### RULES FOR THE AGRICULTURAL EXHIBIT HALL

(located next to the Club House)

- **NO ENTRY FEE TO ENTER ANY OF THESE EXHIBITS.**
- **All entries are received upon the express condition that the society shall not be responsible for the loss or damage to such property.**
- Please “READ & FOLLOW THE RULES” exactly as given in the Exhibitor's Guide.
- All exhibits must have been grown, selected and arranged by the exhibitor during the past 12 months.
- No article previously exhibited in this building may be exhibited.
- The same specimens cannot be entered both as part of a collection and as a plate.
- Only one (1) entry per class per exhibitor. Exceptions may be made for the “Any Other” classes.
- **Placing will be awarded on the basis of quality of exhibit and the decision of the Judges will be final.**
- **All produce MUST be washed and of show quality.**
- If a class is available for an item, the “Any Other” class CANNOT be used.

- No names should be visible on any items. This includes the names of businesses or farms associated with the exhibitor. Anything visible will be removed.
- In the event of fewer than 3 entries in any given class, the Management reserves the right to combine comparable classes. If there are sufficient entries, classes may be divided at the judges' discretion.
- The Management reserves the right to reclassify an exhibit.
- A “DISQUALIFIED” means that the rules were not followed.
- All premium money will be paid from awards as marked in the Judge’s book and NOT from the ribbons that may be attached to exhibits, as ribbons are sometimes misplaced.
- YOUTH EXHIBITS are open to anyone 9 to 19 years of age as of January 1 of the current year. Exhibitors under 9 years old will have their own classes, CHILD EXHIBITS. ADULT EXHIBITS are open to anyone who has reached the age of 20 as of the Fair date. Ages for Youth and Child exhibitors should be included in all entries. Exceptions are made if the division or class does not exist in the Youth or Child categories.
- No person may exhibit in Adult, Youth, and Child Classes. Exceptions are made if the division or class does not exist in the Youth or Child categories.
- If you have any questions, write or call the Superintendent(s).
- The Management reserves the right to remove perished items. If an exhibitor wishes to refresh their items, the exhibitor can do so at the exhibitor’s convenience. Please contact the Superintendent(s).

## **REMOVAL OF EXHIBITS**

### **NO EARLY REMOVAL OF EXHIBITS.**

The building will be closed to the public at 6:00 P.M. on Monday, Sept. 2<sup>nd</sup>.

*Exhibitors who wish to help oversee the exhibits in the Hall for one 4-hour shift,  
at some time during the Fair, may volunteer with the Superintendents.  
Passes will be issued for this purpose.*

## **ADULT EXHIBITS**

- The following Fruit and Farm classes may limit the number of placements in each class to ensure adequate display space for all exhibitors.
- The Judge will keep a scorecard on these exhibits. After the judging, the superintendent will make it available.
- To receive the listed Premium, a score of 85% must be achieved.
- All entries must be kept fresh.
- Passes will be issued for these classes to allow the exhibitors to comply with this rule.

## Fruit & Vegetable Displays - Division 523



**Class**

01. Display of at least 6 kinds of fruit to cover a 3' x 3' square of table space.
02. Display of mixed fruit – attractively arranged in appropriate container, such as chopping bowl, tray, basket, bowl, etc., using at least 5 kinds of fruit.

*In Classes 03 & 04, the judges may divide the themes into fruit-oriented and vegetable-oriented.*

03. Family Display – 3' x 4' High Back – to consist of any article grown or manufactured on the exhibitor's property during the last 12 months. At least 60% of items, including canning and flowers, must be agricultural. Baking will not be counted for 60% of agricultural items.
04. Family Display – 3' x 4' Low Back
05. Collection of Garden Vegetables – 3' x 3' – using at least 6 kinds
06. Collection of at least 5 kinds of Vegetables & Greens exhibited in a chopping bowl/suitable container.
07. Market Basket—A collection of at least five items from the list of fair classes displayed in a container suitable for use at a farmer's market. The basket can contain baked items, flowers, fruits, herbs (both dry and/or fresh), vegetables, maple products, eggs, farm crops, and handmade item(s) by the exhibitor. Flowers, herbs, and stems of leafy greens should be in water; a vase can be hidden in the basket. Items must be grown or crafted by the exhibitor.

## Bees & Honey - Division 527



### RULES

- An exhibitor shall not offer for exhibit any item not produced and/or prepared by the exhibitor.
- Honey and beeswax must be produced from the exhibitor's own apiary and the current year's crop.
- All honey needs to be in leak-proof containers.
- All frames of honey need to be mounted in bee-tight cases with transparent faces.
- An exhibitor shall make only one entry in a given class.
- New classes may be listed and judged, provided there are 3 or more entries.
- Undesirable quality exhibits will not be accepted.
- Placings' will be awarded on the basis of the quality of the exhibit, and the decision of the judges will be final.
- No labels or identification will be placed on any entry until judged.
- The exhibitor will pick up all observation hives on Monday evening.
- *Classes 01-06 are to be judged on appearance, and Classes 07-12 are to be in queen-line jars.*

## Canned and Preserved Goods - Division 542



### **Rules and Regulations:**

- **All entries are received upon the express condition that the society shall not be responsible for the loss or damage to such property.**
- The products shown must be canned in the past 12 months and have been made by the exhibitor.
- Must be labeled with the contents and date they were canned.
- Labeling and Jars shall all be uniform. Each entry shall be of the Standard Commercial Jar size and type.
- All products, including jam and jelly, shall be sealed by processing—hot water bath for fruits, pressure for tomatoes, vegetables, and vegetable combinations.
- Foods to be canned must be fresh produce, not previously canned or frozen.
- At drop off, exhibitors are required to add their ShoWorks exhibitor number to the bottom of each jar.
- Preference shall be given to practical packs, rather than to fancy packs.
- Rings should be removed and jars should be clean & clear of sticky residue.

- **All entries are received upon the express condition that the society shall not be responsible for the loss or damage to such property.**
- The products shown must be canned in the past 12 months and have been made by the exhibitor.

- Preference shall be given to practical packs, rather than to fancy packs.

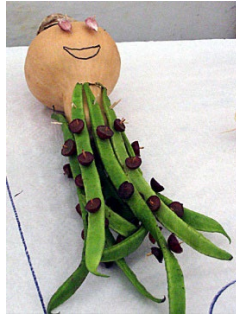
