Special Note to Exhibitors

The premium list as published will be our guide, so **read all the rules and be certain you understand them** when entries are made. The Executive Committee reserves the right to correct or interpret any part of the rules or premium list.

Before making your entries, notice carefully the rules and regulations governing the department in which each entry belongs, then be sure to fill out the online entry correctly.

All 4-H/FFA and Open Class entries must be the original work of the exhibitor, and all code of ethics followed.

If possible, make your entries before the last day. Notice carefully the time of closing entries. Be sure to have your livestock entries in place according to the Fair and Judging schedule. If you make an entry and decide not to show it, advise the Secretary and your entry will be taken from the Judges' books. There is no charge for this.

The Fair Management has arranged to give the patrons of the Warren County Fair the best from an educational and entertainment standpoint, with more livestock and agricultural exhibits of all kinds.

The Fair Management believes that Warren County is entitled to the best. In turn, they have confidence that you will support their efforts by your attendance and cooperation, for which they thank you sincerely.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

- Rules of the Fair must be observed by all exhibitors. The Executive Committee reserves the right to withhold part or all premiums from
 exhibitors who fail to observe the rules that are in force when entries are made.
- 2. Competition in all departments, unless otherwise designated, is limited to residents of Warren County or members of 4-H or FFA clubs in Warren County.
- 3. Entry Tags will be furnished by the Secretary. Exhibitor should write the division, class number, name of the article on the tag and attach it to some conspicuous part of the article. It must not be removed until the close of the Fair. Tags are available upon check-in.
- 4. Livestock and Open Class Exhibitors may only bring exhibits that have been entered with the Fair Secretary. All entries must be in place according to the Fair and Judging Schedule printed in the front of this book. All 4-H animals must have accurate identification and supporting documents including images, registration papers, leases, and or rabies certificates entered into 4-H Online by May 15 at 11:59 p.m. All FFA members will adhere to the same deadline and document requirements but will turn in required paperwork to the Extension Office. Failure to enter or update these items will result in the animal ineligible to show. This is an identification deadline, not a fair class entry deadline.
- 5. Fees must be paid and in good standing prior to the first day of the fair.
- 6. The Association will take every possible precaution for the safe keeping of the articles or animals on exhibition after their arrival and arrangement, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur.
- 7. All articles or animals competing for premiums must be entered in the name of the bona fide owner, **unless otherwise specified.** The Superintendents may require satisfactory proof of ownership. Exhibitors of purebred animals must file certificate, if required by the Secretary or Superintendents to show eligibility for record of registry.
- 8. Articles which are the product of the soil must be entered in the name of the producer. Articles which are the result of mechanical or artistic skill may be entered in the name of the contriver. Household articles and fancy goods offered for premium must have been manufactured and owned by the exhibitor. Judges are authorized to eliminate from competition any articles which do not comply with the rules.
- 9. Where there is but one entry in a class, first premium will be paid only if reported worthy by the Judge. In the event of only one exhibitor in an Open Class, and showing more than one animal, only one premium will be paid.

Please see warrencofair.com for any updates made after the initial posting March 20, 2023.

Corrections to rules or classes made after the initial posting in the online version will be considered the most current rules. If you have any questions, please ask.

- 10. Any exhibitor, who shall in any way interfere with the awarding Judge, Committee, or policy during the examination of goods or animals, shall forfeit any premiums that may be awarded.
- 11. Entries in the championship classes will be automatic. (No entry with the Secretary is required.) Only first place winners are eligible for championship competition. If reserve is awarded, first and second place winners are eligible.
- 12. Consumption of alcoholic beverages will be prohibited on all fairground property, unless offered for sale by the Fairboard in a specified area designated.
- 13. Alcohol Policy Alcohol is not allowed to be consumed on the Fairgrounds property during the dates of the annual Fair event, unless offered by the fair in a specific designated area. Law enforcement will be called to handle infractions to the rule.
- 14. The Association reserves the right to limit electrical consumption by participants.
- 15. All Warren County Fair 4-H and FFA Exhibitors will wear the official Warren County Fair exhibitor t-shirt tucked in, and in its original form while exhibiting. (Exception-horse exhibitors)
- 16. Per IA Code 673, Exhibitors are responsible for the safety, security, care of animals, and damage to person and/or personal property caused by their animals.
- 17. Dogs are not allowed on or off leash on the fairgrounds in any livestock areas or show areas. Exception: Service dogs and 4-H/FFA dogs on leash for Wednesday show.
- 18. Warren County Produced Eligibility Statement: (copies available from fair secretary or online) Animals must be born, produced and raised in Warren County. Producer must be a resident of Warren County. Animal must be purchased directly from Warren County producers. Copy online to fill out and upload.
- 19. Retag Procedure: A market beef superintendant must be present at the time of a retag to witness, reinstall tag, and obtain signatures on a triplicate form with one copy going to the Extension office, Fair office and Exhibitor.
- 20. CHECKS MUST BE CASHED IMMEDIATELY! ALL checks issued by the Warren County Fair (premiums and/or auction) are VOID if they are not cashed within 90 days of the date issued. After 90 days from the date on the check, uncashed checks will become a donation to the Fair Board. If you do not wish to receive a premium check from your fair exhibits please advise the Fair Secretary prior to Fair.
- 21. No Cell Phones or text messaging allowed by any exhibitors during shows or contests.
- 22. No solicitation on Warren County Fairgrounds during the annual Fair no handbills, signage, handouts or flyers can be distributed or placed on car windows. Only information/advertising from paid commercial vendors can be given away from their specific commercial booth space or authorized vendors. No other advertising can be placed on fairgrounds property during the annual Fair event (barns, poles, windows, etc.) without prior consent from the Warren County Fair Board of Directors.
- 23. Infraction of any rule/regulation may result in immediate disqualification from current year fair and future fairs.
- 24. YQCA will be required for 4-H/FFA members.
- 25. Code of Ethics apply to Open Class exhibitors, visitors, families and extended families.

Rules for Livestock

- 1. See the General Rules and Regulations and the State Livestock Health Rules and Regulations on previous pages.
- 2. NEW ALL LIVESTOCK must be in stalls, pens, cages by noon for check-in Wednesday, July 26.
- 2. Animals to compose competitive groups need not be named in application for entry, but exhibitor must indicate the group classes in which he/she wishes to make entries.
- 3. Exhibitors must keep their stalls open and stock uncovered from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. during each day of exhibition. Exception: Exhibitors will be allowed to use blankets on horses up until show day. After completion of the show, blankets will no longer be used to cover any of the horses. Sheep and goats may use blankets after inspection and weigh-in. All exhibitors are asked to present their stalls in an attractive manner. There will be no blocking chutes allowed in the aisles or doorways. On show day, blocking chutes will be allowed in the aisles; however, safety and courtesy to others shall be maintained.
- 4. Stalls will be assigned by Superintendents. <u>All animals entered must remain until 9 p.m.</u>, <u>Sunday.</u> Each exhibitor is expected to furnish his/her own feed. Rabbit exhibitors may use straw. All other exhibitors are to use wood products.
- 5. Exhibitors are expected to obey the Marshall promptly in producing their stock in show rings when requested to do so. No refractory person will be allowed to compete for premiums.
- 6. If a question should arise regarding a market steer breed designation, the following procedure will be followed: A signed written protest will be given to the Fair Secretary by noon on Thursday. Every effort will be made to contact the owner by 2:00 P.M. and the owner will then have until 8:00 A.M. Friday to verify. The executive committee and the beef superintendents will be the final authority.
- 7. Any family or exhibitor that removes an open class or 4-H/FFA exhibit (livestock or non-livestock) prior to Sunday night at 9 p.m. will NOT be allowed to exhibit the next year and will forfeit all premiums due.
- 8 Cattle will not be allowed in horse barns or stalls. Horses will not be allowed in cattle barns.
- 9. Animals must be in their assigned stalls until superintendents have checked the animals in. Do not go to tie outs until checked-in, Wednesday noon.
- 10. Warren County Produced Eligibility Statement: (copies available from fair secretary or online) Animals must be born, produced and raised in Warren County. Producer must be a resident of Warren County. Animal must be purchased directly from Warren County producers.
- 11. No intact males will show in 4-H/FFA shows.
- 12. Retag Procedure: A market beef superintendant must be present at the time of a retag to witness, reinstall tag, and obtain signatures on a triplicate form with one copy going to the Extension office, Fair office and Exhibitor.
- 13. During Pre Fair Picnic, Club Leaders pick up beef stall cards and place according to the map provided.
- 14. **Tie Outs** Cannot be reserved with anything other than 1 necktie (per animal coming to the Fair) tied to the fence under each numbered space.
- 15. All fans, electrical appliances, and extension cords used in all barns and display areas must have safe wiring and must be in safe operating condition. Fair officials and superintendents have the right to decide if any fan, electrical appliance, or cord is safe and has the right to request that the use of the fan or electrical appliance be discontinued immediately if it does not meet these standards.

- NO strings, tape, wire, signs, etc. will be allowed to reserve spaces. If put up, it will be taken down.
- NO Tie out space can be reserved until after 8:00 a.m. Monday, July 24th, 2023.
- 17. Awnings, Canopies, Tents (with no sides), cannot be placed until after swine weigh-in Tuesday evening.
 - If any spaces on the grassy areas are marked with posts, wires, strings, etc. it will be taken down until the proper set up time. This includes all species and all grass areas.
 - If it is put up prior to the proper set up time, it will be taken down.

Junior Livestock Exhibiting Rules

The General Rules and Livestock Rules, as printed in this premium list, will apply in all cases unless exceptions are printed under department headings.

Competition in this department is limited to 4-H and FFA members properly enrolled in Warren County 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters. In order to show at the Warren County Fair, the Fairboard requires that all FFA members and projects shall comply with the same regulations as 4-H members and projects. No animal project will be shown in Warren County 4-H/FFA division that has been or will be shown in another county fair in 4-H/FFA division the same year.

All Warren County Fair 4-H and FFA Exhibitors will wear the official Warren County Fair exhibitor t-shirt tucked in, and in its original form while exhibiting. (Exception-horse exhibitors)

4-H All animals (except Market Beef and Advanced Cattle Feeders) must have been identified on their specific 4-H Identification Report, which was on file at the County Extension Office by May 15. Market Beef and Advanced Cattle Feeder must have been identified on the Market Beef Identification Form (4-H-106-bi) and on file in the County Extension Office by February 1.

FFA All animals (except Market Beef and Advanced Cattle Feeders) must have been identified on their specific ID form obtained at the Extension Office and on file with the FFA Advisor by May 15. Market Beef and Advanced Cattle Feeders must have been identified on the Market Beef ID Form and on file with the FFA Advisor by Feb. 1.

Removing or remedying physical defects by any artificial means in animals exhibited will be considered as fraud and deception. Any attempt to improve the showing quality of an animal by artificial means (other than castration or grooming) will not be allowed. All animals showing evidence of such treatment will be barred from exhibition. For clarification, check with project Superintendent or the Fair Secretary.

All livestock must be shown by the member identifying the project except in case of sickness, injury, service in the Armed Forces, or when more than one animal is being exhibited at the same time. The substitute must be another eligible Warren County 4-H Club or FFA Chapter member. Any and all other exceptions must be approved by <u>all</u> respective division Superintendents.

Any 4-H/FFA project removed from the County Fair without official permission of the Fair Executive Committee will automatically disqualify that 4-H/FFA member from entering the County 4-H/FFA competition the following year, and all 4-H/FFA premiums due that member in any 4-H/FFA division for the current year will be forfeited.

In classes where no livestock merits first award, the Judges will award premiums from second place down.

Showmanship contests are held during the various livestock shows under the supervision of the Superintendents. Ribbons and/or trophies will be awarded depending upon the livestock division. All 4-H/FFA livestock division showmanship will compete as Jr. 4th, 5th, and 6th grade, Intermediate 7th, 8th, 9th grade and Sr. 10th, 11th, and 12th as of September 15.

Any situation arising, relative to 4-H Club and FFA exhibits not covered in the rules, under the jurisdiction of the Fair Board, or in case of a conflict or misunderstanding, the final authority for the interpretation rests with a board of two members of the executive committee, two members of the county Extension Youth Committee, one FFA advisor, one county Extension staff member, and the superintendent of the division in which the dispute developed.

All 4-H/FFA male market animals must be physically castrated. No chemical castration allowed.

YQCA-FFA Advisors will administer classes and tests and provide a list of eligible exhibitors to show in classes at the fair. YQCA deadline - June 1.

YQCA - 4-H members will complete classes and/or tests administered by officials appointed by Warren County Extension and Staff. A list of eligible exhibitors to show at the Fair will be provided by Extension Staff. YQCA deadline - June 1.

Objectives of 4-H/FFA Livestock Shows

- $1. \quad \text{To be consistent with the overall purposes of } 4\text{-H club and FFA work and the } 4\text{-H/FFA livestock program.}$
- 2. To acquaint the public with the 4-H/FFA Programs.
- 3. To provide individual members with appropriate recognition for their achievements.
- 4. To provide group experiences that will help participants develop appropriate attitudes, understandings and abilities in working with others.
- 5. To help young people develop an appreciation for the dignity of work and the satisfaction from a job well done.
- 6. To develop the ability to recognize and appreciate desirable livestock.
- 7. To develop an appreciation for proper preparation and presentation in selling an article or service, and to provide an opportunity to apply skills related thereto.
- 8. To provide an opportunity for 4-H club members and FFA chapter members to learn and understand marketing principles and procedures.

County Fair Campground Rules

- 1. All sign up and fee payment must be made online. No refunds and no transfers. Entries to be made in the adult name.
- 2. No campers will be allowed to park in their assigned spot before 8:00 a.m. Sunday, July 23rd. Sign up using an adult name. Any campers that arrive prior to 8:00 am will remain outside the camping area until that time. Campers will be parked between 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon unless prior arrangements are made to be parked after noon (12:00 p.m.). Campers at north end grounds near horse arena will be parked beginning at noon.
- Camping fee is \$200 per camper. \$50 hang tag for vehicles. Only one optional hang tag is allowed. All tents (including any tents accompanying a camper) will be charged \$125.
- 4. Anyone asked to remove their tent or camper will do so with no refund.
- 5. Campground Curfew is midnight. Lights must be out and campground must be quiet.
- 6. Adult Supervision is required for each camper/tent.
- 7. Consumption of alcoholic beverages is prohibited on all fairground property.
- 8. Any vehicle without a tag or wrong color tag may be towed at the owners' expense.
- 9. Campers must be out by 4:00 p.m. Monday or pay \$20.00 for another night.

Livestock Auction

As of November 2001, it has become necessary to make a change to our policies and procedures for the livestock auction. These changes have come about due to a complaint from one person that was made to the Federal Stockyards and Packers Commission regarding the timeliness of checks being available to exhibitors.

Because of this complaint, we must speed up the collection and payment process. Checks must be issued to market livestock exhibitors whether money has been collected from the buyers or not. In order to comply with federal requirements we must make checks available one week following the sale. The checks will be made available to exhibitors on Monday, August 7th. (We will be billing quicker, thus we will make a note on the invoices to buyers that we are complying with federal regulations and that we would appreciate prompt payment.) The lag time between collection and payment will necessitate the fair establishing a line of credit to cover exhibitor's checks.

The Fair Will Be Collecting a 1.5% Commission On All Market Animals Going Through The Auction.

The 1.5% commission covers:

- Administrative expenses (computer program, overtime costs,etc.)
- Interest expenses (for line of credit)
- Indemnity fund expenses (covers uncollected debts, these expenses were deducted from check.)
- Newspaper ad (prior to complaint these expenses were deducted from check.)

The beef, swine, sheep and goat check-off will be collected as usual. The fair regrets this decision, but the federal requirement has taken this situation out of our control. This commission collection will include cattle, swine, sheep, goats and poultry.

Senate File 362 Iowa Code 673 Chapter

- 5A. "Domesticated animal pathogen" or "pathogen" means a microorganism, biological agent, or toxin causing disease, illness, or death to a human, if the microorganism, biological agent, or toxin is primarily transmitted by human contact with a domesticated animal, manure from a domesticated animal, or other excretions or body fluids from a domesticated animal.
- 5B. "Domesticated animal premises" or "premises" means a location under the management or control of domesticated animal activity sponsor where domesticated animals are regularly kept for three or more consecutive hours.
- 6A. "Fair Authority" means the Iowa State Fair authority established in section 173.1 or a fair as defined in section 174.1.
- 6B. "Fairgrounds" mean real estate under the management or control of a fair authority, including land, buildings, and improvements, and which includes but is not limited to areas reserved for domesticated animal events or domesticated animal activities.

673.4 Fairs - Domesticated Animal Premises - Liability.

- 1. A fair authority is not liable for damages arising from a claim by a participant or spectator alleging injury or death caused by a domesticated animal pathogen transmitted at a domesticated animal premises located on its fairgrounds. This subsection applies regardless of whether a domesticated animal is present on the domesticated animal premises, when the domesticated animal pathogen is transmitted, or whether a domesticated animal present on the domesticated animal premises is engaged in a domesticated animal activity.
- 2. Subsection 1 does not apply to the extent that the participant or spectator proves that the fair authority failed to post a warning sign at a conspicuous place at the domesticated animal premises as required in section 673.5.

673.5 Warning Sign - Notice.

1. A fair authority shall post a warning sign at a conspicuous place on any domesticated animal premises located on the fairgrounds. The warning sign shall be clearly visible to a person visiting the premises for the first time. The sign shall have a white background and the sign's notice shall be printed in black letters minimum of one inch high in the following form:

WARNING

Domesticated Animal Premises

Under the Iowa Code Chapter 673, the Fair is not liable for a domesticated animal pathogen transmitted from this domesticated animal premises. Take necessary sanitary precautions by not touching your face or consuming food or water until thoroughly cleansing and drying your hands after your visit. As soon as possible after your visit, thoroughly cleanse your hands using an appropriate soap and water and thoroughly dry them after cleansing.

Iowa 4-H Code of Conduct For Youth and Families

Updated August 2019

The Iowa 4-H Code of Conduct applies and will be enforced with 4-H youth, 4-H parents/guardians, and 4-H families.

- While participating in or attending a 4-H sponsored program (e.g. club meeting, project meeting, activity, event, learning opportunity).
- While participating in or attending a 4-H event or while on premises used for 4-H purposes (e.g. County Fair, State Fair, show ring, exhibit building, barn, food stand).
- While representing Iowa 4-H to the public.
- Additional programs, events, or opportunities may have additional rules and expectations.
- At all times throughout a 4-H youth's participation when behavior outside of the Iowa 4-H puts youth at risk or has the potential to put youth at risk.

The opportunity to participate in and/or volunteer with Iowa 4-H is a privilege and honor, not a right. All youth participants and parents/guardians supporting their child's participation in 4-H are expected to review and agree to abide by the Iowa 4-H Code of Conduct before becoming involved with Iowa 4-H.

- I understand that the Iowa 4-H Youth Development program is a non-formal education program in which I have a choice to
 participate. I accept my responsibility to engage in program activities and to excuse myself from this program if it does not meet my
 personal learning objectives. I recognize the organization has the responsibility to authority to remove youth who are disruptive to the
 4-H Youth Development program, violate the Iowa 4-H Code of Conduct, the standards of the 4-H Pledge and Motto or federal, state
 or local laws.
- 2. I accept my responsibility to represent the Iowa State University extension and Outreach 4-H Youth development program by holding myself to the standards of the 4-H pledge and motto. I will refrain from behavior that negatively represents myself, my family, my community, 4-H or Iowa State University. I will act in a respectful and responsible manner during all 4-H programs.
- 3. I acknowledge that the 4-H program utilizes competition related to project work as a tool for learning. I will ensure that my project exhibits are appropriate and respectful. I will demonstrate good sportsmanship, encourage this behavior in others, and not allow this behavior to detract from the learning experience. I will not let my personal desire to win overshadow the needs of the group.
- 4. I accept my personal responsibility to be informed and follow the policies, rules, and deadlines established by Iowa 4-H. I will not cheat, lie, knowingly furnish false information, deceive, or otherwise engage in dishonest, unethical or illegal behaviors. I will not encourage others to disregard or intentionally violate conditions of Iowa 4-H participation.
- 5. I will comply with directions of 4-H officials acting in the performance of their duties. I will not obstruct or disrupt any 4-H program or encourage others to engage in such conduct. I understand that a judge's decision is final.
- 6. I will strive to be a positive role model. I will treat youth, parents, volunteers, extension and outreach staff, judges and others with respect, courtesy and consideration.
- 7. I will communicate (oral, written and electronic) in an open, honest, respectful manner in all situations involving the 4-H program. I will refrain from communication that is negative, offensive, destructive or hurtful to others. I will refrain from sharing private matters in a public group setting.
- 8. I will promote a spirit of inclusion and welcome participation of individuals from all backgrounds. I will not engage in or tolerate harassment in any form. (For example bullying, slander, put-downs, insults, taunting, name calling, yelling, profane language, sexual innuendos and other comments or hostile behaviors likely to offend, hurt or set a bad example.)
- 9. I will ensure a safe environment for myself and others by not carelessly or intentionally harming youth or adults in any way; emotionally, mentally, physically, socially, verbally or non-verbally.
- 10. I will not possess, offer, or use tobacco, electronic smoking devices (including but not limited to e-cigs, vapes, juuls), alcohol or illegal substances. I will not attend 4-H programs under the influence of alcohol or any illegal substance.
- 11. I will respect the property of others. I will not use, abuse, or take another individual's personal belongings. I will not damage facilities. Infractions to the Iowa 4-H Code of Conduct will be addressed by the Iowa 4-H Program, the local County Extension District, or their appointed representatives. Infractions to the Iowa 4-H Code of Conduct will result in consequences. The consequences may range from a verbal warning to the loss of privileges (e.g. participation at the event or future events, forfeiture of awards or other forms of recognition, forfeiture of positions of leadership, limitation on volunteer responsibilities) to full removal from the Iowa 4-H Program.

FFA Good Conduct Policy and Code of Show Ring Ethics

Good Conduct Policy

All FFA exhibitors are expected to conduct themselves in a cooperative and courteous manner while participating in FFA events at the Warren County Fair.

FFA members who wish to have the privilege of participating in FFA activities at the Warren County Fair must conduct themselves in accordance with the Good Conduct Policy. Use or possession of alcoholic beverages, tobacco or illegal drugs by any FFA member, regardless of age, on the Warren County Fairgrounds (barns, exhibiting facilities, campgrounds, etc.) will result in the following:

- A. If the violation occurs before or during exhibiting, the member is ineligible to participate in FFA activities at the Warren County Fair and must remove his/her exhibit(s) from the Fairgrounds.
- B. If the violation occurs after exhibiting, the member forfeits his/her premium money, prize money, trophies/banners, and/or sale of champions money, and must remove his/her exhibit(s) from the Fairgrounds.
- C. The violation will be reported to the exhibitor's school for further action under the school district's good conduct policy.
- D. A meeting of the member, parent and advisor with FFA and Warren County Fair officials will be held to determine future member eligibility.

Code of Show Ring Ethics

FFA members participating in the FFA division of the Warren County Fair will be obligated to understand and abide by the *Code of Ethics described as follows:*

Youth are expected to be sincere, honest and act in sportsmanlike ways at all times. Youth represent the entire program and their behavior reflects on their parents, leaders, school and the entire youth program. All adults involved with the youth program, leaders as well as parents, are expected to set positive examples and serve as positive role models by what they say and do. Any youth who breaks the Code of Ethics or allows another person (adult or peer) to talk them into violating the Code of Ethics agrees to forfeit all prizes, awards and premiums. The youth may also be prohibited from exhibiting at this and future exhibitions including the Warren County Fair and other county, state or regional exhibitions.

Youth agree to follow these guidelines:

- A. I will do my own work, appropriate for my age and physical and mental development. This includes research and writing of exhibit explanations, preparing exhibits (building, refinishing, etc.) care and grooming of animals, etc. Adult assistance should help guide and support me, not do it for me.
- B. All exhibits will be true representations of my work. Any attempt to take credit for other's work, alter the conformation of animals, or alter their performance is prohibited. Copyright violation or allowing others to complete my exhibit is considered misrepresentation and is prohibited.
- C. I will treat all people and animals with respect. I will provide appropriate care for animals.
- D. I will present exhibits that are safe for consumption. All exhibits will be safe for judges to evaluate and for exhibition.
- E. All food animals that may be harvested immediately following the show shall be safe for consumers, and shall have met all withdrawal times for all medications and be free of violative drug residue.
- F. If any animal requires medical treatment while at the Fair, only an official Warren County Fair Veterinarian may administer the treatment. All medications that are administered shall be done according to the label instructions of the medication used.
- G. My animal's appearance or performance shall not be altered by any means, including medications, external applications and surgical procedures. Any animal that is found to have changed its appearance or its performance shall be disqualified from the show and have penalties assessed against me, my parent(s) and/or guardian by the Management of the Warren County Fair.
- H. I will follow all ownership and possession rules and, if requested, will provide the necessary documentation.
- I. I will follow all livestock health requirements for the Warren County Fair, according to the state health requirements as printed in the Premium Book. I will provide animal health certificates from a licensed veterinarian upon request for the Management of the Warren County Fair.
- J. By my entering an animal in this Fair, I am giving consent to the Management of the Warren County Fair to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. If the laboratory report on the analysis of any sample indicates a presence of forbidden drugs, this shall be evidence such substance has been administered to the animal(s) either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on me, my parent(s) and/or guardian to prove otherwise.
- K. I am responsible for my exhibit and I will not allow others to violate this Code on my behalf. By my entering an exhibit in this Fair I will accept any disciplinary action taken by the Management of the Warren County Fair for any violation of this Code of Ethics and any other rules of competition of the Fair without recourse against the Warren County Fair.
- L. I want my exhibit to be an example of how to accept what life has to offer, both good and not so good, and how to live with and learn from the outcome.
- M. I will not be involved in any illegal activities while participating in FFA events, including but not limited to alcohol, tobacco or drug use.

IAFE (International Association of Fairs and Expositions) National Code of Show Ring Ethics*

Exhibitors of animals at livestock show shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics", fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminated with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statues, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.
 - If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.
 - At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening

- conduct toward them.
- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

*This Code of Ethics was adopted at the Association of Iowa Fairs, Inc. Convention in December 2002, and revised in December of 2003. We, as members of the association, are printing it in our Fairbook as a Guideline for conduct. All rules and decisions, whether General and/or Specific, of the Warren County Fair take precedence.

2023 Health Requirements for Exhibition of Livestock, Poultry and Birds at a County 4-H/FFA Fair Exhibition

Any evidence of warts, ringworm, foot rot, pink eye, draining abscesses or any other contagious or infectious condition will eliminate the animal from the show.

No individual Certificate of Veterinary Inspection will be required on Iowa origin animals or poultry exhibited at County 4-H/FFA FAIR, but the animals must be inspected when unloaded or shortly thereafter by an accredited veterinarian. Swine are required to be inspected either before being unloaded or before leaving a designated isolation and inspection area (prior to mixing with any other swine). All animals moving from out of state into an Iowa county 4-H/FFA fair must meet Iowa Animal and Livestock Important requirements. Each show <u>must</u> have an official veterinarian.

Quarantined animals or animals from quarantined herds cannot be exhibited.

Official identification listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection required for all cattle and bison of any age coming in from out of state used for rodeos, recreational events, shows and exhibitions.

Swine

All swine must originate from a herd or area not under quarantine and must be individually identified. All swine are required to have individual official identification. All 4-H and FFA tags bearing the US shield are official identification tags.

Swine originating outside of Iowa. All exhibitors must present a test record and Certificate of Veterinary Inspection that indicate that each swine has had a negative test for pseudorabies within 30 days prior to the show (individual show regulations may have more restrictive time restrictions), regardless of the status of the herd, and show individual official identification on test report. Electronic identification will not be considered official identification for exhibition purposes.

Swine exhibition requirements. "Swine exhibition" means an exhibit, demonstration, show, or competition involving an event on the state fairgrounds, a county fair, or other exhibition event. The sponsor of the exhibition must retain an Iowa licensed veterinarian to supervise the health of the swine at the exhibition location. The sponsor must electronically file the approved registration form and obtain approval from the state veterinarian at least 30 days before the event. The registration form includes the name of the exhibition and the address and telephone number of its location; the name, address and telephone number of the veterinarian; and the date of the planned exhibition. Sales of swine will not be allowed unless the event has been registered and received approval from the state veterinarian 30 days prior to the event.

Swine exhibition report required. The sponsor of the swine exhibition shall electronically submit to the department the approved report form within five business days after the conclusion of the exhibition. The form includes the name of the exhibition and the address and telephone number of its location; the name, address and telephone number of the veterinarian; the date that the exhibition occurred; the name, address and telephone number of the premises from which the swine was moved after the exhibition if such premises is a different premises.

Sheep and Goats

All sexually intact sheep must have an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag (Ex. IA1234-5678) or another official Scrapie tag. All sexually intact goats must be identified with an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag (Ex. IA1234-5678), another official Scrapie tag, or by an official tattoo registered with USDA (to register, call 1-866-USDA-TAG; 1-866-873-2824). Wethers less than 18 months of age are required to have an individual identification and a scrapie tag may be used, but a scrapie tag is not required.

Poultry and Birds

All poultry exhibited must come from U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid clean or equivalent flocks, or have had a negative Pullorum-Typhoid test within 90 days of public exhibition and the test must have been performed by an authorized tester. (SEE GENERAL SECTION 1B) Please note: **Poultry purchased from a hatchery and raised for exhibition are not exempt from Pullorum-Typhoid testing requirements.**

However, "Market Classes" of poultry consigned to a slaughter establishment are exempt from the Salmonella testing requirements. "Market

Classes" of poultry must be separated from all other poultry by a distance of ten or more feet and/or an eight-foot high solid partition.

Dogs and Cats

All dogs and cats exhibited must have a current rabies vaccination certificate.

Farm Deer

Accredited veterinarians must be approved to administer tuberculosis tests on cervidae. "Cervidae" means all animals belonging to the cervidae family, and "CWD susceptible cervidae" means whitetail deer, blacktail deer, mule deer, red deer, elk and moose. Native Iowa Cervidae may be exhibited without other testing requirements when accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection that lists individual official identification.

All Cervidae must have been pmt of the herd of origin for at least one year or were natural additions, or must have originated from a chronic wasting disease monitored or certified herd in which these animals have been kept for at least one year or were natural additions. Cervidae originating from a herd with a diagnosis, signs, epidemiological evidence, or area under quarantine for chronic wasting disease may not be exhibited. The following statement must appear on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection:

"All Cervidae on this certificate have been part of the herd of origin for at least one year or were natural additions to this herd. There has been no diagnosis, signs, or epidemiological evidence of chronic wasting disease in this herd for the past year."

THE DECISION OF THE OFFICIAL SHOW VETERINARIAN WILL BE FINAL.

- 3. To teach basic lamb management skills without a large investment.
- 4. To provide a better understanding of the feeder lambs industry.

Rules and Guidelines

- 1. Project is open to Pre-4-H members, Kindergarten, first, second, and third grade as of September 15.
- 2. Any newborn or orphan lamb that is born between February 1 and May 1 may be shown. If purchased, the lamb must be purchased and in possession of exhibitor within 2 weeks of birth; identified by a photo.
- 3. Lamb must be bucket or bottle fed. No nursing permitted after 2 weeks of birth.
- 4. Exhibitor may identify two animals, but is limited to a maximum of one lamb to be exhibited at the county fair.
- 5. Lambs are to be shown at halter.
- 6. Superintendent may combine or divide entries.
- 7. Lambs will be brought in on judging day, Thursday and taken home the day of the show. They cannot be sold at the fair sale.
- 8. Bucket/Bottle exhibitors must follow the fair rules and health requirements as stated in the fair book.
- 9. Third graders may keep bucket/bottle lamb for breeding sheep or market sheep for classes the following year.

- 1. Open class exhibitors are limited to three (3) birds per class per exhibitor.
- 2. An entry fee of \$2.00 per bird must accompany entries or they will not be accepted. A service charge of \$.50 per bird will be assessed to cover veterinarian inspection fees. A double entry fee will be charged for any changes made after entry week.
- 3. Birds are not to be placed in pens until they have been approved by the Fair Veterinarian.
- 4. Pen assignments will be made by the Superintendents.
- 5. All poultry exhibited must come from U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid certified clean or equivalent flocks, or have had a negative Pullorum-Typhoid test performed by an authorized tester within 90 days prior to public exhibition. A copy of test papers must be presented to superintendent at check-in time before caging of birds. Please note: Poultry purchased from a Pullorum-Typhoid free hatchery and raised for exhibition are not exempt from Pullorum-Typhoid testing requirements.
- 6. Exhibitors are responsible for entering birds in the proper class. Incorrectly entered birds will be placed at the bottom of the class.
- 7. Birds must be in place by 12:00 noon on Wednesday. Open class judging will begin on Saturday at 9:00 a.m. Birds will be released on Sunday at 9:00 p.m.
- 8. Bantam and Standard breeds will be judged by their adherence to the American Poultry Association Standard of Perfection. No crossbred birds may be entered in these classes.
- 9. In Exhibition Poultry, prizes will be awarded as merited in the opinion of the judge. Any prize may be withheld at the discretion of the judge.
- 10. TERMS:
 - a. Cock-male bird hatched before January 1 of the current year;
 - b. Hen-female bird hatched before January 1 of the current year;
 - c. Cockerel-male bird hatched on or after January 1 of the current year;
 - d. Pullet female bird hatched on or after January 1 of current year.
- 11. Exhibitors are responsible for the care of their birds. Exhibitors must provide feed, feeders, waterers, and clean up pens. Premiums will not be paid if pens are not cleaned or birds are not checked out by release time.
- 12. Once the show has begun, exhibitors will handle birds only at the Judge's request.
- 13. Care will be used in handling all birds; but the management will not be responsible for loss through fire, theft, accident or any other medium. Policing will be in effect at all times.

If stalls are not cleaned by release time, premium money will not be allocated.

- 1. \$1.00 per entry, 1 entry per class, specify division and class. Entries **MUST** be made online to the fair. See website and "General Rules and Regulations" for further information.
- 2. Entries limited to Warren County residents and all entries must be the work of the exhibitor.
- 3. All products exhibited in jars, etc., must have been canned since August 2nd, 2022. Canned products must be canned in standard Mason-type, colorless jars made for home canning with new, metal screw bands left on. Products not meeting these qualifications will not be judged. Jellies and jams will be opened if the judge so desires. Secure your entry tag on a rubber band and place it around the neck of the jar. No other labels are to be on the jar.
- 4. All canned products must be canned in compliance with the current USDA guidelines for safe canning. Any entries not complying with these guidelines will be disqualified. The method of processing, headspace, processing time, date of preparation, altitude and county name (not county number) in which the product was canned must be included on the **recipe card, not** the entry tag. If an entry has been processed in a pressure canner, the recipe card must include whether a dial gauge or weighted gauge canner was used and the pounds used.
- 5. All baked products are to be placed on plain white Styrofoam, plastic or heavy-duty paper plates or white cardboard (cake) boards (furnished by the exhibitor) with entry tags attached along with the recipe used. Either staple or tie your entry tag to the entry and then cover with clear plastic or a zip-lock bag. Do not put the tag on the plastic covering Please use the 6 inch or 9 inch paper plates. Anything coming in on larger size plates may be disqualified. In addition, exhibitor's name should be put in an inconspicuous place on container. You can purchase these paper boards at Michael's, Hobby Lobby, Jo-Ann Fabrics and Crafts or Walmart.
- 6. Recipes may be printed or typed with black ink on one side only of an 8 1/2 x 11 sheet of paper. A 3"x5" or 4"x6" inch plain or ruled recipe card may be used, printing or typed on one side only, if not using the sheet of paper. More than one sheet or card may be used, but please number them. To be considered for judging, the recipe must accompany each exhibit. Each ingredient must be listed in exact measurement (type of measurement used, i.e. yeast, self-rising flour must be specified). Follow general proper recipe procedures, listing all steps of preparation, pan size, temperature and baking time.
- 7. Exhibitor's number must be in the upper right hand corner of the recipe; the division and class number in the upper left hand corner. Staple the back of the recipe to the back of the entry tag so the judges can see the recipe and it does not interfere with the front of the entry tag.
- 8. YOUR ENTRY MUST BE READY TO BE JUDGED <u>PRIOR</u> TO YOUR ARRIVAL AT THE FAIR. THIS INCLUDES: 1) COMPLETED ENTRY TAGS ATTACHED TO ENTRIES and 2) RECIPE CARDS STAPLED TO ENTRY TAGS (BACK OF RECIPE CARD TO BACK OF ENTRY TAG). THERE IS NEITHER ROOM NOR TIME TO PREPARE YOUR ENTRY AT THE FAIR. EXHIBITORS WITH ENTRIES THAT ARE READY FOR JUDGING WILL TAKE PRECEDENCE AT CHECK-IN.
- 9. Pies are the only baked product to be judged in container in which they were baked. Pies in classes 840-845 will be judged on the filling and pie crust. NO CREAM FILLING, PUMPKIN OR PECAN PIE. WE WILL NOT ACCEPT ANY ENTRIES THAT HAVE BEEN PUT ON ICE OR IN A COOLER. Use glass pie plates only. Pies baked in any other type of pie plate will be judged, but not placed. Do not put names on the bottom of the pie plate. Pies may be picked up after all judging is finished and before 7:00 p.m. on judging day.
- 10. All baked goods shall be covered with plastic wrap or in plastic bags, except, Frosted Layer cake classes, Decorated Cake classes, Ugliest Cake classes and Pie classes. Cake containers may be used when entering Frosted Layer and Decorated Cake classes. Pie containers may be used when entering pies. Any entries not wrapped as specified will be judged but not placed. Either staple or tie your entry tag to the entry and then cover with clear plastic or a zip-lock bag. Pie entry tags may be taped to the glass pie plate.
- 11. No bread mixes, cake mixes, frosting mixes/premade frostings, and prepared pie fillings allowed, except where it is specified to use these products.
- 12. Cake pan size according to recipe. Bread pan size 9" x 5" or size that recipe recommends.
- 13. Any exhibit not worthy of placing will not be given a prize. A first place ribbon does not have to be given if the judge does not feel any entry is worthy of first place. All judges decisions are final.
- 14. All entries, JUNIORS, INTERMEDIATES and ADULTS will ONLY be Accepted from 8:30-9:45 a.m. on Wednesday. Judging will be at 10:00 a.m. for ALL age groups, JUNIORS, INTERMEDIATES and ADULTS.
- 15. Exhibitors will pick up baked goods as soon as all food items in their entry class have been judged, not before judging is over. Only a portion of the baked items will be retained for exhibition. NOTE: Any baked item not picked up by 7:00 p.m. Wednesday will be disposed of. Other exhibits must be picked up after 9:00 p.m. and before 10:00 p.m. on Sunday. Exhibits, which include food item, ribbon, entry tag, comment card and recipe, may NOT be picked up before 9:00 p.m. on Sunday.
- 16. All entries MUST be accompanied by the recipe on a 3"x 5" or 4" x 6" PLAIN WHITE or PLAIN RULED recipe card, or 8 1/2 x 11 sheet of paper, including the recipe for the pie crusts and frostings. Do not use recipe cards with pictures or commercially printed wording such as "from the kitchen of", etc.
- 17. Only Junior and Intermediate Division entries MUST have the child's age and the Exhibitor's number in the UPPER RIGHT HAND CORNER of the recipe; the division and class number in the Upper Left Hand Corner of the recipe.
- 18. Entrants may **ONLY** enter in their appropriate age division. Entries will be moved to the correct class if entered in the wrong age division and may receive a ribbon, but no premium award.

4-H and FFA Market Beef Department

Superintendents: Brandon Reynolds, Reed McCormick, Gene Bedwell, Derek Hommer, Bob Dyer, Brad Kaufman, Casey Cortum

Exhibitors are limited to exhibiting four animals, all of which must have been weighed and eartagged, according to Warren County 4-H rules and policies, before Feb., 1, of current year; not more than three can be steers and not more than three can be heifers. Any animals with horns or having central incisor teeth up in wear at County Fair time will not be allowed to show.

All animals must be in their stalls by 12:00 noon., Wednesday, and stay in the stall until released by the superintendent, after release animals may go to tie outs. Calves will be weighed Wednesday 7:00-9:00 a.m., and will be weighed only once. If any animal is artificially filled or tampered with, in an attempt to adjust the weight, the animal will be sent home. Animals will be divided by weight into approximately equal-sized classes within each breed division. All Breeding and Market Cattle must be on grounds and checked-in by 9:00 a.m. May arrive Tuesday night.

All Warren County Fair 4-H and FFA Exhibitors will wear the official Warren County Fair exhibitor t-shirt tucked in, and in its original form while exhibiting. (Exception-horse exhibitors)

No use of paint or coloring agents are allowed. Top 3 animals will be toweled at the completion of the class. Champion and Reserve of each division will be toweled. Any animal showing evidence of painting or coloring agent will be disqualified. If any animal is disqualified, the remaining animals move up 1 place.

All calves will be judged on individuality, quality, and finish; showmanship considered.

There will be a **Prospect Market Calf Class** which will consist of all market steers weighing under 850 pounds and market heifers weighing under 800 pounds. These will show as the first class of the show. Placing will be in groups of blue, red, and white, with ribbon awards only. First place animals will not be eligible to show for Grand Champion.

There will be no blocking chutes allowed in the aisles or doorways. On show day, blocking chutes will be allowed in the aisles; however, safety and courtesy to others shall be maintained. Tie-outs may be used by exhibitors. It is the responsibility of those exhibitors using the tie-outs to maintain area while they are using it and then clean it when they are finished. Necktie may be used to reserve one numbered space per animal after 8:00 a.m. Monday morning before fair opens.

All feed and water will be removed from Market Beef to be sold at the 4-H Auction by 10:00 p.m. on Sunday.

Each eligible animal must return to the show ring for championship drive or forfeit ALL premium money for that animal.

1st: \$9 * 2nd: \$8 * 3rd: \$7 * 4th: \$6 * 5th: \$5 * 6th: \$3

*7th-10th: \$2

The daily rate-of-gain for each animal will be posted. Special ribbons will be issued to the members exhibiting the top 15% market animals with the highest rate-of-gain.

Warren County Produced Eligibility Statement: (copies available from fair secretary) Animals must be born, produced and raised in Warren County. Producer must be a resident of Warren County. Animal must be purchased directly from Warren County producers. Form due the last day of fair entry week to be eligible for WCP ribbon.

4-H and FFA Market Heifers

Market heifers will be divided by weight into approximately equal-sized classes regardless of breed characteristics. Any heifer weighing under 800 pounds will show in the **Prospect Market Calf Class**.

Market heifers will show as last division of the day.

All Warren County Fair 4-H and FFA Exhibitors will wear the official Warren County Fair exhibitor t-shirt tucked in, and in its original form while exhibiting. (Exception-horse exhibitors)

Market heifers will be divided by weight into approximately equal-sized classes regardless of breed characteristics. Any heifer weighing under 800 lbs. will show in Prospect Market Calf Class.

Market heifers will show last division of the day.

A Champion Market Heifer will be selected and she is eligible to compete for Grand Champion Market Beef (Final Drive).

A Champion Warren County Produced Market Heifer will be selected. The owner of the animal who has a timely signed affidavit on file is eligible for recognition.

4-H and FFA Market Beef

Market beef entries are open to registered, papered, tattooed animals.

Beef: Market Beef:

- 1. Market steer breeds to follow ISF rules and require registration papers and tattoos. If an animal has no registration or tattoo they will show as a crossbred by February 1.
- 2. Registered steers must present the original registration papers at fair check-in time. No copies or electronic versions (cell phones, tablets etc.) will be accepted. Steer without necessary registration papers will be shown in the crossbred division. Tattoos will be checked. No illegible or fresh tattoos will be allowed to show. Re-tattooing at the show will not be permitted.
- 3. Physical registration papers and tattoo will be checked at fair weigh-in while animal is in the chute.
- 4. The division breakdowns will follow each National Breed Association's Rules. The AOB division will only be utilized for registered animals with a breed not listed.

Animals with unknown parentage (purchased at a sale barn, through a livestock buyer, etc.) must be identified on the Market Beef Identification Form as crossbred regardless of breed characteristics shown. Any animal entered in a breed class, which is determined not eligible or which has been disqualified for any reason by its breed's national association, will be shown as a crossbred, provided an additional \$6 entry fee is paid.

All Warren County Fair 4-H and FFA Exhibitors will wear the official Warren County Fair exhibitor t-shirt tucked in, and in its original form while exhibiting. (Exception-horse exhibitors).

Order of showing: Angus, AOB, Charolais, Chianina, Gelbvieh, Herefords, Limousin, Maine-Anjou, Miniature Hereford, Red Angus, Salers, Shorthorns, Shorthorn Plus, Simmental, Crossbreds and Market Heifers.

NEW - All Breeds remain eligible to show by breed, however if no more than two animals are checked-in at the Fair, those animals will be moved to AOB.

Market Beef will show by breed for Champion. Each division will complete all classes and pick champion before moving to next division.

Can also show in the Performance Beef Show if properly entered.

A Champion Warren County Produced Market Beef will be selected. Owner of the animals who have a timely signed affidavit on file are eligible for recognition.

Grand Champion Market Beef or Reserve Grand Champion Market Beef are eligible to attend the showdown.

If neither can attend there will be no representative. The top 5 market beef will be selected.

Beef Showmanship Rules

(No entry fee required)

- Showmanship classes are limited to currently enrolled 4-H and FFA members.
- Beef Showmanship classes will be held at the end of the Market Beef Show.
- All Beef Exhibitors are eligible to enter Beef showmanship classes.
- Exhibitors must use their own animal that was exhibited during and before the show that day.
- All showmanship exhibitors must wear their respective 4-H or FFA show shirts.
- Exhibitors are eligible to enter the classes by bringing their eligible animal to the Beef Show staging area when the classes are announced.
- Divisions are based on school grades on September 1 of the previous calendar year.
- Divisions are:
 - a. Junior: Grades 4-6
 - Intermediate: Grades 7-9
 - Senior: Grades 10-12
- A Champion and Reserve Champion will be named in each division.
 - a. Ribbons, Trophies and Plaques will be awarded as available.
- 10
- An Exhibitor may compete/win in each age division more than once. An Exhibitor may compete in any, and all, Showmanship classes, i.e., Beef, Swine, Sheep, Dairy, Goats, Horses, etc., in which they have exhibited an eligible animal during current fair and meet all other requirements.

4-H/FFA Advanced Cattle Feeding

Superintendents: Brandon Reynolds, Kevin Smith, Jim Nicholls, Tom Nicholls,

- The project will be supervised by the Advanced Cattle Feeding Project Advisory Committee. 1.
- One or more FFA/4-H'ers together may own three animals for the project, or one or more 4-H'ers may have a partnership project with each FFA/4-H'er owning up to three animals in the project. Each owner may designate one calf from the pen to be shown as an individual in the Market Beef classes at the County Fair. The calf must be weighed and tagged, with both a tag designated for the pen project and the Market Beef project, and the animal is to be fed with the other animals in the pen project. All animals must be dehorned and males must be castrated.
- Calves must be ear tagged and weighed on the Warren County fairground's scales on the scheduled dates. A weigh ticket on each pen and on each calf identified as an individual will be on file in the Extension Office. Advanced Cattle Feeder animals must be identified on the Market Beef Identification Report (4-H-106-bi). The identification form must be turned in to the Extension Office by February 1st. I.D.'S postmarked or placed in the Extension Office drop-box on or before February 1 will be accepted.
- Calves are to be purchased on or before weigh-in. Feed records are to begin on the day of weigh-in.
- Advanced Cattle Feeders partnership or independent must be fed separate from other pens, individual market Beef, or other livestock on the farm to be able to be exhibited at the County Fair.
- Accurate records of feed and other costs must be kept. The monthly feed record sheet will be provided and must be sent to the Extension Office or Brandon Reynolds by the 10th following --examples January records are to be in by February 10, etc. Doing this will influence the points received for accuracy in the Proficiency Contest.
- A scheduled visit will be made with each member in January or February by the Advisory Committee. Purpose of the visit will be to evaluate the project at the beginning. Other unannounced visits may be made during the year.
- Members may compete for three separate awards:
 - 1.) A ribbon and money award based on the "on-the-hoof" placing at the County Fair. The pens will be shown by the designated owner/
 - 2.) Advanced Cattle Feeding proficiency Award, based on the Advisory Committee's evaluation of each member's management practices, interviews, records, feed efficiency, rate-of-gain, cost-of-gain, and a written examination on knowledge of the cattle feeding industry, market trends and member's own operation.
 - 3.) Top Rate-of-Gain pen will be awarded the Marion Nicholls Memorial plaque. Individual cattle shown in the Market Beef division will not be eligible for rate-of-gain in the Market Beef division.
- To be eligible for awards, all calves enrolled in the project must be weighed in and exhibited at the County Fair. Animals in the pens must average 850 pounds to be shown. An animal identified as an individual must weigh 850 pounds to be shown in the market Beef classes. They need not be sold if members feel the animals are not yet ready for market.
- 10. Prior to exhibiting at the County Fair, a time will be selected for members to meet with the Advisory Committee for a record analysis and the written examination. Members must have up-to-date records on feed and all other costs at this time.
- 11. In order to assure uniformity in figuring feed costs, the Advisory Committee may establish an index. If copies of receipts for expenses are turned in with feed records they will be used.

12. Pen of Three (advanced cattle feeders) calves entered as individuals will not be eligible for the Market Beef Rate-of-Gain. The Advanced Cattle Feeders will post rate-of-gain winners with the show sheet.

- Entries are open to market steer and heifers that are exhibited in the 4-H and FFA Market steer and heifer classes and Advanced Cattle Feeders class.
- 2. Exhibitors may enter **only one** of their animals into the carcass contest. The carcass class is open to the Advanced Feeders division first, with one animal eligible per pen. Then the carcass contest will be filled on a first-come, first-serve basis.
- 3. There will be an informational meeting prior to Weigh-In that will be posted in the cattle barn.
 - a. Details of the formulas and scoring tables used to determine quality and yield grades along with grid-out values will be available. Also, all associated costs involved will be discussed and available.
- 4. Exhibitors must make entry into the carcass show and designate which division they will compete in at fair entry time. Entry limit of 12.

Performance Market Beef

Division 1, Class 1

This program emphasizes the exhibitor's ability to select and raise cattle which will be evaluated on the components of rate-of-gain, visual appraisal and ultrasound carcass. Animals in this division will be ultrasound evaluated at weigh-in. The images are sent to the CUP Lab in Ames where they are evaluated for current market value and placed by the CUP Lab.

Performance beef will be shown in the market beef show as well as the performance class. Class size limited to 10 head by weight. If more than 10 head are entered they will be broke into two classes. A champion will be selected and sold during the sale as a Champion in the Performance division. A market animal from the Advanced Cattle Feeder pen may show in this Performance division if it is eligible for the market beef show.

Overall placing will be based on:

Rate-of-Gain Component: (40%): Rate of gain will be calculated from beginning weigh-in to fair weigh-in on a per day feed basis.

Visual appraisal (Live Show) Component (20%): Class size limited to 10 head per class. If more than 10 head are entered classes will be broken by weight.

Ultrasound Carcass Component (40%): Ultrasound data will be collected at the fair. Cattle will be evaluated on estimates of USDA yield and quality grades which determine carcass value. These grades will be estimated by using ultrasounds to measure 12th rib fat thickness, ribeye area and marbling score.

Champion will be placed in sale order after market beef champions. Other entries will be sold by placing like other market beef show.

4-H and FFA Breeding Beef

- * All Breeding/Market Cattle must be on grounds and checked-in by 9:00 a.m. Cattle may arrive Tuesday night.
- 1. General Livestock rules and regulations apply in the division.
- 2. All heifers shown in the breed classes will follow the breed classification requirements of their respective breed associations. Breeds shown alphabetically.
- 3. All registered and commercial heifers must be tattooed and number recorded by May 15. Calfhood vaccination tattoo is not acceptable identification. Registered heifers must have a date of birth, tattoo and registry number of animal in (4-H online) by May 15. If any information is missing in (4-H online), the animal will show as commercial heifer. If the heifer is ID'd as commercial she cannot be switched to a breed class. Heifer cannot be changed after being ID'd.
- 4. A class for commercial breeding heifers is available for non-registered breeding heifers (4-H and FFA only.)
- 5. Heifers shown in this division cannot be shown in any Market Beef Class.

- Registration and ear tattoos will be checked on all purebred and commercial heifers as they go through the chute. Original registration paper MUST be provided (no copies or faxes will be accepted). Applications for registrations will not be accepted.
- All Breeding Beef will be checked-in on Wednesday immediately following the weigh-in of the Market Beef. Tattoos and registration papers will be inspected.
- Classes in each breed will be determined after all entries are in and based on total number shown. As nearly as practical, classes will be set at no more than 8 head, based on birthdate.
- 9. The youngest class will be shown first with the heifers put in order of age as the class starts with the youngest animal first.
- 10. Breeding heifers will be divided into divisions and shown in alphabetical order.
- 11. Entries will be placed numerically by birthdate.
- 12. NEW All Breeds remain eligible to show by breed, however if no more than two animals are checked-in at the Fair, those animals will be moved to AOB.
- 13. A Supreme Breeding Heifer Champion and Reserve Champion will be selected from the champion of each breed shown in the 4-H and FFA Breeding Heifer Show. Three honorable mention awards will be presented (3rd, 4th, 5th Overall).
- 14. Each individual exhibitor is limited to:
 - a. A maximum of six (6) animals in this department.
 - b. A maximum of three (3) heifers in the beef heifer and produce classes combined.
 - c. A maximum of three (3) beef cows.

In the produce classes, entries are open to beef heifers that were dropped by a dam that has been enrolled by the club member in the beef heifer project. Animals entered in the produce classes may NOT be entered in any other 4-H class. Winner of produce will be named champion produce female. Winner will be eligible for Champion 4-H heifer of that breed.

- 14. Order of showing: Aberdeen, Aberdeen Percentage, American Blue, Angus, Charolais, Charolais Composite, Chianina, Gelbvieh, Gelbvieh Balancer, Horned Hereford, Polled Hereford, Limousin, Lim-Flex, Maine-Anjou, Maintainner, Maine-Angus, Miniature Hereford (horned and polled), Red Angus, Foundation Red Angus, Salers, Shorthorn, Shorthorn Plus, Simmental, Foundation Simmental, Simbrah, South Devon, AOB, Commercial. All breeds remain eligible to show by breed, however, if no more than two animals are checked-in at the Fair. those animals will move to AOB.
- 15. No uses of paint or coloring agents are allowed. Top 3 animals will be toweled at the completion of the class. Champion and Reserve of each division will be toweled. Any animal showing evidence of painting or coloring agent will be disqualified. If any animal is disqualified, the remaining animals move up one place.
- 16. Cattle are not allowed in horse barns or stalls.
- 17. A Champion Warren County Produced Breeding Heifer will be selected. Owner of the animal who have a timely signed affidavit on file are eligible for recognition.
- 18. Top 5 Breeding Heifers will be selected.
- 19. Animals must be in their assigned stalls until superintendents have checked the animals in. Do not go to tieouts until checked-in and released by superintendent.
- 20. Cannot enter AOB unless breed (division) is not listed.

- Calves are to be shown at halter. Class may be split if numbers warrant, according to age of exhibitor and number of calves in each group. The Superintendent may divide or combine the number of entries.
- Judging will be on the following:
 - (1) what 4-H'er has learned about the care and raising of the calf,
 - (2) the fitting and showing (according to beef or dairy guidelines) with emphasis on what the 4-H'er has learned,
 - (3) the general health of the calf and the knowledge of the 4-H'er about this area, and
 - (4) the completed record sheet.

4-H and FFA Dairy Goat

Superintendents: Renea Loomis, Ryan Loomis

Check-in will be at 7:00-7:30 a.m. Tuesday. Market Dairy Goats and Breeding Goats must be inspected by a vet or vet appointed representative checked **before** leaving trailer. Do not stall any market, breeding, meat or dairy goats before they are inspected. Scales CLOSE at 9:00 a.m. Goat, Sheep exhibitors meet with the Superintendents to review show bill in barn. No Changes to show program after 9:00 p.m on Wednesday.

No full body shavings on any goats. Will allow shaving or trimming of Dairy Goat udders prior to show.

Please read the "General Rules and Regulations" and "Rules for Livestock". Kids may be born up until June 1 of last year, if the dam is entered as a project. Kids must be entered on the Dairy Goat Identification Form by May 15 of current year. Tattoos must be placed by May 15.

All breeds will show together in their respective age classes. The base date for computing age of goats in all classes will be the date of the show. If more than 12 animals are entered in any one class, it will be divided into equal classes according to the age of the animals.

No fresh tattoos will be allowed at the Warren County Fair. If the goat cannot have an ear tattoo, a tail tattoo will be required. All dairy goats are required to have tattoos and corresponding registration papers. Registration papers can include papers stamped by the American Dairy Goat Association. A copy of registration papers must be provided at check-in meeting the night before the show. The tattoo on the registration papers must correspond to the tattoo on the entered animal. If the animal is not registered, it will be required to attend sheep and goat weigh-ins to be tagged.

Only females may be shown. Each member may exhibit a maximum of six goats (any combination of meat, breeding meat doe or dairy with 6 being total number). All goats must have been dehorned to be shown. The base date for computing the age of goats in all classes will be the date of the show.

Milk out time will be at discretion of the exhibitor.

All sexually intact goats must be identified with an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag or by an official registered tattoo. **NOTE:** Please see page 3 rule #5 of Code of Ethics.

Exhibitors and animals must stay within exhibition area. Animals are not allowed in other species areas or parking lot. Lambs and goats may be walked around the sheep and goat barn only.

All fans, electrical appliances and extension cords used in the sheep and goat barn must have safe wiring and must be in safe operating condition. Superintendents have the right to decide if any fan, electrical appliance, or cord is safe and has the right to request that the use of the fan or electrical appliance be discontinued immediately if it does not meet these standards.

Check-in will be at 7:00-7:30 a.m. Tuesday. Market and Breeding goats must be inspected by a vet or vet appointed representative checked **before** leaving trailer. Do not stall any market, breeding, dairy, or meat goats before they are inspected. Animals will be inspected by a licensed veterinarian before leaving the trailer. If animals can't be thoroughly examined, you will be asked to unload for inspection. All blankets/tubes must be removed for vet inspection and weigh-ins. Scales CLOSE at 9:00 a.m. Goat, Sheep exhibitors meet with the Superintendents to review show bill in barn. No changes to show program after 9:00 p.m. on Wednesday. *Please read the "General Rules and Regulations" and "Rules for Livestock"*.

Any meat goat showing evidence of contagious diseases will be unable to be shown. Disqualified meat goats must be removed from the barn and Fairgrounds immediately. Any goat found to have external parasites will be disqualified and exhibitor must remove it from the premises immediately.

Exhibitors are expected to care for their meat goats in an acceptable manner. No muzzles allowed. Bracing is allowed, however all goats must have four feet on the floor in the show ring at all times. Lifting feet off the ground or placing them on any support or altered ring surface is not acceptable. Exhibitors will receive one warning if they are found lifting or slapping goats. Second offenses will result in automatic exhibitor disqualification from the show.

Exhibitors and animals must stay within exhibition area. Animals are not allowed in other species areas or parking lot. Lambs may be walked around the sheep and goat barn only.

All meat goats must have been weighed and eartagged according to Warren County 4-H rules and policies.

Each 4-H'er may ID at weigh-in 6 meat goats. Each member may exhibit a maximum of six goats (any combination of meat, breeding meat does or dairy with 6 being total number). NOTE: Please see page 3 rule #5 of Code of Ethics.

All market meat goats will be weighed and checked for appropriate county identification during check-in. Any evidence of tampering with the official 4-H and FFA tags will be scrutinized. No reweighs will be allowed.

Weight Limit: All goats must weigh a minimum of 50 pounds. Any weight below 50 pounds will show in a Prospect Meat Goat Class and will not sell. These will show as the first class of the show. Placings will be in groups of blue, red, and white, with ribbon awards only. First place animals will not be eligible to show for Grand Champion. 4-H Market Meat goat will be divided into divisions by weight.

Age: Wethers must have kid teeth in normal positions at time of check-in, any wether having lost any kid teeth will be disqualified.

Horns: Exhibitors will be required to have horns tipped blunt on all goats before arrival on the grounds. Removal of horns on grounds is NOT permitted.

Hair: All meat goats must be uniformly clipped with 3/8 inch length of hair or less above the knee and hock joints to include the head, excluding the tail, prior to arrival on the grounds. ALL MEAT GOATS SHOULD ARRIVE ON THE WARREN COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS CLIPPED AND SHOW READY.

Fitting allowed.

There will be no coloring agent, paint, or powdering agent used on any goat. Injection, drenching, or application of a substance per rectum is prohibited. The application of any substance to or near the tail or anus is prohibited. Animals showing any signs of being unethically fitted will be disqualified. There must be a licensed veterinarian present if a goat is in need of drenching.

No icing, alcohol or artificial coloring of goats at any time while on the fair grounds. No "cool blue" or equivalent is allowed.

ENTRY FORM: Copy of the Livestock Identification Report for meat goats, 4-H-106-LS, Iowa 4-H Market Meat goat Verification Form for market meat goat, must accompany entry forms with all required information included on the form and submitted to county extension office by May 15.

The registration fee is \$3.00 per head and must be paid with entry. No refunds.

All meat goats must be penned in the assigned pens.

All 4-H Meat goat exhibitors must be certified through the YQCA Program.

No drugs or medicants of any kind may be administered at the Fair except by the order of the official Fair veterinarian. Uses of any non-approved substances are strictly forbidden. All animals will be subject to random chemical testing and analysis of saliva, urine, blood, other excretions or tissues to determine whether a substance or drug has been induced or whether a substance or drug has been introduced to interfere with the testing procedure. Positive tests, except for residues which are within FDA tolerance levels, will result in forfeiture of ribbons, trophies, premiums and sale price. Exhibitors and their family will be barred from participation in future Warren County Fairs.

No coaching will be allowed from or near the ring. This includes verbal or nonverbal coaching. Violators will be escorted from the barn for the duration of the show.

If stalls are not cleaned by 3:00 p.m. on sale day, premium money will not be allocated.

Rate-of-Gain: Rate-of-Gain will be figured on each market goat and special ribbons will be given to the top 15%. Must be weighed on Warren County scales at time, place, and date designated to be eligible for Rate-of-Gain.

Warren County Produced: A Champion Warren County Produced Meat Goat will be selected. Owner of the animals who have a timely signed affidavit on file are eligible for recognition.

Warren County Produced Eligibility Statement: (copies available from fair secretary) Animals must be born, produced and raised in Warren County. Producer must be a resident of Warren County. Animal must be purchased directly from Warren County producers. Form due the last day of fair entry week to be eligible for WCP ribbon.

The Grand Champion animal will be eligible to go to the South Central Showdown, if they are unable then the Reserve Champion will be eligible.

All breeding meat does must walk across the scales and be tagged/tattoo or retinal scan/tattoo at weigh-in with an official FFA or 4-H tag and scrapies tag or registration tattoo prior to May 15. No fresh tattoos will be allowed at the Warren County Fair. Failed retinal scan will result in no premiums awarded for any goat classes and disqualification. Grand/Reserve Grand Breeding Meat Doe will be retinal scanned if there is only a tattoo visibly present, at the conclusion of the show. Birth dates should be listed on the Iowa 4-H meat goat verification form (4-H-106).

Each 4-H'er may ID at weigh-in 6 breeding meat does. Each member may exhibit a maximum of six goats (any combination of meat, breeding meat doe or dairy with 6 being total number). **NOTE: Please see page 11 rule #5 of Code of Ethics.**

All entries must be taught to lead. All breeding does must have their coats clean and their hooves must be properly cleaned and trimmed. Horns will be allowed, but tipped and blunted. Removal of horns on grounds is NOT permitted. ALL BREEDING MEAT DOES SHOULD ARRIVE ON THE WARREN COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS SHOW READY. All goats must be penned in assigned pens. The application of any substance to or near the tail or anus is prohibited. Animals showing any signs of being unethically fitted will be disqualified. There must be a licensed veterinarian present if a goat is in need of drenching.

No tagging day. Exhibitors will be responsible for obtaining tags from extension office to tag their own swine. Enter info into 4-H online by May 15th. Superintendents will help with tagging if needed.

If a Swine loses a tag: re-tagging procedure will apply. Please contact the Extension Office for further details.

General Swine Rules

To be eligible for exhibition in Market Swine Show, market swine must weigh at least 210-310 pounds at the time of weigh-ins. All swine, Market and Breeding, will be weighed only once, unless there is an obvious mechanical problem with the scale. The weigh-in weight will also be the official sale weight. Swine must have been farrowed on or after January 1st of current year.

Due to the limited number of pens available and the amount of swine entered, the following rules must be followed:

- 1. Each exhibitor will be allowed to show a maximum of 6 swine, which can be any combination of crossbred or purebred market or breeding animal.
- 2. Each exhibitor should be prepared to pen 3 swine per pen.
- 3. The swine superintendents will have the right to reallocate pens among exhibitors if there are pens that are not being utilized by exhibitors to the extent of three swine per pen. The number of pens that each exhibitor is assigned will be at the discretion of the Swine Superintendents.

Superintendents will have final approval and can dismiss swine from fair and/or sale.

Non-Terminal show animals that are not going through the sale must be designated within an hour of the show being completed. The exhibitor must to tell Superintendents where hog is going after it leaves Fairgrounds. Those animals that are not going to be in the sale will be released at 9:00 p.m. Sunday night. Animals must be removed by 6:00 a.m. Monday morning if not going through sale.

A maximum of (6) swine may be shown by each exhibitor. These can be any combination with a maximum of 2 swine in any class. Each exhibitor may exhibit a total of 6 swine of any combination in the Crossbred Market Divisions or Purebred Market Division, or Breeding Gilts. These swine may be barrows or gilts or any combination of each. If entries exceed the capacity of the swine facility, the number of swine per exhibitor may be adjusted accordingly.

Scale tickets will not leave the scale area.

County Fair Weigh-In/Check-In:

Check-in/weigh-in for all swine will be Tuesday of the County Fair starting at 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. Your 4-H club and/or FFA Chapter will be given a time to bring in your swine. Swine must be vet checked before leaving trailer. Swine will be weighed after vet inspection. The vet inspection form must be turned in at the scale.

- 1. Superintendent will verify ear notches and tags with 4-H Online.
- 2. Tags and ear notches MUST match swine information that was entered in 4-H Online before May 15th of current year. Swine will not cross scale until paperwork is complete and submitted: Drug affidavit and original purebred registration forms, and scale ticket filled out. If no purebred papers are present, the Swine can show down to crossbred. Registration papers must be in their original paper form and in the family name or the youth's name.
- 3. ANY DISCREPANCIES BETWEEN THE SWINE'S EAR NOTCHES AND TAGS AND 4-H ONLINE INFORMATION AT WEIGH-IN WILL RESULT IN DISQUALIFICATION. YOUR SWINE WILL BE MARKED WITH LIVESTOCK PAINT AND WILL NOT BE ALLOWED OFF THE TRAILER. IT WILL NOT BE WEIGHED. THE ANIMAL WILL GO HOME TUESDAY NIGHT.

Fair entries will be made by number of swine and by entering a department division class with ear tag, ear notch and premise ID for each possible entry. A Breeding Gilt entry must designate ear tag, ear notch and premise ID.

There shall be no coloring agents or powder used on swine. The use of either is strictly prohibited. Swine found in violation will not be shown or sold and if discovered during the show, you will be dismissed from the class. If discovered after you have shown, you will be disqualified and will not be allowed to show in any more classes, including the final drive.

Quarantined animals or animals from quarantined herds cannot be exhibited.

HF556 also says that the sponsor of the exhibition will need to submit a report to the IDALS (Iowa Dept. of Ag and Land Stewardship) on a form developed by IDALS stating where swine came from and where they will return after exhibition so that is some additional responsibility for fair board, Swine superintendents, fair vet, etc.

Warren County Produced Eligibility Statement (copies available from fair secretary): Animals must be born, produced and raised in Warren County. Producer must be a resident of Warren County. Animal must be purchased directly from Warren County Producers. Form must be completed and turned in online June 1st-July 1st or obtain a paper from and turn in to the Fair Secretary between June 1st-July 1st.

All Warren County Fair 4-H and FFA Exhibitors will wear the official Warren County Fair exhibitor t-shirt tucked in, and in its original form while exhibiting.

Market Specific Rule

The buyers of the market swine strongly encourage a voluntary 14-day withdrawal of any drug that has a withdrawal time limit.

The Market Swine, will be divided by weight into approximately equal classes.

All Market division swine weighing 210-310 pounds can be sold at the auction and sent directly to a slaughter establishment from the fair. No swine can be sold in the Auction that have not been exhibited.

Market Gilts cannot be shown as Breeding Gilts.

Per the Iowa 4-H Code of Conduct for Youth and Families and the FFA Good Conduct Policy and Code of Show Ring Ethics exhibitors, exhibitor's family members and all other person(s) will treat others with respect, courtesy and consideration. This includes all superintendents and volunteers. Any violations will be subject to dismissal and/or disqualification.
- 3. Check-in and vet checks will be at 7:30-8:30 a.m. on Tuesday. All sheep are not to leave the trailer before being inspected by the official fair vet, or official vet appointed representative. If animals cannot be thoroughly examined, animals must be unloaded for inspection. All blankets, tubes and leg wraps must be removed for official vet inspection and weigh-ins. Weigh-ins will be from 7:30-9:00 a.m. All market, breeding, purebred and open class sheep must cross the scale before being stalled.
- 4. Warren County produced animals must be designated and all paperwork must be turned in by the deadline.
- 5. All fans, electrical appliances and extension cords used in the sheep and goat barn must have safe wiring and must be in safe operating condition. Superintendents have the right to decide if any fan, electrical appliance or cord is safe and have the right to request that the use of the fan or electrical appliance be discontinued immediately if it does not meet these standards.
- 6. All sexually intact sheep must have an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag.
- 7. Exhibitors are to care for their animals in an acceptable manner. No muzzles allowed.
- 8. No icing, use of alcohol, cool blue, or equivalent. Only tap water may be applied to animals on show day. No ice allowed in spray bottles or buckets. When animals enter the show ring, they must be completely dry.
- 9. Any abusive care including slapping or excessive modification of animals is prohibited. All lambs must have all four feet on the ground in the show ring at all times. Exhibitors will receive one warning for lifting or slapping lambs. A second offense will result in disqualification at the discretion of the superintendents.
- 10. No artificial coloring.
- 11. No drenching or administering medication to lambs at any time while on the Warren County Fairgrounds by an exhibitor, and exhibitor's family member or other person(s). Sheep superintendents must be notified of any necessary medication for an animal. A licensed vet, superintendent and the exhibitor must be present if a lamb is in need of any medication or drenching.
- 12. All lambs must be slick-sheared before weigh-in at the Warren County Fair. Any animal not slick-sheared will be sent home. Electric trimmer will be allowed for fitting prior to the show.
- 13. Side on tents and canopies near or around the sheep and goat barn are prohibited.
- 14. Goat and sheep exhibitors will meet the superintendents to review the show bill on Wednesday evening. No changes will be made to the show program after 9:00 p.m. on Wednesday.
- 15. An individual animal cannot be exhibited in both the open and 4-H/FFA show. The exhibitor must choose one or the other.
- 16. All Warren County Fair 4-H and FFA exhibitors will wear official Warren County Fair exhibitors t-shirts tucked in and in its original form while exhibiting. (exception: horse exhibitors)
- 17. The sheep show will not be interrupted or stopped for any reason that will prolong the show. This includes any other livestock show occurring at the same time.
- 18. Exhibitors and animals must stay within the exhibition area. Animals are not allowed in other species areas or in the parking lot. Lambs may be walked around the sheep and goat barn only.
- 19. Stall must be cleaned by 3:00 p.m. on sale day. Failure to do so will result in loss of premium money.

Market Lambs

Lambs must be born on or after January 1 of current year. Each member may weigh-in a total of eight, and are limited to entering not more than four at the County Fair. All market sheep must be weighed and eartagged according to 4-H rules and policies. Rate-of-gain will be figured on each lamb, and special ribbons will be given to the top 15%. Must be weighed on Warren County scales at time, place and date designated to be eligible for Rate-of-Gain ribbon. Lambs entered in the Market Lamb classes may not be entered in the Commercial Breeding Ewe or Purebred Sheep classes. Lambs will be weighed and divided by weight into approximately equal classes. Lambs will be weighed only once, and weigh-in weight will be the sale weight. Any lamb weighing 79 pounds or under at weigh-in time will be shown in a Feeder Lamb class and will be awarded ribbons only.

The pen-of-three market lamb class shall consist of three market lambs belonging to one member. Exhibitors may pick a pen of three from their four individual market lambs. The ear tag numbers of each market lamb in the pen-of-three class must be declared prior to being weighed at the fair weigh-in time. The pen-of-three class will be divided into classes of approximately equal weight.

Ram lambs, cryptorchids or sexually intact males will **not** be allowed to show as market lambs.

All sexually intact sheep must have an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag.

Weighing of market lambs will be Tuesday, 7:30 to 8:30 a.m. Any lamb weighing under 92 pounds will not be sold at the Market Lamb Auction.

If stalls are not cleaned by 3:00 p.m. on sale day, premium money will not be allocated.

Both ewe lambs (born on or after January 1 of current year) and yearling ewes that were carried as commercial breeding ewes by the member as a project last year may be exhibited. In addition, members may purchase one yearling ewe by the spring sheep and goat weigh-in and tagging day of the current year. All commercial ewe lambs and yearling ewes must be tagged at the spring weigh-in with an official 4-H or FFA tag. Each member may enroll as many as eight breeding sheep (lambs, yearlings or a combination of both) as projects on the sheep identification form, but are limited to entering no more than a total of four (lambs, yearlings or a combination of both) at the county fair. Commercial ewes must meet the same health requirements as market lambs, yearling ewes or purebred sheep. Any ewes entered in these classes may not be entered in the market lamb or purebred sheep classes. Commercial ewes and yearling ewes will be weighed at the fair and classes will be divided by approximately equal weight. Commercial ewes will not be sold at the Livestock Auction.

Sheep Showmanship

(No entry fee required)

- Showmanship classes are limited to currently enrolled 4-H and FFA members.
- 2. Showmanship classes will be held for both market and breeding sheep exhibitors.
- 3. Showmanship classes will be held during the Sheep show
- 4. All 4-H/FFASheep Exhibitors are eligible to enter Sheep showmanship classes.
- 5. All Showmanship exhibitors must wear their respective 4-H or FFA show shirts.
- 6. Exhibitors must use their own animal that was exhibited during the Sheep show that day.
- 7. Exhibitors are eligible to enter the classes by bringing their eligible animal to the Sheep Show Ring when the classes are announced.

- 8. Divisions are based on school grades as September 1 of the previous calendar year.
- 9. Divisions are: (compete in 1 only)
 - a. Junior: Grades 4-6
 - b. Intermediate: Grades 7-9
 - c. Senior: Grades 10-12

Any exhibitor that has previously won in their age division is eligible to exhibit in the next age division.

- 10. A Champion and Reserve Champion will be named in each division.
 - a. Ribbons, Trophies, and Plaques will be awarded as available.
- 11. An Exhibitor may not win in each age division more than once. Can only move up if won a division.

Please read the "General Rules and Regulations" and "Rules for Livestock."

- 1. Horses, ponies and exhibitors must be on the grounds to check-in by 12:00 noon, Wednesday. Horses and ponies MUST remain on the grounds until Sunday at 9:00 p.m. Animals are not to arrive before 12:00 noon, Tuesday unless requested with superintendant. Any Exhibitor showing in speed event classes only must still check-in by 12:00 noon, Wednesday.
- 2. See the back of the book on page 106 for riding form and hunter hack requirements and forms.
- 3. Each 4-H or FFA member is limited to exhibiting five horse/pony projects of which a max of two may be leased. Leased horses may have completed lease form 4H106c, uploaded into 4-H online. Halter/confirmation class horses must be owned; cannot be leased.
- 4. In accordance to form 4H202 Iowa 4-H livestock Show Requirements: To exhibit in classes in which the primary emphasis of evaluation is the skill level of the 4-H'er, ownership is not required; however, the 4-H'er must take an active role in the care of the animal (includes feeding, cleaning, training, health care, farrier care, exercising, etc.). Horses to be exhibited in conformation (halter) classes must be owned by the 4-H'er or in partnership with a family member. Leased horses may be shown in showmanship and riding or driving classes. If the horse is leased, attach a signed lease agreement (4H106CL) to the identification form.
- 5. In accordance with the Identification guidelines as outlined on form 4H202, if a family includes more 4-H'ers than horses, more than one 4-H'er may identify a horse. However, in this situation a 4-H'er cannot identify more than one horse. Animals identified as part of a 4-H project cannot be identified or exhibited as an FFA project. For further clarification, if a family has multiple horses, depending on the 4-H'er will need to enter separate horses.
- 6. No stallions, older than 12 month of age will be allowed to be shown at the County Fair.
- 7. Exhibitors in English-Type Performance classes are to wear full English attire which consists of a long sleeve light colored shirt, traditional English type breeches, English type jacket and English type riding boot. Horses should also be shown in proper English equipment. Whips may be used in English Halter classes as aids with excessive use to be penalized at the judge's option. Helmets and armbands are mandatory. An exhibitor failing to wear an armband will be dropped to the white award group. Whips may be used in English halter classes as aids with excessive use to be penalized at the judges option.
- 8. Exhibitors in Western Halter, English Halter, Performance, and Western Driving are to wear a solid, plain, front button or snap long-sleeved, collared shirt of any color (including white). The following is prohibited: personalized logos or embroidery, zippers, sheer or lace fabric, embellishments or bling of any kind including, but not limited to, sequins, rhinestones, chains, etc. Shirt must be tucked in. Solid dark blue colored riding jeans (without holes), and Western-style boots. Ties are optional. Exhibitors showing in English Halter may also wear English attire as outlined in rule 7. Spurs are optional in performance classes and chaps are prohibited. Exception: 4-H or FFA t-shirts may be worn in timed events. 4-H arm bands are mandatory in all classes and should be worn on the left arm. Helmets are mandatory in all performance classes. See #10. Western style hats are allowed in Western Halter and Showmanship. An exhibitor failing to wear an armband will be dropped to the white award group.
- 9. FFA exhibitors are to wear black or dark blue jeans, white shirt, FFA jacket (optional) and FFA badge or armband as designated by FFA rules. Helmets are mandatory. An exhibitor failing to wear an armband will be dropped to the white award group.
- 10. All exhibitors participating in performance classes must wear an American Society of Testing Materials (ASTM) and Safety Engineering Institute (SEI) approved headgear with chinstrap and properly fitted harness while mounted and riding. Harness must be secured and properly fitted. It is the responsibility of the rider, parent or guardian to see that the headgear worn complies with appropriate safety standards for protective headgear. Any rider violating this rule at any time must immediately be prohibited from further riding until such headgear is in place.
- 11. All exhibitors may wear ASTM/SEI approved headgear in any Halter or Showmanship class without penalty from the judge.
- 12. Anyone riding a horse or pony during the fair either in the arena or on the grounds must wear a helmet and boots.
- 13. The Warren County Fair and the Warren County Extension Service make no representation or warranty, expressed or implied, about any protective headgear as all equestrian sports involve inherent dangerous risk and as no helmet can protect against all foreseeable injuries.
- 14. Whips may be used in English Halter classes as aids with excessive use to be penalized at the judge's option. Bats are allowed in speed events as long as used behind the cinch.
- 15. The regular stall fee, as printed in the Premium List, will include participation in one class. A \$1.00 fee will be charged for each additional class entered
- 16. All exhibitors will be eligible to compete in the showmanship contest. Entries in this contest must be made during Fair entry times.
- 17. No class will be held for more than three minutes after the class has been called and the first horse has entered the arena. However, if equipment changes are necessary between classes, exhibitors must notify the Superintendents (who may, at their discretion, delay calling the next class).
- 18. Only exhibitors and members of the immediate family or local club leader can assist in grooming and fitting animals at the show. Only exhibitors and members of the immediate family may ride the horse/ponies/mule at the show. Outside help may be the basis for disqualification.
- 19. Animals will be placed in purple, blue, red and white award groups.
- 20. A double entry fee will be charged for any changes made after entry week until judges books are complete.
- 21. Unweaned foals must be shown along side their dam. The dam must be handled by another exhibitor, parent or 4-H leader and will not be judged in this class.
- 22. The arena will be open daily from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. for riding with the exception of when shows are in progress. Horses are to be in their stalls at 8:00 p.m. The arena will be available for riding ONLY when a Horse Superintendent is present at the arena for supervision. Times along with the Superintendent overseeing the arena will be posted in the Secretary's office.
- 23. Any rules not addressed in this book can be found in the 4-H Publication, "Rules and Regulation for 4-H Equine Shows in Iowa" (4-H 511C Revised June 2013).
- 24. In the event of injury or illness of a horse during or prior to fair, another horse may be substituted as long as it was listed on the Horse and Pony Identification Form prior to May 15th of that year. Also, a letter or release from the vet will be required.

- 25. Each exhibitor may enter more than one animal in each class during Warren County Fair sign up. However, may only show one animal in each class.
- 26. High Point All Around Exhibitor Award will be awarded at 4-H Family Night.

Handy Horse description from Wikipedia

- A. The rider proceeds from the starting line around both barrels into limed square. Rider must stop in square and stay there five (5) seconds and then cross finish line (animal does not have to stand still; however, timing does not start until animal has reached a complete stop). The judge/superintendent shall signify to the ring steward when the animal has all four hooves in the square. The ring steward shall start timing when he receives the signal from the judge/superintendent and give an audible signal to go to the rider when five (5) seconds have elapsed. If the animal steps on the square once the 5 seconds has started, the animal is disqualified.
- B. When rider hears the "Go" signal, they exit the box and race across the finish line. The judge/superintendent should determine that the animal stays in square.

Keyhole Race description from Wikipedia

The event begins when the horse and rider cross the timing line. The team enters the keyhole at a gallop, then turns in either direction inside the keyhole's circle without stepping over the chalk. The horse and the rider turn as fast as they can in the bulb. The team then exits the keyhole again at a gallop and the time ends once they cross the timing line.

Jumping Figure 8 Barrel Racing

- A. The rider will start prior to the timer line. The rider will proceed across the pole set on the approach to the barrel. The rider has the option of running the figure eight pattern to the left or the right as long as they start with the middle barrel.
- B. The rider must finish the figure 8 pattern with the middle barrel and cross the pole again prior to crossing the timer line.
- C. Disqualification results if the rider touches the barrel with a hand, running off course and turning a barrel the wrong way or knocking the pole from the supports.

MUST BE OWNED BY THE EXHIBITOR OR IN PARTNERSHIP WITH PARENT OR GUARDIAN.

RULES:

- 1. General Livestock Rules and Regulations and General Rules and Regulations apply in this department. Dog Identification
 - a. Entries are open to dogs identified in 4-H Online as 4-H projects by May 15 of the current year that meet the division and class qualifications.
 - b. Each dog must be identified as 4-H OR FFA, not both.
 - c. Immediate family members (siblings/step-siblings) may co-identify the same dog(s) in 4-H.
 - d. Co-identified dogs must be identified separately by each 4-H family member in 4-H online.
 - e. Dogs identified as FFA cannot be co-identified.
 - f. Each dog must enter ONLY one obedience class.
 - g. Each dog is allowed ONLY one entry per class (obedience, rally, agility, showmanship). For example: family member A can show dog in obedience and showmanship, then family member B can show the same dog in rally and agility.
 - h. Rabies certificate number and date vaccinated must be recorded in 4-H online.
- 2. All exhibitors/dogs are highly encouraged to attend 4-H training or private obedience classes and *MUST* compete in obedience to be eligible to compete in agility, rally or showmanship classes.
 - a. Class entries must be reviewed and signed off by a dog project leader prior to Fair entry.
- 3. The county fair dog show is NOT an AKC sanctioned show; while AKC obedience rules have been used as guidelines, class descriptions may differ. To assist with dog show expectations, it is recommended that youth obtain a copy of AKC rules prior to exhibiting.
- 4. CLASS DETERMINATION
 - a. Exhibitor and dog experience in conjunction with show scores from previous county fair will be used to determine class level.
 - b. Years completed is every year dog has been shown plus current year.
 - c. A qualifying score is achieved when a dog and handler earns a minimum of 170 out of 200 points.
 - d. Dogs with qualifying scores must advance to the next class with exception of preferred open and open classes.
- 5. All fee(s) must be paid at time of entry; \$1.00 per class (except showmanship) plus vet fee of \$.50 per dog.
- 6. HEALTH REQUIREMENTS
 - a. Bring copy of current Certificate of Veterinarian Inspection to fair that includes vaccination dates for Rabies (certificate number required), parvo and distemper.
 - b. Any bitch in season or nursing will not be allowed to show.
- 7. HOUSING
 - a. Will not be provided on Fairgrounds; exhibitors should plan to arrive with dogs Wednesday morning.
 - b. *ONLY* dogs exhibiting in the 4-H and FFA dog show are allowed on fairgrounds.
 - c. All dogs must remain in designated areas at all times.
 - d. All dogs will be released upon completion of their classes.
 - e. Wednesday is the *ONLY* day dogs will be allowed on fairgrounds.
- 8. CHECK-IN PROCEDURES exhibitors should report to show ring with dogs beginning at 10:00 a.m. and no later than 11:00 a.m.; process will include verification of class entries, jumping height measurements and veterinarian inspection accompanied by review of Rabies, parvo and distemper vaccinations.
- 9. All dogs must be shown by 4-H or FFA member.
- 10. EXHIBITOR CONDUCT
 - a. No practicing will be allowed in showring.
 - b. Be ready when class is called.
 - c. Exhibitors participating in showmanship and obedience classes must give precedence to showmanship.
 - d. Judges do not have to hold classes for a single exhibitor.
 - e. Do not strike dogs or use any other unnecessary/harsh physical means to discipline dogs while on fairgrounds.
 - f. Baiting is not allowed in obedience and rally classes; any evidence of baiting will result in a severe scoring penalty.
- 11. EXHIBITOR DRESS all 4-H and FFA dog project exhibitors will wear an official Warren County Fair exhibitor t-shirt, tucked in, and in its original form while showing.
- 12. EQUIPMENT
 - a. Tents, canopies, awning, etc. may NOT be set up prior to 7:00 a.m. on show day; all must be removed upon completion of the dog show.
 - b. All dogs must be leashed or crated while waiting for their class to be called.
 - c. Owners are responsible for providing water and food to their dog(s).
 - d. Exhibitors may choose to use choke chains, buckle collars or martingales in obedience classes; show leads are to be used when handling dogs in showmanship classes.
 - e. NO dog will be allowed to show with prong or pinch collars, gentle leaders or harnesses.
 - f. Exhibitors are responsible for providing their own dumb bell as applicable.
 - g. Jumps will be provided by the project; all dogs will be measured at shoulder height (withers) for applicable classes.
 - h. Requests to use additional equipment will be handled on a case by case basis.

- 13. GROOMING EXPECTATIONS All dogs need to be well groomed and evaluated for:
 - a. Free of loose hair, fleas, lice and other insects.
 - b. Toenails of suitable length.
 - c. Ears and eyes clean and clear.
- 14. Any exhibitor/dog team, regardless of age, may choose to participate in Agility at the discretion of the owner; trainers, volunteers, superintendents and fair board members are not responsible/liable for injuries/accidents.
- 15. Dogs cannot be shown in both Dog Show and Pet Show.

Exhibitors check-in with superintendent from 6:00-9:00 p.m., Tuesday. Rabbits may only be penned and check-in during the times listed.

- 1. General Livestock Rules and Regulations and 4-H General Rules and Regulations apply in this department. Please refer to the front of the Fair book for these rules.
- All rabbits (commercial, fancy and market) exhibiting at the Warren County Fair must be properly identified in the Iowa 4-H Online ID system by July 1.
- All rabbits must be permanently identified with a tattoo in the left ear prior to check-in. Please contact Rabbit Superintendent for availability
 of rabbit tattooing workshops prior to fair check-in. Tattoos are not required on entry forms but must match 4-H Online ID System at
 check-in time.
- 4. HEALTH REQUIREMENTS All rabbits will be examined by the official show check-in assistants before being placed in coops Tuesday 6:00-9:00 p.m. Animals must be disease free. Any animal found with any communicable disease(s) will not be allowed to remain in or around the Rabbit Building. The sick animal is the sole responsibility of the owner. Example of communicable diseases include, but are not limited to: nasal or eye discharge, vent disease, ear mites, fleas, fur mites, abscesses or other infections.
- 5. Breed and class determinations must be made at the time the Fair entries are made. A double entry fee will be charged to any changes made after entry week. Any changes made after arrival at the fair may be subject to approval, and may not receive premiums. Exhibitors are responsible for determination of their entries in the proper breeds, varieties and classes for entry. Please refer to the American Rabbit Breeders Association Standard of Perfection (2011-2015) for approved breeds and varieties. Age of animal is based on actual age on show date. Contact Superintendent or Assistant Superintendents with questions.
- 6. All Warren County Fair 4-H and FFA Exhibitors will wear the official Warren County Fair exhibitor t-shirt tucked in, and in its original form while exhibiting. (Exception-horse exhibitors)
- 7. Coops will be provided at the Fairgrounds. Exhibitor must furnish own feed, bedding, food and water containers. Padlocks for coops are encouraged. Exhibitors are responsible for providing and locking their own padlocks if desired. Fans may be provided by exhibitors. Cords must be safely arranged to prevent chewing, tripping or other hazards. Only rabbits that are officially entered may be on the Fairgrounds. Only one rabbit per coop is allowed, except Meat Pens. The coop size is 18"x24". There are a limited number of 24"x24" pens reserved for Giant breeds and Meat Pens.
- 8. Cage decorations are allowed at the discretion of the Superintendent. All decorations must be safe for animals and people. Nothing that can be chewed or will interfere with judging or viewing will be allowed. No balloons will be allowed.
- 9. Does with nursing litters and juniors still nursing, are not permitted to exhibit.
- 10. Exhibitors are limited to making two entries per class, per breed and variety for Standardbred Classes (Fancy and Commercial). Exhibitors are allowed to enter two animals in the following classes Pet, Meat Pen, Fryer and Roaster. The maximum number of animals per exhibitor is 24, with meat pen to count as 3 animals.
- 11. Rabbits cannot be shown in both the Rabbit Show and the Pet Show.

Market Rabbit Classification

A Market Champion and Reserve Market Champion will be selected from the Champion Meat Pen, Champion Single Fryer and Champion Roaster.

Market rabbit classes focus on the commercial production qualities of rabbits. Many breeds will meet these requirements. Please refer to the ARBA Standard of Perfection (currently dated) for more information.

Tattoos are not necessary on entry form, but will be provided at check-in.

Common disqualifications include; white toenails on colored animals, overweight for breed standard, non-recognized breed (ie: Velveteen Lop) or variety. Refer to the ARBA Standard of Perfection (2011-2015) for more information.

Pet: This class allows crossbred animals. Tattos are not necessary on entry form, but will be provided at check-in. All breeds will be judged together, but separated by sex and age.

Market Meat Rabbit

Division 4

These rabbits can be purebred or crossbred.

Class Number:

- Meat Pen Meat pen will consist of three rabbits of the same breed and variety. The age limit is not over 10 weeks of age; minimum weight of 3.5 pounds, maximum weight of 5.5 pounds. This division allows crossbred rabbits; however, they must be of the same variety. Each exhibitor may enter two meat pens. Max pen weight is 16.5lbs.
- Single Fryer Single Fryer consists of one rabbit not over 10 weeks of age; minimum weight of three pounds, maximum weight of five pounds. This division allows crossbred rabbits. The fryer MAY BE pulled from the Meat Pen. (Note this is not allowed at the Iowa State Fair 4-H Rabbit Show) Each exhibitor may enter two Single Fryers.
- Roaster Roaster consists of one rabbit under 6 months of age; minimum weight five pounds, maximum weight of eight pounds. This division allows crossbred rabbits. Roasters MAY NOT be exhibited in any other class at the Warren County Fair show. Example: You may show a Californian Junior buck in the Standard bred class or the Roaster class, not both. Each Exhibitor may enter two Roasters.

4 Stewer - All rabbits entered in this class must be six months of age and over; minimum weight eight pounds. This division allows crossbred rabbits. Stewers MAY NOT be exhibited in any other class at the Warren County Fair show. Example: You may show a Californian Senior Buck in the Standard Bred Class or the Stewer Class, not both. Each Exhibitor may enter two Stewers.

POSTER CLASS

Educational Exhibits and Informational Classes: Pre-Entry is not required, no premiums will be paid. The exhibits will be displayed in the rabbit barn for public viewing. Awards and Prizes will be given; sponsored by Warren County Rabbit Committee.

Posters: Poster must be 22 inches by 28 inches in size. Each exhibitor may enter one poster in each class of Animal Science or ARBA Breed(s). Label the back of the exhibit with your name, club, and all sources of information. ARBA Breed(s) - any poster focusing on a breed or breeds of rabbits. Animal Science – any topic related to rabbits, that is not focused on a breed(s).

Breed Identification: A fun educational quiz about which breeds of rabbits are on display at the fair. This will be completed Friday evening. Time will be announced.

An informal, educational Rabbit Showmanship workshop will be held each day during the Fair. Check-in information in barn and at check-in.

Showmanship Division

- 1. Showmanship classes do not require pre entry; sign up is day of show.
- 2. The 4-H Rabbit Showmanship Score Sheet will be used by each exhibitor. A copy of this form is available at the Extension Office, upon request of the Iowa State 4-H Office or at this web site: www.extension.iastate.edu/4-H/projects/rabbit.
- 3. Exhibitors must exhibit at least one rabbit in this year's 4-H/FFA Rabbit Show at the Warren County Fair to be eligible to compete in showmanship.
- 4. Exhibitors may only win the Champion Showmanship Award once per age group. They may still compete and receive the highest score, but will not receive the Champion Award. Exhibitors must compete in the appropriate age group, or Novice, only for first year exhibitors.

An informal, educational Rabbit Showmanship workshop will be held each day during the Fair. Check-in information in barn and at check-in.

All rules for Rabbit Department apply to Cavy entries, including the following:

- 1. Each exhibitor may enter two cavies per class, per breed and variety up to a maximum of 10 cavies.
- 2. It is recommended that cavies are ear tagged, but not required to exhibit at the Warren County Fair. All cavies must be identified on the Fair entry form by Breed and Class Number.
- 3. Breed and class determinations must be made at the time the Fair entries are made. A double entry fee will be charged to any changes made after entry week. Any changes made after arrival at the fair may be subject to approval, and may not receive premiums. Exhibitors are responsible for determination of their entries in the proper breeds, varieties and classes for entry. Please refer to the American Rabbit Breeders Association Standard of Perfection (2011-2015) for approved breeds and varieties. Age of animal is based on actual age on show date. Cavies will be entered and judged according to the A.R.B.A. Standard of Perfection. There will also be a Pet class for cavies that do not meet the breed Standards.
- 4. Any Cavy showing evidence of the following condition at anytime during the Fair will not be allowed to remain on the fairgrounds. Abscesses, Cold-Nasal Discharge, Mange, Dandruff or scale at base of hair, Mites, Lice, or Ticks, Runny Eyes, Other health problem that may endanger cavy or other exhibits.
- 5. Cavy cages are NOT available. The exhibitor is responsible for bringing their own cage(s), feed and water containers and bedding. A cage table will be provided.

Refer to A.R.B.A. Standard of Perfection at the Extension Office, or with a Cavy breeder that shows cavies, or superintendant for the information that would place your cavies in any PET CAVY classes (ie. white toenails on a colored cavy; variety (color) not recognized by A.R.B.A.)

Awards will be given for Best of Breed, Best Opposite Sex, Best In Show and Reserve In Show and Best Pet Cavy.

Cavy Showmanship will be conducted by the Official Judge and placings given at their discretion. An Award will be given for Champion Cavy Showmanship.





4-H and FFA Poultry

Superintendent: Marty Overmann, Jason Fantz The 4-H and FFA poultry show will be held on Saturday at 1:00 p.m.

- 1. Production and Market pens are limited to one entry per class.
- 2. An entry fee of \$1.50 per bird must accompany entry or they will not be accepted. A service charge of \$.25 per bird will be assessed to cover veterinarian inspection fees. A double entry fee will be charged for any changes made after entry week.
- 3. Birds are not to be placed in pens until they have been approved by the Fair Veterinarian.
- 4. A Superintendent will assign pens. All Market Birds will be weighed by the Superintendent at the time of placing in their pens.
- 5. All poultry exhibited must come from U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid certified clean or equivalent flocks, or have had a negative Pullorum-Typhoid test performed by an authorized tester within 90 days prior to public exhibition. A copy of test papers must be presented to superintendent at check-in time before caging of birds. Please note: Poultry purchased from a Pullorum-Typhoid free hatchery and raised for exhibition are not exempt from Pullorum-Typhoid testing requirements.
- 6. Exhibitors are responsible for entering birds in the proper class. Incorrectly entered birds will be placed at the bottom of the class.
- 7. Birds will be judged by the comparison method, demonstrating uniform growth, appropriate market/production breed selection, and appearance.
- 8. Birds should be in place by 12:00 noon on Wednesday.
- 9. Exhibitors are responsible for the care of their birds. Exhibitors MUST provide feed, feeders, water and clean up pens. See #8 open show rules. Premiums will not be paid if pens are not cleaned or birds are not checked out by release time.
- 10. Pens must contain birds of the same age.
- 11. Once the show has begun, exhibitors will handle birds only at the Judge's request.
- 12. All Warren County Fair 4-H and FFA Exhibitors will wear the official Warren County Fair exhibitor t-shirt tucked in, and in its original form while exhibiting. (Exception-horse exhibitors)
- 13. Poultry Showmanship competition for Junior, Intermediate, and Senior 4-H'ers will immediately follow the bird judging. No pre-entry or fee is required.
- 14. Care will be used in handling all birds; but the management will not be responsible for loss through fire, theft, accident or any other medium. Policing will be in effect at all times.

Market Chicken Auction Rules

Each entrant may sell up to 2 pens, one roaster and one broiler pen. Must use cages to keep birds safe in transport.

Exhibitor must be present with their own birds to attend the auction.

Auction order will be printed in sale program.

If exhibitor will not be selling birds, the Superintendant must be notified as soon as possible.

Birds for auction will stay on fairgrounds until auction begins on Monday. Exhibitors must continue to feed, water and care for the birds.

If Grand Champion Market Pen is species other than chicken, they will be auctioned off on Sunday evening.

Processing costs will be deducted from the exhibitor sale check.

Order of species in auction will be determined and printed.

4-H/FFA Poultry

Division: Large Fowl and Breeding Poultry (Pen of Two)

All breeding poultry should be entered as cock and hen or cockerel and pullet. With these terms defined as: cock-male bird, 1 year or older; Hen female bird, 1 year or older; Cockerel - male bird, less than 1 year old; Pullet - female bird, less than 1 year old.

All entries will be made by providing class, breed and variety information.

Example: Class - American Breed - Plymouth Rock, Variety - Barred.

Large Fowl Breeding Chickens will be judged by the American Standard of Perfection. No crossbred entries will be allowed in the breed classes.

You may compete in each class and you may have up to 5 different breeds entered in a class.

For example one pen of 2 Plymouth Rock Barred, one pen of 2 Jersey Giant Blue would be 2 entries in Class 1 American.

This department is open to youth who are participating in 4-H/FFA Youth Development Programs conducted by Iowa State University Extension and Outreach.

All exhibitors are responsible to READ and COMPLY with the Warren County Fair 4-H General Exhibit Rules, 4-H General Rules and Regulations, and all 4-H department exhibit class rules and regulations.

General Exhibit Rules

- 1. 4-H members who have completed 4th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) are eligible to exhibit at the Warren County Fair.
- 2. 4-H Clover Kids (*Kindergarten-3rd grade*) are eligible to exhibit in the 4-H Building. Clover Kids will "share" their exhibits and receive participation ribbons for their exhibits in the 4-H Building. Their exhibits may be a school project, simple craft, hobby, collection, etc. Clover Kids may also participate in the Pet Show on Sunday, July 30th at 9:30 am.
- 3. Exhibitors in 4-H classes are not eligible to exhibit in a similar department of the FFA division or vice-versa. See also "4-H Department General Rules and Regulations."
- 4. Eligible exhibits are an outgrowth of work done as a planned part of the 4-H'ers participation in 4-H projects or programs during the current 4-H year (*since the 2022 Warren County Fair*). If a school project, please make the necessary changes to form it into a 4-H Exhibit. Exhibits can be completed by an individual or group and may represent all or part of the learning in the project or program.
- 5. Exhibits previously entered in an FFA Ag Science Fair or any other FFA event or competition may not be entered in any 4-H exhibit class. FFA will have their separate exhibit area.
- 6. Exhibits that do not comply with the class description, size guidelines, copyright restrictions, safety and approved methods will be disqualified and <u>not</u> put on public display.
- 7. If the exhibitor chooses a display to illustrate what was learned:
 - Posters may not exceed 24" x 36" in size.
 - Chart boards, graph boards, project presentation boards, model displays, etc., may not exceed 48" x 48" in size. Maximum size is determined by measuring the flat (*unfolded*) dimensions. Display boxes may not exceed 28" x 22" in height or width and 12" in depth.
- 8. Endangered and threatened plants and animals (*includes insects*), or songbird feathers and nests may **NOT** be used in any exhibit. Live specimens of noxious weeds or invasive species are NOT permitted in any exhibit. Dried specimens are acceptable to use in exhibits.
- 9. **Copyrighted materials and designs** may not be used in an exhibit that is presented as original work by the exhibitor. Exhibitors must include permission from the copyright holder/owner when using copyrighted materials. Exhibitors must give proper credit to the original source of all materials/designs used in exhibits. (See special rules for Visual Arts and general copyright information for 4-H'ers.) If you find your idea from

- Pinterest, you will need to find the original site to source. It can be found by double clicking on the image.
- 10. The 4-H member's goal and application of exhibit standards will form the basis of the evaluation process. Evaluation criteria will include demonstrated learning, workmanship, techniques, and general appearance and design. Exhibitors will receive evaluation comments and a blue, red or white Warren County Fair ribbon. Exhibitors will receive evaluation comments and a blue red or white Warren County Fair Ribbon.
- 11. Each exhibitor at the Warren County Fair should be prepared (in writing or orally) to answer the following questions during their conference judging. 4-H'ers are strongly encouraged to write out their answers to be ready to discuss them with the judge. The Iowa State Fair requires a written explanation, an audio recording, or video recording answering the questions with each exhibit.

The 4-H exhibitor should respond to the following questions about the exhibit:

What did you plan to learn or do? (What was your exhibit goal(s)?)

What steps did you take to learn or do this?

What were the most important things you learned?

Check for additional requirements in exhibit classes for food and nutrition, photography, and visual art classes.

- 12. All judges' decisions are final.
- 13. Each item in an exhibit must be securely labeled, including:
 - Class Number
 - 4-H Exhibitor's Name and 4-H Club
 - Grade Completed and Age
 - Description and Years in Project
- 14. If a 4-H'er is unable to attend conference judging, they may send their exhibits (limit of 2) with their leader or parent to be dropped off for judging. These exhibits will need to be checked where a Superintendent will take them for judging. Parents or leaders will not be allowed in the judging area to present these exhibits. These projects will not be considered for: Iowa State Fair, Outstanding Exhibits, Top 4th Grade, or Creative Arts Tour.
- 15. At no time will a parent or leader partake in the judging process. This is the 4-H'ers time to share their information with the judge. If a 4-H'er needs assistance from a parent or leader in moving their exhibit to the judging table that is fine, but please then leave the judging area immediately.
- 16. The total amount of projects to be judged in one class area is limited to three projects. However, there is an exception for the area of photography where an exhibitor can enter four total photos. (Example: only three Food and Nutrition projects will be permitted to be judged.) If an exhibitor brings more than three projects for a given project area they will be asked to choose which three projects will be judged and the rest will be removed from the premise.

Other Exhibit Information

Due to security, 4-H'ers are discouraged from sending items that have special meaning and historical value as their exhibit or part of an exhibit. The Warren County Fair and Iowa State University Extension and Outreach – Warren County will use diligence to ensure the safety of articles entered for exhibition after their arrival and placement. However, they will not be responsible for damage or loss by accident, fire, theft, etc.

Judging Day Procedures and Release of Exhibits

Pre-entry via FairEntry is required for all Static Exhibits by Wednesday, July 19th. No late entries will be accepted.

Entries in these areas need to be made online via FairEntry by June 15th, 2023.

All exhibits entered in the 4-H Building will be conference judged. (*Exception*: Clover Kids will have their own *special sharing time*.) The purpose of conference judging is to let each member have a personal interview with the judge to discuss what the member planned to do in the project, how the item displayed fits into the goals the member hoped to reach, and how the member feels about the final results of his/her efforts for the year.

Conference judging provides an opportunity for the 4-H member to express his/her thoughts to an adult. It is an opportunity for the adult to listen to the youth and converse together; the result being a mutually satisfying experience. Each club is assigned a time for judging on Saturday, July 22nd. At the scheduled time, all members in that club are to bring their exhibits to the 4-H and Youth Exhibit Building to participate in conference judging. If a member is not able to participate in conference judging, they need to contact their club leader to make arrangements to have their exhibit (up to two) taken to the 4-H and Youth Exhibit Building before 12:00 noon on the day of judging, July 22nd. Entry forms are generated from Fair Entry and will be available at the Warren County Extension Office prior to the Warren County Fair. They will also be available Saturday, July 22nd at Static Judging. This form needs to be signed by the 4-Her and turned in at the completion of the day at the check-out table. The entry tags will also be generated by Fair Entry and will be available at the Warren County Extension Office prior to judging day. They will also be available Saturday, July 22nd at Static Judging.

Judging Day Process...When You Arrive at The Exhibit Building

- Check-in at the check-in table
- Proceed to the waiting area for each individual judge
- After talking with a judge, exhibits are to be taken to the club's booth (or the area designated for those projects) to be displayed
- Parents are NOT allowed in the judging area
- Exhibits considered for the Iowa State Fair will be retained to be displayed in a special area.
- Proceed to the check-out table in the exhibit building
- Please sign and turn in the entry form to receive your ribbons
- Please attach your ribbon securely to your exhibit/project
- Exhibits will be awarded premiums on the basis of blue, red, and white ribbon quality
- Exhibits not placed in one of the above groups by a judge will not be awarded premium money
- Any exhibit that does not meet the class description may be moved to a more appropriate class with the permission of the 4-H member
- All premiums will be paid to the club of the respective 4-H member
- Fourth grade 4-H members will be eligible to earn a Top 4th Grade ribbon for their projects and their club will receive their premium money
- The Warren County Fair Exhibit Building opens up for initial viewing on Saturday, July 22nd following the Pre-Fair Picnic for one hour and then officially re-opens on Wednesday, July 26th at 9:00 a.m.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Baked and garden items will be held for the 4-H Bake/Garden Sale. 4-Hers should include a picture of their baked item attached to their project. The booth will be set up at the 4-H Exhibit Building and the sale will take place Saturday, July 22nd during judging time and continue after the prefair picnic. Proceeds will go to the Warren County 4-H Trip Scholarship Fund.

Exhibits are to remain on display in the 4-H and FFA Building until 9:00 p.m., Sunday, July 30th at which time they will be released by the General Superintendent or Extension staff.

The 4-H/FFA building will be closed at 6:00 p.m. on Sunday, July 30th it will reopen at 9:00 p.m. until 10:00 p.m. for removal of exhibits. The building will be open again on Monday, July 31st from 9:00-10:00 a.m. for those unable to remove their exhibits on Sunday evening. Superintendents or Extension staff will not be responsible for exhibits left after that time.

<u>IMPORTANT NOTE:</u> Any exhibit removed prior to 9:00 p.m., Sunday, July 30th, will automatically disqualify the 4-H member from entering the Warren County 4-H competition the following year, and all premiums due that member in any 4-H division for the current year will be forfeited. An exception to this rule is live plants (please see Horticulture under Agriculture guidelines).*

State Fair Notes

4-H'ers completing 5th - 12th grades are eligible to exhibit at the 2023 Iowa State Fair. Exhibits at the Iowa State Fair are NOT conference judged.

4-H'ers with exhibits chosen for the Iowa State Fair will be given additional instructions on when and where to take their exhibits. A picture will be taken in the 4-H Exhibit Building on Friday, July 28th at 5:00 p.m. of all 4-Hers with exhibits selected for the Iowa State Fair and those selected for the Creative Arts Tour.

ANOTHER OPPORTUNITY: If you are unable to participate in the Friday afternoon photo shoot, another opportunity is scheduled for Saturday, July 29th at 11:00 a.m.

Exhibits that do not comply with <u>size guidelines</u>, <u>copyright</u>, <u>and safety procedures</u> will not be accepted for entry, evaluation or display at the Iowa State Fair. The Iowa State Fair requires a written explanation, an audio recording or video recording answering three questions about each exhibit.

The 4-H exhibitor should respond briefly to the following questions about the exhibit:

What did you plan to learn or do? (What was your exhibit goal(s)?)

What steps did you take to learn or do this?

What were the most important things you learned?

Club Booths and Hosting

The "Club Pride" award will be given by Senior 4-H to the 4-H club booth best displays the theme for the year, is nicely decorated, and highlights the club and its members.

4-H and Youth Building Hosting Schedule

Guidelines for 4-H Clubs Hosting the Exhibit Building:

- Must have <u>one adult present</u> with any 4-H members that are hosting.
- Hosts are expected to GREET VISITORS with a smile; ask visitors if they have questions.
- Provide information about 4-H. Flyers and information at the hosting table.
- Encourage children to complete the *interest* form to join 4-H and place in collection box on table.
- Work with the kids to do the daily activity
- First Shift of the day Make sure hosting table and areas are clean and neat.
- Others hosts are to sweep the floor as needed and pick up trash.
- The next shift should arrive before you leave the Exhibit Building.
- Final shift of day -
 - Sweep the floor and pick up any trash.
 - Do not turn off Master Breaker... do turn off the individual breaker.
 - To lock the building, place the bolts and nuts in the east and west doors

<u>ADDITIONAL NOTES</u>: Hosts are not to eat, play cards or other games, or engage in private conversations (or use technological instruments) with other friends; 4-H hosts are ambassadors for the 4-H program; the host table should be neat and clean for visitors to the 4-H Exhibit Building, and you should be welcoming guests.

Class Descriptions

Most exhibit classes have specific guidelines and requirements which will be included in the judging process. Members are highly encouraged to access http://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/projects-list to find information about the judging criteria for projects and exhibits they created from their 4-H learning experience.

There are six areas or divisions in which to exhibit projects at the Warren County Fair. Each area or division has class numbers listed below. All projects entered at the Warren County Fair will enter under a specific area or division and then identify the class that is most appropriate for their project on Judging Day.

Class descriptions for the Communication Events such as 4-H Presentations, Extemporaneous Speaking, Working Exhibits, or Share-The-Fun Activities along with the Clothing Events such as Clothing Selection, \$20 Challenge, Fashion Revue, Innovative Design or the Pet Show will be found in the fair book following the class descriptions for the Exhibit Building.

Animals

10110 Animal Science

An exhibit (other than the animal itself) that shows the learning about a large or small animal including beef, dairy cattle, dairy goats, dogs, horse and pony, meat goats, pets, poultry, rabbits, sheep and swine. Ownership of any animal is not required.

10120 Veterinary Science

An exhibit that shows learning about keeping animals healthy, animal diseases, animal/human health interaction, or other learning related to Veterinary Science.

Agriculture and Natural Resources

10210 Crop Production and Plant Science

An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of field crops, plant growth, soils and soil fertility, or any other learning related to Crop Production and Plant Science.

10220 Conservation, Environment, and Sustainability

An exhibit that shows the connections between humans and their environment including energy, energy conservation, stewardship, conservation, creating habitat, etc.

10222 Entomology

Any exhibit that shows learning from an entomology or bee project (excluding live specimens) that is an outgrowth or an entomology or bee project learning experience. Includes specimen collections and may include products (ex: honey) or equipment as part of the display.

10224 Fish and Wildlife

Any exhibit that shows learning about a fish and/or wildlife project or program such as identification, habitats, harvest, taxidermy, etc. Any specimens must have been legally taken and must include information about date and location of harvest, and who the specimen was acquired from if not self-harvested. Feral swine (including Russian/European Boar) are NOT permitted in taxidermy exhibits.

10226 Forestry

Any exhibit, including collections, that show learning from participation in a forestry project or program.

10230 Horticulture and Plant Science

An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of plants, soils, small fruit production, vegetable and flower gardens, plant nutrition, careers, etc. (Garden crops and herbs are exhibited in classes in the 4-H Horticulture Department under 4-H Livestock.)

*If using live plants within your exhibit please contact the Extension Office to make arrangements for you to take them home after being judged on Saturday, July 22nd since the building is locked until Wednesday, July 26th at 9:00 a.m.

10235 Home Grounds Improvement

An exhibit that shows learning about landscape plans, selection of landscape plants, ornamental garden features, home yard improvement, storage sheds, careers, etc.

*If using live plants within your exhibit please contact the Extension Office to make arrangements for you to take them home after being judged on Saturday, July 22nd since the building is locked until Wednesday at 9:00 a.m.

550A Vegetable Plates - County Fair Only Class

This is to be an exhibit of vegetables raised as the results of work done by the 4-Her. Please refer to: http://www.extension.iastate.edu/4hfiles/agriculture/LHHortClass.pdf. For the number of specimens to put on a plate for your exhibit

The vegetables should be prepared for exhibit as instructed in 4-H-462, "Harvesting and Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit." <u>Please note</u> only one variety per plate.

Exhibitor must enter each plate of vegetables separately. White paper plates are recommended.

Exhibits will not be selected from this class for State Fair exhibition.

Judging will be based on the quality of produce. Each exhibit tag MUST show the variety name. **Members wishing to exhibit similar produce at Iowa State Fair must enter them via Fair Entry June 1st-July 1st.** After judging, produce will be sold at the 4-H Bake/Garden Sale with the exception of one specimen per plate, which will remain on exhibition.

550B Vegetable Collection Plates - County Fair Only Class

This is to be a collection of vegetables with 8-10 different vegetables raised as the results of work done by the 4-Her. The vegetables should be prepared for exhibit as instructed in 4-H-462, "Harvesting and Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit." White paper plates are recommended.

Exhibits will not be selected from this class for State Fair exhibition.

Judging will be based on the quality of produce. Each exhibit tag MUST show the variety name. **Members wishing to exhibit similar produce at Iowa State Fair must enter them via Fair Entry June 1st-July 1st.** After judging, the vegetables will stay on display.

Class 550C Jumbo or Most Unusual - County Fair Only Class

Vegetables (one specimen). White paper plates are recommended. Exhibits will not be selected from this class for State Fair exhibition. Each exhibit tag MUST show the variety name. After judging, the vegetables will stay on display.

Class 550D Herbs - County Fair Only Class

Herb species (three sprigs for exhibit) to be displayed in a bottle provided by the 4-H'er. Sprigs should be of adequate length to reach the water level. Herb species must be properly labelled on the entry tag. Exhibits will not be selected from this class for State Fair exhibition.

Class 550E Flower Display - County Fair Only Class

Two blooms displayed in a bottle provided by the 4-Her. Flower variety must be properly labelled on the entry tag. Each flower display will be a separate exhibit. The flowers should be prepared for exhibit as instructed in 4-H-464, "Preparing Cut Flowers and House Plants for Exhibit." Members wishing to exhibit similar produce at Iowa State Fair must enter them via Fair Entry June 1st-July 1st.

10240 Outdoor Adventures

An exhibit that shows learning about backpacking, biking, camping, canoeing, fishing, hiking or other outdoor activities.

10250 Safety and Education in Shooting Sports

An exhibit that shows learning about safe and responsible use of firearms and archery equipment or wildlife management. (The exhibit may not include actual firearms; archery equipment allowed if tips are removed from arrows).

10260 Other Agriculture and Natural Resources

An exhibit that shows learning about agriculture or natural resources and does not fit in any of the classes listed above.

Creative Arts

10310 Music

An exhibit that shows learning about musical performance, composition and arrangements, instruments, musical styles or history.

10320 Photography

An exhibit, either photo(s) or an educational display, that shows learning about photography from choosing a camera to modifying your photo. Still photos only, not video.

Photography Special Rules:

- Photographs may be either black and white or color. They may be processed from negatives, slides, or digital cameras and computer
 manipulation programs. Photographs must have been taken since your county fair of the previous year.
- 2. Photographs should be a minimum of 5" x 7". Finished size (including mounting/matting) of single photographs may not exceed 11" x 14". Exception: Panoramic photos must not exceed 24" in length.
- 3. All photographs must be printed on photographic paper and must be mounted and/or matted.
- 4. Mounted photos can be (a) flush-mounted [no board showing] on mounting board, or (b) with mount borders [window mat or flat mount directly on board]. Exhibitors may cut their own mounting boards, use ready-cut window mats or have matting done professionally.
 - 4-Hers are responsible for design decisions such as border, color and size. Framed photographs (including floating frames) will not be judged.
- 5. Maximum thickness of finished project must not exceed ¼" thick.
- 6. A series is a group of photographs [3 to 5] that are related to or tell a step-by-step story. Photographs must be mounted together in story order or sequence Finished size of individual photographs in a series should not exceed 6" x 8".
- 7. Edited photos should include a copy of the photo before edits
- 8. Subject matter of photographs must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting.
- 9. Photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.

- 10. Iowa State Fair 4-H photography exhibitors must use the Photo Exhibit Label to provide required information for photo exhibits.
- 11. Exhibitors entered in 4-H Photography are not eligible to exhibit in the FFA Photography Show and vice-versa.

10340 Creative Photography

A photographic image that was creatively edited or modified beyond reality in a creative, imaginative, and experimental way to make it more interesting and visually engaging. Could be a composite of multiple photographs.

Alternative/Creative Photography Special Rules:

- 1. Photograph/image may be mounted/matted or submitted (uploaded) as a digital image.
- 2. If mounted, photograph/image must be mounted on foam core no smaller than 4" in length or larger than 14" in length.
- 3. Photograph/Image can be digitally created or from a film negative.
- 4. Exhibit must have the most current Photo Exhibit Label on back with required information for photo exhibits. Exhibit write up should include additional information about the processes and decisions used to develop exhibit.
- 5. Subject matter must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting, photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.

10345 Photography Idea/Educational Display

An exhibit that demonstrates learning about photography that does not fit into any previous photography class. This class includes photos printed on canvas, fabric, ceramic, etc. as part of an educational display showing learning about printing techniques, display, merchandising, etc.

10350 Visual Arts Original Art

An exhibit that shows learning through creation of original art. Original art is one of a kind, non replicable design of your creation. By using one medium or a combination, an individual creates an authentic work of art that is not recognizable as another's work. You must explain the application of the most relevant design element(s) and art principle(s) featured in this exhibit. Describe your inspirations, reasons, feelings, and/or motives for creating this work of art.

10355 Visual Arts - Design, Process, or Technique Exploration

This class emphasized process and provides the opportunity to explore a medium, practice a skill or study and apply elements and principles of art and design. An explanation of the application of design elements or art principles used when making the exhibit must be included. This exhibit may be an object, portfolio, display, poster, or organized sketchbook. If a non-original design source is used, its origin (where the idea was found, any pictures, sketches, etc.) must be credited, acknowledged or have copyright permission obtained. See visual arts special rule #5 and #6.

10360 Visual Arts - Other Visual Art Ideas/Topics

Exhibits might include the study and research about an individual artist, style, craft, business or marketing process, planning group tour, career options, etc.

Visual Arts Special Rules:

- 1. Items entered must be ready for display in the home, gallery, or intended final display location: pictures framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command strips or other quick attach products are usually not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing.
- 2. Exhibits made from kits or preformed molds will not be accepted. Exception: Preformed molds (greenware, whiteware) may be used to provide the appropriate surface for a process technique or application of original design.
- 3. If the exhibit is a finished art object, the source or inspiration of the design, design sketches, or other process for creating the object and design must be included. For additional information see the Visual Arts and Design Elements and Art principles Exhibit Tip Sheets at https://www.extension.iastate.edu/4-H/exhibit-tip-sheets.
- 4. If the exhibit is a finished art object information must be included explaining the application of design elements and art principles used in creation of the work.
- 5. Original works of art must be a creative expression of a design unique to the artist, or permission of the original copyright holder/owner. Use of copyrighted or trademarked designs, images, logos, or materials in 4-H visual arts exhibits is prohibited unless written permission has been obtained from the copyright or trademark holder/owner. For additional information, see 4-H Exhibit Copyright Information at https://www.extension.iastate.edu/4-H/visual-art.

630C Warren County Kit Class

This means: A pre-packaged (kit) or pre-determined patterns (not eligible for State Fair)

This is a project where a 4-H'er has limited choices or decisions in the design of the article. Examples are latch hook kits, counted cross stitch patterns, paint by number, etc., (When you purchase a kit or pattern, you are paying for the privilege of using copyrighted material.)

Family and Consumer Sciences

10410 Child Development

An exhibit that shows learning about children. Exhibits that include items intended for use with children (books, toys, learning games, babysitting kits, etc.) should include information about what you have learned 1) about children while creating and using the exhibit or 2) what the child(ren) learned from use of the item(s) in the exhibit. Exhibit examples include careers in child development, caring for children with special needs, childcare, growth and development, safety and health, etc.

10420 Clothing and Fashion - Constructed/Sewn Garments and Accessories

A constructed garment or accessory (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and/or clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.

10422 Clothing and Fashion - Purchased Garments and Accessories

Purchased garments or accessories that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, an/or clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.

10424 Clothing and Fashion - Other Ideas/Educational Exhibits

Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about clothing and fashion including but not limited to design illustrations, exploration of clothing styles, careers, clothing care, etc.

Clothing and Fashion Special Rules:

- 1. Outfits or accessories which will be worn during the Awardrobe Clothing Event may not be entered as a 4-H Iowa State Fair exhibit.
- Exhibits in classes 10420 and 10422 must include information about application of design elements and art principles. Exhibits in class 10424 should include information about application of design elements and art principles if appropriate for the exhibit.

10430 Consumer Management

An exhibit that shows learning through savvy budgeting, comparison shopping, money management, or consumer rights and responsibilities.

10440 Food and Nutrition - Prepared Product

An exhibit of a prepared or preserved food product that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, or safety practices through the making of a prepared or preserved food product. See Food and Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 "Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide" at https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434 for additional information regarding prepared and preserved food products. *Display boxes are not allowed for prepared products at the Iowa State Fair.*

10442 Food and Nutrition - Preserved Product

An exhibit of a preserved food product that shows skills or learning about food preservation through the making of a prepared or preserved food product. Processed honey may be exhibited in this class. See Food and Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 "Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide" at https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434 for additional information regarding preserved food products

10445 Food and Nutrition - Educational Display

An educational exhibit (poster, report, display) that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, meal planning/preparations and service, safety practices, or food preservation. See Food and Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 "Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide" for additional information regarding prepared and preserved food products. Exhibits showing learning about meal planning and service must include a menu.

Food and Nutrition Special Rules:

- 1. Any exhibit considered to be a food safety risk or portray a food safety risk will not be accepted, judged or displayed.
- 2. All food products/exhibits should be appropriate for human consumption.
- Food product exhibits must be prepared, baked or cooked using only food grade utensils and containers.
- 4. Products that require refrigeration will not be accepted, judged or displayed.
- 5. Meat jerky products are prohibited.
- 6. The recipe must be included for any prepared or preserved food exhibit; credit the source of the recipe.
- 7. Preserved foods must include the Food Preservation Exhibit Label. Only food processed after August 1, 2022 is acceptable. Current USDA and/or Iowa State University guidelines for home food preservation must be used. Processed honey must include the Honey Exhibit Label.
- 8. Preserved food exhibits must include two product samples. One will be opened for evaluation and discarded; the second will be placed on display and returned to the exhibitor. All perishable food products will be discarded when removed from display.
- 9. Prepared foods should be placed on a firm disposable plate or flat cardboard. Place food product exhibit in a reclosable plastic bag with entry tag fastened outside the bag. Recommended number of items to include with the exhibit:
 - Cookies, cupcakes, bars, muffins, rolls, etc. four (4) to six (6) items
 - Cakes, loafs, pies, etc. one (1) whole product.
- 10. The use of alcoholic beverages in the preparation or production of 4-H food exhibits is NOT permitted.
- 11. We ask that all 4-H'ers submit a photo of their baked good to their exhibit for display purposes during the Warren County Fair.

10450 Health

An exhibit that shows learning through food choices, physical activity, safe activities and skills such as first aid and CPR, careers, and/or healthy lifestyle choices.

10460 Home Improvement

An exhibit that shows learning in planning, improving and caring for your home living space, including extended personal living areas immediately adjacent to the home. Exhibits may include new or refinished/reclaimed/restored items. Exhibits showing learning about home design, furniture, home accessories, and fabrics must include information about how design elements and art principles were applied.

Please refer to: http://www.extension.iastate.edu/4hfiles/projects/hotsheets/DesignElementsArtPrinciplesTipSheet.pdf for your Design Elements and Art Principles. The judges might ask you to explain these within your exhibit.

Home Improvement Special Rule:

- 1. Items entered must be ready for display in the home: pictures framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips or other quick attach products are usually not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing.
- 2. Exhibit write-up/information must include source of inspiration and/or references indicating where the idea or information was obtained, giving credit to original author(s)/designer(s)/artist(s).

10470 Sewing and Needle Arts

A constructed item (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning and skill in sewing, knitting, crocheting, or other needle arts. May include the construction of household items such as pillowcases, curtains, table runners, quilts, wall hangings, etc. Exhibits in this class are not intended to be worn by humans.

10472 Sewing and Needle Arts - Other Ideas/Educational Exhibits

Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about sewing and needle arts including construction techniques, use and care of fabrics and fibers, design illustrations, decorative processes, careers, etc.

Note: Exhibits in classes 10470 and 10472 should include information about application of design elements and art principles if appropriate for the exhibit.

10480 Other Family and Consumer Science

An exhibit that demonstrates learning about a family and consumer science topic that does not fit any other Family & Consumer Science class listed.

Special Exhibition - THRIFTY MEAL CHALLENGE

10490 Thrifty Meal Challenge

Create a balanced, nutritious meal for family of four (4) that includes a serving from each of the five food groups with a budget of \$11.

Special Rules:

- 1. Each county may enter one (1) exhibit in this class.
- 2. All entries will receive an evaluation and ribbon.
- 3. Exhibit may be from an individual or group effort.
- 4. The meal must include a serving for each person from each of the five (5) food groups. Recommended portion sizes per person: ½ cup fruit, ½ cup vegetable, 3 ounces protein, 1-2 ounces grain, 1 cup equivalent dairy.
- 5. The meal must serve four (4) people.
- 6. Total expense on receipt(s) must not exceed \$11.
- 7. The exhibit will be a poster (maximum size 20" x 30") that includes:
 - a. Menu
 - b. Meal type
 - c. Copy of receipts (up to 2)
 - d. Photos of participant experience
 - e. Thrifty Meal Challenge Worksheet (required)

Personal Development

10510 Citizenship and Civic Engagement

An exhibit that shows learning about or contributing to your community, your country or your world.

10520 Communication

An exhibit that shows learning about written, oral, and visual communication skills. Includes learning from participation in Theatre Arts projects or programs such as puppets, stage design, etc. May include original creative writing, poetry, fiction and non-fiction, etc.

10530 4-H Poster Communication Exhibit

Special poster exhibit to visually tell a story or idea about 4-H to the general public. Exhibitors must use one of the following themes:

- 4-H is ... (open to 4-H'er's interpretation)
- Join 4-H
- Opportunity4All (2022 National 4-H Week theme)
- Spy Your Potential (2023 Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme)
- Best Days Ever (in 4-H) (variation of Iowa State Fair theme)

Poster Communication Special Rules:

- 1. Only one poster per 4-H member may be entered. Limit of two posters per county to advance to State Fair.
- All posters must be designed on, or affixed to, standard poster board or foam core board -size minimum of 14"x20" or maximum of 15"x22".
- 3. Posters may be vertical or horizontal. Posters may be any medium: watercolor, ink, crayon, acrylic, charcoal, oils, collage, etc.
- 4. Posters cannot be 3-dimensional. Materials used to make the poster may not extend more than 1/8" above the poster or foam core board.
- 5. Each poster must have the completed Poster Exhibit Entry Form attached to the back.
- 6. Posters cannot use copyrighted material or exact copies of other promotional designs, such as the Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme logo.
- 7. 4-H members may include the 4-H clover in the poster.
- 8. All 4-H Communication Posters will receive Certificates of Recognition and written evaluation comments. Outstanding posters will receive Seals of Merit. Superior posters will receive Seals of Excellence.

10540 Digital Storytelling

An exhibit that demonstrates the application of technology to produce a creative movie/film/video. Exhibits may include a finished movie or video, creation of a detailed storyboard, editing techniques using digital video software, production techniques, or other display to share what was learned. Copyright permission must be obtained for any non-original material included as part of a film/movie/video.

10550 Leadership

An exhibit that shows learning about leadership skills and influencing others in a positive way.

10560 Self-Determined

An exhibit that shows learning as part of your 4-H adventure and does not fit any other class.

Science, Engineering and Technology

*If using live plants within your exhibit please contact the Extension Office to make arrangements for you to take them home after being judged on Saturday, July 18th since the building is locked until Wednesday at 9:00 am.

10610 Mechanics

Any exhibit that shows skills or learning about general mechanics or engineering solutions or that involve a combination of skills.

10612 Automotive

Repaired or restored vehicle.

10613 Automotive

Educational display showing learning about an automotive idea including automotive maintenance, auto operations, auto safety, or automotive systems.

10614 Electric

Constructed or repaired article or educational display that shows skills or learning about electric wiring, appliances, lighting, electrical energy sources, safety, etc.

10615 Small Engine

Repaired or restored operating engine or educational display or other type exhibit that shows skills or learning about small engines. This class includes repaired or restored lawn tractors, small motorcycles, go-karts, etc.

10616 Tractor

Repaired or restored tractor.

10617 Tractor: Educational display

Educational display showing learning related to tractors, tractor mechanics, tractor operations, or tractor safety.

10618 Welding

Constructed item or educational display that shows skills or learning about welding.

10620 Woodworking

An exhibit that shows learning about wood, woodworking techniques, and safe uses of woodworking tools and machines.

Exhibits may include newly constructed or refinished/reclaimed/restored wood items.

10630 Science, Engineering and Technology

An exhibit that shows learning about or helps explain how science and technology help us interact with the world. Topics include biological and chemical sciences, computers and networking, earth and climate, geospatial mapping (GPS/GIS), or any other application of Science, Engineering, or Technology.

10632 Aerospace

Educational display or other exhibit (including flyable models) showing learning about an aerospace idea or topic.

10634 Robotics

Educational display or other exhibit (including working robots) that shows learning about robotics and robotic systems.

Science, Engineering and Technology Special Rule:

1. Exhibitors entered in the 4-H Science, Engineering and Technology classes may not enter in similar FFA Ag Mechanics classes and vice-versa.

Clover Kids Pet Show

Sunday, July 30th, 9:30 a.m.

- Open to all Clover Kids in Warren County. Pre-entry is required via FairEntry.
- Clover Kids will have the opportunity to show the audience their pet and tell a caring adult/Senior 4-H member about their pet.
- Clover Kids Pet Show animals are only allowed on the fairground during the entry and show time.
- All pets must come properly restrained or contained. Appropriate examples include on a leash or in a box, cage, or bowl.
- Livestock animals such as swine, horses, cattle (beef and dairy), sheep and goats are not to be shown in the Clover Kids Pet Show. All other animals must be less than 100 pounds in order to be shown.
- Pet show animals are not allowed in any livestock barns or show rings on the fairgrounds.
- Any animal being shown in Open Class or a 4-H Class is not permitted to show in the Pet Show.
- Clover Kids and pets must be supervised by an adult at all times. The adult is responsible for both the Clover Kid and pet. Only a few Clover
 Kids and pets will be allowed in the showcase area at a time, along with a responsible adult, to ensure the safety of the pet, the Clover Kid, and
 the audience.
- Cats and dogs must have a current rabies certificate. (Use the same health requirements as for the 4-H Dog, Cat, and Pet Shows.)
- Any female animal in season cannot be shown.
- Participants will receive a participation ribbon; no premium money will be given.

Clover Kids Bucket of Junk Class

Clover Kids can enter in the Bucket of Junk Class by attending the Bucket of Junk Workshop on July 10th. Clover Kids will create a project out of different art supplies to display in the 4-H Building during the Warren County Fair. Pre-entry and attendance to the workshop is required.

Clover Kids Fashion Show

Clover Kids can participate in the Fashion Show on Thursday, July 27th at 5:00pm at the Friends of 4H Stage. Pre-entry is required via FairEntry by Wednesday, July 19th. The \$20 Clothing Challenge is the only class that will be available for Clover Kids.

- 1. This class is designed to expand the Clover Kids member's shopping experience to shopping venues emphasizing recycling, reducing and reusing. Outfits must be purchased at a garage sale, consignment store, thrift store, secondhand store, or similar place.
- 2. Twenty dollars is the purchase price limit including tax. However, some secondhand stores and venues do not typically charge sales tax.
- 3. Receipt(s) for every item included as a part of the calculated total must be submitted with the entry. A garage sale receipt can be a piece of paper with the name of the location such as "Jane Doe garage sale", date, amount paid, and signature of person selling at the garage sale. If the outfit was free at a garage sale, "free" can be listed on the report form and on the receipt. Failure to provide receipts will be reflected in the evaluation.
- 4. An outfit consists of major clothing pieces such as a shirt and pants or a dress. Shoes, undergarments and accessories are not included in the \$20 purchase price limit.

Clothing Events

Please Note: For Clothing Events the Senior 4-H age category is defined as 9-12th grades per State Fair rules.

4-H Awardrobe Clothing Event

General Overview

- 1. Each youth may only participate in the 4-H Awardrobe Clothing Event with one entry in one class per year. Participants may be selected to participate in any one of the four classes, even if they participated in that class in previous years
- 2. Each county may send the following number of participants in each class to represent their county, selected from each of the county's events:
 - a. Fashion Revue Class: Four participants total with no more than two (2) participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
 - b. \$20 Challenge Class: Four participants total with no more than two (2) participant with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
 - c. Clothing Selection Class: Four participants total with no more than two (2) participant with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
 - d. Innovative Design Class: Four participants total with no more than two (2) participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
- 3. The categories in each class are simply for entry limit purposes. All entries in each class will be judged together.
- 4. Participants must be in the senior 4-H designated level (completed grades 9 12 the same year as the event)
- 5. Outfits or accessories which will be worn during the State 4-H Awardrobe Clothing Event may not be entered as another 4-H Iowa State Fair exhibit.
- 6. Participants must bring the garment or outfit they purchased or created, and accessories, to the State 4-H Awardrobe Clothing Event.
- 7. Participants should submit only the materials requested for each class (report form and photo for ALL classes plus a receipt for \$20 challenge). If additional materials are sent with the entry or brought to the conference judging, they will not be considered.
- 8. Participant report forms must be uploaded by county staff no later than July 31. Participants should abide by county deadlines for submitting paperwork for entry. Requests for class or group time changes will be honored as availability allows through July 31. Requests made after July 31 cannot be accommodated due to our printing deadlines.
- 9. A \$30 registration fee is required for each participant entry. Counties will be billed following the Iowa State Fair.
- 10. All participants must participate in all Awardrobe Clothing Event activities at the times scheduled for their county unless the 4-H member is involved in another Iowa State Fair 4-H activity at the same time with a non-flexible schedule, with pre-approval is required prior to July 31.

Special Criteria Related to Event Participation

Fashion Revue

- 1. The purpose of this category is to encourage the sewing of a personal garment or outfit.
- 2. Consideration is given to fit, color, style, suitability, attractiveness, quality of construction, stage presentation, and required care.
- 3. Youth participants will model a garment or outfit they constructed, hand-knitted, machine-knitted, or crocheted during the current 4-H year.
- 4. A garment or outfit consists of one to three pieces such as, but not limited to, party clothes, tailored suits, vest, slacks, shirt, skirt, active sportswear and/or coats.
- 5. Blouses, shirts, and sweaters are usually considered as garments. If they are used to complete an outfit, they may be constructed or selected.
- 6. All other accessories and undergarments may be constructed or selected.
- Each entrant must fill out the Fashion Revue Form available at the Extension Office and bring it on judging day, <u>Thursday</u>, <u>June 22nd</u>, <u>2023</u> at the Warren County Extension Office. Judging will be from 8:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m.
- Entrants will be expected to be dressed and ready to model their garments at their assigned times. 4-H members must sign up for Fashion Revue online via FairEntry by June 15th 2023.

• Ribbons will be given and State Fair winners will be announced at the Clothing Event Fashion Show on Thursday, July 27th at 5:00 pm at The Friends of 4-H Stage.

Clothing Selection

- 1. The purpose of this category is to select and/or purchase an outfit that represents the 4-H member's goal or intended use for the selected outfit.
- Judging is based on fit, color, style, suitability, attractiveness, quality and construction features, stage presentation, required care, and cost comparison.
- There is no consideration in the judging on the amount spent, only in the process of record keeping and reflection on the cost of the individual items as a part of the process.
- 4. Outfits may be purchased at a department store, boutique, online store, sidewalk sales, retail shops or mall stores. Outfits may also be purchased at garage sales or other second hand venues with a total price of over \$15. Outfits may be gifts, hand-me-downs, relative or friend's modern or vintage clothing, or existing personal clothing, as long as the 4-Her actually selected the item as part of this specific outfit for the stated purpose.
- 5. Home-sewn clothing that was not sewn specifically for the participant are acceptable, such as purchases from a used clothing store.
- Each entrant must fill out the Fashion Revue Form available at the Extension Office and bring it on judging day, <u>Thursday, June 22nd, 2023 at the Warren County Extension Office</u>. Judging will be from 8:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m.
- Entrants will be expected to be dressed and ready to model their garments at their assigned times. 4-H members must sign up for Clothing Selection online via FairEntry by June 15th, 2023.
- Ribbons will be given and State Fair winners will be announced at the Clothing Event Fashion Show on Thursday, July 27th at 5:00 pm at <u>The Friends of 4-H Stage.</u>

The \$20 Challenge

- 1. This class is designed to expand the 4-H member's shopping experience to shopping venues emphasizing recycling, reducing and reusing. Outfits must be purchased at a garage sale, consignment store, thrift store, secondhand store, or similar place.
- 2. Online venues are allowed, must be second-hand in nature. Shipping and handling are not included in the total calculations.
- 3. Traditional shopping venues may not be used, regardless of a low regular or sale price. Hand-me-downs or clothing as gifts do not qualify, but may be entered in Clothing Selection if 4-H member selected the items to meet a specific purpose/goal.
- 4. Twenty dollars is the purchase price limit including tax. However, some second hand stores and venues do not typically charge sales tax.
- 5. Receipt(s) for every item included as a part of the calculated total must be submitted with the entry. A garage sale receipt can be a piece of paper with the name of the location such as "Jane Doe garage sale", date, amount paid, and signature of person selling at the garage sale. If the outfit was free at a garage sale, "free" can be listed on the report form and on the receipt. Failure to provide receipts will be reflected in the evaluation.
- 6. An outfit consists of major clothing pieces such as a shirt and pants or a dress. Shoes, undergarments and accessories are not included in the \$20 purchase price limit.
- 7. Alterations are permitted to achieve a desired look or fit.
- 8. There are no additional considerations for an outfit that cost less than \$20.
- 9. The outfit pieces should be purchased to meet the 4-H member's goal or intended use for the purchased outfit, and the 4-H member should have had an experience in choosing shopping alternatives, evaluating fit, quality and construction features, price, and cost comparison.
- Each entrant must fill out the Fashion Revue Form available at the Extension Office and bring it on judging day, Thursday, June 22nd, 2023 at the Warren County Extension Office. Judging will be from 8:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m.
- Ribbons will be given and State Fair winners will be announced at the Clothing Event Fashion Show on Thursday, July 27th at 5:00 p.m. at The Friends of 4-H Stage.

Innovative Design

- 1. The purpose of this class is to encourage creativity and out-of-the-box thinking when creating an outfit.
- 2. These designs can be theatrical costumes, cosplay, wearable technology, sustainable/upcycled fashion, accessible fashion, and/or outfits that use unconventional materials.
- 3. The outfit must be showcased as a worn garment modeled by the exhibitor or by the individual that it was designed for.
- 4. Exhibitors may make their garment entirely, or permanently alter the silhouette of pre-existing materials through some method of permanent alteration or addition.
- 5. Consideration is given to originality and innovation.
- 6. Each entrant must fill out the Fashion Revue Form available at the Extension Office and bring it on judging day, Thursday, June 22nd, 2023 at the Warren County Extension Office. Judging will be from 8:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m.
- 7. Entrants will be expected to be dressed and ready to model their garments at their assigned times. 4-H members must sign up for Clothing Selection online via FairEntry by June 15th, 2023.
- 8. Ribbons will be given and State Fair winners will be announced at the Clothing Event Fashion Show on Thursday, July 27th at 5:00 pm at The Friends of 4-H Stage.

Clothing Selection NOTE: Outfits may be selected and/or purchased from any source, including consignment shops, used clothing stores, etc. Clothing items which are home-sewn are NOT eligible unless the completed garment was purchased from a used clothing source. Clothing items which are custom-sewn specifically for the participant are not eligible

4-H Communications Programs

This department is open to youth who are participating in the 4-H Youth Development programs conducted by Iowa State University Extension.

All participants are responsible to read and comply with the Warren County Fair Communication Event program rules, 4-H General Rules and Regulations, and specific program event rules and regulations.

Purpose

The Communication Event program provides opportunities for 4-H youth to develop their personal communication skills by sharing talents, knowledge, or information with others. The events provide a series of developmental experiences for different age levels.

General Communication Event Program Rules and Regulations

- a. Educational Presentations and Working Exhibit may be given by one or more 4-H'ers. Teams consisting of youth of mixed grades will be entered in the class of the member in the highest grade level (i.e. a team with a 5th grader and an 8th grader must be entered in the intermediate/senior class).
- b. Topics selected by the 4-H'er(s) should be an outgrowth of his/her 4-H experience(s). Topics should be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.
- c. Participants in the 4-H Communication Programs are expected to wear appropriate clothing representative of the 4-H Youth Program and/or the topic of the presentation.
- d. 4-H'ers must use sanitary and safe procedures and methods at all times. Educational Presentations and Working Exhibits involving food must follow established food safety guidelines.
- e. All participants are expected to comply with all copyright/trademark regulations. Copyrighted material may not be distributed without permission.
- f. Each 4-H'er may only participate in one Educational Presentation for judging at the Warren County Fair.

State Fair Participant Guidelines:

4-H'ers who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2023 are eligible to participate at the Iowa State Fair. Exception: Share the Fun and Extemporaneous Speaking - See event rules for age guidelines.

11100 Educational Presentation

Provide an opportunity for 4-H members to demonstrate communication skills by presenting knowledge, information, or a process to an audience.

Educational Presentation Rules

- 1. Time limit: Junior Presentations (5th and 6th grade) must not exceed 15 minutes. Intermediate/Senior Presentations (7th 12th grade) must not exceed 20 minutes. Presenters will be verbally told to "STOP" when they exceed the time limit.
- 2. Participants must turn in a completed Educational Presentation Report form during event check-in.
- 3. 4-H members may participate in one Educational Presentation per year at the Iowa State Fair.
- 4. Presentation content must be the original work of the presenter(s). Extensive paraphrasing from other sources is prohibited. Use of brief quotations or excerpts from other work(s) is permitted provided the source is identified.
 - Participants must sign-up online via Fair Entry by June 15th, 2023.
 - Educational Presentation judging will be on Thursday, June 22nd, from 8:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m. at Warren County Extension Office.

 Awards will be given for Educational Presentation during the Communications Awards on Sunday, July 30th starting at 3 pm on the Free Stage.

11200 Working Exhibit

Provide an opportunity for 4-H'ers to communicate, interact with, and teach an audience in an informal and experiential way.

Working Exhibit Rules

- 1. Time limit: Junior Working Exhibits (5th and 6th grade) will be scheduled for a 30 minute period. Intermediate/Senior Working Exhibits (7th 12th grade) will be scheduled for a 30 minute period.
- 2. Participants must turn in a completed Working Exhibit Report form during event check-in.
- 3. 4-H members may participate in one Working Exhibit per year at the Iowa State Fair.
- 4. Working Exhibit judging will be on Thursday, June 22nd at the Warren County Extension Office.
- 5. 4-H members will then exhibit their working exhibits on Friday, July 28, 2023 at 2pm in the 4-H Exhibit Building.
 - Awards will be given for Educational Presentation during the Communications Awards on Sunday, July 30th starting at 3 pm on the Free Stage.

11200 Working Exhibit

Provide an opportunity for 4-H members to share their skills and talents before an audience purely for the sake of enjoyment.

Class 11300 Share-The-Fun Program

- 1. Eligibility: 4-H members who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2023. Exception: If the Share-The-Fun act involves a whole club, the following criteria must be applied to determine if the club can be entered in the Share-The-Fun Program at the Iowa State Fair:
 - At least 80 percent of the performing group must have completed 5th through 12th grade in 2023.
 - Clover Kids are not eligible to participate at the Iowa State Fair.
- 2. Share-The-Fun performances must not exceed six minutes in length.
- 3. Skits, songs, stunts, short one-act plays, dance, and other entertainment are acceptable. All performances must be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.
- 4. All acts must turn in a completed 4-H Share-The-Fun Report form at event check-in to confirm stage setup, cue music, etc.
- 5. Participants must sign-up online via FairEntry by June 15th 2023.
- 6. Share-The-Fun judging will be on Thursday, June 22nd from 8am-2pm at the Warren County Extension Office.

 Awards will be given for Educational Presentation during the Communications Awards on Sunday, July 30th starting at 3 pm on the Free Stage.

11400 Extemporaneous Speaking Program

Encourage the development of communication skills by providing an opportunity to think, organize thoughts, prepare a speech, and respond to questions when given a limited amount of preparation time.

Extemporaneous Speaking Rules

- 1. Participants must be senior 4-H members completed 9th through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2023.
- 2. Each county may enter a maximum of two entries; individuals may participate once per year at the Iowa State Fair.
- . Program format:
 - a. Thirty minutes before the program, each participant will draw three of the available topics, selecting one to speak on.
 - The selected topic will not be available to the other participants in the speaker's assigned room. The general nature of the topics will relate to 4-H. The other two topics drawn but not chosen will be returned to the available topics for the other participants.
 - b. A preparation room is to be used with one participant per speaking site admitted initially and one additional participant per speaking site admitted each 15 minutes as the program progresses. A participant may not leave the preparation room until it is time to speak, nor may a participant receive help from a parent, leader, other adult or any other youth. A program official will assist participants with the time requirements.
 - c. All reference material will be screened by a program official on the following basis:
 - Participant may bring their own books, magazines or newspaper clippings for reference during the thirty minutes of preparation.
 - Reference material must be printed material such as books or magazines (cannot be notes, outlines or speeches prepared by the participant or by another person for use in this program).
 - Some relevant reference material will be available in the preparation room. This material will consist of historical material related to the 4-H program.
 - d. Each speech shall be the result of the 4-H members own efforts using approved reference material that a participant may bring to the preparation room. No other assistance may be provided. Plain note cards will be provided for each participant in the preparation room. If notes are used, the note cards provided must be used in delivering the speech.
 - e. Only notes made during the preparation period may be used.
 - f. Each speech shall be not less than four but no more than six minutes with five minutes additional time allowed for related questions, which shall be asked by the judge. The participant will be shown time cards in an ascending order (1, 2, 3, 4, 5) by the timekeeper. "Stop" will be said at six minutes.
 - g. The program timekeeper will introduce each participant by name, the county they represent, and read the selected question.
 - h. Participants are not permitted to use any props, gadgets, posters or audiovisuals of any sort. A podium will not be available.
- 4. Speeches will be evaluated using the following criteria:
 - a. Content related to topic.
 - b. Knowledge of the subject.
 - c. Organization of material.
 - d. Power of expression.
 - e. Voice.
 - f. Stage presence.
 - g General effect.
 - h. Response to questions.
- 5. A judge's critique/conference with each participant will be included as a part of the program.
- 6. Participants must sign-up online via FairEntry by June 15th 2023.
- 7. Extemporaneous judging will be on Thursday, June 22nd, 2023 at the Warren County Extension Office.
 - Awards will be given for Extemporaneous during the Communications Awards on Sunday, July 30th starting at 3 pm on the Friends of 4-H
 Free Stage.

Showstock Impressions-Breeding Beef Showmanship Awards

The Warren County Angus Association (Eric and Kelly Johnson, Prole) will present trophies to the Champion and Reserve Champion Angus Market Steers, the Champion and Reserve Champion Black Angus Heifers. They will present a belt buckle to the Champion Warren County Produced Angus Market Steer. They will present money awards of \$25, \$20, \$15, \$10, and \$5 respectively to the top five Angus rate-of-gain.

The Warren County Cattlemen's Association (Terry Eckstein, Indianola) will award trophies to the Champion and Reserve Champion Crossbred Market Steers, the Champion and Reserve Champion Market Heifer, the Champion and Reserve Champion Commercial and All Other Breeds Beef Breeding Heifers, and the winners of the Showmanship contest in the Market Beef, Commercial and All Other Breeds Beef Breeding Shows. They will present a plaque to the Champion Warren County Produced Crossbred Market Steer. The association sponsors the following premiums for the Proficiency Contest: 1st - \$100, 2nd - \$75, 3rd - \$50, 4th - \$25.

The Warren County Charolais Association (Gene Bedwell, New Virginia) will award trophies to the Champion and Reserve Champion Charolais Market Steers, the Champion and Reserve Charolais Heifer and Champion Beef Cow. They will present a belt buckle to the Champion Warren County Produced Charolais Market Steer. They will pay \$10 to each 4-H'er for a three pound-per-day rate-of-gain on Charolais-sired Market Steer and a \$10 bonus to the Market Steer with the top rate-of-gain overall if it is a Charolais-sired animal.

The Warren County Hereford Breeders' Association (Craig Amos, Indianola) will award trophies to the Champion and Reserve Champion Hereford Market Steers, the Champion and Reserve Champion Hereford Beef Breeding Heifers. They will give a plaque to the Champion Warren County Produced Hereford Market Steer and a plaque to the Hereford Market Steer with the highest rate-of-gain.

Hunter Hack Form required if entering that class
