RULES & REGULATIONS

1. Threshed grain sample should be exhibited in a clear plastic, gallon-size zip closure bags. The gallon bag should be 3/4 full of grain.
2. Any hay grower is eligible to enter.
3. Exhibits in the Nursery/Field Crops & Seeds Department must be produced within the last year (unless specifically indicated differently).
4. Exhibitors may make two (2) entries per class.
5. For baled hay classes, 6" to 8" will constitute one entry.
6. Bales must be tied with wire or twine.
7. For the loose hay class, a bundle of 4" or more in diameter tied twice will constitute an entry.
8. Judging factors considered include: relative feed value, protein, maturity, texture, leafiness, freedom from foreign material, color, size, shape, odor and mold-free.
9. Variety must be listed on each class entered.
10. The decision of the judge is final.

10A - DIVISION 1 - ADULT, 18 and Older

10B - DIVISION 2 - YOUTH, 13-17 years old

10C - DIVISION 3 - YOUTH, 9-12 years old

10D - DIVISION 4 - YOUTH, 8 and Under

10E - DIVISION 5 - SENIORS, 65 and Older

CROPS AND SEEDS

One (1) pint constitutes an exhibit for Class 1-6.

CLASS 01 - Wheat

CLASS 02 - Oats

CLASS 03 - Barley

CLASS 04 - Peas

CLASS 05 - Beans

CLASS 06 - Small Seeds

CORN

Must have three (3) ears of corn for Class 7-14. Stem must be trimmed. Leave 2-3 layers of husk (unless indicated).

CLASS 07 - Indian (may be from last year's garden)

CLASS 08 - Sweet - In Husks - do not cut tips

CLASS 09 - White - Remove Husks

CLASS 10 - Yellow - Remove Husks

CLASS 11 - Tallest Corn Stalk

CLASS 12 - Corn with Ears Attached

CLASS 13 - Group of Three (3) Corn Stalks

CLASS 14 - Other - Specify Type

SHEAF GRASSES & LEGUMES

A sheaf must be three (3) inches in diameter.

BALE FLAKES

CLASS 21 - First Cutting Alfalfa

CLASS 26 - First Cutting Clover - Grass

SILAGE

Must be displayed in a one (1) quart plastic container or glass jar.

CLASS 33 - Silage

SHEAF GRAINS

A sheaf shall not be less than 2" or more than 4" in diameter below the heads. Tie sheaf in three (3) places: 1. Base of heads, 2. Center of stalks, 3. Near the butt.

CLASS 34 - Sheaf Grains

SUNFLOWERS

CLASS 35 - Tallest - Without Roots - Adult

CLASS 36 - Tallest - Without Roots - Children Under 15

CLASS 37 - Tallest - Without Roots - Elementary School Age

CLASS 38 - Widest - Adult

CLASS 39 - Widest - Children Under 15

CLASS 40 - Widest - Elementary School Age

CLASS 41 - Group of Three (3) Tall Sunflowers

CLASS 42 - Group of Three (3) Tall Various-Colored Sunflowers

NURSERY

Must be in potted or Balled & Burlapped (B&B) form.

CLASS 43 - Nursery

BACKYARD COMPOST

CLASS 44 - Bring in three (3) pounds of compost made from household and yard waste. Use a bucket or compost pail to transport entry. Submit photograph, brief description of techniques: cold, warm, or worm; including a description of what kinds of household and yard waste was used.

JUNIOR FARMER

Design a poster or display mounted on a standard poster board (22 x 28 inches to 25 x 30 inches). Exhibit must focus on one central idea promoting a farming lifestyle:
