We had demos throughout the week including two of our youth breeders. Cassidy Strange, 16, showed how to sheer an angora rabbit. You'd be surprised at how many people don't realize angora yarn for sweaters comes from rabbits! You must remove the wool every 3 months, so it won't mat up and cause the rabbit distress. Timmy Strange, 12, gave talks on various rabbits. He had quit a crowd and was willing to answer people's questions. People always seem to enjoy listening to the youth breeders.

A few of our exhibitors showed people how to clip the rabbit's toenails and discussed rabbit care.

There were pamphlets on rabbit care available for anyone who wanted them.

As I have said many times, this display could not have happened without all our wonderful volunteers. I would especially like to thank my assistant, Sara, who did the bulk of the work, not only working 13 hours daily during the fair, but several hours a day the week before, and once a month since April, also my second assistant, Natasha, for all the effort she put in. I could not have done it without them. And all the exhibitors who not only brought wonderful rabbits, but also put in several hours every day to come talk to the public about our favorite subject, RABBITS.
