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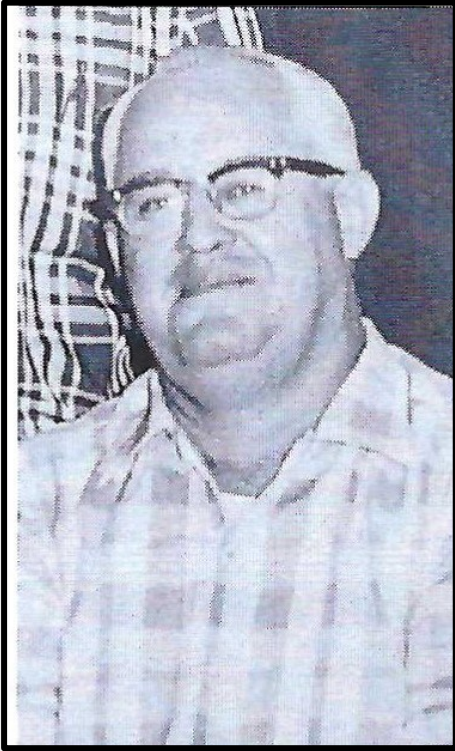

2024 Bedford County Fair Premium Guide to the late Fred Hoover (1923-1982)



The world is made up of people with a variety of backgrounds, interests, and priorities. Many times our family life, and the people within that circle, shape or influence our future. In the summer of 1941, Warden Hoover instructed his two sons to pick up a stick of dynamite from the fairground's explosives shed. So Fred Hoover, and his brother Warden Jr., decided to surprise their dad by blowing the ground hole open for a new light pole. Their dad was surprised when he returned, the boys had forgotten to pack the dynamite with clay before lighting the fuse. The hole was a crater and debris was thrown everywhere, but no one was hurt. It was a hard lesson for the boys, but Warden continued to have faith in his sons and entrusted them with responsibility. We should all be so fortunate to live with people that believe in our ability to overcome life's challenges.

This year's Premium Guide is dedicated to Fred Hoover, the man with the matches that lit the fuse. He continued to light fuses all his life, mostly by inspiring people to believe in themselves while influencing God fearing men with his character. It's not that he needed to be anything other than himself, his demeanor rarely changed. His love for the Bedford Fair was a lifetime com-

mitment, that too, came naturally. Fred inherited his father's position as grounds keeper shortly after his dad passed away in the spring of 1952. When Richard Eichelberger assumed the position as the Fair's President, he and Fred worked together for the next 14 years to produce some of Bedford's finest Fairs.

In 1969, Fred became the Fair's Manager, and during the next 14 year period Fred handled all aspects of the fair and fairgrounds. His good natured wit, marinated with a heavy dose of common sense, diffused many of the typical disagreements that arise during the fair. After all, his time as a Marine during WWII in the Pacific theater had exposed him to the worst of mankind, and prepared him for the highs and lows of dealing with chaotic situations. So getting an earful from an irate vendor when the power went out, or confronting a drunken spectator at a rock concert, or worse yet, resolving sewer line issues at the height of traffic, he handled it all with a clear head and an air of confidence while wearing his trademark cowboy hat. His contribution and impact to the fair, including the people he worked with, was immense.

Despite the fact that Fred passed away 42 years ago, in February of 1982, his memory is still very much a significant part of the fair for the ones whose hearts and minds he touched. His calm demeanor during the peak of a storm, whatever turmoil that may have been, was a quality many respected but only a few achieve. He loved life, and he loved the Bedford County Fair.

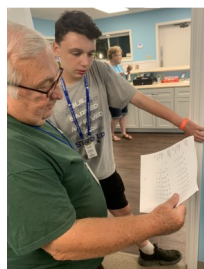

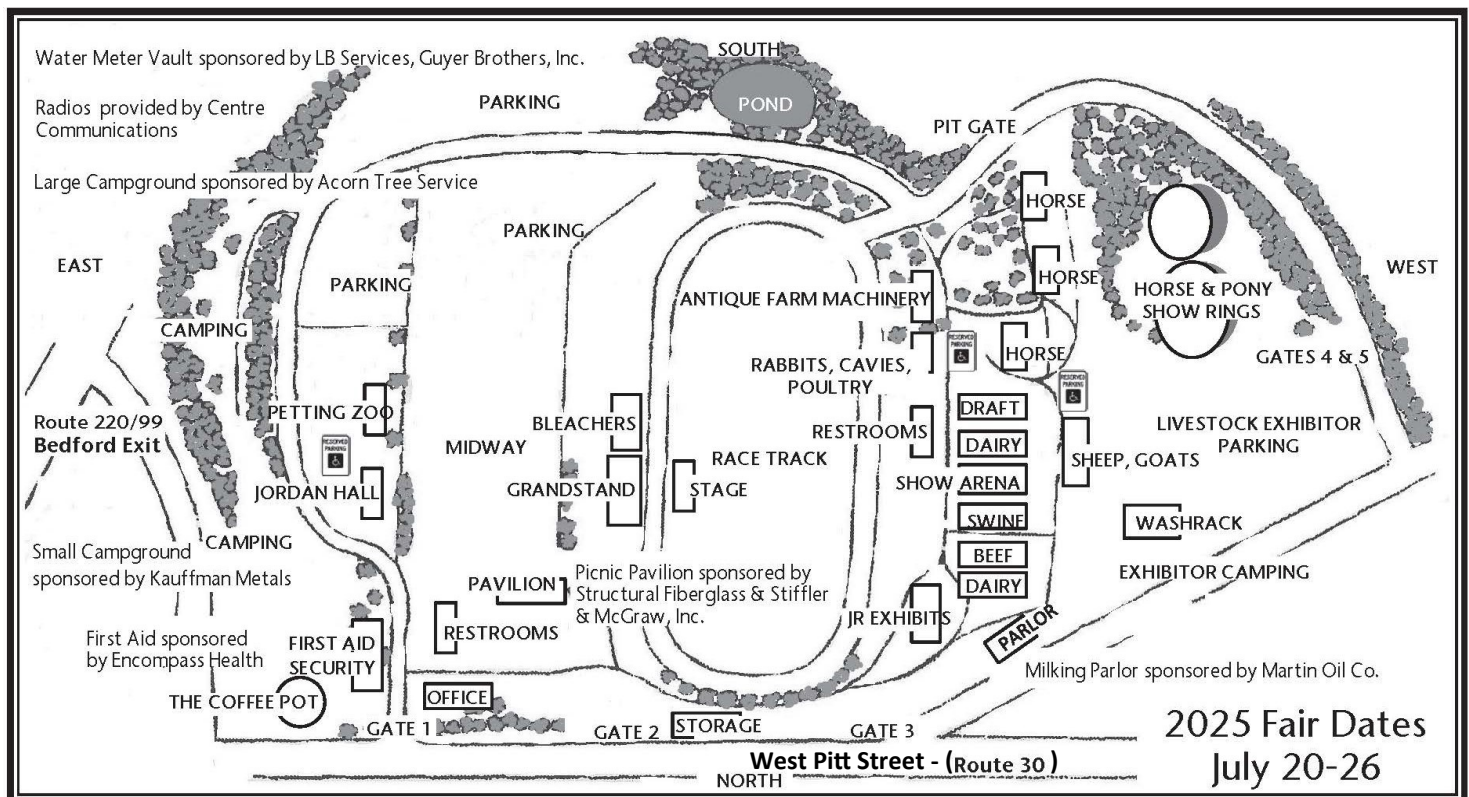

THE BEDFORD COUNTY FAIR IS ASKING EXHIBITORS, IF POSSIBLE, TO REGISTER THEIR GENERAL EXHIBITS / LIVESTOCK ONLINE. TAKING ENTRIES ONLINE RELIEVES STAFF WORKLOAD FROM DATA ENTRY, DATA ENTRY ERRORS, AND PROCESSING HAND WRITTEN FORMS.

General Rules

1. All exhibitors and concessionaires agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Bedford County Fair. The Fair Management reserves the right to reject or remove any item from the fairgrounds that may cause or be considered a hazard.
2. Entries will be made according to classification. The Fair Management reserves the right to interpret, amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine.
3. All exhibits must be the property of exhibitors at the time of entry. Any entry not deemed worthy will not be placed or the judge may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive.
4. Decision of the judges will be final.
5. Every effort will be made to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage, but the association is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire, theft, any financial losses or otherwise whatever the cause or extent of the damage or loss. Any insurance desired on an entry must be carried by the exhibitor.
6. Appropriate ribbons will be awarded in the various classes and cash prizes as stated in the premium book, unless in case of natural disaster or in case of reduced State funding premiums may be prorated according to monies available.
7. No advertising circulars or posters, with the exception of those in paid commercial space, will be allowed on the fairground.
8. No person can act as judge in any class in which he or she may be an exhibitor, an agent of an exhibitor, or in any way interested in the results of the award.
9. No canned or glass bottled beverages may be sold on the fairgrounds. Persons under influence of alcohol or drugs will be expelled from the grounds.
10. No demonstrations, picketing or weapons of any kind will be permitted on the fairground property.
11. No Smoking in any building.
12. Due to State Funding, premium checks may not be available until after the Fair.
13. The use of four wheelers, golf carts, side by sides, bicycles, etc., other than by Fair officials is prohibited.
14. The videotaping of events during the Fair for commercial resale is prohibited; except for special circumstances approved by the fair management.
15. It is the responsibility of parents or legal guardians to monitor or arrange for the supervision of their children under the age of 18 at all times during the Fair.
16. **Due to liability and safety concerns, dogs and other pets are not allowed on the Fairgrounds. This includes camping areas! The exceptions are registered service animals, you must provide certificate and proof of rabies vaccination at Fair Office to be verified by Fair management.**
17. **The Bedford County Fair and its officers reserve the right to randomly drug test any livestock exhibited at the Bedford County Fair.** Non-approved pharmaceuticals are 100% prohibited! This includes substances not approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and/or the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) for slaughter animals that may be destined for human consumption. This includes the use of all products that are not FDA approved including but not limited to any unapproved growth stimulant, beta-agonists, diuretics, or other unapproved medication meant for human usage that are intended for performance enhancing purposes. All utilized pharmaceuticals should be in compliance with Pennsylvania stand-ards, USDA, and/or USDA/Food Safety/safety standards.
If any substance found in the obtained sample is non-approved, then the individual exhibitor will be subject to the following penalties:
 - (A) Disqualified from exhibiting at the Bedford County Fair for one year.
 - (B) Any & all money will be forfeited.
 - (C) All awards (banners, buckles, etc.) must be returned to the Department Committee immediately regardless of situation or will be billed at the Committee's discretion.
 - (D) Will be responsible to pay all fees for the blood test results.

Fair Week Camping Rules

1. **Camping prices:** Electric, water and sewer - \$180/week, electric and water - \$150/week, and dry camping - \$75/week. Upon payment, you will be issued a paid parking permit that must be displayed in your camper window while on the fairgrounds. Any camper arriving before or leaving after the permitted time period, without permission, will be charged accordingly.
2. **Positively no wastewater from campers or motorhomes may be transported to the fairgrounds and disposed of into the fairgrounds sanitary sewer collection system.**
3. **No alcoholic beverages are permitted on the fairgrounds.** Campers are responsible for all individuals within their camping and parking area. No air rifles or pistols, (unless needed for competitions), firearms, BB guns, pellet guns, chain saws, sparklers, or fireworks are permitted on premises unless required for competitions. Trash must be placed in barrels in the camping areas. We ask that you police your camping area before leaving. No glass bottles or containers are permitted in camping areas.
4. **The Bedford County Agricultural Society (BCAS) assumes no responsibility for damage, theft, or loss of any nature to any and all personal property or campers belonging to individuals. Campers agree to hold harmless BCAS against any injuries or liabilities to individuals and campers during their stay.**
5. **Due to liability and safety concerns, dogs and other pets are not allowed on the Fairgrounds. This includes camping areas! The exceptions are registered service animals, you must provide certificate and proof of rabies vaccination at Fair Office to be verified by Fair management.**
6. **No campfires are permitted during fair week. Quiet time is 12:00 am to 6:00 am.** Please be respectful of your neighbors.
7. Bedford County Agricultural Society reserves the right to refuse entrance to any camper for any valid and legitimate reason. Have a safe and enjoyable camping experience. We thank you for your cooperation.

Golf Cart & UV Rules

After discussion with our insurance company, it was agreed that golf carts, 4-wheelers, side by sides, and ATV's will be limited to Board Members, Fair Staff, Junior Fair Board, Queen Committee, Superintendents, Security and Emergency Services. Exceptions for special circumstances will be taken into consideration, but an application must be submitted to the board for approval by May 1, 2024. Applications are available at the office or by calling 814-623-9011.

Photo Disclaimer

The Bedford County Fair reserves the right to use any photograph/video taken at any event during the Bedford County Fair or an event sponsored by the Fair, without the expressed written permission of those included within the photograph/video. The Bedford County Fair may use the photograph/video in publications or other media material produced, used or contracted by the Bedford County Fair including but not limited to: brochures, video promotions, social media, books, newspapers, magazines, television, website, etc. Every effort will be taken to make persons aware that their photo has been taken and may be used as outlined above. **Any person desiring NOT to have their photo taken or distributed must contact the Fair office in writing of his/her intentions and include a photograph for identification purposes only.**

Exhibitor Rules And Policies

Premium Checks

1. No premium checks will be re-issued. Checks are only valid for 90 days.
2. **Premium checks will be available at Livestock Office/4-H Center (Jr. Exhibitors & Clubs) and Jordan Hall (Sr. Exhibitors), during Fair week on Friday after 8 pm., Saturday, 8 am - 9 pm, and Sunday, - 9 am - 2 pm. (Note: These are NOT exhibit release times.) (Please ask staff if they have a check for you!)**
3. **Please make every effort to pick up your check BEFORE you leave the fairgrounds.** After Sunday, checks will be available at the Fair Office, **they will NOT be mailed.** (Please ask staff if they have a check for you!) **Checks are only valid for 90 days!**
4. If you wish to have your premium check mailed, please provide a stamped self-address envelope. Give the envelope to the Livestock office or Jordan Hall personnel.
5. Departments 11-24 Exhibits may be removed from 8:00 pm to 11:00 pm Saturday July 27 and on Sunday, July 28 from 8 am - 2 pm. After July 28, exhibits may be picked up at the fair office. NOTE: Exhibits not picked up by August 31 will become the property of the Fair and given to charity.
5. **Livestock is dismissed on Saturday at 12:00 p.m. No exceptions! Please follow designated exit routes.**
6. Consignor (exhibitor) checks will be mailed as soon as all buyers have paid for their purchases from Jr Livestock Sale. **The Fair Office does not issue the checks for the Livestock Sale! Please contact the sale committee if you have any questions.**

General Livestock Rules and Barn Policies

101. **Livestock and Horse and Pony entries will close June 21, 2024.** No entry fees. **Enter online at FairEntry.com.** No entries will be accepted after the deadline.
102. All Livestock Superintendents, Vo-Ag and Extension personnel are requested to attend a meeting at the Fairground Office in June. Important matters pertaining to the judging schedule, assignment of stall space, etc. will be discussed and finalized at this time.
103. Livestock will be received on the Fairgrounds from Friday, July 21 until noon Sunday, July 23. (Also see specie specific rules). In case of emergency to meet this rule, call the fair office 814-623-9011. The Fair reserves the right to close entries when available space is filled.
104. **Livestock may be removed after 12:00 p.m. Saturday** at which time the barns will be closed to visitors. Animals sold in the Jun-ior Livestock Sale are excluded from this rule. All animals, in so far as possible, will be removed and loaded from the West (upper) ends of the barn. No trucks or trailers are to be loaded from the East (lower) ends of the barns.
105. Every animal must be entered for competition in the name of the owner as listed on registration papers. Joint ownership considered to be one owner.
106. **Exhibitor Defined:** An exhibitor must be the owner or member of partnership or family owning the animal. In case a herd or flock is registered in the names of different members of the family and where the herd or flock is one unit, all entries will considered as a single exhibitor. 4-H and FFA members are excluded from this rule if they enter open class in their own name.
107. No exhibitor may enter more than two (2) animals in any class.
108. Each exhibitor is responsible for the care of their own animals
109. Each animal or pen of animals must be identified by breed and age on cards displayed to be easily seen by viewers.

110. An exhibitor of livestock is entitled to 1 weekly ticket for each six (6) animals entered. Exhibitors not old enough to drive will receive a wrist band and 1 car and passenger pass per family. Exhibitors who drive will only receive a wrist band.

Each additional exhibitor's pass will be \$23.00 to be sold only for person assisting the exhibitor with animals. No extra livestock helper passes will be sold after noon on Monday.

111. Livestock trucks and trailers CANNOT park for the week or overnight in the livestock parking area. A designated area will be marked for trucks/trailers on the East side of grounds. Horse exhibitors may arrange for one or two truck/trailers for tack.

112. Animals must be properly clipped, washed and stalls maintained daily. Failure to provide for proper care and display of animals may result in a loss of premiums to the exhibitor and/or dismissal from the Fairgrounds.

113. Bedding for the animals may be straw, sawdust, shavings, or chips. No bark or shredded newspaper may be used.

114. NO COOKING OR REFRIGERATORS ARE ALLOWED IN THE BARN, INCLUDING CROCKPOTS!

115. Electric cords used in the barns must be 12AWG.

116. Grooming: Use only grooming products that are approved for use on meat animals when fitting any animal for show. Any animal showing evidence of unethical fitting practices such as tampering with the natural fleshing and muscle development (including but NOT limited to drenching and pumping fluids) will be barred from the show and sent home. The exhibitor will also be barred from exhibiting at the fair for one year. In the event of an animal illness, the exhibitor should notify and consult the species' superintendent.

117. Show Ring Ethics - Exhibitors of animals at the Bedford County Fair shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at the Fair.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate this code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and may be prohibited from future Fairs. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of GUIDELINES for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1) All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.

2) Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.

3) Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.

4) Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory, to which it is sent, is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5) Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

6) The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

7) Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

8) No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

9) The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

10) The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expos and any special notices to members.

11) The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Any and all animals entered and shown at the Bedford Co Fair are the sole responsibility of the exhibitor. If an animal tests positive for a non-approved substance, i.e. performance enhancing or non-approved for food producing animals, the exhibitor will be held accountable no matter the circumstances, date of purchase, or date of taking possession of the animal. The top 3 market animals will immediately be taken to the designated drug testing area for a sample once the grand drive has ended. The official veterinarian will release the exhibitor and animal once testing is deemed complete.

The Bedford County Fair and its officers, reserve the right to randomly drug test any livestock exhibited at the Bedford County Fair. Non-approved pharmaceuticals are 100% prohibited! This includes substances not approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and/or the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) for slaughter animals that may be destined for human consumption. This includes the use of all products that are not FDA approved including but not limited to any unapproved growth stimulant, beta-agonists, diuretics, or other unapproved medication meant for human usage that are intended for performance enhancing purposes. All utilized pharmaceuticals should be in compliance with Pennsylvania standards, USDA, and/or USDA/Food Safety/safety standards.

If any substance found in the obtained sample is non-approved, then the individual exhibitor will be subject to the following penalties:

- (A) Disqualified from exhibiting at the Bedford County Fair for one year.
- (B) Any & all money will be forfeited.
- (C) All awards (banners, buckles, etc.) must be returned to the Department Committee immediately regardless of situation or will be billed at the Committee's discretion.
- (D) Will be responsible to pay all fees for the blood test results.

Department 10 4-H & FFA Livestock Exhibitor Rules

Please also refer to individual departments in the Premium Guide and animal health rules.

1. Classes are open to 4-H Clubs, Vo-Ag and FFA members in Bedford County with the only exception being Junior Dairy which is open to Blair County Junior members.
2. 4-H Club members must currently be entered on the Penn State Extension 4-H enrollment records for the project in which entry is desired at the Fair.
3. FFA members must be currently enrolled in Vo-Ag classes of Junior FFA clubs with a bona fide farming project in which entry is desired at the Fair and must have an active FFA membership card from the teacher of agriculture.
4. Project books must accompany all animals and will be checked by the proper committee.
5. Animals, except where specifically exempted, must be registered in exhibitors name and be a supervised project.
6. Joint ownership considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.
7. No exhibitor may enter more than two animals in any one class.
8. Animals must be shown by exhibitor. In case of sickness or other approved reason by proper Superintendent, animal then may be shown by another 4-H or FFA member.
9. Junior Livestock exhibitor may show in open classes if entered in same class by the entry deadline.
10. All livestock health admission requirements listed in the Departments 1-10 Rules must be met.
11. Special Fitting & Showing contests and trophies are open only to bona fide exhibitors in the division for the trophy. Competitors must be showing their own animals. Exhibitor age is as of January 1, of the current fair year. Special Fitting & Showing contests and trophies are open only to bona fide exhibitors in the division for the trophy. Competitors must be showing their own animals. Exhibitor age is as of January 1, of the Fair year. Exhibitors must present their animal at the scales to be considered a bona fide exhibitor and become eligible to compete in showmanship. If the animal does not make weight, the exhibitor may borrow an animal from any exhibitor to compete in showmanship. If the exhibitor does not present an animal at the scales for weigh-in, the project is considered incomplete, and the exhibitor is not eligible for showmanship.
12. It is the responsibility of parents or legal guardians to monitor or arrange for the supervision of their children under the age of 18 at all times during the Fair.
13. A Junior Livestock Sale Committee, consisting of six (6) persons made up by the chairman and one committee member of each livestock, will set the sales commission and other rules as needed for the sale. If a Penn State Extension staff member is not included in the above, one will serve as ex-officio.
14. Any and all animals entered and shown at the Bedford Co Fair are the sole responsibility of the exhibitor. If an animal tests positive for a non-approved substance, i.e. performance enhancing or non-approved for food producing animals, the exhibitor will be held accountable no matter the circumstances, date of purchase, or date of taking possession of the animal. The top 3 market animals will immediately be taken to the designated drug testing area for a sample once the grand drive has ended. The official veterinarian will release the exhibitor and animal once testing is deemed complete.

Departments 11-24 Exhibitor Rules

901. **Exhibitors are urged to pre-register by July 19. Enter online at FairEntry.com.** Check under department headings for age requirements. **No entry fees and exhibitors do not gain free entry to the fair.** Exhibits, except farm machinery, will be accepted at the fair office one week prior to the Fair.

902. Articles must be grown or made by exhibitor.

903. **Exhibitors are limited to 1 (one) entry in each class.**

904. **No article will be accepted for competition unless class is listed in the premium tabloid.**

905. Entries entered in the wrong category may be properly placed by a judge in the correct category only if that category has not yet been judged. If the reclassification of exhibits results in multiple entries from one individual in any category, the exhibitor is entitled to only one award in that category.

906. Only exhibitors winning blue ribbons will be considered for Best of Show awards.

907. **Exhibits (Dept. 11 through 21 & 23) will be received at the Fair office one week prior to the Fair. On Friday and Saturday July 19 & 20, Department 11 (Junior Exhibits) should be delivered to the Junior Exhibit 4-H Center, for entry tags and display. Departments 12 through 19 and 23 (Senior exhibits) should be delivered to Jordan Hall for entry tags and display. Department 24 (Antique Farm Machinery) entry tags and pass (if applicable) to be picked up at the Livestock Office in the Junior Exhibit 4-H Center.**

908. Antique Farm Machinery (Dept. 22) will be received Friday & Saturday before the Fair opens. Must be entered by 8:00 p.m. on Saturday.

909. **Exhibits may be removed from 8:00 pm to 11:00 pm Saturday July 27 and on Sunday, July 28 from 8 am - 2 pm.** After July 28, exhibits may be picked up at the fair office. NOTE: Exhibits not picked up by August 31 will become the property of the Fair and given to charity. Premium check availability will depend on State funding. Announcements regarding your check will be placed in newspaper and on website. **Please pick up your check before you leave the fairgrounds. They will not be mailed and are only valid for 90 days.**

910. No "For Sale" allowed on entries.

911. **All exhibitors MUST have their entries registered and IN PLACE by Saturday, July 20, 7:00 p.m. With the EXCEPTIONS of baked goods and floral exhibits, which will be received Monday, July 22, 9:00 to 11:00 am, after being registered.**

Animal Health Requirements and Recommendations

Section 3: Pennsylvania Cattle

I. Requirements:

1. Bedford Fair requires a Certificate of Veterinarian Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition is required.
2. Sexually intact cattle shall be identified by an official ear tag or other unique identification device approved by the Department. Official identification includes any of the following:
 - (a) A USDA issued National Uniform Ear tagging System (NUES) tag .
 - (b) A 15-digit Animal Identification Number (AIN) ear tag starting with "840" .
3. ID requirements specific to the Farm Show Complex:
 - (a) All cattle entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant RFID ear tag.
 - (b) The only exception to this will be for cattle who were identified using a 900 series 15-digit ISO-compliant tag placed before January 1, 2015. No other exceptions will be granted.
 - (c) A person exhibiting at the complex shall distinguish between 840 tags with RFID capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in an animal that is to be exhibited.

II. Recommendations:

1. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
2. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdrawal time).
3. Rodeo: It is recommended that Pennsylvania-origin rodeo cattle of all ages be negative on an official tuberculin test within 60 days prior to the start of the fair unless they are members of and originate from an accredited tuberculosis-free herd. The cattle can be accompanied by the negative test report, or the tuberculosis test results can be recorded by the veterinarian on a CVI.

Section 4: Out of State Cattle

I. Requirements:

1. Bedford Fair requires a Certificate of Veterinarian Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition is required.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): This applies to cattle entering Pennsylvania from states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases, an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor were located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. Federal regulation (USDA) requires individual official animal identification for all cattle of any age for exhibition. Acceptable animal identification includes any of the following:
 - (a) A USDA issued National Uniform Ear tagging System (NUES) tag .
 - (b) A 15-digit Animal Identification Number (AIN) ear tag starting with "840" .
 - (c) Brands registered with a recognized brand inspection authority and accompanied by an official brand inspection certificate, when agreed to by the shipping and receiving State or Tribal animal health authorities; or
 - (d) Tattoos and other identification methods acceptable to a breed association for registration purposes, accompanied by a breed registration certificate, when agreed to by the shipping and receiving State or Tribal animal health authorities.
5. ID requirements specific to the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex: All cattle entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant RFID ear tag. The only exception to this will be for cattle who were identified using a 900 series 15-digit ISO-compliant tag placed before January 1, 2015. No other exceptions will be granted. A person exhibiting at the complex shall distinguish between 840 tags with RFID capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in an animal that is to be exhibited.
6. Tuberculosis testing requirements:
 - (a) No test is required for animals originating from states or zones designated as accredited free by the USDA.
 - (b) All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited advanced by the USDA must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and dates of tests must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).
 - (c) All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited by the USDA must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older are test negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation and the individual animals (all ages) to be imported are also test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).
 - (d) All cattle shall comply with the Department's "Interstate Order of Quarantine; Tuberculosis Testing Requirements for Importation of Cattle, Bison, Goats or Camelids" [49 Pa.B. 709, Saturday, February 16, 2019].
 - (e) Special Tuberculosis Test requirement for Rodeo Cattle. All rodeo cattle and bison from out of state shall be negative on an official tuberculosis test within 60 days prior to entering Pennsylvania unless they originate from and are members of an Accredited Tuberculosis-free herd within an accredited Tuberculosis-free state or zone.

This requirement for rodeo cattle from out-of-state is in addition to all other requirements listed above for out-of-state cattle.

7. Rabies vaccination requirements: See rabies vaccination requirements in the General section for animals exhibiting at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex.

II. Recommendations:

1. While tattoos and brands are acceptable, NUES tags or 840 AIN tags are preferred.
2. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is recommended for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdrawal time).

Dairy Beef

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition is required.
2. Calves are required to be vaccinated against IBR, PI3, BRSV, and BVD using one dose of modified live vaccine or two doses of killed vaccine. (Examples: Bovishield and Pyramid).
3. It is recommended that calves be given a rabies vaccination.
4. If your steer has symptoms of ringworm within 4 weeks of Fair, you should have your animal treated by a veterinarian and a statement of date/treatment.

All members are responsible for health requirements to add value of animals for the buyer.

Section 9: Pennsylvania Equine Animals

I. Requirements:

1. The Department of Agriculture has no specific requirements for Pennsylvania equines at fairs. **However, fair management has the authority to impose requirements designed to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.**
2. See rabies vaccination requirements in the General section for animals exhibiting at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex.

II. Recommendations:

1. A current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) (valid for 30 days after the date of issue). A current VCPR Form may also be used to verify animal ID.
2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
3. It is recommended that all equine animals be test negative for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) by an official test within the 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. Laboratory test results should accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). The CVI shall specify the date of sample collection and EIA test results. Foals less than six months of age accompanied by a test-negative dam are exempt from EIA testing recommendations. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.
4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older. The name of the product used, date of administration and veterinarian administering the rabies vaccination should appear on the CVI or on a rabies vaccination certificate and this information should correlate to a written description of the horse, and any and all forms of identification associated with the horse, such as tattoos, brands, or microchips.
5. Permanent identification, including a microchip, tattoo, or brand.

Section 10: Out of State Equine Animals

I. Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation. **Please Note:** Extended Equine Certificates of Veterinary Inspection and Interstate Equine Event Permits will not be accepted. Brand Certificates will not be accepted as Certificates of Veterinary Inspection.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) statement: This applies to horses entering Pennsylvania from states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. All equine animals must be test negative for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) by an official test within the 12 months prior to the date of importation. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). The CVI shall specify the date of sample collection and EIA test results. Foals under six months of age accompanied by a dam with negative EIA official test results are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.
5. If an equine animal has resided in Texas or New Mexico for a cumulative total of 30 days or more within the six months preceding the date of entry into the Commonwealth, that animal must be test-negative for Babesia caballi and Theileria equi on a competitive enzyme-linked immunosorbent assay (c-ELISA) test, or a Department-approved equivalent test, with the test occurring within the 30 days preceding entry into Pennsylvania. The date of test and the test results shall be written on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
6. See rabies vaccination requirements in the General section for animals exhibiting at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex.

II. Recommendations:

1. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older. The name of the product used, date of administration and veterinarian administering the rabies vaccination should appear on the CVI or on a rabies vaccination certificate and this information should correlate to a written description of the horse, and any and all forms of identification associated with the horse- such as tattoos, brands, or microchips.
2. Permanent identification, including a microchip, tattoo, or brand.

Section 11: Pennsylvania Goats:

Requirements:

A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition is required.

1. Individual official animal identification is required for all goats. Official ID includes:
 - A USDA ear tag with a US shield ; which includes scrapie program tags (animals bearing identification with blue colored scrapie program tags are not permitted be exhibited in Pennsylvania- please call the department at 717-783-6851 if such a tag is encountered).or
 - A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear--state postal code and letters/numbers--and individual animal ID in the left ear); or
 - A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.
 - Identification used for sheep and goats must be permanently affixed to the individual animal.
2. For post-exhibition sales the following requirements apply:
 - (a) Market goats must be documented on sales slips which contain all of the following information:
 - (i) Official identification (as described above)
 - (ii) Sale date
 - (iii) Sale location
 - (iv) Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor
 - (v) Hauler contact information
 - (vi) Destination name and contact information
 - (vii) Total number of animals in the shipment
 - (viii) Type of goat (i.e., meat, dairy, specific breed)
 - (ix) Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler
 - (b) Sales slips, or a document containing all of the information required under subsection (a) above, must follow the goats to their final destination (including slaughter facilities).
 - (c) Goats which are purchased with the intent of breeding and are traveling via interstate movement must have a valid Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) prior to movement to the destination state.
 - (d) A copy of the sale records slips as delineated above and a copy of any CVI, required under subsection (c) above, must be kept by the sale organizer for 5 years.
3. ID requirements specific to the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex (Complex):
 - (a) Goats entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant RFID ear tag. This can be in addition to the forms of ID listed above so long as only one 840 ID is used.
 - (b) A person exhibiting at the complex shall distinguish between 840 tags with RFID capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in an animal that is to be exhibited.
4. All goats shall comply with the Department's regulations regarding the intrastate transportation of goats found at 7 Pa.Code § 3.151).
5. All goats shall comply with the Department's "General Quarantine Order; Scrapie" [50 Pa.B. 4751, September 19, 2020].

II. Recommendations:

1. A current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) (valid for 30 days after the date of issue). A current VCPR Form may also be used to verify animal ID.
2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.

Section 12: Out of State Goats

I. Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation into Pennsylvania.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) statement: This applies to states that experienced a VS outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases, an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. Individual official animal identification is required for all goats. Identification used for sheep and goats must be permanently affixed to the individual animal. Official ID includes any of the following:
 - (a) A USDA ear tag with a US shield ; which includes scrapie program tags (animals bearing identification with blue colored scrapie program tags labelled "meat" with a US shield are not permitted to be exhibited in Pennsylvania. Please call the Department at 717-772-2852 if such a tag is encountered).

(b) A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear - state postal code and letters/numbers - and individual animal ID in the left ear).

(c) A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.

5. Tuberculosis testing requirements:

(a) No test is required for animals originating from states or zones designated as accredited-free by the USDA.

(b) All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited advanced by the USDA must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).

(c) All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older have tested negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation; and the individual animals (all ages) to be imported have also tested negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed.

The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).

(d) All goats shall comply with the Department's "Interstate Order of Quarantine; Tuberculosis Testing Requirements for Importation of Cattle, Bison, Goats or Camelids" [49 Pa.B. 709, Saturday, February 16, 2019].

6. For post-exhibition sales the following requirements apply:

(a) Market goats must be documented on sales slips which contain all the following information:

- (i) Official identification (as described above)
- (ii) Sale date
- (iii) Sale location
- (iv) Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor
- (v) Hauler contact information
- (vi) Destination name and contact information
- (vii) Total number of animals in the shipment
- (viii) Type of goat (i.e., meat, dairy, specific breed)
- (ix) Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler

(b) Sales slips, or a document containing all of the information required under subsection (a) above, must follow the goats to their final destination (including slaughter facilities).

(c) Goats which are purchased with the intent of breeding and are traveling via interstate movement must have a valid Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) prior to movement to the destination state.

(d) A copy of the sale records slips as delineated above and a copy of any CVI, required under subsection (c) above, must be kept by the sale organizer for 5 years.

7. ID requirements specific to the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex (Complex):

(a) Goats entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant RFID ear tag. This can be in addition to the forms of ID listed above so long as only one 840 ID is used.

(b) A person exhibiting at the complex shall distinguish between 840 tags with RFID capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in an animal that is to be exhibited.

8. All goats shall comply with the Department's regulations regarding the importation of goats found at 7 Pa.Code §§ 3.21-3.23 and 3.25-3.28).

9. All goats shall comply with the Department's "Interstate/International Quarantine Order; Scrapie" [50 Pa.B. 4754, September 19, 2020].

II. Recommendations:

All out of state goats must meet all criteria listed above as "requirements". The Department has no additional recommendations to prevent the introduction of contagious disease from out of state goats.

Section 13: Pennsylvania Poultry

Requirements:

Exhibition Market Poultry:

- Market poultry ONLY – birds must move to a USDA or PA Dept. of Agriculture licensed slaughter facility after judging. This is an all-in, all-out procedure where NO birds may return home.
- Market poultry must be on and off the grounds within 72 hours, starting from when the first bird arrives until the last bird leaves. Birds may NOT stay on the grounds for the duration of the entire fair if they will be present longer than 72 hours.
- Exhibition of poultry shall require a PDA issued "Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement" (provided on the Department's website). If a CVI is required for entry by the fair, an endorsement of biosecurity on the "Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement" shall also accompany the poultry.
- All birds must be monitored for signs of illness while on the grounds, however there is not a specific training for this like the Swine Health Monitor Training. Fairs are encouraged to refer to the Biosecurity Guidelines for Exhibition Managers.
- All birds must be behind barriers with signage to prevent public interaction with birds.
- All market poultry must be confirmed free of HPAI prior to entry to the exhibition. This requires a negative HPAI test on record within 14 days of the exhibition.
- * Test samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian and processed at a National Animal Health Laboratory Network lab (this includes all 3 PADLS labs).
- * Test results must accompany the poultry to the show.
- * No new birds may be added to a clean tested flock prior to the show.
- * Additional details on testing requirements can be found on pages 5-6 of the Quarantine Order and MUST be followed.

IMPORTANT REMINDER:

- NO market poultry or poultry products may be exhibited within an active HPAI Control Area or Surveillance Zone. These areas or zones can pop up when a flock tests positive for HPAI at any time.
- This means that market poultry and poultry product exhibition can be canceled at a moment's notice for an indefinite amount of time until the control area and/or surveillance zone is cleared. Please proceed with this in mind and have a plan ready should this occur.

Exhibition of Poultry: The following standards apply to the exhibition of poultry at a Venue or Fair under this exception.

1. All poultry entering an exhibition must bear an official Department issued leg band. Ratites must be identified with a neck band or an electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader).
2. Poultry may be exhibited only if they will be moved immediately after judging directly from the Venue or Fair to a licensed slaughter facility.
3. All poultry exhibited in Pennsylvania at Department sponsored or funded exhibitions shall move as all-in and all-out directly to a Department or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a licensed slaughter facility.
4. Arrival, exhibition and departure of the poultry shall occur within a 72-hour window. The 72 hours begin when the first poultry arrive on the Venue or Fair grounds, whether unloaded or not, and ends when the last poultry physically leave the Venue or Fair grounds in a vehicle or conveyance.
5. Exhibition of poultry shall require Department issued "Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement" which will be provided by the Department. If a CVI is provided for entry, endorsement of biosecurity on the "Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement" shall also accompany the poultry.
6. All poultry on the Venue or Fair grounds shall be monitored for signs of illness, and any signs of illness shall be reported to the Department immediately (717-772-2852).
7. All poultry on the Venue or Fair grounds shall be displayed behind barriers such as ropes to prevent public access to the poultry, with signage to prevent the public from crossing the barrier.
8. Conveyances shall be cleaned and disinfected before loading to transport poultry to the Venue or Fair, and after returning to the premises of origin, and shall meet the requirements imposed by the Department's "Interstate and General Quarantine Order; Virus Control for Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza Vehicle, Container and Material Standards" (45 Pa.B. 4930, Saturday, August 22, 2015).
9. Avian Influenza Testing and Verification: Avian influenza testing and verification shall meet the following requirements.
 - * All samples shall be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian and shall be tested in a National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) laboratory.
 - * All poultry shall originate from a flock in which a random, representative sample of a minimum of 30 birds, 3 weeks of age or older, were tested for avian influenza within the 14 days prior to opening date of the exhibition.
 - * For chickens, turkeys, game birds, and ratites, blood samples (AGID testing) or tracheal or oropharyngeal swab samples (PCR testing) are acceptable samples. Samples from more than one species may not be combined in the same tube for testing.
 - * The poultry, in addition to the documentation required in subparagraph c.v. of this Order, shall be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative or the poultry may not be shipped to, accepted by or unloaded at the Venue or Fair, and upon arrival at the Venue or Fair must be immediately denied entry and sent back to the premises of origin or quarantined until a Department or USDA veterinarian can inspect the poultry.

All non-negative test results shall be reported to the Department immediately.

* If there are fewer than 30 birds in the poultry flock, all birds of age in that flock shall be tested.

* Untested poultry shall not be comingled with or added to the tested flock after negative samples have been collected and may not be added to the poultry that are shipped to the Venue or Fair.

* Sample collectors and testers must maintain records of animal identification, testing records, any other records required by the Domestic Animal Law and any Order issued by the Department for a minimum of two years and must make such records available to the Department upon request.

10. National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) protocols for sample collection, including the number of swabs or tubes of viral transport media, and testing shall be followed. All samples must be tested at a NAHLN laboratory.

Section 15: Pennsylvania Rabbits

I. Requirements:

1. The Department of Agriculture has no specific requirements for Pennsylvania rabbits at fairs. **However, fair management has the authority to impose requirements designed to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.**

2. The owner of the animal and the place of exhibition or destination shall meet the standards established at sections 2323 and 2327 of the Domestic Animal Law (3 Pa.C.S. §§ 2323 and 2327) and set forth in Subchapter A, paragraphs 9 and 10 of this document.

3. The owner of the animal shall meet all general requirements for importation and intrastate movement as set forth in sections 3.3, 3.4, 3.5, 3.6 and 3.7 of the Department's regulations (7 Pa.Code §§ 3.3-3.7).

4. While on exhibit or at any time following exhibition, it is an obligation to report all mass mortality events and all rabbits who are ill and bleeding from eyes, nose, mouth, or have bloody stools to the Department's emergency line 717-772-2852, option 1. It is vital to quickly identify and prevent dangerous transmissible diseases such as Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease (RHD) from spreading.

II. Recommendations:

1. A current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) (valid for 30 days after the date of issue). The CVI shall be written by an accredited veterinarian and shall contain the following statements:

"All Rabbits in the shipment have been examined for and found free of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases including RHD and there have not been multiple mortality events or rabbits exhibiting hemorrhages within the last 90 days. The rabbits in this shipment have not been housed or exhibited with any rabbits associated with known mass mortality or hemorrhage events."

"In the last 90 days, the rabbits in this shipment, have not been exhibited in, housed in, or traveled to, any state or territory in which RHD has been diagnosed within the last 12 months. In addition, during the last 90 days, they have had no contact with any captive or wild rabbit which originated from or travelled to one of those affected states or territories."

2. Vaccination against RHDV-2: Vaccination of Pennsylvania origin rabbits against RHDV-2 is encouraged.

II. Recommendations:

1. For all rabbits: Vaccination against RHDV-2 is encouraged. PLEASE NOTE: Vaccination of rabbits does not exempt the rabbit, rabbit products, or equipment used for them, from meeting the import requirements set forth in the Department's "Interstate/International Quarantine Order; Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease [50 Pa.B. 5272, Saturday, September 26, 2020] and listed in subsections I. 1. and 2. (relating to requirements) above.

2. For rabbits that originate from a Commonwealth, State, Territory, or Country where RHD has NOT been diagnosed in the prior twelve (12) months or there is NO reasonable suspicion it exists: A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) (valid for 30 days after the date of issue) shall be issued and shall include statements by an accredited veterinarian certifying that:

"All rabbits in the shipment have been examined for and found free of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases including RHD and there have not been multiple mortality events or rabbits exhibiting hemorrhages within the last 90 days. The rabbits in this shipment have not been housed or exhibited with any rabbits associated with known mass mortality or hemorrhage events."

"In the last 90 days, the rabbits in this shipment, have not been exhibited in, housed in, or traveled to, any state or territory in which RHD has been diagnosed within the last 12 months. In addition, during the last 90 days, they have had no contact with any captive or wild rabbit originating from or travelled to one of those affected states or territories."

Section 16: Out of State Rabbits

I. Requirements:

1. Interstate and International Order of Quarantine: The owner and the exhibition or destination shall comply with the requirements of the Department's quarantine order, "Interstate/International Quarantine Order; Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease [50 Pa.B. 5272, Saturday, September 26, 2020].

2. Rabbits originating from a Commonwealth, State, Territory or Country identified as being affected by RHD within the 12 months prior to the start of the exhibition: No rabbits or their products, such as meat, pelts, hides, carcasses or other items, and no equipment, exposed feed, forages, or conveyances or other items or associated materials may enter the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania from a Commonwealth, State, Territory, or Country where RHD has been diagnosed in the prior twelve (12) months or there is a reasonable suspicion it exists unless they meet the following requirements:

(a) All live rabbits must be accompanied by a CVI and must be examined by an accredited veterinarian within the seventy-two (72) hours prior to the date of shipment to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The CVI must include statements by an accredited veterinarian certifying that:

- (i) All rabbits in the shipment have been examined for and found free of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases;
- (ii) All rabbits have originated from a single premises that has no signs of infectious, contagious or communicable disease in rabbits;
- (iii) There have been no movements of rabbits onto the premises of origin within the 90 days prior to the date of shipment;
- and
- (iv) The rabbits have had no contact with wild or captive rabbits other than their cohorts in the 90 days prior to the date of shipment.
- (b) No rabbits or their products, such as meat, pelts, hides, carcasses or other items, and no equipment, exposed feed or conveyances or other items or associated materials may enter the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania from a premises exposed to, contaminated with or known to be affected with RHD, or where there is a reasonable suspicion the disease exists or the rabbits have been exposed to or infected with RHD.

Section 17: Pennsylvania Sheep

I. Requirements:

1. Individual official animal identification is required for all sheep. Identification used for sheep must be permanently affixed to the individual animal. Official ID includes any of the following:
 - (a) A USDA ear tag with a US shield ; which includes scrapie program tags (animals bearing identification with blue colored scrapie program tags labelled “meat” with a US shield are not permitted to be exhibited in Pennsylvania. Please call the Department at 717-772-2852 if such a tag is encountered).
 - (b) A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear—state postal code and letters/numbers—and individual animal ID in the left ear).
 - (c) A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.
2. For post-exhibition sales the following requirements apply:
 - (a) Market sheep must be documented on sales slips which contain all of the following information:
 - (i) Official identification (as described above)
 - (ii) Sale date
 - (iii) Sale location
 - (iv) Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor
 - (v) Hauler contact information
 - (vi) Destination name and contact information
 - (vii) Total number of animals in the shipment
 - (viii) Type of sheep (i.e., meat, dairy, specific breed)
 - (ix) Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler
 - (b) Sales slips, or a document containing all of the information required under subsection (a) above, must follow the sheep to their final destination (including slaughter facilities).
 - (c) Sheep which are purchased with the intent of breeding and are traveling via interstate movement must have a valid Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) prior to movement to the destination state.
 - (d) A copy of the sale records slips as delineated above and a copy of any CVI, required under subsection (c) above, must be kept by the sale organizer for 5 years.
3. ID requirements specific to the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex (Complex):
 - (a) Sheep entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant RFID ear tag. This can be in addition to the forms of ID listed above so long as only one 840 ID is used.
 - (b) A person exhibiting at the complex shall distinguish between 840 tags with RFID capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in an animal that is to be exhibited.
4. See rabies vaccination requirements for exhibition of sheep at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex in the general section.
5. All sheep shall comply with the Department’s regulations regarding the intrastate transportation of sheep found at 7 Pa.Code §§ 3.161-3.163).
6. All sheep shall comply with the Department’s “General Quarantine Order; Scrapie” [50 Pa.B. 4751, September 19, 2020].

II. Recommendations:

1. A current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) (valid for 30 days after the date of issue). A current VCPR Form may also be used to verify animal ID.
2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
3. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdrawal time).

Section 18: Out of State Sheep

I. Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to entry into Pennsylvania.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) Statement: This applies to states that experienced a VS outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases, an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required. Identification used for sheep must be permanently affixed to the individual animal. Official scrapie ID includes any of the following:
 - (a) A USDA ear tag with a US shield ; which includes scrapie program tags (animals bearing identification with blue colored scrapie program tags labelled "meat" with a US shield are not permitted to be exhibited in Pennsylvania. Please call the Department at 717-772-2852 if such a tag is encountered).
 - (b) A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear - state postal code and letters/numbers - and individual animal ID in the left ear).
 - (c) A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.
5. ID requirements specific to the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex (Complex):
 - (a) Sheep entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant RFID ear tag. This can be in addition to the forms of ID listed above so long as only one 840 ID is used.
 - (b) A person exhibiting at the complex shall distinguish between 840 tags with RFID capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in an animal that is to be exhibited.
6. For post-exhibition sales the following requirements apply:
 - (a) Market sheep must be documented on sales slips which contain all the following information:
 - (i) Official identification (as described above)
 - (ii) Sale date
 - (iii) Sale location
 - (iv) Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor
 - (v) Hauler contact information
 - (vi) Destination name and contact information
 - (vii) Total number of animals in the shipment
 - (viii) Type of sheep (i.e., meat, dairy, specific breed)
 - (ix) Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler
 - (b) Sales slips, or a document containing all of the information required under subsection (a) above, must follow the sheep to their final destination (including slaughter facilities).
 - (c) Sheep which are purchased with the intent of breeding and are traveling via interstate movement must have a valid Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) prior to movement to the destination state.
 - (d) A copy of the sale records slips as delineated above and a copy of any CVI, required under subsection (c) above, must be kept by the sale organizer for 5 years.
7. See rabies vaccination requirements for exhibition of sheep at the Farm Show Complex in the general section.
8. All sheep shall comply with the Department's regulations regarding the importation of sheep found at 7 Pa.Code §§ 3.121-3.123.
9. All sheep shall comply with the Department's "Interstate/International Quarantine Order; Scrapie" [50 Pa.B. 4754, September 19, 2020].

II. Recommendations:

A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdrawal time).

Section 19: Pennsylvania Swine

Requirements:

1. No swine species shall be exhibited in Pennsylvania unless each animal is in compliance with all of the following:
 - (a) Is accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 14 days prior to the date of the exhibition.
 - (b) Is permanently identified by an official 840 series RFID ear tag and the ear tag number is recorded on the CVI.
 - (c) Has been visually inspected and found to be free of signs of contagious disease immediately prior to unloading at the exhibition by an accredited veterinarian or swine health monitor appointed by the fair board or livestock show committee.
 - (d) Is inspected by a certified swine health monitor appointed by the fair or show/event organizers.
 - (i) Swine health monitors must undergo annual online training which can be found at the following link: Pennsylvania Show and Fair Swine Health Monitor Training (psu.edu) or the following site Extension.psu.edu/Pennsylvania-show-and-fair-swine-health-monitor-training.
 - (ii) Swine health monitors must provide a current completion certificate to the fair or show staff they will be performing monitoring services for, prior to the start of the event.
2. All breeding swine exhibitions must occur prior to the arrival of any market swine. All the following conditions apply:
 - (a) Castrated swine shall not be classified as breeding swine.

(b) Breeding swine shall be removed from the animal exhibition premises prior to any market swine arriving.

(c) Breeding swine for exhibitions shall arrive, exhibit, and depart in a period no greater than 72 hours. Time begins when the first swine arrives physically on the fairgrounds whether unloaded from a trailer or not and ends when the last hog physically leaves the premises on a trailer.

(d) Swine birthing exhibitions and educational displays in which swine are not competing may occur concurrently with market swine animal exhibition, as long as reasonable precaution is made to ensure the biosecurity of the swine birthing exhibition or educational display. Consult your Department regional veterinarian or your herd veterinarian for biosecurity advice.

3. All market swine exhibited in Department sponsored or funded market shows shall move as all-in and all-out directly to a Department or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market in which the sales are designated slaughter-only sales.

4. Shows that are not sponsored by or that do not receive funding from the Department, including jackpot shows and 4-H roundups, not occurring during a Department sponsored or funded fair or show are exempt from the terminal slaughter requirement only if the following conditions are adhered to:

(a) As is stated above, the swine shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued within the 30 days prior to the date of the exhibition and shall be permanently identified by an 840 series RFID identification ear tag.

(b) Arrival, exhibition and departure of the swine shall occur within a 72-hour window. Time begins when the first swine arrives physically on the exhibition grounds, whether unloaded from a trailer or not, and ends when the last hog physically leaves the premises on a trailer.

(c) There shall be no public access to the animals other than observation during competitions.

(d) An accredited veterinarian or trained swine health monitor shall have visually inspected the animals prior to unloading and found each animal to be free of signs of contagious disease.

(e) An accredited veterinarian or trained swine health monitor shall monitor and record the health of the pigs daily for signs of contagious disease, and the accredited veterinarian shall immediately report suspicion of disease to the State Animal Health Official.

(f) A Veterinary-client-patient-relationship is established between the show committee/management staff and an accredited veterinarian, and that veterinarian is readily available for health monitoring, emergency coverage, treatment, follow up evaluation, and prompt reporting of suspicion of disease to the State Animal Health Official.

5. The swine shall be in compliance with the Department's regulations regarding health requirements and intrastate transportation of swine found a 7 Pa.Code §§ 3.172-3.180.

6. The swine shall comply with the Department's general quarantine orders; "General Quarantine Order; Swine Exhibition Requirements" [51 Pa.B. 3861, Saturday, July 17, 2021], "Addendum to the General Quarantine Order; Swine Exhibition Requirements" [52 Pa.B. 2362, April 23, 2022] and "Interstate/International and General Quarantine Order; Importation and Intrastate Movement of Swine" [39 Pa.B. 5442, September 19, 2009].

Section 20: Out of State Swine

Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of the exhibition is required. The CVI shall include a statement verifying that the swine have not been fed raw garbage.

2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) Statement: This applies to states that experienced a VS outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases, an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."

3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.

4. The swine shall comply with all the provisions of subsections 1. through 4. of Section 19 (relating to Pennsylvania Swine Requirements) above.

5. Individual animal ID – must be permanently identified by an official 840 series RFID ear tag and the ear tag number is recorded on the CVI.

6. Brucellosis Testing Requirements: No Brucellosis test is required if the animal originates from a validated brucellosis-free herd within a Brucellosis free state. All others must be tested negative within the 30 days prior to the date of importation. The date of test and test results must be included on the CVI.

7. Pseudorabies Testing Requirements: No Pseudorabies test is required if the animal originates from a Qualified Pseudorabies-free herd within a Pseudorabies free state. All others must be tested negative within the 30 days prior to the date of importation. The date of test and test results must be included on the CVI.

8. All breeding swine exhibitions must occur prior to the arrival of any market swine. All the following conditions apply:

(a) Castrated swine shall not be classified as breeding swine.

(b) Breeding swine shall be removed from the animal exhibition premises prior to any market swine arriving.

(c) Breeding swine for exhibitions shall arrive, exhibit, and depart in a period no greater than 72 hours. Time begins when the first swine arrives physically on the fairgrounds whether unloaded from a trailer or not and ends when the last hog physically leaves the premises on a trailer.

(d) Swine birthing exhibitions and educational displays in which swine are not competing may occur concurrently with market swine animal exhibition, as long as reasonable precaution is made to ensure the biosecurity of the swine birthing exhibition or educational display. Consult your Department regional veterinarian or your herd veterinarian for biosecurity advice.

9. All market swine exhibited in Department sponsored or funded market shows shall move on an all-in all-out basis directly to a Department or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market in which the sales are designated slaughter-only sales.

10. Shows that are not sponsored by or that do not receive funding from the Department, including jackpot shows and 4-H roundups, not occurring during a Department sponsored or funded fair or show are exempt from the terminal slaughter requirement only if the following conditions are adhered to:

(a) As is stated above, the swine shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued within the 30 days prior to the date of the exhibition and shall be permanently identified by an 840 series RFID identification ear tag.

(b) Arrival, exhibition and departure of the swine shall occur within a 72-hour window. Time begins when the first swine arrives physically on the exhibition grounds, whether unloaded from a trailer or not, and ends when the last hog physically leaves the premises on a trailer.

(c) There shall be no public access to the animals other than observation during competitions.

(d) An accredited veterinarian or trained swine health monitor shall have visually inspected the animals prior to unloading and found each animal to be free of signs of contagious disease.

(e) An accredited veterinarian or trained swine health monitor shall monitor and record the health of the pigs daily for signs of contagious disease, and the accredited veterinarian shall immediately report suspicion of disease to the State Animal Health Official.

(f) A Veterinary-client-patient-relationship is established between the show committee/management staff and an accredited veterinarian, and that veterinarian is readily available for health monitoring, emergency coverage, treatment, follow up evaluation, and prompt reporting of suspicion of disease to the State Animal Health Official.

11. The swine shall comply with the Department's regulations regarding interstate transportation and importation of swine found a 7 Pa.Code §§ 3.131-3.139.

12. The swine shall comply with the Department's interstate and international quarantine orders; "Interstate and International Quarantine Order; Swine Exhibition Requirements" [51 Pa.B. 3864, Saturday, July 17, 2021], "Addendum to the Interstate and International Quarantine Order; Swine Exhibition Requirements" [52 Pa.B. 2363, April 23, 2022] and "Interstate/International and General Quarantine Order; Importation and Intrastate Movement of Swine" [39 Pa.B. 5442, September 19, 2009].

Draft Horse Guidelines: A horse or similar equine such as donkey, mule, pony, burro of any size or type used for pulling heavy loads, doing farm work or logging. This show consists of 4 divisions:

1. Heavy Draft Horse - Belgians, Percherons, Clydesdales, Shires, Suffolk or animal weighing over 1300 lbs.
2. Light draft Horse - Morgans, Friesians, Halfingers or Draft crosses weighing under 1300 lbs.
3. Draft Pony - Pony or mini under 48 inches.
4. Mule and Donkey - mule, donkey or burro of any size.

Eligibility Rules:

1. Arrive Sunday by 10 am and leave no earlier than 2 pm Saturday.
2. Exhibitors must show animals entered unless exempt or dismissed by superintendent.
3. All person will abide by fair rules and health requirements and protect the public from any unruly animals (biters, kickers, etc.) The superintendent will have full authority to remove any animal as needed for any reason.
4. NEGATIVE COGGINS TEST, RABIES VACCINE, AND CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION ARE MANDATORY. Copies of tests must be attached to the stall where the animal is kept. See Equine Animal Health Rules for more specifics.
5. Exhibitors will take prudent care when moving animals from one place to another within the fairgrounds, making all necessary precautions to protect the public.
6. 4-H exhibitors showing in the Draft Show should be stalled in the 4-H barns, if possible.
7. No mare and foal will be separated regardless of class shown in, unless so desired by owner.
8. Each exhibitor must have a separate number.
9. Youth classes will be divided into Youth ages 12 years and under and Youth ages 13 to 18 years. Age determined as of January 1st of this year.
10. All youth 18 years and younger in hitch classes must be accompanied by an adult driver 19 years or older.
11. Classes may be split by judge if needed
12. Safety helmets are suggested but not mandatory.
13. There cannot be leaders handling animals in a hitch class.
14. A brood mare must have had a foal before July 1 of this year.
15. If entered in a brood mare class, the animal is not eligible for other mare classes.
16. Peewee and Novice is anyone not comfortable driving alone.

Department 10 Rules - 4-H and Vocational Junior Livestock

1. Classes are open to 4-H Clubs, Vo-Ag and FFA members in Bedford County with the only exception being Junior Dairy which is open to Blair County Junior members.
2. 4-H Club members must currently be entered on the Penn State Extension 4-H enrollment records for the project in which entry is desired at the Fair.
3. FFA members must be currently enrolled in Vo-Ag classes of Junior FFA clubs with a bona fide farming project in which entry is desired at the Fair, and must have an active FFA membership card from the teacher of agriculture.
4. Project books must accompany all animals and will be checked by the proper committee.
5. Animals, except where specifically exempted, must be registered in exhibitors name and be a supervised project.

6. Joint ownership considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.

7. No exhibitor may enter more than two animals in any one class.

8. Animals must be shown by exhibitor. In case of sickness or other approved reason by proper Superintendent, animal then may be shown by another 4-H or FFA member.

9. Junior Livestock exhibitor may show in open classes if entered in same class by the entry deadline.

10. All livestock health admission requirements listed in the Departments 1-10 Rules must be met.

11. Special Fitting & Showing contests and trophies are open only to bona fide exhibitors in the division for the trophy. Competitors must be showing their own animals. Exhibitor age is as of January 1, of the current fair year. Special Fitting & Showing contests and trophies are open only to bona fide exhibitors in the division for the trophy. Competitors must be showing their own animals. Exhibitor age is as of January 1, of the Fair year. **Exhibitors must present their animal at the scales to be considered a bona fide exhibitor and become eligible to compete in showmanship. If the animal does not make weight, the exhibitor may borrow an animal from any exhibitor to compete in showmanship. If the exhibitor does not present an animal at the scales for weigh-in, the project is considered incomplete and the exhibitor is not eligible for showmanship.**

12. It is the responsibility of parents or legal guardians to monitor or arrange for the supervision of their children under the age of 18 at all times during the Fair.

13. A Junior Livestock Sale Committee, consisting of six (6) persons made up by the chairman and one committee member of each livestock, will set the sales commission and other rules as needed for the sale. If a Penn State Extension staff member is not included in the above, one will serve as ex-officio.

14. Any and all animals entered and shown at the Bedford Co Fair are the sole responsibility of the exhibitor. If an animal tests positive for a non-approved substance; i.e. performance enhancing or non-approved for food producing animals, the exhibitor will be held accountable no matter the circumstances, date of purchase, or date of taking possession of the animal. **The top 3 market animals will immediately be taken to the designated drug testing area for a sample** once the grand drive has ended. The official veterinarian will release the exhibitor and animal once testing is deemed complete.

The Bedford County Fair and it's officers, reserve the right to randomly drug test any livestock exhibited at the Bedford County Fair. Non-approved pharmaceuticals are 100% prohibited! This includes substances not approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and/or the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) for slaughter animals that may be destined for human consumption. This includes the use of all products that are not FDA approved including but not limited to any unapproved growth stimulant, beta-agonists, diuretics, or other unapproved medication meant for human usage that are intended for performance enhancing purposes. All utilized pharmaceuticals should be in compliance with Pennsylvania standards, USDA, and/or USDA/Food Safety/safety standards.

If any substance found in the obtained sample is non-approved, then the individual exhibitor will be subject to the following penalties:

(A) Disqualified from exhibiting at the Bedford County Fair for one year.

(B) Any & all money will be forfeited.

(C) All awards (banners, buckles, etc.) must be returned to the Department Committee immediately regardless of situation or will be billed at the Committee's discretion.

(D) Will be responsible to pay any and all fees for the blood test results.

1. Vehicles used by 4-H Horse & Pony members, used for sleeping but not parked in designated camping area, may be moved closer to the horse barns from 10:00 pm to 7:30 am in order to be closer to the horses; however, clear access lanes to and around each barn must be kept open at all times for emergency (fire, ambulance and utility) vehicles. In no case may extension cords from any campers and "sleepers" be plugged into the barn lights or plug outlets. Vehicles (cars and pickup trucks) belonging to Horse & Pony members, leaders and parents are to be parked in the Horse & Pony parking lot above the horse show ring whenever possible. There are to be no tents pitched, trailers or vehicles of any kind parked in front of the barn on the north track side unless you are unloading. The Horse & Pony Committee will have the responsibility of seeing that these rules are followed.

2. An office fee of \$5 per horse or pony will be collected at the announcer's stand when you check in for each animal exhibited in the Jr. Horse & Pony Production & Performance Shows.

3. It is the responsibility of each exhibitor to follow the show and be at the in-gate on time. Two-minute gate call.

4. Junior Horse Project & Junior Horse Championship rules in current State 4-H Horse Show rule book will apply with the exception of rule no. 7, Department 10, Rules, 4-H, FFA & Vo-Ag Jr. Livestock.

5. All miniature horses must be 40" or under in height. They may be registered or unregistered. Height certificate required.

6. Any 4-H member under the age of 12 years of age must have a Level 1 Horsemanship Skills form signed by (3) three examiners in order to show in the production classes. Any new 4-H or FFA member showing for the first time at the Fair must have a form signed by (3) three examiners that they have passed State Level 1 Horsemanship Skills or Bedford County Basic Horse Safety Skills in order to show in futurity or performance classes at the Fair.

7. 4-H members' registration papers, Coggins, rabies vaccination verification signed by a vet, and measurement certificate (for pony classes) on performance and production animals were due in the Extension Office by June 1. FFA members are to attach copies of their Coggins, rabies vaccination verification signed by a vet, registration papers, height certificate (for pony classes) for their performance and production animals to their Fair entry form. If there are no papers with the entry form the entry will NOT be accepted. Fair entries are due on June 21. Enter online on <http://bedfordcountyfairpa.fairentry.com/> and refer to Premium Guide for more rules and directions.

8. THERE WILL BE NOTHING PLUGGED INTO LIGHT FIXTURES IN THE HORSE BARN! There will be no tack or feed stalls in the horse barns unless assigned by committee. No hoses are to be used to water horses and no extension cords are to be run from campers to the barns.

9. Any 4-H or FFA members winning in class 8 through 10 and 12 through 14 in that age group is not eligible for that award again until they reach the next age category. However, anyone winning the award in either the Grooming or Showmanship class is then eligible to show in the Master Grooming or Showmanship class also (this applies to previous years' winners also). If you have changed age categories this year you are eligible to enter the Grooming or Showmanship (classes 8 through 10 and 12 through 14) class and if you win the award, you are eligible to show in the Master Grooming or Showmanship class.

10. Class 7, 20 Year & Over Mare or Gelding, Horse or Pony, the animal must be 20 years old or over. It must have been shown in 4-H at least two years. They must have a current record book either performance or production. If showing production, you may bring them in on Wednesday and take them home on Wednesday. The animal must have a current Coggins, rabies vaccination verification signed by a vet in accordance with the Animal Health Rules, Horses, in the premium tabloid. Participants in this class may still show in the 4 years (mare or gelding) and over production class. Animals in this class will be judged on their conformation and how well they have aged. This class was designed to say thanks to the animals that have given so much to us.

11. Class No. 16 is for 2-year-old horses/ponies only, walk/trot only, any tack. Classes 17 and 18 are for 3-, 4- and 5-year-olds, walk, trot/jog, canter/lope.

12. Class 19, 20, 21 and 22 are PERFORMANCE CLASS and members may show a total of two animals in these classes.

13. Exhibitors in classes 36, 64, 65, 67 and 68 must show an animal that is housed on the grounds during the fair. No animals are permitted to be hauled in.

14. Any 4-H, or FFA member in violation of any of the rules in this Fair Web or the Premium tabloid will automatically be disqualified from participating in the shows.

1. Dairy feeder steer calves (no heifers) must be born and tagged between December 1st and March 1st of the current project year. Members can tag three calves, but only two calves may be shown in the feeder classes. Animals cannot be replaced after tagging deadline. Any two from the group of three that were tagged may be shown in the following year's finished steer show. An exhibitor may show two dairy feeder calves and two finished dairy steers each year.
2. Project animal must be tagged by the 4H Leader or FFA Advisor. Animal must have official Bedford County Fair RFID tag. Fair Tags and project enrollment form will be available at the Extension Office. Project enrollment form must be returned to the Extension Office by March 15th. No late submissions will be accepted. Five (\$5) will be collected per tagged animal and returned with the project enrollment form. Checks made payable to "Bedford County Dairy Committee." Due to supply demands, tags will be available early February 2024.
3. Project animal can be any breed of dairy, (Ayrshire, Brown Swiss,

Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey, Milking Shorthorn, or Red & White) but MUST be pure bred dairy blood. No crossbreeding of dairy breeds or beef parentage.

4. All calves should be dehorned in time to be healed by the show. Calves should be castrated by May 1. Calves must be either cut or banded – Crimping will not be allowed. Dairy beef must be completely free of testicular development and healed at the show.

5. **Feeder Calves must weigh a minimum of 350 lbs. and will be enforced.** Must be on a grain fed diet by the Fair in order to show – Calves will be divided in three classes by weight following weigh-in: Light, Medium, and Heavy.

6. Dairy Feeders and finished steers will be weighed immediately after the Market Steers on Sunday afternoon. Both will be shown on Tuesday afternoon, following the Junior Dairy Show. Dairy Feeder Calves will start, followed by Finished Dairy Steers. Showmanship will occur following the Finished Dairy steer show.

7. Members must declare at the scale whether to sell or take their project animal home. For Feeder Calves, The 1st place feeder calf of each class will be eligible to be sold at the Livestock Sale on Saturday (this includes Grand & Reserve Grand Champions). However, to follow the industry standards, **NO FEEDER CALF UNDER 450 lbs. will be accepted or sold at the sale. Substitutes will be at the discretion of the Sale Committee. Also, the Grand & Reserve Finished Steers will be sold at the sale on Saturday.** All others will not be sold through the livestock sale. The dairy beef committee will seek a predetermined bid for all feeders to be sold. Rope halters must be left with your steers for loading after the fair.

8. Members are responsible for their 4H Project Books or proof that the steer is entered in the FFA AET system. Members must bring documentation with them at the time of weigh-in or you will not be permitted to show.

9. All members are responsible for health requirements. To add value of animals for the buyer. See rules at www.bedford-fair.com.

10. A substitute showman who is the same age or younger may be used if the exhibitor has more than one steer in the ring in the same class. Refer to the www.bedford-fair.com website for specific showmanship requirements.

11. All Dairy Beef calves and Finished Steers will be housed together in the Open Show Dairy Barn (unless you are a Dairy Exhibitor). You are responsible for your own bedding, water and feed.

12. Fitting Suggestion: Slick Shearing and be sure to get all the hair removed from all locations of the body with the exception of the switch.

1. There will be individual market lamb classes divided by weight in as nearly twelve equal groups as possible with a minimum weight of 85 pounds, and a limit of 2 entries per exhibitor.
2. Lambs must be ewes or wethers. No ram lambs will be permitted.
3. Lambs will be weighted upon arrival Saturday for both class breakdown and the sale.
4. All market lambs must be on feed as a 4-H or FFA project by May 1st.
5. All project books must be completed to date and will be collected by the sheep committee and/or Extension Agent at scales before market lambs are weighed in.
6. Market lamb judging will be held on Tuesday evening at 6:30 p.m.
7. All market lambs must have a tag in their ear to be eligible for the 2024 market lamb show at the Fair. All tagging will be done on the first Saturday in May at the Fairgrounds between 8:00 a.m. and 12 noon. There will be a \$10 charge per tag. An additional \$10 will be charged per tag for re-tagging of animals. (Tagging will be done according to

the guidelines issues by Extension Office.) Any lamb with a scrapie tag bearing the word "meat" will not be tagged. These animals were designated for slaughter through a sale barn and are not eligible for show.

8. Market lambs will be weighed only once for classes.

9. **Blood samples from the Champion and Reserve Champion market lambs from each weight division will be drawn for drug testing immediately following the type show in the sheep barn.**

10. The top two lambs in classes 1-12 will be sold in the sale. In addition, each market lamb member who does not have a lamb in the top 24 will sell his or her highest placing lamb. **If an exhibitor has two lambs placing the same in two different classes, they must notify Rodney Fisher by 10 pm on the day of the show, as to which lamb they want to sell. If Rodney is not notified, the heaviest lamb will be entered into the sale.**

11. All market lambs must be slick sheared within 48 hours prior to the market lamb show.

12. All market lambs must have certified scrapie tags to be shown.

13. Market lambs to be in the sale must be paint-numbered immediately following the market lamb show.

14. If any tags needed replaced due to loss or infection, Rodney Fisher (814-623-7778) is to be contacted and re-tagging will be done.

15. Health papers will be checked before unloading.

16. **Market lambs will be accepted for unloading, checked-in, and weighed-in on Saturday between 7:00 am - 10 am and 6:00 pm - 8:00 pm.**

17. All sheep exhibitors must clean their pen after the Fair. Bedding is to be put in the designated area. **If you do not clean your pen thoroughly, a fee of \$25 will be billed to the exhibitor.**

4. **All pigs will be weighed in on Saturday, July 20, from 7-10 a.m. and 6-9 p.m. NO EXCEPTIONS! Pigs must weigh between 230-280 lbs. Health papers (CVI) must be checked before unloading at designated areas. Health Papers must be issued within 14 days of weigh-ins.**
 - 4a. All light or heavy pigs will be temporarily placed in a swine barn and then taken to the butcher shop by the Swine Committee at the conclusion of weigh ins. It will then become the exhibitor's responsibility to contact the butcher shop to make further arrangements.
5. All health papers and completed (up to date) 4-H and FFA record books must be presented at weigh-ins in order for these animals to be weighed.
6. **NO CARCASS HOGS are allowed to be on the Fairgrounds prior to Wednesday morning's weigh-in. (This rule will be strictly enforced).**
7. Swine Showmanship will take place Wednesday at 6:00 pm. All showmen must sign up on entry form to be eligible to show. Classes will be divided into 4 age divisions and split into "heats" divided as evenly as possible, not exceeding more than 15 showmen. Top 5 showmen in each division will receive a banner. Pee-Wee followed by (Age as of Jan1.) Div. 1 - (18-21) Div.2 - (15-17) Div. 3 - (12-14) Div. 4 - (8-11).
8. Jr. Market Swine Judging will take place Thursday at 6:00 pm. There will be 15 classes (3 divisions) divided by weight, regardless of breed, to as nearly as possible having equal numbers of individual pigs shown in each class. Pigs weighing less than 230 lbs. or more than 280 lbs. are not eligible to compete. Top 3 pigs in each division along with top 3 pigs overall will receive banners.
9. An exhibitor may enter and show not more than 2 market hogs.
10. **There shall be "NO SWITCHING OF PENS" once pen assignments are done unless permission is given by the Swine committee superintendent first!**

11. The meat goat show is open to any breed or crossbred of meat goat genetics. Purebred dairy goats are not to be shown in the meat goat show. Goat's ears must be large enough to tag as determined by show superintendent.
12. The junior meat goat show will begin on Monday at 6 p.m. The Pee Wee show will be held immediately before the type show.
13. The top 2 goats from each class will be sold in the livestock auction sale. In addition, any exhibitor not placing first or second in their class will sell his or her highest placing goat. No exceptions. In the event that a showman's goats both earn the same placing, the heavier of the two goats will be placed in the sale unless notified otherwise by the exhibitor by NOON on TUESDAY.
14. There will be twelve (12) classes divided by weight to (as nearly as possible as selected by the goat committee) have equal numbers in each class.
15. **Health papers and goats will be checked for health concerns by show attendants before entering barn. Any goats not passing health inspection will not be penned and must be taken home.**

16. Goats will only be accepted for unloading Saturday 7 am - 10 am and 6 pm - 8 pm.
17. Goats will be weighed in and project books and health papers will be checked at time of check-in **before** goats are placed in pens.
18. Each animal must be shown by its owner according to tag-in information and fair entry. **No goats will be accepted after 8 pm.** Any goats not making weight must be taken home the same day.
19. **Goats may not be kept inside enclosed tents for fitting, etc. at any time during the fair week.** Failure to follow this rule WILL result in the animal not being permitted to show and or be in the sale at the discretion of the goat committee.
20. **Blood samples from the Champion and Reserve Champion market goats from each weight division will be drawn for drug testing immediately following the type show.**

General Poultry Rules

1. Poultry showing is only open to 4-H and FFA members in good standing and carrying a poultry project. For showmanship classes, age is determined as of January 1 of the current year.
2. See meat bird special rules for ownership requirements.
3. All poultry must meet health requirements of the Bureau of Animal Industry, the Dept. of Ag, and the owner-endorsed health certificate must accompany the entry at check in. This certificate is available from your leader, ag advisor, or at link above.
4. All poultry entering an exhibition must bear an official PDA-issued leg band.
5. Exhibitors can enter their poultry and showmanship classes online at link above.
6. All poultry must be checked-in on the fairgrounds by noon on Sunday the start of fair week. Exhibitors must be present to check in their birds for health inspection prior to caging any birds. Hands-on health checks will be done on Sunday from 10 am-noon. Exhibitors must have the required health certificate for health check and an owner endorsed health certificate.
7. No animals showing signs of contagious, infectious disease or external parasites will be admitted.
8. All pens must be kept clean throughout the week. If your cage is not kept clean, or project is not cared for properly, you may be barred from future exhibition. Exhibitors must provide feed and water bowls.
9. Record books must be up-to-date and checked prior to showing. Health Requirements: See rules above and Health Rules (Poultry: Section 13)

1. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Testing and Verification.
2. Tested Avian influenza Clean (a negative test within thirty (30) days of exhibition date).
3. Recommended vaccination for Laryngotracheitis.

As part of the PDA Poultry Exhibition Quarantine, only market poultry allowed at the Fair. NO market poultry or poultry products may be exhibited within an active HPAI Control

Area or Surveillance Zone. These areas or zones can pop up when a flock tests positive for HPAI at any time. This means that market poultry exhibition can be canceled at a moment's notice for an indefinite amount of time until the control area and/or surveillance zone is cleared. Please proceed with this in mind and have a plan ready should this occur. Please read all information. Also, the Fairs in Pa have elected not to allow eggs and feathers for exhibition (this includes feathers in crafts).

Market poultry ONLY – birds must move to a USDA or PA Dept. of Agriculture licensed slaughter facility after judging. This is an all-in, all-out procedure where NO birds may return home.

- Market poultry must be on and off the grounds within 72 hours, starting from when the first bird arrives until the last bird leaves. Birds may NOT stay on the grounds for the duration of the entire fair if they will be present longer than 72 hours.

- Exhibition of poultry shall require a PDA issued "Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement" (provided on the Department's website). If a CVI is required for entry by the fair, an endorsement of biosecurity on the "Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement" shall also accompany the poultry.

- All birds must be monitored for signs of illness while on the grounds, however there is not a specific training for this like the Swine Health

Monitor Training. Fairs are encouraged to refer to the Biosecurity Guidelines for Exhibition Managers.

- All birds must be behind barriers with signage to prevent public interaction with birds.
- All market poultry must be confirmed free of HPAI prior to entry to the exhibition. This requires a negative HPAI test on record within 14 days of the exhibition.

*Test samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian and processed at a National Animal Health Laboratory Network lab (this includes all 3 PADLS labs).

* Test results must accompany the poultry to the show.

* No new birds may be added to a clean tested flock prior to the show.

* Additional details on testing requirements can be found on pages 5-6 of the Quarantine Order and MUST be followed.

IMPORTANT REMINDER:

- NO market poultry or poultry products may be exhibited within an active HPAI Control Area or Surveillance Zone. These areas or zones can pop up when a flock tests positive for HPAI at any time.
- This means that market poultry and poultry product exhibition can be canceled at a moment's notice for an indefinite amount of time until the control area and/or surveillance zone is cleared. Please proceed with this in mind and have a plan ready should this occur.

If weight of meat pen does not meet requirements at weigh in, the entire exhibit will be sent home and will not be shown in the regular breed show.
 - Owner must notify a rabbit committee member their intent to enter a meat pen and start a compliance form before the doe is bred by April 1, 2024. Call 814-585-3345 or 814-494-8858. This form can be picked up at the 4H office, from project leader or committee member.
*Exhibitors who choose to breed should be do so April 13, 2024, or after. *Litters should be born on May 11 or later.
 - Exhibitor must notify a rabbit committee member within three days after the doe's kindling.
 - The compliance statement must be brought with the rabbits to the fairgrounds at check- in day.

2. Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this PA Preferred® Junior Baking contest at any other fair in 2024.
3. Entry must be six (6) individual sized portions of the baked entry item. (cookies, brownies or bars)
4. The cookies, brownies or bars, and any fillings and frostings, must be made from scratch with edible ingredients. No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (ex: pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.). Any decorations must be edible.
5. At least two (2) PA Preferred® or locally purchased ingredients must be used in the recipe. Some examples of qualifying ingredients include grains (such as oats or flour), butter, milk, eggs, fruits and/or vegetables.
6. A PA Preferred® logo is not required because not all PA Preferred® products carry the label. The name of the ingredient and the source is sufficient (example - 1/2 cup butter (PA Preferred, Lapp Valley Farm; 4 cups apples (Smith Farm Orchard). Contact RA-AGPAPPreferred@pa.gov for any assistance with qualifying ingredients.
7. Entry must be submitted for judging on a food safe disposable setting. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
8. Recipe(s) must be submitted with the entry, printed on one side of 8 -1/2" x 11" sheets of paper. Recipe must list all ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. The name of each PA Preferred® ingredient or locally purchased ingredient must be clearly listed clearly along with the source that made/grew the product (ex: PA Preferred Milk – Galliker's brand or Apples - Smith Farm Orchard). Entrant's name, age, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages. (All recipes and cookies-brownies-bars will become the property of the fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.)
9. Refrigeration is not available at the fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.
10. Judging criteria:

Flavor (aroma, taste, good balance of flavorings) - 30 points

Texture (appropriate for the type of cookie, brownie or bar) - 25 points

Inside Characteristics (even grain, evenly baked; free from air pockets) - 20 points

Outside Characteristics (uniform size, shape, appearance; overall appeal) - 15 points

Creativity - 10 points

Officers of the JFB shall consist of a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. The meeting for re-organization shall be held at the first meeting of the year. These will be a one (1) year term position.

Duties of Members

*Your term will run for a period of one year, but you may re-apply each year.

*It is mandatory you attend meetings when they are called. The JFB Advisors will determine excused absences or exceptions. Meetings will be held more often during March through September than winter months.

* You will be required to work a certain amount of hours fair week as well as committees. Those will be explained under the requirements.

*You may be removed at any time during the year for inappropriate, unacceptable behavior or for not fulfilling your duties.

* You must carry a professional attitude when handling fair attendees.

* Use appropriate dress, behavior, and language especially when representing the fair.

* Take responsibility for planning and conducting your committees.

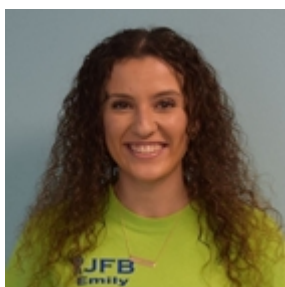

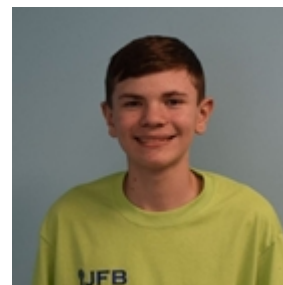
