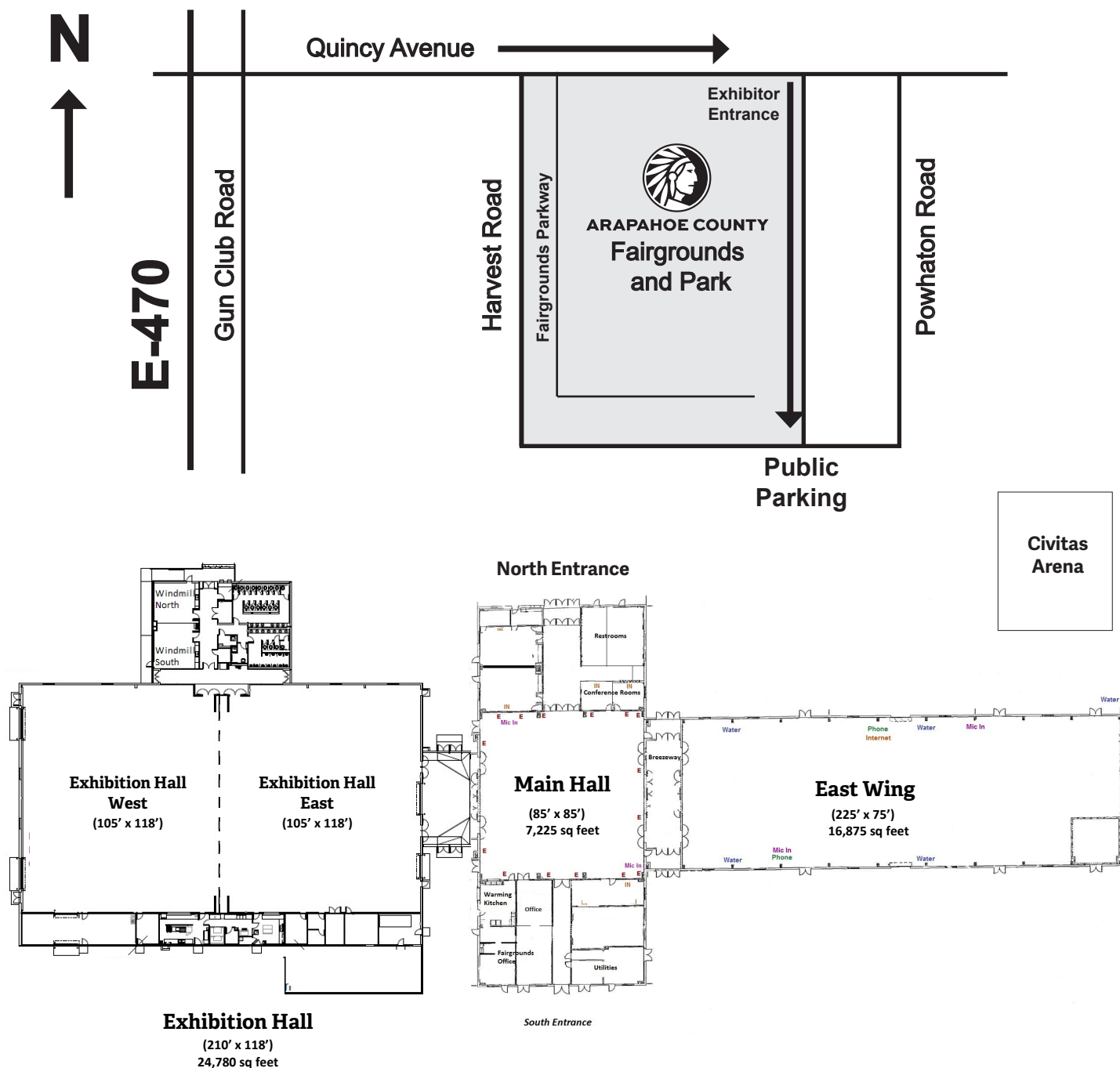

5. Mailed pre-entry forms must be postmarked Wednesday, July 12 and received by July 19, 2023.
6. Exhibitors entering online for the first time or exhibitors who did not keep their password from the last Fair will need to create their own password/ID.
7. For help with computer pre-entry, call 303-730-1920 and ask for Jean Walton.
8. Faxed or email entries are not accepted.

3. If you have not submitted a pre-entry form, you will need to submit the completed entry form on page 15, and completed exhibit entry tags(s) on pages 17 and 19.
4. **Entry Tags:**
 - a. Exhibit description is required on temporary exhibit tag for each exhibit and on entry form.
 - b. Complete the exhibit entry tags for your exhibits prior to arriving at the Fair. These forms are on page 17 and 19 and may be copied and also online at **ArapahoeCountyFair.com** under Public Competition. This will speed up the entry process.

5. Entries not accepted after 9:30 a.m., July 25. **No exceptions.**
6. Allow time to complete your paperwork so that the entry process is completed by 9:30 a.m.
7. It is the exhibitors' responsibility to enter their exhibits in the correct class.

EXHIBITOR RULES:

1. Exhibitors of any age may live in any Colorado county.
2. Youth are eligible and encouraged to enter in Public Living Arts competitions. **Youth exhibitors do not need to be enrolled in 4-H.**
3. All articles entered must be entered in the name of the person who made it.
4. Quilt and Traditional Hooked Rug entries must have been completed after July 31, 2021.
5. All other entries must have been completed after July 31, 2022.
6. Items exhibited in a previous Arapahoe County Fair may not be shown in this year's Fair.
7. Label all items with exhibitor's full name.
8. **Items may not be entered if there is not a class for them.**
9. **There is a limit of two entries per class by an individual except in photography. No exceptions.**
10. Exhibitors must enter in their respective age divisions except for Fine Arts. (See page 9.)
 - a) Juniors: Age 18 and under, as of Dec. 31, 2022
 - b) Seniors: Age 19 and up as of Dec 31, 2022
11. **Please consult this book for information regarding rules and regulations in each Division.**
12. Judging will be open to the public but may be subject to change due to public health orders.
13. The Arapahoe County Fair Committee has the right to refuse any entry if it is deemed inappropriate for a general audience or does not meet the exhibit guidelines given.

EXHIBIT RELEASE:

1. All exhibits must remain on display until release time at **6 – 8:00 p.m., Sunday, July 30, 2023.**

2. **If you cannot pick up your exhibits on Sunday, July 30, 2023, please make arrangements to have someone pick them up for you.**
3. Exhibits not picked up will be kept at the Fairgrounds for one week after the Fair, and then taken to the Extension Office unless other arrangements have been made.

AWARDS:

1. The American Placing System is used in Living Arts; judges choose one first, one second and one third place in each class.
2. **Judges reserve the option to withhold ribbons and awards in a class where there is no deserving entry.** The decision of the judges is final.
3. Classes may be combined, divided, exhibits moved to the appropriate class, or not entered at the discretion of the superintendents and/or the judge in all Divisions.
4. In classes with only one entry, the award will be based on merit.
5. **Overall Judge's Choice Ribbons:** This award is based on the best blue ribbon entry in each of the areas listed and will be chosen by the judges.
 - a. There will be one Overall Junior and one Overall Senior Judge's Choice Award in each of the divisions listed: Photography, Metal Art, Pottery, Sculpture & 3D Assemblage, Paper Arts, Baked Goods, Food Preservation, Candy, Quilts, Knitting, Crochet, Needle Arts, Other Fiber Arts, and Woodworking
 - b. In Fine Arts there will be one Overall Youth, one Overall Junior, One Overall Intermediate and one Overall Senior Judge's Choice Award.
6. **People's Choice Ribbons:** Only **one Senior** and **one Junior** People's Choice Ribbon award will be given in Public Competition Living Arts. Voting will begin Thursday, July 27 and end Saturday, July 29. These awards will be posted on Sunday, July 30, 2023.

PROTESTS:

1. Under no circumstances shall any Superintendent or Fair Official be treated disrespectfully. Complaints must be brought to the attention of the Fair Planning Committee in writing within 24 hours.

EXHIBIT RULES ALL BAKED GOODS

1. Exhibitors may enter two items per class.
2. All exhibits should be brought on white disposable plates. **Exhibits in pans will not be accepted.**
3. Breads are to be entered as a loaf unless otherwise specified.
4. **Standard size loaf pans are to be used for breads (Approximately 4 ½" x 8" x 3").**
5. **Artisan Yeast Breads are not required to be baked in a loaf pan.**
6. Submit recipe on 3" x 5" card (for judge's use only.)
7. Only a portion of all baked goods exhibits will be kept for display. The remainder may be claimed by the exhibitor following judging.

PRODUCT STANDARDS FOR BAKED GOODS

Quick Bread should be even or slightly rounded, golden brown crust, equally light throughout. Texture should have a fine even grain, not crumbly. Flavor should be characteristic of ingredients. Any nuts or fruits should be uniformly distributed.

Yeast Bread should have a uniform golden crust, a smooth, well-rounded top, slice easily, and hold shape. Texture should be moderately fine, even grained, free from large air bubbles and well-baked. The flavor should be pleasant, with a bland nut-like taste.

Coffee Cakes should be well-baked and browned, not doughy, crumbly, or drippy. If dough swirls, it should have a clean cut design. Icing should enhance appearance. Flavor of topping should complement or be a pleasant contrast to flavor of dough.

Cakes should have a neat appearance. Texture should be consistent with recipe and ingredients used with flavor well-blended and pleasant to the taste.

THE JUDGE WILL CONSIDER BAKED ENTRIES ON A BASIS OF:

- General Appearance
- Color
- Crust or Outer Covering
- Shape and Volume
- Texture
- Crumb (moist or dry)
- Consistency
- Tenderness
- Flavor

COOKIE TYPES DEFINED

Drop Cookies – Dough is dropped by teaspoon onto cookie sheet, not flattened.

Molded Cookies – Dough is rolled into balls or thin pencil-shaped rolls between hands. Some cookies are then flattened with the bottom of a glass, or crisscrossed with the tines of a fork, or pressed down with a thumb, or pressed into a cookie mold for shaping, or stamped.

Refrigerator Cookies – Dough is molded into rolls, wrapped, chilled thoroughly in the refrigerator, and then cut into thin slices for baking.

Rolled Cookies – Dough is chilled, rolled out on a board and then cut into desired shapes with cutters or pattern, i.e. Springerle.

Pressed Cookies – Dough is forced through a cookie press into desired shapes. An example of a pressed cookie is Spritz.

Brownies – Moist dough is poured into a pan, baked, cooled and cut into bars.

Bar Cookies – Stiff dough is spread evenly into pan, baked, cooled and cut into bars or diamonds.

DIVISION - FOOD PRESERVATION

Canned Foods will be judged on:

- Pack** – Full, attractive, yet practical
- Liquid** – Covers the top of fruits and vegetables; adequate head space.
- Color** – Natural color, not faded or unnaturally light.
- Quality of product** – Distinct, uniform pieces, well-prepared, firm.
- Appearance of container** – Standard brand-name glass jar; clean; suitable; rings and lids with ring easily removable and clean under ring; clear, neat label.
- Technique** – USDA approved safe methods, adjusted for altitude, approved pack, and having acidity for safety.
- Label** – Name of product; style of pack; date canned; method/equipment used (dial or weighted gauge); processing time; altitude, pounds of pressure.
- Recipe** – 3" x 5" card attached to jar by rubber band through hole punched in upper left hand corner of card. Recipe card is for judge's use only.

EXHIBIT RULES FOR FOOD PRESERVATION

- Exhibitors may enter two items per class.
- Recipes are required for canned and dried products and must include recipe source. Recipes **MUST** be put on 3" x 5" cards and be attached to the jar.
- All canned products must be exhibited in standard brand-name clear glass canning jars in good condition (no mayonnaise jars, etc.). The standard brand name such as Ball or Kerr, imprinted on the side of the jar identifies a standard jar.
- Use two-piece lids. Remove the screw band for storage, but put a clean screw band on the jar to bring it to the Fair.
- The exhibit must be canned after the last Fair of the previous year (July 25, 2022) by the person in whose name it is entered.
- All exhibits must be labeled properly. Please do not put your name on the label. Unlabeled entries will not be

judged. Secure label one inch from the bottom of the jar.

- Label must provide the following information: (See example below)
 - Name and variety of product
 - Method of preparation (raw or hot pack)
 - Method of processing (water bath, pressure canner – indicate weighted or dial gauge; dried oven or dehydrator)
 - Processing time, altitude and pounds of pressure (p.s.i.)
 - Date canned or dried
 - Recipe source and page number

Label Examples:

Red Haven Sliced Peaches in Light Syrup Raw Pack August 24, 2022 Boiling Water Canner Processed 40 Minutes <u>So Easy to Preserve pg. 44-</u> 45	Canned Green Beans Hot Pack August 30, 2022 Pressure Canned, Dial Gauge Processed 25 min. at 13 p.s.i <u>Ball Blue Book of</u> <u>Preserving pg. 20</u>
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- Decorative storage containers/jars, which have a rubber seal, are not acceptable for canning exhibits.
- No decorations on jars, i.e. lace or fabric on jar lid. Jars should be clean, dry and rings easily removed by judge. Jellies/Jams must be exhibited in an 8 oz. jar.
- Any jars showing leaks or spoilage will not be judged.
- Use appropriate headspace as called for in recipe directions. Liquid should cover the solids in the jar.
- Sticky or dusty jars and jars with signs of old labels will be quickly eliminated.
- The judge may open and taste jars of jellies, jams, preserves, and/or pickles at their discretion.
- Canned foods (vegetables and fruits) may be opened in determining the pressure seal quality of the product. Jars that are opened during judging will be marked by the judge and should not be eaten when the Fair is over.

FOOD SAFETY GUIDELINES

- All entries must be canned or dried according to the most recent research based USDA recommendations for high altitude area. Check with your local CSU Extension Office prior to canning for recent USDA recommendations and adjustments needed for high altitude.
- Canning methods and processing times from Ball, Kerr or other publications are considered secondary to USDA recommendations. Always use USDA processing times over other sources. Be sure to make adjustments in processing times.
- Processes that are unacceptable and unsafe include: open kettle processing; oven canning, inversion sealing; paraffin sealing, microwave canning, water bath canning of low acid products (vegetables require pressure canning); sundried jerky and meat jerky dried from unsafe meats.
- CSU e-coli safe method must be used in jerky exhibits (Fact Sheet #9.311)

5. Jerky exhibits **MUST** include recipe for e-coli safe methods (pre-heat method prior to drying). Recipes **MUST** be put on 3 x 5" cards and be attached to exhibit.
6. It is **MANDATORY** that a copy of the test results for Chronic Wasting Disease be included if Deer and Elk meat are used in Jerky recipes.

1. Exhibitor must be an amateur. An amateur is a person who takes photographs as a hobby or whose return from sales does not exceed \$1,000 annually or 30% of annual income.
2. Exhibitor may enter only one photo per class.
3. **The photo cannot be duplicated as an entry in any other class.**
4. Photos must have been taken after July 27, 2022 and not won an award at any other county Fair or state Fair and not previously entered at the Arapahoe County Fair.
5. The content of the photo as documented with the camera may not be changed or altered. Basic editing such as cropping, color correction, exposure adjustment, spotting, saturation, contrast with a digital program is allowed.
6. The photo must be the original work of the exhibitor, with the exception of processing (printing) and mounting.
7. Prints must be at least 5" x 7" and no larger than 8" x 10" not including the mat.
8. Entry must be securely adhered to a 4-ply mat board with dry mount or double sided tape with or without a mat border in front of the photo. Mat edges should not exceed 2 ¼ inches beyond the image border. Photos may also be flush mounted on foam board. Do not use rubber cement.
9. Label "top" on the back of each entry to aid in hanging entries for display.
10. Hangers will be provided. Do not put them on your entries.
11. **Entry Guidelines for all Categories except Creative Editing Category:**
 - a. Entry must come from a single photograph.
 - b. Do not post-process your entry from or to include elements of multiple images, multiple exposures, clip art, computer rendered images, or elements from other photographs. Post-shot adjustments may be made to your image in a photo-editing program so long as the modification is applied to the whole image. This includes levels, black and white conversion, hue/saturation, sizing/rotating, curves and cropping.
 - c. All photographs should accurately reflect the subject matter and the scene as it appeared.
 - d. **Photos that have been digitally altered beyond standard optimization (removal of dust, cropping, reasonable adjustments to exposure, color and contrast, etc.) will be disqualified.**
12. **Creative Edited** entries may include any of the above to create special effects desired by the photographer for their final image.
13. **Unacceptable Entries:** Photos of nude/seminude subjects or sensitive nature or use of unacceptable materials for

mounting such as poster board, canvas, glass, and fabric and framed or shrink-wrapped photos will not be accepted. Images that do not meet these requirements may or may not be judged at the judging panel's sole discretion.

14. The Arapahoe County Fair Committee has the right to refuse any entry if it is deemed inappropriate for a general audience or does not meet the exhibit guidelines given.
