Latah County Fair Animal Ownership & Floater Policy

All Large Livestock Market Animals destined to attend the Latah County Fair, must attend the official Initial Weigh-In for the Fair Year to be tagged and verify ownership.

Weigh-In Dates will be established by the January Fair Board Meeting each year. At Initial Weigh-In, one primary animal will be designated for each exhibitor, and the floater(s) will be identified as a family floater.

All 4-H members must be enrolled, and dues paid in 4-H database and all FFA members must be in good standing with their local FFA chapter, prior to the animal(s) being weighed at initial weigh-in and/or date of ownership for small animals.

Immediate family members who live at the same address may share floater animals (“family floater”). Multiple exhibitor families penning animals at a central location cannot share floater animals.

Floater Animal Philosophy: Floater Animals are to be regarded as a backup animal to help ensure the 4-H or FFA Members can exhibit at the Latah County Fair and complete their project in the case of illness or death of the primary animal. Floaters are not intended to ensure weight requirements are met for the Livestock Sale.

Floater Animal Limits are by size of Family:

# of Exhibitors in Family	# of Floater Animals Allowed
1	1
2	2
3	2
4	2
5 or more	3

Final selection of which animal exhibits at the Fair is up to the exhibitor and will be recorded during Fair registration.

All Small Animal Market Projects will be procured and/or ownership determined by the appropriate species specific protocol as adopted by the Fair Board and published in the Policy Library:
