All exhibitors should be familiar with and must abide by the terms and conditions of the Indiana State Fair. Failure to do so may result in loss of the privilege to exhibit at the State Fair and/or ejection from the Fairgrounds.

Indiana State Fair

4-H COMPETITIONS GENERAL TERMS & CONDITIONS

Definitions

As used in these Terms & Conditions, the following Definitions apply:

- A. **"Animal Wellness and Care Plan"** shall mean a document in place to provide a statement of intent and standards by which the Indiana State Fair will operate to ensure the care, safety, and well-being of all animals involved with the Indiana State Fair. Indiana State Fair agrees to adhere to the best animal care practices, ensure all animals are under the care of an official veterinarian and that all animals are in accordance with the Indiana Board of Animal Health rules and regulations.
- B. The **"Board"** shall mean the Indiana State Fair Board.
- C. **"Department"** means any of the following 4-H event divisions:
 - a. Horse & Pony
 - b. Llama and Alpaca
 - c. Beef Cattle
 - d. Dairy Cattle
 - e. Swine
 - f. Sheep
 - g. Dairy Goats
 - h. Poultry
 - i. Rabbit
 - j. Dog
 - k. Cats
 - l. Pygmy Goat
 - m. Meat Type Goat
- D. **"Premium"** shall mean an award of any kind, including cash, plaques, ribbons, trophies and other such articles awarded to or received by exhibitors as prizes for accomplishments in the Show.
- E. **"Rules"** shall mean these General Terms & Conditions and any applicable Special Terms & Conditions for each species.
- F. **"Show"** shall mean the Indiana State Fair and the events and activities that it sponsors.
- G. **"Show Management"** means an adult individual duly appointed by the Indiana State Fair Board to serve as the overall show managers including, but not limited to, the Executive Director or designee, the Director of the Purdue Cooperative Extension and his/her designee, Indiana State Fair Commission Livestock Coordinator, Department Superintendents and State Fair Veterinarians.
- H. **"4-H Show Manager"** means an adult individual appointed by the Purdue Cooperative Extension 4-H Animal Science Specialist to organize and supervise animal identification, judging and activities in the Indiana 4-H Livestock shows at the Indiana State Fair.

General Principles

- 1. By submitting an Indiana State Fair Entry Form or online entry, 4-H Exhibitors agree to all Terms & Conditions.
 - a. Exhibitors entered under one account are also responsible and held accountable to all Terms and Conditions.
- 2. The Indiana State Fair is fully committed to ensuring integrity in all 4-H Competitions. As such, there is No Tolerance for any violation of Terms & Conditions; intent is not relevant (i.e., strict liability) and any determined violations including testing results are final and binding. 4-H Exhibitors should expect that any animal exhibit may be tested at any time while on the Fairgrounds or at harvest.
- 3. The Indiana State Fair is fully committed to carrying out the Animal Wellness & Care Plan and ensuring the proper treatment of all animal exhibits. Therefore, sick animals shall not be exhibited because of the risk to the animal exhibit, other animal exhibits, the 4-H Exhibitor, other 4-H Exhibitors, other persons, and the integrity of 4-H Competitions. Based on Animal Wellness & Care Plan, the Board or Show Management may prohibit an animal exhibit from showing at their sole discretion.

Care Of Animal Exhibits

- 4. 4-H Exhibitors are completely responsible for the care and custody of animal exhibits at the Indiana State Fair.
- 5. 4-H Exhibitors may receive clipping and grooming assistance from members of their immediate family (father, mother and siblings), from a current Indiana 4-H member, and from individuals enrolled in the Indiana 4-H Approved Animal Grooming Assistance Program. Temporary guardianships established for the intent of animal exhibition or grooming purposes are not permitted and shall result in immediate disqualification.
 - a. State Fair and 4-H officials reserve the right to request identification from any individual grooming any animal(s), ID refusal and violations to the policy may result in the disqualification of an animal entry.
 - b. To access the Indiana 4-H Approved Animal Grooming Assistance Program contact your local Purdue Extension Office.

6. Ownership of the animal exhibits passes from the 4-H Exhibitors or their families to the Indiana State Fair Commission when the Indiana State Fair Commission takes possession of the animal exhibits for harvesting.

Code of Ethics

7. In order to protect the integrity of the Indiana State Fair 4-H Competitions and the food supply, the Indiana State Fair reserves the right to disqualify any animal(s) they have reasonable cause to believe have been fitted in an unethical manner.
 - a. By submitting an Indiana State Fair Entry Form or online entry, 4-H Exhibitors represent that the exhibitors' animal(s) natural conformation and structure has not been altered in any way. This alternation is also known as "unethical fitting" and includes but is not limited to injection of air, gas, or other foreign substances, cutting/tearing of the hide or removal of tissue in an attempt to alter the physical appearance or shape of the animal, numbing an animal's tail, cutting tendons of an animal, using foreign substances to build or cosmetically re-shape feet.
 - b. Any animal found to have surgical alterations other than dehorning, castration, or docking as permitted by the species-specific rules may be disqualified. Unethical fitting also includes attempts to disrupt or change normal dental development. The act of artificially filling animals internally, which includes stomach pumping or any other method per os (by esophagus) is prohibited for all species.
 - c. No injection sites (including sites from acupuncture treatments) may be found in marketable areas such as top, rounds, loin, hips, etc.
 - d. The administration of any drug prohibited by Federal, State, or Local law or any drug used in a manner prohibited by Federal, State, or Local law is prohibited.
 - e. In such cases where unethical fitting appears to have been attempted, the Indiana State Fair may appoint a veterinarian to inspect the entry. The Indiana State Fair will follow a course of action based on the findings and conclusions of the examining veterinarian. Any 4-H Exhibitor that is disqualified for any rules or code of ethics violations will forfeit all premiums

Drug & Alterations Testing/Examination Principles

8. The Indiana State Fair 4-H Animal Testing Program protects the integrity of the Indiana State Fair, 4-H Competitions and the food supply. At no time shall animal exhibits have any substance present, alteration or tissue anomalies that:
 - a. Violates standards established by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA).
 - b. Violates standards established by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). Should testing results reveal non label compound use, consideration may be given if credible veterinary disclosure or testimony is provided, accompanied by credible documentation citing appropriate exercise of the Animal Medicinal Drug Use Clarification Act of 1994 (AMDUCA) within an existing Veterinarian Client Patient Relationship (VCPR) at the time of treatment is provided in a timely manner when requested by State Fair officials before, not after an Appeal Process as outlined in General Terms & Conditions 34-50 has been initiated and is recorded and present on the exhibit's Animal Affidavit.
 - c. Is determined by the Purdue University Meat Lab Manager or State or Federal Meat Inspectors to be unacceptable for human consumption either during or post-harvest.
 - d. Provides any potential performance enhancing quality or any potential showing advantage including but not limited to tampering, altering, or misrepresenting any exhibit; coloring that alters or misrepresents breed characteristics; pumping air or other substances to alter conformation; methods to induce artificial fill; performing surgical and/or non-surgical procedures to alter the animal's configuration or natural conformation of any part of the animal's body; and unethical fitting. The following generally accepted management practices are allowed: hoof trimming, dehorning, removal of hair, castration, branding, tattooing, ear notching, and docking of tails.

Treatment of Acute Injury Policy for 4-H Animal Exhibits at the 2023 ISF.

9. In the event that an animal suffers an acute injury, it is permissible for the animal to be treated with FDA approved medications. An ISF veterinarian must administer all treatments. The determination of the time of injury and its impact on the animal is solely based on the evaluation and diagnosis of the attending ISF veterinarian. For market animals, all withdrawal times must be completed prior to the start of the show. Failure to meet this withdrawal time requirement shall disqualify an animal from exhibition. Non-market animals are exempt from withdrawal times being completed by the time of show with the exception of any breeding females which may be loaded on market trucks at the ISF.
10. The use by non-veterinarians (exhibitor or otherwise) of animal compounds or other substances in any manner other than in accord with the labeling approved by FDA is a violation of federal law and individuals found to be in violation may be disqualified and/or ejected from the event at the discretion of Show Management.

Animal Affidavit

11. Upon check-in at the State Fairgrounds, an animal affidavit (found at <https://www.indianastatefair.com/p/state-fair/competitions--contests/livestock-information>) shall be submitted for **all animal exhibits** (i.e., market and breeding) in the:
 - a. Beef Cattle Department,
 - b. Dairy Cattle Department,
 - c. Swine Department,
 - d. Sheep Department,
 - e. Dairy Goat Department,
 - f. Boer Goat Department, and
 - g. Meat Goat Department.
12. All medications, vaccinations, injections, medical treatments, and any foreign substances administered, in any form or manner, from the ownership deadline (May 15, 2023) through the day of check-in must be recorded.
13. Disclosing drugs and/or alterations on the animal affidavit does not affect the imposition of penalties should there be a violation of the Code of Ethics or drug testing /examination principles outlined above. Attaching accompanying veterinary documentation to support any Animal Affidavit claims is recommended.
14. A separate affidavit will be required for each event a 4-H Member enters. **(ie If an affidavit is submitted by the 4-H Member exhibiting barrows a new affidavit will be required if they are also exhibiting gilts.)**
15. Failure to complete the animal affidavit shall result in automatic disqualification and may result in additional imposed penalties as listed below in General Terms & Conditions 36-40.

Veterinary Treatment Of Animal Exhibits

16. Upon check-in at the State Fairgrounds, all 4-H Exhibitors irrevocably consent to emergency medical care that may be needed to preserve an animal's life or prevent extreme suffering. 4-H Exhibitors and any person affiliated with them hereby waive any claim related to emergency medical care and, to the fullest extent permitted by law, 4-H Exhibitors and any person affiliated with them hereby agree to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the Indiana State Fair Board, Indiana State Fair Commission, Purdue University, Indiana 4-H Program, Cooperative Extension, the State of Indiana, and respective agencies, affiliates, agents, officers, and employees from all claims and suits including court costs, attorney's fees, and other expenses related to emergency medical care. If the following conditions have been met, the Indiana State Fair is expressly authorized to perform any medical treatment, including but not limited to medical practices/procedures, administering of medications, surgery, and euthanasia, for an animal in the absence of the 4-H Exhibitor if:
 - a. The 4-H Exhibitor is unreachable after due diligence has been made to contact the 4-H Exhibitor, and
 - b. A State Fair Veterinarian or Show Management determines that the animal's health is in danger and delaying treatment would be detrimental to the animal's life, or that the animal is in extreme pain.
17. Only the State Fair Veterinarians may administer drugs to animal exhibits at the Fairgrounds.
18. Within 2 hours of treatment, the State Fair Veterinarians shall report all performed treatments to the Department Superintendent on an Indiana State Fair-provided reporting form.

Non-ambulatory Deceased Animal Policy

19. The Indiana State Fair will not allow the unloading of animals that are non-ambulatory (i.e. downer) or unable to walk off the vehicle under their own power. The exception to this policy will be unloading the animal for euthanizing and disposing of the animal. If an animal becomes non-ambulatory after arrival at the Indiana State Fairgrounds, then the following policy will be strictly enforced:
 - a. The owner shall immediately notify the Superintendent in charge of that department.
 - b. The Department Superintendent shall immediately notify the State Fair Veterinarian and the Livestock Coordinator about the animal in question and circumstances evolving around how this condition happened.
 - c. Show Management and the owner (or representative) will consult each other to come to the best decision for the animal with the emphasis being for the well-being of the animal. Only the persons that are available need to be involved in the decision. If euthanasia is determined to be the best option, this will be at the owner's expense.
 - d. Livestock that becomes non-ambulatory after arriving at the Indiana State Fairgrounds must be disposed of or removed for treatment within 12 hours of discovering or receiving notice of the animal's condition. If the animal is treatable and Show Management agrees, the owner must remove that animal from the Fairgrounds (at the owner's expense) within the 12-hour period.
20. In the event of an animal dying while at the Indiana State Fairgrounds, the animal's owner(s) is/are responsible for removing it from the Fairgrounds. The timetable is as follows, remove from the building, or display area within 30 minutes to either their vehicle or a designated location. The owner then has up to three (3) hours to remove the carcass from the grounds to a proper disposal site at the owner's expense. If necessary, fairgrounds staff will assist moving the carcass to a designated area/into the owner's vehicle.

Judges & Judging

21. The decision of the judges will be final in all cases, except where mistake, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion, not discovered at the time of award, is proven. Any objections to a judge must be submitted as an Official Grievance (See Rule 28 below for Official Protests).
22. 4-H Exhibitors and any person affiliated with them shall treat officials and judges with respect. 4-H Exhibitors shall not interfere/attempt to interfere with or influence/attempt to influence a Judges' decision.
23. Any exhibit not presented promptly when called shall be disqualified.
24. Competition placings are not official until all carcass examination, animal testing, re-weighing, and animal verifications are complete.
25. 4-H Exhibitors may appeal a Judge's decision only by alleging either that a specific and applicable Term & Condition was violated, or that the Judge's decision was improperly influenced. 4-H Exhibitors appealing a Judge's decision shall describe relevant facts and their proof (e.g., witnesses) as well as give verbal notice to Show Management within two (2) hours of the alleged infraction.
26. The 4-H Exhibitor submitting the Grievance Form shall use the Due Process procedure below to appeal.

Grievance Procedure

27. Within twenty-four (24) hours of observing any suspected infraction, 4-H Exhibitors competing in a 4-H competition shall personally present a Grievance Form (found <https://www.indianastatefair.com/p/state-fair/competitions--contests/livestock-information>) to the State Fair Entry Office. No other persons have standing to present a Grievance Form.
28. If a Grievance Form is presented after judging for a competition has begun, the judging shall proceed, and the Grievance Form will be considered following the judging.
29. Within 30 days of receiving the Grievance Form, Show Management shall notify the 4-H Exhibitor in writing of their validity determination and/or denial reasoning along with any actions taken as a result.
30. The 4-H Exhibitor submitting the Grievance Form shall use the Due Process procedure below to appeal.

Determination and Interpretation Principles

31. The Indiana State Fair Board and Show Management:
 - a. Shall act to ensure integrity in all 4-H Competitions and penalize Terms & Conditions violations, fraud, deception, and improper/unethical activities,
 - b. Have the final authority to interpret all Terms & Conditions and make determinations at their discretion,
 - c. May resolve any unforeseen matters in their sole discretion, and
 - d. May amend or add to these Terms & Conditions and/or withdraw all premium offerings in any Departments should they determine that an emergency exists and/or circumstances require such action.

Indiana State Fair Board Due Process, Determinations, Penalties and Appeals

32. The Indiana State Fair Commission is the final authority for all actions relating to programs funded through it.
33. When a Term & Condition violation is reported, Show Management shall investigate and determine whether a violation has occurred and either may seek assistance, guidance, and vet any questions via the Indiana State Fair Board or the Indiana State Fair 4-H Animal Testing Program Advisory Committee.
34. Upon determining a Term & Condition violation has occurred, Show Management may adjust, amend or impose a penalty, sanction, disqualify, ban from future competition, assign alternative penalties or dismiss from violation any exhibitor or project determined to be in violation. These determination decisions may extend to a 4-H Exhibitor's immediate family. No action of the family or exhibitor shall affect the timeline or process for the appeal under Ind Code 4-21.5-3 et. Seq. (the Administrative Orders and Procedures Act, AOPA)
35. 4-H Exhibitors whose animal exhibit tests positive for any substance in violation of General Term and Condition 8a shall be subject to the following penalties:
 - a. First Offense
 - i. Disqualification of that animal exhibit from the Indiana State Fair,
 - ii. Forfeiture of all entry and other fees associated with that animal exhibit,
 - iii. Forfeiture of all monetary awards associated with that animal exhibit,
 - iv. Forfeiture from the animal exhibit being awarded 4-H Champion Award.
 - b. Second Offense
 - i. Disqualification of the exhibitor from the Indiana State Fair,
 - ii. Forfeiture of all entry and other fees associated with the exhibitor,
 - iii. Forfeiture of all monetary awards associated with the exhibitor,
 - iv. Forfeiture from the exhibitor being awarded 4-H Champion Award, and
 - v. Ban from competing in the Indiana State Fair for the following year.
 - c. Third Offense
 - i. Disqualification of the exhibitor from the Indiana State Fair,

- ii. Forfeiture of all entry and other fees associated with the exhibitor,
 - iii. Forfeiture of all monetary awards associated with the exhibitor,
 - iv. Forfeiture from the exhibitor being awarded 4-H Champion Award, and
 - v. Lifetime ban from exhibiting at the Indiana State Fair.
- 36. 4-H Exhibitors whose animal exhibit test positive for any substance or are determined to be in violation of General Term and Condition 8b, 8c, or 8d or is determined to have been fitted unethically in violation of General Term and Conditions 7a-7e shall be subject to the following penalties:
 - a. First Offense
 - i. Disqualification of the exhibitor from exhibiting at the Indiana State Fair,
 - ii. Forfeiture of all entry and other fees associated with the exhibitor,
 - iii. Forfeiture of all monetary awards associated with the exhibitor,
 - iv. Forfeiture from the exhibitor being awarded 4-H Champion Award,
 - v. Ban from competing in the Indiana State Fair for the following 2 years, and
 - vi. Forfeiture of any proceeds from an animal exhibit awarded premiums from the Indiana State Fair Celebration of Champions (the Indiana State Fair Board shall withhold proceeds and shall donate the entire sum to the Indiana State Fair Foundation).
 - b. Second Offense
 - i. Disqualification of the exhibitor from the Indiana State Fair,
 - ii. Forfeiture of all entry and other fees associated with the exhibitor,
 - iii. Forfeiture of all monetary awards associated with the exhibitor,
 - iv. Forfeiture from the exhibitor being awarded 4-H Champion Award,
 - v. Forfeiture of any proceeds from an animal exhibit awarded premiums from the Indiana State Fair Celebration of Champions (the Indiana State Fair Board shall withhold proceeds and shall donate the entire sum to the Indiana State Fair Foundation), and
 - vi. Lifetime ban from exhibiting at the Indiana State Fair.
- 37. Show Management reserves the right to assess additional penalties beyond those listed.
- 38. The Indiana State Fair Board may notify the International Association of Fairs and Expositions and the North American Livestock Stock Show and Rodeo Managers Association (NALSRMA) of any decision related to their National Code of Show Ring Ethics including but not limited to addition to the NALSRAMA Rule Infraction Database (RID) List.
- 39. The Indiana State Fair Board may be required to notify the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and/or the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) of any finding that violates applicable regulations.
- 40. Within 15 days of the violation determination Show Management shall notify the 4-H Exhibitor in writing of the violation determination and imposed penalty. For violations not involving 8a or 8b the exhibitor may appeal the decision in writing to the Indiana State Fair Board within 15 days of the determination of a violation. Within 15 days of receipt of the written Show Management may rescind their initial determination.
- 41. The 4-H Exhibitor receiving a violation determination and/or imposed penalty may request an appeal hearing within 18 days of the initial violation determination. Requests for an appeal hearing must be sent to the State of Indiana Office of Administrative Law Proceedings (OALP) by submitting a petition for review. To submit a request, go online to <https://www.in.gov/oalp/>, select that you are an individual filing for a petition for review. Then:
 - a. Fill out the online form via the link at the bottom of the page (you will be asked to upload a copy of the violation determination);
 - b. Download a paper copy of the request form and mail it to OALP; or
 - c. Personally appear at OALP's office located at 100 N. Senate Avenue N802, Indianapolis, IN 46204.
- 42. OALP shall appoint an Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) to conduct an appeal hearing. The ALJ shall issue an order to parties setting a date for the appeal hearing.
- 43. OALP's assigned ALJ shall issue a final order concluding the Administrative Review.
- 44. Either party wishing to appeal the ALJ's final order may file for judicial review of the order. Any judicial review shall take place in a competent court situated in Marion County, Indiana.

4-H Determinations

- 45. Independently, the Director of the Purdue Cooperative Extension or his/her designee may assess penalties under 4-H Policies and is the final authority for all actions pertaining to the statewide policies and programs of Indiana 4-H, including but not limited to eligibility determinations for competitions

Premises ID

- 46. The Indiana State Fair requires all Indiana Exhibitors to provide the Indiana State Board of Animal Health required Premises ID number on all entry forms for beef and dairy cattle, goats, swine and sheep. Indiana exhibitors of horses, poultry, llamas and alpacas as well as out of state exhibitors will be requested to voluntarily provide Premises ID numbers. To obtain a Premises ID #, please contact the Indiana State Board of Animal Health at 877-747-3038. Information can be found on the Indiana State Board of Animal Health website at www.in.gov/boah.

4-H Substitute Showman

47. 4-H exhibitors having an entry in animal classes at the State Fair are expected to show their own animals. In cases where this cannot be done, the owner may request another Indiana 4-H member to serve as a substitute showman. Substitute showmen must be approved in writing by the 4-H show manager, 24 hours prior to showing of the animal(s) needing a substitute showman. Requests will only be granted for medical emergencies, conflicts with showing other animals, or circumstances deemed unavoidable by the 4-H show manager. Failure to be excused from a job and/or participation in a non-4-H-related creative arts or sporting event or practice will not result in a substitute showman being granted.

Supreme 4-H Livestock Showmanship

48. The champion and reserve champion senior beef showmen, champion senior barrow showman, champion senior gilt showman, the champion senior market lamb showman and champion senior breeding ewe showman, champion senior meat goat wether & wether dam showman and the champion senior meat goat breeding doe showman will compete for the title of Supreme 4-H Livestock Showman. The winner will be declared the Indiana State Fair Supreme 4-H Livestock Showman and will receive a \$500 award. Once a 4-H member is declared the Indiana State Fair Supreme 4-H Livestock Showman, they will become ineligible to compete in 4-H beef, sheep, and swine showmanship classes at the Indiana State Fair in future years.

4-H Grand & Supreme Drive

49. Should a champion animal become ill/injured or be determined to be unsound and unable to participate in either the Grand or Supreme Drive, the reserve animal of that breed will represent the breed. The Department Superintendent shall inform the judge of the situation prior to judging the Grand/Supreme Champion. The reserve breed champion from the same breed as the Grand Champion is eligible to be selected for the ISF Celebration of Champions.
50. Once a market animal is selected for the Celebration of Champions it cannot be withdrawn and will undergo testing and harvest.
51. All 4-H Celebration of Champions market animals will be transported by the State Fair or designee to the processing harvest site.
52. All 4-H Celebration of Champions market animal carcasses will remain under the jurisdiction and ownership of the State Fair until such time as all carcass examinations, tissue testing, and/or any other required testing as determined by the Show Management or State 4-H Youth Development officials have been completed.
53. Monetary awards will not be issued until test results are complete.

Indiana State Fair Celebration of Champions

62. The 2023 Indiana State Fair Celebration of Champions will honor the top five in 4-H market lambs, barrows, beef steers, the Grand Champion Dairy Steer, the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Meat Goat Wether, the Grand Champion 4-H Commercial Waterfowl, the Grand Champion 4-H Meat Pen of Rabbits, and the Grand Champion 4-H Meat Type Chickens, 4-H Grand Champion Dairy Goat Wether as market projects.
63. The 2023 Indiana State Fair Celebration of Champions will also honor the 4-H Supreme Champion and Reserve Supreme Champion Beef Heifers, 4-H Supreme Champion and Reserve Supreme Champion Gilts, 4-H Supreme Champion and Reserve Supreme Champion Ewes, 4-H Supreme Champion and Reserve Supreme Champion Dairy Cows, 4-H Supreme Champion and Reserve Supreme Champion Dairy Heifers, 4-H Supreme Champion Full Blood & Supreme Champion Percentage Meat Goat Does, 4-H Grand Champion Meat Goat Wether Dam, 4-H Supreme Champion Sr. & Supreme Champion Jr. Dairy Goat Does, 4-H Best Exhibition in Show Poultry and 4-H Best of Show Rabbits as non-market/breeding projects.
64. An exhibitor may only receive one Celebration award per project category (Market and Non-Market), however if an exhibitor is selected for multiple Celebration awards outlined in rules # 62 and # 63 in a Market and Non-Market/Breeding project category they may receive two Celebration awards, one per project category (market and non-market). Exhibitors selected for multiple Celebration honors will automatically receive the largest Celebration award per project category (Market & Non-Market/Breeding).
65. The Youth Development and Fundraising Committee reserves the right to eliminate any 4-H animals from the ISF Celebration of Champions which it deems to not be in the best interest of the Indiana State Fair.
66. The Indiana State Fair Celebration of Champions Award total monetary amount includes premiums and accomplishment award for all participants, and market value price for market animals. Total monetary award amount is based on a formula. Awards will not be given to exhibitors until testing results are complete.
67. With regard to ISF Celebration of Champions animals, it is understood that the market animals awarded upon showing and/or processing will have urine, blood, saliva and/or tissue samples taken per the mandatory testing under 4-H General Terms & Conditions and the animal may be examined by a panel of licensed and accredited veterinarians. Upon said examination, if in the opinion of the examiners, the animal has been fitted in an unethical manner or tampered with, the animal will be disqualified from the ISF Celebration of Champions, all premiums and awards forfeited, and the award proceeds will be withheld by the Indiana State Fair Board and donated to the Indiana State Fair Foundation.
68. Exhibitors of reserve 4-H breed champion market animals not selected for Celebration of Champions must take their animal home.
69. The ownership of a market animal or an exhibit receiving an ISF Celebration of Champion award is maintained by

the exhibitor until the conclusion of Grand Drive, Sunday, August 7. The animal or exhibit must be on display until the Transfer of Ownership is signed over to the Indiana State Fair.

Recognized 4-H Breed Participation Policy

70. **Recognized Breed Participation/All Other Purebreds:** Indiana State Fair recognized breeds (those listed in the current 4-H entry book) are required to have a minimum of five (5) market animals and/or five (5) breeding animals in order to offer breed/gender classes. ISF recognized breeds (those listed in the 4-H entry book) that have fewer than five (5) market and/or breeding animals will show in an AOP (ALL OTHER PUREBRED) class. Regardless of the number of animals in the AOP class, premiums will be offered for AOP division. Champion of the AOP division would be eligible for overall champion. Purebred or composite breeds NOT recognized by the Indiana State Fair 4-H Entry Book will be considered for commercial/crossbred classifications and not be considered for AOP classification. This five (5) head minimum does not apply to exhibition breeds during their two (2) year establishment trail, see 4-H General Terms & Conditions for more information about exhibition breeds.

Establishing New 4-H Breeds In Competition

71. The Indiana State Fair must approve a state-affiliate breed association application for a breed show. For proposed 4-H breeds showing for the first time at Indiana State Fair the breed must show for two years and have a minimum of 10 head exhibited in either proposed breed/gender classification. During these two years, the breed will be classified as exhibition only with NO premiums remitted (includes any special program premiums i.e. Indiana Bred). This rule does not apply to any Poultry or Rabbit exhibits.
72. To place an established breed of livestock on probation the following shall apply:
- 4-H Breeds will not be placed on probation but rather if minimums are not met exhibited in AOP division.
 - The same entry fees shall be paid by all livestock exhibitors regardless of show classification.
73. The Indiana State Fair reserves the right make, amend and change any and/or all final breed participation policy determinations based on both exhibitor and entry numbers.
74. For the purposes of this rule, Breed shall mean purebred breeds, composite breeds, division, varieties, classifications, etc. This rule does not apply to any Poultry or Rabbit exhibits.

Loss or Damage

75. It is mutually agreed that the Indiana State Fair assumes no liability for loss to property or by reason of any claim for personal injury, including death. The exhibitor herein agrees to release, discharge and indemnify the State of Indiana, Indiana State Fair Board, Indiana State Fair Commission, its component members, and their successors from liability by reason of injury to property and/or persons, including death, which may occur within or upon the premises herein described in any manner connected with use thereof by exhibitor.

NSF Checks

76. A \$35.00 handling charge will be added to all checks returned as non-sufficient funds (NSF).
77. Any exhibitor not redeeming a non-sufficient funds check will be ineligible to show and/or forfeit all premiums and awards won.
78. An exhibitor with any NSF checks not redeemed by the entry deadline(s) will be assessed all applicable late fees.
79. NSF checks are not re-deposited.

Premiums

80. **Premium Checks will be mailed in October for all departments.**
81. Premiums will be paid according to official judging result sheets.
82. Any exhibitor receiving \$600.00 or more in monetary awards will be required to provide the Indiana State Fair with a completed IRS Form W-9 (W-8BEN for foreign exhibitors) providing a taxpayer identification number. Failure to provide this information will result in the forfeiture of all premium monies. Forms may be obtained at the Barn Offices, at the Entry Office in the Pop Weaver Youth Pavilion or on the IRS website at www.irs.gov.
83. Questions and/or discrepancies noted in issued premium checks must be addressed to the Indiana State Fair Entry Department prior to **December 1, 2023** for resolution. Premium records will be considered closed on December 1, 2023. After this date the exhibitor's right of protest is relinquished.

INDIANA STATE FAIR Safety Information

All emergencies, safety concerns and suspicious activity should be reported immediately to the Indiana State Fair Operations Center at (317) 927-7520.

Prohibited Items

- No alcoholic beverages may be brought on to the Fairgrounds during the annual Indiana State Fair.
- No person in possession of a deadly weapon shall be permitted onto or be permitted to remain on the Fairgrounds, unless that person can demonstrate that the deadly weapon is intended for sale or trade at an event that is taking place on the Fairgrounds (Indiana Administrative Code, Title 80, Section 11-2-2(b)).
 - The definition of a deadly weapon includes firearms, knives or sharp bladed items (regardless of blade length), or any object carried or possessed with the intent to be used as a deadly weapon.
 - Exhibitors will be permitted to carry and use knives and other tools necessary for the proper care of their animals, tack, and equipment. However, these items may only be carried within the confines of the barn in which the animal(s) is housed. Knives and other tools carried outside of the barn are subject to confiscation under the deadly weapon rules found in the Indiana Administrative Code, Title 80, Section 11-2-2.
- Any deadly weapon found in the possession of a person while on the Fairgrounds is subject to immediate confiscation by persons authorized to provide security protection services as well as city, county, and state police agencies. Federal, state, or local law enforcement officers or those employed or authorized by the Indiana State Fair Commission are excepted from this rule (Indiana Administrative Code, Title 80, Section 11-2-2 (a), (c), and Section 11-2-3 (1) and (2)).
- Any person properly licensed to carry a firearm must secure the firearm in a locked compartment of his/her vehicle and it shall not be visible to passersby (Indiana Administrative Code, Title 80, Section 11-2-2(d)).
- No generators (not attached to a working/in transit RV/trailer/living quarters) or animal scales are permitted on the Fairgrounds except those furnished by the State Fair.

Animal Policies & Procedures

- The only animals permitted on the Fairgrounds during the Indiana State Fair are animals registered, boarded or entered for exhibition, show or other competition; animals that will be used in a scheduled performance or to perform work at the Fair; law enforcement animals and service animals. Household and family pets, whether domestic or wild, and service animals not recognized by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Section 36.104 are not permitted on the Fairgrounds during the Indiana State Fair. No person in possession of or having control over an unauthorized animal shall be permitted onto or be permitted to remain on the Fairgrounds (Indiana Administrative Code, Title 80, Section 11-2-4).
- Animals entered for exhibition, show or competition and animals scheduled to perform must remain in approved areas at all times. Violation may be disqualifiable offenses. See individual department terms and conditions for more specific information.

General Safety Policies & Procedures

- Smoking is not permitted inside barns and buildings. Smoking is only permitted in designated areas on the Fairgrounds.
- Cameras are located throughout the Fairgrounds for security and promotional purposes.
- Motorized vehicles, including golf carts, are not permitted in any barns or buildings (IFC 313.1). This does not apply to personal mobility devices. A valid State issued driver's license is required to operate a motorized vehicle including a golf cart on the Fairgrounds.
- Fans are permitted, so long as they have safety-approved shrouds. See individual department requirements pertaining to size, allowable number, and placement of fans.

Tents, Canopies, & Stall Coverings

- Any tent, canopy, or stall covering in a building must be made of a material to allow for or not block water distribution as well as meet or exceed NFPA Standard 701.
- A portable fire extinguisher must be located under each tent, canopy, or covering.

Fire Safety

- The Indiana State Fire Marshal's Office conducts regular inspections of all barns and buildings during the Indiana State Fair to identify any potential fire hazards or threats to life safety. The decisions of the fire marshal are final and will be enforced.
- Fire extinguishers are located throughout every barn and building. They may be used for approved purposes only. Do not use a fire extinguisher if you are not trained on its proper use.
- Most buildings and barns are equipped with fire alarm and/or fire suppression systems. In the event of a fire, these systems should be activated.
- Emergency exits are clearly marked in all barns and buildings. In the event of an emergency, calmly evacuate through the nearest accessible emergency exit.
- Do not store tack/supplies in primary aisle or in front of exit doors.

Severe Weather

- In the event of severe weather impacting the Fairgrounds, be it a severe thunderstorm or tornado, you may receive instructions over the barn or building public address system. If the barn or building is not equipped with a public-address system, State Fair staff will notify people in person.
- During a severe weather situation, you will be asked to remain inside, away from windows and doors whenever possible. Staff may be instructed to close all doors and windows, including overhead doors.
- Larger barns and buildings will be used for shelter-in-place (points of refuge) to allow Fairgoers to seek shelter. This may cause an influx of people into livestock areas and result in the postponement of a show or exhibition.

Exhibitors should be mindful of this, keep aisles and walkways clear, and tend to their animals accordingly.

Food Preparation/Cooking Policies & Procedures

- Cooking inside and adjacent to barns and buildings is not advised. The Indiana State Fair Biosecurity plan recommends that food be excluded from animal areas. If cooking and/or food preparation is necessary, the following policies and procedures must be followed:
 - Cooking devices that use open flames, including charcoal and gas grills, exposed heating elements and non-electric power/ fuel sources are not permitted inside or outside barns or buildings.
 - Approved cooking devices are limited to crockpots, or similar slow cookers, and microwave ovens. Cooking devices must have a cover approved for use with the device and comply with all applicable electrical and fire codes. Cooking devices are also required to be powered by approved cords that are not frayed or malfunctioning in any way.
 - Exhibitors cooking in the barns and buildings do so at their own risk and assume all liability for their actions concerning food contamination from pathogens that may be present in or near a livestock area.

Extension Cords

- Extension Cords shall not be a substitute for permanent wiring. IFC 2012 (605.4.1)
- Extension Cords shall not be affixed to structures. IFC 2012 (605.5)
- Extension Cords shall not extend through walls, ceilings, doorways, or floors. IFC 2012 (605.5)
- Extension Cords shall not be buried under carpet or animal bedding.

Multi-plug Adapter/Power Strip

- Multi-plug adapter(s) are prohibited. IFC 2012 (605.4)
- Power strip(s) shall be grounded and be equipped with overcurrent protection. IFC 2012 (605.4.1)
- Power strip shall be directly connected to an electrical outlet (no piggy-backing). IFC 2012 (605.4.2)
- Power strip cords shall not extend through walls, ceilings, doorways, or floors. IFC 2012 (605.4.3)

Animal Wellness & Care

The Animal Wellness & Care Plan (AWAC) was established to reinforce the Indiana State Fair's commitment and belief in the proper treatment of all animals in exhibition. The Indiana State Fair holds exhibitors of the various species of animals being exhibited to the highest standards in wellness, care and ethics of exhibition. The AWAC is responsible for ensuring the most up to date standards as well as to be a source for the public to seek answers to their questions relating to the health and safety of the animals involved in the Indiana State Fair. Failure or refusal by an exhibitor or fairgoer to comply with the Animal Wellness & Care Plan can result in penalties up to and including but not limited to removal and a ban from the Fairgrounds for the duration of the event.

Biosecurity

The Indiana State Fair Biosecurity Plan was developed to prevent the outbreak of diseases carried by both animals and humans that spread pathogens that can be transmitted to and from farm animals, as well as through the food supply. Many diseases and pathogens can be prevented through maintaining the cleanliness of facilities and encouraging good hygiene. The Biosecurity Plan will be enforced during the Indiana State Fair and all exhibitors are expected to carryout and preform basic biosecurity and hygienic task including:

- Hand Washing/sanitizing following exposure to animals and always before consuming food or drinks
- Excluding human food and food preparation from animal areas
- Maintaining general cleanliness of animals and animal areas
- Properly disposing of animal waste/soiled bedding in properly identified/designated areas
- Cleaning-up after your animal if it soils/has a biological event in a building/Fair common space
- Reporting the appearance or evidence of animal/human sickness or distress to Fair officials

Failure or refusal to comply with the above can result in penalties up to and including but not limited to removal and a ban from the Fairgrounds for the duration of the event.

The Indiana State Fair is committed to providing opportunities for all 4-H participants to show their animals as part of the State Fair. The State Fair also wants to ensure the integrity of its 4-H competitions as is evidenced by the various terms and conditions set forth in this Entry Book, including its policy with respect to testing for unauthorized substances in certain animals that are entered into these competitions and the penalties associated with positive results. By entering into these competitions, you agree to these terms and conditions and as such, we strongly recommend that you read this information carefully prior to submitting your entry.

EXHIBITOR INFORMATION

Fairgrounds Admission

- General admission, adults — \$14
- Children, five (5) years old and under, accompanied by an adult - FREE
- General Parking on Fairgrounds \$10.00 per day (when available) during the Indiana State Fair.

Entry Information

- Online Entry - <https://exhibitorscorner.indianastatefair.com/>. Online entry requires credit card payment (accepting Visa, MasterCard, Discover, American Express).
- Entry Forms - Indiana State Fair entries will not be processed without complete information, proper signatures and appropriate payment. Make sure that all of the information requested is completed correctly. Double check your total fee to make sure your check or money order is correct and enclosed. Previous year's entry forms will not be accepted. Mail in entry forms must be postmarked before or on the deadline day to receive the lower fees, even if deadline day falls on a weekend day or holiday.
- Entry Deadline - Please refer to individual departments for entry deadlines.
- Entry Fees - Please see individual departments for entry fees.
- Refunds - Entry Fees, late fees, processing fees, overpayments and any additional fees will not be refunded. If one check pays for more than one 4-H member's entries and any entry is incorrect, the correct entries will be processed, and the check will be deposited. The fees for the incorrect entries will be considered an overpayment on the correct entries. The incorrect entries will be returned to the exhibitor. After correction, the entries must be returned with entry fee as directed by the Entry Department and will be subject to applicable late fees.
- Entry Revisions - Substitutions may be made within the same section, unless stated otherwise in departmental terms and conditions, provided the same number of entries is maintained as was entered on the original entry form, (i.e., If eight (8) exhibits are on the original entry form, you are limited to 8 entries, without paying additional fees). If a new section is entered, this is a new entry with all applicable fees. Any exhibit entered on an original entry form may be added any class for which it is eligible. Classes designated as group classes (containing more than one animal) can be entered without additional fees, provided the animals in the group are entered in individual classes.
- Check-in Entries - Entries will be accepted at Check-in, unless otherwise stated in departmental deadlines, however, there will be additional late fee(s).
- All 4-H animal exhibitors must be officially enrolled at the county level and subject to verification of county enrollment to be eligible to exhibit at the Indiana State Fair.
- 4-H animals do not need to be county winners to qualify as a State Fair entry; however, exhibitors must have satisfactorily fulfilled the county requirements.
- No livestock will be released until all fees, including those for veterinary services, have been paid in full.
- Advertising - Commercial advertisement, names or insignia, farm names and family names on 4-H exhibitors or exhibits while showing is prohibited. An exception is made for 4-H Rabbit Exhibitors due to safety concerns (see individual department terms and conditions). Distribution or posting of flyers, advertisements, banners or posters are prohibited from being hung in the Barns or Coliseum, Youth Arena or any other building, except for those in preapproved areas as directed by a Commission Department Manager.

Exhibitor Admission

- Exhibitor Tickets - \$10.00 Tickets can be purchased online on Exhibitor's Corner account.
- All exhibitors entering the Fairgrounds or picking up exhibits on or after Friday, July 28, 2023, are required to pay admission and parking or have an exhibitor ticket and parking pass to give to the gate attendant or to be scanned.
- Pass Outs - Any exhibitor leaving the Fairgrounds that wishes to return on the same day must obtain a hand stamp from the gate attendant or pay admission to re-enter. This policy will be strictly enforced. Pass outs are not permitted after 8pm.

Assignment Of Stalls

- Assignment of stalls will be made and enforced by department personnel.
- Alteration or removal of stall or pen structures - Exhibitors are required to notify and obtain approval from department personnel to alter any assigned stall(s) or pen structure(s), or any part thereof. If an Exhibitor does not seek and obtain such approval, the Exhibitor shall indemnify and hold harmless the Indiana State Fair Board and the Indiana State Fair Commission for any damage to person or property that results from such alteration or removal and penalties may be imposed on the exhibitor. The Indiana State Fair reserves the right to alter, move or revoke stalls on an as needed basis.
- Feed and Bedding of good quality will be available for exhibitors to purchase at reasonable prices. The Indiana State Fair will not furnish these items. The selling of feed or bedding is strictly prohibited, with the exception of the approved Indiana State Fair vendor.

Schedules

- Arrival/Check-in/Show Schedules – Please see individual departments for arrival/check-in/show times.
- Exhibitors and animals must arrive before the end of their scheduled check-in time, if animals are entered in another Fair, they may arrive later than the specified arrival time. The Department Superintendent must be notified of this in advance and the Department Superintendent reserves the right to deny entry to any exhibitors and animals that fail to pre-notify.

Loss Or Damage

- It is mutually agreed that the Indiana State Fair assumes no liability for any loss of property or any claim for personal injury, including death. The exhibitor herein agrees to release, discharge and indemnify the Indiana State Fair, its component members, and their successors from liability by reason of injury to property and/or persons, including death, which may occur within or upon the premises herein described in any manner connected with use thereof by exhibitor.

Campgrounds Terms & Conditions

- Spaces in the Indiana State Fair 46th Street Campgrounds are reserved on a first come-first served basis. The charge for a camping spot is \$45.00 per day plus 7% sales tax and a one-time per reservation fee of \$2.50.
- Reservations are **required** and are made on our website <https://www.indianastatefair.com/state-fair/camping-information/>. To reserve a spot, full payment is required in advance, and payment will be taken at the point of reservation.
- **Check-in time is after 1:00pm**
- **Check-out time is NOON**
- These terms and conditions apply to the 46th Street campground located south of 46th Street.
 - Campers will select their site when making their reservation based on their trailer length and electrical needs.
 - All campers should come prepared with 15' of water and sewer hose and 15' of electrical cord to reach connections.
 - Reservations are for the sleeping unit only. Reservation of a camping site **does not** guarantee enough room to park any vehicles in the camp site. All vehicles should be parked in the 46th Street parking lot adjacent to the camping area. All other vehicles, livestock trailers, etc. must park in designated areas.
 - Any vehicle in violation of this condition will be towed at the owner's expense.
- Primitive camping is available at the Motel Lot (south of 38th Street) on a first come first served basis for \$15 a night. No reservations taken or needed. Generators are allowed in the Motel Lot only. Trucks and trailers **only**. No single vehicles.
- We will open the campground for reservations on **May 1, 2023**.
- Camping availability will sell out! Please make sure to book your reservations early to ensure availability.

INDIANA 4-H PROGRAM PHILOSOPHY AND EXPECTATIONS

The Indiana 4-H Youth Development program serves the youth of Indiana by providing a strong educational youth development program. This program delivers educational experiences in a variety of settings. Caring, capable and contributing adults assist in the 4-H program as role models for youth. The rich heritage of the 4-H Program is one to be valued and passed along to future generations. The Indiana 4-H Youth Policies and Procedures Handbook includes certain standards and guidelines to assure that 4-H is a positive youth development program. County 4-H policy is guided by the county 4-H policy making or governing board (i.e., 4-H Council) as provided by the County Extension Board. Legal authority for the 4-H Program rests with the Director of the Cooperative Extension Service at Purdue University. No county 4-H policy may conflict with state 4-H policy or with federal guidelines and requirements. Deadlines for county and state participation should be carefully constructed so as to encourage rather than to discourage participation. Such deadlines should be well published. Members not complying with established and published dates and deadlines for exhibition may be denied the opportunity to exhibit. It is the policy of 4-H to be an inclusive organization. No county policy or practice should be used to arbitrarily exclude youth from either membership or participation. Youth should participate in 4-H Youth Development opportunities at levels and times that best suit the youth's development.

Per state and federal guidelines, volunteers and Extension Educators may not require youth to attend 4-H club meetings in order to complete 4-H or exhibit their work.

4-H MEMBERSHIP:

Youth may become 4-H members when they enter the third grade and may continue their membership through the completion of grade 12. Each individual may continue membership for a maximum of ten (10) consecutive years. An

individual's 4-H grade is determined by the school grade in which he or she is classified at the time of year he or she enrolls in 4-H. A member does not advance in 4-H grade until he or she enrolls in 4-H for the subsequent year. Each member should enroll in the division of a project/subject that would best suit his/her interest and potential for personal growth and would enhance their family involvement. Opportunities in the 4-H program are available to all Indiana youth as defined regardless of race, religion, color, sex, age, national origin or ancestry, marital status, parental status, sexual orientation or disability. Married young men and women of 4-H age may participate in any of the 4-H projects and activities. However, married persons must participate by the same terms and conditions and/or guidelines as unmarried participants. Membership in 4-H is gained by annually enrolling through a Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service Office located in each of Indiana's 92 counties. The Indiana 4-H Youth Development program year is October 1 to September 30 annually. Enrollment is an annual process attained by completing individual 4-H enrollment via the 4-H Online enrollment process. Statewide 4-H Online enrollment occurs annually October 1 through January 15.

COMPLETION:

The completion of a 4-H experience may include a variety of options and must not be misinterpreted solely as exhibition of a project at a local, county, or state fair. There are a number of ways that a young person may participate in the 4-H Youth Development Program in addition to the club-based option. Participating in these 4-H opportunities enable the youth to build skills that will serve them well throughout their adult lives. Some of these participation options do not include the preparation of a specific exhibit by an individual that would be on display at a fair or similar event. In some cases, the youths' actual participation may be the final product that results in their completion of a year of 4-H. Some examples of this participation include working as a team to develop a robot for a workshop or challenge; completing a Spark Club experience; participating in State 4-H Band or Chorus; taking part in a science training or experiment; participating in an after school 4-H experience; etc. 4-H members are considered complete in their 4-H educational experience for the year when they have (1) completed the 4-H member enrollment process prior to the established and published date for enrolling; and (2) had an officially recognized 4-H volunteer/Extension Educator verify the existence of the completed project/subject or the member's participation in a 4-H educational experience. Additionally, 4-H members who participate in a club- or fair-based 4-H project/subject will submit a completed 4-H record sheet based on printed or web-based educational materials (used by Indiana 4-H Youth Development) prior to the established and published date. Though exhibiting in local, county, and state exhibits/fairs is not required for project completion, as it does not necessarily relate directly to content and skills learned in the development of the 4-H project, project exhibition is encouraged as a continuation of the educational experience. Extension employees and volunteers are obligated to eliminate (and should not create) any practices that limit, deprive, or tend to deprive any youth of opportunities for membership and/or participation in the Indiana 4-H program.

EXHIBITION AT THE INDIANA STATE FAIR:

Exhibition of 4-H projects in local, county or state exhibits/fairs is considered a privilege and is voluntary on the part of the exhibitor. The exhibition of 4-H projects provides 4-H members an opportunity to display their 4-H projects, enter into competition and participate in an educational/social environment with their peers. With exhibition also comes the responsibility for abiding by all of the terms and conditions pertaining to the respective 4-H project. Not following the established terms and conditions of the projects will be grounds for exclusion from the competition/exhibition or the project itself.

1. If DNA is not submitted by May 15th to the County Extension Office that animal is not eligible to show at the Indiana State Fair.(Required for: BEEF,DAIRY BEEF, DAIRY FEMALES, SWINE, SHEEP AND MEAT GOATS)
2. An exhibit may not be entered in more than one State Fair 4-H class except in some animal classes where designated. In a State Fair class requiring more than one item, all items must be exhibited by the same 4-H member. All parts of an exhibit made in one class must belong to one 4-H member.
3. All 4-H exhibits at the State Fair must be prepared during the current 4-H year. Eligibility rests solely with the State 4-H Youth Program Leader or their designee on entries in all 4-H classes.
4. Any 4-H exhibit removed from display prior to the official release will be disqualified. Any 4-H placings/prizes (including ribbons, money, medals, trophies, etc.) awarded that exhibit will be forfeited.
5. 4-H exhibitors having an entry in animal classes at State Fair are expected to show their own animals. In cases where this cannot be done, the owner may request another Indiana 4-H member to serve as a substitute showman. Substitute showmen must be approved in writing by the 4-H show manager, 24 hours prior to showing of the animal(s) needing a substitute showman. Requests will only be granted for medical emergencies, conflicts with showing other animals, or circumstances deemed unavoidable by the 4-H show manager. Failure to be excused from a job and/or participation in a non 4-H-related creative arts or sporting event or practice will not result in a substitute showman being granted.

4-H ANIMAL OWNERSHIP, POSSESSION AND EXHIBITION:

Each 4-H member shall own his/her own 4-H exhibit. Ownership must be in effect on or before the county and state ID deadlines and continuously until after the 4-H show at the County and/or State Fair.

1. For 4-H breeding animals, family corporations and/or partnerships of 4-H members with one or more parents, siblings, grandparents, aunts, uncles, or legal guardians are acceptable.
2. For 4-H dairy cattle, family corporations and/or partnerships of the 4-H member with unrelated persons or dairy operations are also acceptable.
3. Dairy heifers, horses, ponies, alpacas and llamas may be leased subject to approval of both the county 4-H dairy,

- horse and pony, or llama committee and the respective County Extension Educator. 4-H animals (horse and pony, dairy, alpacas and llamas are only eligible to be leased by a single 4-H member in a 4-H program year.
4. 4-H animals are expected to be in the personal possession and regular care of the 4-H member who owns/leases them (unless other arrangements have been agreed upon by the County 4-H Extension Educator) from the animal ID deadline until the conclusion of the County and/or State Fair.
 5. **4-H market animals and commercial animals must be individually identified and verified under the supervision of the county 4-H program at county identification events by May 15th. These species include market lambs and commercial ewes, dairy wethers, dairy feeder steers, dairy beef steers, beef steers, market and commercial heifers, meat goat wethers, and market wether dams.**
 6. 4-H animals purchased, sold, or offered for sale after the enrollment deadline and prior to the Indiana State Fair (including animals that have gone through a "Premium Only Auction"), shall not be eligible to show in the 4-H show at the Indiana State Fair. Sale of products of animals (milk, cheese, wool, etc.) in lieu of the animal, is considered equivalent to a "Premium Only Auction."
 7. 4-H animals exhibited after the May 15 State 4-H animal ID deadline at any show by anyone other than the individual whose 4-H enrollment record is connected to the ID of the animal in Indiana 4-H Online will not be eligible to be shown in the 4-H show at the Indiana State Fair. This term/condition does not apply to siblings, who may show each other's animals at any show during the year without jeopardizing State Fair eligibility. 4-H animals that are selected by 4-H Extension Staff or 4-H Adult Volunteers for use in supreme showmanship contests (Master Showmanship, Round Robin, etc.) may be used in those county events without jeopardizing State Fair eligibility. This policy applies to all 4-H animal projects. For animal projects without state ID deadlines, the person who enters them in the Indiana State Fair 4-H show is the equivalent of the owner of the animals.
 8. 4-H members showing registered beef, Boer goats, dairy, dairy goats, sheep and swine must present a registration certificate (no photocopies, carbons or fax copies, except a fax directly from the national breed association to the Indiana State Fair) to the 4-H show manager before the specified time for each specie, showing that the exhibitor owns the animal being exhibited, as per ownership terms, on or before the May 15 ID deadline and continuously until 4-H show day at the Indiana State Fair.
 9. 4-H breeding beef, boer goats, dairy goats, sheep and swine must be registered in one of the following ownership methods:
 - a. in the 4-H members' name
 - b. John Smith and Sons
 - c. John Smith, Sons and Daughters
 - d. John Smith & Family (family includes sons, daughters, and legal guardian youth only)
 - e. Mark Smith (brother) and Mary Smith (sister)
 - f. Family corporations, where the 4-H members' name appears as a holder of stock in the corporation, and proof of same must be supplied on or before the enrollment date
 - g. Family partnership where the 4-H members father, mother, brother, sister, aunt, uncle, grandparent, and/or legal guardian is also in the family partnership and the 4-H member's name appears on the legal, notarized partnership. A copy of the written document must be on file with the Extension Office before the ID deadline. A single animal can only be included in one 4-H Online family profile.
 10. 4-H breeding beef, boer goats, dairy goats, sheep and swine will NOT be accepted in the State Fair 4-H Show if they are registered in a father's name only, farm name only, or partnerships with unrelated persons (such as "Smith View", "Smith Oak", "John Doe and William Smith (4-H member)", "Long Oak and William Smith (4-H Member)", etc.).
 11. . For 4-H dairy cattle, partnerships of the 4-H member with unrelated persons or dairy operations are acceptable (i.e. John Doe and William Smith (4-H member) or Long Oak and William Smith). Dairy cows and heifers, owned in a partnership, may not be exhibited by more than one person from May 15 until the conclusion of the State Fair 4-H Dairy Show. This person must be the exhibitor of the animal in the current State Fair 4-H Dairy Show, or the animal will be ineligible for this show. 4-H dairy cattle will not be accepted in 4-H classes at the State Fair if they are registered in the father's name only or in a farm name, such as "Smith View", "Smith Oak", etc., unless the 4-H member has a certified lease agreement for this animal.
 12. The Dairy lease program is only for 4-H members who do not own their own dairy cows and/or heifers. Only dairy heifers that will be less than two years-of-age at the time of the Indiana State Fair 4-H dairy show, may be leased. Leasing a dairy heifer will be considered the equivalent of ownership. The 4-H member should be regularly involved in the care of the heifer, regardless of where the heifer is kept, and the 4-H member should have exclusive show rights to the heifer during the 4-H lease period from May 15 until the 4-H dairy show at the Indiana State Fair. Leased 4-H dairy heifers must be registered (although it is not necessary to have the registration paper transferred to the 4-H member's name) by May 15 and be properly identified in Indiana 4-H Online.
 13. . 4-H Exhibitors may receive clipping and grooming assistance from members of their immediate family (father, mother and siblings), from a current Indiana 4-H member, and from individuals in the Approved Animal Grooming Assistance Program.

13 . Temporary guardianships established for the intent of animal exhibition or grooming purposes are not permitted and shall result in immediate disqualification.

BEHAVIORAL CRITERIA:

There are many opportunities for 4-H members, volunteers, parents and the public to participate in 4-H events and activities. When involved in such experiences; members, volunteers, parents and the public are expected to follow all terms and conditions/rules and regulations as outlined by those responsible for the specific program or activity. When attending, participating or acting on behalf of the 4-H program, all persons are expected to conduct themselves in accordance with accepted standards of social behavior, respect the rights of others, and refrain from any conduct which may be injurious to the 4-H program. The following actions constitute misconduct for which persons may be subject to disciplinary consequences and/or dismissal from the program:

- (a) Dishonesty in connection with any 4-H activity by cheating or knowingly furnishing false information.
- (b) Alteration or unauthorized use of 4-H records.
- (c) Obstruction or disruption of any 4-H activity or aiding and encouraging other persons to engage in such conduct.
- (d) Failure to comply or aiding or encouraging other persons not to comply with specific terms and conditions of a given project, contest, or activity.
- (e) Failure to comply with directions of 4-H officials acting in the proper performance of their duties.
- (f) Inhumane treatment of 4-H animal projects.

There are many opportunities for 4-H members, volunteers, parents and the public to participate in 4-H events and activities. When involved in such experiences, members, volunteers, parents and the public are expected to follow all rules and regulations as outlined by those responsible for the specific program or activity. In all such 4-H activities, the following constitute a violation of behavioral expectations:

- 1. Possession or use of fire crackers, gun powder, firearms, chemicals or other materials that can be used to create an explosive mixture.
- 2. Misuse of fire equipment or sounding a false fire alarm.
- 3. Having a guest of a different gender in your sleeping quarters, or inappropriate sexual behavior.
- 4. Physical or verbal abuse of any person or conduct which threatens or endangers the health or safety of any person.
- 5. Theft of or malicious damage to property.
- 6. Possession, use, or distribution of alcohol, illegal drugs, tobacco and tobacco-like products, electronic smoking devices (including, but not limited to, e-cigs, vapes, juuls), or other dangerous substances.
- 7. Inappropriate displays of affection towards another person(s).
- 8. Distribution, misuse, or abuse of over-the-counter, homeopathic (including supplements and vitamins), or prescription medications.
- 9. Inappropriate clothing or lack of clothing during the event or activity.
- 10. Lewd, indecent, or obscene conduct or language.
- 11. Unauthorized entry, use or occupancy of any facility.
- 12. Any conduct which threatens or interferes with maintenance of appropriate order and discipline or invades the rights of others.
- 13. Unwillingness to follow appropriate health and safety procedures.
- 14. Reckless or inappropriate behavior.

When violations occur at out-of-county, district, area, state and/or national 4-H events, the following procedures will be followed. (a) The parents/legal guardians may be contacted to arrange transportation home for the violator(s) and (b) The local extension educator may be notified

Penalties: If, in the opinion of the State 4-H Program Leader or their designee, evidence of alteration, excessive outside help, unethical preparation, or misconduct is noted, the exhibit and/or 4-H member may be disqualified, all premiums and awards forfeited, or the 4-H member may be subject to a disbarment from participation in that project or other related 4-H projects, events, or activities. Enforcement may be selective which does not waive the state 4-H Youth Program's right to enforce collectively at a future date and appropriate circumstance.

- Any State Fair 4-H situation not covered by these policies shall be handled by the State 4-H Youth Program Leader or their designee as appropriate.

DUE PROCESS AND RIGHT OF APPEAL FOR VIOLATION OF STATE 4-H PROGRAMS AND POLICIES WHILE AT THE INDIANA STATE FAIR

- 1. The State 4-H Youth Program Leader, or their designee, shall notify the person in writing of the violation and the penalty imposed.
- 2. A person may appeal a decision, in writing, to the State 4-H Youth Program Leader, within 15 days of receiving written notification
- 3. Within 15 days of receipt of a written appeal, the State 4-H Youth Program Leader may rescind the initial determination. No further determination as to the reported violation may be subsequently made by the State 4-H Youth Program Leader. The person filing the appeal shall have no further remedy available upon rescission of the initial determination. In short, the case would be closed.
- 4. If the State 4-H Youth Program Leader does not rescind the initial determination within 15 days of receiving the appeal, a hearing will be set by the Director of the Purdue Cooperative Extension Service. The person filing the

- appeal shall be notified of the date in writing.
5. The Director of the Purdue Cooperative Extension Service or their designee shall conduct the hearing as the sole hearing officer.
 6. Within 15 days of the conclusion of the hearing, the hearing officer shall submit to the State 4-H Youth Program Leader, his/ her findings and recommendations with regard to the reported violation(s), penalties and the person's appeal.
 7. Upon receiving the recommendations of the hearing officer, the State 4-H Youth Program Leader shall take action upon the recommendation.
 8. Final actions will be stated in writing and provided to the person filing the appeal within 15 days of the determination by the State 4-H Youth Program Leader.
 9. Any appeal beyond this point deemed necessary by the appellant would need to be filed in a Marion County, Indiana court of law.

ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITION OF DOMESTIC ANIMALS IN INDIANA 2023

This document describes the Indiana State Board of Animal Health's (BOAH) requirements for all animal exhibitions in the state. Indiana State 4-H has imposed additional requirements as a condition of exhibition. These additional conditions are denoted with an "*" throughout this document. Please call the Indiana State 4-H Office at (765) 494-8435 with questions concerning 4-H exhibition requirements in Indiana.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES

A. Limitations on Exhibition

This section describes limitations on exhibiting animals in Indiana. Other exhibition limitations may be described in the species-specific requirements that follow.

1. Failure to meet all animal health requirements will result in removal of animals from the exhibition premises.
2. The following animals are not eligible for exhibition in Indiana:
 1. Animals that originate from a herd that is under quarantine.
 2. An animal prohibited from exhibition under any law or order.
 3. Any animal classified as a brucellosis "suspect".
 4. Animals showing signs of any infectious or communicable disease or that are a health hazard to people or other animals.
 5. Any animal that does not meet state animal health requirements.
3. Any animal that develops or shows signs of any infectious or communicable disease during exhibition must be removed from the premises, including the surrounding exhibition grounds. An owner who is disputing the exclusion of his/her animal(s) from exhibition may not exhibit the animal in question pending any appeal.
4. The State Veterinarian is authorized to make the final determination as to an animal's eligibility for exhibition. The State Veterinarian may order removal of any animal from the exhibition grounds.
5. Exhibition organizers may impose health requirements in addition to those prescribed by BOAH. Added requirements may not contradict requirements imposed by BOAH.

6. Exhibition organizers may have a licensed and accredited veterinarian review animals and animal health documentation during the exhibition.

B. Certificates of Veterinary Inspection

1. **For animals located within Indiana**, a certificate of veterinary inspection (commonly known as a “health paper”) is not required by the Indiana State 4-H Office or BOAH for exhibition.
2. **For animals located outside of Indiana**, the exhibitor must have a properly completed CVI for all animals prior to entry. This requirement applies to all domestic animals (except fish and poultry).
 - a. CVIs must be completed by a licensed and accredited veterinarian who has personally inspected the animals.
 - b. A CVI for any animal is valid for 30 days from the date it is issued by a licensed and accredited veterinarian. *NOTE: Animal(s) must be inspected by a licensed and accredited veterinarian no more than ten days prior to the date in which the CVI is issued.*
 - c. CVIs must clearly include a description of each animal including the age, sex, and breed of the animal, and the official individual identification.
 - d. CVIs must accompany the animal while on the exhibition premises.
 - i. CVI’s can be made available in their original format (i.e., digital, or physical copy).

C. Pre-Entry Movement Permit (REVISED)

Effective January 1, 2022:

1. **For swine and cattle located within Indiana**, a pre-entry movement permit is not required.
2. **For swine and cattle located outside of Indiana**, a pre-entry movement permit is not required when an electronic certificate of veterinary inspection is issued.
3. **For swine and cattle located outside of Indiana**, a pre-entry movement permit is required when a **paper** certificate of veterinary inspection is issued.
 - a. The 2023 Indiana State Fair pre-entry movement permit number is “**INSF23**” and must be noted on all **paper** certificates of veterinary inspection.

D. Indiana State Fairgrounds

1. The Federal Premises Identification Number for the Indiana State Fairgrounds that should be recorded on all associated CVIs is: **00C6T69**
2. The physical address for the Indiana State Fairgrounds that should be recorded on all associated CVIs is: **1202 E 38th St, Indianapolis, IN 46205**

E. Official Identification

All exhibition animals must be permanently and individually identified unless otherwise noted. Official ear tags are tags approved by the USDA that bear the US shield. All official identification and any additional identification devices should be recorded on the certificate of veterinary inspection.

F. Testing

1. All tests required for exhibition must be conducted at the Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory (ADDL) at Purdue University, a laboratory approved by the Indiana State Board of Animal Health, or a state or federal-approved laboratory.
2. All animals, including Indiana animals, that are to be offered for sale to out of state buyers should have the necessary testing completed prior to the sale date. The destination state should be contacted to ensure all pre-entry movement requirements are met prior to the planned movement.

DOG SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

A. SEE GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES

B. Certification*

1. All 4-H dogs must have a completed certification of vaccination for the 4-H Dog project (4-H 671).
2. The certification of vaccination must be signed by the Extension Educator, a licensed and accredited veterinarian, and must be available at check-in.
3. A veterinary check-in will be done before registration and before the 4-H dog may be benched and entered in the 4-H Dog Show.
 - a. This original form **MUST** be brought by the 4-H member to all 4-H Dog events.

C. Official Identification

1. Physical description of the individual animal
 - a. Name, age, breed, color, gender, distinctive markings, etc.

D. Testing*

1. Heartworm test (Recommended)

E. Vaccinations*

1. Vaccinations must be given at least two weeks prior to and within one year of show date.
2. Rabies (Required)
 - a. All dogs three months of age or older must be vaccinated by a licensed and accredited veterinarian in accordance with the state rabies vaccination law.
3. Distemper, Hepatitis, Parainfluenza, and Parvovirus -DHPP (Required)
4. Leptospirosis (Required)
5. Bordetella vaccine (Required)

F. Procedures*

1. Flea and tick preventative (Required)
2. Fecal parasite exam (Recommended)

3. Heartworm consultation (Recommended)

Terms & Conditions for 4-H Dogs

1. **Indiana State Fair General Terms and Conditions** - By entering exhibits at the Indiana State Fair, you agree to the Indiana State Fair General Terms and Conditions on **page 1**.
 - a. All animals must meet the official health requirements, general terms and ownership conditions located in the front of the State Fair 4-H Entry Book. Especially note terms and conditions on tampering, misrepresentation, conduct, drugs, etc. Officials reserve the right to require drug steroid testing and examination of animals entered for show.
 - b. Read official health terms and conditions, general terms and conditions and official ownership terms and conditions located in the front of the 4-H Entry Book. Pay attention to the terms and conditions on tampering, misrepresentation, conduct, drugs, pumping, forced fillings, etc. 4-Hers and parent's consent to drug and/or steroid testing as a condition for entering. Refusing tests will be cause for disqualification.
2. **Health and Safety** - All 4-H dogs must be accompanied by the 2023 4-H 671 Certificate of Completion (vaccination form), **(original only; no photo copies)** signed by a licensed, accredited veterinarian indicating the dog has been vaccinated for rabies, distemper, hepatitis, parvovirus, leptospirosis and kennel cough. Vaccinations will not be administered to dogs at the show. Dates must be included for each vaccine. All information must be completed on the vaccination certificate or the animal will be sent home. Animals that are vaccinated at home must provide an original receipt for the vaccine and attach the receipt and the label for the vaccine on the vet form; in addition to putting the date of vaccination and the name of person who administered the vaccines on the form
 - a. A copy of the Rabies Immunization Certificate provided by your veterinarian **must** accompany the 2023 4-H 671 Certificate of Completion (vaccination form) at check-in (see **page 15** of Entry Book).
 - b. A 4-H dog may not be exhibited if they are showing symptoms of any communicable disease or parasites (including ticks and fleas).
 - c. A dog displaying signs of aggression will not be allowed to show in the interest of safety to others associated with the show. Dogs that bite any official (including judges) will be disqualified from all further activities and will be sent home from the show.
 - d. 4-H members are responsible for the actions of their dogs.
 - e. The veterinarians may take each dog's temperature as part of the vet health check.
 - f. Female dogs who show signs of estrus will not be allowed to compete in the State Fair dog show. These dogs should be left at home, so they do not distract other dogs and prevent the exhibitors from being able to demonstrate their true abilities.
 - g. Decisions made by State Fair veterinarians are final.
 - h. Excessive and/or inhumane treatment of a 4-H dog by a handler and/or family member will be grounds for disqualification of the 4-H exhibitor.
 - i. As a courtesy to others, 4-H exhibitors are asked to stack their crates, and not set up exercise pens.
 - j. Aisle ways and exits shall be kept clear and open for emergency needs.
3. **Terms and Conditions for 4-H Dog Show** - If any 4-Her chooses not to follow the terms and conditions set forth by the Indiana State Fair, he/she will forfeit all awards and be immediately dismissed from the dog show. Please refer to General Terms and Conditions in the front of this Entry Book.
 - a. All exhibitors must have been enrolled by May 15 in a county 4-H dog obedience project and completed to be eligible to compete in the Indiana State Fair 4-H dog show.
 - b. All 4-H dog exhibitors must first report to vet check on Saturday. Exhibitors will receive armbands and information packets at check-in. Exhibitors will be required to present their stamped vet paper and armband on Sunday morning.
 - c. Outside of the show ring, all 4-H dogs must be on a leash or in their crate. No training (includes but not limited to any off-leash work, jumping, dumbbell use, recall) is allowed in the building. Handlers may warm up dogs in the building. This is limited to heeling on-leash, sits and downs.
 - d. In any given year, a 4-H dog must be shown at the same obedience/agility level or higher at the State Fair that the dog was entered in as a part of the county 4-H dog program. The 4-H dog leader's signature on 4-H 671

Certificate of Completion (vaccination form) is to verify the level of obedience work, showmanship, agility, and that the 4-H member completed the project level. The 4-H member may not move back to a lower class than the one they entered in previous years, with the same dog.

- e. In a given year, at the State Fair dog show, a 4-H exhibitor may show one (1) 4-H obedience trained dog and/or one (1) dog trained through the 4-H service dog program. Each dog may only be shown by one child.
- f. 4-H dogs must wear a well fitted slip, buckle, quick release, or martingale collar made of leather, fabric or chain in order to be exhibited in dog show classes. The leash must be made of fabric or leather and must be six (6) feet in length. Collar tags will not be allowed in the 4-H show. 4-H dogs being raised for the service dog programs are exempt from the collar tags. Head halters are useful training tools and are acceptable in the 4-H training program. However, the head halter is not acceptable show equipment. Pinch collars cannot be worn in the show building. Flea and tick collars cannot be worn for judging.
- g. A dog being shown in the dog project must belong to the exhibitor or to a member of the immediate family or household. Dogs may only be shown by the 4-H member, their sibling, or their parent from May 15 through the Dog Show. Exhibition by any other individual makes the dog ineligible for State Fair exhibition. Ownership is waived on 4-H dogs raised for the service dog program.
- h. The 4-H showmanship, agility, and/or 4-H drill team dog must be the same animal that was shown by the 4-H exhibitor in a State Fair obedience class. Dogs trained through 4-H for the "service dog" program are not allowed to be shown in 4-H showmanship, agility and/or 4-H drill team competition. Personal service dogs that are owner-handled may be shown in a Service Dog class in order to satisfy their obedience class requirement.
- i. Dogs that have been disqualified in their Obedience class are not eligible for exhibition in showmanship, agility, or drill team.
- j. Commercial advertisement or insignia on 4-H exhibitors is PROHIBITED during the State Fair dog show; however, the 4-H clover is permitted. 4-H dogs being raised for the service dog program are exempt.
- k. All 4-H exhibitors are required to clean up after their dog. Clean up supplies will be available at the information booth. Waste should be deposited in a trash container provided by the State Fair. Failure to clean up after your dog may result in disqualification from the dog show.
- l. The 4-H arm band number must be worn on the left arm of the exhibitor at all times.
- m. Dogs must remain within 25 feet of barn at all times. Dogs are restricted to the show building, loading and unloading zones, walking to and from the parking lot and designated practice and potty areas. Under no circumstances should dogs be in the other barns, food vending, midway, or back lots. Failure to follow this term and condition will result in immediate expulsion of the dog from the State Fairgrounds facility, and disqualification from the dog show.
- n. Decisions of the judges are final. Video cameras may be used for personal use but will not be used to dispute a judge's decision or score.
- o. All participants with disabilities will be afforded reasonable access and opportunity to participate on an equal basis with any other 4-H dog exhibitor. For disability needs, please contact the Indiana State Fair (317) 927-7500.
- p. Appropriate attire is required in all dog show classes. Exposing cleavage, bare midriff, or buttocks is inappropriate, and will be penalized. Appropriately fitted athletic shoes must be worn for obedience, agility and drill team. Refer to Drill Team and Showmanship Terms and Conditions for attire regulations specific to those events.
- q. No bait allowed in the ring or staging area except for showmanship. Having bait in those areas will be a rule violation and be scored accordingly.
- r. No schedule changes will be made after judging begins each day.
- s. Sections OB (obedience) and AG (agility) have Veteran designations for older dogs. Refer to the terms and conditions for each class to see qualifications for the veterans' designations. This designation is separate for Agility and Obedience and is for the remainder of the 4-H show career of the dog.
- t. Special problems or infractions not covered by these terms and conditions will be acted upon by representatives from the Indiana State Fair and the Purdue Cooperative Extension Service.

Entry Information

1. All entries must be made in accordance with the terms and conditions.
2. **Online Entry** - To enter the Indiana State Fair, please go to <https://exhibitorscorner.indianastatefair.com/> and enter online. Each exhibitor is required to pay an entry fee at the time of entry. An exhibitor will not be considered entered the Indiana State Fair until payment is made in full. Payment can be made online with a valid credit card. Entries will not be accepted over the phone.
3. An Unloading/Load Out permit, and 6 admission tickets will be included with the department fee. Purchasing of Parking Passes are optional and are sold separately through Exhibitor's Corner.
4. **Entry Deadlines and Fees** - see below.

- **No Entries will have a showtime scheduled after July 31st.** Entries made after July 31st will be for exhibition only.

5. **Confirmation of Entry-** A confirmation email will be sent to the email address used to sign in for the account once entries have been paid in full.
- All entries will be verified by the State Fair 4-H Dog Show Committee.
 - Changes and additional classes will be subject to the department fee, based on the date of change or entry.
 - If a 4-H member has enrolled in an incorrect class, they may show in the enrolled class for exhibition only; other classes will not be affected.
 - It is the responsibility of the 4-H member to enroll in the correct class.
 - Exhibitors should bring their receipt received in the mail or if online entry - electronic confirmation with them at the time of check-in. Confirmation of entries will not be made over the phone.

Exhibitor Packets-

6. Exhibitors will have the option to have their exhibitor packet sent to them electronically via email at no charge or have the packet mailed to them with an additional fee applied. Packets will include department information, admission tickets, unloading/load out permits, and any additional items that were purchased during time of registration. Electronic Packets (E-Packets) will be sent automatically as soon as the order has been submitted. If an exhibitor chose to have a copy of their packet mailed to them, the Indiana State Fair Entry Department will mail out the packet if the entry is made prior to July 10. Entering on July 10 or after, packets will only be mailed if there is sufficient return mail time based on the department's arrival times. If a packet cannot be sent out, payment will have to be made to get into the fair, then packets can be picked up in the Entry Office. Refunds will not be given for gate admission and/or parking fees. Packet information will be available to all exhibitors by logging into their Exhibitor's Corner account. Admission tickets, unloading/load out permits, and parking passes will be scanned when coming through a gate.
7. **Show times will be emailed one week prior to the 4-H Dog Show.**
8. **Only dogs exhibited at the Indiana State Fair are allowed at the 4-H Dog Show.**

Arrival and Parking Procedures

1. The State Fair 4-H dog show will be conducted in the West Pavilion. Exhibitors should plan to enter the Fairgrounds through Gate 1 off of 38th Street. Exhibitors will receive a permit in the mail prior to show date to enter gate 1.

Obedience

Dogs showing in obedience at the Indiana State Fair must be at least 6 months old on day of show.

Please refer to 4-H Dog Website <https://extension.purdue.edu/4h/Pages/project.aspx?proj=5> for training guides and score sheets.

Judging Procedures

1. Whenever possible, all obedience classes will be judged through a progression of rings, with the same judge passing inspection on a particular exercise for all participants.

For example, the same judge will evaluate “heel-on-leash” for all of the dogs in the same class, while another judge will evaluate “stand for examination.” On rare occasions, substitute judges may be called upon to supplement show needs.

NOTE: to reduce scent conflict, the order of the dog show for Classes 4 through 6 will be in reverse order (i.e. 6-5-4 classes).

2. Classes will start at the scheduled time, facilities permitting.
3. Judges will not wait on any exhibitor. If a 4-H member is not present when their arm band number is scheduled to go into the ring, their number will be placed at the bottom of the list. Once final score sheets have been turned in to auditing, no further exhibitors will be allowed to show in that class for a placing.
4. Score sheets from the 4-H dog show will not be released on show day. However, 4-H score sheets and comment sheets will be mailed to respective 4-H exhibitors Purdue Extension Offices for pickup.
5. Tie scores in obedience classes will be broken as follows: a) scores will be compared for each area of the obedience competition, beginning with the first exercise on the score sheet and proceeding down the sheet through the successive exercises; b) if the scores are tied in each exercise, the first exercise on the score sheet will be repeated in its entirety, in order to determine a winner.
6. A dog fouling in the ring will receive an automatic ten (10) point dock in score.
7. The high jump will be set at the same height as the 4-H dog measures at the withers rounded to the nearest multiple of two (2) inches. Minimum height is four (4) inches and the maximum height is 36 inches. (All dogs less than 7.5 inches must jump the four (4) inch minimum.) At the obedience check-in, a handler may request a 2-inch reduction in high jump height for a dog 7 years or older. The broad jump distance will be twice the high jump height. See the 4-H Obedience Guide for specific breeds that jump at reduced height and distance.
8. Obedience regulations not covered by these terms and conditions will be based on the regulations of the American Kennel Club, Inc.
9. The veterans' obedience class is for 4-H members whose dogs are at least seven (7) years-old or are physically challenged. The dog must have completed at least class 2-B in previous years. Dogs who are physically challenged must be accompanied by a letter from a veterinarian stating that the dog is unable to perform jumping and/or retrieving exercises. A dog may not be shown in any other obedience class at the Indiana State Fair 4-H Dog Show, once they have competed in the Veteran's Class.
10. 4-H dog exhibitors will receive a participation ribbon. Honorable mention ribbons will be awarded to non-placed entries when deemed appropriate in classes 5A, 5B, 6A and 6B

Service Dogs

- Exhibitors are to bring a copy of identification from their Service Dog group that shows the date the exhibitor was designated a Service Dog raiser for their current State Fair entry.
- Dogs trained through 4-H for a Service Dog program are not allowed to be shown in 4-H showmanship, agility and/or 4-H drill team competition. Personal service dogs that are owner-handled may be shown in a Service Dog class in order to satisfy their obedience class requirement.
- 4-H dogs being raised for a Service Dog program may wear their identification collar tags and/or insignia.

Drill Team Terms and Conditions

- Terms and Conditions for County Entries** - For State Fair competition, a drill team shall only consist of 4-H exhibitors, their dogs, and 4-H obedience and/or showmanship equipment.
 - Handler and dog equal one (1) unit.
 - Teams must have a minimum of four (4) units and a maximum of 20 units. A 4-H member may participate on only one (1) drill team in any given year.
 - A club may enter a total of two (2) drill teams.
 - All members of the drill team must be accompanied by their 4-H obedience dog while performing in the drill team ring.
 - Only regulation obedience and/or showmanship equipment (no props) will be allowed for use with the dogs in either drill team class. Six-foot leads must be used for on-lead exercises and may be used for all exercises. It is not necessary to switch to a showmanship lead to perform a showmanship exercise within the routine.
 - Each drill team will be allowed two (2) minutes prior to the start of their performance to set up equipment. An additional two (2) minutes will be allowed at the end of the performance for removal of equipment.
 - For both set up and removal of equipment, each ten (10) seconds over the two (2) minute time limit will result in a loss of five (5) points.
 - Performance time will be up to five (5) minutes, with each ten (10) seconds over five (5) minutes reducing the score by five (5) points.
 - Drill teams will be limited to a performance area that is 40 feet wide and 80 feet long.
 - Teams shall enter at one end of the show area and exit at the opposite end.
 - Whistles and music are optional.
 - Bait cannot be used in drill team competition or staging area.
 - Tie scores in drill team will be broken by the judge(s).
 - A dog fouling in the ring will receive an automatic ten (10) point dock in score.
- Drill Team** - Drill teams must be pre-entered. The county drill coach or 4-H leader must send a letter stating the division, all team members' names and the name and contact information for an approved drill team judge being provided by the county, to Sue Pfrank at isfdrillteam@gmail.com. **Deadline is July 1.** Emails must be received by 11:59pm on July 1. If a county drill team enters after the deadline, there will be a 10 point deduction from their team score. No entries will be made after July 31. All drill team members must be entered and show in obedience. Substitutions will be allowed if AG (agility) or OB (obedience) showing conflicts with Drill Team time. Drill Team time will not be changed, unless approved by Show Manager. Each county entering a drill team must provide an available and approved judge they believe can judge the event.

NOTE: Commercial advertisement is not permitted on 4-H exhibitors, handlers, or dogs. Fringe, glitter, sequins and other decorations are not acceptable on the clothing of 4-H drill team members. Accessories such as: hats, gloves, and purses are also unacceptable for 4-H drill team members. Drill teams must abide by the printed "terms and conditions for the 4-H dog show."

- Coordinated outfits that are intended to identify 4-H handlers as members of a specific group are acceptable.

- b. All clothing or accessories that comply with the standards established for exhibitors showing in the 4-H dog obedience and/or showmanship classes may be worn.
- c. Insignia and logos such as "County Drill Team" or specific club name, paw prints, pictures, or letters identifying the drill team member and/or dog are permitted.
- d. Accessories such as scarves, bandanas and sashes may not be worn by 4-H handlers or dogs.
- e. Logos or lettering that promotes any product or business are NOT acceptable. Example - brand names, a business, movie or cartoon characters, popular singing artists, etc.
- f. No short-shorts or short-skirts are allowed.
- g. Boots, high heels, backless slip-ons, loose fitting shoes, floppy sandals, or other unsafe footwear are not appropriate attire.
- h. Costumes are not allowed. Costume is defined by The Concise American Heritage Dictionary as 1) Type of dress characteristic of a particular country or period, 2) a set of clothes for a particular occasion or season, 3) an outfit worn by one playing a part.

Showmanship

Dogs showing in showmanship at the Indiana State Fair are required to have shown in obedience at the current State Fair and must be at least 6 months old on day of show. Dogs that have been disqualified in Obedience may not exhibit in Showmanship.

Score sheets will not be used at the State Fair. Exhibitors will receive comment sheets. Call-backs may occur for the judge to decide final placings.

1 Junior showmanship

For any 4-H member who is in the 3rd, 4th or 5th grades on January 1 of the current year. Once an exhibitor is the junior showmanship winner at the State Fair, he/she is only eligible to compete in intermediate or senior showmanship in subsequent years.

2 Intermediate showmanship

For any 4-H member in the 6th, 7th or 8th grades on January 1 of the current year. Once an exhibitor is the intermediate showmanship winner at the State Fair, he/she must compete in senior showmanship in future years.

3 Senior showmanship

For any 4-H member in the 9th grade or above on January 1 of the current year.

Proper attire: girls-dress, skirt and blouse, culottes, or dress pants. Boys-dress pants, dress shirts; (coat and tie are optional.)

Inappropriate attire: boots, high heels, backless slip-on shoes, loose fitting shoes or other unsafe footwear.

See 4-H 716-W (Indiana 4-H Dog Showmanship Guide) available through your County Extension Office or <http://extension.purdue.edu/4h> for further detail and clarity on attire, patterns, tips and judge guidelines.

A dog fouling in the ring will be placed lower in the class.

Agility Terms and Conditions

The 4-H Dog Agility Program is based on guidelines from the American Kennel Club rules. Modifications have been made to the AKC rules to provide a program suitable for 4-H handlers. The complete agility rules and obstacle specifications are detailed in the Indiana 4-H Dog Agility Rules, <https://extension.purdue.edu/4-H/projects/4-h-project-dog.html>. Agility regulations not covered by these rules and the terms and conditions below will be based on the regulations of The American Kennel Club, 8051 Arco Corporation Drive, Suite 100, Raleigh, NC 27617-3390; www.akc.org.

- Dogs showing in agility at the Indiana State Fair are required to have shown in obedience at the current State Fair and must be at least 15-months-old on day of show. Agility is recommended for 1B dogs and higher. Dogs that have been disqualified in Obedience may not compete in Agility; in situations where the dog completes Agility before they complete Obedience, the Agility Score sheet will be pulled for that exhibitor.
- Agility section/classes will be entered as Beginning, Intermediate, Advanced and Excellent. Awards will be granted by that classification, regardless of dog size. The show committee will place dogs in the appropriate size division based on the height at the withers reported on the entry form. Dogs may be measured at the show to verify accuracy of the reported height at the withers.
- Each class will offer five (5) jump height divisions based on the dog's height at the withers. Dogs 7 years and over (Veterans) may jump one jump height lower than their actual height division. Make sure you indicate on your entry form if your dog needs to be scheduled as a Veteran.
 - * 4-inch Division - dogs up to and including 11" at the withers will have 4" jump heights
 - * 8-inch Division - dogs over 11" and up to and including 14" at the withers will have 8" jump heights.
 - * 12-inch Division - dogs over 14" and up to and including 18" at the withers will have 12" jump heights.
 - * 16-inch Division - dogs over 18" and up to and including 22" at the withers will have 16" jump heights.
 - * 20-inch Division - dogs over 22" at the withers will have 20" jump heights

The Pause Table will be at the hurdle height for each division.

- All agility work will be done on a flat-buckle or quick-release collar.
 - * Beginning level A must use a six (6)-foot lead.

* All other levels will be off lead at the state fair.

* Collar tags will not be allowed.

5. Once all paws have touched contact equipment, the dog must either complete the obstacle or move to the next one. No additional attempts will be allowed.
6. Scores will start with 200 points. Points will be deducted for performance and time faults.
7. If a dog fouls in the ring during the walk through there will be a 10-point deduction in the agility score. If a dog fouls in the ring during the scored run, it will be excused immediately.
8. Appropriately fitted athletic shoes must be worn for agility.
9. Handlers who need the aid of supporting devices (crutches, wheelchair, etc.) may request extra time for completion of the course. This request must be made to the agility committee chair before classes begin that day; and the amount of time allowed will be determined by the judge.
10. In Agility, dogs with qualifying scores will place ahead of dogs with non-qualifying scores. In agility, dogs must successfully complete each obstacle on the course to receive a qualifying score.

Class Description

The program offers four (4) levels of competition - Beginning, Intermediate, Advanced and Excellent. The level of competition will be determined by the handler and their county leader based on the handler's previous agility participation and the dog's ability and past training.

Registration for the Top Dog test will take place in the testing area. 4-H members that have not entered a dog, but that wish to participate in Top Dog must contact the show manager for an official entry form, which must be completed and signed by their parents.
2. Each test will consist of 25 questions.
3. The test questions will be compiled from the following resources: 5 questions will come from the Indiana 4-H Agility Guide, 5 questions from the Indiana 4-H Showmanship Guide (4-H 716w), 5 obedience questions from the Indiana 4-H Obedience guidelines, 5 questions from the grade appropriate 4-H dog curriculum guide (junior - BU8166, intermediate - BU8167, senior - BU8168), and 5 questions from the Dept. 411 current Indiana State Fair Entry Book.
4. One winner in each division will be named. A participation ribbon will be given to all participants. The tie-

breaker to determine the Top Dog Scholar will involve the identification of AKC breeds.

5. The Top Dog Scholar test will be given Saturday, August 20, 11 am - 4 pm. The Top Dog Scholar will be announced on Saturday, August 18, during the awards program.
