## **RULES FOR THE AGRICULTURAL EXHIBIT HALL**

(located next to the Club House)

- **All entries are received upon the express condition that the society shall not be responsible for the loss or damage to such property.**
- Please “READ & FOLLOW THE RULES” exactly as given in the Exhibitor’s Guide.
- All exhibits must have been grown, selected and arranged by the exhibitor during the past 12 months.
- No article previously exhibited in this building may be exhibited.
- The same specimens cannot be entered both as part of a collection and as a plate.
- Only one (1) entry per class per exhibitor, however, an exhibitor may enter as many varieties in a class as he/she wishes.
- **Placing will be awarded on the basis of quality of exhibit and the decision of the Judges will be final.**
- If a class is available for an item, the “Any Other” class CANNOT be used.
- No names should be visible on any items.
- In the event of fewer than 3 entries in any given class, the Management reserves the right to combine comparable classes. If there are sufficient entries, classes may be divided at the discretion of the Judges.
- The Management reserves the right to reclassify an exhibit.
- A “DISQUALIFIED” means that the rules were not followed.
- All premium money will be paid from awards as marked in the Judge’s book and NOT from the ribbons that may be attached to exhibits, as ribbons are sometimes misplaced.
- YOUTH EXHIBITS are open to any person 9 to 19 years of age as of January 1 of current year. Exhibitors less than 9 years will have their own classes, CHILD EXHIBITS. ADULT EXHIBITS are open to anyone who have reached the age of 20 as of the Fair date. Ages for Youth and Child exhibitors should be included on all entries.
- No person may exhibit in both Adult, Youth, and Child Classes.
- If you have any questions, write or call the Superintendent(s).

- The Management reserves the right to remove perished items. If an exhibitor wishes to refresh their items, the exhibitor can do so at the exhibitor's convenience. Please contact the Superintendent(s).

### REMOVAL OF EXHIBITS

NO EARLY REMOVAL OF EXHIBITS. The building will be closed to the public at 8:00 P.M. on Monday, Sept. 6<sup>th</sup>. Exhibits must be removed on **Tuesday, Sept. 7<sup>th</sup> from 4:00 PM – 7:00 PM.** If you have a problem, please discuss it with the Superintendent. The fair is **NOT** responsible for exhibits left beyond at this time. Please check your list of awards with the Superintendent, or her representatives, for any clerical errors.

DISCREPANCIES MUST BE CORRECTED AT PICK UP.

### ADULT EXHIBITS

To ensure adequate display space for all exhibitors, the following Fruit and Farm classes may be limited to the number of placements in each class. The Judge will keep a score card on these exhibits. These will be available from the Superintendent after judging. To receive the listed Premium, a score of 85% must be achieved. All entries must be kept fresh. Passes will be issued on these classes to allow the exhibitors to comply with this rule.

*Exhibitors who wish to help oversee the exhibits in the Hall for one 4-hour shift, at some time during the Fair, may volunteer with the Superintendents. Passes will be issued for this purpose.*

#### Fruit & Vegetable Displays - Division 523

##### Class

01. Display of at least 6 kinds of fruit to cover a 3' x 3' square of table space.
02. Display of mixed fruit – attractively arranged in appropriate container, such as chopping bowl, tray, basket, bowl, etc., using at least 5 kinds of fruit.

*In Classes 03 & 04, fruit oriented and vegetable oriented themes may be divided at the discretion of the judges.*

03. Family Display – 3' x 4' High Back – *to consist of any article that has been grown or manufactured on the exhibitor's property during the last 12 months. At least 60% of items must be agricultural, including canning and flowers. Baking will not be counted for 60% agricultural items.*
04. Family Display – 3' x 4' Low Back
05. Collection of Garden Vegetables – 3' x 3' – *using at least 6 kinds*
06. Collection of at least 5 kinds of Vegetables and Greens exhibited in a chopping bowl or suitable container.
07. Market Basket – *Collection of at least five items from list of fair classes displayed in a container suitable to use at farmers market. Basket can contain: baked items, flowers, fruits, herbs (both dry and/or fresh), vegetables, maple products, eggs, farm crops, and handmade item(s) by the exhibitor. Flowers, herbs, and stems of leafy greens should be in water, vase can be hidden in basket. Items must be grown or crafted by exhibitor.*

- Undesirable quality exhibits will not be accepted.
- Placing's will be awarded on basis of quality of exhibit, and the decision of the judges will be final.
- No labels or identification on any entry until judged.
- All observation hives are to be picked up by the exhibitor on Monday evening.
