This department is subject to all BCF General Rules, General Exhibitor Rules and all Junior Exhibitor Livestock and Animal Division Rules in addition to those listed for the department.

## GENERAL RULES

These rules apply to the Showmanship, Obedience and Rally Contest. Please refer to the Agility section for rules related to that contest. Contest requirements may be modified at any time in response to changes in Health Department guidance.

Please read these rules carefully since some classes and requirements have changed.

1. All exhibitors MUST comply with current Health Department requirements.
2. The only training equipment allowed in the Obedience and Rally ring is a slip, chain, martingale, flat buckle or clip collar without tags and a nylon or leather leash. No halties, gentle leaders, slip leads, harnesses or pinch collars are allowed. The same collars are allowed without tags in the Showmanship ring, but handlers may also use a martingale or other show lead to exhibit their dog. No bait or treats are allowed in the Obedience or Rally rings. Bait may be used in the Showmanship ring at the discretion of the judge.
3. If a dog has failed an exercise, it will not ordinarily be re-judged unless the judge feels the dog's performance was prejudiced by peculiar and unusual conditions. In such a case, the judge may elect to re-judge the dog only on the portion of the exercise in which the unusual condition occurred.
4. Exhibitors MUST comply with the Colorado State 4-H Dress Code.
5. NO dogs are allowed beyond the immediate vicinity of the indoor arena unless returning to or from the car. Dogs are not allowed to enter other barns, or buildings on the fairgrounds.
6. Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning up after their dogs both inside and outside the arena.
7. Dogs must be always on leash except when performing off leash exercises in the show ring.
8. In addition to the BCF General Rules, General Exhibitor Rules and all Junior Exhibitor Livestock and Animal Division Rules, exhibitors must also comply with the policies adopted by the Boulder County Dog Advisory Committee including the rules regarding Shared Family Dogs and Borrowed Dogs, as posted on the Boulder County 4-H Dog Project web page.
9. Any negative behavior on the part of the exhibitor, family members or leaders directed toward any official will result in disqualification and awards forfeited. If there is a question as to the rules or the judging of a class, adult family members, exhibitors or leaders must approach the Dog Superintendent and not the judge. The Superintendent will then take the question to the judge if warranted.

## ELIGIBILITY RULES

1. Only exhibitors enrolled in the 4-H Dog Project are eligible to enter classes under Department 400.
2. Each 4-H exhibitor must provide an up-to-date printed record book at check in.
3. Exhibitors must own their project dog individually or in partnership with immediate family members or guardians during the complete duration of the project.
4. Exhibitors may only exhibit one dog in Showmanship but may enter separate dogs in Rally and Obedience. An exhibitor may enter more than one dog in Obedience and Rally classes and may enter more than one dog in the same class for Obedience and Rally if they meet County qualifications. If an exhibitor has two dogs in the same Obedience class, they must choose one dog for the group sits and downs. The other dog must be handled by a currently enrolled 4-H dog project member for the group sits and downs.
5. The progress the dog has made and the number of years the handler has been in the dog project determines the correct class to enter. The "A" level classes are limited to exhibitors and/or dogs with no experience showing in that class. If a project member and/or dog has ever received a qualifying score in an A level class and decides to show a new dog, the member must enter the "B" level class.

## DOG ELIGIBILITY RULES

1. Only dogs with a 4-H Dog ID completed in 4-H Online by the last Thursday in April are eligible to enter classes under Department 400. Dogs who do not have a completed Dog ID in 4-H Online by the last Thursday in April will NOT be allowed to compete at County Fair or Statefair the State Dog Trials.
2. Vaccines MUST be kept current in 4-H Online throughout the year in order to exhibit at County or the State Dog Trials State Fair. Upon request, proof of current rabies, distemper and parvovirus vaccination must be presented upon check-in. Bordatella is strongly encouraged but not required. Rabies tag number must be on the entry form under the Registration Tag category. Rabies vaccines must be administered by a licensed veterinarian. Titers may be accepted as
provided in the State 4-H Dog Contest Trial Rules.
3. A dog with an AKC title or a title from another national dog association is disqualified from entering the same class for which that title was awarded or any lower class, except if that title was won less than four months before the State Fair-Dog Trials, and then the dog is eligible for entry in the same class. The exceptions to this titling rule are Grad Novice, Open, Grad Open, and Utility Obedience; and Rally Advanced/Excellent and Masters Rally. Rule 1 above, takes precedence over this rule.
4. No bitch in heat will be allowed to compete in any dog class. A Boulder County Fair Livestock Show \& Rodeo veterinarian's decision on doubtful cases will be accepted as final.
5. Dog show officials can and will dismiss any entrant or their family from the show for any mistreatment of dogs entered in the show. If a question should arise as to what constitutes mistreatment, 4-H Staff and/or officials will meet to discuss appropriate action in each case. Dismissal from the show will result in the forfeiture of any awards.
6. Dogs 6 months of age or younger are not eligible to compete in Showmanship.
7. For Obedience, Rally, and Agility, the same dog may not compete in the same discipline more than once with more than one family member.

## STATE 4-H FAIR-DOG TRAILS

1. Refer to the Colorado State Fair 4-H Dog Trials Requirements for contest rules governing the State Obedience, Rally and Showmanship contests and the State Agility contest.
2. After earning a qualifying score in Showmanship, Rally or Obedience competition at the Boulder County Fair, the exhibitor may be eligible to show at the State 4-H Dog Trials. Qualifying scores are 170 and above in Obedience and Showmanship and 70 and above in Rally. The top four qualifying scores in each class at county fair will have the first opportunity to show at the State 4-H Dog Trials Faif. The next highest qualifying scores from County Fair will be considered for any remaining spots. If there are still spots available in a class after considering all County Fair qualifying scores, qualifying scores from 4-H fun matches or other dog shows may be considered for the-participation in the State 4-H Dog Trials at the discretion of the Superintendent. The next highest placing participant at the county fair show will have the chance to participate in state fair if they had a qualifying score at a fun match. Exhibitors must provide proof of qualifying score to the project leader or superintendent prior to County Fair. Exhibitors with alternate qualifying scores will be selected for any remaining State Dog Trial slots in the order of the highest to lowest scores.
3. There are no limits on entries for the State Agility Contest.
4. Once scores from County Fair are made available, eligible exhibitors must notify the Dog Superintendent of their decision to participate in the State Dog Trials or the State Agility Contest, and which classes they will be entering.
5. The Team Rally competition at the State 4-H Dog Trials Fair will be limited to 8 entries plus one alternate from Boulder County. The 8 exhibitors with the highest qualifying scores in the Intermediate or higher Rally classes will be eligible to participate in the State Fair Dog Trials Team Rally competition. The exhibitor with the 9th highest score will serve as an alternate team member.

## PREMIUMS:

## AWARDS:

Class placements awards and scoresheets will be available at the Awards Ceremony.

1. Ribbons will be awarded to the $1^{\text {st }}-5^{\text {th }}$ place exhibitors in each of the Obedience, Showmanship and Rally CLASSES.
2. Depending on the number of entries, a Champion and Reserve Champion may be awarded in each DIVISION (ie; Beginner Novice, Novice, Grad Novice, Advanced, Veterans).
3. An Overall Champion and Reserve Champion will be awarded to the highest scoring exhibitors in each DISCIPLINE (Obedience, Rally and Showmanship). Dogs entered in the Puppy Class or Veterans Obedience are not eligible to compete for the Overall Obedience awards.
4. A Dog Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be awarded to the single dog and handler teams with the highest combined total qualifying score for Obedience, Showmanship and Rally. Exhibitors must participate in all three disciplines with the same dog in order to be eligible for this award. Exhibitors showing a single dog in this contest are not eligible for the Handler Grand or Reserve Grand Champion award. Dogs entered in the Puppy class or Veterans Division classes are not eligible to compete for the Dog Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion awards at County Fair.
5. A Handler Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be awarded to the exhibitors with the highest combined total qualifying score for Obedience, Showmanship and Rally. Exhibitors must show more than one dog in the contest and exhibitors must participate in all three disciplines. The exhibitor's highest score from any dog in each discipline will be used to compute the combined score. (Their top scores could come from different dogs or all from the same dog, but they must show more than one dog.) Exhibitors showing more than one dog in this contest are not eligible for the Dog Grand or Reserve Grand Champion award. Dogs entered in the Puppy class or Veterans Division classes are not eligible to compete for the Handler Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion awards at County Fair.
6. The top four qualifying scores in each class at the county fair are eligible to go to the State Dog Trials.
7. Unlimited State Fair Dog Trials entries are available in Graduate Novice A/B, Open A/B, Grad Open $A / B$ and Utility $A / B$ Obedience, Rally Advanced/Excellent $A / B$, and Masters Rally A/B.
8. The Puppy Class and Masters Choice Class are not offered at the State Dog Trials. Exhibitors who receive a qualifying score in the Masters Choice Rally class at County Fair are not eligible to compete in the Masters Rally class at the State Dog Trials.
9. The top two scorers in each Showmanship age group (Junior, Intermediate, Senior) may be eligible to participate in the Boulder County Fair Small Animal Round Robin contest. If any of the top two scorers in an age group decline to participate, the opportunity will be offered to the next highest scoring participant in that age group with a qualifying score. Exhibitors who have won Round Robin in previous years are only eligible to enter the Elite Showman class. See the Rules in Department 999 for more details.

## CLASSES

1. All exhibitors participating in the $4-H$ Dog Contest are required to submit a reasonably complete Dog Record Book at check-in for the Dog Contest. Judges may use exhibitor's 4-H Dog Project Record Books as a tie breaker in any class.
2. The number of judging rings and number of class exhibitors will be determined by current Health Department restrictions.
3. All 4-H Obedience and Rally classes will be patterned after the latest AKC guidelines whenever possible, except that dog registry with AKC is not required. Please see the AKC website for details www.AKC.org. Some exercises and rules have been adapted from AKC to better serve the youth of this program.

## OBEDIENCE CLASSES

Obedience exercises are patterned after the AKC guidelines wherever possible and are explained in the Dog Resource Handbook. You can also visit www.AKC.org for detailed explanations of the exercises. Some classes and exercises have been modified from AKC guidelines to better serve our $4-\mathrm{H}$ youth. A qualifying score in Obedience will be 170 out of the possible 200 points. In all Obedience classes, up to 15 points will be deducted for the following: strong correcting or disciplining, excessive barking, leaving the ring, rules violation or showing fear. Fouling the ring will be a 15-point deduction. The member will be allowed to finish their run. For the safety of all, a dog that snaps, bites, or attempts to bite will be excused from the ring. The Puppy Class is offered at County Fair but will no longer be offered at the State Dog Trials Fair.
A dog with an AKC Obedience title or a title from another national dog association is disqualified from entering the same obedience class for which that title was awarded or any lower class, except if that title was won less than four months before the State Fair 4-H Dog Trials Contest. The exceptions to this titling rule are Grad Novice, Open, Grad Open, and Utility Obedience.

## BEGINNER NOVICE DIVISION

## CLASS \#509: Puppies

This class is for puppies $\underline{\text { OR older dogs that are not ready for regular obedience classes. The purpose }}$ of this class is to introduce obedience commands to a new dog without the stress of perfection seen
in regular obedience classes. This class will allow the dog to participate in shows in a positive manner, thus setting the dog up for a lifetime of enjoyment in the show ring. Dog and handler teams are evaluated more on the handler's skill in training their dog and dealing with the animal's mistakes rather than on the skill of the animal when performing the exercises.
Food, treats, or toys ARE allowed in the puppy ring. Double commands will also be allowed.
This is a NO SCORE class. The score sheet will consist of Excellent, Good or Needs Improvement. After one year of showing in the Puppy Class, the team moves into Pre-Beginner Novice A Obedience.

The dog and handler team in the Puppy class will be judged on the following:

1. Loose Lead Walking - Dog does not need to be in perfect heel position but should not be pulling the handler. The dog should be watching the handler and should be on the handler's left side. Handler should be able to get the dog's attention.
2. Sit for Exam - In this exercise the puppy is commanded to a Sit position. The judge will approach the dog and examine it. The purpose of this exercise is to teach the puppy to accept handling from a friendly stranger.
3. Recall - The handler will command the puppy to stay in a Sit position and will step in front of the dog. When the judge says "Call your dog," the handler will proceed to walk backward no more than six feet while calling the dog. The dog should get up and follow the handler in a happy manner. After the six foot distance has been reached, the handler will command the dog to sit.
4. Down Stay - The handler will put the dog in a Down position. When the judge says "Leave your dog," the handler will command the dog to Stay. The handler will walk to the end of the lead, pause, and then immediately walk around behind the dog and back to the heel position.
5. Serpentine Walking - The expectations are the same as for loose lead walking, with the addition of three "posts" as a distraction.

## CLASS \#510: Pre-Beginner Novice OBED A

This class is open only to handlers and their dogs in their first year of dog obedience training.
Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Pre-Beginner Novice A for one year. All exercises in this class are performed on leash. A 6-foot leash is required for this class. The exercises in this class have been modified from AKC guidelines to better meet the needs of $4-\mathrm{H}$ youth.

## CLASS \#511: Pre-Beginner Novice OBED B

This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Pre-Beginner Novice A. Handlers with prior experience in Pre-Beginner or Beginner Novice Obedience who are showing a
new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Pre- Beginner or Beginner Novice dog should also enter the B class. This class is open to exhibitors or doss with previous experience in Pre-Beginner of Beginner Novice Obedience training OR exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Pre-Beginner Novice A Obedience. All exercises in this class are performed on-leash. A 6-foot leash is required for this class. The exercises in this class have been modified from AKC guidelines to better meet the needs of 4-H youth.

## CLASS \#512: Beginner Novice OBED A

This class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Beginner Novice training with no prior experience in Beginner Novice Obedience Dog training. Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Beginner Novice A for one year. A 6 -foot leash is required for this class. All exercises in this class will be judged according to AKC specifications except registration of dog is not required.

## Class \#513: Beginner Novice OBED B

This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Beginner Novice A. Handlers with prior Beginner Novice experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Beginner Novice dog should also enter the B class. This classis opento exhibitors or dogs with previous experience in Beginner Novice Obedience training OR exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Beginner Novice $\wedge$ Obedience. All exercises in this class will be judged according to AKC specifications except registration of dog is not required. A 6foot leash is required for this class.

## NOVICE OBEDIENCE DIVISION

## CLASS \#514: Novice OBED A

This class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Novice training with no prior experience in Novice Obedience Dog training. Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Novice A for one year. All
exercises in this class will be judged according to AKC specifications except registration of dog is not required. This class includes some off-leash exercises. A 6-foot leash is required for this class.

## CLASS \#515: Novice OBED B

This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Novice A. Handlers with prior Novice experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Novice dog should also enter the B class. This class is open to exhibitors or dogs with previous experience in Novice Obedience training OR exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Norice A Obedience. All exercises in this class will be judged according to AKC specifications except registration of dog is not required. This class includes some off-leash exercises. A 6 foot leash is required for this class.

## GRAD NOVICE OBEDIENCE DIVISION

## CLASS \#516: Pre Graduate Novice A

This class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Pre-Graduate Obedience training with no prior experience in Pre-Graduate Obedience training. Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in PreGraduate Novice A for one year. The exercises in this class have been modified from AKC guidelines to better meet the needs of $4-\mathrm{H}$ youth. See below for an explanation of the Pre-Graduate Novice exercises.

## CLASS \#517: Pre-Graduate Novice B

This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Pre-Graduate Novice A. Handlers with prior Pre-Graduate Novice experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Pre-Graduate Novice dog should also enter the B class. This class is

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open to exhibitors or dogs with previous experience in Pre-Grad Obedience training OR exhibitors
and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Pre-Grad Novice A Obedience. See below for an
explanation of the Pre-Graduate Novice exercises.

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## Explanation of Pre-Graduate Novice A \& B Exercises

Moving Stand and Examination: This exercise is performed off leash. The judge will give the command "forward," at which time the handler will heel forward with his/her dog. After the handler has proceeded forward about ten feet, the judge will give the command "stand your dog." Without pausing, the handler will command and/or signal the dog to stand and the handler will continue forward about 10 to 12 feet and turn and face the dog. The judge will approach the dog from the front, give a novice exam and give the command "return to your dog." The handler will return to his/her dog by going around and behind and back to heel position.
Moving Drop on Recall: The principal feature of this exercise is that the dog heels and executes a prompt response to the handler's command and/or signal to down and remain in the down position until called or signaled to come on command. Orders for the exercise are "Forward," "Down your dog," "Call your dog" and "Finish." The handler will stand with the dog sitting in the heel position at a point designated by the judge, who will then ask, "Are you ready?" and order "Forward." The handler may command or signal his/her dog to heel and will walk briskly and naturally. After he/she has gone about 15 feet, the judge will order "Down your dog." Without pausing, the handler will command and/or signal the dog to down. The handler will continue forward to the end of the ring, turn around and stand in a natural manner facing the dog. On the judge's orders or signals, the handler will command or signal the dog to come and immediately sit in front of the handler until the command to "Finish" is given by the judge.
Recall Over Broad Jump: The principal feature of this exercise is that the dog stays until directed to jump, clears the jump on a single command or signal, and immediately returns to sit in front of the handler. Orders are "Leave your dog," "Call your dog" and "Finish." The handler will stand with his/her dog sitting in the heel position at least eight feet from the jump, facing the lowest end of the lowest hurdle. When the judge orders "Leave your dog," the handler will give the command and/or signal to stay, go at least eight feet beyond the highest edge of the last hurdle, turn, and face the dog as in the Novice recall. On the judge's order, the handler will give the command or signal to jump. The dog must clear the entire distance of the broad jump without touching it and, without any further command or signal, immediately sit in front of the handler until the command to "Finish" is given by the judge.

Class 518- Graduate Novice A is This class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Graduate Novice Obedience training with no prior experience in Graduate Novice Obedience training. Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Graduate Novice A for one year.

Class 519- Graduate Novice B - This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Graduate Novice A. Handlers with prior Graduate Novice experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Graduate Novice dog should also enter the B class. hisclass is open to exhibitors or dogs with previous experience in Graduate Novice Obedience training OR exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Graduate Novice $A$ The youth and dog team may continue to compete in this class even after receiving a qualifying score in Graduate Novice Obedience at a previous State of County Fair or State Dog Trial.

## ADVANCED OBEDIENCE DIVISION

Class \#520 -Open A This class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Open Obedience training with no prior experience in Open Obedience training. Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Open A for one year. All exercises in these classes will be judged according to AKC specifications except registration of dog is not required.

Class \#521-Open B -This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Open A. Handlers with prior Open experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Open dog should also enter the B class. This class is open to exhibitors or dogs with previous experience in Open Obedience training OR exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Open $A$. The youth and dog team may continue to compete in this class, even after receiving a qualifying score in Open Obedience at a previous County Fair or State Dog Trial. Exercise Points

CLASS \#522- Grad Open A This class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Graduate Open

Obedience training with no prior experience in Graduate Open Obedience training. Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Grad Open A for one year. All exercises in these classes will be judged according to AKC specifications except registration of dog is not required.

CLASS \#523- Grad Open B This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Grad Open A. Handlers with prior Grad Open experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Grad Open dog should also enter the B class. This class-is open to experienced handlers in their second or higher year of Grad Open training. The youth and dog teams may continue to compete in this class, even after receiving a qualifying score in Graduate Open Obedience at a previous State of County Fair or State Dog Trial. All exercises in these classes will be judged according to AKC specifications except registration of dog is not required.

CLASS \#524- Utility A This class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Utility Obedience training with no prior experience in Utility Obedience training. Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Utility A for one year. All exercises in these classes will be judged according to AKC specifications except registration of dog is not required.

CLASS \#525- Utility B This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Utility A. Handlers with prior Utility experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Utility dog should also enter the B class. This class is open to exhibitors of dogs with previous experience in Utility Obedience training OR exhibitors and dogs who did not earn aqualifying score in Utility $A$. The youth and dog team may continue to compete in this class for the remainder of their 4-H years, even after receiving a qualifying score in Utility Obedience at a previous State or County Fair or State Dog Trial. All exercises in these classes will be judged according to AKC specifications except registration of dog is not required.

## VETERANS DIVISION - Obedience Classes Only

The Veterans Obedience Division is an optional Division for any dog 7 years old or over who may no
longer be able to jump the standard regulation height due to age, injury, joint issues, comfort, etc. Any dog 7 years or older may be entered in the Veterans Division. It is the choice of the handler, the handler's parent, and the handler's trainer and veterinarian whether to exhibit a dog in a Veteran class. Veteran dogs will compete at the obedience level the handler chooses, from Novice up through Utility. All exercises are the same as for regular obedience classes except for the jump height. Veterans Division dogs will be allowed to jump $1 / 2$ of their regulation jump height. They are required to perform all other exercises as in the regular class; jump height will be the only difference from the regular class. Once a Veteran dog can no longer jump at least $1 / 2$ their regulation jump height they must be moved to a class that does not require jumping. A Veteran dog may change Obedience classes in either direction each year as their health determines. If a dog is entered as a Veteran during a project year, they may go back to regular Obedience classes the following year; however, they must go back to the level they would have been competing at before they moved to Veterans.

The Veterans classes and scoring adjustments are listed below:

Class 526: Novice Veterans: Judge's score
Class 527: Pre-Grad Novice Veterans: Judge's score plus 3 points
Class 528: Grad Novice Veterans: Judge's score plus 6 points
Class 529: Open Veterans: Judge's score plus 9 points
Class 530: Grad Open Veterans: Judge's score plus 12 points
Class 531: Utility Veterans: Judge's score plus 15 points

Dogs entered in the Veterans Division are not eligible to compete for the Overall Obedience or Grand/Reserve Grand Champion awards at County Fair. Veteran dogs will jump 1/2 the required height for their class. Refer to the chart below for the standard High or Bar Jump heights.

## Obedience Jump Information

There are 3 types of jumps that may be used in Obedience classes: the Bar Jump, the High Jump and the Broad Jump. All dogs in regular (non Veterans) Obedience classes must jump their regulation height and width.

For the Broad Jump: The Broad Jump will cover a distance equal to twice the standard height of the High or Bar Jump setting for each dog. Veteran dogs will jump $1 / 2$ the required width for their class and must use the correct number of boards for the width being jumped:
*Four boards are used for widths of 48-72 inches
*Three boards are used for widths of $28-44$ inches
*Two boards are used for widths of 16-24 inches
*One board is used for a width of 8 inches.

## SHOWMANSHIP CLASSES

Dogs under 6 months of age are not eligible to compete in Showmanship classes at County or the State Dog Trials Fair.

Placement in Showmanship classes is based on the exhibitor's age, experience level and achievement at previous State Dog Trials. and the experience level of the handler. The experience level of the dog has no bearing on class placement.

A written test will be given to each exhibitor entered in a Showmanship class. The exhibitor is responsible for taking the test at the designated time. If the exhibitor does not take the test within the designated time, they will receive zero points for that portion of their showmanship score.

Exhibitors should be prepared to answer questions in the ring about the breed of their dog, the AKC group the breed belongs to, and the purpose of the breed or what the breed is used for. In the case of mixed breeds, the exhibitor must decide the breed the dog they are showing most resembles.

All exhibitors will present their dogs on either a table, ramp or on the floor, based on the breed of the dog or the breed the dog is most like. Judges and exhibitors should refer to the current Table and Ramp list to ensure they have up-to-date information. The Table and Ramp list can be found on the AKC Website at: (https://images.akc.org/pdf/judges/table_breeds.pdf) It is mandatory that breeds are shown on a table, ramp, or floor as assigned.

A qualifying score in Showmanship will be 170 points out of the possible 200 points. Class size will be determined by Health Department restrictions in place at the time of the show. During the Showmanship class each area of judging will be evaluated throughout the entire class. The score will reflect the handler's ability to perform these items throughout the class and not just at one time. For example: the dog should be stacked (either hand stacked or free stacked) upon entering the ring,
during the exam, after the pattern, and any time they are in the line-up. The "set-up" score will reflect all these times when the dog is stacked.

## JUNIOR DIVISION

CLASS \#500: Junior Novice This class is for exhibitors who are 8-10 years old as of December 31 of the previous year, are in their 1st year of participation in project Showmanship and with no prior experience with any other dog showing entity.

CLASS \#501: Junior Open - This class is for exhibitors who are 8-10 years old as of December 31 of the previous year with previous experience in Showmanship, either with 4-H or with a national dog association.

## INTERMEDIATE DIVISION

CLASS \#502: Intermediate Novice - This class is for exhibitors who are 11-13 years old as of December 31 of the previous year, are in their 1st year of participation in the project Showmanship, and with no prior experience with any other dog showing entity.

CLASS \#503: Intermediate Open - This class is for exhibitors who are 11-13 years old as of December 31 of the previous year with previous experience in Showmanship, either with 4-H or with a national dog association.

## SENIOR DIVISION

CLASS \#505: Senior Novice - This class is for participants who are 14-18 years old as of December 31 of the previous year, are in their 1st year of participation in the project Showmanship, and with no prior experience with any other dog showing entity.

CLASS \#506: Senior Open - This class is for exhibitors who are 14-18 years old as of December 31 of the previous year with previous experience in Showmanship, either with 4-H or with a national dog association.

## ADVANCED DIVISION

CLASS \#504: Intermediate Advanced - This class is for experienced handlers who are 11-13 years of age as of December 31 of the previous year and who placed 1st through 10th at a previous State Fair Dog Trial with a qualifying score in Intermediate Open Showmanship

CLASS \#507: Senior Advanced - This class is for experienced handlers who are 14-18 years of age as of December 31 of the previous year and who placed 1st through 10th at a previous State Fair Dog Trial with a qualifying score in Senior Open Showmanship.

CLASS \#508: Master Showman - This class is only for Intermediate or Senior handlers who have
placed as Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion Showman at a previous State 4-H Dog Trial. At the judge's discretion, any exhibitor who has qualified to show in the Master Showman class at the State Dog Trials Fair may compete along with the Senior Advanced class at the Boulder County Fair, but will be judged at a higher level (fewer expected errors) than other exhibitors in the Senior Advanced class.

## RALLY OBEDIENCE

All 4-H Rally classes will be patterned after the latest AKC Obedience guidelines whenever possible, except that dog registry with AKC is not required. Some exercises and rules may have been adapted from AKC to better serve the exhibitors of this program. A qualifying score in Rally is 70 out of the 100 possible points.

1. Prior to the start of each class, a 10-to-15-minute walk through (without dogs) is allowed for the handlers to familiarize themselves with the course pattern. Only during this time, handlers may ask the judge to clarify or answer any questions about the Rally signs or the Rally course.
2. The only training equipment allowed in the Rally ring is a slip, chain, flat buckle or clip collar without tags and a nylon or leather leash. No halties, gentle leaders, slip leads, harnesses or pinch collars are allowed.
3. The judge will tell the handler when to begin the Rally course. The dog and handler will proceed at their own pace through a course of designated stations.
4. Unlimited communication from the handler to the dog is encouraged. Multiple commands and/or signals using one or both arms are allowed. Arms and hands do not need to be maintained in any particular position at any time. The handler may not touch the dog or make any physical corrections any time. Exhibitors in the Excellent and higher Rally levels may not pat their legs or clap their hands to encourage their dog. Loud or harsh commands or intimidating signals will be penalized.
5. There should be a sense of teamwork between the handler and the dog.
6. Times will be recorded, but not posted. Times may only be used to break ties.
7. Handlers may enter more than one dog in the same Rally class.
8. In all classes a 15-point deduction will be administered in the Rally classes for the following: strong correcting, disciplining, excessive barking, fouling the ring, consistently tight lead, knocking over a jump, or a sign not attempted by a handler.
9. For the safety of all, a dog that snaps, bites, or attempts to bite will be excused from the ring.
10. Scoresheets can be viewed on the Colorado 4-H website https://co4h.colostate.edu/state-fairinformation/
11. There are no Rally classes for Veteran dogs. All dogs must be able to jump required heights and perform the required items.
12. All jump heights will conform with current (January 2021) AKC Rally height and broad jump recommendations. The standard AKC jump requirements for Rally are as follows:

With the exception of Rally Master and Masters Choice classes, a dog and handler team with any other Rally title from any national dog association (AKC, UKC, CKC, ASCA, etc.) is disqualified from entering the class for which the degree was awarded, or any lower class, except if that title was won less than four months before the State 4-H Dog Trials. Please refer to the Dog Eligibility Rules for more information.
" $A$ " level classes are limited to exhibitors with no prior experience showing a dog in that class. Exhibitors showing a new dog must enter the "B" level if they ever received a qualifying score in that class with any other dog.

## RALLY NOVICE DIVISION

## CLASS \#532: Rally Novice A

This class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Rally Novice training with no prior experience in Rally Novice Dog training. A handler may only compete in Rally Novice A for one year. All exercises are performed on leash. There are no jumps in this class.

## CLASS \#533: Rally Novice B

This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Novice A. Handlers with prior Rally Novice experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Rally Novice dog should also enter the B class. This class is open to exhibitors or dogs with previous experience in Rally Novice training OR exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Novice $A$. All exercises are performed on leash. There are no jumps in this class.

## RALLY INTERMEDIATE DIVISION

## CLASS \#534: Rally Intermediate A

This class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Rally Intermediate training with no prior experience in Rally Intermediate Dog training. A handler may only compete in Rally Intermediate A for one year. All exercises are performed on leash. There are no jumps in this class.

## CLASS \#535: Rally Intermediate B

This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Intermediate A. Handlers with prior Rally Intermediate experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Rally Intermediate dog should also enter the B class. This class is open to exhibitors or dogs with previous experience in Rally Intermediate training OR exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Intermediate $\Lambda$. All exercises are performed on leash. There are no jumps in this class.

## RALLY ADVANCED DIVISION

## CLASS \#536: Rally Advanced A

This class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Rally Advanced training with no prior experience in Rally Advanced Dog training All exercises are performed off leash. Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Rally Advanced A for one year. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. The Advanced Rally course may include one jump.

## CLASS \#537: Rally Advanced B

This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Advanced A. Handlers with prior Rally Advanced experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Rally Advanced dog should also enter the B class. This class is open to exhibitors or dogs with previous experience in Rally Advanced training OR exhibitors and dogs whe did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Advanced $A$. All exercises are performed off leash. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. The Advanced Rally course may include one jump.

## RALLY EXCELLENT DIVISION

## CLASS \#538: Rally Excellent A

This class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Rally Excellent training with no prior experience in Rally Excellent dog training. Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Rally Excellent A for one year. All exercises are performed off leash. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. The Excellent Rally course may include two jumps.

## CLASS \#539: Rally Excellent B

This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Excellent A. Handlers with prior Rally Excellent experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Rally Excellent dog should also enter the B class. This class is open to exhibitors of dogs with previous experience in Rally Excellent training OR exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Excellent $A$. All exercises are performed off leash. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. The Excellent Rally course may include two jumps.

## RALLY RAE DIVISION

## CLASS \#540: Rally Advanced/Excellent A (RAE-A)

This class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Rally Advanced/Excellent training with no prior experience in Rally Advanced/Excellent Dog training. Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Rally Advanced/Excellent A for one year. All exercises are performed off leash. Handlers must receive a qualifying score in BOTH the Rally Advanced course and the Rally Excellent course at the same dog trial in order to receive a qualifying score in RAE.

## CLASS \#541: Rally Advanced/Excellent B (RAE-B)

This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Advanced/Excellent A. Handlers with prior Rally Advanced/Excellent experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Rally Novice Advanced/Excellent dog should also enter the B class. This class is open to exhibitors or dogs with previous experience in Rally

Advanced/Excellent training OR exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Advanced/Excellent A . All exercises are performed off leash. Handlers must receive a qualifying score in BOTH the Rally Advanced course and the Rally Excellent course at the same dog trial in order to receive a qualifying score in RAE. A handler may continue to compete in this class for the until they are ready to advance to the Rally Masters level class.

## RALLY MASTERS DIVISION

## CLASS 542: Masters Rally A

The Masters Rally A class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Rally Masters training with no prior experience in Rally Masters Dog training. Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Masters Rally A for one year. All exercises are performed off leash and courses may have 1 jump. There are no retries for any of the signs on the Rally Master course.

## CLASS 543: Masters Rally B

This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Masters A. Handlers with prior Rally Masters experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Rally Masters dog should also enter the B class. This class is open to exhibitors or dogs with previous experience in Rally Masters training OR exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Masters $\Lambda$. Exhibitor and dog teams may continue to compete in this class for their remaining years in the program regardless of whether they have received a qualifying score or received a Masters Rally title from a national dog association. All exercises are performed off leash and courses may have 1 jump. There are no retries for any of the signs on the Rally Master

CLASS 600: Masters Choice Rally A - This class is the same as the Masters Rally class except there are no jumps. This class is NOT offered at the State Dog Trials and exhibitors who receive a qualifying score in this class are NOT eligible to compete in Masters Rally at the State Dog Trials. The Masters Choice Rally A class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Rally Masters Choice training with no prior experience in Rally Masters Choice Dog training. Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Masters Choice Rally A for one year. All exercises are performed off leash and courses have no jumps. There are no retries for any of the signs on the Rally Masters Choice course.

CLASS 601: Masters Choice Rally B -- This class is the same as the Masters Rally class except there are no jumps. This class is NOT offered at the State Dog Trials and exhibitors who receive a qualifying score in this class are NOT eligible to compete in Masters Rally at the State Dog Trials. This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Masters Choice A. Handlers with prior Rally Masters Choice experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Rally Masters Choice dog should also enter the B class. Exhibitor and dog teams may continue to compete in this class for their remaining years in the program regardless of whether they have received a qualifying score or received a Masters Choice Rally title from a national dog association. All exercises are performed off leash and courses have no jumps. There are no retries for any of the signs on the Rally Master course.

## Class \#544: Team Rally

Team Rally is a non-entry class for the Boulder County Dog Contest. Two teams consisting of 4 members and 4 dogs each will be assembled by the Superintendent to compete in Team Rally at the State Dog TrialsFairin the following manner. The 8 exhibitors with the highest qualifying scores in the Intermediate or higher level Rally classes at County Fair will have the first opportunity to participate in the State Dog TrialsFair Team Rally competition. The exhibitor with the 9th highest score will serve as an alternate team member. If there are not enough qualifiers to complete two teams plus an alternate, the 4-H Dog Superintendent may select exhibitors with previous experience in Intermediate or higher Rally to fill any openings.

## FUN CONTESTS

These contests will be open to all exhibitors and will be held after completion of the regular classes. Dogs must have been entered in the County Fair Dog Show to compete. No pre-entry is required for these contests; sign up is during check-in.

Agility Fun Run - An Agility Team will consist of 5 dogs and handlers. All exhibitors will have an opportunity to complete two Agility Fun Runs to have fun with their pups! be given an opportunity to familiarize themselves with the course and obstacles prior to the competition. Obstacles may include a tunnel, jumps, pause table, tire jump and dog walk. Dogs and handlers will navigate the agility course individually. Treats will be allowed on the course. Time will start when the judge gives the first member of the team the "Forward" command. All members will run the course individually. The next member on the team will start when the previous member crosses the finish line. Each team will receive a cumulative time. One point will be awarded for each correctly completed obstacle. The team with the highest point score wins the competition. In the event of a tie, the cumulative time will serve as the tie breaker, with the fastest time winning.

Costume Contest - This optional contest will consist of dogs in costume. Costumes can include the handler and can be funny, serious, educational, etc. Contestants will be judged based on creativity. Prizes will be awarded to $1^{\text {st }}$ through $5^{\text {th }}$ place winners.

Best Trick Contest - This optional contest will consist of the exhibitor showing their dog's best trick or task. The contest will be judged based on originality \& and degree of difficulty. Prizes will be awarded to $1^{\text {st }}$ through $5^{\text {th }}$ place winners.

## DOG AGILITY CONTEST RULES

The Boulder County Fair Dog Agility Contest will follow all equipment, safety and procedural requirements in the State 4-H Dog Agility Rules. These Rules may be found at https://co4h.colostate.edu/statefair/StateFairContestReq-Cat-Dog.pdf beginning on page 19.
These Rules are in addition to, and do not supersede or negate, the Boulder County Fair General Rules, General Exhibitor Rules or the Junior Dog Contest Rules.

## General Agility Rules:

1. Dogs must be a minimum of 12 months old to compete in the Pre-Foundation and Foundation Jumpers classes. Dogs must be a minimum of 15 months old to compete in all other Jumpers agility classes.
2. The Pre-Foundation class is a no-score, non-regular class that is performed ON LEASH. All other Agility dogs will perform off-leash and must be under control off-leash in order to compete in the regular Agility Contest. Regular Agility dogs and handlers must pass an Off-Leash Heeling Pre-Test prior to participating in the Contest. Dogs must always be on a leash outside the ring except when performing exercises off leash at the warm-up area in Agility.
3. No dog may participate with a physical or mental condition that would significantly impair their performance.may participate. Some examples of these include (but are not limited to) hip dysplasia, disc problems, severely slipped stifles, shoulder problems, overweight, or advancing age. A judge, Dog Superintendent or County 4-H dog agility trainer will have the authority to stop the performance of any dog whose soundness is in question.
4. Dogs that show signs of aggression toward humans or other dogs will not be permitted to participate.
5. Female dogs in season are not permitted to compete. participate.
6. Handlers may not touch their dogs or an obstacle while running the course. Incidental contact that does not aid the dog on the course will not be penalized.
7. Poor sportsmanship will not be tolerated. Any handler exhibiting poor sportsmanship such as swearing, yelling at their dog, striking the dog, pulling on their dog's fur or body parts, excessive corrections, loud complaints about other exhibitors or the judge, etc., will be eliminated.
8. The judge will penalize any handler receiving outside assistance.
9. A dog unable to complete the course for any reason including leaving the ring and not immediately returning in control of to the handler or ceasing to work for a significant period of time will receive an elimination.
10. Handlers may use voice commands, signals, or both. Handlers are encouraged to talk or cheer their dogs through the course. There is no penalty for multiple commands or verbal encouragement, but all must be in the spirit of good sportsmanship.
11. Any dog fouling the ring during competition will be asked to leave the ring - receiving a disqualification.
12. Course walk through will be 5-7 minutes which is done without dogs. A 2-minute warning will be provided so the first handler can get their dog during the walking of the course. Judges will have discretion whether or not to allow additional walk through times.
13. Training aids and treats are not permitted on the course at a trial.
14. In all regular Agility classes, collars must be a flat buckle or rolled leather collar, with no attachments except for a 4 " -6 " tab (optional in Foundation and Novice, not allowed in Advanced and Intermediate). Pinch/prong and electrical collars, head halters and special training collars are not allowed.
15. Dogs may be brought to the start line on slip leads, slip chains, body harnesses or other collars.
16. Handlers may not jump over the jumps with their dogs.

## AGILITY WAIVER

All parents/guardians and members must sign the "4-H Dog Agility Release Form" about injury to dog and handler to participate in classes, shows, and demonstrations. The Waiver can be found at https://co4h.colostate.edu/statefair/Dog-Agility-Waiver.pdf

## HEIGHT CARDS

All handlers must possess an official Colorado State 4-H Dog Project Agility Height Card for the dog entered in the competition, signed by the measuring authority. Note that two separate measurements and two signatures are required. Official height cards from outside agility venues will also be accepted. Dogs may be measured by judge or show personnel at the State Agility Competition to receive a height card. ## OFF-LEASH HEELING PRE-TEST

Since all regular Agility classes are performed off-leash, it is important that ALL dog/handler teams demonstrate control prior to competition. In order to determine that your dog is under control, an Off-Leash Heeling Pre-Test will be given to ALL dog/handler teams entered in the Jumpers classes. If you fail this Pre-Test, you will not be allowed to compete. This Pre-Test does not require perfect heeling, but will evaluate overall off-leash control of the dog.

## VETERAN CLASSES

Dogs 7 years of age and older are eligible to compete in the Veterans classes. Additionally, dogs with minor physical disabilities (such as minor hip dysplasia) may compete in this level with a veterinarian's approval and provided documentation. Dogs competing in the Veteran class will jump at a lower jump height (Preferred Jump Height).

## AGILITY AWARDS

A perfect score is 100 points and is called a "Clean Run". All scores 70 and above are considered qualifying and are eligible for placement awards.

1. Each dog and handler team competing in the Agility Contest will be allowed three runs and the single highest score will be used to determine award placement.
2. Ribbons will be awarded to the 1st -5 th place exhibitors in each of the regular Agility classes. No placement awards will be awarded for non-qualifying scores.
3. One Champion and one Reserve Champion rosette ribbon will be awarded in all regular Agility classes. If there is a tie between two exhibitors for Champion or Reserve Champion, the tiebreaker procedure described in the State Agility Rules will be used. and the team with the tow Win. Because taller dogs generally have a speed advantage over smaller dogs, the State Agility Rules
provide that ties will be broken by subtracting the Actual Course Time (CT from the Maximum Course Time (MCT). This procedure gives an equalized time difference to more fairly break ties between classes and jump heights. The larger (positive) difference will win the tie.

## CLASS DESCRIPTIONS

## CLASS 603: Pre-Foundation Jumpers without Weaves <br> (Regular \& Veteran class)

This class is open to dog and handler teams in Beginner Novice Dog Obedience or higher level training who are not ready for regular agility classes. This will be a NO SCORE CLASS. This class is NOT available at the State 4-H Dog Trials. All Dogs must be shown on leash. The use of an approved collar and tab is optional. Each participant will be allowed two runs through the course and will receive a special ribbon.

The Pre-Foundation class will be a simple course with a basic " S ", or " U " shape consisting of 8 to 10 obstacles.

- Bar Jumps (Winged or Wingless) (5 to 9) (required)
- Open Tunnel (1 to 3) (required)


## Class \#557: Foundation - Jumpers Without Weaves

This Foundation level class is recommended open to for participants of dogs and handlers in their first year of Agility training. Participants may also choose to enter a higher level Agility class in their first year provided they pass the Heeling Pre-Test. Dogs competing in the Foundation class may jump a lower jump height (Preferred Jump Height).
The Foundation level course will be a simple course with a basic " $S$ ", or " $U$ " shape and will consist of 8-10 obstacles. The following obstacles are used:

- Bar jumps (winged or wingless) (5-9) (required)
- Open Tunnel (1 to 3) (required)

Time will be used to break ties for Champion and Reserve Champion awards.
All dogs must be shown off leash. The use of an approved collar and tab is optional.

## Class \#558- Novice - Jumpers without Weaves - Regular Class \#559 - Novice Jumpers Without Weaves - Veteran

The Novice level classes are recommended for participants and dogs with some prior Agility experience, however, experience is not required. All dogs entered in these classes must pass the required Heeling Pre-Test. Dogs competing in the Veteran class will jump at a lower jump height (Preferred Jump Height). The Novice level course will be a simple course. Angles between obstacles should not exceed 90 degrees. Entrances to obstacles should never be adjacent to one another. The course is to consist of 10 to 14 obstacles. The following obstacles are used:

- Bar Jumps (winged or wingless) (6-11) (required)
- Open Tunnel (1 to 3) (required)
- Broad Jump (optional)

Time will be used to break ties for Champion and Reserve Champion awards.
All dogs must be shown off leash. The use of an approved collar and tab is optional.

## Class \#560 - Intermediate - Jumpers Without Weaves - Regular <br> Class \#561 - Intermediate - Jumpers Without Weaves - Veteran

The Intermediate level classes are recommended for participants and dogs with some prior Agility experience, however, experience is not required. All dogs entered in these classes must pass the required Heeling Pre-Test. Dogs competing in the Veteran class will jump at a lower jump height (Preferred Jump Height). The Intermediate level course is to consist of 14 to 16 obstacles. The following obstacles are used:

- Bar Jumps (winged or wingless) (7-13) (required)
- Open Tunnel (1 to 3) (required)
- Broad Jump (1) OR Double Jump (1) (required)
- $\quad$ Tire Jump (1) (optional)

Time will be used to break ties for Champion and Reserve Champion awards. All dogs must be shown off leash. The use of an approved collar is optional.

Class 562 and 563 will not be offered in Boulder County at this time.

## Class \#562-Advanced-Jumpers Without Weaves - Regular

Class \#563-Advanced-Jumpers Without Weaves - Veteran
The Advanced level classes are recommended for participants and dogs with some prior Agility experience, however, experience is not required. Alldogs entered in these classes must pass the required Heeling Pre-Test. Dogs competing in the Veteran class will jump at a lower jump height (Preferred Jump Height). The Advanced level course is to consist of 16 to 18 obstacles. The following obstacles are used:

- Bar Jumps (winged or wingless) (9-16) (required)
- Double Bar Jump (required)
- Triple Bar Jump (required)
- OpenTunnel (1 to-3) (required)
- Broad jump (optional)
- Tire Jump (optional)

Time will be used to break ties for Champion and Reserve Champion awards.
All dogs must be shown off leash. The use of an approved collar is optional.
