# CREATIVE ARTS DIVISION - 2023

The Exchange Club of Charleston’s Coastal Carolina Fair welcomes your participation in our Creative Arts Division. Entering your projects will permit you a platform to showcase your creative abilities and contribute to the pleasure and education of visitors to the Fair.

## I. GENERAL RULES

1. Eligibility. Residents of the South Carolina Low Country are eligible to enter articles in the Creative Arts Division of the Coastal Carolina Fair. Age categories for divisions are as follows, unless otherwise specified:

- Youth (ages 18 and under)
- Adult (ages 19 - 59)
- $\quad$ Senior (60 - 79)
- Senior + (age 80 and above)

Please indicate age category on the entry form. All age categories are judged separately. Entrants must identify themselves as an Amateur or Professional. A Professional is one who receives monetary gain for goods or services (ex. an artist who sells his work). Group participation, defined as more than one person working on a project, is also welcome. Each area will be judged separately. All information must be disclosed upon entry.
2. People's Choice Award. A ribbon will be awarded to the entry that has the most votes for favorite entry from those attending the Fair. Attendees will vote starting opening day throughout the last Thursday of the Fair, at which time all the votes will be counted and the ribbon awarded.
3. Entry Procedures (except Quilts, King Arthur Baking Company Contest and Coastal Carolina Fair Baked Goods Contest). Articles MUST be entered at the Fair’s Exchange Hall on Saturday, October 21st, from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm and Sunday, October 22 ${ }^{\text {nd }}$ from 12:00 to 4:00 pm ONLY. Articles MUST be entered with the official Entry Form found on the Fair's website or upon request from the Fair's Administrative Office. Additional copies may be reproduced as needed.

## REQUIREMENTS: KING ARTHUR BAKING COMPANY CONTEST AND COASTAL

 CAROLINA FAIR BAKED GOODS CONTEST ONLY - Entry acceptance is Saturday, November $4^{\text {th }}$ from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm.EXCEPTION: SECTION NO. 61 - DECORATED CAKE FORMS will be accepted on October 21st and $22^{\text {nd }}$.

We welcome all entries, however, due to space limitations, all oversized entries are subjected to being displayed outside of locked cabinets. We are not responsible for loss or damage to the items which are not in the locked cabinets. Entering an item into this show does not guarantee that it will be displayed during the Fair. Entering of an item into this show does not entitle anyone to free admission into the Fair.
4. Baking Contests

King Arthur Baking Company Baking Contest is sponsored by the King Arthur Baking
Company, whereas the Coastal Carolina Fair sponsors the Baked Goods Contest. The two contests will be held on Saturday, November $4^{\text {th }}$ in the Exchange Hall. Entries will be accepted between

9:00 am and 12:00 pm. The Awards ceremony will take place at approximately 4:00 pm. Entrants are requested to pre-register at www.coastalcarolinafair.org/baking by October $23^{\text {rd }}$ to receive entry instructions.

No articles may be claimed or picked up before Monday, November 6, 2023, between the hours of 1:00 pm and 7:00 pm. No articles will be released without their proper claim check. Articles unclaimed by November 16, 2023 will be discarded.

Comments and suggestions must be submitted in writing within 10 days after the Fair. They will be welcomed, evaluated, and acknowledged within 30 days after the closing of the Fair.

## II. CERAMICS - Mrs. Dot Weston, Coordinator

1. Amateur and Professional Ceramists are invited to present displays and exhibits. There will be the following competitive classifications:
A. Hobbyist: The Hobbyist Division applies to those who work in ceramics as a hobby, who do not have a letterhead or sign, do not teach or work in ceramics as a livelihood, or have not previously taught.
B. Professional: This division applies to those who teach or have taught ceramics/clay; whose works have been sold; or whose livelihood is in ceramics/clay.
C. School Teachers: A special division for teachers’ personal artwork will be judged separately
D. Age divisions:

Youth
(1) Ages 5 through 11 years
(2) Ages 12 through 18 years (Ages to be given on application.)
(3) Pre-School

Adult (Ages 19 - 59)
Senior (Ages 60-79)
Senior + (Ages 80 and above)

## 2. Rules of Exhibit

A. No item will be accepted unless it was made by the person entering such item without help from the teacher. Teachers may suggest, but work must not be done on a piece by teachers or anyone other than the person entering the item. Teachers entering pieces for students must have written permission from students to enter pieces.
B. Each person must have a list of pieces ready that are to be displayed and the classification under which they will be entered. A current name, address, and telephone number must be included on entry blank.
C. Participants may only enter one piece in a specific section (for instance, one piece in glaze, one opaque under glaze).
D. Bottom of pieces must be finished with glaze / stain or dry footed for high fire glazes, but NO felt.
E. Pieces should be cleaned properly, not cracked, and all loose pieces should be taped down or glued.
F. All pieces must be fired at least to the bisque state, except in Section 30.
G. Nativity and chess sets must be limited to ten pieces only.
H. Groupings of pieces must be limited to 5 pieces.
I. Entries can be no more than 15 pounds.
J. Entries are limited to a height of 20 inches overall.
K. Entries can have no cracks.

## 3. Awards

A. Judging will be done by a competent panel of judges and all work will be judged on choice of design and adaptability, color harmony or contrast, originality, and workmanship.
B. Ribbons will be awarded First, Second, and Third places, if the judges deem items are of such quality to justify them. Where there is only one entry in a particular section that entry will not be awarded a premium because of lack of competition, but may be judged on its own merit within that class for a ribbon.

1. General Rules
A. Each person may enter as many items as they wish.
B. All items must have been completed since the last Fair.
C. Each entry must be designated either:
2. Original design, or
3. Kit/charted design/adaptation
D. Each entrant must designate herself/himself as an Amateur or Professional and Youth (under 12), Youth (12-18), Young Adult (19 - 39), Adult (40-59), Senior (60 - 79), or Senior+ (80 and above). The definition of a professional is someone who receives monetary gains for goods or services (e.g., teaching or a member of The Embroiderer's Guild of America, Inc.).
E. The professional category will be judged separately from the amateur category according to the categories listed in this booklet. Guild members, be sure to identify yourself as a professional when entering your needlework. Any member of a Guild will be judged separately from the general public.
F. The following will NOT be accepted for exhibit or competition in this department: clothing that has been worn, has frayed edges, or is soiled; linens that are aged, used or soiled; and items that have previously been entered into competition at the Coastal Carolina Fair. Items must be smoke and odor free.
G. ALL pictures entered into the exhibit MUST have wire and screw eyes for hangers. The wire must be on the back of the picture and must run from one side to the other. Any identifying marks (initials or names) need to be covered.
H. Embroidered quilts will be accepted and will be judged on their embroidery, cross-stitch, construction, etc.
I. The Embroiderer's Guild of America, Inc., Magnolia Chapter, will coordinate the needlework exhibits. In awarding ribbons and prizes, THE DECISION OF THE JUDGES IS FINAL.
J. During the judging names will not be displayed, but each article will be given a number. The names may be displayed after judging.
K. BEST OF SHOW. All Blue Ribbon winners are eligible to be considered for Best of Show: Amateur and Professional.
L. Exhibits without competition will be judged on their own merit and will receive an award or places only if determined worthy by the judges.
M. We welcome all entries. However, due to space limitations, all oversized entries are subject to being displayed outside the locked cabinets. We cannot be held responsible for loss or damage to the items, which are not in the locked cabinets.

3. Professionals may exhibit. A professional is defined as one following an occupation as a means of livelihood or for gain. Groups are also welcomed.
4. During the judging, names will not be displayed, but each article will be given a number. The names will be displayed after judging.
5. Awards
A. Judging will be done by a competent panel of judges according to specific qualifications established for each section.
B. Ribbons will be awarded first, second, third and fourth places if the judges deem items of such quality to justify them. Where there is one entry in a particular section, the judges' discretion will be used in making the award. Each section will also be awarded a Best of Show ribbon.
C. Youth, adult, senior and senior+ exhibits, as well as amateur, professional and group will be judged separately.

## General Rules. The USDA requires Recipes to ensure quality!

1. All entries must have been preserved within the last year (12 months). If fresh produce is used, the exhibit should have been preserved within the last growing season; in no case should this exceed one year.
2. Unsealed exhibits or products showing signs of spoilage will not be judged.
3. Exhibits must be labeled with the name of the food, the date preserved, and the method of preservation including process time, please do NOT personalize with your name. Entries without required labeling will not be judged. If the food is canned, the label must state whether the food was hot or raw packed, boiling water or pressure canned the process time and the pounds of pressure if pressure-canned. The RECIPE used must also accompany the entry.
(A judge needs to know if the proper amount of citric acid, lemon juice or vinegar has been added to canned tomatoes, for example. The judge also has to know whether certain foods have meat, low acid vegetables, starches, etc. added)

Example: Peaches, hot packed, boiling water canner, 20 minutes,

## July 13, 2023, Recipe:

4. An exhibit must not have been previously entered in the same event.
5. Judges are instructed not to award a premium or placing unless the exhibits are worthy.
6. Exhibits without competition will be judged on their own merit and will receive an award or placing only if determined worthy by the judges.
7. Judging will be done by comparison to recognized standards of quality and safety and by comparison to other exhibits to determine placing within a class (first, second, third, etc.)
8. Exhibits will not be judged by tasting; visual inspection will be used. Jars may need to be opened, however, when spoilage is suspected or differences among entries are very small.
9. Youth exhibits are judged separately from adults.
10. The decisions of the judge are final.
11. Foods that are opened during judging will be marked by the judges and should not be eaten when the fair event is over. The judges or fair attendants will dispose of any foods that are considered hazardous to consume. (This includes the jar and packing liquids/product that contained the food.)
12. Canned products must be canned in clear, standard (half-pint, pint or quart) jars in good condition with new, two-piece canning lids (flat lid and band). (Note: There are now 12-ounce canning jars available. If there is not a USDA recommended process time available for the 12 -ounce jar, these may be used with a pint jar canning process recommendation. The process time for pints cannot be reduced for the small jar size. If there is only a USDA process for the half-pint jar size, the 12 -ounce jar would be disqualified for lack of recommended USDA process time.)
13. Jar sizes for which there is no USDA canning recommendations will not be judged.
14. Jams, jellies, marmalades and preserves sealed with paraffin will not be judged; these products must be heat sealed (canned).
15. Fancy padded lids, colored jars, fabric over wraps or cozies interfere with the judging process and are not necessary and should not be used.
16. USDA Recommendations for Headspace in Canned Foods:

Headspace is the unfilled space above the food in a jar and below its lid. USDA recommends headspace in specific foods as follows:
A. Jams and Jellies: $1 / 4$ inch
B. Fruits, Tomatoes, Pickles, Relishes, etc.: $1 / 2$ inch
C. Low Acid Food (to be processed in a pressure canner): 1 inch
(For correct headspace for each food, check the processing directions for each specific food or call your local County Extension Office.)

A diverse art form that utilizes a variety of techniques and media to decorate functional and non-functional surfaces.
Fine Art cannot be accepted in the Decorative Painting Section.
Because of the systematic method employed, contemporary decorative painting is a highly teachable art form. The patterns or freehand designs allow a high degree of success without academic training or inherent drawing ability. Approached with creativity, discipline and craftsmanship, contemporary decorative painting offers opportunities for artistic self-expression and creative satisfaction.
The scope of the contemporary decorative painting is boundless. Styles and techniques of the past are incorporated into the materials of the present, while developing the decorative art heritage of the future.

Tole painting is the general term historically used to describe decorative painting of tin surfaces, especially in New England and or by the Pennsylvania Germans. Contemporary decorative painting encompasses not only the folk art style of Sweden, Norway, Germany, Russia, England and Mexico, but the many facets of Early American decorative painting such as stenciling, faux finishing, bronzing, gold leaf, country painting, theorem and graining.
