4-H & FFA Livestock Shows

The Boulder County Fair's mission is to celebrate both rural and urban heritage while cultivating an innovative future through education and leadership. With a tradition of showcasing the accomplishments and leadership of both 4-H and FFA youth and community members, we provide educational and entertaining opportunities for all attendees, meeting the interests and challenges of a changing world.

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GENERAL INFORMATION AND RULES

Cooperation – The Boulder County Fair Livestock Show and Rodeo is held in cooperation with the Boulder County Board of Commissioners, the Boulder County Fair Board, and the Boulder County Office of Colorado State University Extension. The Boulder County Fair, Livestock Show and Rodeo does not discriminate based on race, color, sex, religion, age, disability, sexual preference, veteran or marital status, or national origin in its policies and activities.

Responsibility - The Boulder County Fair, Livestock Show & Rodeo (BCF) Management will use all possible care to ensure the safety of animals, exhibits, exhibitors, and people attending the fair. The BCF Management or any individual assisting with the fair, will in no case be responsible for any loss or damage done to, occasioned by, or arising from any animal, or article on exhibition, or for any accident or injury to any person exhibiting, assisting with, or attending the fair. The exhibitors shall indemnify the Fair Management against all legal or other proceeding in regard hereto. The placing of any exhibits on the show grounds by all exhibitors shall signify his/her agreement to abide by this rule.

FAIRGROUND RULES

1. Alcohol/Drug Restrictions – Pursuant to Colorado Statue 12-47-901(1)(h)(I), it is illegal to bring **any** outside alcoholic beverages into the BCF, including parking lots. Alcoholic beverages not purchased on the premises will be confiscated immediately and may result in fines and/or ejection from the premises. The presence or use of alcoholic beverages on the fairgrounds is prohibited except in designated areas.

Illegal drugs of any kind, including marijuana, are prohibited from the BCF, including parking lots. Any illegal drugs, including marijuana, will be confiscated and may result in fines and/or ejection from the premises.

2. Disorderly Conduct, Illegal Activity, Vandalism & Horseplay will not be tolerated. Violators will be escorted from the fairgrounds by security and may be prosecuted. No person shall engage in foul, obscene or abusive language or actions.

3. Motorized Vehicles - ATV's and golf carts will not be permitted without prior written permission from the BCF Board. Use of carts is restricted in the areas of the midway or in pedestrian travel areas during BCF hours of operation.

4. **Leash Law: Boulder County and the City of Longmont require all dogs to be always on a leash on public property. For the safety of animals and people, dogs are not allowed in the poultry, rabbit, goat, or sheep areas and the indoor arena during horse events.**

5. Unauthorized carrying or discharging firearms or weapons of any kind is not permitted. Unauthorized paintball, BB, pellet, air, blowguns, rocket slingshots, crossbows, martial arts weapons, fireworks, and explosives are not allowed during the Fair.

6. Smoking is not permitted in county facilities or on county property and therefore adhered to by BCF.

7. Parking is not permitted in assigned fire lanes or where otherwise posted "No Parking." Violators may be ticketed and/or towed at owner's expense.

8. Camping is permitted only at the campgrounds. Dry camping ("exhibitors/spectators camping outside the campgrounds") will only be allowed when the campground is full or when prior approval is obtained from the Fair Board.

EXHIBITOR GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

ENTRIES

1. Eligibility - Competition is open to all. 4-H and FFA Exhibitors must belong to a Boulder County 4-H or FFA Club.
2. Entries – **Prior entry is required in all departments. Entries open after May 15.**

JUDGING

1. Judges will not award prizes to an unworthy exhibit. It is the intention of the department that no premium or distinction of any kind shall be given to any animal or article that is not deserving. This rule must be strictly adhered to whether there is competition or not. Exhibits that do not meet size requirements will not be considered for Champion or Reserve Champion.
2. Judges shall report to the superintendent any exhibitors who in any way, whether in person or by agents, parents or others servants, interfere with them during the adjudication or show any disrespect to them, whereupon **the superintendent shall at his/her discretion demand a proper apology from such exhibitor, or exclude exhibitors from further competition, and the board may withhold from such exhibitors any premiums that have been awarded them, and expel them from further exhibiting at the fair.**
3. The decision of the awarding judges shall be final, and no appeal will be considered.
4. Any exhibitor attempting to interfere with the judges during their adjudication will be promptly excluded from the competition.
5. In all cases not covered by these rules, the ruling of the superintendent of the department will apply.
6. The judge and superintendent of the department shall sign each award book immediately after all awards have been made in the class contained therein.
7. No person shall act as judge in any class in which he/she may be interested as a relative, agent, or employee of an exhibitor or otherwise; and if such case shall be presented, the superintendent of department may remove such interested judge, or substitute another judge temporarily.
8. The awards of such premiums at the show will be confined to entries named in the department.
9. The judge and the person acting as clerk to the judge must take special pains after making an award to see that it is properly entered in the award book.
10. The clerk at each show verifies the accuracy of the judge's book between pre-entries and actual entrants. The superintendent signs the book before premium money is awarded.
11. Persons with disabilities have the right to request and receive reasonable accommodation. If any youth need additional assistance during exhibiting at the Boulder County Fair, please contact the fair office and department superintendent in writing ahead of time so reasonable accommodations can be made. We request accommodation requests be made 2 weeks prior to the event at minimum. Day of event/show accommodations will be adjusted as needed with the understanding there will be limitations.

GRIEVANCES, PROTESTS AND APPEALS

1. APPEAL: An “Appeal” may be filed by 4-H/FFA and open class exhibitors to get clarifications regarding rules, policies, and judging procedures. The Division Superintendent or the entity (example the Junior Livestock Sale Committee, Horse Leaders Council, Livestock Advisory) would be responsible, as appropriate to handle all appeals, and the Fair Board will be copied on those communications.
 - a. Division Superintendent in consultation with the 4-H Extension Agent will address all appeals as appropriate for their respective department.
 - b. If the Superintendent and Extension Agent do not have a clear response, it will go to the respective advisory council for their advice on the appeal. Example a dairy goat question would go to the Livestock advisory board for their advice. Horse questions would go to the Horse Leaders Council for their advice.
 - c. The respective entity will share the rule interpretation with the fair board prior to releasing their decision.
 - d. The Fair Board will be copied on those communications back to the appeal person.
 - e. In the event an individual is not satisfied with the appeal, the exhibitor may choose to file a “Protest.”
2. PROTEST: If a protest is filed by 4-H/FFA members, open class exhibitor(s), or other individual(s); the following procedure will be followed. A “Protest Request” must be submitted in writing to the Boulder County Fair, Livestock Show & Rodeo (BCF) Manager’s Office. A fee of \$150.00 in cash or certified check must accompany the protest form. The protest shall plainly state the cause of the protest and shall be delivered to the Fair Manager’s office prior to judging or within 1 (one) hour after the conclusion of the class judging. Judging will not be interrupted by a protest and judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation. Once the championship judging begins, no protest will be accepted. The protest committee made up of the division superintendent and two fair board representatives will meet and act upon the filed protest. A decision will be given to the individual filing the protest within 24 hours of receiving the filed protest unless a thorough investigation by the protest committee takes longer, in which case the individual filing the protest will be notified. The fee(s) imposed above shall be refunded if the matter is resolved in favor of the person bringing the protest appeal.
3. PROTEST APPEAL COMMITTEE: In the event an individual is not satisfied with the protest ruling by the protest committee, the exhibitor may appeal the protest resolution to the Protest Appeals Committee. This committee is made up of the Fair Board Executive Committee. A fee of \$200.00 in cash or certified check must accompany the Protest Appeal which shall be in writing, and delivered to the Boulder County Fair, Livestock Show & Rodeo (BCF) Management Office. The appeal shall plainly state the protest matter being appealed and shall be delivered to the Fair Management Office not more than 8 (eight) hours after the protest resolution was announced. The decision of the Protest Appeals Committee is final. Compliance with the protest and appeal process is mandatory prior to seeking review in any other forum. The fee(s) imposed above shall be refunded if the matter is resolved in favor of the person bringing the protest appeal.
4. In addition to the fee(s) imposed for the process, an individual protesting that the use of illegal drugs were administered to an animal and ask for testing be administered will stand the cost of the testing if no residuals are identified. Often such tests can cost over

\$1,000.00 for each substance chemical checked. If illegal substances are found the cost of the test will be charged against the exhibitor along with the other consequences under general rules number six under animal treatment "Alteration of Conformation and Structure, Prohibited Substances or Unethical Fitting".

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EXHIBIT RELEASE

1. **No exhibit shall be released until their designated release time.** All exhibits in the Exhibit Building must be picked up between 4:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. The Fair management won't be responsible for exhibits left after exhibit release. Removal of any exhibit before the designated time will cause the forfeiture of award money.
2. **Livestock-** Livestock must be removed from the fairgrounds during the designated release times. Most animal release will be Sunday morning 7:00-11:00 a.m. Members are expected to take animals home and return to the fairgrounds to help clean stalls, show ring and barns to be complete by 6:00 p.m. Please refer to your species department for specific release times.
3. **Prior to release times-** No tack may be removed unless in coordination with the department supervisor and it does not disrupt any other event or show.
4. **Livestock Sale Animals Release-** The release of the livestock sale animals varies each year due to transportation and packer schedules. Water, feed for the following day, and bedding is to stay in place for remaining livestock after the conclusion of the livestock sale. If a sale animals stays overnight, all items must be picked up and stalls cleaned by noon the following Monday.
5. **Animals will be released only during each department's designated release time. See specific departments for the release time.** Livestock sold in the Jr. Market Livestock Sale and released by the Jr. Market Livestock Committee President are exempt. Birds sold in the Poultry Sale are exempt and will be released at the time of sale.
 - a. Release will be permitted by the Department Superintendent after review of stalls, pens, cages, and tie racks. These areas must be cleaned to the satisfaction of the superintendent and fairgrounds staff.
 - b. Failure to comply with this requirement may bar said exhibitor from future participation and/or any premiums, which may have been awarded.

4-H/FFA JUNIOR EXHIBIT RULES

EXHIBITOR ELIGIBILITY

1. Only members in good standing and actively enrolled in Boulder County 4-H, St. Vrain Valley FFA, or Boulder Valley FFA, and who have carried out and completed all required project work to date, are eligible to exhibit and show in 4-H/FFA Junior Fair classes.
2. Age Limits: To compete, 4-H members must have turned 8 before December 31st of the current year and be less than 19 as of December 31st of the current year. St. Vrain FFA members must follow FFA age requirement guidelines and follow all FFA requirements. To compete, FFA members

must be eligible for and enrolled in St. Vrain Valley FFA during the school year ending in May of the current year AND be less than 19 as of December 31st of the current year.

3. Cloverbud: Cloverbud 4-H members (ages 5–7) may exhibit in areas specifically created for them at the fair. They may be recognized for their participation, but not awarded placement ribbons or premiums. Cloverbuds may not participate in competitive events. All proposed exhibits for Cloverbud 4-H members must be approved by the Extension Office before they can be labeled for Cloverbud participation. Cloverbud members may not sell in the Junior Market Livestock Sale.

EXHIBIT ELIGIBILITY

1. Ownership. All Junior Livestock entries must be the property of, and be shown by, the eligible exhibitor. All animals shown must have been fed and cared for by the 4-H member or FFA student exhibiting in their regularly conducted project. Crops and gardens exhibits must have been taken from a field or garden grown by and the property of the exhibitor. Ownership of animals must be in the 4-H club member or FFA exhibitor's individual name prior to the Last Thursday of April of the year exhibited, except for market projects which must be owned by market nomination for each species, and except the Lease-An-Animal exhibitors which have a signed lease contract in the Extension Office. *Please note the rule on kid goats born after the last Thursday in April that can be found in the goat department rules.*

JUNIOR EXHIBITOR LIVESTOCK AND ANIMAL DIVISION RULES

“Livestock” – refers to the following species: beef, dairy, goat, poultry, rabbit, cavy, sheep, and swine.

ANIMAL TREATMENT

1. The Boulder County Fair, (BCF) is organized and operated exclusively for educational purposes, and sponsors, produces and presents exhibitions of livestock, livestock products and the like for children, adults, and the public. These exhibitions educate the livestock industry, participants of the BCF, general public in better breeding, feeding and care of livestock. BCF arranges for the judging and presentation of premiums and prizes, and the like, in continuation of such exhibitions and/or shows.
2. COLORADO REVISED STATUTES: All exhibitors further agree to abide by all the rules of the Colorado Revised Statutes regarding livestock shows, exhibitions, and sales. In particular, Section 18-9-207 as it refers to the tampering, drugging, and misrepresentation of animals.
3. The Boulder County Fair and 4-H program adheres to the International Association of Fairs and Expositions (IAFE) National Code of Show Ring Ethics. Each Livestock exhibitor indicates by turning in entries that they have read the code and will abide by these guidelines.

IAFE NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall always deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the “IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics”, fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- a. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- b. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- c. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- d. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the

animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates in the animals entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

- e. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except the external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- f. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- g. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- h. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- i. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether he or she was instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- j. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an

animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.

- k. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

4. The superintendent of each department and the official animal rights spokesperson for the fair, if in agreement, have the authority to disqualify exhibitors for inhumane treatment of animals at the Boulder County Fair, Livestock Show & Rodeo (BCF).

5. Inhumane Treatment of Animals. Abuse of animal(s) in any form will not be allowed. No electric prods will be allowed to be used on any animal at any time. Any violation of this rule will result in immediate disqualification with no recourse.
6. Alteration of Conformation and Structure by Prohibited Substance or Unethical Fitting. Prohibited Substance and/or Unethical Fitting defined as: The injection of internal or external administration of any product or material, whether gas, solid, or liquid, to an animal for the purpose of enhancing or transforming the true conformation, configuration, color, breed, condition or age or by making the animal appear more sound than otherwise would appear; the administration, use or application of any drug or feed additive affecting the central nervous system; the administration of diuretics for cosmetic purposes, tissue manipulation, removal, surgical attachment or otherwise to change, conceal, enhance, or transform the true conformation or configuration of the animal; attaching to the hide foreign objects including hair or hair substitutes, cloth or fiber for the purpose of deception. Any physical or physiological attempt to alter the natural musculature or weight by use of injections or ingested material not conducive to the continued health or marketability of bovine, sheep, or swine carcasses or for deception. Violation of this rule will result in disqualification with no recourse and be subject to other sanctions; and the use of artificial tail head, tail fin, poll, use of hair or hair-like substance, cloth or fiber, ineligible age, illegal substitution of animal(s), violates these rules and will result in immediate disqualification with no recourse. Every participant in consideration of their entry being accepted by BCF specifically represents that no animal entered therein by the participant is misrepresented in any way, except for trimming feet or blocking of hair. Every participant agrees to submit the entry for any inspection deemed appropriate by BCF, and further specifically agrees that the conclusion reached by BCF as to whether such animal(s) is in violation of prohibited substance and/or unethical fitting practice shall be final and conclusive without recourse against BCF. Every participant, by entering the animals for exhibition, thereby releases BCF from all claims or demands whatsoever arising from any cause or happening in connection with the inspection of any such animal(s) or any ruling or action taken by reason of the conclusion by BCF under terms of this rule.
7. Consequences for Alteration of Conformation and Structure by Prohibited Substance or Unethical Fitting. In the event any such animal(s) is declared to be in violation of prohibited substance or unethical fitting as aforesaid, BCF may disqualify and impose such penalties in addition to those

other penalties prescribed by law.

- a. Permanently bar such animal(s) from competition at the BCF;
 - b. May bar the participant from entering such animal(s), the participant's family representative or agents or any or all of them from any further participation in the BCF;
 - c. Submit name and address of participant and action taken against participant to other cooperating Livestock Exhibitions, Shows and Sales affecting eligibility;
 - d. Release to the media such actions;
 - e. In the event any award(s), banner(s), premium(s), prize(s), ribbon(s), and/or trophy(s) shall have been awarded by BCF Sponsor(s) to animal(s) exhibited in violation of these rules, the participant of such animal(s) will, upon demand of BCF, immediately return to BCF all award(s), banner(s), premium(s), prize(s), ribbon(s) and/or trophy(s) awarded to such disqualified animal(s);
 - f. Participant will be liable to BCF and shall indemnify and hold BCF harmless from all damages, including but not limited to all expenses and costs for blood, tissue, urine, hide and/or carcass sampling and testing. BCF management labor and expense(s), consultant legal and court cost(s) incurred as a result of violations of BCF rules and regulations.
8. Conduct. Any false representation, interference, or unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of any participant will be dealt with by BCF according to the equities of the case. If any participant interferes in any way with the judges or shows disrespect to them, or to the show, the BCF may withhold from such participant any premium monies that may have been awarded or take any other steps deemed desirable.
9. Prohibited Substance, Drug Testing, Sabotage, Tampering, Inhumane Treatment. BCF reserves the right to question the alteration of any animal's physical or physiological structure. As a condition of participation in the BCF, participant agrees to submit to BCF, at their discretion, any animal so entered for immediate testing. Test(s) may include, but not be limited to blood, tissue, and urine. Participant(s) further agree that the conclusions reached by BCF shall be final, without recourse against BCF.
10. Lesions, Fungus, and Disease. Any animal that exhibits visible signs of dermatitis, lesions, and/or fungus (ringworm), will immediately be removed from BCF grounds.

FITTING AND GROOMING OF ANIMALS

1. Junior Livestock entries must be cared for by the Junior Exhibitors of this show. Junior exhibitors are expected to have prepared their own project animal for exhibition. Junior exhibitors may receive mentoring and assistance, providing they are in attendance and participating at all times when assistance is given.
2. Exhibitor Statement: "The superintendents ask for your cooperation in minimizing the use of adult assistance in preparing animals for show at the fair. We understand the younger exhibitors will probably need some assistance. Helping an exhibitor in such a way that he/she is learning the techniques of properly preparing an exhibit is an important part of the total project experience. When an adult lends this assistance to the process, then it becomes a contest among adults, and we have lost the teaching and learning aspect of junior exhibits. Since this is a Junior Show, the goal of the superintendents is to direct the fair in such a way that it is a positive learning experience for our young exhibitors."
3. Boulder County requires that only Boulder County 4-H or St. Vrain Valley and Boulder Valley FFA

members enrolled in the Boulder County 4-H & FFA programs can help each other. In addition, their own immediate parents, stepparents, brothers, sisters or half-brothers or half-sisters, or legal guardian, living under the same roof, may assist the Boulder County 4-H or FFA youth with fitting, caring for and/or handling junior livestock that is deemed necessary by the head superintendent of that species. Superintendents have the responsibility to determine that said help and/or assistance is educational/demonstrational and youth is present if and when the adult is assisting with the livestock exhibit.

4. The species superintendent has the right to disqualify a junior exhibitor for infraction and abuse of this rule. Any exception/modification to this rule must be approved by the species superintendent ahead of time.
5. Should multiple exhibit and/or multiple specie conflicts occur, prohibiting the Junior Exhibitor from being present for a period of time, it is the responsibility of the Junior Exhibitor to notify the 4-H Staff or the Superintendent of the conflict, prior to the occurrence.
6. Failure to follow fitting rules may result in ineligibility to show or sale livestock at the Boulder County Fair.
7. Warnings. Under Colorado Law, it is a crime to sabotage or tamper with, administer growth stimulation drug(s) to substitute unauthorized animal(s) for exhibition livestock, pursuant to Section 18-9-207, Colorado Revised Statutes. Penalties include up to eighteen (18) months in prison or a fine up to one hundred thousand (\$100,000.00) dollars and the name and photograph of any convicted person(s) to be made available for publication in newspapers and trade journals. Under Colorado Law, a llama professional is not liable for an injury to or the death of a participant in llama activities resulting from the inherent risks of llama activities, pursuant to Section 13-21-119, Colorado Horse Statutes.
8. If drug or other chemical residues are found in tissue of carcasses of animals sold through sale or sales connected with the Boulder County Fair, said show and the Boulder County Fair Junior Market Livestock Sale Committee will not be liable or responsible for condition of carcass or sale price of animal. Exhibitor forfeits all rights to the sale price.
9. The Boulder County Fair and Boulder County Quality Animal Program endorse and support the USDA Wholesome Meat Act, the Meat Quality Assurance Program and insist exhibitors are in compliance. Exhibitors of all market animals (beef, dairy, goats, poultry, rabbits, sheep, swine) must certify their compliance with manufacturer's pre-market withdrawal periods specified for all medications, drugs, pesticides, or feed additives administered. The use of any non-approved chemical or improper use of approved chemicals is strictly prohibited.
10. **A completed and signed Certificate of Statement of Disclosure (USDA Wholesome Meat Act form) will be required at the time of weigh-in at the Fair.** The certificate must be signed by a parent, junior exhibitor and the Boulder County 4-H/ St Vrain Valley FFA leader and must be turned in to the Superintendent at the time of weigh-in. No junior market animal will be allowed to show without this certification form properly filled out and signed. If drug or other chemical residues are found in tissue or carcasses of animals at time of or following slaughter, or if there is any evidence of tampering, the exhibitor forfeits all rights to the sale price.
11. **If a carcass is condemned for any reason, including illicit drug use and/or non-compliance of drug withdrawal times, the exhibitor will receive no payment.** The Boulder County Fair also endorses and supports the use of sound management practices in the care and feeding of all project animals. All exhibitors of Dairy, Dairy Goat, Sheep, Beef, Swine, Poultry, Cavy, and Rabbit

project animals must submit a “Certification and Statement of Disclosure” form at time of weigh in. A complete copy of the “Wholesome Meat Animal Assurance” program is available from the Extension Office.

FEED AND CARE:

1. All Junior exhibitors in whose name the entered animal is owned, and entry accepted and acknowledged, are responsible for the custody, care and feeding of their animal(s).
2. Exhibitors must furnish their own feed, feeding equipment, and bedding and must care for their own animals and exhibits. Water hoses will not be furnished at the wash racks. Exhibitors are asked to bring their own hoses.
3. Stalls and alleyways must be always kept clean. Stalls and pens must be cleaned each day and all refuse matter disposed of properly – as directed by one of the Livestock Team members.
4. Exhibitors must feed, water and bed, and otherwise care for the entries during the Fair. Exhibitors are expected to help keep exhibit areas, grooming areas, and barn perimeters clean and attractive. All animals and other exhibits should be always kept clean and in a presentable condition. The Head Superintendent for each Livestock Department and the 4-H Livestock Extension Agent reserve the right to feed and water neglected animals. Any animal found in neglect of feed, water, and/or care may be dismissed from the grounds and the exhibitor may be scratched in all entered classes with all premiums and awards forfeited.
5. Failure to observe feed and care rules may result in forfeiting premium money, immediate dismissal from the Fair, and may result in ineligibility to show the following year.
6. Barn A & B pen areas will be closed daily, to the public and exhibitors, from 9:30 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. Barn A building will also be closed from 9 p.m. to 7:30 a.m. This is being done for the safety, and welfare of the livestock, and exhibitors while at the fair.

HEALTH REGULATIONS:

1. All animals to show or exhibit must be present at their appropriate animal health inspection times (if provided by that department) before being allowed into barns or stalls/pens. See individual departments for Animal Health Inspection time. **There is no charge for animal health inspections.**
2. Any livestock originating from a premise under quarantine for any disease will be barred from entry.
3. All exhibitors who have entered any of the Jr. Livestock shows agree to submit their animal for exam and/or testing that is deemed appropriate by the Boulder County Fair officials, Extension Agents, or State Animal Health Officials.
4. Random exams, testing, and sampling may be done at any time, providing it does not interfere with a livestock show for that particular animal in which the exhibitor has made entry. Owners will be informed prior to any exams, tests, or sampling that is done.
5. Veterinarians will inspect Junior Livestock entries at animal health inspections and monitor the general health of animals daily during the fair for visible signs of infection or contagious diseases. Entries found to be showing signs of an infectious or contagious disease may not be allowed to show and may be sent home. The Fair Veterinarian’s decision will be final. If an animal presents signs of illness after the judging has been completed, the premiums will still be paid and awarded.
6. The superintendent in charge has the right to call for the services of a veterinarian in the treatment of a sick animal if the exhibitor is not available. **Any veterinary fees are the responsibility of the exhibitor.**

7. Only a licensed practicing veterinarian, with a livestock superintendent or owner/exhibitor present, may administer antibiotics and or sulfonamides to any animal, including tubing an animal for bloating, while it is on the fairground's property.
8. Veterinarian Needs: The exhibitor should contact their own veterinarian should the need arise.

EXHIBITOR ELIGIBILITY

1. Meat Quality Assurance Training - Each exhibitor entering a livestock project (excluding horse, cat, cavy, and dog) is required to complete training and be in compliance of the Colorado State University Youth Meat Quality Assurance (MQA) program, as conducted by Extension or Agricultural Education Instructors.
 - a. Junior exhibitors must complete MQA training prior to the first time they exhibit a livestock project and repeat the training the year following their 14th birthday. Check with the Extension Office for MQA training dates and locations.
 - b. **A parent/guardian signature is required on the acceptance form that is completed at the beginning of the training and a completed test sheet must be turned in at the end.**
 - c. Deadline for taking the MQA program is 45 days prior to the first day of the Boulder County Fair.
 - d. Failure to complete this requirement will exclude the project member from showing and/or selling at the Boulder County Fair.
2. Record Books - **All members who exhibit animal projects (dog, horse, and livestock) at the Boulder County Fair or State or National Shows (Ex: Colorado State Fair, National Western Stock Show, etc.) must turn in a completed record book for that species to be eligible to exhibit that species in next year's fair. Completed 4-H record books for each species and project exhibited must be submitted to the Boulder County Extension Office no later than the second Thursday in September and completed FFA record books must be submitted to the FFA Advisor by the last Friday in September.**
 - a. Final 4-H record books will need to be in a prong-like record book cover. No three-ring binders. 4-H branded record book covers are available at the Extension Office while supplies last. Prong-like binders can be purchased at any office store as well.
 - b. If a member is ineligible to show a species in one organization (4-H or FFA), they are ineligible to show the species in another organization (4-H or FFA.)
3. Premise Identification - All entrants for livestock exhibited in 4- H/FFA breed or market competitions, including horses, shall provide a premises registration number. Rabbit, Cavy, and dog entrants are excluded.

Premises ID is one component of the National Animal Identification System (NAIS). For NAIS's purposes, a premises is defined as a location or site where livestock and poultry are born, handled, housed, managed, marketed, processed, or exhibited. Premises ID is critical to rapid detection and evaluation of the scope of animal disease outbreaks and in improving emergency response efficiency. A Premises ID is not the same as a Scrapie ID (there is no ear tag associated with Premises ID). A Premises ID is always seven digits made up of both numbers and letters. If your 4-H project animal is housed/boarded somewhere other than your property, the Premises ID would need to be obtained from/through the landowner where your animals are housed. It is simple and free to obtain a Premises ID. You can register online at <https://www.colorado.gov/pacific/aganimals/traceability> or call 1-303-869-9130

4. Final decision for eligibility will be determined by the Boulder County 4-H Extension Agent and the St. Vrain Valley and Boulder Valley FFA Advisor.

ANIMAL ELIGIBILITY

1. Ownership - All livestock entries must be the property of the eligible exhibitor. Each exhibitor must have valid written evidence of his or her ownership indicating sole ownership prior to the species identification date, which shall include brand inspection, bill of sale, affidavit, registration certificate or other written proof satisfactory to the superintendent. All papers must be available for inspection. Ownership of the animals must be established before animal is nominated and tagged.
 - a. Ownership deadline for all species is the last Thursday in April except for market beef, market goat, poultry, rabbit, market sheep and market swine, which must be owned by the species designated county market nomination (ID) date. Check with the Extension Office for nomination dates. ~~When an animal is born after the last Thursday in April, the mother must be owned by the last Thursday in April, unless other department rules are designated. For kid goats born after the last Thursday in April, please see the department rules for the member and animal eligibility that is an exception to the above ownership deadline.~~
 - b. Non-Market animals (Dairy Cattle, Breeding Beef, Dog, Horse, Llama/Alpaca, Dairy Goats, Breeding Goats, Utility Goats, Breeding Sheep, Cavy and Rabbits) entered in the Boulder County Fair must have been previously identified by the last Thursday in April of the current year using the species Animal Identification Process and uploaded on 4-H Online enrollment or through their FFA advisor. This form must be on file at the Boulder County Extension Office by the posted deadlines each year (last Thursday in April). By submitting this form, the member is declaring they have ownership of the animal and are providing primary care of their project or is an official Lease-An-Animal 4-H project. (Excludes Poultry)
 - c. All animals will be listed and registered to a specific exhibitor. Siblings must specify ownership of specific animals. For example, steer 101 cannot be listed as John's steer and later transferred to his sister, Mary. No changes will be allowed in ownership after the nomination date.
 - d. Lease-An-Animal (LAA) participants, who have a valid, signed lease an animal agreement accepted and filed in the Extension Office, are exempt from all ownership rules. All LAA entries must be leased, as designated on lease an animal agreement, and shown by the eligible exhibitor.
 - e. Inspection - At any time during the project year, each exhibitor, including catch-a-calf participants, agrees to provide for inspection by the Fair Board, or its designated representative, his or her exhibits and evidence of ownership and location.
 - f. The act of entering an animal in the County Fair is the giving consent by the Junior Exhibitor for show management to obtain retinal images on any animal, at any time, and for any reason during Fair and Fair management may take action deemed appropriate based on the results of the retinal images.
2. Animal Death/Quarantine Hardship Rule - Hardship allowances for project animal death or quarantine are at the discretion of the Superintendent and must be cleared by the Extension Agent/FFA Advisor and may not be the same for every department. See Department Superintendent if animal death occurs.

- a. Hardship is limited to showmanship classes only.
 - b. Exhibitor must provide proof of death/quarantine and may only show another exhibitor's eligible project animal.
 - c. Members will be eligible for Round Robin qualification and participation.
3. Animal Care and Housing Forms - All animal exhibitors (livestock, horse, and dog) are required to fill out and turn in, with proper signatures, an Animal Care and Housing Form for all animal projects in which they are enrolled. If individuals keep their animals at their home, this information is completed in 4-H Online when you enroll. For those animals not kept at home, a hard copy form must be completed. **Forms are due to the Extension Office no later than the first Friday in May.** Failure to complete and comply with this requirement will exclude the project member from showing and/or selling at the Boulder County Fair.
 4. Market Livestock Nomination - Each market animal must be identified by ear tag and retinal scan (beef, market dairy cattle, goat, sheep); ear tag, ear notches (swine); leg band (poultry); or tattoo and hair sample (rabbit). Check with the Extension Office for nomination dates.
 - a. There are no make-up dates for market livestock nominations. Exhibitors may make arrangements for another family to bring your animals.
 - b. Animals missing ear tags will be retagged upon arrival at the Boulder County Fair. Other forms of identification on file (i.e. retinal scan, ear notches, hair DNA, sex, breed, etc.) will be used to verify the animal identity prior to exhibiting.
 5. USDA Wholesome Meat Act - The United States Department of Agriculture Wholesome Meat Act applies to the sale of market livestock sold during the Boulder County Fair as follows:
 - a. Animals must be in good health and carcasses free of drug or chemical residues.
 - b. Antibiotics and sulfonamides have required withdrawal periods.
 - c. Drug label directions for use and withdrawal periods must be followed.
 - d. If drug or other chemical residues are found in tissue of carcasses, the entire carcass may be condemned.
 6. Participants in the Pee Wee showmanship in the different livestock departments are to utilize 4-H/FFA animals that are already on the grounds. No outside animals will be allowed.

ENTRIES

1. All entries close the date published under the General Exhibitor Rules. Appropriate on-line forms by this published deadline.
2. See the Department 100, Junior Horse show for entry deadlines and guidelines.
3. No livestock will be permitted to return to stock trailers, trucks, or parking areas following check-in. Horses and dogs are excluded.
4. Stalls/pens may be assigned by the superintendent. Check with department superintendent for further information as we get closer to the show date.
5. Substitutions - In the event a member's project animal dies or is injured, substitutions are allowed only with animals that were previously identified by the member during each species nomination/identification period.

EXHIBITING

1. All exhibitors, by making entry to the Boulder County Fair Junior Livestock shows, agree to abide

by the Boulder County Fair General Rules, 4-H/FFA General Rules, the rules of each department(s) entered and the code of conduct of 4-H and FFA.

2. Exhibitors must also follow the Colorado 4-H Dress Code while exhibiting and representing 4-H with their projects. FFA members also must follow the Colorado 4-H Dress Code unless wearing official dress. For guidelines see: <https://co4h.colostate.edu/resources/dress-code.pdf>.
3. Animals not entered in regularly scheduled classes will not be permitted on the grounds.
4. Underweight/Overweight Animals - Overweight animals will be shown in Overweight classes. Underweight animals will be shown in underweight classes. Underweight and overweight animals are not eligible for Champion or Reserve Champion classes or for the Junior Livestock Sale but may be used in showmanship classes. See species department for weight limits and if overweight/underweight classes are available.
5. Class Calls - All exhibitors will be given three (3) calls prior to the start of each class. The class will commence when the ring steward signals the judge, and no additional exhibitors will be admitted. Failure to show animals when class is called will not justify a class recall.
6. Own Animals- Exhibitors must show their own animals. Exceptions may occur when there are conflicting classes, multiple animals in a class, or hardship cases approved by the superintendent.
7. Conflicting Classes - If an exhibitor is needed in two different livestock show rings, the exhibitor must notify both superintendents to work out scheduling. Superintendents will try to adjust judging schedule to accommodate but will not hold the show for an exhibitor.
8. Control of Animal - Any livestock deemed uncontrollable by the superintendent will be excused from the show ring or the fairgrounds depending on the severity of the situation.
 - a. All exhibitors must control and show their own animal.
 - b. In the event an exhibitor has more than one animal in a class, another Boulder County 4-H or St. Vrain Valley/Boulder Valley FFA member may show it for them.
 - c. In the event, a younger Boulder County 4-H or St. Vrain Valley/Boulder Valley FFA member feels uncomfortable showing their animal they may have an older Boulder County 4-H or St. Vrain Valley/Boulder Valley FFA member assist them.
9. Combining/Splitting Classes - It is not the intention of the Boulder County Fair to create classes for each individual animal. A class should have at least three entries to make up a competitive class. When there are less than three entries in a class, the superintendent may allow individual entries to be judged or may combine classes at his/her discretion. Large classes may also be split into smaller classes.
10. Champion/Reserve Champion Selection - All animals that are breed, weight, age or class champions or reserve champions must return to show ring and be judged in the picking of the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion. Failure to do so results in all premium money and prizes being forfeited along with the right to sell any animal in the Junior Market Livestock Sale.
11. Awards & Premiums - Ribbons and premiums will be given to winners in each class as awarded. No awards will be made to an unworthy animal or other exhibit. If classes are not filled, placing will be made according to the merits of the entries as the judge sees it. Trophies may be awarded based on availability. The decisions of the judge shall be final.
12. Animal Disqualified - Should any animal awarded a cash prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prize shall graduate up into the higher positions next in order above them, if, in the

opinion of the judge, these animals are worthy of such prizes. If the Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion animal(s) are disqualified, no further advancement or replacement of animal(s) will be made. All award(s), banner(s), premium(s), prize(s), ribbon(s), and/or trophy(s) will be forfeit and returned.

13. **Premiums** - payouts will be awarded as follows unless stated otherwise in a specific department. Additional awards and premiums may be given as sponsorship and donations are available at time of judging.

OUT-OF-COUNTY FAIRS, SHOWS, AND EXHIBITIONS ENTRIES:

1. Members planning on exhibiting animals at any national or regional shows such as the Colorado State Fair, Ak-Sar-Ben, American Royal, National Western Stock Show, or any others, must know and adhere to the entry deadlines for those individual shows, fairs, or exhibitions.
2. Each fair, show or exhibition has specific nomination, entry forms deadlines, and specific requirements for that event. It is the exhibitor’s responsibility to find out these specific dates and requirements.
3. If the out-of-county fair, show or exhibition, (i.e. Colorado State Fair or Ak-Sar-Ben) require a Boulder County Fair livestock ear tag, you must complete the Boulder County Fair tag-in process for that species of animal on the set animal nomination date.
4. 4-H/FFA Members will need to collect the DNA samples prior to the nomination date of the out-of-county fair and submit the DNA samples by the species deadline set by that show.
5. No animal sold in the Boulder County Fair Jr. Market Sale is eligible to enter or compete at the Colorado State Fair.

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE RULES

The Junior Livestock Sale will be held in the Indoor Arena, Saturday, August 9, 2025, starting at 1:00 p.m., following the Buyer's Lunch Event.

General Sale order:

- All Champions and Reserve Champions of all species will start the sale.
- Rabbits, Lambs, Turkeys, Beef, Poultry, Swine, Dairy and Goats will sell. Following the sale of all champion and reserves the Sale order within the species will be random and chosen through the species superintendents selection.

Sale Limit: The Sale committee reserves the right to limit livestock numbers for the sale.

- Up to 10 lots of meat pens of rabbits and 10 pens lots of poultry would be allowed. This would be 8 pens-lots plus the Grand Champions & Reserve Grand Champions. (Lots may be meat pens of three or the individual market animal, however the class is determined in the species department.)
- **Exception Sale Qty:** An exhibitor may sell only one animal in the sale, with the exception that all Grand and Reserve Grand Champions must be sold.
- An exception to that would be exhibitors with the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Market Rabbit, Poultry and Turkey. Those individuals have the option of selling a beef, dairy, lamb, hog, or goat in addition to their Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Market Rabbit, Poultry, or Turkey.

Marketing: The entering, marketing, presentation, and sale of all entries in the Boulder County Livestock Sale will be the responsibility of the exhibitor. Under no circumstances will the management of the Boulder County Fair, the Junior Livestock Sale Committee, the Boulder County Extension Office, or any individual assisting with the fair be held responsible for the marketing of the animals.

SALE REQUIREMENTS:

1. **Tag-In:** All market animals & MDAP must be tagged on spring tagging dates.
 - **Inspection Papers:** All market beef & dairy members must bring original brand inspection papers to the fair for Brand Inspector's use.
 - **Dairy DHR:** If the heifer is registered, the current owner (exhibitor) will also need the registration paper and the transfer documents signed and ready for buyer. All papers must accompany the heifer at the sale along with brand paper.
 - **Ewe Lambs & Does:** Must have a Scrapie flock ID tag present for sale.
 - **Male market animals:** Must be castrated or banded prior to the first weigh-in date in the spring. Owners will refund the sale money to the buyer if their animals are found to have

testicles in the body cavity at the time of processing. Poultry market chickens, market turkeys, and rabbits are exempt from this requirement for health and safety reasons.

2. Livestock sold in the sale must have been shown in their respective market animal class or DHR & DSP (Dairy Heifer Replacement & Market Dairy Animal Project) class at that Boulder County Fair's 4-H/FFA livestock show.
3. **Attendance:** The exhibitor must be present in the sale ring at the time the animal is to be sold.
4. **Required Form:** The USDA Wholesome Meat Act (certification and disclosure) form and the Jr. Livestock Sale Intent form are merged into 1 form. This form is used to create the "sale order".
 - **Deadline:** The form is due back to each respective Livestock Superintendent. Each Livestock Superintendent will determine the time and details of the form deadline (normally immediately after the market show for that species).
 - Failure to submit this form on time will result in the exhibitor not eligible to sell the animal through the sale.
 - Take a photo of the form for your records.
 - All Wholesome Meat Assurance Act rules and regulations must be adhered to. See Jr. Exhibitor Livestock and Animal General rules under USDA Wholesome Meat Act.
 - It is the exhibitor and Superintendent's responsibility to coordinate and submit the "sale of intent" form to the designated livestock sale committee member after the final market show for that species.
 - **Multiple Species:** When an exhibitor is showing multiple species, the exhibitor will complete a form for each species. Immediately following the exhibitors' FINAL COMPETITION, the exhibitor with the Superintendent(s) will identify the species to be sold.
5. **Forfeit Sale Privilege:** Any exhibitor withdrawing an animal from sale after being designated on the sale intent form will forfeit sale privileges for the following year.
6. **Fees:** There will be up to 5% commission deducted for operating expenses on all sale proceeds (**includes all add ons, and sale prices**).
Additional fees:
 - **Check-Off:** Pork check-off fee (National Pork Board), Beef/Dairy check-off fee & brand inspection, Lamb check-off fee (American Lamb Board).
 - **Photo & Fee:** Photos of the sale animal with the exhibitor are required for the sale. The fee for pictures will be deducted from the check (Two 4" x 6" photos). Additional pictures may be ordered privately.
 - Only add-ons that are paid in full will be included in the exhibitors' check.
 - An exhibitor "buyback" financial transaction will be applied and deducted on the exhibitors' check (no invoicing).
7. **Photo Dress Requirement:** The appointed Photographer must take a photo of the sale animal with the exhibitor dressed in showmanship attire during their species' designated time and no later than Friday A.M.
8. **Animal Sale Ring Presentation:** Any non-show material(s) on animals not allowed in the show ring are not allowed in the sale ring, e.g., glitter or decorations on all species. Show awards for the current year BOULDER COUNTY FAIR are allowed in the sale ring, e.g., ribbons and banners.
9. **State Fair:** No animal sold in the Boulder County Fair Junior livestock market sale is eligible for any market classes at the Colorado State Fair
10. **Buyer and Sponsor "Thank You" Process:**

- **Fair Entry:** The Livestock Sale Committee utilizes the exhibitor's information in **FAIR ENTRY** for contacting, printing, and sending the sale check. **FFA & 4-H exhibitors must enter a current email address, telephone number, and home address.**
- 10 working days post sale an email will be sent to the address in Fair Entry from the Jr Livestock Sale Committee email address. This email contains a listing of all buyers and add-on sponsors: names, business, business contact (if applicable).
- The exhibitor is to deliver the thank you notes for all buyers and sponsors (add-on) to the **Boulder County Extension Office** in pre-addressed and stamped envelopes.
- **Due Date & Lateness:** Failure of an exhibitor to submit a hand-delivered thank you letter to the Boulder County Extension Office by the **second Thursday in September** will result in a \$100.00 fee being deducted from the exhibitor's check.
- Upon receipt of your complete thank you listing, you will then be eligible to receive your check **when we have collected buyer and sponsor money.**

ANIMAL QUALITY:

1. All animals that meet sale quality regulations are eligible to sell in the sale.
2. **Inspection:** All animals will be inspected by the respective Livestock Superintendent for that department and a sale committee member who is not associated with that species to guarantee quality is adequate; the Sale Committee reserves the right not to allow that animal to sell.
3. **Drug Testing:** If drug testing is ordered by a regulatory agency, an additional fee will be assessed to the exhibitor, if the test is positive. Fee costs will then be paid directly by the exhibitor or deducted from the Junior Market Livestock Sale check if sufficient funds exist.

POST-SALE:

1. **Sale Marking:** The Boulder County Junior Market Livestock Sale Committee reserves the right to mark animals before or after the sale in any manner they desire. Animals entered in this sale will be clearly marked to indicate they have been shown and sold at the 2025 Boulder County Fair.
2. **Care:** 4-H and FFA exhibitors or a family member must remain at fairgrounds until all exhibitors' animals are loaded to leave the fairgrounds, unless otherwise directed by the Sale Committee. This is to include animals not in the sale leaving for packing plants on alternative transportation not provided by animal owner.
3. **Check Out:** No sale animals will be allowed to leave the fairgrounds without a proper checkout with the species sale committee designee and/or Superintendent.

To Register:

1. Obtain a horse show entry form from your 4-H organizational leader and use the schedule (below) to list classes you wish to compete in, using a separate form per horse.
2. Ask your 4-H organizational leader to review and approve your entries.
3. When your 4-H organizational leader has approved your entries, register at: www.fairentry.com. Click on "Find Your Fair." On the right side of the screen, under Colorado section, select "2025 Boulder County Fair." Register for classes under 4-H Horse project.
ENTRIES CLOSE July 14, 2025 through FairEntry.

Horse ID Sheets:

HORSE ID SHEETS MUST BE COMPLETED ONLINE NO LATER THAN THE LAST Thursday IN APRIL (APRIL 24, 2025), FOR ANY HORSES THAT ARE TO BE SHOWN AT THE 2025 BOULDER COUNTY FAIR. HARDSHIP CASES WILL BE CONSIDERED AFTER THE LAST FRIDAY IN APRIL-ONLY IN THE CASE OF THE DEATH OF A PROJECT HORSE.

- a) Substitution will be considered upon presentation of a certificate of death no later than four (4) days before check-in of the Boulder County Fair Horse Show. Death certificates must be presented to the county 4-H Extension Agent overseeing the horse program by the above deadline.
- b) Replacement 4-H horses must be selected from currently or previously identified horses in the Boulder County 4-H Horse Program by another current or previous 4-H member. The member requesting the replacement must provide acceptable documentation showing that the horse has been identified.
- c) Rule from the Colorado State 4-H rule book about sharing horses with members above level 1 are still in effect. Rule # 4D under General Rules and Requirements.
- d) Classes may be limited due to scheduling conflicts among members utilizing the same horse.
- e) Following the rules above, a replacement horse may also be proposed for other 4-H horse shows held after the Animal ID deadline. This also requires notification at least 4 days before the show. The same replacement horse shall be used in all subsequent shows of that season.

FAIR HORSE SHOW REGISTRATIONS SHALL BE COMPLETED ONLINE ON THE BOULDER COUNTY "FAIR ENTRY" SYSTEM NO LATER THAN July 14, 2025. **NO LATE FAIR HORSE SHOW REGISTRATIONS WILL BE ACCEPTED.**

GENERAL RULES

THERE ARE ADDITIONAL RULES FOR SPECIFIC CLASSES – See Boulder County Horse Safety Rules, Boulder County Horse Project/Show Rules, Colorado 4-H Horse Rule Book, and Boulder County 4-H Driving Rules.

1. No one may approach a judge without explicit permission from show management; under no circumstances may an exhibitor, parent, leader or spectator badger, insult or be argumentative with a horse show judge, show secretary, ring steward or show management. No one may approach the horse show fair superintendent with a dispute, without his/her organizational leader present to moderate. Any flagrant display of poor sportsmanship or affront to a judge, ring steward, or show management, by or on behalf of the exhibitor, may result in exclusion of the exhibitor from competition and/or forfeiture of awards or expulsion from the show grounds for the person, and/or exhibitor.
2. Current Colorado 4-H Horse Rule Book, Boulder County Horse Project and Show Rules, Boulder County Horse Safety Rules, and Boulder County 4-H Driving Rules will apply. In the event of conflict, Boulder County 4-H Horse Rules will take precedence.
3. Show management reserves the right to change the order of classes.
4. Classes may be split or combined by age or random order by the show officials as entries warrant. Please check final class lists on show day and notify show management if you feel there is a discrepancy.
5. Age of exhibitor is determined as of December 31st of the prior year. Junior members are 8-10 years old; Intermediate members are 11-13 years old; Senior members are 14-18 years old.
6. Age of horse is determined as of January 1st of the year foaled.
7. **All exhibitors are required to compete at the level of the 4-H card held or the highest-level riding test passed in that discipline.** Those members not yet holding a card or having passed a riding test compete as Unrated. All showmanship exhibitors are required to compete at the highest-level showmanship test passed. Those members not yet holding a card in showmanship or who have not passed the Level 1 showmanship test will compete as Unrated in showmanship.

8. Please use the following tests/competencies to determine the eligibility of classes:

Members must have passed Level 1 or higher:

- Western Riding, Reining, Trail
- English Control and classical Dressage
- Western Dressage – must hold a Level 1 or higher Western card, or have passed Level 1 or higher Western riding test

9. Members may show only one horse in each class, except for halter classes. In halter classes when scheduling conflicts arise, if necessary, a member may have another 4-H member show a horse, with the other 4-H member using the assigned back number of the horse being shown.
10. **Delegates to the Master Livestock Showmanship Contest (“Round Robin”) shall be selected from the Showmanship Round Robin qualifying classes.** No other showmanship classes will qualify for Round Robin.
11. **DO NOT ENTER “ROUND ROBIN QUALIFYING SHOWMANSHIP” CLASS IF YOU CANNOT OR DO NOT WISH TO SHOW IN THE ROUND ROBIN CONTEST.** The two highest placing contestants in each Round Robin Qualifying Showmanship class will be the delegates to the round robin competition. Delegates will bring their project horses to the Round Robin contest.
11. **Only a 4-H member may school horses during the Boulder County Fair 4-H Horse Show (except in the Nelson Road practice arena).**
12. In classical Dressage classes, a smooth snaffle bit is required. A list and pictures of allowable bits are available in the State Rule Book or through club leaders. Copies of the current USDF dressage tests are available online. Ride times may be assigned for Classical Dressage and Western Dressage. See westerndressageassociation.org rules for Western Dressage tack and rules.
13. For Western Riding, Reining and Western Horsemanship classes, Levels 3 and 4 must perform flying lead changes; simple lead changes must be penalized. Levels 1 and 2 must perform simple lead changes; flying lead changes must be penalized.
14. For riders entered in any English classes, including on-the-flat classes, a helmet is required.

15. Therapeutic Horsemanship and Showmanship (English or Western): Disabled 4-H members may compete in these classes, but riders may not cross-enter any other class. An exhibitor in the Therapeutic class may elect to have another 4-H member ride or exhibit in the class (but not be judged) so said exhibitor is not the only rider in the class. If a member wishes to elect this option, notify the organizational leader to make the arrangements prior to the class.
16. Walk/Trot Horsemanship (English and Western) – This class is for Unrated riders in their first or second year of the horse project as well as disabled/therapeutic riders in any year of their horse project. These riders may not cross-enter any class (English or Western) that canters or lopes.
17. Patterns for all pattern classes will be **posted online 2 weeks before fair.** Patterns will be conducted before rail work. Pattern and rail classes will be judged 60% on the pattern, 40% on the rail work. It is the judge's discretion to conduct the rail work one way or both ways of the ring.
18. Trainer Horse class – This class is for horses under 6 years of age that have only been trained by the 4-H member, not by professionals. Horses may be ridden with any legal bit, one or two handed. Members must ride Level 2 or higher to compete in this class.
19. Green Horse class – This class is for horses 5 years of age and younger that are not ready for regular Horsemanship classes, or are in their first year of showing. Horses may be ridden with any legal bit, one or two handed. Exhibitors in this class may not cross-enter regular Horsemanship classes with their Green Horse.
20. Miniature Horse Measurements - To compete in County Fair Classes all miniature horses should have been officially measured by Fair Superintendent. The requirements for obtaining measurements will be followed by the AMHR Rulebook.
 - Miniature Horses must not to exceed 38".
 - If a miniature horse is measured and found to be over 38", the Superintendent shall not allow the horse to show as a miniature.

FAIR HORSE SHOW DIVISION AWARDS:

1. Division High Point Awards will be presented to the following levels in English and Western Divisions (any number of project horses used):

- * Level 1
- * Level 2
- * Levels 3 / 4 combined

2. Division High Point Awards will be presented to the following levels in the Ranch Horse Division (One horse/One rider combination only):

- * Level 1
- * Levels 2-4 combined

3. Division High Point Awards will be presented to the following age groups in the Gymkhana Division (any number of project horses used):

- * Junior – Intermediate combined
- * Senior

4. A contestant may enter all of the classes in a single division that he or she is qualified to enter (See Rule number 7 in General Fair Rules for level qualifications). To be eligible for the 2025 4-H Division High Point Awards, the 4-H member may compete in the following classes:

5. Points per class are calculated on a 10-1 scale no matter how many exhibitors are in a class (except for the Ranch Horse Division- see next rule). Example: A contestant placing 1st in a class of three will receive ten points; a contestant placing 2nd will receive nine points; and so on... These points will be tabulated toward any High Point Awards.

6. Ranch Horse Division only - Points per class will be based on the Exhibitor's earned performance score provided by the judge. Example: An exhibitor with a class score of 68 will receive 68 points for that class.

7. The Boulder County Horse Leaders Council reserves the right to adjust results if Show Management becomes aware of an error in the point calculations of results previously announced. In any such case, Boulder County Horse Leaders Council has the right to take back all prizes distributed prior to the error and distribute them to the correct recipient.

8. Ties: Scores of the written test will be used to break ties. In the event a tie still exists, score in the respective Horsemanship class for English and Western Divisions will be used. The score in Showmanship will be used as a third-tier tiebreaker. In Ranch Horse Level 1, the score in the Ranch Riding class will be used. In Ranch Horse Levels 2-4, the score in the Individual Cow Work class will be used. In Gymkhana, the time in the Barrels class will be used. If a tie still exists, an official flip of a coin by the Fair Superintendent will be used to break the tie.

9. Any horse project member who receives a Division High Point Award or Reserve Division High Point Award at the Boulder County Fair 4-H Horse Show must attempt to rate to the next level, in that discipline, before the next Boulder County Fair registration deadline. Such rating is recommended to be done by a State-certified out of county rater or a rater who is not affiliated with the member's club.

a. If a member is required to attempt to rate to the next level in any discipline for any reason, failure to do so will result in ineligibility to show at the Boulder County Fair in all disciplines.

b. Exception to the level up rules are for level 4 Riders, as there is no higher level in which to advance.

10. NOTE FOR UNRATED RIDERS – although there are no division High Point awards for Unrated exhibitors, any Unrated rider who receives a First or Second place in Boulder County Fair horse show classes must attempt to rate to the next level, in that discipline, before the next Boulder County Fair registration deadline. See rule 9 for further clarification.

GENERAL:

1. **Animal Health Inspection will take place upon arrival.**
2. Fitting will be optional this year and is not required.

ELIGIBILITY:

1. Only exhibitors enrolled in the 4-H or FFA Breeding Beef project are eligible to enter classes under Department 300.
2. Registered heifers must have original breed papers and show ownership on registration papers by last Thursday of April of the current year. Any breed females without original registration papers will be shown as commercial females.
3. Commercial females must show proof of ownership by the last Thursday in April of the current year. (i.e. Colorado Brand Certificate in the member's name) to be eligible to be shown.
4. Females may be registered or commercial. All breeding animals must be previously identified on **4HOnline through the Animal ID Process.**
 - a. Non-Market animals (Dairy Cattle, Breeding Beef, Dog, Horse, Dairy Goats, Breeding Goats, Utility Goats, Breeding Sheep) entered in the Boulder County Fair must have been previously identified by the last Thursday in April of the current year using the species **Animal Identification Process** and uploaded on **4-HOnline** enrollment or through their FFA advisor. This form must be on file at the Boulder County Extension Office by the posted deadlines each year (last Thursday in April). By submitting this form, the member is declaring they have ownership of the animal and are providing

primary care of their project.

- b. Members must also submit a Colorado Brand Inspection certificate in the member's name. Breed registration papers can also be included if the animal is a purebred.
- c. If the animal is part of the official Lease-an-animal program, they must have a lease agreement on file at the extension office prior to the identification deadline. Brand Inspections do not have to be in the lease-an-animal member's name, but must show the name of the person the lease-an-animal agreement is made with.
- d. Breed verification forms must also be submitted at registration time for tag in or animal id.

- 5. All bulls must be born in 2025 and nursing his dam. Bulls will only be shown in cow/calf class.
- 6. Cow/calf class, cow of any age and calf must be born in 2025.
- 7. Heifer calves born in 2024 must be weaned to show as an individual.
- 8. To be eligible for the Registered Bred & Owned Female, females must be registered and have original breed papers listing only the exhibitor as the breeder on these papers. This does not include family or farm bred and owned heifers.
- 9. Cattle that do not meet the age requirements for their classification may be shown in showmanship classes only. Cattle must be safe, and it will be up to the superintendent's discretion if they meet this eligibility.

CLASSIFICATION:

- 1. If less than 4 head per class, classes may be combined within breed.
- 2. Breeding beef classes will be offered in the breed classifications listed.
- 3. All English & Exotic breeds regardless of class size will be shown within their respective breeds. Breed association show rules will apply concerning eligibility.
- 4. Breed Association Show Rules for eligibility of the breed shown will apply.

PREMIUMS:

Premiums will be paid by check ~~and/or cash and will either be available for pick up or~~ and mailed out after the Fair. Superintendents have the right to use their discretion to hold or refuse prize money.

GENERAL:

1. This will be an optional fit show (not required).
2. Stalls will be available for bedding on Monday between 8:00 a.m. – 7:00 p.m. but check with the Superintendent prior to bedding. **No cattle of any kind, may be in the barns/or stalled before the Check-in time, unless a vet certified health paper (dated within 7 days) is turned in to superintendent (beef/dairy) or 4-H agent BEFORE animals are unloaded and visually inspected before stalling.**

ELIGIBILITY:

1. Only exhibitors enrolled in the 4-H or FFA Market Beef project are eligible to enter classes under Department 350.
2. The USDA Wholesome Meat Act form and Livestock Sale Intent form are to be signed by exhibitor & parent by DATE TBD electronically this year. Please see sale rules for other specifics for participation this year.
3. Members must have a Colorado Brand Inspection certificate in the member's name before the market beef tag in during the spring (March).

4. Miniature Breed Division: In order for cattle to be considered for the miniature breed division, the member must provide a breed verification form stating this animal is a true miniature breed and signed by the breeder. The completed form must be turned in at the March tag in. The official height requirements for cattle to be considered "Miniature Breeds are 48" or below.
5. All exhibitors must bring their brand papers for verification when their animal crosses the scale for weigh in at fair.
6. Any animal not meeting the minimum market weight can have an IMMEDIATE re-weigh at the request of the 4-H/ FFA member or parent/guardian. The animal may not leave the scale area, the animal will come off the scale, the scale will be zeroed out for reweigh, the second weight stands.
7. Market beef cattle must be less than 2 years of age, to be eligible to show in the Beef Market classes at the Boulder County Fair
8. The champion/reserve of the miniature beef division will be eligible compete in the grand drive with all other market beef and would be eligible to sell in the Junior livestock sale.
9. **Animal Health Inspection will take place upon arrival.**
10. **Market steers and heifers that do not meet the minimum weight requirements will fall into the feeder class and are not eligible for the Jr. Livestock Market Sale.**
11. **Market steers and heifers that do not meet the minimum rate of gain requirements are not eligible for the Jr. Livestock Sale.** A market animal should gain an average of 2 lbs per day over the life of the project as a goal, however the minimum rate of gain to be eligible for the junior market sale is **1.0 lbs** per day.
12. **All market heifers must be open (not pregnant).**
13. **THERE WILL BE NO SHRINK APPLIED to the weight of market animal during weigh-in at fair.**

CLASSIFICATION:

1. Market Beef classes consist of Market Heifers and Market Steers and Miniature Beef. Heifers entered in a Junior Market Beef class are not eligible to show in any of the Junior Breeding Beef classes. Miniature Beef will not show in their respective market heifer or steer class.
2. Heifers cannot change classification from breeding to market or market to breeding.
3. Market classes will be shown by weight classes. If there are a large number of animals of a certain breed, show staff reserves the right to break out classes.

1. All cattle **MUST** have a sign designating the name of animal, ownership, and club. Signage with the minimum required information must be hung above the animal by 5 p.m. on Tuesday.
2. Stalls will be assigned by the superintendent. All dairy animals will be stalled at all times where the dairy superintendent has assigned. All dairy animals will remain on public display at all times. (No 4-H/FFA dairy cattle are to be stalled in horse stalls at any time.) Those with milking cows see superintendent as the milkers **ONLY**, may be eligible to check out following the show.
3. Stalls will be available for bedding on Monday between 8:00 a.m. – 7:00 p.m. **No cattle of any kind, may be in the barns/or stalled before the Check-in time, unless a vet certified health paper (dated within 7 days) is turned in to superintendent (beef/dairy) or 4-H agent BEFORE animals are unloaded and visually inspected before stalling.**
4. Exhibitors are required to wear a closed leather shoe/boot and dress in whites in the show ring and for sale photos. (White button up shirt/Polo & white pants)
5. Showmanship will start the dairy show, starting with Juniors; Intermediates; then Seniors. Showmanship classes will be judged using the current PDCA showmanship scorecard. All 1st and 2nd place winners from each age division will have the option to compete in the Large Animal Round Robin Showmanship Contest on **Friday Aug 8th**. See Dept. 999 for complete Round Robin Rules.
- 6 Several large donations from sponsors have contributed to this show so all exhibitors are expected to fill out multiple thank you cards. Award winners from select classes will have additional cards to complete. These cards will be provided at the show and are to be turned in to the superintendent by **checkout time to receive any awards or premiums.**

ELIGIBILITY:

1. Only exhibitors enrolled in the 4-H or FFA Dairy Cattle project are eligible to enter classes under Department 375. **New**– Self Determined members who have participated within the Dairy program MAY enter in NON cattle classes (24-26), costume class (23) and the specific Showmanship Class using a dairy animal that was admitted during check in. Only Boulder County 4-H/FFA members may lead cattle in the show ring and must be dressed in whites.
2. **Animal Health Inspection is required for all animals before being allowed in the barns or stalls. See above for time.**
3. Record Books – Each 4-H or FFA member **must provide their up-to-date record book during check-in. A non-printed up-to-date record book is allowed on a flash drive.** Animals not listed in the record book or included on the Dairy Cattle Animal Identification Form will not be allowed to exhibit at the Boulder County Fair. An incomplete record book will result in denial of check-in. **A complete up-to-date record book must include all pages; including a MQA date; project supplement pages, and milk production record(s).**
 - **Self Determined** members must provide their up-to-date record book, along with a dairy cattle participation log (provided to members at workshops).
4. Females may be purebred or high grade. All animals to show must be included in the record book. Registered animals must be registered or leased by a breed association under the name of the exhibitor or have an official County 4-H Lease Agreement on file in the 4-H office. All FFA members must turn in the Dairy Cattle Identification Form to your FFA Advisor before the set deadline (before the last Thursday in April) of the current year along with photos and ownership papers, where it will be **turned in to the Extension Office by the last Thursday in April.**

DAIRY HEIFER REPLACEMENT CLASS:

1. In order to be eligible for the “Dairy Heifer Replacement” (DHR) class, Heifers must have been nominated and pregnant by the last Thursday in April deadline.
2. Only one heifer (designated by entering in this class) will show in the specific “Dairy Heifer Replacement” (DHR) class. All other nominated heifers may show in their regular aged dairy heifer class.
3. All designated DHR will be allowed to sell at the Boulder County Livestock Sale at the Boulder County Fair. All Livestock Sale Rules will apply. (Only one (1) animal regardless of species may sell from a member). A sale intent form will be required and turned in to the dairy superintendent immediately following the dairy show.
4. Heifers will be inspected and pregnancy checked at the Boulder County Fair check-in, and/or prior to the sale.
5. Ownership and/or brand papers for the DHRP heifer must accompany every heifer in the sale. If the heifer is registered, the registration papers must be in the member's name by fair and must also accompany the heifer at the sale, along with the signed transfer.
6. Heifers will NOT be allowed to sell if:
 - a. They are not at least five (5) months pregnant.
 - b. They are not healthy, or in poor condition according to breed standards (size and condition for their age and stage of pregnancy at time of check-in).

7. Prior to receiving the sale check, you must turn in your buyer's thank you into the Extension Office by the second Thursday in September. Failure to submit the letter by the second Thursday in September will result in a \$100.00 fee being deducted from the exhibitor's check. These late fees will be contributed to the Market Sale Scholarship fund.
8. Members are encouraged to contact several potential buyers for their animals. Buy back opportunities will be available for businesses that purchase animals.

Market Dairy Animal Classes (MDAP):

1. The participant must be enrolled in the Dairy Cattle project.
2. This is for Dairy breed Steers **or freemartin heifers** ONLY and will be a 2-year program. Dairy animals **MUST** be 100% dairy: Holstein, Jersey, Brown Swiss, Ayrshire, Guernsey, or Milking Shorthorn. Dairy animals may be crosses from any of these dairy breeds only. **NO BEEF CROSSES WILL BE PERMITTED. The superintendent & 4-H County Specialist reserve the right to make the final decision on any crossbreds.**
3. The first year, bull calves must be **born Feb 1st to the last Thursday in April (Animal ID deadline)** and submitted online by the last Thursday in April using the current year Dairy Cattle ID form. All calves must have a permanent tattoo and/or an ear tag by June 1 & the ID must be updated if needed.
4. All feeder calves (1st year) must have been castrated and dehorned prior to their first fair. NO bulls or horned animals will be allowed.
5. In the second year, the participant must nominate and tag in their animals at the required **spring** tag-in date of the current project year. Nomination cards are available at the Boulder County Extension Office. The 4-H agent will keep the original and send a copy of the nomination card to the dairy cattle superintendent.

MDAP REQUIREMENTS:

1. For all feeder calves & market animals, **only the face & tail may be clipped. All hair is to be brushed down with a natural lay**, no coloring or hair stand up of any kind may be used; hooves may be polished with clear only. Showing of dairy market animals will follow the dairy cattle guidelines (PDCA) as showing heifers, except for clipping. Show sticks are NOT allowed.
2. Participants may ID and show up to 3 calves the first year. From these calves, participants may nominate and show up to two (2) animals, but are limited to selling only one (1) through the sale the second year.
3. The member must be the sole owner of the animal. A copy of the brand certificate, along with 2 photos, (side view of each side), and list tag # AND the ear tattoo # online with the Dairy Cattle ID form for calves.
4. All 2nd year nominated animals must participate at designated tag-in and had exhibited at the prior Boulder County Fair. Only 1 animal may sell through the BCF Livestock Sale.
5. The animal must be:
 - a. Born February - April (by animal ID deadline) of the current year for the feeder calf. (5-7 months old at Fair time) and for 2nd year steer animals exhibited at prior year fair and were born February - April of the prior year (16-18 months old at Fair time) **2nd year for heifer - ages December - February, and exhibited at prior year fair in a heifer class or the feeder class.**
 - b. Must be from a purebred dairy breed sire. (AI or natural breeding) NO BEEF crosses.

- c. From a dam of a dairy breed (see breeds), either registered or high grade and may be a dairy cross (combo of dairy breeds only).
- d. Tattooed and/or tagged by June 1st of current year AND online ID updated for calves. Or, nominated & tagged by required tag-in date of current year for 2nd year animals.

SALE GUIDELINES- 2nd year animals only:

1. Only 1 animal, **heifer or steer** will be allowed to sell at the Boulder County Livestock Sale at the Boulder County Fair if all requirements are met. All Livestock Sale Rules will apply. (only one (1) animal regardless of species may sell from a member)
2. Steers **or freemartin heifers** must be of the correct age, completed the current tag-in & meet weight requirement of 900 pounds, prior to the sale.
3. Official CO brand papers for ALL steers **or freemartin heifers** must accompany each animal.
4. Market Dairy Animals will NOT be eligible to sell if:
 - a. Did not show at the previous BCF
 - b. Missed the required nomination & tag-in date of the current year.
 - c. Does not weigh at least 900 lbs at weigh-in when checking in
 - d. Is unhealthy, or in poor condition according to breed standards (size and condition for age & breed at time of check-in).
5. Participants will adhere to all Boulder County Livestock Sale Rules. A sale intent form will be required and turned in to the dairy superintendent immediately following the dairy show.
6. Prior to receiving the sale check, you must turn in your buyer's thank you into the Extension Office by the second Thursday in September. Failure to submit the letter by the second Thursday in September will result in a \$100.00 fee being deducted from the exhibitor's check. These late fees will be contributed to the Livestock Sale Scholarship fund.
7. Members are highly encouraged to contact several potential buyers for their animals. Non BCF Sale animals may have opportunities to be sold at market price if sale committee is aware of these surplus animals.

Awards may be given to the top one or two participants of each age division, Junior Intermediate and Senior. Judging will be based on stall and animal cleanliness; stall display & signage, number of animals; sportsmanship, and being courteous to others. Scores may include information from the superintendent on: showmanship placing; promptness at the show ring; neatness of stall area; regularity of feeding and watering; respect and care of facilities; presentation of information to the public; signage (information) of each animal stalled and quiz participation.

This department is subject to all BCF General Rules, General Exhibitor Rules and all Junior Exhibitor Livestock and Animal Division Rules in addition to those listed for the department.

GENERAL RULES

These rules apply to the Showmanship, Obedience and Rally Contest. Please refer to the Agility section for rules related to that contest. Contest requirements may be modified at any time in response to changes in Health Department guidance.

Please read these rules carefully since some classes and requirements have changed.

1. All exhibitors **MUST** comply with current Health Department requirements.
2. The only training equipment allowed in the Obedience and Rally ring is a slip, chain, martingale, flat buckle or clip collar without tags and a nylon or leather leash. No halties, gentle leaders, slip leads, harnesses or pinch collars are allowed. The same collars are allowed without tags in the Showmanship ring, but handlers may also use a martingale or other show lead to exhibit their dog. No bait or treats are allowed in the Obedience or Rally rings. Bait may be used in the Showmanship ring at the discretion of the judge.
3. If a dog has failed an exercise, it will not ordinarily be re-judged unless the judge feels the dog's performance was prejudiced by peculiar and unusual conditions. In such a case, the judge may elect to re-judge the dog only on the portion of the exercise in which the unusual condition occurred.
4. Exhibitors **MUST** comply with the Colorado State 4-H Dress Code.

5. NO dogs are allowed beyond the immediate vicinity of the indoor arena unless returning to or from the car. Dogs are not allowed to enter other barns, or buildings on the fairgrounds.
6. Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning up after their dogs both inside and outside the arena.
7. Dogs must be always on leash except when performing off leash exercises in the show ring.
8. In addition to the BCF General Rules, General Exhibitor Rules and all Junior Exhibitor Livestock and Animal Division Rules, exhibitors must also comply with the policies adopted by the Boulder County Dog Advisory Committee including the rules regarding Shared Family Dogs and Borrowed Dogs, as posted on the Boulder County 4-H Dog Project web page and referenced in the Eligibility section of these rules.
9. Any negative behavior on the part of the exhibitor, family members or leaders directed toward any official will result in disqualification and awards forfeited. If there is a question as to the rules or the judging of a class, adult family members, exhibitors or leaders must approach the Dog Superintendent and not the judge. The Superintendent will then take the question to the judge if warranted.

ELIGIBILITY RULES

1. Only exhibitors enrolled in the 4-H Dog Project are eligible to enter classes under Department 400.
2. Each 4-H exhibitor must provide an up-to-date printed record book at check in.
3. Exhibitors must own their project dog individually or in partnership with immediate family members or guardians provide Primary Care (more than 51%) for their Project Dog during the complete duration of the project.
4. If a Project Dog is not able to complete the 4-H Dog Project due to extenuating circumstances (severe aggression, illness, injury, death, re-location, etc.), the 4-H member may borrow a dog to complete the Project subject to the following requirements:
 - The 4-H member must obtain permission from the Dog Superintendent and the County 4-H Specialist (Agent) to complete the Project with a borrowed dog.
 - The 4-H member must also obtain written permission from the owner to borrow the dog.
 - If possible, the 4-H member should assist with caring for the borrowed dog.
 - The borrowed dog must comply with all vaccination and any other County requirements.
 - The 4-H member may participate in all County training classes with the borrowed dog.
 - The 4-H member may show the borrowed dog as "Exhibition Only" at 4-H Fun Matches or County Fair, but cannot compete for any titles or prizes.
 - Exhibitors with borrowed dogs are not eligible to participate in the State Dog Contest.
5. If more than one 4-H member in a family wants to participate in the 4-H Dog Project, and the family cannot provide a separate dog for each member, siblings can share a Family Dog for the Boulder County 4-H Dog Project. A Family Dog is defined as a dog living in the same household as a 4-H dog project member. Shared Family Dogs are subject to the following requirements:
 - The Family Dog must be entered in the Dog ID for each child.
 - Each child must complete their own record book for the Family Dog.

- Each child must be responsible for a significant portion of the Family Dog's care (must share morning/evening feedings, grooming, walks, etc).
- Siblings sharing the Family Dog may participate in all Boulder County 4-H dog training classes.
- Siblings may exhibit the shared Family Dog in 4-H competitions (Fun Matches, County Fair, State Fair) under the following conditions:
 - Only one sibling may compete with the Family Dog in Obedience.
 - Only one sibling may compete with the Family Dog in Rally.
 - There are no restrictions on competing with the Family Dog in Showmanship events each year, so long as the siblings are not in the same Showmanship class (ie; Junior Novice, Intermediate Open, etc).
 - The sibling not competing with the Family Dog may request to show "Exhibition Only" in that event at County Fair.
 - If the Family Dog receives a qualifying score with one sibling in any class at the **Boulder County Fair**, another sibling may compete with the Family Dog in the same class the following year, but must enter the "Open", "B" or "C" level.
 - Shared Family dogs are not eligible to compete for Grand or Reserve Grand Champion at the **Boulder County Fair**.
 - Shared Family Dogs are eligible to compete in the State Dog Contest only in the classes for which they qualified at the County level.
 - If the Family Dog receives a **qualifying score** (receives a title) in any class **at State Fair**, that same dog is no longer eligible for exhibition in "A" level in the same class in which they previously qualified with a different handler at State 4-H Dog Trials.

6. Exhibitors may only exhibit one dog in Showmanship but may enter separate dogs in Rally and Obedience. An exhibitor may enter more than one dog in Obedience and Rally classes and may enter more than one dog in the same class for Obedience and Rally if they meet County qualifications. If an exhibitor has two dogs in the same Obedience class, they must choose one dog for the group sits and downs. The other dog must be handled by a currently enrolled 4-H dog project member for the group sits and downs.
7. The progress the dog has made and the number of years the handler has been in the dog project determines the correct class to enter. The "A" level classes are limited to exhibitors and/or dogs with no experience showing in that class. If a project member and/or dog has ever received a qualifying score in an A level class and decides to show a new dog, the member must enter the "B" level class.

DOG ELIGIBILITY RULES

1. **Only dogs with a 4-H Dog ID completed in 4-H Online by the last Thursday in April are eligible to enter classes under Department 400. Dogs who do not have a completed Dog ID in 4-H Online by the last Thursday in April will NOT be allowed to compete at County Fair or State Fair the State Dog Trials.**
2. Vaccines MUST be kept current in 4-H Online throughout the year in order to exhibit at County or the State Dog Trials ~~State Fair~~. Upon request, proof of current rabies, distemper and parvovirus

vaccination must be presented upon check-in. Bordatella is strongly encouraged but not required. Rabies tag number must be on the entry form under the Registration Tag category. Rabies vaccines must be administered by a licensed veterinarian. Titters may be accepted as provided in the State 4-H Dog Contest Trial Rules.

3. A dog with an AKC title or a title from another national dog association is disqualified from entering the same class for which that title was awarded or any lower class, except if that title was won less than four months before the State Fair-Dog Trials, and then the dog is eligible for entry in the same class. The exceptions to this titling rule are Grad Novice, Open, Grad Open, and Utility Obedience; and Rally Advanced/Excellent and Masters Rally. Rule 1 above, takes precedence over this rule.
4. No bitch in heat will be allowed to compete in any dog class. A Boulder County Fair Livestock Show & Rodeo veterinarian's decision on doubtful cases will be accepted as final.
5. Dog show officials can and will dismiss any entrant or their family from the show for any mistreatment of dogs entered in the show. If a question should arise as to what constitutes mistreatment, 4-H Staff and/or officials will meet to discuss appropriate action in each case. Dismissal from the show will result in the forfeiture of any awards.
6. Dogs 6 months of age or younger are not eligible to compete in Showmanship.
7. For Obedience, Rally, and Agility, the same dog may not compete in the same discipline more than once with more than one family member.

STATE 4-H DOG TRAILS

1. Refer to the Colorado State 4-H Dog Trials Requirements for contest rules governing the State Obedience, Rally and Showmanship contests and the State Agility contest.
2. After earning a qualifying score in Showmanship, Rally or Obedience competition at the Boulder County Fair, the exhibitor may be eligible to show at the State 4-H Dog Trials. Qualifying scores are 170 and above in Obedience and Showmanship and 70 and above in Rally. The top four qualifying scores in each class at county fair will have the first opportunity to show at the State 4-H Dog Trials. The next highest qualifying scores from County Fair will be considered for any remaining spots. If there are still spots available in a class after considering all County Fair qualifying scores, qualifying scores from 4-H fun matches or other dog shows may be considered for participation in the State 4-H Dog Trials at the discretion of the Superintendent. Exhibitors must provide proof of qualifying score to the project leader or superintendent prior to County Fair. Exhibitors with alternate qualifying scores will be selected for any remaining State Dog Trial slots in the order of the highest to lowest scores.
3. There are no limits on entries for the State Agility Contest.
4. Once scores from County Fair are made available, eligible exhibitors must notify the Dog Superintendent of their decision to participate in the State Dog Trials or the State Agility Contest, and which classes they will be entering.
5. The Team Rally competition at the State 4-H Dog Trials will be limited to 8 entries plus one alternate from Boulder County. The 8 exhibitors with the highest qualifying scores in the Intermediate or higher Rally classes **at County Fair** will be eligible to participate in the State Dog Trials Team Rally competition. The exhibitor with the 9th highest score will serve as an alternate

team member.

AWARDS:

Class placements awards and scoresheets will be available at the Awards Ceremony.

1. Ribbons will be awarded to the 1st - 5th place exhibitors in each of the Obedience, Showmanship and Rally **CLASSES**.
2. Depending on the number of entries, a Champion and Reserve Champion may be awarded in each **DIVISION** (*ie; Beginner Novice, Novice, Grad Novice, Advanced, Veterans*).
3. An Overall Champion and Reserve Champion will be awarded to the highest scoring exhibitors in each **DISCIPLINE** (Obedience, Rally and Showmanship). Dogs entered in the Puppy Class or Veterans Obedience are not eligible to compete for the Overall Obedience awards.
4. A **Dog** Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be awarded to the single dog and handler teams with the highest combined total qualifying score for Obedience, Showmanship and Rally. Exhibitors must participate in all three disciplines with the same dog in order to be eligible for this award. Exhibitors showing a single dog in this contest are not eligible for the Handler Grand or Reserve Grand Champion award. Dogs entered in the Puppy class or Veterans Division classes are not eligible to compete for the Dog Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion awards at County Fair.
5. A **Handler** Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be awarded to the exhibitors with the highest combined total qualifying score for Obedience, Showmanship and Rally. Exhibitors must show more than one dog in the contest and exhibitors must participate in all three disciplines. The exhibitor's highest score from any dog in each discipline will be used to compute the combined score. (Their top scores could come from different dogs or all from the same dog, but they must show more than one dog.) Exhibitors showing more than one dog in this contest are not eligible for the Dog Grand or Reserve Grand Champion award. Dogs entered in the Puppy class or Veterans Division classes are not eligible to compete for the Handler Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion awards at County Fair.
6. The top four qualifying scores in each class **at County Fair** are eligible to go to the State Dog Trials.
7. Unlimited State Dog Trials entries are available in Graduate Novice A/B, Open A/B, Grad Open A/B and Utility A/B Obedience, and Masters Rally A/B.
8. The Puppy Class and Masters Choice Class are not offered at the State Dog Trials.

Exhibitors who receive a qualifying score in the Masters Choice Rally class at County Fair are not eligible to compete in the Masters Rally class at the State Dog Trials.

9. The top two scorers in each Showmanship age group (Junior, Intermediate, Senior) may be eligible to participate in the Boulder County Fair Small Animal Round Robin contest. If any of the top two scorers in an age group decline to participate, the opportunity will be offered to the next highest scoring participant in that age group with a qualifying score. Exhibitors who have won Round Robin in previous years are only eligible to enter the Elite Showman class. See the Rules in Department 999 for more details.

CLASSES

1. All exhibitors participating in the **County Fair** Dog Contest are required to submit a reasonably complete Dog Record Book at check-in for the Dog Contest. Judges may use exhibitor's 4-H Dog Project Record Book as a tie breaker in any class.
2. The number of judging rings and number of class exhibitors will be determined by current Health Department restrictions.
3. All 4-H Obedience and Rally classes will be patterned after the latest AKC guidelines whenever possible, except that dog registry with AKC is not required. Please see the AKC website for details www.AKC.org. Some exercises and rules have been adapted from AKC to better serve the youth of this program.

OBEDIENCE CLASSES

Obedience exercises are patterned after the AKC guidelines wherever possible and are explained in the Dog Resource Handbook as well as the Colorado 4-H Dog Project Supplement available at <https://co4h.colostate.edu/projects/other/Dog-Obedience-Supplement.pdf>. You can also visit www.AKC.org for detailed explanations of the exercises. Some classes and exercises have been modified from AKC guidelines to better serve our 4-H youth. A qualifying score in Obedience will be 170 out of the possible 200 points. In all Obedience classes, up to 15 points will be deducted for the following: strong correcting or disciplining, excessive barking, leaving the ring, rules violation or showing fear. Fouling the ring will be a 15-point deduction and the member will be allowed to finish their run. For the safety of all, a dog that snaps, bites, or attempts to bite will be excused from the ring. The Puppy Class is offered at County Fair but will no longer be offered at the State Dog Trials.

A dog with an AKC Obedience title or a title from another national dog association is disqualified from entering the same obedience class for which that title was awarded or any lower class, except if that title was won less than four months before the State 4-H Dog Trials. The exceptions to this titling rule are Grad Novice, Open, Grad Open, and Utility Obedience.

BEGINNER NOVICE DIVISION

CLASS #509: Puppies

This class is for puppies OR older dogs that are not ready for regular obedience classes. The purpose of this class is to introduce obedience commands to a new dog without the stress of perfection seen in regular obedience classes. This class will allow the dog to participate in shows in a positive manner, thus setting the dog up for a lifetime of enjoyment in the show ring. Dog and handler teams are evaluated more on the handler's skill in training their dog and dealing with the animal's mistakes rather than on the skill of the animal when performing the exercises.

Food, treats, or toys ARE allowed in the puppy ring. Double commands will also be allowed.

This is a NO SCORE class. The score sheet will consist of Excellent, Good or Needs Improvement.

After one year of showing in the Puppy Class, the team moves into Pre-Beginner Novice A Obedience.

The dog and handler team in the Puppy class will be judged on the following:

1. Loose Lead Walking – Dog does not need to be in perfect heel position but should not be pulling the handler. The dog should be watching the handler and should be on the handler's left side. Handler should be able to get the dog's attention.
2. Sit for Exam – In this exercise the puppy is commanded to a Sit position. The judge will approach the dog and examine it. The purpose of this exercise is to teach the puppy to accept handling from a friendly stranger.
3. Recall – The handler will command the puppy to stay in a Sit position and will step in front of the dog. When the judge says "Call your dog," the handler will proceed to walk backward no more than six feet while calling the dog. The dog should get up and follow the handler in a happy manner. After the six foot distance has been reached, the handler will command the dog to sit.
4. Down Stay - The handler will put the dog in a Down position. When the judge says "Leave your dog," the handler will command the dog to Stay. The handler will walk to the end of the lead, pause, and then immediately walk around behind the dog and back to the heel position.
5. Serpentine Walking – The expectations are the same as for loose lead walking, with the addition of three "posts" as a distraction.

CLASS #510: Pre-Beginner Novice OBED A

This class is open only to handlers and their dogs in their first year of dog obedience training.

Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Pre-Beginner Novice A for one year. All exercises in this class are performed on leash. A 6-foot leash is required for this class. The exercises in this class have been modified from AKC guidelines to better meet the needs of 4-H youth.

CLASS #511: Pre-Beginner Novice OBED B

This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Pre-Beginner Novice A. Handlers with prior experience in Pre-Beginner or Beginner Novice Obedience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Pre- Beginner or Beginner Novice dog should also enter the B class. All exercises in this class are performed on-leash. A 6-foot leash is required for this class. The exercises in this class have been modified from AKC guidelines to better meet the needs of

4-H youth.

VETERANS DIVISION – Obedience Classes Only

The Veterans Obedience Division is an optional Division for any dog 7 years old or over who may no longer be able to jump the standard regulation height due to age, injury, joint issues, comfort, etc. Any dog 7 years or older may be entered in the Veterans Division. It is the choice of the handler, the

handler's parent, and the handler's trainer and veterinarian whether to exhibit a dog in a Veteran class. Veteran dogs will compete at the obedience level the handler chooses, from Novice up through Utility. All exercises are the same as for regular obedience classes except for the jump height. Veterans Division dogs will be allowed to jump ½ of their regulation jump height. They are required to perform all other exercises as in the regular class; jump height will be the only difference from the regular class. Once a Veteran dog can no longer jump at least ½ their regulation jump height they must be moved to a class that does not require jumping. A Veteran dog may change Obedience classes in either direction each year as their health determines. If a dog is entered as a Veteran during a project year, they may go back to regular Obedience classes the following year; however, they must go back to the level they would have been competing at before they moved to Veterans.

The Veterans classes and scoring adjustments are listed below:

Class 526: Novice Veterans: Judge's score

Class 527: Pre-Grad Novice Veterans: Judge's score plus 3 points

Class 528: Grad Novice Veterans: Judge's score plus 6 points

Class 529: Open Veterans: Judge's score plus 9 points

Class 530: Grad Open Veterans: Judge's score plus 12 points

Class 531: Utility Veterans: Judge's score plus 15 points

Dogs entered in the Veterans Division are not eligible to compete for the Overall Obedience or Grand/Reserve Grand Champion awards at County Fair. Veteran dogs will jump 1/2 the required height for their class. Refer to the chart below for the standard High or Bar Jump heights.

Obedience Jump Information

There are 3 types of jumps that may be used in Obedience classes: the Bar Jump, the High Jump and the Broad Jump. All dogs in regular (non Veterans) Obedience classes must jump their regulation height and width.

For the Broad Jump: The Broad Jump will cover a distance equal to twice the standard height of the High or Bar Jump setting for each dog. Veteran dogs will jump 1/2 the required width for their class and must use the correct number of boards for the width being jumped:

- *Four boards are used for widths of 48-72 inches
- *Three boards are used for widths of 28-44 inches
- *Two boards are used for widths of 16-24 inches
- *One board is used for a width of 8 inches.

SHOWMANSHIP CLASSES

Dogs under 6 months of age are not eligible to compete in Showmanship classes at County or the State Dog Trials.

Placement in Showmanship classes is based on the exhibitor's age, experience level and achievement at previous State Dog Trials. The experience level of the dog has no bearing on class placement.

A written test will be given to each exhibitor entered in a Showmanship class. The exhibitor is responsible for taking the test at the designated time. If the exhibitor does not take the test within the designated time, they will receive zero points for that portion of their showmanship score.

Exhibitors should be prepared to answer questions in the ring about the breed of their dog, the AKC group the breed belongs to, and the purpose of the breed or what the breed is used for. In the case of mixed breeds, the exhibitor must decide the breed the dog they are showing most resembles.

All exhibitors will present their dogs on either a table, ramp or on the floor, based on the breed of the dog or the breed the dog is most like. Judges and exhibitors should refer to the current Table and Ramp list to ensure they have up-to-date information. The Table and Ramp list can be found on the AKC Website at: (https://images.akc.org/pdf/judges/table_breeds.pdf) It is mandatory that breeds are shown on a table, ramp, or floor as assigned.

A qualifying score in Showmanship will be 170 points out of the possible 200 points. Class size will be determined by Health Department restrictions in place at the time of the show. During the Showmanship class each area of judging will be evaluated throughout the entire class. The score will reflect the handler's ability to perform these items throughout the class and not just at one time. For example: the dog should be stacked (either hand stacked or free stacked) upon entering the ring, during the exam, after the pattern, and any time they are in the line-up. The "set-up" score will

reflect all these times when the dog is stacked.

JUNIOR DIVISION

CLASS #500: Junior Novice This class is for exhibitors who are 8 –10 years old as of December 31 of the previous year, are in their 1st year of participation in Showmanship and with no prior experience with any other dog showing entity.

CLASS #501: Junior Open - This class is for exhibitors who are 8-10 years old as of December 31 of the previous year with previous experience in Showmanship, either with 4-H or with a national dog association.

INTERMEDIATE DIVISION

CLASS #502: Intermediate Novice - This class is for exhibitors who are 11-13 years old as of December 31 of the previous year, are in their 1st year of participation in Showmanship, and with no prior experience with any other dog showing entity.

CLASS #503: Intermediate Open - This class is for exhibitors who are 11-13 years old as of December 31 of the previous year with previous experience in Showmanship, either with 4-H or with a national dog association.

SENIOR DIVISION

CLASS #505: Senior Novice - This class is for participants who are 14-18 years old as of December 31 of the previous year, are in their 1st year of participation in Showmanship, and with no prior experience with any other dog showing entity.

CLASS #506: Senior Open - This class is for exhibitors who are 14-18 years old as of December 31 of the previous year with previous experience in Showmanship, either with 4-H or with a national dog association.

ADVANCED DIVISION

CLASS #504: Intermediate Advanced – This class is for experienced handlers who are 11-13 years of age as of December 31 of the previous year and who placed 1st through 10th at a previous State Dog Trial with a qualifying score in Intermediate Open Showmanship

CLASS #507: Senior Advanced - This class is for experienced handlers who are 14-18 years of age as of December 31 of the previous year and who placed 1st through 10th at a previous State Dog Trial with a qualifying score in Senior Open Showmanship.

CLASS #508: Master Showman - This class is only for Intermediate or Senior handlers who have placed as Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion Showman at a previous State 4-H Dog Trial.

At the judge's discretion, any exhibitor who has qualified to show in the Master Showman class at the State Dog Trials may compete along with the Senior Advanced class at the Boulder County Fair, but will be judged at a higher level (fewer expected errors) than other exhibitors in the Senior Advanced class.

Pee-Wee Showmanship – This is a fun class open to youth aged 5-8 years old. Pee Wee Showmanship will follow completion of the Master Showmanship Class. Participants will use a stuffed animal of their own choosing to demonstrate knowledge about dogs and about showmanship handling skills. Participants will enter the ring with their animal and follow the judge's instructions for ring patterns and procedures, and demonstrate knowledge of dog external anatomy and body parts.

RALLY OBEDIENCE

All 4-H Rally classes will be patterned after the latest AKC Obedience guidelines whenever possible, except that dog registry with AKC is not required. Some exercises and rules may have been adapted from AKC to better serve the exhibitors of this program. A qualifying score in Rally is 70 out of the 100 possible points.

1. Prior to the start of each class, a 10-to-15-minute walk through (without dogs) is allowed for the handlers to familiarize themselves with the course pattern. Only during this time, handlers may ask the judge to clarify or answer any questions about the Rally signs or the Rally course.
2. The only training equipment allowed in the Rally ring is a slip, chain, flat buckle or clip collar without tags and a nylon or leather leash. No halties, gentle leaders, slip leads, harnesses or pinch collars are allowed.
3. The judge will tell the handler when to begin the Rally course. The dog and handler will proceed at their own pace through a course of designated stations.
4. Unlimited communication from the handler to the dog is encouraged. Multiple commands and/or signals using one or both arms are allowed. Arms and hands do not need to be maintained in any particular position at any time. The handler may not touch the dog or make any physical corrections any time. Exhibitors in the Excellent and higher Rally levels may not pat their legs or clap their hands to encourage their dog. Loud or harsh commands or intimidating signals will be penalized.
5. There should be a sense of teamwork between the handler and the dog.
6. Times will be recorded, but not posted. Times may only be used to break ties.
7. Handlers may enter more than one dog in the same Rally class.
8. In all classes a 15-point deduction will be administered in the Rally classes for the following: strong correcting, disciplining, excessive barking, fouling the ring, consistently tight lead, knocking over a jump, or a sign not attempted by a handler.
9. For the safety of all, a dog that snaps, bites, or attempts to bite will be excused from the ring.

11. There are no Rally classes for Veteran dogs. All dogs must be able to jump required heights and perform the required items.
12. All jump heights will conform with current (January 2021) AKC Rally height and broad jump

recommendations. The standard AKC jump requirements for Rally are as follows:

With the exception of Rally Master and Masters Choice classes, a dog and handler team with any other Rally title from any national dog association (AKC, UKC, CKC, ASCA, etc.) is disqualified from entering the class for which the degree was awarded, or any lower class, except if that title was won less than four months before the State 4-H Dog Trials. Please refer to the Dog Eligibility Rules for more information.

“A” level classes are limited to exhibitors with no prior experience showing a dog in that class. Exhibitors showing a new dog must enter the “B” level if they ever received a qualifying score in that class with any other dog.

RALLY NOVICE DIVISION

CLASS #532: Rally Novice A

This class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Rally Novice training with no prior experience in Rally Novice Dog training. A handler may only compete in Rally Novice A for one year. All exercises are performed on leash. There are no jumps in this class.

CLASS #533: Rally Novice B

This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Novice A. Handlers with prior Rally Novice experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Rally Novice dog should also enter the B class. All exercises are performed on leash. There are no jumps in this class.

RALLY INTERMEDIATE DIVISION

CLASS #534: Rally Intermediate A

This class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Rally Intermediate training with no prior experience in Rally Intermediate Dog training. A handler may only compete in Rally Intermediate A for one year. All exercises are performed on leash. There are no jumps in this class.

CLASS #535: Rally Intermediate B

This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Intermediate A. Handlers with prior Rally Intermediate experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers

showing an experienced Rally Intermediate dog should also enter the B class. All exercises are performed on leash. There are no jumps in this class.

RALLY ADVANCED DIVISION

CLASS #536: Rally Advanced A

This class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Rally Advanced training with no prior experience in Rally Advanced Dog training. All exercises are performed off leash. Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Rally Advanced A for one year. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. The Advanced Rally course may include one jump.

CLASS #537: Rally Advanced B

This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Advanced A. Handlers with prior Rally Advanced experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Rally Advanced dog should also enter the B class. All exercises are performed off leash. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. The Advanced Rally course may include one jump.

RALLY EXCELLENT DIVISION

CLASS #538: Rally Excellent A

This class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Rally Excellent training with no prior experience in Rally Excellent dog training. Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Rally Excellent A for one year. All exercises are performed off leash. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. The Excellent Rally course may include two jumps.

CLASS #539: Rally Excellent B

This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Excellent A. Handlers with prior Rally Excellent experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Rally Excellent dog should also enter the B class. All exercises are performed off leash. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. The Excellent Rally course may include two jumps.

RALLY RAE DIVISION

CLASS #540: Rally Advanced/Excellent A (RAE-A)

This class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Rally Advanced/Excellent training with no prior experience in Rally Advanced/Excellent Dog training. Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Rally Advanced/Excellent A for one year. All exercises are performed off leash. Handlers must receive a qualifying score in BOTH the Rally Advanced course and the Rally Excellent course at the same dog trial in order to receive a qualifying score in RAE.

CLASS #541: Rally Advanced/Excellent B (RAE-B)

This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally

Advanced/Excellent A. Handlers with prior Rally Advanced/Excellent experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Rally Novice Advanced/Excellent dog should also enter the B class. All exercises are performed off leash. Handlers must receive a qualifying score in BOTH the Rally Advanced course and the Rally Excellent course at the same dog trial in order to receive a qualifying score in RAE.

RALLY MASTERS DIVISION

CLASS 542: Masters Rally A

The Masters Rally A class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Rally Masters training with no prior experience in Rally Masters Dog training. Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Masters Rally A for one year. All exercises are performed off leash and courses may have 1 jump. There are no retries for any of the signs on the Rally Master course.

CLASS 543: Masters Rally B

This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Masters A. Handlers with prior Rally Masters experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Rally Masters dog should also enter the B class. Exhibitor and dog teams may continue to compete in this class for their remaining years in the program regardless of whether they have received a qualifying score or received a Masters Rally title from a national dog association. All exercises are performed off leash and courses may have 1 jump. There are no retries for any of the signs on the Rally Master

CLASS 600: Masters Choice Rally A – This class is the same as the Masters Rally class except there are no jumps. This class is NOT offered at the State Dog Trials and exhibitors who receive a qualifying score in this class are NOT eligible to compete in Masters Rally at the State Dog Trials. The Masters Choice Rally A class is open to exhibitors in their 1st year of Rally Masters Choice training with no prior experience in Rally Masters Choice Dog training. Exhibitors and dogs may only compete in Masters Choice Rally A for one year. All exercises are performed off leash and courses have no jumps. There are no retries for any of the signs on the Rally Masters Choice course.

CLASS 601: Masters Choice Rally B -- This class is the same as the Masters Rally class except there are no jumps. This class is NOT offered at the State Dog Trials and exhibitors who receive a qualifying score in this class are NOT eligible to compete in Masters Rally at the State Dog Trials. This class is open to exhibitors and dogs who did not earn a qualifying score in Rally Masters Choice A. Handlers with prior Rally Masters Choice experience who are showing a new dog, or new handlers showing an experienced Rally Masters Choice dog should also enter the B class. Exhibitor and dog teams may continue to compete in this class for their remaining years in the program regardless of whether they have received a qualifying score or received a Masters Choice Rally title from a national dog association. All exercises are performed off leash and courses have no jumps. There are no retries for any of the signs on the Rally Master course.

Class #544: Team Rally

Team Rally is a non-entry class for the Boulder County Dog Contest. Two teams consisting of 4

members and 4 dogs each will be assembled by the Superintendent to compete in Team Rally at the State Dog Trials in the following manner. The 8 exhibitors with the highest qualifying scores in the Intermediate or higher level Rally classes at County Fair will have the first opportunity to participate in the State Dog Trials Team Rally competition. The exhibitor with the 9th highest score will serve as an alternate team member. If there are not enough qualifiers to complete two teams plus an alternate, the 4-H Dog Superintendent may select exhibitors with previous experience in Intermediate or higher Rally to fill any openings.

FUN CONTESTS

These contests will be open to all exhibitors and will be held after completion of the regular classes. Dogs must have been entered in the County Fair Dog Show to compete. No pre-entry is required for these contests; sign up is during check-in.

Costume Contest – This optional contest will consist of dogs in costume. Costumes can include the handler and can be funny, serious, educational, etc. Contestants will be judged based on creativity. Prizes will be awarded to 1st through 5th place winners.

Best Trick Contest - This optional contest will consist of the exhibitor showing their dog's best trick or task. The contest will be judged based on originality & and degree of difficulty. Prizes will be awarded to 1st through 5th place winners.

DOG AGILITY CONTEST RULES

The Boulder County Fair Dog Agility Contest will generally follow the equipment, classes and procedural requirements in the State 4-H Dog Agility Rules found at <https://co4h.colostate.edu/statefair/Dog.pdf>

However, for the health and safety of all participating dogs, Boulder County 4-H will follow the jump height requirements developed for Junior handlers and Veteran Dogs competing in NADAC events. These jump heights are lower than the heights required by AKC and the State Agility Contest and **will not qualify a dog and handler team for the State competition**. Handlers would like to compete at the State Agility Contest may request permission from the Dog Superintendent to perform one extra run at the County Fair Agility Contest to jump at the higher AKC heights.

General Agility Rules:

1. Dogs must be a minimum of 12 months old to compete in the Pre-Foundation and Foundation Jumpers classes. Dogs must be a minimum of 15 months old to compete in all other Jumpers agility classes.
2. The Pre-Foundation class is a no-score, non-regular class that is performed ON LEASH. All other Agility classes are performed off-leash and dogs must be under control in order to compete in the regular Agility Contest. Regular Agility dogs and handlers must pass an **Off-Leash Heeling Pre-Test** prior to participating in the Contest. Dogs must always be on a leash outside the ring except when performing exercises off leash at the warm-up area in Agility.

3. No dog may participate with a physical or mental condition that would significantly impair their performance. Some examples of these include (but are not limited to) hip dysplasia, disc problems, severely slipped stifles, shoulder problems, overweight, or advancing age. A judge, Dog Superintendent or County 4-H dog agility trainer will have the authority to stop the performance of any dog whose soundness is in question.
4. Dogs that show signs of aggression toward humans or other dogs will not be permitted to participate.
5. Female dogs in season are not permitted to participate.
6. Handlers may not touch their dogs or an obstacle while running the course. Incidental contact that does not aid the dog on the course will not be penalized.
7. Poor sportsmanship will not be tolerated. Any handler exhibiting poor sportsmanship such as swearing, yelling at their dog, striking the dog, pulling on their dog's fur or body parts, excessive corrections, loud complaints about other exhibitors or the judge, etc., will be eliminated.
8. The judge will penalize any handler receiving outside assistance.
9. A dog unable to complete the course for any reason including leaving the ring and not immediately returning in control to the handler or ceasing to work for a significant period of time will receive an elimination.
10. Handlers may use voice commands, signals, or both. Handlers are encouraged to talk or cheer their dogs through the course. There is no penalty for multiple commands or verbal encouragement, but all must be in the spirit of good sportsmanship.
11. Any dog fouling the ring during competition will be asked to leave the ring - receiving a disqualification for that one run.
12. Course walk through will be 5-7 minutes which is done without dogs. A 2-minute warning will be provided so the first handler can get their dog during the walking of the course. Judges will have discretion whether or not to allow additional walk through times.
13. Training aids and treats are not permitted on the course at a trial.
14. In all regular Agility classes, collars must be a flat buckle or rolled leather collar, with no attachments except for a 4"-6" tab (optional in Foundation and Novice, not allowed in Advanced and Intermediate). Pinch/prong and electrical collars, head halters and special training collars are not allowed.
15. Dogs may be brought to the start line on slip leads, slip chains, body harnesses or other collars.
16. Handlers may not jump over the jumps with their dogs.

AGILITY WAIVER

All parents/guardians and members must sign the "4-H Dog Agility Release Form" about injury to dog and handler to participate in classes, shows, and demonstrations. The Waiver can be found at <https://co4h.colostate.edu/statefair/Dog-Agility-Waiver.pdf>

HEIGHT CARDS

All handlers must possess an official Colorado State 4-H Dog Project Agility Height Card for the dog entered in the competition, signed by the measuring authority. Note that two separate measurements and two signatures are required. Official height cards from outside agility venues will also be accepted. Dogs may be measured by judge or show personnel at the State Agility Competition to receive a height card. The Height Card can be found on page 36 of the State Agility Rules <http://co4h.colostate.edu/statefair/score-sheets/Agility-rules.pdf>

OFF-LEASH HEELING PRE-TEST

Since all regular Agility classes are performed off-leash, it is important that ALL dog/handler teams demonstrate **control** prior to competition. In order to determine that your dog is under control, an Off-Leash Heeling Pre-Test will be given to ALL dog/handler teams entered in the Jumpers classes. If you fail this Pre-Test, you will not be allowed to compete. This Pre-Test does not require perfect heeling, but will evaluate overall off-leash **control** of the dog.

VETERAN CLASSES

NADAC requires the same jump heights for both Junior Handlers and Veteran dogs. All dogs participating in the County Fair Agility Contest, **regardless of age or ability**, will jump the **same heights**, and should enter the **regular agility classes** for County Fair.

Dog and handler teams approved by the County Dog Superintendent to compete in the State Agility Contest are eligible to enter **Veteran classes** if the dog is 7 years of age and older, or has minor physical disabilities (such as minor hip dysplasia). Those dogs will be permitted to jump at a lower jump height than the standard agility jump height (Preferred Jump Height) at the State Contest. **Handler and dog teams approved to compete at the State Agility Contest should enter BOTH the regular and Veteran class for County Fair.**

AGILITY AWARDS

A perfect score is 100 points and is called a "Clean Run". All scores 70 and above are considered qualifying and are eligible for placement awards.

1. Each dog and handler team competing in the Agility Contest will be allowed three runs and the single highest score will be used to determine award placement.
2. Ties **within each regular Agility class** will be broken by subtracting the Actual Course Time (CT) from the Standard Course Time (SCT). The larger (positive) difference will win the tie.
3. Ribbons will be awarded to the 1st - 5th place exhibitors in each of the regular Agility classes. No placement awards will be awarded for non-qualifying scores or for the Pre-Foundation Agility Class.
3. One Champion and one Reserve Champion rosette ribbon will be awarded in all regular Agility classes. **There is no Overall Champion award for Agility.** **If there is a tie between two exhibitors for Champion or Reserve Champion, the tiebreaker procedure described in the State Agility Rules will be used, and the team with the lower time will win.** **Because the higher level classes include longer**

courses with more obstacles, scoring for those classes will be adjusted in the following manner to ensure equity when determining the Overall Agility Champion and Reserve Champion:

- Foundation Jumpers Class: No score adjustment
- Novice Jumpers Class: 0.5 point addition to Judge's score
- Intermediate Jumpers Class: 0.75 point addition to Judge's score
- Advanced Jumpers Class: 1.0 point addition to Judge's score

Because taller dogs generally have a speed advantage over smaller dogs, the State Agility Rules provide that ties will be broken by subtracting the Actual Course Time (CT) from the Maximum Course Time (MCT). This procedure gives an equalized time difference to more fairly break ties between classes and jump heights. The larger (positive) difference will win the tie.

CLASS DESCRIPTIONS

CLASS 603: Pre-Foundation Jumpers without Weaves **(Regular & Veteran class) (Not offered at the State Contest)**

This class is open to dog and handler teams in Beginner Novice Dog Obedience or higher level training who are not ready for regular agility classes. This will be a **NO SCORE CLASS**. This class is **NOT** available at the State 4-H Dog Trials. All Dogs must be shown **ON LEASH**. The use of an approved collar and tab is optional. Each participant will be allowed two runs through the course and will receive a special ribbon.

The Pre-Foundation class will be a simple course with a basic "S", or "U" shape consisting of 8 to 10 obstacles.

- Bar Jumps (Winged or Wingless) (5 to 9) (required)
- Open Tunnel (1 to 3) (required)

The **Foundation Class** is open to dog and handler teams in their first year of Agility training and **this class has a fewer number of obstacles than the Novice class**. Participants may also choose to enter a higher level Agility class in their first year provided they pass the Heeling Pre-Test. **Dogs competing in the Foundation class may jump a lower jump height (Preferred Jump Height) than regular Agility classes.**

The Foundation level course will be a simple course with a basic "S", or "U" shape and will consist of 8-10 obstacles. The following obstacles are used:

- Bar jumps (winged or wingless) (5-9) (required)
- Open Tunnel (1 to 3) (required)

Time will be used to break ties for Champion and Reserve Champion awards.

All dogs must be shown off leash. The use of an approved collar and tab is optional.

Class #558 - Novice - Jumpers without Weaves - Regular

Class #559 – Novice Jumpers Without Weaves - Veteran (for State Contest entry only)

The Novice level classes are recommended for participants and dogs with some prior Agility training, however, experience is not required. All dogs entered in these classes must pass the required Heeling Pre-Test. **Dogs competing in the Veteran class at the State Contest will jump at a lower jump height (Preferred Jump Height).** The Novice level course will be a simple course. Angles between obstacles should not exceed 90 degrees. Entrances to obstacles should never be adjacent to one another. The course is to consist of 10 to 14 obstacles. The following obstacles are used:

- Bar Jumps (winged or wingless) (6-11) (required)
- Open Tunnel (1 to 3) (required)
- Broad Jump (optional)

Dogs competing in the Veteran class at the State Contest will jump at a lower jump height (Preferred Jump Height).

Time will be used to break ties for Champion and Reserve Champion awards.

All dogs must be shown off leash. The use of an approved collar and tab is optional.

Class #560 - Intermediate - Jumpers Without Weaves – Regular

Class #561 – Intermediate – Jumpers Without Weaves- Veteran (for State Contest entry only)

The Intermediate level classes are recommended for participants and dogs with some prior Agility experience, however, experience is not required. All dogs entered in these classes must pass the required Heeling Pre-Test. **Dogs competing in the Veteran class will jump at a lower jump height (Preferred Jump Height).** The Intermediate level course is to consist of 14 to 16 obstacles. The following obstacles are used:

- Bar Jumps (winged or wingless) (7-13) (required)
- Open Tunnel (1 to 3) (required)
- Broad Jump (1) OR Double Jump (1) (required)
- Tire Jump (1) (optional)

Dogs competing in the Veteran class at the State Agility Contest will jump at a lower jump height (Preferred Jump Height).

Time will be used to break ties for Champion and Reserve Champion awards.

All dogs must be shown off leash. The use of an approved collar is optional.

Class 562 and 563 will not be offered in Boulder County at this time.

Class #562 - Advanced - Jumpers Without Weaves - Regular

Class #563 - Advanced - Jumpers Without Weaves – Veteran (for State Contest entry only)

The Advanced level classes are recommended for participants and dogs with some prior Agility experience, however, experience is not required. All dogs entered in these classes must pass the required Heeling Pre-Test. Dogs competing in the Veteran class will jump at a lower jump height (Preferred Jump Height). The Advanced level course is to consist of 16 to 18 obstacles. The following obstacles are used:

- Bar Jumps (winged or wingless) (9-16) (required)
- Double Bar Jump (required)
- Triple Bar Jump (required)
- Open Tunnel (1 to 3) (required)
- Broad jump (optional)
- Tire Jump (optional)

Time will be used to break ties for Champion and Reserve Champion awards.

All dogs must be shown off leash. The use of an approved collar is optional.

JUMP HEIGHTS

For the health and safety of all participating dogs, Boulder County 4-H will follow the jump height requirements developed for Junior handlers and Veteran Dogs competing in NADAC events. These jump heights are lower than the heights required by AKC and the State Agility Contest. With the permission of the Dog Superintendent, experienced handlers may use one of their three runs at the County Fair Agility Contest to jump at the higher AKC heights in order to qualify to compete at the State Agility Contest.

This department is subject to all BCF General Rules, General Exhibitor Rules and all Junior Exhibitor Livestock and Animal Division Rules in addition to those listed for the department.

GENERAL:

1. No dogs are allowed in the cat area.
2. All cats are subject to the animal health inspection before being allowed in barn area and cages. There is no charge for health inspection.
3. Exhibitors must provide all supplies for their cats including cages and bedding. Exhibitors are responsible for caring for their own cats and/or equipment, and cleaning of their cages and surrounding areas daily.
4. No cats less than 8 weeks of age are allowed at the fair.

ELIGIBILITY:

1. Members must be enrolled in the 4-H Cat Project.
2. The member must own his/her project cat individually or in partnership with immediate family members or guardians during the complete duration of the project year. No leased cats will be allowed to show at Fair. If requested the member must have proof of ownership of the cat at the time of entry and provide that to the superintendents. The member must provide the majority of care for the cat(s). If you have a kitten born after the deadline, please show proof you own the mother.
3. An acceptable record book must be done and meet all guidelines required by Boulder County for Fair qualification.
4. The exhibitor must own all cats entered in this department by the last Thursday in April of the current year.

5. All 4-H Cat ID Forms (including health certificates) are to be on 4-H Online by the last Thursday in April. Dates of approved current and effective vaccination of the cat for rabies and FVRCP (feline viral rhinotracheitis, calicivirus and panleukopenia/distemper) must be provided on the 4-H Cat ID Form. It is highly recommended that you have your cat(s) tested and vaccinated for Feline Leukemia and Feline Immunodeficiency Virus. While this is not mandatory, it is recommended for the health of your cat. If you have a cat that has tested positive for FELV and/or FIN, please alert the show superintendent so that appropriate precautions can be taken. A rabies vaccination is federally mandated to be given by a veterinarian ONLY. This vaccination must be current and include a veterinarian's signature.
6. Proof of Rabies vaccination must come from a licensed veterinarian, or the cat is not legally considered vaccinated. If the member's cat receives rabies immunizations which are given by anyone who is not a Colorado State licensed veterinarian, these immunizations will not be recognized by law should the cat bite someone.
7. It is recommended that all 4-H cats, other than pedigreed breeding animals, be neutered or spayed.
8. No obviously pregnant or lactating queens will be allowed to compete in any classes at the State Fair.
9. All cats must have their front and rear claws clipped for the safety of the 4-Her and judge.
10. Cats cannot be brought into the fairgrounds unless entered and shown in respective classes.

CLASSIFICATION:

1. This is not a sanctioned show but will be judged to CFA standards at judges' discretion.
2. Order of the judging class will be determined by the judge and posted the day of show.
3. At the decision of the superintendent, like classes (breeds) will be combined for judging, making comparable size classes. Order of the judging will be posted near the judging area.

JUDGING:

1. Each exhibitor is allowed a maximum of 2 cats.
2. After check-in and vet check, cats must remain in the cat area of Barn A until cleared for checkout. All cages and barn areas must be clean before obtaining approval for release from the superintendent that they can leave the building. Exhibitors found leaving early with their cats will have all premiums withheld. We will not be held responsible for any cats left after check-out. (In the event an exhibitor sells a cat, the same rules apply to the new owner, and the exhibitor will be held responsible).

PREMIUMS:

1. Premiums will be paid by check and/or cash and will either be available for pick up or mailed out after the fair. Superintendents have the right to use their discretion to hold or refuse prize money.

GENERAL:

1. Goats will arrive on **Monday, August 6th between 5:00 pm and 7:00 pm** and will be housed in Barn A.
2. Milkout will be at 4:00pm the evening before the show. ***All does in milk must be checked.***
3. Exhibitors are required to dress in white in the show ring.
4. Classes may be combined or divided, and class order may be changed at the discretion of the Superintendent and/or the judge.
5. The All-Goat Costume class will be held **Wednesday, August 6th at 5:30 pm.**
6. Record books—Exhibitors record books must be completed to date and available for display. There must be records on each animal shown.
8. Barn A will be closed daily, to the public and exhibitors, from 9:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. for the safety and welfare of livestock and exhibitors while at the fair.

ELIGIBILITY:

1. Only exhibitors enrolled in the 4-H Dairy Goat Project are eligible to enter classes under Dept. 500.

2. Each individual goat may only be used as a project goat in one project. For instance, if an exhibitor owns two dairy goats, he/she can show one as his/her dairy goat project goat and one as his/her utility goat project goat, but the same goat cannot be entered in both departments.
3. Registration in breed associations of animals is not required; goats will be shown in breed class most closely representing breed type.
4. All goats must have an official USDA Scrapie Eradication Program Identification tag with the following exception: Registered goats may use a legible registration tattoo or microchip (EIDs) with registration papers in place of the scrapies tag. Registration papers must be provided for verification. Illegible tattoos or non-readable microchips must be replaced with a scrapies tag.
5. **NEW IN 2025: No more than 3 entries per exhibitor in each class. Note: Some classes have other limits.**
6. Dairy goats must be identified using the **Animal Identification Procedures** and uploaded to **4-HOnline enrollment** or through an **FFA advisor** by the last **Thursday of April** each year. This information must be on file at the **Boulder County Extension Office** by the posted deadline. By submitting animal IDs, members confirm **ownership or participation in a Lease-An-Animal 4-H project** and acknowledge they have the **primary care responsibilities**.

Important Notes:

- **Animal Identification does not replace fair class entry; both are required.**
- **For kid goats born after April 24th:**
 - Members must submit a **hard copy animal ID form** with updates to the **Extension Office and FFA advisor (if applicable)** as they are completed.
 - All animals intended for showing must have forms submitted **by July 7th**.
 - **NEW: Members do not need to own the dam** of goats born after April 24th. However, they **must have identified other goats as project animals before April 24th.**
 - Added kid goats **must be born after April 24th and can only be added to the project the member was previously enrolled in and had animals identified under.**
 - Members **may purchase new kid goats(born after April 24th) until July 7th** to show at the Boulder County Fair.

Example: A 4-H member is enrolled in dairy goats and has Daisy and Daffodil as their 4-H dairy goats. The 4-H member did proper animal identification on Daisy and Daffodil by the last Thursday in April. The 4-H member purchases a new kid goat named Easter who was born on May 10th. The member completes an animal ID form and submits it to the Extension office before July 7th. The 4-H member would not be eligible to put Easter kid goat in the utility goat project because they were not enrolled in that project with other animals before the last Thursday in April.

The intention of this rule change is to increase the number of kid goats shown at the Boulder County Fair as project animals. As most kid goats are born in the spring, this gives more opportunity for members to obtain new animals while they are young.

Dairy Goats entered in the Boulder County Fair must have been previously identified by the last

Thursday of April of the current year using the species Animal Identification Procedures and uploaded on 4-H Online enrollment or through their FFA advisor. This must be on file at the Boulder County Extension Office by the posted deadlines each year. By submitting the animal IDs, the member is declaring they have ownership of the animal and are providing primary care of their project or is an official Lease-An-Animal 4-H project. The Animal Identification process does not replace the online entry of fair classes, however, is in addition to the entry. The only exception is for babies born after April 24th. in which case the dam must have been owned by the exhibitor by April 25th. See Rule 5a.

a. For dairy animals born after April 24th, the member will need to provide a hard copy printed animal identification form with updates to the Extension office and FFA advisor (if enrolled in FFA) as they are completed. All animals planned to be shown at the Boulder County Fair must have forms completed and turned in prior to July 7th. NEW THIS YEAR: Members are not required to own the dam of the babies born after the April 24th deadline. The members must own the dam as of April 25th, of the current year and listed as their project animal on the animal identification form provided by April 25th. Members adding baby goats after April 24th must have previously identified other goats as their project animals prior to April 24th. As long as you have those animals you are caring for, you are eligible to purchase new baby goats for your project throughout the year.

7. All animals must be disbudded or dehorned.

7. The senior doe winning “Best in Show” from previous Boulder County Dairy Goat Show will not be allowed to show in any regular breed classes, but may still show in milk contest, group classes, showmanship and to challenge the Best in Show Senior Doe from current show.

REGULATIONS:

1. This is not an official ADGA show, but ADGA rules are applicable for the Dairy Goat division.

PREMIUMS:

Superintendents have the right to use their discretion to hold or refuse prize money.

Minimum Weight – 60 lbs.
Maximum Weight – 115 lbs.

Market Goat Rate of Gain Requirements:

The minimum weight of gain is an average of 0.13 lbs. per day. Rate of Gain is calculated by subtracting the initial tag in weight from the final weight in weight.

This department is subject to all BCF General Rules, General Exhibitor Rules and all Junior Exhibitor Livestock and Animal Division Rules in addition to those listed for the department.

GENERAL:

1. Pens will be assigned and available for bedding on Sunday evening, **but no goats may be stalled before being checked in, with your up-to-date record book in hand (printed)**. Each animal must have a sign-designating name of animal, ownership, and club by 5:00 p.m. on the day following check-in.
2. **All market goats must be shown with a collar or halter. No pinch or prong collars are allowed. Muzzles can be used in the pens as long as the animal can drink.**
3. All market goats must be shown by the exhibitor that they are registered to as established by animal ID weigh in during May.

4. Animals will be judged for structural correctness and quality conformation as well as meatiness throughout with no excess fat.
5. All market goats must be slick shorn. Everything above the knees and hocks must be 3/8" of hair or less, except tail tip and legs from hocks to hooves.
6. Altering the natural color of the animal using any artificial coloring is not allowed. However, products that match the animal's natural color may be used in the fitting process from the knees and hocks down and on the tail only. (For example, black products may be used on black- legged goats, red on a red-legged goats, and white on a white legged goat). Any grooming material on any other part of the body not mentioned (artificial color evidenced by rubbing with a cloth or glove) will not be permitted.
7. Bracing is allowed in the market classes.
8. Exhibitors must be enrolled in the Market or Breeding projects, (Departments 550 or 525) to participate in Goat Showmanship. This class will proceed in the following age group order: Seniors, Intermediates, Juniors. **TO ENTER GO TO DEPARTMENT 1000, SHOWMANSHIP DEPARTMENT**
9. Barns A pens will be closed daily, to the public and exhibitors, from 9:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. This for the safety and welfare of livestock and exhibitors while at the fair.
10. Meat goats (both market and breeding) may be shown with or without horns. Horned pygmies, Boers, and market goats shall have their horn tips tipped or taped for the exhibitors' safety. It is recommended that their horns be "tipped" (trimmed of sharp points) for the showman's safety.

CLASSIFICATION:

1. Classes will be broken by weight.
2. There will be 3 weight divisions: Light, Medium, and Heavy weights. There will also be a local owned and bred market class. A Champion and Reserve will come from each weight division and one from the local owned and bred market class. The overall Grand Champion will be chosen from the champions of the three (3) weight classes and local owned and bred champion (i.e., four champion market goats). Once a Grand Champion Market Goat is selected, the reserve champion from that class will then be judged along with the other champions for the Reserve Grand Champion Market Goat. For example, if the lightweight champion is selected as the Grand Champion, the reserve lightweight champion would then be judged along with the other champions to determine which goat would be the Reserve Grand Champion.

ELIGIBILITY:

1. To be eligible to show in the Jr. Market Goat Show at the Boulder County Fair all exhibitors must be enrolled in the 4-H or FFA Market Goat Project.
2. All market wethers or does shown and milk teeth must be in place (under 1 yr. of age).
3. **All male goats in the market show MUST BE banded or castrated by the market goat tag in date.**
4. **All does in the market show must have scrapie tags in place by the market goat tag in date.**
5. Market goats must be dehorned or have horns "tipped."
6. Market goats that are not above the minimum weight requirement will fall into the feeder class

and are not eligible for the carcass contest, Champion classes, rate of gain awards or the Jr. Market Sale.

7. Market goats that are over the maximum weight requirement or do not make the minimum average daily gain will show in the NMR (Not Meeting Requirements) class only and are not eligible for the champion classes, rate of gain awards or the Jr. Market Sale.

8. The following must be completed to sell at the Junior Market Sale:

The USDA Wholesome Meat Act form and Livestock Sale Intent form are to be signed by exhibitor and parent. Please see sale rules for other specifics for participation this year. **Forms will be electronic.**

9. Absolutely NO BUCKS allowed on premises.

LOCAL OWNED & BRED

1. To be eligible to enter the Local Owned & Bred market classes, members must raise and kid their own wether or doe. To demonstrate that the goat is Local Owned & Bred, you must provide a scrapies tag number that is registered to the 4-H member's address. You must also provide the scrapies tag number of the dam. This information will need to be provided at tag-in.
2. **Members must declare which goats will be entered in the Local Owned & Bred classes at the mandatory identification tag in in May tag in on the first Monday of May.**
3. When members enter their goat for fair, they must indicate whether they want the specific animal, with the Boulder County ear tag and scrapies tag numbers, to be entered into the Local Owned & Bred market class.

Superintendents have the right to use their discretion to hold or refuse prize money.

SEE BREED CLASSIFICATIONS BELOW
3. Premise ID must be recorded at the Extension Office prior to check in.
4. All breeding sheep must have a scrapie tag.
5. **Absolutely no Rams allowed on premise.**

CLASSIFICATION:

1. Breeding classes consist of pure-bred and non-registered crossbred sheep and must bear the proper breed classification for the class.
2. Sheep entered in lamb class must have all lamb teeth in place.
3. Combination of Breed classes is based on previous year's entries.

1. No health certificates will be required prior to the Fair. **A Vet will be in the barn at check in.**
2. Exhibitors MUST be present when their lambs are weighed in.
 - Any exceptions must have the pre-approval of the Sheep Superintendent
3. One weigh-in will be allowed Weigh in Rules:
 - All market lambs will be weighed-in without blankets or halters.
 - Lambs must be dry and have less than ¼" of wool.
 - If a lamb is under the Minimum Weight they can re-weigh ONE more time, immediately taken off the scale and returned to scale for re-weigh.
 - Underweight lambs can be used for showmanship.
 - Market lambs that are classified as under Minimum Weight will enter the Feeder class

and are not eligible for advanced awards(champions/reserves), or to show for Champion Market Lamb. Underweight lambs are not eligible for the Jr. Livestock Sale event.

4. Exhibitors should bring water and buckets so sheep can always have water.
5. Exhibitors may use meshed or plastic muzzles, but the style MUST allow the animal to drink water.
6. Oral drenching will be allowed with drench guns. The use of stomach pumps is prohibited.
7. No icing, wet towels only
8. Animals may be exercised in the show ring and within the barn and wash rack area.
9. Any sheep taken outside of the barn to any other area will be disqualified.
10. Barns A & B will be closed daily to the public and exhibitors from 9 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. This for the safety and welfare of the livestock and equipment while at the fair.
11. Lambs must be shown slick shorn, including all areas above the neck/knee/hock and from the ears back.
12. Blocking stands and equipment are to be stored in tack pen
13. Sheep must always have water in their pens.
14. Bedding: shavings allowed. No dirt floors are allowed and will result in disqualification from the show.
15. Premiums will be paid by check from the fair office.

ELIGIBILITY:

1. Polled or small horns or scurs no more than 1.5 inches above the skin line.
2. Must have at least $\frac{1}{3}$ inch of hair primarily on the belly, forearm, and britch. Enough length of hair should be left to distinguish between hair and wool on each sheep. If the classifier cannot make a judgment to properly classify the sheep due to it being shorn too closely, the sheep will be moved to the Market Lamb show.
3. Moderate size ear with no wool covering.
4. No wool below the knees and hocks.
4. No wool forward of poll.

Unacceptable Standards:

1. Excessive wool covering more than $\frac{2}{3}$ of body (belly, forearm, and britch)
2. Long, pendulous ears.
3. Long, narrow muzzle.
4. Wool forward of poll.

Absolute Disqualifications:

1. All wool or very little evidence of hair on the belly, forearm, or britch.
2. Wool below the knees or hocks.

3. Wool on the ears.

1. Each 4-H or FFA member will provide their up-to-date record book during the check in process. Animals not listed in the record book will not be allowed to exhibit, at the Boulder County Fair. Members must do separate records for breeding project animals, even if the animals are shown in market and breeding.
2. All hogs must be inspected by fair veterinarian and superintendent during Swine Weigh-In.
3. All swine exhibited at the Boulder County Fair must originate in herds known not to be infected with pseudo rabies.

4. Hogs may be taken home following release time and after verification from the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent that your pens and sale pens are clean.
5. Barns A and B pens will be closed daily, to the public and exhibitors, from 9:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. This for the safety and welfare of livestock and exhibitors while at the fair.

ELIGIBILITY:

1. To be eligible to show in the Jr. Breeding Swine Show at the Boulder County Fair all exhibitors must be enrolled in the 4-H or FFA Breeding Swine Project.
2. Gilts that have been shown in breeding classes may be shown in market classes if a 4-H breeding and market record book has been completed by the exhibitor AND the exhibitor is enrolled in the Swine Breeding and Market Projects.
3. Weigh Classification (breeding gilts only) - Minimum Weight 175lbs - Maximum Weight 325
4. All Breeding swine must be farrowed after January 1, 2025. Verification will be required upon request.

NOTE: Classes are not guaranteed by breed. A minimum of 3-4 entries per class should be met to guarantee the class. Superintendent has the right to combine classes at their discretion as needed. Classes may be combined by using the following strategies (in no particular order):

- a. Combine all breed and ages together.
- b. Combine by age.
- c. Combine by weight.
- d. Combine by similar breed characteristics.

CLASSIFICATION: Breed characteristics are listed below, however classifier will default to the National Swine Registry Breed Characteristics and the Certified Pedigreed Swine association as well as specific breed registries not listed on one of the two previous websites.

Breed Marking Requirements for Breeding Gilts are as follows:

Duroc

1. Color marking shall be red.
2. Ears must be down and medium size.
3. Must not have any white hair located on the animal.
4. No more than three black spots, none over two inches in diameter on the body.
5. Must not have any shading or indication of a belt.
6. Must not have any black hair.

Hampshire

1. Must be black in color with a white belt starting on the front leg. The belt may partially or totally encircle the body. Animal is eligible if it has a black head, and the body is totally white.
2. Ears must be erect and not rounded
3. Must NOT have any white hair or indications of streaking on the forehead.
4. Must NOT have any red hair.

Yorkshire

1. Must be white in color and ears must be erect.
2. Must not have any colored hair other than white.
3. Must NOT have more than two pigmentation spots larger than a U.S. minted dime or one

pigmentation spot larger than a U.S. minted quarter.

4. Must not have any skin pigmentation when combined is larger than one U.S. minted silver dollar.

Chester White-

1. Must be solid white in color and no other color on the skin larger than a silver dollar.
2. Ears must be down and medium size.
3. Any signs of weighted ear tags or evidence of past existence of such ear tags are determined to be not permissible and are grounds for disqualification.

Berkshire

1. Must be black and white with erect ears.
2. Must have white on all four legs, face, and tail.
3. Must not have solid white or solid black face from the ears forward.
4. Must not have a solid black nose.
5. White is allowed on the ears, but no solid white may appear on the ears.
6. Berkshire must NOT have an area of white skin that exceeds 93.5 Square inches of contiguous solid white skin on the upper 2/3 of the body.
7. No white skin or hair that encircles the body between the base of the ear and base of the tail.

Spotted Swine

1. Must be black and white in color.
2. Ears must be down and reasonably sized.
3. Red or sandy brown spots are not allowed.
4. No solid black head from the ears forward.
5. Must not have any shading or indication of a belt.
6. No white belt pattern (hair or skin) that encompasses the back 1/3 of both shoulder blades and extends down to the foreleg of the animal. The belt pattern is not completely broken by black. Exception to this rule is a predominately white-bodied individual with a white face.

Landrace

1. Must be white in color with no other color on the body.
2. Ears must be down.
3. Must not have any more than three spots of skin pigmentation any of them larger than one U.S. minted quarter.

Hereford

1. Must be White Faced (at least 50%)
2. Must have down (At least broke Forward) ears.
2. Not less than two-thirds red exclusive of face and ears.
3. At least 2 white feet not showing less than 1 inch above the hoof.
4. Must be red (light or dark) in color. No white belt or partial belt.
5. No swirls

Tammworth

1. Must be Dark or golden red in color with erect ears.

2. Elongated snout.
3. No Swirls

Poland China

1. Must be Black with 6 white points (Face, Feet, and Tail).
2. Must not have more than one black leg.
3. Ears must be down.
4. Must not have evidence of a white belt or partial belt formation.
5. Cannot have red or sandy hair or pigment.
6. Occasional splash of white on body is permissible.

PREMIUMS:

Premium prize money will be awarded based on placements in each market swine class or breeding swine class. Superintendents have the right to use their discretion to hold or refuse prize money.

Breeding Swine will be classified by their breed first then divided by weight as needed.

This department is subject to all BCF General Rules, General Exhibitor Rules and all Junior Exhibitor Livestock and Animal Division Rules in addition to those listed for the department.

GENERAL:

1. **Each 4-H or FFA member will provide their up-to-date record book by 1:00 p.m. the day after check in.** Animals not listed in the record book will not be allowed to exhibit, at the Boulder County Fair.
2. **All hogs must be inspected by fair veterinarian and superintendent during Swine Weigh-In or during arrival on grounds.**
3. All swine exhibited at the Boulder County Fair must originate in herds known not to be infected with pseudo rabies.
4. The USDA Wholesome Meat Act form and Livestock Sale Intent form are to be signed by exhibitor & parent and turned in by the sale committee deadline. Please see sale rules for other specifics for participation this year.
5. Hogs will be required to be clean and free of foreign materials during the weigh-in. Hogs that are dirty will need to be washed off with water prior to weigh in and are allowed to use the wash racks giving ample time before the end of weigh-in. It is requested that all hogs be washed off with water prior to weigh in. Hogs are not allowed to leave the wash rack before being weighed in. **No re-weighs will be allowed after the hog leaves the scale area.**
6. Any hog and exhibitor not in the holding pen when the show ring gate is opened for that class during the market show will be disqualified from exhibiting that hog in that class.
7. ONLY 4-H/FFA exhibitors and their animals may be in the holding pens.
8. **Hogs will be shown by weight.**
 - a.—Classes will be determined by weight only.
 - b.— Minimum weight will be 225 pounds, maximum weight will be 290 pounds.
 - c.—There will be NO division of market classes based on sex.
 - d.— The breaks and the approximate number of market hogs in each class will be left to the discretion of the Superintendent, but no more than 10 swine will show in any class.
 - e.—Under/overweight market swine will be released at the superintendent's discretion.
 - f.— The first-place hog in each class will return to the ring for the Championship Drive. The second-place hogs will be on standby at their stalls.
9. Hogs may be taken home following release time and after verification from the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent that your pens and sale pens are clean.
10. Barns will be closed daily, to the public and exhibitors, from 9:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. This for the safety and welfare of livestock and exhibitors while at the fair.

ELIGIBILITY:

1. Only members with a current Meat Quality Assurance certification (MQA) and enrolled in the 4-H or FFA Market Swine Project are eligible to enter Market Swine classes. Members showing at the

Colorado State Fair are required to meet Pork Quality Assurance (PQA) requirements.

2. All market swine must be farrowed after January 1, 2024.
3. Market pigs that are classified as under Minimum Weight will enter the Feeder class and are not eligible for the Jr. Livestock Market Event.
4. Market pigs that are classified as Overweight, will enter the Overweight class and are not eligible for the Jr. Livestock Market Event
5. All barrows must be castrated and completely healed from castration prior to animal identification day in May.

The following will be considered for all participating Swine project members:

1. Herdsmanship is the total responsibility of the exhibitor. During the week of Fair exhibitors are expected to feed, water, and care for their own animals and it is the exhibitors' responsibility to keep their pen area orderly, neat, and clean.
2. Inspections will be made periodically while the junior swine are at the fair. Awards will be announced and presented at the Swine Awards Ceremony.
3. The following criteria will be used in judging for the Swine Herdsman Award:
 - Sportsmanship.
 - Participation at Swine events.
 - Cleanliness of pens and animals.
 - Neatness of aisle in front of pen.
 - Promptness in entering the show ring.
 - Courtesy to the judge and others (including spectators).
 - Regularity of feeding and watering.
 - Respect and care of facilities.
 - Willingness to assist other 4-H members and Swine participants.

This department is subject to all BCF General Rules, General Exhibitor Rules and all Junior Exhibitor Livestock and Animal Division Rules in addition to those listed for the department.

GENERAL:

1. All birds must pass the required animal health inspection and be checked in between 7:00 and 9:00 am Tuesday August 5th.
2. Chicken meat birds and turkeys will be weighed on Tuesday August 5th at 2:00 p.m.. After check-in, market birds may only be moved for any reason by the superintendents. Any market birds that are moved may be subject to immediate disqualification.
3. **Please be sure your birds are healthy, clean, and vermin free before check in. Close examination and dusting, if necessary, for lice and mites 7 and 2 days before check-in is suggested. Any bird determined to have LICE, MITES, OR THEIR EGGS or to show symptoms of disease will be required to leave the barn immediately and will not be able to show at fair.**
4. All birds must have numbered leg bands at check-in. Birds without bands will not be able to check-in. Band numbers must be included on the entry form. Leg bands are for the benefit of the exhibitors. The purpose is to be sure that each exhibitor can identify his/her own birds, especially when birds are moved to different cages. Leg bands will be available after June 1 at the Extension Office or at the Poultry ID Clinic. They are free.

5. All exhibitors are required to sign up for a shift to watch the barn during the fair to assist the superintendents and for poultry project completion. Please help prevent injuries to fair visitors and reduce the potential for theft of birds.
6. Barn A building will be closed daily, to the public and exhibitors, from 9:00 p.m. to 7:30 a.m. for the safety and welfare of livestock and exhibitors while at the fair.
7. All eggs laid during the Fair will be collected daily by someone and put on display. At the end of each day the eggs will be composted.
8. Each exhibitor is required to care for his or her birds. Each family will be required to bring one bag of shavings to share with the barn. Shavings will be available for the cages. **Exhibitors will supply their own feed and containers for feed and water.** No Styrofoam, paper cups, or glass containers are allowed. Feed and water containers must be secured to the cages to prevent spillage. Turkeys, ducks, and geese require gallon size water containers. Birds must be fed and watered a minimum of twice daily, the first time before 9:00 a.m. if possible. The cage area and containers for each bird must be cleaned daily to maintain sanitary conditions. Water being changed out may only be dumped on the North side of Barn A, next to the fence. Dirty or wet shavings should be replaced with new shavings as needed. Cages must be cleaned before birds will be released.
9. Exhibitors must own, be present, and care for their birds in the show room. If an exhibitor is unable to be present due to sickness or emergency, contact the superintendent to arrange a possible substitute.

ELIGIBILITY:

1. Only exhibitors enrolled in a 4-H or FFA Fowl project (Market/Breeding Poultry, Market/Breeding Turkey, Show Birds, Duck, Goose, Pigeon, and Game Birds) are eligible to enter Junior Poultry classes (Department 800).
2. The exhibitor must own all birds entered in this department by the last Thursday in April of the current year, **except for meat chicken pens.**
3. **There will be a Poultry ID clinic available for you to attend. It is highly encouraged for all first-year members to attend!** At that time, you may bring a list of your birds to get leg bands. Birds are not required. You may bring any birds you have questions about, especially if you have birds that you are uncertain about in regards of breed or sex. **Contact Extension Office or Poultry Superintendent for date and time.**

CLASSIFICATION:

1. Cock and hen are birds over a year old at the time of show. Cockerel and pullet are birds less than a year at the time of show.
2. There will be no dual entry of birds in market vs breed classes. Exhibitors must choose one class.
3. Exhibitors are responsible for properly entering birds in the correct class. If showing chickens, be sure to verify whether you have bantam or standard size birds and enter in the appropriate class. There is a copy of the APA Standard of Perfection in the Extension Office to help correctly classify birds or ask the superintendents, who also have copies of the standards, before making your entry.
4. If there are more than 8 birds entered in any class of the Any Other Breed category in each of the major Classes (for example the Asiatic Breed), the class will be divided into additional breeds as

required. There must be a minimum of 4 birds of any one breed in the class for that breed to be separated into a new category. The superintendent will decide this action.

5. **Young birds entered in breed classes should be at least four months old by the time of fair, so they have matured enough to be judged properly.**

JUDGING:

1. Birds will be judged in their cages. Meat pens will be weighed by the superintendents and handled by the judge.
2. An exhibitor is limited to not more than 20 entries in show bird classes (including show chickens, waterfowl, game birds, and breeding turkeys) and limited to not more than 4 entries in each of the following projects: market chickens, market turkeys, and egg production. Exhibitors may also enter once in showmanship.

If birds are lost or die after they are entered, other birds of the same class may be substituted if the superintendent is advised before the show that this is necessary. If the number of birds an exhibitor is bringing to fair changes from what is on the entry form, contact the superintendent as soon as possible.

3. Only birds that have been entered and shown may be sold at the fair. No birds may be sold, or any signs placed on cages until after all the judging is completed. The superintendents will not be responsible for any sales.
4. Breed classes are judged according to the APA Standard of Perfection. All birds entered in breed classes will be shown individually. Factors that are considered in judging are the following:
 - a. **Conformation** - bird must have proper shape, comb, etc., and be free of disqualifying defects.
 - b. **Color** - must have proper color pattern for variety and not have color defects such as wrong bill or leg color.
 - c. **Condition** - bird must be clean, healthy, have good feather quality, and be prepared for show.
5. Production Classes are judged on the following criteria:
 - a. For pullets in egg production pens, indication of early sexual maturity; for hens, records of laying at a high rate. Choose breeds that are known for laying large numbers of eggs. Laying hens one year old or older are not required to be in good feather condition.
 - b. Birds in chicken meat classes must be as uniform in weight as possible.
 - c. All meat production birds shall exhibit good growth rate.
 - d. Condition - health, vigor, cleanliness, and good feather quality.
 - e. Freedom from deformities.
 - f. Preparation of bird for showing.
 - g. Development and conformation of producing bird.
6. Non-Standard Fowl classes will include crossbred birds and purebred stock that do not meet breed descriptions of the standard of perfection. These birds may have non-standard leg color, combs, plumage color, etc. These birds will compete for Champion Non-Standard Fowl. Birds entered in production pens may NOT be exhibited individually in Non-Standard Fowl classes. Production varieties such as California White, Red Star, and Black Star chickens may be exhibited in the non-standard fowl division in the appropriate weight class; please specify the variety on the entry form. Non-standard birds will be judged on the following:

- a. Condition - health, vigor, cleanliness, and good feather quality.
- b. Freedom from deformities.
- c. Preparation for show.

MARKET POULTRY AND LIVESTOCK SALE:

1. The Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Chicken and Turkey Meat birds have gone through the Junior Livestock Sale for many years. The Livestock Sale Committee has granted 6 more spaces, for a total of 10 spaces, for youth that have market ready poultry to participate in the sale this year. These 6 spaces are reserved for youth that have no other animals going through the Livestock Sale.
2. In the event there are more than 6 youth in this category, the Poultry Superintendent will choose which birds will be eligible by drawing random classes and with placement order. First, we will ask exhibitors who intends to sell. In the event there are more than 6 youth wanting to sell, the superintendent will pick who is eligible by placement order and then by randomly drawing classes Starting with 3rd place and then going to all 4th places, etc. Market ready birds can be a pen of three meat chickens or one meat turkey.
3. All birds that will be sold at the livestock sale will be processed and donated to a local shelter, unless otherwise specified by the buyer or sale committee. The Poultry Superintendent will determine the current fair market value of poultry. A small sales commission and the cost of the sale photographs will also be deducted from the bid amount.

PREMIUMS:

1. Where there is no competition between exhibitors in any class, only one premium will be awarded. The judge and superintendent of the department will award such prize or prizes as the bird deserves.
2. Birds will be judged according to merit. No bird deemed unworthy or disqualified will be awarded any premium money.
3. See the chart below for the amounts of Premium Money to be awarded in the Poultry Division. **Failure to clean pens or care for livestock will result in forfeit of premium money.** Premium money will be awarded after release and barn cleanup. Champion and Reserve Champion Ribbons will be awarded for each division. Best and Reserve of Class will be awarded for each of the major classes such as American Class.

2. Rabbit record books will be checked by Superintendents during check in time. Record Books must be up to date for an Exhibitor to participate in all shows. **No animal will be allowed on the Fairgrounds if not listed in the exhibitor's record book.**
3. All rabbits are subject to be vet inspected before being allowed in rabbit area and cages. There is no charge for health inspection. **Any rabbit that is found to be sick, diseased, or lame may be ineligible and excused from the fairgrounds.**
4. Exhibitors must provide all supplies for their rabbit(s) *including shavings*. Exhibitors are responsible for caring for their own rabbit(s) and/or equipment, and cleaning of their cages and surrounding areas **DAILY**. Exhibitors will be fined \$5.00 per cage for unclean areas upon conclusion of the fair.
5. No rabbits less than 8 weeks of age are allowed at fair. Do not bring newborn rabbits to the fair just to be with their doe.
6. *Maximum number of Rabbits per large cage: 3 and Regular Cage: 1*
7. *Barn Watch is a requirement for all families to help prevent injuries and to reduce the potential theft of rabbits.*

ELIGIBILITY:

1. Only exhibitors enrolled in a 4-H or FFA Rabbit project (Market/Breeding Rabbit and Companion Rabbit) are eligible to enter Junior Rabbit classes (Department 900).
2. All breeding rabbits, companion rabbits and **market rabbits** must be owned by the exhibitor and listed, along with photos on the Rabbit ID report and up-loaded on or before the last Thursday in April of the current project year. All rabbits being shown must be also included in the record book. In the case of any Breeding Rabbit born after the last Thursday in April, the kindling doe must have been owned by the exhibitor **on or before** the last Thursday in April of the current year, and all the doe's records must appear in the exhibitor's record book. The member must have provided and turned in a hard copy of the up-dated Rabbit ID form to the Extension office and FFA advisor prior to July 6th, of the current year.
3. Meat Pen of rabbits: Exhibitors must own the kindling doe. All does used to kindle litters of meat pens rabbits must be owned by the exhibitor and identified in 4HOnline by the last Thursday in April of current year. All rabbits shown in the meat pen class must be identified and tattooed at the Meat Pen Rabbit ID Day in July each year.
4. **All rabbits must have tattoo identification in left ear. (In some cases a marker tattoo may be accepted.) When doing animal ID in 4HOnline and you do not know your tattoo, please put "Pending" and then update the 4-H Office when you have your rabbit tattooed.**
5. Market rabbits may also be entered in the breeding show if the exhibitor is dual enrolled in both market and breeding rabbit projects and the rabbit should be listed in both record books.

CLASSIFICATION:

1. **This is not an ARBA sanctioned show but will be judged to ARBA standards at judges' discretion.**

ELIGIBILITY

PARTICIPANT CRITERIA

1. Open to 1st, 2nd, and 3rd-year swine project members in Boulder County 4-H or St. Vrain Valley FFA.
2. Must be enrolled in the swine project for the 2024-2025 year and in good standing.
3. Must be between the age of eight (8) and eighteen (18). Age is determined as of December 31 of the previous year. It is highly recommended that a Participant does not enter this program if they plan to be away at college or away from home during the time of raising the animal.
4. Past participants of the Swine Sponsorship, Catch-a-Pig, or Pen-a-Pig programs are not eligible.
5. Participants must demonstrate the ability to house and care for a pig from April to August 2025.
6. Participants must comply with all rules and regulations outlined in the Boulder County Fair Premium Book, Boulder County 4-H, and St. Vrain Valley FFA program requirements.

COMMITMENT

1. Participants must actively engage in mentorship, attend required training clinics, and adhere to all program rules.
2. Participation in the 2025 Boulder County Fair is mandatory.
3. Participants must prove access to adequate facilities, feed, vet care and other needs for raising and caring for the animal.
