-94 days
- 3C. Each show must have a minimum of (6) six Lake County Fair exhibitors.
- 3D. No one will be permitted in the show ring during shows/sales unless authorized/sanctioned by the Lake County Fair Association management or superintendents.
- 3E. ALL Market Divisions are Terminal Shows, Animals MUST be sold at auction to the highest bidder.

- 3F. ALL Market Divisions are Terminal Shows. Market animals sold WILL go Directly to slaughter. NO EXCEPTIONS!
- 3G. Market animals will **NOT** be released to exhibitors or be permitted on any trailer that is not a USDA approved slaughter facility trailer and approved by the Lake County Fair.
- 3H. Buyer packets (Credentials, and parking pass) will be mailed to buyers who purchased an animal the previous year by the Fair Office. No tickets or parking passes will be given to exhibitors to pass to their buyers.
 - a. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to furnish the Lake County Fair office with buyer's names and addresses they would like credentials sent to.
 - b. Prospective Buyer information MUST be given to the Fair Office by March 14, 2025, to ensure delivery to the buyers.
 - c. Please note Buyers will still need to register online or day of sale. Furnishing the fair office does **NOT** ensure their registration.
- 3I. A (6%) six percent commission fee will be deducted from both the sale price of animals sold at auction AND all add-ons processed by the Lake County Fair for the promotion and production of our Youth Livestock Programs.
 - a. It is highly encouraged that add-ons are given directly to exhibitors.
 - i. Please note that add-ons given to exhibitors are not eligible as a tax write-off.
- 3J. Each exhibitor MUST prepare a letter of thanks to their buyer.
 - a. Letters must be in an addressed (i.e.: To Buyer & From Exhibitor), stamped, but **NOT SEALED** envelope ready for mailing.
 - b. Exhibitors MUST furnish the Fair office with Buyer Thank-You letters by May 2, 2025, at 5:00 PM.
 - i. A \$100.00 fine will be deducted from the Exhibitor's checks for any Thank-you letters turned in after the deadline.
 - ii. A \$50.00 fine will be deducted from the Exhibitor's checks for any Unacceptable Thank-you letter (i.e., scrapbook paper, ripped paper, one sentence, no buyer name, non-legible handwriting, etc.)
 - iii. NO Checks will be mailed to an exhibitor until their Thank-You letter is received in the fair office.
 - iv. While NOT recommended: Mailed Thank-You letters will be accepted. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to ensure that your letter is received at the fair office by the deadline. Receipts will be given for hand delivered Thank-You letters only.
 - v. PLEASE NOTE: If NO Thank-You is received by June 30, 2025, the fair will NOT mail an exhibitor's check, Sale & Premium checks will be donated back to the fair and the exhibitor will be disqualified from showing in next year's fair.
 - c. Exhibitors are encouraged to also send Thank-you letters to Barn and Award sponsors. These letters do **NOT** need to be turned into the fair office but sent directly to sponsors.
- 3K. Gifts for Buyer's shall **NOT** be given the night of sale. If you choose to give a gift/basket, please do so after fair.
- 3L. The Lake County Fair will not sponsor the sale of any animal that has been eliminated or disqualified for any reason.

3M. Buyer pictures with exhibitors will be presented to the buyer as soon as possible.

4-Livestock Premiums & Awards

- 4A. Award sponsorship is determined upon the approval of the Lake County Fair management.
- 4B. Please allow 6 weeks from the last day of fair to receive Sale and Premium checks.
- 4C. All judging (unless otherwise noted) will be done on a sliding scale by class placing.
 - a. 1st in class-\$25, 2nd-\$20, 3rd-\$15, 4th-\$10, 5th-\$7.50, 6th and below-\$0.
- 4D. Showmanship Awards will be awarded for each Livestock Division and age bracket (Junior, Intermediate, Senior) with the exception of Horse Show.
 - a. To participate in showmanship exhibitors **MUST** use the animal registered under their name.
 - b. Non-registered animals may **NOT** be used even if owned by the exhibitor.
 - c. Borrowing animals for showmanship is **NOT** permitted.
 - d. 1st place showmanship will receive a belt buckle.
 - e. 2nd place showmanship will receive award.
 - f. 3rd place showmanship will receive award.
 - g. 4th place showmanship will receive award.
 - h. 5th place showmanship will receive award.
- 4E. Record Book awards will be awarded for each Livestock Division and age bracket (Junior, Intermediate, Senior)
 - a. 1st place record book will receive an award.
 - b. 2nd place record book will receive an award.
 - c. 3rd place record book will receive an award.
- 4F. Skill-a-thon awards will be awarded for each Livestock Division and age bracket (Junior, Intermediate, Senior) with the exception of Horse Show (2024-2025).

Horse Show Exhibitors may compete in overall skill-a-thon, however there will not be a horse show division skill-a-thon offered by the Lake County Fair.

- a. 1st place Skill-a-thon will receive an award.
- b. 2nd place Skill-a-thon will receive an award.
- c. 3rd place Skill-a-thon will receive an award.
- d. Overall 1st place Skill-a-thon will receive an award
- 4G. Herdsman Awards will be awarded for all Division Exhibitors, and they will be judged daily on the following:
 - a. Orderliness and cleanliness of service area, stall, pens, animals, and public walkways.
 - b. Personal appearance of exhibitor.
 - c. Cooperation with superintendents and show officials in presenting attractive exhibits.
 - d. Availability of either exhibitor or information about their exhibits.
 - e. This award will receive \$50 and award for 1st place, and \$25 and award for 2nd place.
- 4H. The "Charles E. Norris Sportsman Award" will be awarded all divisions with the exclusion of poultry and rabbit.
 - a. This award will given to the Best All Around Lake County FFA Chapter or 4-H Club for outstanding cleanliness, courtesy, personal appearance, and attitude.
 - b. This award will receive an award and \$100.00

- c. This award is in honor of Charles E. Norris.
- 4I. The "James "Big Jim" Richardson Award" will be given to an exhibitor participating in a Lake County Fair show for their first time in all divisions with the exclusion of poultry and rabbit.
 - a. This award will receive an award.
 - b. This award is in honor of a longtime support James Richardson.
- 4J. Please refer to species rules for date/times of when awards will be announced and distributed.
- 4K. There is no money paid for rosette ribbons.
- 4L. The Lake County Fair may announce and offer additional awards.
 - a. It is the responsibility and discretion of Livestock Superintendents to select award recipients of all special awards. Their decision is FINAL.

Horse Show

- Registration fee: \$10.50, please refer to Section 2 for additional registration information.
- A Maximum of six (6) entries may be exhibited, one entry per class will be permitted.
- All Horse Show Exhibitors must be 8 years old by September 1, 2024
 - o 4-H Cloverbuds aged 5-7 may compete in Cloverbud stick horse classes only
- The Florida 4-H Horse Show Rules will govern this show. The Florida 4-H Horse Show Rules will be made available on the Lake County Fair Website. <u>Horse Show Rules UF/IFAS Animal Sciences University of Florida</u>, Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences UF/IFAS
- Exhibitors must manage at least one (1) horse of any age or breed as a 4-H or FFA Horsemanship Project and complete a project record book.
- Lake County Fair may allow for replacement of a horse prior to the show if a veterinarian certifies the registered horse unsound. This must be done by March 15, 2025.
- All exhibitors are required to wear an SEI or SEI/ASTM approved safety equestrian helmet with fastened chin harness whenever they are showing a horse. Failure to obey this rule will result in immediate disqualification and the exhibitor and their horse must leave the fair grounds.
- The public address system is used to help the show move as smoothly as possible, but it is only a courtesy. It is the responsibility of the contestants to know when they are required to be in the make-up area or arena. There will be a two (2) minute final call
- Exhibitors are expected to be neat, clean, attentive, and courteous at all times. Chaps are optional. Long sleeved shirts, pants, boots (no tennis shoes), and helmets are required.
- Any questions regarding tack, bits, and attire will go to the judge for verification.

Fair Check in:

- Entries will be received between 11:00am & 1:00pm on the day of show
- Department of Agriculture will inspect and accept Coggins.
- All horses entering show grounds must be accompanied by a negative test for EIA made within the last twelve (12) months. The horse's name on both the Coggins papers and entry form must be the same
- Superintendent reserves the right to reject any entry for any reason.

Show will begin with Cloverbud Classes at 2:00pm

In hand classes will start at 3:00pm or following Cloverbud Classes whichever occurs later

HEALTH REGULATIONS AND REQUIREMENTS For Admission of Animals for Exhibition

5C-4.0017 General Requirements and Limitations.

- (1) Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI) Required. Animals presented for exhibition purposes in Florida, unless specifically exempted, must be accompanied by an OCVI issued by a veterinarian accredited in the state of origin.
- (a) The OCVI must be complete including the breed, sex, and registration number, and the official individual identification of each animal.
- (b) Results of a specific test requirement or herd accreditation, certification or validation number for each animal must be recorded on the OCVI with the date of the test or herd accreditation, certification or validation.
- (2) Expiration of Required OCVI.
- (a) For Florida-origin animals an OCVI is valid for 90 days from the date of issue; or until the expiration date of any required tests, whichever is the earliest date.
- (b) For animals imported into Florida for exhibition purposes only, the OCVI is valid for 30 days, except that, for equine imported into Florida using a current Equine Interstate Passport Card, DACS-09207, or equivalent of the state of origin signed by the State Veterinarian or chief animal health official, the OCVI will be extended to the date of expiration of the Equine Interstate Passport Card or its equivalent of the state of origin.
- (3) Exemption to Required OCVI. An OCVI is not required for animals originating in Florida and entered in market classes provided that animals are segregated from other animals and the pens are occupied only by the animals in a market class. Pens used for market classes must not be reused until after cleaning and disinfecting.
- (4) Inspection Required. Prior to immediate acceptance at an exhibition, all animals presented for exhibition must be visually inspected by an authorized representative for:
- (a) The required official individual identification of the animal; and
- (b) Clinical signs of disease including, but not limited to: caseous lymphadenitis, blisters/ulcers around the mouth, nostrils, coronary band, pinkeye, pox, scabies, lice, ringworm, atrophic rhinitis, or multiple warts that are clearly visible; and
- (c) Evidence of compliance with animal tests and OCVI requirements, where required. (5) Animals Rejected for Exhibition.
- (a) Any animal in noncompliance with animal tests and OCVI requirements, or
- (b) Any animal not meeting the official individual identification requirements, or
- (c) Any animal which is suspected of having or showing clinical signs of dangerous transmissible, contagious or infectious disease on visual inspection, or any animal which is known to be exposed to such diseases must be:
- 1. Immediately withdrawn from exhibition and returned to the place of origin, or
- 2. Examined by a Florida-licensed and USDA-accredited veterinarian at the owner's expense within 24 hours, who certifies by a signed, written statement, that the animal is free of dangerous transmissible, contagious or infectious disease and pests.
- (6) Forms. Equine Interstate Passport Card, DACS-09207 Rev. 07/05, is hereby incorporated by reference. Copies may be obtained from the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, Division of Animal Industry, 407 S. Calhoun St., Tallahassee, FL 32399-0800.

5C-4.0015 Definitions.

For the purposes of this chapter the following definitions shall apply:

(1) Accredited Veterinarian. A veterinarian licensed in the state of origin and accredited by the United States Department of

Agriculture, Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (USDA, APHIS) to perform certain functions of the federal and cooperative-state-federal programs in accordance with the provisions of Title 9 Code of Federal Regulations (9 CFR) § 161 (2005).

- (2) Animal(s). This term shall include:
- (a) Livestock including grazing animals, such as cattle, horses, sheep, swine, goats, and other hoofed animals; (b) Ratites, limited to ostriches, emus, and rheas;
- (c) Poultry or Domestic fowl which are propagated or maintained for commercial or breeding purposes; and (d) Wild or game animals which may threaten the agricultural interests of Florida.
- (3) Authorized Representative. An employee of the state or federal government, or a licensed veterinarian accredited by the USDA, who is authorized to conduct animal disease control and eradication activities.
- (4) Commercial Production Swine. Swine that have been subjected to and found negative on an annual brucellosis and pseudorabies test and have been continuously managed with adequate facilities and practices to prevent exposure to either transitional or feral swine and so recognized by state animal health officials.
- (5) Group. One or more animals maintained on the same premises or in contact with one another.
- (6) Horse. Any horse, mule, ass, zebra or other equidae.
- (7) Isolation. Separation of individual animals by a physical barrier in a manner that assures one animal does not have access to

the body, excrement, or discharges of another animal; does not share a building with a common ventilation system; and is not

within ten feet of another animal.

(8) Market Class. An exhibition class consisting of finished fed animals that all go directly to slaughter immediately following the

exhibition.

(9) Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI). A legible record or certificate made on an official form from the state of

origin or from the USDA, or a Department-approved electronic format, issued and signed by veterinarians licensed and accredited in the state of origin for the purpose of certifying the official individual identification, test requirements, and health status of specific animals for movement, exhibition, and other designated purposes.

- (10) Official Individual Identification. An individual animal identification that uniquely identifies the animal, the owner, the premises where the animal was identified and the state in which the official individual identification was applied and: (a) For Cattle:
- 1. Is approved by the United States Department of Agriculture in accordance with 9 C.F.R. § 86.4(a)(1) (2013), as incorporated in Rule 5C-31.006, F.A.C.; or
- 2. Is submitted to and verified by the Department as meeting the requirements for official individual identification such that state officials can determine the herd in which the animal was officially identified.

- (b) For Livestock Other than Cattle:
- 1. Tattoos and registered brands such as ear, tail-web or flank tattoos, breed registration tattoos when accompanied by breed registration papers; or an official breed registration brand when accompanied by a brand registration certificate;
- 2. Official leg or wing bands for poultry;
- 3. Color digital images or notarized color photographs of the animal, signed by a state-licensed, USDA-accredited veterinarian; or
- 4. Implanted electronic chips with a unique number that is recorded in a single, central database.
- (11) Official test. A test conducted by a method approved by Department rules for the specific disease and animal species.
 - 12. (12) Poultry, Domestic Fowl or Ratites. Chickens, turkeys, quail, pheasants, chukars, peafowl, guineas, ratites (limited to
 - ostriches, emus and rheas) and waterfowl that are propagated or maintained for commercial or breeding purposes.
 - 13. (13) Segregated. To maintain a group of animals separate from another group of animals in such a manner as to prevent physical

contact between animals of the two groups.

5C-4.002 Cattle or Bison.

- (1) OCVI Required.
- (a) Florida-origin cattle or bison moved for exhibition must be accompanied by an OCVI dated not more than 90 days prior to exhibition.
- (b) Cattle or bison imported from other states for exhibition must be accompanied by an OCVI dated not more than 30 days prior to exhibition.
- (2) Test or Certification Required. (a) Tuberculosis.
- 1. Florida-origin cattle or bison may be entered for exhibition without a tuberculin test.
- 2. Imported dairy cattle may be entered for exhibition provided they have a negative caudal fold tuberculin skin test within 30 days prior to the date of the exhibition; except that, dairy cattle from Accredited Tuberculosis-Free Herds originating in Tuberculosis-Free States, are exempt from this test requirement.
- 3. Imported beef cattle or bison may be entered for exhibition without a negative caudal fold tuberculin skin test provided they originate from Accredited Tuberculosis-Free States or Herds. Otherwise, they must meet the requirements in subparagraph 5C-4.002(2)(a)2., F.A.C.
- (b) Brucellosis.
- 1. Test Required. Cattle or bison, six (6) months of age or older, must have evidence of a negative brucellosis test within 30 days prior to the date of exhibition.
- 2. Exemption from Required Brucellosis Test. a. Steers and spayed heifers; and
- b. Cattle or bison originating from a Certified Brucellosis-Free Herd, or a Brucellosis Class Free State or Area which when certified, the OCVI must show the certified herd number and the date of the last herd certification test; and

c. Cattle or bison from non-quarantined herds originating from Class A State or Area provided that the cattle are under 18 months of age.

5C-4.003 Swine.

- (1) OCVI Required.
- (a) Swine for exhibition must be accompanied by an OCVI dated not more than 90 days prior to presentation for exhibition. (b) Swine imported for exhibition must be accompanied by an OCVI dated not more than 30 days prior to presentation for exhibition.
- (2) Tests or Certification Required for Breeding Swine. (a) Brucellosis.
- 1. Swine six (6) months of age or older must be negative to an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition, or
- 2. Originate from a Validated Brucellosis-Free Swine herd as defined in 9 CFR § 78.1, or
- 3. Originate from a Commercial Production Swine Herd as defined in subsection 5C-4.0015(4), F.A.C.
- (b) Pseudorabies. Swine six (6) months of age or older must be negative to an official test for pseudorabies within 30 days prior to exhibition, or
- 1. Originate from a Qualified Pseudorabies-Free Herd as defined in 9 CFR § 85, or
- 2. Originate from an Approved Commercial Production Swine Herd.
- (3) Exemptions. Swine for exhibition as "market class" swine are exempt from the OCVI and test requirements provided that all swine in the class go directly to slaughter following the exhibition.
- (4) Isolation. Breeding swine returning to the farm from exhibitions must be isolated from other swine at least 30 days before

being returned to the herd. Breeding swine for exhibition must be maintained in isolation between exhibitions or move

directly between exhibitions.

(5) Materials. 9 CFR § 78 (2005) and § 85 (2005) are hereby incorporated by reference. Copies may be obtained from the United States Government Printing Office, Superintendent of Documents, Mail Stop SSOP, Washington, D.C. 20402-9328.

5C-4.004 Poultry, Domestic Fowl or Ratites.

- (1) OCVI Required. An OCVI is required for poultry, domestic fowl or ratites for movement into Florida, but not specifically for exhibition. However, poultry, domestic fowl or ratites presented for exhibition without an OCVI, must be inspected as provided in subsection 5C-4.0017(4), F.A.C.
- (2) Test or Certification Required. All poultry or domestic fowl entered for exhibition must originate from Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flocks or hatcheries, as provided in 9 CFR § 145 (2005) and § 147 (2005), or have a negative pullorum-typhoid test within 90 days prior to exhibition.

(3) Materials. 9 CFR § 145 (2005) and § 147 (2005) are hereby incorporated by reference. Copies may be obtained from the United States Government Printing Office, Superintendent of Documents, Mail Stop SSOP, Washington, D.C. 20402-9328.

5C-4.005 Goats or Sheep.

- (1) OCVI Required.
- (a) Florida-origin goats or sheep presented for exhibition must be accompanied by an OCVI dated not more than 90 days prior to presentation.
- (b) Goats or sheep imported into Florida for exhibition must be accompanied by an OCVI completed within 30 days prior to exhibition.
- (2) Identification. All goats or sheep entered for exhibition purposes must have an official individual identification in accordance

with the National Scrapie Eradication Uniform Methods and Rules, APHIS 91-55-066, June 1, 2005. (3) Test or Certification Required.

- (a) Tuberculosis Test. All dairy goats six (6) months of age or older imported for exhibition purposes must originate from an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free Herd, or have had a negative caudal fold tuberculosis test within 90 days prior to exhibition. When originating from accredited tuberculosis-free herds, the OCVI must show, the accredited herd number and the date of the last herd accreditation test.
- (b) Brucellosis Test. All dairy goats six (6) months of age or older imported for exhibition purposes must originate from a Certified Brucellosis-Free Herd, or have had a negative brucellousis test within 90 days prior to exhibition. When originating from a certified brucellosis-free herd, the OCVI must show the certified herd number and the date of the last herd certification test.
- (c) Exemption From Test Requirements. There are no tuberculosis or brucellosis test requirements for meat type goats or

Florida-origin dairy goats.

(4) Resolution of Violations, Settlement, and Additional Enforcement Remedies – The Department and person charged with a violation may agree to resolve violations prior to an administrative hearing, or enter into settlement pursuant to Section 120.57(4), F.S. The penalties addressed in this rule shall not be construed to limit the authority

of the Department to resolve violations prior to or after initiation of any administrative action or to settle with any party. The Department shall utilize all available remedies to ensure compliance including administrative action, civil actions, settlements, and referrals for criminal prosecution. The Department shall enforce a failure to comply with an agreement to resolve violations or a settlement agreement with the penalties and remedies provided in the agreement and as authorized by Chapters 120 or 570 and 585, F.S.
