Code of Conduct for Parents, Volunteers and Youth within the Idaho 4-H Youth Development Program

Idaho families and youth trust the University of Idaho Extension system to provide educational programs in a safe environment for all participants. The opportunity to participate in and/or work with University of Idaho Extension's 4-H Youth Development program is a privilege and honor, not a right. Volunteers are to be positive role models. Youth and parents/guardians are expected to demonstrate appropriate behavior at all times. The following Code of Conduct has been established as the foundation for all individuals participating in University of Idaho Extension programs. All University of Idaho 4-H Youth Development program participants are expected to:

- Work with youth, families, volunteers and Extension personnel in a cooperative, courteous, respectful manner demonstrating good sportsmanship and behaviors appropriate for a positive role model.
- Accept supervision from Extension personnel and cooperate with others; in addition, parents and youth will accept supervision from certified organizational and project volunteers.
- Maintain open, honest communication with members, volunteers, parents and Extension personnel.
- Uphold every individual's right to dignity, appropriate self-expression, and individual development.
- Refrain from verbal, physical or emotional abuse of others (via bullying, texting, social media, etc.) and report such abuse, if observed. Any actions, such as a conviction for child abuse or neglect, violent crimes, unethical behavior, substance abuse, verbal abuse, physical abuse, mismanagement of 4-H funds, or other serious offenses will not be tolerated.
- Respect, adhere to and enforce the rules, policies, and guidelines established at the county and state levels for the 4-H Youth Development Program.
- Promote the spirit of inclusion and welcome participation of other individuals from all backgrounds. Comply with equal opportunity and anti-discrimination laws.
- The consumption of alcoholic beverages, use of tobacco products or an illegal controlled substance at 4-H youth events is prohibited.
- Inform Extension personnel of any incidents that may violate 4-H policies.
- Treat animals humanely and encourage all participants to provide appropriate and ethical animal care.
- Operate machinery, vehicles, and other equipment in a safe and responsible manner when working with youth and adults participating in 4-H Youth Development programs.
- Ensure that 4-H participants are not required to purchase materials, equipment, animals or services from any specific places of business.
- Comply with all applicable laws of the city, county, and state of residence and/or location of 4-H activity.
- Handle all concerns regarding county/area 4-H program management internally within the University of Idaho Extension system.

Violating the Code of Conduct shall be grounds for action up to and including immediate removal from the 4-H activity/program and termination. Decisions regarding immediate removal, suspension or termination will be made by the county 4-H Professional with subsequent notification of and consultation with the District Director and State 4-H Youth Development Director. Volunteers who wish to appeal a decision may do so through the Appeal Process.

Market Animal Buyer Information and FAQs

Who organizes and operates the Market Animal Sale?

The Bonner County 4-H Market Animal Livestock Committee, with the cooperation of the University of Idaho, Bonner County Extension Office, the Fair Board, and Bonner County 4-H personnel.

What is "Turn" price?

The on-hoof live price a producer receives when selling through the local auction yard. The price is established by calling several local or area livestock yards and receiving a quote on the price for market animals on a given day.

Who pays the Turn Price?

The turn price is paid by the company or individual that offers the best current market price.

What is "Blue Sky" Money?

Blue Sky money is the money paid to the member above and beyond the turn price paid for the animal.

Who pays the Blue Sky Money?

Individuals and businesses who bid on the members animal pay the blue sky money. The blue sky money is that portion of the price bid that is eligible as a tax benefit to 4-H supporters.

Who can buy at the Market Animal Sale?

Anyone can purchase an animal at the market animal sale. Buyers are required to register and pick up a number in order to buy during the sale.

What happens after the "hammer falls"?

When the hammer falls and the auctioneer says the animal is sold, that is exactly what it means. No switching, substituting, or deleting of animals. Animals that are returned to 4-H members by the buyer must be taken home at the close of fair. See

Rule #54 in the 4-H section for 4-H member's responsibilities concerning sold animals.

What can I do with the animal I purchased?

Buyers have three ways to buy:

Live animal – Buyers may arrange to take their purchase home at the conclusion of the fair.

Custom Process – Most buyers will prefer having their purchase custom processed. Buyers are responsible for the fees charged by the processor.

Turn the animal – The buyer pays the Market Animal Committee the bid price over the turn price. The turn buyer pays for the turn price portion of the sale.

Is there a maximum weight that a Market Animal can be?

The Market Animal Livestock Committee and the Bonner County 4-H program have introduced a maximum weight on market hogs of 300 pounds and 1,500 pounds for Market Beef. Members with animals over the respective weight limits will be allowed to sell, providing they received a blue or red ribbon in the quality class, but buyers will only pay for up to 300 or 1,500 pounds respectively.

What is the exhibitor's responsibility?

Before the sale: To educate themselves on the project they have chosen. To select an animal and prepare it properly in order

for it to be worthy to be sold at the sale. To follow and adhere to the policies and requirements of the

4-H program.

During the sale: The exhibitor must be appropriately dressed and present their animal and themselves in a clean, well-groomed fashion.

After the sale: The exhibitor is responsible for the care of the animal until it is time to load out on Sunday morning. The exhibitor is also responsible for writing a thank you note to his or her buyer and turning the Thank you note into the Extension Office no later than September 1st.

What happens if member's animal receives a white ribbon in the show ring or is under the Minimum Weight required?

The animal will not be allowed to sell in the Market Animal Sale. Beef must be 1,050 pounds/maximum 1,500, Sheep must be 105 pounds, Swine must be 225 pounds/maximum 300 and Market Goats must be 60 pounds at the Fair weigh-in. This ensures that the buyers purchase a quality animal. A list of white ribbon or underweight animals will not be available during the fair. For more information and rules, see the 4-H Rules & Regulations.

Deposit check must be picked up by the end of payout (Sunday ONLY 8am-12pm). **Any deposit funds not picked up at this time will be used as donation towards that barn. *Deposits will not be returned by mail.** Stalls must be cleaned to dirt/concrete. Stalls in Cattle Barn need to have all shavings and manure moved to the middle of aisles. Stalls in Horse Barns must be cleaned out to dirt/concrete and move 5 ft out of stall. Cages must be free of manure and feed. All decorations and personal equipment must be removed from all barns and the grounds.

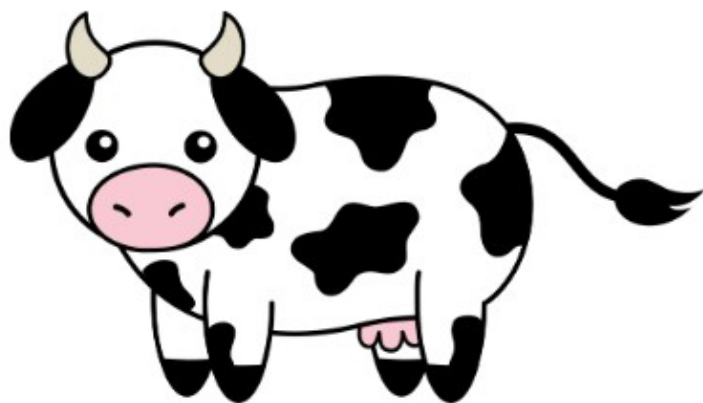

4-H Special Contests

HORSE CONTESTS

Horse Bowl

The Horse Bowl contest provides 4-H members an opportunity to demonstrate their equine knowledge in a fun and friendly competition. Members that do well will have an opportunity to compete with a team at the District, State and possibly the National contests.

Hippology

The primary objective of the Hippology contest is to provide, in a friendly but competitive setting, an opportunity for youth enrolled in 4-H to demonstrate the breadth of their knowledge and understanding of equine science and management, and in particular, the practical application of this knowledge and skill. It is hoped that this contest will generate new friendships and be a rewarding experience for the contestants.

Horse Judging

The primary objective of the 4-H Horse Judging Contest is to teach youth the principles of horse selection and performance evaluation as related to equine recreational activities and provide an opportunity for youth to demonstrate their knowledge of equine-related matters in a competitive setting and to stimulate youth achievement. We hope that this competition will help youth improve their skills in decision-making, communication, and team work.

Trail Ride

The Bonner County 4-H Trail Ride/Riding Clinic is an opportunity for 4-H members enrolled in the Horse project to show off their trail riding skills. Members will ride along a trail and encounter various obstacles and/or tasks for them to complete while mounted.

ANIMAL AND LIVESTOCK CONTESTS

4-H Small Animal Judging and Field Day

This contest is open to all members enrolled in the Bonner County 4-H Youth Development Program. Members will listen to various speakers speak about small animals and then participate in a judging contest.

4-H Cat and Pocket Pet Show

All 4-H members enrolled in the Cat and/or Pocket Pet projects are required to fit and show their project animal as part of their project completion. All animals must be in good health. Exhibitors must provide own cage, water dish and food. Animals must be kept in their cage until class is ready. All animals must be able to be controlled by handler during the class. Members may only enter one animal for fitting and showing.

4-H Special Contests

4-H Dog Show

All 4-H members enrolled in the Dog project are required to fit and show their project animal as part of their project completion.

4-H Large Animal Livestock Judging

The Livestock judging consists of carefully analyzing animals and measuring them against a standard that is commonly accepted as being ideal. This contest provides an opportunity for youth to put their livestock evaluation and oral reasons skills to work.

Beef Bowl

The Beef Bowl is sponsored by the Bonner County Cattlewomen and was instituted to encourage 4-H beef members to become more knowledgeable of the beef industry. The Beef Bowl is patterned after the Bonner County Horse Bowl, except beef and cattle related questions are asked. All 4-H livestock clubs are invited to enter teams into the contest. Four members constitute a team. Questions will be taken from the 4-H beef project manual, from the cow-calf management guide and from Idaho Beef Council material. Awards will be provided to first, second and third place teams.

Sales Talk

This contest is open to all 4-H members taking market or breeding animal projects. The contest encourages members to enhance their public speaking skills. Awards will be given in each of the three categories: Junior, Intermediate, Senior.

The rules are as follows:

1. A participant is allowed 4-7 minutes for presentation.
2. An animal or photo of same will be used during presentation. Photo must be 8 x 10 or smaller.
3. A copy of the registration certificate, if purebred, may be presented to judges.
4. Participant is allowed one assistant to handle the animal. Each category will be judged by a team of 2 judges. Please check schedule for dates and times.

STATIC PROJECT CONTESTS

4-H Shooting Sports Contests

While participation in the Archery and/or Rifle/Pistol contests is not required for project completion; it is a great event for 4-H members enrolled in these projects to showcase the skills they've learned over the 4-H year.

Fashion Review

All 4-H members enrolled in the clothing and jewelry making projects must model at the county contest or at a pre-arranged project 4-H meeting. Style of garment/jewelry, fit, model appearance, and some garment construction will be considered. The garment/jewelry modeled must be the project work of the member exhibiting. Participants will be divided into the following age groups: 8-10, 11-13, and 14 and over.

GENERAL 4-H CONTESTS

Interview Judging

Interview Judging will be held prior to Fair Week. Each year we will interview 65 members by appointment on a first come first serve basis. There will be top awards for each age category. All record books need to be as complete as possible and brought to Interview Judging. Know your Government, Leadership, Public Speaking, Citizenship Washington Focus, and all Self-determined project members must complete Interview Judging for project completion.

Demonstrations

The contest for Horse, Family and Consumer Science, Agriculture and Miscellaneous oral presentations is held in the spring. The contest is open to all 4-H club members enrolled in 4-H.

4-H Club Secretary Book

Club secretary books may be submitted to select the most accurate secretary book in the county. Books must be turned into the 4-H display area on Monday before the fair week. Ribbon awards will be given.

4-H Club Scrapbook

All 4-H clubs may submit a scrapbook and report of club activities. Ribbons will be given to those clubs participating Books. The scrapbooks must be submitted into the 4-H area on Sunday before the fair week. Scrapbooks will be displayed in the 4-H exhibit area.

4-H Special Awards

4-H Record Book Recognition

The Sandpoint Elks, and the Farm Bureau provide incentives to 4-H members for completing record books. Cash awards of \$5, \$10 and \$20 are given to members who complete excellent, superior, and outstanding record books, as judged by members of the committee, based on established criteria. These awards are announced/distributed during the 4-H Awards Ceremony.

Good Shepherd Award

Sponsored by the Bonner Sheep Producers, this award is given to the individual member exhibiting the highest standard of herdsmanship with their sheep project, based on outstanding sportsmanship, animal care and courtesy to others.

Ray Davis Memorial Herdsmanship Awards

Sponsored by the Horse Leaders Council and awarded to the Club that maintains well-decorated and clean stalls and demonstrates observance of rules, respect for their animals, sportsmanship, positive attitude, courtesy, and helpfulness.

Top Red Angus Market Steer Project

Sponsored by Wood V Bar X Red Angus Ranch, this belt buckle award is for the top blue ribbon, red angus market steer, based on the beef quality classes.

Top Black Angus Market Steer

Sponsored by the Bonner Cattle Women, this belt buckle award is for the top blue ribbon, black angus market steer as determined in the beef quality classes.

Top Simmental Steer

The Idaho Simmental Association will present a gift to the top, blue ribbon Simmental purebred or crossbred project.

Top Simmental Breeding Project

The Idaho Simmental Association will present a gift to the top, blue ribbon, Simmental breeding project.

Top Hereford Market Steer

Sponsored by Fern Ridge Ranch Herefords in Sandpoint, this sweatshirt award is given to the top blue ribbon, Market Hereford (or Hereford crossbreed) in the beef Quality classes.

Top Hereford Breeding Project

Sponsored by Fern Ridge Ranch Herefords in Sandpoint, this sweatshirt award is given to the top blue ribbon, Hereford Breeding Project.

Superior Beef Award

Sponsored by the Idaho Cattle Association, this belt buckle award is given to the overall Superior 4-H Beef project, based on an application. Recipients must be enrolled in a 4-H beef project and exhibit the best combination of performance, sportsmanship and citizenship. Applications are available in the Beef Barn during Fair or at the Extension office. Applications must be turned into Extension by 9 AM on Saturday of the Fair. The criteria include the following:

- * Livestock Contest Participation
- * Fitting & Showing Placing
- * Beef Quality Placing
- * Beef Sportsmanship
- * Beef Herdsmanship
- * Beef Record Book

~100 points are possible for all categories

4-H Horsemanship Awards

Sponsored by the 4-H Horse Leaders Council, these horse awards are given to recipients who have an outstanding horse project and have excelled in their horsemanship skills throughout the 4-H year per the application criteria. A Top Horsemanship award will be given to the following age categories:

- * Junior Overall Horsemanship Award
- * Intermediate Overall Horsemanship Award
- * Senior Overall Horsemanship Award



2022-2023 Bonner County Mission Statement, Rules and Regulations

Bonner County 4-H Mission Statement

The mission of 4-H is to help youth acquire knowledge, develop life skills, and form attitudes that will enable them to become self-directed, productive, and contributing members of society.

4-H Bonner County General Rules and Regulations

1. 4-H age is the age of the individual on January 1 within the current 4-H year. The 4-H year runs October 1st-September 30th. An individual may continue to participate in the 4-H program if they are 18 on January 1 within the current 4-H year. A member between the ages of 5-7 on January 1 of the current 4-H year may only enroll as a Cloverbud.
2. Age divisions in 4-H are as follows: Junior: ages 8-10 Intermediate: ages 11-13 Senior: ages 14-18
3. 4-H members must attend 6 organizational meetings and 2/3 of all project meetings offered to them. Make-up meetings will be left to the discretion of each leader.
4. Individuals can enroll at any time but are encouraged to enroll between Oct. 1 and Feb. 1 so they can compete for top awards or sell a market animal at fair. Enrollments received after Feb 1 may still participate in 4-H Events but will not receive top awards. Enrollment in clubs and projects are subject to availability.
5. 4-H members must give one Oral Presentation (Public Speech, Demonstration or Illustrated talk) for each project at either a general meeting, project meeting, demonstration day or other Extension approved event.
6. All non-food Static Projects and Completed Record books must be turned in to the Extension Office the Monday from 9am – 6pm prior to fair week. All food projects will be due the Monday of Fair 9am – 1pm.
7. All record books must be signed (by project or organizational leader, member, and parent) and must include a total experience story and Involvement Report to be approved when presented at exhibitor check-in.
8. In Bonner County 4-H, Cloverbud years do not count towards participation years in 4-H for county awards.
9. 4-H projects will be divided by age division and ribbons will be awarded according to each applicable division.
10. Poster presentations CANNOT be larger than the size determined by the project requirements.

11. All Cloverbud projects are non-competitive and will be awarded a participation ribbon. Exhibiting is not a requirement for the Cloverbud Project.

12. Champion and Reserve Champion rosettes will be awarded to the top 2 overall placements in each project area, provided at least 2 blue ribbons were awarded in the project area. When there are less than 2 blue ribbons awarded in a project area, issuance of top awards will be at the judge's discretion.

13. No article from one project may be entered as part of another project. Any work done as a part of a 4-H project may not be entered into open class, except for the top two clothing projects, which may be cross entered into open class for a chance to win the top open class award.

14. Annual Financial Summaries and Civil Rights Reports are due to the Extension Office November 1 of each year. For those clubs that do not have money, submit the form with \$0 or none. If your club fails to submit, your club will be turned off and members will not be able to enroll in your club until the paperwork is received.

Judging

15. Livestock judging is not required for completion of any large animal project; however, judging is required for several special awards and participation is always highly encouraged.

16. The small animal judging contest is open to all 4-H members regardless of project enrollment and ribbon awards will be given to all members who participate. There are also special awards for the top placements in this contest.

17. The Hormel scoring system is used in all judging contests.

18. Barn superintendent must notify the owner of each animal to be used during a judging contest.

General Livestock

19. All 4-H members are required to be present during the judging of their exhibit animal unless excused by Extension staff and the appropriate 4-H barn superintendent.

20. All livestock preparation prior to and during the fair, except instances regarding safety, shall be done by the individual 4-H member.

21. All record books must be approved and submitted at exhibitor check-in. Special award applications are due to the Extension Office the Friday of fair by 4:30 pm.

22. All record books must be complete and turned in before the animal will be weighed in at fair.

23. When preparing an animal for show, the 4-H member must do the majority of the prep work themselves but may receive some assistance from another youth or a 4-H Leader. Members who are not preparing their own animals will be given one warning before risking disqualification.

24. All project dress codes must be followed. See breed requirements for details. Emphasis is always on safely presenting a neat, clean appearance. It is required that full-length pants/jeans/slacks as well as long sleeve shirts for beef, horse, rabbit and poultry, boots or hard sole shoes must be worn. No baseball caps allowed in the show ring. Western hats are optional for beef only.

25. NO OPEN TOED SHOES allowed in any barn or while handling any project animal.

26. Members who lose an animal (market, breeding, dairy, or pet) during the project year may still choose to complete their project by completing the non-animal project for the same species.

27. No tranquilizing or use of any calming products of any type will be allowed during 4-H events regardless of label directions.

28. Any animal deemed to be of substandard health by the judge or fair vet must be removed from grounds the same day by owner.

29. All exhibitors, parents and volunteers must abide by the 4-H Code of Conduct.

30. All animals, including poultry and rabbits, must have a health certificate if crossing a state line. Documentation must be provided to Extension staff at spring weigh in or when requested.

31. All members must provide a proof of ownership brand inspection for beef, bill of sale on goats, sheep, and swine (proof of ownership for any self-bred animal). Documentation must be provided to Extension staff at spring weigh in or when requested. Please do not include these documents in your record books.

32. All beef, llama/alpaca & horse members will be required to pay a \$10 stall deposit and \$10 bedding fee for each stall. Swine, sheep, goat will be required to pay a \$5 stall deposit and \$5 bedding fee. Small animal members will be required to pay a \$2 pen deposit and \$2 bedding fee. The deposits will be refunded at the close of fair after stalls and pens have been cleaned and inspected. Bedding fees are non-refundable. These fees will be coordinated by your project leader.

Fitting and Showing

33. Padlocks will not be permitted on any pen during the fair.

34. Animals must be able to be led in order to fit and show in the appropriate class. Animals must be manageable. The barn superintendent, 4-H Market Animal Committee, Extension Staff or Fair Management will collaborate on the decision to excuse an animal from the fair. The judge may also dismiss an animal from the show ring if it is deemed unsafe.

35. Fitting and Showing classes will follow the same age divisions as outlined by 4-H Policies and Procedures.

36. All members must fit and show a project animal which belongs to the member. Members having more than one species of animal must fit and show each species. If a 4-H member has more than one animal of same species, only one must be shown in the fitting and showing class. However, all market projects must be shown in fitting and showing.

37. Members must fit and show breeding animals if they are not selling a market animal of the same species.

38. The top showmen will be selected from each age division in each class to compete for overall champion/ reserve champion showman in each species.

39. The top showman from sheep, beef, swine, dairy, and goat may compete in the large animal Round Robin fitting and showing contest. Top showman from dog, rabbit, cavy cat and poultry may compete in the small animal Round Robin fitting and showing contest. Champion and Reserve Champion ribbons are awarded.

Market Animals

40. A member may sell only one market animal through the livestock auction each year.

41. Members are responsible for the care and maintenance of ALL animals until the animals leave the fairgrounds.

42. All market projects must be weighed in at the proper spring weigh-in.

43. 4-H members may weigh in and carry multiple species market projects. If a member carries more than one species for a market project, they must declare to the superintendent immediately following the last quality class, which species they will sell at the livestock auction.



44. Alternate Market Animals: 4-H members may weigh in and tag a maximum of two (2) of any species at the spring weigh in. All animals weighed will be tagged and records on each animal must be kept. The member must select only one of each species to bring to fair. Only one of each species will be weighed at fair. If you have an alternate animal your choice must be made prior to fair. You will not be allowed to switch animals if your first choice does not make weight. You will not be allowed to switch a market animal to a breeding project at fair.

45. An alternate animal may be shared by immediate family members.

46. All 4-H ownership requirements must be met by the members before the members are eligible to participate at the fair.

47. Animals meeting minimum fair weights are subject to the judge's discretion as to quality grade. Only red ribbon and higher placing in quality will be permitted to sell through the sale.

48. Minimum on market animals at fair weigh in are as follows:

Bred heifers— 850 pounds

Goats— 60 pounds

Sheep— 105 pounds

Steer— 1050 pounds minimum/1,500 pounds maximum

Swine— 225 pounds minimum/300 pounds maximum

Swine over 300 pounds and Beef over 1,500 pounds will still qualify to sell, if they receive a red ribbon or higher in the quality class. Members will not be paid for any pounds over 300 or 1,500 respectively.

49. Only those market animals that do not make weight at the fair weigh-in will be entitled to one IMMEDIATE re-weigh after the scales are rebalanced.

50. Those market animals which cannot be sold at the auction (underweight or animals receiving a white ribbon in quality) may be advertised with special signs AFTER the auction. These signs are available at the Extension Office. These are the ONLY signs that are to be used. No social media advertising will be permitted.

A. Members with underweight and white ribbon animals cannot approach perspective buyers on fairgrounds property until after the 4-H Livestock Auction ends.

51. White ribbon and underweight animals will not be listed on a posted sale list. Members are encouraged to take the underweight animal home to finish them out before selling to a private buyer.

52. Sale Fees: 4-H members selling a market animal will be required to pay a 5% selling fee. Beef members will be required to pay the final brand inspection and swine members will be required to pay the national pork board fees. These costs will be deducted from the 4-H member's sale check by the treasurer of the 4-H Market Animal Livestock Committee and a check for the balance will be issued to the member following payment from the buyer.

53. Any member in violation of the market animal sale rules forfeits the right to sell any animal at the sale the following year or at the discretion of the Market Animal Livestock Committee.

54. Market animals must be presented to the sale in the same manner as they were in their Fitting and Showing and Quality classes. Other than member's ribbons and banners, no additional items may be placed on the animal.

55. When the hammer falls and the auctioneer says the animal is sold, the sale is final. No switching, substituting, or deleting of animals. Animals that are returned to the member by the buyer must be taken home.

56. A formal change of animal ownership occurs when the animal in a youth market project is sold. A 4-H animal sold through the county market animal sale cannot be returned to the member and then be shown/sold as a 4-H project at another show for the current year.

57. All barns will be closed to spectators during their showing times and portion of the sale. The barns will reopen upon completion of their portion of events.

58. Members are required to write a thoughtful thank you to their buyer and turn it in to the Extension Office no later than September 1st.

59. Checks must be picked up at the Extension office and cashed within 90 days of the issue date.

Herdsmanship

60. Official 4-H animal care guidelines are found in member materials and are also available through the Extension Office.

61. 4-H members will feed and provide clean water AT LEAST twice a day and when prudent livestock management dictates.

62. Each 4-H member is responsible for maintaining his/her animal in a fit and clean state for the duration of the fair.

63. Animals must be fed, watered, and have pens cleaned by 9am every day of the fair. Exhibitors will receive one verbal warning. More than one warning may result in the member forfeiting their ability to exhibit that species the following year. Dismissal is at the discretion of the livestock committee, leaders, superintendents and Extension staff.

64. 4-H members must maintain and display their animals in a way that does not endanger the animal, other members or the public. This includes storing ALL equipment and feed in non-exhibit locations and in appropriate areas and containers.

65. Market animals must remain in their assigned pens until they are released by their respective superintendent.

66. Please see project requirements for exhibit guidelines on all projects.

Beef

67. Water buckets and feed pans may not be left in front of beef animals except for during feeding periods.

68. Other than registered breed standards, horns and scurs can be no longer than 2 inches and must be blunt.

69. Market steer shall be on dry feed (no pasture) from the time of the official spring weigh in until the time of the sale.

70. Market steer are to be taken off water and feed at 9pm the evening before weighing in at the fair.

71. 4-H beef members must fill out a trip permit. Beef animals will be brand inspected. Brand inspector fees are the responsibility of the member.

72. In order to sell through the Market Sale, all steers must be halter broke and able to be lead across the scales at the spring weigh in.

73. There is no maximum weight for steers at spring weigh-in.

74. Beef animals that are not able to be controlled by the 4-H member will be excused from the fair and sale and will be asked to remove the animal from the grounds.

This decision will be at the discretion of leaders, superintendent, Market Animal Livestock Committee, Extension staff, and judge (where applicable). Animals that get loose 2 times during showing will be immediately tied up.

75. Bred Heifer Rules: Health certificate must be furnished dated within 30 days of the sale. Bred heifers must be shown to the 4-H Market Animal Livestock Committee for approval at spring weigh in. All animals must have a positive pregnancy test certificate dated within 30 days of the fair and state an approximate calving date. This project is for BEEF members ONLY.

Sheep and Goat

76. Contingent on fair board rule #3 of the Sheep Department (#8), sheep shall not be bathed on the grounds during fair. Spot washing is acceptable.

77. No wet lambs will be weighed at fair.

78. Goats may wash at swine wash racks with permission of both goat and swine superintendents.

79. Only wethers/does will be allowed in the market class/sale.

80. Goats/sheep are not allowed beyond the entry of the beef barn or in the beef wash racks.

81. All Goats and Sheep must have a scrapie tag or tattoo.

82. Pet/Pack, and Breeding Goats may be shown with horns. All horns must be tipped, taped, or padded. Market and Dairy goats must be dehorned or polled or have scurs less than 2 inches long.

83. Halters may not be used for showing Market sheep or for any fitting and showing class. Market Goat may not show with a lead rope attached to a piece of equipment.

Swine

84. There is no maximum weight for swine at spring weigh-in.

85. Feed containers must be kept clean and removable feed buckets must be removed after feeding.

86. Storage of show equipment and buckets must be out of the aisles and kept clean.

Rabbit and Poultry

87. Any blue or red ribbon pen of meat rabbits may be sold at the market sale if the 4-H members is not selling any other market animal.

88. Please refer to project materials on what constitutes a blue-ribbon pen of meat rabbits.

89. Any blue or red ribbon pen of three (3) fryer/broiler chickens or two (2) turkey may be sold at the market sale if the 4-H member is not selling any other market animal.

90. All market poultry project members must own and provide care for animals according to species rules. All market broiler project members must own and provide care for animals for no more than 12 weeks. All market turkey project members must own and provide care for animals for no more than 16 weeks for hens and no more than 25 weeks for toms.

Special Contests

91. Demonstration – The contest for Horse, Family and Consumer Science, Agriculture and Miscellaneous oral presentations is held in the spring. The contest is open to all 4-H club members enrolled in 4-H.

92. Fashion Review – All 4-H members enrolled in the clothing and jewelry making projects must model at the county contest or at a pre-arranged project 4-H meeting. Style of garment/jewelry, fit, model appearance, and some garment construction will be considered. The garment/jewelry modeled must be the project work of the member exhibiting. Participants will be divided into the following age groups: 8-10, 11-13, and 14 and over.

93. Judging Contests – There are three judging contests held each year. Livestock judging, small animal/dog judging, and horse judging. An award is given to the top in each category. Please check the 4-H Calendar for dates and times.

94. Interview Judging – Interview Judging will be held prior to Fair Week. Each year we will interview 65 members by appointment on a first come first serve basis. There will be top awards for each age category. All record books need to be as complete as possible and brought to Interview Judging. Know your Government, Leadership, Public Speaking, Citizenship Washington Focus, and all Self-determined project members must complete Interview Judging for project completion.

95. Sales Talk – This contest is open to all 4-H members taking market or breeding animal projects. The contest encourages members to enhance their public speaking skills. Awards will be given in each of the three categories: Junior, Intermediate, and Senior. The rules are as follows.

- A participant is allowed 4-7 minutes for presentation
- An animal or photo of animal will be used during the presentation. Photo must be 8x10 or smaller
- A copy of the registration certificate, if pure bred, may be presented to judges
- Participant is allowed one assistant to handle the animal. Each category will be judged by a team of two judges. Please check schedule for dates and times.

96. Beef Bowl – The Beef Bowl is sponsored by the Bonner County Cattlewomen and was instituted to encourage 4-H beef member to become more knowledgeable of the beef industry. The beef Bowl is patterned after the Bonner County Horse Bowl, except beef and cattle related questions are asked. All 4-H livestock clubs are invited to enter teams into the contest. Four members constitute a team. Questions will be taken from the 4-H project manual, from the cow-calf management guide and from Idaho Beef Council material. Award will be provided to first, second, and third place teams.

97. 4-H Club Secretary and Treasurer Books – Club secretary and treasurer books may be submitted to select the most accurate book in the county. Books must be turned into the 4-H display area the Monday before Fair Week. Ribbon awards will be given.

98. 4-H Club Scrapbook – All 4-H clubs may submit a scrapbook and report of club activities. Ribbons will be given to those clubs participating books. The scrapbooks must be submitted into the 4-H area on the Monday before Fair Week. Scrapbooks will be displayed in the 4-H exhibit area.

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
