### **GENERAL RULES**

- 1. EXHIBITOR COMPLIANCE. The rules and regulations contained in the Official Big E Premium Book (including IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics and ESE Code of Ethics) are the conditions under which all entries are accepted. Exhibitors are urged to study these rules carefully before making application for entries. A signed entry serves as an agreement to comply with all rules and regulations contained within this book and all other official Big E publications (including changes posted within our website). Incomplete (unsigned) entries will be returned with any accompanying payment.
- 2. Loss Or Damage. All exhibits will be under the direction of Eastern States Exposition Management, who will exercise every reasonable care in the protection of exhibits. In no case will Eastern States Exposition or Management be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur. Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any loss, injury or damage to any animal; or loss, injury or damage done by or arising from any animal exhibited by him/her, and shall indemnify Eastern States Exposition against legal or other proceedings in regard thereto. All consumption of food/beverages in the Mallary Complex by exhibitors and their guests is done at the exhibitor's risk.
- 3. ENTRIES. A separate entry form is required for each exhibitor and/or herd unit for each breed. Online Entries: Access to the Eastern States Exposition online entry system is at www.TheBigE.com/agriculture. Forms are available online from the Agriculture page of www.TheBigE.com and may be reproduced for your convenience. Faxed entries will be accepted and will be processed when a credit card number has been charged. Metered mail postmark will not be accepted as proof of deadline compliance. In the event the number of entries exceeds the allowed barn space capacity, entries will be accepted in the chronological order they were received. Refunds on cancelled entries are granted in extreme circumstances by the Director of Agriculture.
- 4. INITIAL PASSES. Upon receipt and acceptance of entry, initial entry passes will be issued to the exhibitor. Passes are intended to provide initial entry and parking for people working directly with the animals and owners. Additional passes will be available from your superintendent upon arrival.
- 5. Reduced Rate Tickets are available from the Agriculture Office after July 1 at \$10 per ticket. We invite and encourage you to take advantage of this ticket savings. Please call 413-205-5011, requesting the Agriculture Office, or email a ticket request to aginfo@TheBigE.com.
- **6. RULE VIOLATIONS.** Within the show ring competition the decision of the judge is final in all cases—except where an error or deliberate misrepresentation is discovered. In the case of unintentional error brought to light after placing has been announced but before the end of the breed show, a correction of placing and corresponding premiums will be made by Management. If the error is not discovered until after the completion of the breed show, Management will make an effort to rectify the error but will not be held responsible for exhibitor unintentional error. If, in the opinion of Management, an exhibitor willfully violates any rules governing The Big E, all premiums/prizes won by him/her will be forfeited and he/she may be subject to such other penalties as Management deems appropriate. Other penalties will potentially involve inclusion in the National Show Ring Ethics infraction database.
- 7. Rule And Deadline Interpretation. The Management of Eastern States Exposition reserves the right to interpret all rules and regulations governing the show and to make such decisions as may be necessary for the successful conduct of the show. Such interpretations and decisions will be final. Questions regarding rule interpretations should be directed to Director of Agriculture & Education, Eastern States Exposition, 1305 Memorial Ave., West Springfield MA 01089, telephone (413)205-5011 or aginfo@The-BigE.com. Requests will receive prompt attention. Request for exception to any rule must be made in written form and must accompany the entry form. This request is not grounds for a late entry. All entries must be made in accordance to the listed dates to be accepted.
- 8. GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE. An exhibitor wishing to protest or appeal any action, condition or circumstance occurring during the show which he considers detrimental to his interests, the interests of his fellow exhibitors or those of the Exposition, may protest, complain or appeal to the Management at any time prior to the release hour for his exhibits, by plainly stating his appeal or protest in writing and attaching thereto a fee of \$100, such fee to be refunded upon settlement of the claim in his/her favor but forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Protests questioning the competency or fairness of judges will not be entertained or condoned. In all cases of complaint, protest or appeal, the decision of the appropriate committee will be binding and final.
- 9. Valid Registration Certificates. The original registration certificate or association's duplicate or computer printouts (NO PHOTOCOPIES) will be considered as proof of ownership, identity, age and breeder of an entry. Electronic registration certificates are accepted and may be used by management as ownership verification. The ownership of an entry must appear on the certificate as it will be exhibited, or if owned in partnership, exhibited by one or more of the owners. In the case of an animal under one year of age, a photocopy or electronic image of the registration application with a registration number assigned by the breed association may be presented if the actual registration paper is not processed

by show date. We will not accept registration transfers after the show has started. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to be sure animals are registered properly according to their respective breed association rules. Junior exhibitors should check rules under their specific breed for ownership deadlines. Please make sure papers are with animals.

- **10. TATTOOS.** For all breeds requiring tattoos as a means of permanent identification, it is the exhibitor's responsibility to be sure tattoos are clear and easily readable. Animals with questionable tattoos will not be allowed to show. Exception: Llamas and Alpacas must have microchips.
- 11. EXHIBITOR AND BREEDER. An exhibitor must be the owner or member of a partnership or syndicate owning an animal. Animals owned in partnership or syndicate must be entered in an individual class of the show under the partnership or syndicate's name. In the group classes, partnership or syndicate animals may be entered and exhibited under the name of one of the co-owners, but must be entered in all classes in the same manner. For the purpose of meeting the requirements in all group classes, for premier breeder and exhibitor, and defining numbers of an entry, an exhibitor is further defined as those members of an immediate family residing on one farm and where the herd is one unit. Exhibitors are required to list persons qualifying as family members of one unit or all members of a syndicate on the entry form.
- 12. Substitutions. An entry may be substituted within or between classes after the entry deadline, providing the owner and/or part owner making the original entry is owner and/or part owner of the entry being substituted. (See Special Rules in Dairy Goat & Sheep section for exception.) As described in the definition of exhibitor and breeder, substitutions may be made among different members of the same family on the same farm. There will be no substitutions between breeds. Use the substitution form located on the website.
- **13. INSPECTION PROCEDURE.** All gates are closed to livestock entrance or exit between 11pm and 6am. Please plan to arrive only during the times listed in each show section, unless otherwise stated.
- a. All inspections will be done by official Animal Health Inspectors or Massachusetts State Veterinar ians (referred to as AHI). They have the final word of determination and Management will support their decisions.
- b. Multiple AHI personnel will be on hand during the pre-determined arrival hours and will remain until all animals have been checked. Specific inspectors will be in charge of specific areas, but all inspectors are qualified to inspect all species of animals and may be called to additional areas as needed.
- c. Health papers and official interstate health papers issued from their state of origin, and meeting MDAR Fair Animal Health Requirements must accompany animals! This means the driver or exhibitor must be in possession of the papers and remain with the animals during the entire inspection process.
- d. Arrive at Gate 1
  - 1. Show health papers, if requested to do so.
- 2. If the gate person requests, please wait patiently until directed to proceed to the next point. e. Proceed to Gate 10
  - 1. Show health papers, if requested to do so.
  - 2. Be prepared for staff to compare the number of animals being transported with the number of animals listed on the papers. All animals being transported must be accounted for on the health papers or driver will be asked to leave without unloading.
- f. Please make contact with your Superintendent before attempting to unload ANY animals. No animals may unload before Superintendent approval. *Each animal MUST pass inspection before entering the Mallary Complex or tie-out stalls.*
- g. (Bovine, Goat, Camelid) Unload as directed by Superintendent.
  - 1. AHI will inspect each animal as they unload. AHI initials on the health papers prove the animal has passed inspection and may be stalled/penned.
  - 2. If there is a waiting line, animal safety and welfare is of utmost concern. Weather (heat and humidity) may dictate the animals' need to unload before the inspection process can happen. In this case, the animals will proceed to the nearest wash rack on the perimeter of the Mallary Complex and remain there until inspected. No animal may enter the Mallary Complex or tie-out stalls before they have passed inspection.
- h. (Sheep, Swine) Unload as directed by Superintendent.
  - 1. AHI will inspect each animal as they unload. AHI initials on the health papers prove the animal has passed inspection and may be penned.
  - 2. If there is a waiting line, animal safety and welfare is of utmost concern. Weather (heat and humidity) may dictate the animals' need to unload before the inspection process can happen. In this case the animals will proceed to the holding pens on the east side or east alcove of the Mallary Complex. There, animals may unload and wait in relative safety and comfort until their turn to be inspected. *No animal may enter the Mallary Complex before they have passed*

#### inspection.

- i. Any animal not passing inspection will be asked to leave the grounds. If leaving would induce unfair hardship on the driver or exhibitor, the animals would proceed directly to the quarantine area directly outside Gate 10 and remain in the quarantine area for the duration of their stay. A reasonable amount of bedding will be provided in the quarantine area; water and electricity are available. Animal care is the responsibility of the exhibitor. Said animal may not be exhibited.
- j. Failure to comply with the Arrival and Inspection Procedure will constitute an infraction of the General Rules and Regulations in which case the exhibitor and/or driver and all animals listed within that entry will be asked to leave Eastern States Exposition premises.
- 14. ARRIVAL/DEPARTURE WAIVER. On rare occasions, exemptions to our published Arrival/Departure times are allowed. (Example: in case of family emergency or to accommodate attendance at other livestock expositions.) To request exemption to the published Arrival/Departure times, a request must be made to the Director of Agriculture and Education. The Director of Agriculture and Education will be contacted by gate security and will handle all nighttime emergency arrivals.
- 15. Releases. All release documents will be issued from the Superintendent's Office. Exhibitors who remove one or more animals without a release will forfeit all premiums won. For times and dates, please see each specific show. Premiums will be forfeited by the owner if exhibitor of a show string chooses to leave early.
- **16. STABLING.** Stabling process begins with your accepted entry form; special stabling requests will be entertained if made at the time of entry and space allows. Final stabling determination is at the discretion of the Show Superintendent and will be done according to actual numbers of animals brought to the Fair (not entered), tack and display of farm signs, banners, etc. Payment of entry fees does not provide bedding, stabling or display space for animals not brought to the Fair.
- 17. DISPLAY STALLS. Displays must not interfere with other exhibitors and must comply with the West Springfield Fire Prevention Codes published in this Premium Book. Exhibitors will be required to maintain their respective area in a reasonably clean and orderly condition at all times. No alleyway fans will be allowed!
- **18. NIGHT TIE-OUT.** (Beef Animals only) A night tie-out area will be provided for use between 8pm and 8am for beef animals.
- 19. Sharps Disposal. Any syringes/needles found in the garbage or manure pits require a biohazard team to be brought in for management and disposal. The cost of this situation management will be deducted from the following year's available premiums for all shows in the barn at the time of infraction. Disposal containers are available in Mallary offices, the milk room and several places throughout the barn. If a container is missing or full, please notify the Agriculture Office immediately! You may also take biohazard waste home with you.
- 20. CAMPER POLICY.
- a. <u>NEW FOR 2024</u>: Camping exhibitors are to submit a camping request by May 31. Camper reservations will be issued starting June 15. Camping exhibitors will pay for their camping reservation when a confirmation has been issued. Requests that are not accommodated will be added to a wait list. Wait list reservations will be issued as space is available through the fair. NO CAMPER WILL BE ACCEPTED IN THE MALLARY COMPLEX AREA WITHOUT A VERIFIED CONFIRMATION.
- b. Camper spaces may be requested by exhibitors and others working with an open livestock show during The Big E and are limited to dates of your entry activity.
- c. Camper move-in begins at 1 pm on your arrival date, and departure is by 12 pm noon on your departure day. Campers moving in on September 18 may experience delays due to the sheep moveout scheduled from 12 pm to 6 pm.
- d. Space is officially confirmed upon receipt of payment and signed Camper Confirmation. Your sig nature is required and by signing the Camper Confirmation the individual agrees to assume all risks associated with their stay.
- e. Camper spaces in the Mallary Complex area and are assessed as follows:
  - \$20 per camper per night for 0 slide-outs
  - \$30 per camper per night for 1 slide-out
  - \$40 per camper per night for 2+ slide-outs
- f. No camper will be parked in the Mallary Complex without a permit attached. Permits will be available from the camper lot superintendent upon arrival to gate 10.
- g. 50-amp service is available to all campers inside the Mallary Camping Lot.
- h. No drop awnings are permitted in the Mallary Complex area. Only grounded extension cords may be used in the camper lot. One plug per unit.
- i. All campers need to be equipped with a long sewer line and hose.
- j. If space is not available in the Mallary Camper Lot, dry camping is available at Gate 9 on a "first

- come, first served" basis without hook-ups or electricity.
- k. No cars, trucks or other non-camper vehicles are allowed to be used as overnight accommodation on the grounds of The Big E. Any vehicles used in this manner will be towed.
- More information is available regarding the availability of camper parking spaces in our public parking lot. For specific information regarding public parking, camping and pricing, please contact The Big E Admissions Department at 800-639-2908.
  - Eastern States Exposition does not encourage the use of tents due to their possible placement near moving vehicles in our public parking lot. Persons wishing to use canvas-sided/pop-up/tent campers must tell the parking attendant upon entering the parking area so they may be directed to the designated areas. For specific information, please contact The Big E Admissions Department at 800-639-2908.
  - No tents are allowed in the Mallary Agriculture Complex parking area.
  - Any persons using canvas-sided/pop-up/tent-type campers will be required to accept all
    responsibility for any theft, safety and/or personal liability.
  - Management reserves the right to refuse access, and is not responsible for accidents or personal loss, injury or damage to any property.
- 21. PREMIUM PAYMENT. The Big E will make an effort to have checks available at time of release; occasionally circumstances will not allow this. Checks will then be mailed in a timely fashion to the exhibitor. The Big E assumes no responsibility for premium checks once they are presented to the exhibitor. All checks must be cashed and missing checks reported prior to December 1. After January 1 the show's books are closed and protests are not valid. Any check not cashed within 90 days of date issued will be invalid and deemed a donation to the Agriculture and Education Department of Eastern States Exposition.
- **22. A**NIMAL **W**ELFARE. It is the responsibility of all exhibitors to provide proper and humane care and treatment to animals. Show Management reserves the right to disqualify and remove any exhibitor deemed to be in violation of this basic principle of animal husbandry.

#### 23. EXHIBITOR RESPONSIBILITIES.

- a. Animals quarantined by Animal Health Inspector or Veterinarian must leave the grounds or proceed directly to the quarantine area near Gate 10. No quarantined animal is allowed within the Mallary Complex or show area. Failure to comply is grounds for show ejection and loss of all premium money.
- b. Livestock are to be made available for parading and for judging contests as requested or premiums will be forfeited.
- c. Parking of all stock trailers will be at a satellite lot. Maps and directions will be available upon arrival and are available at www.TheBigE.com. Trailers should be removed from the grounds upon completion of unloading. We ask that exhibitors show consideration to fellow exhibitors who may be waiting to unload. (See additional information in Special Rules for the Dairy Goat show.)
- d. Manure is a recyclable resource. Please assist this process by keeping trash out of the manure pits. Only ESE approved bedding is allowed. Due to concerns of air quality for livestock and exhibitors, mechanical shredding or distribution of bedding by the exhibitor is not allowed in the Mallary Complex.
- e. Cattle may be watered in the stall area or wash rack.
- f. Walkways and aisles must be kept dry and neat.
- g. An exhibitor meeting will be held for each individual show at The Big E. It is the responsibility of the Show Superintendent, Breed Representative and Director of Agriculture to concur on a meeting time and place. Please listen for announcements and watch the OFFICIAL SHOW ANNOUNCEMENT bulletin board outside the Livestock Office for the time and place. The purposes of this meeting are to:
  - 1. propose new classes or recommend class deletions.
  - 2. have general input regarding the show.
  - 3. nominate judges for following year's show.
  - 4. elect Breed Representative from current year's exhibitors.
- h. Upon signing of entry, the exhibitor grants permission to be photographed/interviewed by the Exposition in connection with the activity. All photographs are the property of the Exposition and may be used for their purposes.
- Exhibitor consumption of alcohol is at their responsibility and should not impact other exhibitors or guests of the Exposition.
- j. Radios or any media players are acceptable at a decibel level that will not impact your fellow exhibitor's Fair experience. Management reserves the right to request you to lower the volume.
- **24. PET POLICY.** The Big E has instituted a **no pet policy**, which is strictly monitored in the Mallary Complex. Exception is made in the following circumstances:

- a. Sheep Dog Trial entries these dogs are restricted to the agriculture buildings and grounds appropriate for heading directly to and from these buildings (Mallary Complex, Farm-A-Rama and Coliseum), must be under supervision of their owner and on leash when not competing. These dogs must be supervised at all times. No dogs may be left unattended, whether in kennels, out of kennels or in parking lot.
- b. Dogs participating in the 4-H Dog Activity during the Fair please refer to the Arrival/Departure Schedule for Activity days.
- c. Working Sheep Dog Demonstration dogs and fowl.

#### Regarding ALL the above dogs:

- a. All dogs must comply with Massachusetts Animal Health Regulations. (Please see entire regulations page)
- b. Any dog found wandering or left unattended will be turned over to Hampden County Animal Control, telephone (413)781-1484. Any ensuing fines or fees will be the responsibility of the dog owner.
- 25. Quality Assurance Program. Quality assurance testing or a survey may be done at The Big E.
  - a. All animals are subject to testing at any time:
    - 1. to determine whether the animal has been unethically fitted in any way.
    - 2. to determine whether any false information or representation was made in a competition entry.
    - 3. to determine whether an animal qualifies for competition in a particular breed classification.
  - b. Exhibitor's signature on Entry Form acknowledges they have read, understand and agree to abide by the following rules for specific shows (copies are available in the Director of Agriculture's office):
    - 1. HOLSTEIN ASSN OF U.S.A. Show Ring Policy for the Holstein Show.
    - 2. PDCA Show Ring Code of Ethics for all other Dairy Shows.
    - 3. IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics for all other Livestock Shows.
    - 4. Eastern States Exposition Show Policy and Code of Ethics for all shows.
  - c. Use of drugs in animals not in compliance with manufacturer's label as to dosage, time of withdrawal limitations, or other manufacturer's limitations and show regulations is *PROHIBITED*. The use of tranquilizers or possession of same after arrival at the Fair will be construed as tampering. Canadian exhibitors must comply with US Drug Restrictions.
  - d. In the event of testing, violations will be handled in compliance of the ESE Code of Ethics.

#### ENTRY FEES AND PASS INFORMATION

Late entries, when allowed, are double the standard fee (unless otherwise noted). Late entries may not appear in the show catalog. Open show entry fees paid in full, must accompany completed entry forms. PAYMENT MUST BE IN U.S. FUNDS and checks made payable to Eastern States Exposition reflecting the following rates:

## EASTERN STATES EXPOSITION Show Ring Policy and Code of Ethics

Eastern States Exposition is one of the premier livestock shows in the Northeast. As an elite venue, Eastern States Exposition has a responsibility for maintaining a first-class image of fairness and ethics in its livestock shows. The purpose of regulations concerning ethical practices is to maintain a positive international reputation and to ensure good animal husbandry is on display for all spectators. Eastern States Exposition seeks to promote good animal husbandry, attractive barn exhibits and a high-quality show for exhibitors and spectators.

Eastern States Exposition endorses the PDCA and the IAFE Code of Ethics in all livestock shows and gives full cooperative support to the judges and the respective National Breed Associations. It recognizes that certain practices are necessary in the proper care and management of livestock in the course of moving livestock to and between shows in order to keep them in a sound, healthy condition so they might be presented in the show ring in a natural, normal condition.

To detect any unethical practices, show management, at the discretion of the Ethics Committee, may use technologies for testing body fluids like milk or blood or other new examination techniques like ultrasound at anytime while the animals are on Eastern States Exposition grounds. By making entry in any exhibition, an exhibitor consents to the collection of specimens, e.g. milk, blood, etc., and photographic or direct examination of the animal. Furthermore, by making an entry in any exhibition, the owner and/or exhibitor, as well as any individual handling or fitting their animal, agrees to supply proper animal and personal identification when asked by ethics personnel or show management.

The following are examples of practices or procedures that are violations of the Eastern States Exposition Show Ring Policy and Code of Ethics, which include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Misrepresenting the age, lineage/breed and/or milking status of the animal for the class in which it is entered.
- Treating an animal without a verifiable veterinary need for that treatment, internally or externally, for the purpose of improving the appearance. Extra label use of all drugs must be used under the direction of a licensed veterinarian. Evidence of same shall be provided in writing if requested.
- 3. In dairy cattle, using a device to artificially create or enhance the udder crease.
- 4. Icing of animal for non-medical purposes.
- Administering an injected or applied anesthetic to alter the carriage of the tail or other body parts.
- Surgically or unethically inserting any matter under the skin or into any body cavity to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body.
- Criticizing or interfering with the judge, show management or other exhibitors while in the Show Ring, on show grounds or other conduct detrimental to the breed or the show.
- Challenging, threatening, criticizing or interfering with an Ethics Committee member or volunteer appointed by show management to monitor the animals on exhibit on the show grounds.
- Failing to provide proper/accurate animal and/or personal identification when asked by ethics personnel or show management.
- Adding real or artificial hair or hair-like substances to any part of the animal, except for false switches.
- Excessively manipulating topline and/or tailhead hair in dairy cattle, beyond 11/2 inches from the skin.
- \*Should a topline violation occur (i.e. adding real or artificial hair or hair-like sub-stances or if topline hair is in excess of 11/2 inches): the Director of Agriculture and Education or their appointed agent shall inform the exhibitor that if they choose to enter the Show Ring, after being informed of such a topline violation, an ethics violation will have occurred.
- 13. Mistreatment of an animal.
- 14. Unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of owner or their representative(s).
- 15. Improper fitting practices, such as over filling and over bagging.
- Any alleged unethical practices or procedures not listed above are subject to review by the Ethics Committee.
- 17. An observer, will be appointed by Eastern States Exposition Management to be on duty at Eastern States Exposition events.
- 18. The observer will be responsible for monitoring violations of the Eastern States Exposition Show Ring Policy and Code of Ethics by exhibitors and their representatives.
- 19. Complaints of alleged violations may be presented to Eastern States Exposition Director of

- Agriculture and Education.
- 20. All complaints of alleged violations received by Director of Agriculture will be referred to the Ethics Committee to determine investigative requirements and discipline. To the extent reasonably possible, the identity of the animal, the owner and/or other involved parties will be kept confidential.
- 21 All findings of the Ethics Committee will be presented to the Director of Agriculture and Education.
- 22. The Eastern States Exposition staff has the authority to inspect all animals to determine if violations of the Eastern States Exposition Show Ring Policy and Code of Ethics have occurred. In that regard, the Eastern States Exposition has authority to perform the following:
  - pull hair samples;
  - draw blood samples;
  - perform an ultrasound examination of the udder, prior to milk-out;
  - perform a milk-out of any individual cow or cows;
  - collect and test any of the animal's body fluids;
  - use any technology that may be useful in determining if a violation has occurred in any animal based on placement, random selection or suspect characteristics;
- 23. Require delivery to the Eastern States Exposition Director of Agriculture and Education of hypodermic syringe, needle or other devices, swabs, cloths, or other material, or samples or any medicine, preparation, or substance, whether in liquid or other form, in the possession or control of the exhibitor, the fitter, agents or persons acting on behalf of the exhibitor for the purpose of laboratory analysis.
- 24. Following the judging of the milking cow classes, the Eastern States Exposition will ultrasound the udders, prior to milk-out, of at least 3 cows in a class.
- 25. Following the judging of all milking cow classes, milk samples may be taken from a minimum of three cows in both the open and junior show the Grand Champion, the Reserve Grand Champion and the Honorable Mention. Random ultrasound and milk samples will be taken in milking cow classes. Exhibitors who are selected to have milk samples taken from their animals will be presented a colored card with directions. Samples are not required to be drawn immediately following the class; however, teat seals may not be removed for milking until an ethics representative is present to take the samples. Animals may also be selected by the Director of Agriculture and Education to have a blood sample drawn.
- 26. An individual who is not necessarily an owner or exhibitor but who commits a violation of the Eastern States Exposition Show Ring Policy and Code of Ethics, will be subject to the same ethics enforcement procedures and sanctions as the owner or exhibitor. If an ethics violation occurs at the show, the Ethics Coordinator may take the following courses of action, depending on the severity of the violation.
- 27. Report to the Director of Agriculture and Education who may inform the judge of the violation. The judge may consider the violation in the placing of the class.
- 28. Following the completion of the Eastern States Exposition events and the evaluation of the hair samples/measurements, ultrasound readings and upon the receipt of the milk sample and blood sample analysis or other lab reports, and reports of eye witnesses or Eastern States Exposition personnel, the Ethics Committee will submit a report to Show Management if any violations have occurred. This reporting will happen as soon as reasonably possible after the end of the show.
- 29. If evidence suggests that a violation has occurred, the Director of Agriculture and Education will promptly notify the accused individual(s) and/or owner(s) as listed on the entry form of the suspected violation and will provide the accused individual(s) with copies of the supporting evidence to the extent reasonably possible. As soon as possible thereafter, an ethics hearing will be scheduled. Eastern States Exposition shall take reasonable steps to maintain the anonymity of the accused individual(s) and/or animal throughout the enforcement process
- 30. An Eastern States Exposition representative will present the evidence, while maintaining individual confidentiality, at a hearing of the Ethics Committee. Generally, the Ethics Committee will consist of eight people,: seven livestock committee members, including representation of at least three different species, and moderated by the Eastern States Exposition Director of Agriculture and Education. Ethics Committee members will serve as a jury to determine whether the accused individual(s) is/are guilty of a violation and, if so, what penalty is appropriate for the violation. A guilty verdict must be by a 2/3 majority of the Ethics Committee. The hearing will be presided over by the Eastern States Exposition Director of Agriculture and Education. In each case, the accused individual will be invited to defend or explain the allegations, submit

- evidence, and/or have representation at the hearing.
- 31. Promptly after the Ethics Committee renders its decision, the Director of Agriculture and Education will inform the accused individual(s) of the determinations of the Ethics Committee. It is the accused individual(s) responsibility to notify any other owners of the determination by the Ethics Committee.
- 32. If found guilty of a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics, the penalty for the individual, the exhibitor, the representative and/or the animal may range from a letter of reprimand to being barred for three years from participating at Eastern States Exposition. The identity of the animal(s), exhibitors and/or representatives that are barred will be kept confidential to the extent reasonably possible.
- An animal found in violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics will forfeit any premiums, their
  placing will be removed and the animal and/or owner/representative must observe any penalty
  placed upon them.
- 34. If the individual, the exhibitor and/or their representatives are guilty of repeated violations at Eastern States Exposition events, they and/or the animal could be barred from participating at Eastern States Exposition for life.
- 35 Barring an exhibitor or representative and/or an individual will result in animals owned fully or in partnership by that individual, farm and/or affiliated entity not being allowed to enter, exhibit or sell in Eastern States Exposition shows and/or sales. The barred individual will also be ineligible to be present in the Show Ring, and/or serve any other official capacity for the length of the bar. Any individual barred for an ethics violation at any point of time (regardless of timing or length of bar) must be approved by Eastern States Exposition's Ethics Committee prior to being nominated to serve on any official committee or as an official judge.

#### ANIMAL HEALTH RULES AND REGULATIONS

Attached are the 2024 Massachusetts Animal Health Rules for Fairs and Shows. These rules are current as of August 10, 2024 but are subject to change due to the continuing outbreak of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in birds in the United States. Please visit Massachusetts

Agricultural Fairs Program | Mass.gov for the most updated version.

Special Notes: Massachusetts COVID-19 response orders supersede all other exhibition guidance

Due to the continuing outbreak of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in birds in the United States, Animal Health Officials from all six New England States may recommend postponing competitions, exhibitions, shows, swaps, or other in-person events encouraging the gathering or comingling of domestic fowl or poultry. If events are held, best practices for biosecurity should be implemented.

The virus that causes HPAI in birds, H5N1 influenza, has also been detected in lactating dairy cattle in 12 states as of May 24, 2024, all outside of New England. As a precaution, all lactating dairy cattle moving interstate are subject to additional pre-movement testing and documentation requirements, and some fairs and shows may prohibit their entry onto show grounds. Please see the "Cattle" section below for more information.

In addition to complying with all laws and regulations governing animal health issues all fairs must adopt and enforce the following rules for governance for the fair.

NO animal will be admitted to the fairgrounds unless it meets the requirements below. NO animal is to be unloaded or enter a barn or tie-out stall until the animal and its paperwork have been inspected and approved for entry.

#### General Rules for All Animals: See M.G.L. c. 128 §2C. 129 §2

### A. General Rules for All Animals: M.G.L. c. 128 2C. 129 2

- All animals must be in proper physical condition, be properly identified and free of visual evidence of
  infectious, contagious or parasitic disease at time of arrival. Specific diseases and conditions which
  will disqualify an animal for entry are identified for each species in the following sections of the rules.
  Animals of any species with open or draining wounds will not be approved for entry.
- Evidence of infectious, contagious or parasitic disease or failure to produce the necessary documents for health
  certification, vaccination or testing will result in the animal's rejection for entry. THE INSPECTOR'S DECISION
  IS FINAL.
- 3. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only, and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly-licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- Official ID: See Final Rule: Summary of Traceability for Livestock Moved Interstate (Summary of general requirements by species)
  - All livestock must have proper official, individual ID as required and approved for the species, e.g., official metal ear tag, tattoo, scrapie tag, or microchip. Registration forms must accompany health certificates when used as part of official identification.
- 5. Health Certificates: --

One Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI) may be allowed for animals of the same species to be exhibited at fairs or shows in any of the New England states (CT, \*ME, MA, \*\*NH, RI, and \*\*\*VT) when submitted with an itinerary of the dates and locations of the events at which the listed animals are expected to be shown. Only animals that are healthy at the time of shipment may be moved. Note that \*ME, \*\*NH, and \*\*\*VT have additional requirements. Certificates of veterinary inspection in these states are valid for a shorter period of time and may have additional language, movement and permit requirements.

For the 2022 Show and Fair Season, livestock animals being exhibited in New England states must have official certificates of veterinary inspection (OCVIs) that meet the following requirements:

- a. <u>MA</u>, and RI: OCVIs issued on or after January 1, 2024 may be used for those animals being shown at multiple fairs and shows in MA, and RI through the 2024 show/fair season ending October 31, 2024. <u>MA -Notes:</u> The Big E Fairgrounds in West Springfield requires an Infectious Disease Waiver (provided by The Big E) for all equines entering the premises for any show, fair, or exhibition. All bovines must have official RFID tags.
- b. CT and ME: An importation permit for exhibition animals is also required. Contact CT Dept. of Agriculture

- (860-713-2504) or ME State Veterinarian's Office (207-287-3701) for permits or questions.
- c. NH: \*\*NH: To qualify for the extended CVI, animals exhibited in NH must originate in a New England state and move on OCVIs issued on or after April 1, 2022 to participating NH fairs and shows from July 1 to October 31. The extended CVI is not available for animals that do not reside in New England. Contact NH State Veterinarian's Office (603) 271-2404 for details and permits.
- d. \*\*\*VT: Contact the VT Animal Health Office (802-828-2421) for specific import requirements that deviate from the general information in this letter and must be met for legal import of livestock.
- e. A single OCVI from the animals' home state may be completed for travel to and from the New England states in which the animals will be exhibited. MA animals being shown ONLY in MA may substitute a signed, dated latter on the letterhead of an accredited veterinarian for an OCVI if all required information is included and all additional requirements are met.
- f. Multiple animals of the same species may be listed on one health certificate with appropriate individual IDs and descriptions. Animals of different species may not be listed on the same official health certificate.
- g. An itinerary of the names and locations for each New England fair or show at which owner expects to show the listed animals and the dates when each animal is expected to be on each site, must be prepared by the owner and presented to the veterinarian at the time the OCVI is written.
  - A copy of this planned itinerary must be attached to the official health certificate (import and export) for it to be used for more than one fair or show.
  - ii. That proposed list should be signed by the veterinarian and the owner/ exhibitor and reference the relevant OCVI number(s).
- h. The name and address of the first show or fair where the listed animals will be exhibited is to be used as the "destination" on the OCVI form. In addition, "See attached list" or a similar statement directing Animal Health Officials or Fair Inspectors to the attached proposed itinerary must be included.
- Exhibitors must keep an accurate list of the show locations and dates when their animals were actually on the show/fairgrounds. This record must be available to fair inspectors at each inspection and check-in.
- j. Any animal listed on an OCVI that becomes sick must remain home. If the animal is refused entry to any exhibition during 2024 for health reasons it must have a new health certificate issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days of the next interstate movement.
- k. Any New England state may end their participation in this agreement and revert to the standard published requirements for livestock imports in the state at any time, in the event of foreign animal disease outbreak or changes to state legislation.

All petting zoos are required to have a USDA APHIS Exhibitor's License (as needed) and valid 2024 health certificates.

ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EACH SPECIES ARE LISTED BELOW

#### B. Cattle: See M.G.L. c. 129 882, 39 and 330 CMR 4.04(2).

Updated May 24, 2024:

Please be advised that the above guidance does not applying to Lactating Dairy Cattle moving interstate for purpose of showing or exhibition. Lactating Dairy Cattle are subject to the Federal Order requiring a negative test for Avian Influenza and an Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI) written by an accredited veterinarian in the state of origin within 7 days of movement.

This is an evolving situation. Changes to these requirements will be published as they become available. Fais and shows may elect to prohibit lactating dairy cattle from entering the show premises.

- 1. TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States and in-state animals. Current brucellosis and TB status in the exhibitor's state can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office in each state. If the exhibitor's state is not TB-Accredited or Brucellosis-Free, then the exhibitor must call the Massachusetts Division of Animal Health for entry requirements (617-626-1795or 857-348-3922). All animals must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, cowpox and open or draining wounds.
- 2. While not required, it is strongly recommended that all cattle be currently vaccinated for rabies.
- 3. Note: **The Big E is requiring RFID official identification tags for all cattle** entering the Big E Fairgrounds premises in 2024. Other fairs may add this requirement. Contact fair office with questions.

## C. Poultry: See M.G.L. c. 882, 129, and 330 CMR 5.02.

- 1. No poultry will be admitted to a fairground until it has been individually inspected.
- 2. All poultry must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: infectious bronchitis, coryza, pullorum- typhoid, fowl-pox, external parasites and laryngotracheitis.
- 3. Each bird must be accompanied by written proof (ID card or test report) that the breeding flock was blood- tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within one year prior to entry date.
- 4. Birds from guarantined states will not be permitted entry.
- All birds over 16 weeks of age as of January 1, 2024 shall be individually leg banded with a state leg band. This includes out of state exhibitors.
- 6. No bird vaccinated for laryngotracheitis within thirty days of the fair will be admitted.

## D. Goats: See M.G.L. c. 129 62. 9 CFR 79.6 and Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06.

- TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States
  and in-state animals.
- 2. All goats and kids presented, regardless of age, must be individually listed and identified on the health certificate. All goats must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, pox and open or draining wounds. All goats must also be free of sore mouth and scrapie exposure.
- Based on the Federal Scrapie Eradication Program (FSEP), goats and sheep of any age or sex brought to show or exhibition from either out of state or within state must possess a USDA official individual identification tag or registry tattoo accompanied by current registration papers consistent with the requirements of the FSEP and the Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06. Information is available from USDA-APHIS at 508-363- 2290.

## E. Camelids (Llamas, Alpacas, etc.): See M.G.L. c. 129 62, M.G. l. c. 131, 623, 321 CMR 9.02,

1. TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States or for in-state animals. Current brucellosis and TB status in the exhibitor's state can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office in each state. If the exhibitor's state is not TB-Accredited or Brucellosis-Free, then the exhibitor contact MDAR for an entry permit.

## F. Swine: See M.G.L. c. 129 614E, 330 CMR 11.04(2), 9 CFR 71.19

- 1. All swine must be identified by an official ear tag or registration.
- 2. Swine must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: erysipelas, atrophic rhinitis, manage and open or draining wounds.
- No person shall import into Massachusetts from outside the state any swine which have been pseudorabies vaccinated. M.G.L. c. 129 §14E.
- 4. All swine shall originate from qualified pseudorabies-free herds or monitored herds in qualified pseudorabies free States only. The pseudorabies status of the exhibitor's state can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office in each state.

### G. Sheep: See 9 CFR 79 and Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06.

- No sheep will be allowed entry from flocks in which Scrapie has been diagnosed or in which animals are under surveillance for Scrapie during the previous eighteen months. Based on the Federal Scrapie Eradication Program (FSEP), goats and sheep of any age or sex brought to show or exhibition from either out of state or within state must possess a USDA official individual identification tag or registry tattoo accompanied by current registration papers consistent with the requirements of the FSEP and the Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06. Information is available from USDA-APHIS at 508-363-2290.
- No sheep will be permitted entry from flocks in which soremouth has existed or in which soremouth Vaccine has been administered in the previous sixty (60) days.
- Sheep must be free from visual evidence of foot rot, sore mouth, pink eye, ringworm, and open and draining wounds. While not required, it is strongly recommended that sheep be currently vaccinated against rabies.

## H. Equine: M.G.L. c. 128 §§2C. 44 . 330 CMR 16.05.

1. All equines entering a Massachusetts fairground must have a valid health certificate.

Note: The Big E Fairgrounds in West Springfield requires a CVI issued within the prior 30 days for all equines entering the premises for any show, fair, or exhibition.

- All equines must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: mange, ringworm, soring, strangles, and open or draining wounds.
- All equines originating from within and outside of the Commonwealth must have a negative USDA- approved EIA test (i.e., Coggins test or ELISA test) dated within twelve months of entry.
- 4. While not required, it is *strongly recommended* that all equines be vaccinated for rabies, tetanus, EEE and WNV within one year of the fair.

## I. Rabbits: See M.G.L. c. 129 §2

Rabbits must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: rabbit hemorrhagic Disease Virus 2 (RHDV2), snuffles, wet tail, and skin and ear infections. Microchips may be used for ID in rabbits originating in MA.

### J. Dogs and Cats: See M.G.L. c. 129 839G

- All dogs and cats must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: kennel cough, distemper, hepatitis, parvo, ringworm and mange.
- 2. All dogs and cats must be accompanied by a valid and current vaccination certificate for rabies.

## EVACUATION PLAN FOR ANIMALS ON EXHIBITION AT EASTERN STATES EXPOSITION

If an event should occur on the Exposition grounds that would require the evacuation or removal of animals being exhibited or shown under the control of the Agriculture Department of Eastern States Exposition, the following guidelines should be implemented to assist in the timely and orderly evacuation of these animals.

- The Director of Agriculture and Education of the Exposition will notify the Security Department that a situation exists that would require the evacuation of some or all of the animals on the Exposition grounds.
- 2. Upon notification from the Exposition Director of Agriculture and Education, the Director of Public Safety will be dispatched to the Agriculture Department office located in the Mallary Complex, or other location as directed, to act as a liaison between the Director of Public Safety and the Agriculture Department Director.
- 3. The Dirctor of Public Safety, at the direction of the Agriculture Department will establish a central location where the Agriculture Department exhibitors will stand by to be transported or escorted to off grounds parking so vehicles to be used to transport the animals off grounds may be rapidly returned to the Exposition grounds to be loaded out.
- 4. If the animals need to be removed immediately from the buildings they are to be housed in the Coliseum. The Security Department will provide officers to secure the route to this location and assist in isolating the Coliseum once the animals are moved.

  Removal of animals from the building will proceed under the Direction of the West Springfield Fire Department.
- 5. The Security Department shall provide all available vehicles to transport drivers or escort vehicles to retrieve trailers from off ground locations.
- 6. The Director of Public Safety supervisor shall accompany the vehicles to the off grounds location to assist in assembling a convoy of vehicles to be escorted back to the Exposition grounds for loading.
- 7. Should the disposal of animal remains be necessary the Director of Agriculture will work with R G Webster Enterprises and the MDAR(Massachusetts Department of Agriculture Resources) to assure that this is done in a timely manner.
- 8. All operations shall continue until directed by the Director of Agriculture to be suspended.

## QUARANTINE PLAN FOR ANIMALS ON EXHIBITION AT EASTERN STATES EXPOSITION

Should the MDAR (Massachusetts Department of Agriculture Resources) determine that a mass quarantine needs to take place at the Exposition, the Director of Agriculture will follow all directives issued by MDAR, and acting with the assistance of the Seasonal Security secure the quarantine area and proceed to set up care of all quarantined animals.

## 2024 Fire Prevention Regularions for Exhibit Halls / Temporary Structures / Agricultural Events

- Smoking is prohibited inside any building or temporary structure
- 2. Aisles shall be a minimum of 10' in width and remain free of obstructions at all times
- 3. All exits and fire lanes shall remain unobstructed and free at all times per 527 CMR 1.00
- All fire alarm pull stations, fire extinguishers, sprinkler heads and any other fire protection devices
  or equipment shall be free and clear of obstructions and readily visible per 527 CMR 1.00
- All columns marked with a red band at the top (indicating a fire extinguisher location) shall not be obstructed or obscured from view
- No signs, decorations, or products shall be attached to any part of the automatic fire sprinkler system
- 7. All decorations, fabric used as backdrops and / or table coverings must be flame retardant
  - a. Use of spray flame retardant is acceptable (NFPA 701 testing standards)
- 8. All tents (i.e. "pop-up tent") must have flame retardant ratings
  - No vendor shall set up more than (2) 10' x 10' tents next to each other without a 10' space in between
- 9. All lighting / electrical mechanisms shall have a UL label
  - a. Extension cords must be proper wire gauge (AWG) for the load connected b. Home extension cords are prohibited
- 10. Electrical devices shall not be left unattended
  - Displays utilizing lights / electrical mechanisms shall be shut-off or unplugged at the end of the event day
- 11. Flammable liquids and gases (propane, butane, etc.) are not permitted within buildings
- 12. Non-flammable gas cylinders shall be supported by metal stands / a proper chain
- 13. Any motorized engine (automobile, truck, motorcycle, RV, ATV, etc§) shall have the positive battery lead disconnected / taped [527 CMR 1.00 Ch. 20.1.5.5.4.12.2]
- 14. All fuel tank openings shall be locked and sealed (taped) to prevent escape of vapors
  - a. Fuel tanks shall not contain in excess of ½ their capacity or in excess of 10 gallons (which ever is less) [527 CMR 1.00 Ch. 20.1.5.5.4.12.1]
- 15. Keys are not permitted to be within the ignition [527 CMR 1.00 Ch. 20.1.5.5.4.12.3]
  - a. Vehicles may operate off of shore power only
- 16. Vehicle engines are not permitted to be started / run at any time within a building while occupied by the public [527 CMR 1.00 Ch. 20.1.5.5.4.12.5]
- Lithium-ion (Li-Ion) batteries (on display) must not be stored in excess quantities according to the Deputy Chief of Fire Prevention
  - a. Approval required from WSFD Fire Prevention Office prior to setup
  - Li-ion batteries in larger quantities for sale shall be stored outside of structures at least 10' from a building
  - c. Li-ion batteries on display shall be inspected and protected from potential damage
  - d. Li-ion batteries on display shall not be left unattended while charging / in-use
- 18. Electric vehicles, which contain Li-ion batteries must adhere to the following
  - a. Electric vehicles shall not be moved during exhibit hours
  - Manufacturer's recommendations must be adhered to when concerning the length of battery use
  - c. Carbon monoxide alarms must be present within 10' of electric vehicle use

- e. Electric vehicles are prohibited to be stored within 25' of building systems or services (i.e. electrical room, sprinkler room, etc..)
- 19. Live trees, baled hay / straw, corn stalks, and vegetation shall be watered daily
  - Approval required from WSFD Fire Prevention Office prior to setup
  - b. The use of burlap is prohibited
- 20. Home and garden events, where bark mulch is an integral part of vendor business (landscape contractors, garden center distributors etc§) and the display is readily available as landscape or garden center exhibit, may use bark mulch under the following conditions:
  - a. Contained behind masonry or other non-combustible retaining wall
  - b. No more than 3" in depth
  - c. Shall be sprayed with water daily, before / after the event (must be kept damp)

### **IAFE**

## (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS) NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof
  of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation
  of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.
  - At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
- Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of

- animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals
  to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not
  acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.
