General Rules

- 1. Participation in the Jefferson County Fair is a valued opportunity for everyone involved. To ensure a positive experience for all, it's important that exhibitors, parents, leaders, and volunteers uphold the highest standards of conduct. If rules are not followed, exhibitors may face disqualification, loss of awards or premiums, and potential ineligibility for future participation. We appreciate everyone's commitment to maintaining the integrity of the Fair.
- 2. It is the Exhibitor's responsibility to be aware of all dates, deadlines and updates which may be emailed, posted online at the Fair website or in Fair Entry.
- 3. The Jefferson County Fair Park Committee reserves the right to interpret the rules and regulations listed in this entry information.
- 4. The Jefferson County Fair Park is not responsible for LOST or STOLEN articles, or for INJURY or DEATH of livestock. Owners/exhibitors assume full responsibility. Exhibitors exhibit at their own risk.
- 5. The Jefferson County Fair Park has the right to publish, and copyright any exhibitors image (including audio, moving image or photography) for educational programs, websites, and promotion of its programs.
- 6. All rules apply to all departments unless stated otherwise.
- 7. Open and Senior department entries are open to Jefferson and adjoining county residents, as space permits.
- 8. Junior Exhibitors must be 8-19 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year and in good standings of the youth organization they represent to participate in the fair. Jefferson County Fair Junior department entries are open to members of 4-H, FFA, a scouting program, a breed group, or another recognized youth organization under adult leadership which has an education program appropriate to that organization and is approved by the Fair prior to March 1st of the current Fair year.
- 9. No entry shall compete for more than one premium except Showperson Events (livestock exhibits).
- 10. Exhibits must be the result of the exhibitor's own labor or current Fair year projects (Fair to Fair) and may not have been shown at a previous Jefferson County Fair with the exception of animal projects.
- 11. Any exhibit containing illegal or protected materials will be disqualified.
- 12. Exhibits not fulfilling department rules and requirements may be disqualified or placings lowered. The Judge, Superintendent, and Fair Staff have the right to disqualify any exhibit.
- 13. Exhibitors entered in Conference Judging Divisions must attend Judging Day to present their exhibit to the judge. 14. Animal Exhibits:
 - Must be shown by the exhibitor unless special permission is granted by Fair Management because of a medical condition (i.e. broken leg) or conflicting JCF Junior division shows.
 - Animals not properly cleaned/groomed, halter broke or unsafe may be disqualified or forfeit premiums.
 - May not be unloaded or placed in housing facility until all necessary papers are checked by Fair Staff.
 Failure to do so may result in quarantine, disqualification and/or the animal being removed from the Fair Park.
- 15. Fitting: Only the exhibitor, immediate family (father, mother, grandparents, sibling or guardian), another Jefferson County Fair exhibitor or authorized organizational leader will be allowed to assist with show preparation/fitting at any time during the Fair. Animals may be fit in designated areas only. Additional Fitting Rules can be found under the Jefferson County Fair Ethics Policy.
- 16. If an exhibitor has a special need to where accommodation is desired, please notify fair management and superintendent.
- 17. Livestock are at the risk of the exhibitor at all times. Proper animal husbandry management, which includes feed, bedding, daily care and animal health is the responsibility of the exhibitor unless stated otherwise.
- 18. Premises ID number must be included at the time of entry submission.
- 19. All exhibits must be in place by the specified entry check-in deadline. Exhibits arriving after the deadline may not be eligible to be judged.
- 20. Any postings in/on any building must have Fair Management approval.
- 21. Entry tags will be printed for static classes and must be picked up at the Fair Office. Email updates will be sent when tags are available.

Ethics Policy

The Jefferson County Fair is committed to fostering an environment of respect, integrity, and fairness for all participants. Our Ethics Policy is designed to ensure that every exhibitor, volunteer, and visitor upholds high standards of behavior that promote honesty, responsible animal care, and respectful interactions. By following these guidelines, we can create a positive experience that reflects our shared values and commitment to a safe, inclusive, and enjoyable Fair for everyone.

- 1. Tampering, and/or inhumane treatment; and/or misrepresentation as to breeding, age, ownership and any irregularity in showing will be considered fraud and deception.
- 2. To maintain a high degree of confidence and integrity in the livestock shows, the Jefferson County FairPark Committee reserves the right to disqualify any animal fitted in an unethical manner and/or disqualify the exhibitor. Unethical fitting shall include any injection of gas, solid or liquid to alter normal confirmation. In addition, it shall include any cutting or tearing of the hide, cutting or tearing underneath the hide or removal of tissue in any attempt to alter the shape or appearance. It shall also include attempts to disrupt or change normal dental development, dyeing or coloring hair, adding artificial tailheads, switches, polls, hair and heels, as well as any attempt to change the confirmation and degree of firmness by administration of fluids internally or externally in a liquid or solid state. The use of any medication not prescribed under a veterinarian's direction is prohibited.
- 3. All exhibitors, their immediate family and any other parties involved in the unethical fitting and showing of an animal, will be subject to forfeiture of award(s) and premium(s), and/or dismissal from the Fair Park; and/or being barred from competition immediately in the department in which the violation has occurred and/or from all departments entered; and/or in future competition at the Jefferson County Fair.

International Association of Fairs & Expositions (IAFE)

National Code of Show Ring Ethics

(Jefferson County Fair is a member of the IAFE)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall always hold themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to Junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, lengthof ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating to is prohibited.
- 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs and livestock shows.
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in any event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations and rules and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other samples taken from live- stock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such

substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, it's integrity is preserved andall procedures of said collections and preservation, transfer to the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of anysubstance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive orthreatening conduct toward them.
- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person
- 9. or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 10. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether he or she was instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 11. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsibility person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 12. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions provided by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violationof federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Vehicle Parking, Livestock Trailer Parking & Camping Information

Vehicle Parking: Preferred vehicle parking will be available to purchase on Fair Entry. Preferred Parking locations will also be posted on Fair Entry.

Livestock Trailers: Exhibitors may park animal trailers in a designated location during the Fair at no charge. Trailer parking forms are available on Fair Entry. You must have a tag on your trailer, or it will be moved by fair park management.

Camping: Camping during the fair is for animal exhibitors only. Camping can be purchased on Fair Entry.

Golf Carts: Only golf carts issued or approved by Fair Management are permitted

Animal Health Regulations Fairs and Shows in Wisconsin: 2024 Season

This is a summary of animal health requirements for fairs, shows and exhibitions. They are not necessarily the same as requirements for importing animals into Wisconsin or moving them within the state for other purposes. They may change if animal diseases occur in Wisconsin or elsewhere, so always check datcp.wi.gov or contact us for current information. Fairs or exhibitions may have additional requirements. Jefferson County Fair Animal Auction & Youth Celebration Goals:

- 1. Develop a program/event which allows as many Fair youth exhibitors as possible an equitable opportunity to be recognized for outstanding Fair achievement.
- 2. Expand community awareness and participation in the Fair, its events/programs and the Fair's value to youth development.
- 3. Demonstrate positive human to human interaction and goodwill.
- 4. Reaffirm the importance of the Fair and Fair Park as valuable community assets to residents of Jefferson County, Fair attendees, and youth exhibitors.
- 5. Incentive to develop skills associated with positive animal management as a recreation or business.
- 6. Develop an understanding and appreciation of the role of an event/public auction in philanthropic and entrepreneurship activities.

Successful Auction Participation Guidelines:

<u>Auction Buyer Communication</u>: Auction participants are strongly encouraged to communicate with their auction supporters, bidders and buyers after your animal sells and at the conclusion of the auction event. Personal contact and engagement are the best ways to show appreciation and thanks. Following up after the Fair with a written communication is also encouraged. Contact the Fair Office if you need assistance in obtaining accurate contact information. There are NO REQUIREMENTS from the Fair for how participants should demonstrate their appreciation to AUCTION, FAIR and YOUTH supporters.

<u>Auction Supporters:</u> Auction participants are strongly encouraged to promote the Auction by inviting prospective supporters and bidders to attend the Jefferson County Fair Animal Auction & Youth Celebration. Favorable auction price discovery will require a strong active support base and personal connections. To maintain and strengthen an active supporter/bidder base, it will be crucial to continue communications with current supporters but also by adding **NEW prospective supporters/bidders. Participants who have identified potential auction supporters/bidders should submit the prospective bidder information online. Listed below is the process the Fair will follow for actively soliciting 2025 prospective supporters/bidders:**

- New Prospective Bidders: Any new auction bidders that participants have identified must submit the bidders contact information to FairEntry online by May 23. Go to the Fair website for more information on how to enter bidders.

Admission tickets will be sent via mail no later than June 15th. If a bidder has not received their ticket by July 1st should contact the fair office at 920-674-7148.
 - Upon arrival to the fair on Saturday July 12th buyers will receive their **bidder card and two (2)** complimentary Auction hospitality wristbands at registration.

<u>Auction Photographs:</u> There will be at least two backdrops available for auction photographs (location TBD). Each exhibitor is encouraged to seek out their supporters and invite them to have their picture taken.

Protest and Appeal Policy

Any participant or their immediate family may file a Protest or Appeal with the Jefferson County Fair if they would like consideration/reconsideration of a program violation. See Jefferson County Fair Entry Information for further protest and appeal procedures.

Participant Eligibility:

 Auction participants must meet Jefferson County Fair exhibitor eligibility requirements as stated in the Fair entry information (available online at <u>the Fair website</u>) and successfully enter/participate in the respective market divisions (Department 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8) at the 2025 Jefferson County Fair. The auction will be organized by special awards and ribbon place.

- Beef weigh-in on December 14th in the indoor arena is not mandatory, but you must attend if you would like to be involved in rate of gain
 - Any exhibitor not able to participate in weigh-in on December 14th must submit DNA to the fair office by 5PM on Monday, December 16th 2024
- Attendance at the Goat/Sheep weigh-in on Sunday, May 4th, 2025 in the MAP is not mandatory, but you must attend if you would like to be involved in Rate of Gain.
 - Any exhibitor not able to participate in weigh-in on May 4th must submit DNA to the fair office by 5PM on Monday, May 5th 2025.
- 2. Grand and Reserve Overall Champion Information:
 - Grand and Reserve Overall Champion must sell
- 3. Exhibitors may sell in the auction in the following ways:
 - Sell a Market Animal Lot: Youth with market project(s) that meet all Jefferson County Fair Animal Auction & Youth Celebration requirements may sell one of the following:
 - One (1) large animal in departments Beef, Swine, Sheep or Goat.
 - Two (2) Poultry (Blue Ribbon)/ Rabbit (Any Ribbon)
 - One (1) large animal and one (1) Poultry (Blue Ribbon)/ Rabbit (Any Ribbon)
 - <u>Market Poultry/Rabbit entries</u> will sell independently, back to back. Youth will receive all auction proceeds from the market animal lot minus the 5% off the gavel price.
 - Dairy Pledge Drive: Designated award-winning dairy youth will be recognized during the Jefferson County Fair Animal Auction & Youth Celebration. Auction supporters will have the opportunity to support this group of award winners through a pledge drive. <u>All proceeds</u> from the pledge drive minus the 5% auction commission will be distributed <u>equally</u> to these award-winning youth. Dairy Pledge Drive participants are NOT REQUIRED to meet the market animal guidelines listed below to participate. Dairy Pledge Drive participants are still eligible to sell a market animal lot if they meet the requirements noted below.

- 2. Unacceptable Market Animal Quality: The market judge from any species show can determine if an animal is unsuitable for market. Unsuitable market animals could possess any of the following flaws: meat quality (odor/taste due to masculine characteristics), physical health issues/injuries, and/or testicles present. Post-harvest inspection may also determine if unacceptable market quality exists, and an animal is subject to an adjustment between the buyer and the seller under the guidance of Fair Management.
- 3. Animal Health/Injury: If an auction animal is injured or has any health concerns during or after the sale, the participant must immediately notify the Auction Coordinator/Fair Management.

Auction Event Details:

- Set-up/Take Down: Participants are expected to help with auction set-up or take down. Details will be announced at the Fair
- **Commission:** The fair will deduct a maximum 5% commission which will be figured off the gavel price.
 - Covers the costs of postage, bidder entrance tickets, hospitality tent/lunch, etc. The commission is calculated once sponsorships and expenses have been calculated to only collect the needed percentage for costs.

- v. Poultry will have a designated processor which will be communicated by the Poultry superintendent
- Animal Residue/Carcass Inspections or Identification Verification: The Fair reserves the authority to conduct residue testing, carcass inspections, or any other recognized process available to verify USDA, Fair or IAFE rule compliance. Evidence of ethics violations, tampering or testing violations as identified and determined by Fair management may result in sale proceeds being held, retained, or forfeited, in which case any additional expenses involved with animal harvest, testing, and/or carcass disposal will be the sole responsibility of the youth participant. The Jefferson County Fair has the discretion to determine appropriate penalty in all situations for deemed rule violations which may include forfeiture of sale proceeds, penalties, future restrictions and/or expulsion from future Fair and/or Auction participation.

Animal Identification and DNA

- 1. Identification: All Market animals must have 840 Ear Tag and DNA identification on file with the Jefferson County Fair or Wisconsin State Fair by May 23rd to be eligible for Champion Awards. Once identified, market animals are subject to random 840 ear tag inspection and DNA verification testing at any time by Fair Management. Exhibitors who intentionally remove official 840 ear tags are subject to disciplinary actions. Market animals not DNA Identified by May 23rd will be allowed to show but are not eligible for Champion Awards and will be identified as such after the judge has placed the class and will be lowered one ribbon group placing.
 - 840 Ear tag Identification: Any 15-digit 840 ear tag identification will be accepted, RFID ear tags are preferred but not required. The Fair will have Individual 840 RFID Ear Tags available for purchase in the Fair office (503 North Jackson Avenue, Jefferson) beginning October 21, 2024 but the 840 identification ear tag used does not have to be a Jefferson County Fair issued ear tag. If an 840 ear tag is lost at any point throughout the project please notify the Fair office of the updated 840 ear tag identification number. Animals which arrive at the Fair without 840 ear tag identification which matches initial identification are not eligible for Champion awards and will be lowered one ribbon group placing and identified as such after the judge has placed the class.
 - DNA Identification: Jefferson County Fair works with an outside service provider to offer a non-biased identification DNA verification process which is used to protect show integrity and ensure the animals entered are the same animals brought to the Fair by the exhibitor. These DNA kits will be available in the Fair office (503 North Jackson Avenue, Jefferson) for purchase beginning on October 21, 2024.
 - Beef will receive tags at the December weigh in

*Wisconsin State Fair DNA deadline may vary from Jefferson County – check the Wisconsin State Fair website.

- 2. **BEEF:** You will purchase tags at the optional weigh on December 14th 2024. Those not participating in weigh-in must purchase tags from the fair office and must turn DNA in to the office by December 16th, 2024.
- 3. **GOATS/SHEEP:** You will purchase tags at the optional weigh on May 4th, 2025. Those not participating in weigh-in must purchase tags from the fair office and must turn DNA in to the office by May 5th, 2025.
- 4. **SWINE:** You may purchase tags from the fair office beginning March 1st and ending May 5th
- 5. Lost 840 Ear tag identification: If any market animals lose their documented 840 Ear tag identification prior to Tuesday of fair, exhibitors must email the following information to <u>fair@jeffersoncountywi.gov</u>

If an 840 tag is lost after check-in please contact the Fair office. Jefferson County Fair reserves authority to take a DNA sample of any animal which losses their 840 Ear Tag.

Paper entries may be brought to the Fair Office during normal business hours (8 am – 4 pm) or left in the Fair Park Office Dropbox which is located near the front entrance to the Fair Park Activity Center building. As a result of mail service challenges, we will not accept mailed entries via the United States Postal Service (USPS).

Late Entry Information:

Late entries will be accepted in printed form until 4 pm on June 6th, 2025 at the Fair Office. Late entries are subject to a \$100 exhibitor late fee in addition to all original fees. Late entries may be brought to the Fair Office during normal business hours (8 am - 4 pm) or left in the Fair Park Office Dropbox which is located near the front entrance to the Fair Park Activity Center building. As a result of mail service challenges, we will not accept mailed entries via the United States Postal Service (USPS). No entries will be accepted for competitions after 4 pm on June 6, 2025.

Entry Cancellation Refund Request:

All 2025 Jefferson County Fair entry information is available at The Fair website or by stopping in to the Fair Office during normal business hours 8 am – 4 pm Monday – Friday for specific department printed copies.

Entry cancellation Refund Request form must be submitted to the Fair Office by 4 pm on June 27, 2025 to receive entry fee refund consideration. Forms must be submitted on the "Entry Cancellation Refund Request Form" available at The Fair website. Requests will be reviewed and status determined prior to the start of the 2025 Jefferson County Fair.

Entry Substitutions:

Entry substitutions will be accepted at no charge until June 27th, 2025. Some departments may allow substitutions until Fair for an additional fee.

Jefferson County Fair Admission:

Exhibitors and fair guests must have valid admission credentials to enter the Fair, admission is \$12.00 per day. An exhibitor may purchase a wristband at the time of entry for \$15.00 which is valid for the entire week of fair. **One wristband may be purchased per exhibitor.**

Herdsmanship Information

Guidelines and Rubric:

Exhibitors will be judged on herdsmanship based on the following

- 1. General Appearance: overall look of the club's exhibit
- 2. Cleanliness: Pens are clean and well bedded; animals are clean and groomed
- 3. Decorations: Eye appeal, neatness, related to fair's theme
- 4. Identification: Clear identification of the club and the exhibitor(s) first and last name
- 5. **Storage**: Decorations are put up safely, the aisle is free of obstacles, show boxes & feed pans are out of the way.

Poultry and Rabbit Specific Info:

- Individuals must sign themselves up for barn duty
- The details of barn duty will be communicated by the superintendent(s)
- If an individual does not show up for barn duty **OR** does not fulfill their duties, the club they belong to will be docked points at the superintendent(s) discretion.

2025 JEFFERSON COUNTY FAIR MASTER SHOWPERSON

On Saturday, July 12th, at 7pm pm in the Indoor Arena, the best of the best showperson from the 2025 Jefferson County Fair will compete for the title of Master Showperson. A representative from each of the below mentioned Supreme Showpersons will participate in a multi species competition where talented exhibitors demonstrate their Showperson abilities in a variety of species to be an all-around 2025 Jefferson County Fair Master Showperson. Master Showperson is run by a committee of Fair superintendents. Prizes will be determined each year by sponsorships, see Bill Uecker for more details.

- 1. Eligibility: The Supreme Champion Showperson from the following shows Dairy, Beef, Swine, Sheep, Dairy Goat, Meat Goat and Horse are all eligible to participate. A Supreme Champion Showperson participant may only represent one species in the Master Showperson competition. If a Supreme Champion has won the right to represent more than one species the following criteria will be used to determine which species they will represent:
 - Species department the participant exhibited the most classes in at the current Fair
 - Species which had the least amount of exhibitors who participated in Showperson
 - If an eligible participant chooses not to participate in the Master Showperson competition, the option to participate will default to the species Reserve Supreme Champion Showperson, followed by species Honorable Mention Supreme Champion Winner. If an eligible participant is not identified for the species, the highest placing participant in the oldest Showperson age group will be offered the opportunity. If the supreme champion participants don't wish to participate in the Master showperson competition they must notify the fair office by 4 pm on the Friday of Fair or they may lose future Jefferson County Fair eligibility or current years premiums.
- 2. Past winners of Overall Master Showperson contest are ineligible to participate in the Master Showperson contest after they have won.
- 3. Master Showperson participants will be provided animals by Fair Management. Animal selection will be determined by random draw with the first person drawing in each species being the winner of that respective species, followed by the representative from the next species to be shown.
- 4. Show accessories such as combs, brushes, show sticks, will be supplied with each participating animal.
- 5. Participants are encouraged to wear collared shirt, jeans, show harness, belt and closed toe footwear.
- 6. Participants must stay in the staging area during the entire competition. Participants can bring a Jefferson County Jr. Exhibitor assistant to staging area.
- 7. Participants are not allowed use of their cell phones once the competition begins until it is completed. Participants found with a cell phone will be penalized by losing one placing in the species they represent.
- 8. A Judge will rank each Showperson in each species from first place to last with a corresponding rank value (Ex. 1st = 1 pt., 2nd = 2 pts., etc.) The participant with the lowest overall score once all judging is completed will be the winner. In the event of a tie:
 - First Tie-Breaker = One High score and One Low score will be removed from the tied contestants and their scores recalculated, the person with the lower score will win the tie-breaker.
 - Second Tie-Breaker = The contestant with the most 1st place rankings will win the tie-breaker.
 - If a tie still remains after implementing Tie-Breaker criteria the results will be determined as tied and both participants will receive the prizes as posted.
- 9. Each Master Showperson participant is required to attend a meeting at 5:30 pm on Friday of Fair in the MAP Building. At this meeting the rules will be reviewed and each participant will receive their packet. Each participant will be given 3 thank you cards and will turn them in prior to the start of the contest on Saturday July 12th.

- 1. Miss Q Awards are open to any exhibitor with cow entries.

- 6. Exhibitors must comply with State of Wisconsin, Jefferson County Fair, and Fair Management rules. Fair management will reference WI State 4-H Horse Association "Equestrian Guidelines" and "Gymkhana Rules & Class List" for detailed class guidelines.
- 7. Health Rules: All State of Wisconsin mandatory animal health regulations apply. See County & District Fairs, Animal Health Rules and Regulations in entry information.
 - A negative EIA (Coggins) test is required for all exhibition equine. The test must be CURRENT and valid through September 30th of the current fair year. Original documentation must be presented to Fair Management prior to unloading.
 - Management prior to unloading.
 i. Horse ID sheets, EIA (Coggins) test and proof of vaccination must be submitted to Superintendent prior to the arrival of fair. They may be submitted with Fair entry, email or mail.
 - It is recommended all horse be in good health and vaccinated prior to June 1 of the current Fair year for Eastern and Western Encephalomyelitis, Tetanus, and Equine Influenza.
 - Any animal health verification with out of state addresses listed with animal information will be considered by Fair Management as owned outside of Wisconsin and will require a current CVI for Jefferson County Fair exhibition.
- 8. Superintendent:
 - Will assign stalls based on entry information provided by the exhibitor
 - Questions, interpretations, and any variance from participation rules or classes should be directed to Fair Management. Superintendent's decisions will be final.
 - Exhibitors or adults should not approach the judge before, during or after the show. Questions and concerns regarding judges or judging should be directed to Superintendent

- Once a horse is checked in and unloaded it may not leave the Fair Park until the designated time as communicated by the superintendent on Sunday unless authorized by the Fair Veterinarian, Superintendent, or Fair Management.
- 9. Definitions:
 - Horse over 56 inches.
 - Pony Ponies or horses measuring 56" and under are eligible to show in either the pony class or in the horse class (no cross exhibiting). Exhibitor must declare at check in.
 - Miniatures must enter and show in the pony classes for safety reasons.
 - Stallions are not allowed to be exhibited. A stallion is defined as an unaltered male over 1 year of age.
 - Mares with foals at side are not allowed to exhibit.
- 10. Horse/Exhibitor Safety:
 - For Safety reasons, exhibitors may receive assistance with horse handling if exhibitor is in the immediate area. This includes but not limited to leading to and from the stalling area and lunging in arenas.
 - Long pants, boots with a cut-out heel, and SEI approved (and fastened) helmets, must be worn when mounted/driving while on the Fair Park.
 - Exhibitors are ONLY allowed to ride the horse they entered and checked in, no exceptions. Riding is limited to designated riding arena and when entering the show ring.
 - Kicker/Biters: Known kickers must wear a red ribbon on their tail. Known biters must wear a green ribbon on their forelock. Ribbons worn will not be judged against the horse.
 - In driving classes an exhibitor may have an adult ride in cart (helmet required).
- 11. Additional Division/Class Guidelines:
 - The entry gate will be held a maximum of two minutes. Exhibitors requiring a tack change must notify gate person of the request a minimum of two (2) classes before their class is called.

1. Exhibitor Eligibility & General Guidelines:

- Entry Fee: \$1 per class unless noted. Substitutions are allowed only within the division entered.
- Each exhibitor is allowed a maximum of 15 bird class entries within the Junior Poultry Department.
- Pre-fair exhibitor meeting for exhibitors bringing live birds to the Fair. Exhibitors are strongly encouraged to attend, updated Fair and department information discussed will supersede stated entry information. Please watch your email for Fair Information updates or the website at The Fair website for meeting information.
- Exhibitors are expected to assist with Fair exhibit set up on Saturday June 29th, Fair exhibit take down on Sunday July 14, and to complete a 30 minute exhibit supervision duty during the fair.
- Exhibitors are encouraged to decorate their coop area to promote a positive image of agriculture. Coops and animals must be kept accessible to the public while the barn is open or as designated by Superintendent. All waste, feed, manure and trash should be disposed of properly.
- Eggs laid at the Fair become Fair property and will be properly disposed of by Fair Management or Superintendent.
- All exhibits will receive the best care and protection the surroundings will afford, but they are at all times subject to the owner's risk.
- Exhibitors are expected to conform to Jefferson County Fair participation and exhibition policies. Failure to comply may result in premium and awards forfeiture, dismissal from the grounds and being barred from immediate and/or future exhibitions. Superintendent reserves the right to interpret and enforce the rules and regulations; split or combine classes; accept or reject any entry entirely, partially or conditionally.
- If an exhibitor has a special need to where accommodation is desired, please notify fair management and superintendent.

2. Animal and Exhibitor Safety:

- All exhibitors are expected to display positive animal welfare practices while at the Fair. Superintendent reserves the right to disqualify/remove exhibitors and/or entries deemed not presenting positive animal welfare practices.
- Due to animal wellness and safety concerns all poultry are restricted to the designated area and the immediate surrounding area. Poultry found outside of the designated area will be immediately disqualified. No animals other than those housed in the exhibit area will be permitted in this area. Fair Management or Superintendent has discretion to approve special circumstances.
- For public safety and liability reasons exhibitors may not use space in or around their exhibits to conduct any type of direct contact/petting or photo opportunities geared toward fairgoers/public.
- Animals deemed uncontrollable and unsafe to exhibit will be dismissed from the Fair. Superintendent retains the right to warn the exhibitor and dismiss any animal deemed unsafe or uncontrollable at any time. No prizes and awards will be awarded if an animal is dismissed.
- Exhibitors and visitors are prohibited from handling birds other than their own without the consent of Superintendent. Violation may result in loss of all prizes and awards.
- 3. Equipment:
 - Tack: Show boxes, feed, bedding and other equipment used for poultry care must be kept neatly in the designated tack area and out of the public aisles. It is important to keep all housing areas orderly and safe

to promote positive animal agriculture to the public.

- Carrying Cases: Exhibitors must remove their carrying cases from the exhibit area after caging their entries.
- Coop Cups: Two cups of appropriate size must be provided and secured by the exhibitor for each bird being caged. No disposable type cups; paper, plastic or Styrofoam allowed.
- Exhibitors are responsible to feed and water their own birds. Poultry must have access to fresh water at all times. Exhibitors must bring their own feed.

4. Health Records:

- Exhibitors must send a copy of official documentation or Form 9-2 (demonstrating their birds are pullorumtyphoid free to the Fair Office after July 1st or bring it to check in at Fair. Exhibits without paperwork will not be allowed in the barn and they will be ineligible to exhibit. All health documentation received will be retained by Jefferson County Fair and shall not be returned to the exhibitor. The Jefferson County Fair will not be responsible for pullorum testing. All poultry over 4 months of age, except pigeons, shown in public exhibition must show proof of disease status by presenting one of the following:
 - i. Certified flock status (Official Documentation)
 - ii. NPIP Participant or Affiliate Flock Certificate
 - iii. Wisconsin Tested Flock Certificate
 - iv. Wisconsin Associate Flock Certificate
 - v. Wisconsin Individual Poultry Test Report (Form 9-2)
 - vi. Individual identification must be on the test report
 - vii. Youth Exhibition Exemption
 - viii. Leader Letter and Hatchery Receipts
- All Poultry will be inspected for health by Superintendent. Poultry with any external parasites (lice, mites, fleas) may be removed from competition and the Fair Park at Superintendent discretion. Wet poultry will not be accepted at time of entry.
- At any time, any bird shows evidence of a contagious or infectious disease, it shall be removed immediately from the exhibit, quarantined, or harvested as directed by Superintendent, Fair Veterinarian or the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection Representative. All poultry exhibited may be subject to quarantine or harvest if any contagious or infectious disease is discovered among any of the exhibited poultry. Reference health regulations for more information.

5. Class Definitions:

- Cock, Hen, Old Male, Old Female hatched prior to the calendar year shown.
- Cockerel, Pullet, Young Male, Young Female hatched during the calendar year shown.
- Questionable age verification will be determined by Superintendent or judge and that decision is final.
- Chicken and Pigeon: Must be at least eight (8) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
- Waterfowl: Must be at least ten (10) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
- Turkeys: Must be at least fifteen (15) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
- Birds must be entered and exhibited in the class created for that specific breed and variety. The Any Other Variety Class is solely for varieties which have no other class. Birds incorrectly entered by the exhibitor will be disqualified.

6. Bird Identification: (Per state requirements)

- Poultry: identified with a numbered leg band provided at entry/check-in. Exhibitor must record band number on the back of the entry tag when the bird is cooped.
- Pigeons: identified with a seamless numbered band from a recognized banding organization in the current year. Exhibitor must record band number on the back of the entry tag when the bird is cooped.

7. Cooping

- Poultry entries (except market entries) will be cooped by club/group. Market entries will be cooped in a classified manner. Superintendent may consolidate coops.
- Exhibitors must keep cages and birds clean throughout the Fair. Exhibits in unsuitable conditions will receive written notification to remedy the situation. If conditions are not brought up to standard the entry shall be dismissed from the exhibit. No award monies will be awarded if a bird is dismissed.

8. Judging:

- Judges may disqualify birds which are incorrectly entered, in questionable condition or which are not true breed representative.
- Exhibitors and spectators shall not converse with the judge during judging unless the judge initiates communication.
- Exhibitors are responsible for bringing their entries to the judging area for Face to Face judging with the
 exception of market division which will be cage judged, exhibits which are cage judged will have coop tags
 covered during judging.
- Entries will be judged according to APA rules and regulations with the following exceptions:

- 7. The handler should be keeping pace alongside the course but can step across the course if needed. Handlers may not stand behind their rabbit on the run or step over any of the jump rails and posts.
- 8. First and last jumps: These two jumps are considered free jumps, and no faults will be counted on either jump. Lifting the rabbit over the last jump will not count as a fault but the handler cannot lift the rabbit until it reaches the marked lift line. Corrections and faults will be counted between the run space after the first jump and the lift line before the last jump.
- 9. Rabbits must hop through the course on their own free will.
- 10. The course is considered complete, and the clock is stopped when the rabbit has touched all four feet on the ground after clearing the final jump.
- 11. Scoring
 - a. Faults and corrections from run #1 and run #2 will be added together.
 - b. Time (nearest tenth of a second) from run #1 and run #2 will be added together using the official tier's recorded time. If time is in question the back-up time will be considered.
 - c. If a tie exists for the final placing the following criteria will break the tie
 - i. Quickest accumulative time
 - ii. Least number of corrections not converted to faults
 - iii. A runoff (two new runs) will determine the higher place

12. Faults:

- a. 3 corrections = 1 fault
- b. Team number not easily visible on handler = 1 fault
- c. Handler's hand is closer than 24" on the lead = 1 fault
- d. Each knocked down rail or post = 1 fault
- e. Rabbit jumps outside of the jump posts = 1 fault
- f. Lifting rabbit over a jump = 1 fault for each rail and side post present for that jump (excluding first and last jump)
- g. Lifting rabbit over the last jump <u>before</u> the lift line=1 fault for each rail and side post present for that jump
- h. Sliding the rabbit more than 6' on the run=1 fault
- i. Handler lifts the rabbit off the ground = 1 fault
- j. Exceeding 2-minute time limit. Every 15 seconds = 1 fault (maximum 4 faults)
- k. Rabbit jumps back (wrong way) over a jump = 1 fault
- 13. Warnings to Disqualifications; (one warning bell and yellow flag)
 - a. The handler displays improper handling of the rabbit
 - b. The Handler holds the lead too tight, thereby restricting hopping
 - c. The handler receives assistance from spectators
 - d. Team is on the course before called to start
 - e. Team is not available at the start.

- f. The handler does not place the rabbit where it naturally would have landed after lifting it out of a failed jump
- g. The handler stands on the mat behind the rabbit
- 14. Immediate Disqualification: (two warning bells)
 - a. Team is not ready to start after a warning
 - b. The rabbit leaves the competition area. (past the judging area)
 - c. Negligent rabbit treatment (kick, hit, drop, throw, misuse of lead)
 - d. If the handler is on the course and they lose or drop the lead
 - e. Handler uses feet to guide, push, or move a rabbit



1. Exhibitor Eligibility & General Guidelines:

- Entry Fee: \$2 per class unless noted. Substitutions are allowed only within the division entered.
- Exhibition is open to persons of any age who are Jefferson County residents.
- Each exhibitor is allowed a maximum of 20 total entries within the Open Poultry Department. Junior exhibitors may enter in the open show but may not exhibit the same birds they exhibited in the junior show.
- All exhibits will receive the best care and protection the surroundings will afford, but they are at all times subject to the owner's risk. Exhibitors are expected to conform to Jefferson County Fair participation and exhibition policies. Failure to comply may result in prize and award forfeiture, immediate dismissal and/or loss of future exhibition eligibility. Superintendent reserves the right to interpret/enforce the rules and regulations; split or combine classes; accept or reject any entry entirely, partially or conditionally.
- If an exhibitor has a special need to where accommodation is desired, please notify fair management and superintendent.

2. Animal and Exhibitor Safety:

- All exhibitors are expected to demonstrate positive animal welfare practices while at the Fair. Superintendent reserves the right to disqualify and/or remove exhibitors/entries deemed not presenting positive animal welfare practices.
- Due to animal wellness and safety concerns all poultry are restricted to the designated area and the immediate surrounding area or they will be disqualified. No animals other than those entered will be permitted in the designated area. Superintendent has the authority to approve special circumstances.
- For public safety and liability reasons exhibitors may not use space in or around their exhibits to conduct any type of direct contact/petting or photo opportunities geared toward fairgoers/public.
- Exhibitors and visitors are prohibited from handling birds other than their own without the consent of the Superintendent. Violation may result in loss of all prizes and awards.
- Exhibitors are responsible to feed and water their own birds.
- Eggs laid at the Fair become Fair property and will be properly disposed of by Superintendent.
- Tack: Show boxes, feed, bedding and other show equipment used for poultry care must be kept neatly in the exhibitor area and out of the public aisles. It is important to keep all areas orderly and safe to promote positive animal agriculture to the public.

3. Health Records:

- Persons exhibiting poultry at Jefferson County Fair must send a copy of Official Documentation or Form9-2 demonstrating their birds are pullorum-typhoid free prior to July 1. Poultry may not be exhibited at Jefferson County Fair unless accompanied by the required health forms. All documentation received will be retained by Jefferson County Fair and shall not be returned to the exhibitor. The Jefferson County Fair will not be responsible for pullorum testing. All poultry over 4 months of age, except pigeons, shown in public exhibition mustshow proof of disease status by presenting one of the following:
 - i. Certified flock status (Official Documentation)
 - ii. NPIP Participant or Affiliate Flock Certificate
 - iii. Wisconsin Tested Flock Certificate
 - iv. Wisconsin Associate Flock Certificate
 - v. Wisconsin Individual Poultry Test Report (Form 9-2)
 - vi. Individual identification must be on the test report
 - vii. Youth Exhibition Exemption
 - viii. Letter and Hatchery Receipts
- All Poultry will be health inspected by Superintendent upon arrival. Poultry with any external parasites (lice, mites, fleas) will be disqualified from competition and removed from the Fair Park at

Superintendent 's discretion. Wet poultry will not be accepted at time of entry.

 If, at any time, any bird shows evidence of a contagious or infectious disease, it shall be removed immediately from the exhibit, quarantined or harvested as directed by Superintendent, Fair Veterinarian or the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection Representative. All poultry exhibited may be subject to quarantine or harvest if any contagious or infectious disease is discovered among any of the poultry in the exhibit. Reference health regulations for more information.

4. Class Definitions:

- Birds must be entered and exhibited in the class created for that specific breed and variety. The Any Other Variety division is solely for varieties which have no other class. Birds incorrectly entered by the exhibitor will be disqualified.
 - i. Cock, Hen, Old Male, Old Female hatched prior to the calendar year shown.
 - ii. Cockerel, Pullet, Young Male, Young Female hatched during the calendar year shown.
 - iii. Chicken and Pigeon: Must be at least eight (8) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
 - iv. Waterfowl: Must be at least ten (10) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
 - v. Turkeys: Must be at least fifteen (15) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
- Questionable age verification will be determined by Superintendent or by the judge and that decision is final.

5. Identification: Per state (DATCP) requirement

- Poultry must be marked with numbered leg bands which must appear on entry forms and must be recorded on the back of the entry tag, by the exhibitor.
- Pigeons must be seamless banded with a numbered band from a recognized banding organization in the current

6. Judging

- may disqualify birds which are incorrectly entered, in questionable condition or which are not true breed representative.
- Exhibitors and spectators shall not converse with the judge during judging.
