LIVESTOCK RULES & REGULATIONS

GENERAL INFORMATION

- It is the responsibility of each animal's owner or handler to <u>have the animal ready to show at the scheduled showing time.</u>
- Exhibits must stay for the duration of Fair, unless given written permission from Fair Management.
- Ribbons will be awarded to Grand Champion, Reserve Grand Champion, Champion, Reserve Champion, and Best of Show. Champion ribbons will only be given if more than one class is exhibited in each breed (male and female).
 - Note: The above ribbons will be awarded during shows. First, Second, and Third place cloth ribbons will be given on request by the exhibitor.

ENTRIES

- Entries are considered incomplete until payment of the entry fee has been made. Fees are calculated per head or grouping. Check department details for fee amount.
- <u>Registration papers must be available for inspection</u>. Breeding animals must be registered and entered in the name of the owner, but the owner need not be the actual handler.
 - Exception: "Paper pending" will be accepted for animals under 1 year old, or to conform to species standards as long as proof of eligibility for registration is available.
 - Exception: rabbits and poultry.
- <u>Breeding animals dually shown in Open Class and 4-H/FFA must be entered under the same exhibitor, and must enter by the Open Class deadline and pay the Open Class entry fee.</u> The breeding animal must be registered in the exhibitor's name or family name. All animals exhibited in 4-H or FFA must be housed, groomed, and fitted (by the member) in the 4-H or FFA livestock area even when preparing for Open Class shows.
 - Note: Conflicting Open Class and FFA/4-H show times will not be changed to accommodate exhibitors.
- All sheep and goat exhibitors will be required to <u>show proof of participation in the Scrapie Program</u>. Appropriate Scrapie ID and/or paperwork showing compliance must be available for inspection.
- Exhibitors are limited to 2 entries per class.
- Animals shown in group, pair, herd or flock classes must be entered and shown in a single-animal class.
 - Exception: cow/calf pairs.
- Late entries and substitutions will be accepted or denied at the discretion of Fair Management.
- Divisions and/or classes may be split or combined (if needed) at the discretion of Fair Management.

DISPLAYS

- Livestock will be placed in <u>assigned stalls and/or pens</u>.
 - Note: Due to limited space, completed livestock entries will be excepted in the order they are received.
 - Note: Nurse cows will be stalled away from the livestock exhibits. Check with Fair Management for space.
- All animals shall remain tied or penned at all times during Fair unless the animals are being fitted, washed, or shown. Safety ropes or neckties plus halters are required on all cattle.
- All animals must be kept in the barn area. <u>Unauthorized livestock on the grass or in the exhibit building area will be immediately disqualified from future competition and any premiums previously won will be forfeited.</u>



- Signs offering an animal for sale cannot be displayed on the stalls or pens.
- All exhibitors must <u>furnish feed and care for their animals</u> during fair. Shavings are provided by the Fairgrounds.
- All stalls, pens, and aisles must be cleaned and raked by 9 AM each day.
- Exhibitors are required to <u>take all refuse to the designated dump site</u>. Failure to do so will result in a forfeiture of premiums.
- All livestock (including horses that are not being exhibited) must be stalled. Check with Fair Management for stall space.

ANIMAL HEALTH

- All animals and health documents are subject to inspection while on the Fairgrounds. No animal shall be admitted or allowed to remain on the grounds if they show evidence of infectious or contagious conditions.
- Animals from a herd or flock that is under federal or state surveillance may be exhibited without prior permission from the Oregon state Veterinarian's office.
- <u>Animals of Oregon origin</u>: no permits, health certificates, or tests are required for cattle, sheep, goats, and swine. All poultry (including exhibition, exotic, and game birds -- with the exception of waterfowl, pigeons, and doves) must be from a US Pollorum-Typhoid clean flock or have a negative test within 90 days prior to Fair.
 - Note: A veterinarian or technician may be on hand to test birds (if needed), at no charge to the exhibitor.
- <u>Animals with Out-of-State Origin:</u> both a health certificate from a veterinarian in the animal's state of origin AND an entry permit from the Animal Health Division, Oregon Dept. of Agriculture are required. Out-of-state veterinarians should call (503) 986-4689 for the permit number and specific requirements.
 - Note: Cattle and horses must have a current brand inspection from the animal's state of origin.
- No exhibitor will be allowed to administer medication to another exhibitor's entry.
 - Note: If you feel an animal is in need of medication, contact the department superintendent.
- No animals shall be drugged, tranquilized, or unethically fitted as determined by Fair Management.
- Fair management reserves the right to:
 - reject any animal that appears to be unhealthy.
 - call a veterinarian on behalf of a sick animal in cases where the animal's owner is not available.
 - remove any animals from the fair under a veterinarian's recommendation.

ANIMAL WELFARE POLICY

Adopted by the Oregon Fairs Association on October 21, 1988.

Considering the importance of animals to Oregon fairs, it will be the policy of members of the Oregon Fair Association to treat all animals at the fair in a humane manner. Animals shall be provided clean bedding, adequate feed and water, shelter, and fair exhibitors shall keep their animals from harm. It shall further be the policy of OFA members to protect animals from mistreatment by the general public and to assure the safety of fair patrons. All person in charge of fair activities involving animals shall be made aware of this policy.




STATIC EXHIBIT GENERAL INFO

- All Open Class Static Exhibits entry forms are due FRIDAY, AUG. 4th by 5 PM. There is no entry fee.
- Static exhibits are displayed in Carey Foster Hall (CFH). <u>Exhibitor tags and can/jar stickers</u> are available at the Fairgrounds Office through Friday, August 4th, and then will be available at Carey Foster Hall.
- Exhibits are to be <u>dropped off at CFH on MONDAY</u>, <u>AUG. 7th @ 9 AM 1 PM and 4- 7 PM</u>. Late drop-offs will not be accepted. (Note: a refrigerator is available for exhibits that need to be kept cool before judging.)
- Judging is on Tuesday, August 8th.
- Exhibits must remain on display for the duration of Fair.
- Exhibits must be picked up SUNDAY, AUG. 13th @ CFH from 9 AM 1 PM. Unclaimed exhibits will be moved to the Fairgrounds Office and will be discarded after 2 weeks.
 - Note: Please contact the department superintendent or the Fairgrounds Office if you cannot make the pick-up time and would like to schedule a pick-up appointment.
- Premiums are paid out at the Fairgrounds Office on SATURDAY, AUG. 12th from 12 PM 4 PM, SUNDAY, AUG. 13th from 9 AM 1 PM, and the following work week from 8 AM 4 PM.
 - No premium money will be held after August 18th.
- Exhibitors are expected to read all the rules and guidelines for the applicable department(s). Exhibits that do not adhere to the rules and guidelines may be denied entry, at the discretion of the Superintendent and Fair Management.
- All static exhibits must be original work by the exhibitor.
- Entries must have been created within the last 2 years.
- <u>Each exhibit may be entered into one class only.</u> For advice on which class to choose, please contact the department superintendent.
 - Note: Classes may be combined or split at the discretion of Fair Management.
- Each exhibitor can enter several items into each class, but will not be awarded multiple premiums.
 - Note: All placements are at the discretion of the judge and superintendent. Placings are final.
- It is the exhibitor's responsibility to <u>bring the exhibit(s) display-ready</u>. Display requirements vary by department. Please check department details for more information.

YOUNGER YOUTH SHOW INFO

- Completed entry forms must be turned in to the Fairgrounds office by 5:00 PM on FRIDAY, JULY 21st, 2023. There is no fee to enter an animal under Younger Youth.
- Required exhibitor & animal check-in is WEDNESDAY, AUG. 9th between 9:00 AM and 2:00 PM at the Open Class Livestock Check-in Table (near Open Class Beef and Sheep).
- One entry per child, per year. The child may exhibit their own, unregistered animal OR can show an animal that is also being shown by a 4-H/ FFA/Open Class exhibitor. The child must be able to safely handle the animal, and can participate in the Younger Youth show ONLY. Note: unregistered animals are primarily rabbits, poultry, goats, sheep, and typically market animals as well. If the animal is registered, it must be shown in Open Class.
- The Younger Youth Livestock Show is just for fun -- ribbons will be awarded, but no premiums. Each class will be judged on Showmanship, not the conformation of the animal.



RULES FOR OPEN CLASS WOOL

- All fleeces shown must have been shorn within 12 months of the opening date of Fair (8/9/23) and will be disqualified if more than 13 months growth.
- All fleeces entered must have been shorn from sheep owned by exhibitor.
- 3. Exhibitors are limited to two fleeces per section.
- The exhibit tag (obtained from the sheep superintendent) must show the name and address of the exhibitor, breed of sheep, and wool class number.
- 5. The wool judge may change the class number of an entry if he/she deems it improperly entered.
- Fleeces can be rejected if not property prepared for entry.The following is suggested:
 - Lay fleece out on clean floor, skin side down;
 - Remove all dung locks, leg hair, tags and other foreign matter;
 - · Fold both sides into the middle;
 - · Fold the neck wool back to the shoulder;
 - Begin rolling the fleece from the britch end so the best and most attractive wool of the back and front shoulder area is on the outside of the fleece roll, do not tie fleece;
 - Bring fleece in a plastic bag, large enough that it is "stuffed" in.

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

RULES FOR OPEN CLASS LAND PRODUCTS

- 1. Entries are limited to one per class.
- Unless otherwise indicated, entries are to be displayed on a good quality white paper plate with stiff edges or on a Styrofoam tray. (Perishable items that might shrivel such as beets, carrots, beans, or radishes, etc. can be presented in a plastic bag on the required plate to maintain fresh appearance.)
- Items with a root ball should have the root ball bagged in plastic or presented in a jar or container that will hold water to maintain freshness.
- Display herbs in water. Vessels are available at exhibit drop-off.

TIPS ON PREPARING YOUR EXHIBITS

Vegetables should be in the stage of development where they are suitable for marketing or eating. These, along with good conditions, are the main points on which entries are judged. Where more than one specimen is required, uniformity is important.

- Gather your vegetables early in the morning or late in the evening to retain crispness and flavor. Wash root vegetables in cold water and cut the tops, where required, to within 1" to 2" of the base.
- Refrigerate items in a closed plastic bag.
- · Peel away the damaged leaves on cabbage.
- Harvest onions early to allow for curing. Remove no more than one layer of skin to clean. Leave 1" at top and trim roots to 1/4".
- Dig potatoes early enough to cure well before Fair. Brush or wipe with soft cloth to clean.
- Beans should be tender and snap readily.
- Root crops should be of medium size and uniform in length and diameter.
- Slicing cucumber should be firm but not ripe.

- Summer squash and onions should be mature.
- Sweet corn should be succulent and not beginning to be starchy.
- Ripe tomatoes should be fully red but still firm.



HONEY CAKE

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 cup honey
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 4 eggs
- 2 tsp grated orange zest
- 1 cup orange juice
- 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 3 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp baking soda
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 tsp cinnamon

DIRECTIONS

- Preheat oven 350 degrees F (175 degrees
 C). Grease and flour a clear glass 9x13"
 pan.
- 2. Sift together the flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, and cinnamon. Set aside.
- 3. In a large bowl, combine sugar, honey, oil, eggs, and orange zest.
- 4. Beat in the flour mixture, alternating with the orange juice, until just combined. Pour batter into the pan.
- 5. Bake for 40-50 minutes or until a toothpick inserted into the center of the cake comes out clean.
- 6. Allow to cool. Leave unfrosted/unglazed in the baking dish.

RULES & GUIDELINES FOR OPEN CLASS FLORAL DESIGN

- 1. One entry per class, per exhibitor. Exhibitors must place their arrangements in position desired for judging.
- 2. For division 633, specimens do not have to be grown by the exhibitor.
- After initial judging on 8/8, exhibitors will be judged on Showmanship throughout the duration of Fair. Exhibitors should replace wilted flowers and material (additional plant materials cannot be stored at the Fairgrounds). CFH assistants will freshen water regularly.
- Specimens should be displayed in clear glass containers. Stems should reach deeply into the container, if possible. Remove foliage that is submerged in water.
- 5. Unless stated in the class description, all arrangements shall not exceed a width of 18 inches and depth of 16 inches (measurements are including the base).
- Unless specified, do not use accessories in arrangements. An accessory is anything added to the plant material, container, base, or background. If used, the accessory shouldn't be the focal point of the arrangement.
- 7. All arrangements must be easy to move. Secure all accessories to the container or a solid base.
- The presence of insects, disease, and damage caused by insects and disease will disqualify an entry. The exhibitor is responsible for carefully grooming and inspecting entries prior to exhibit drop-off.
- Gather flowers when temperatures are cool in mornings or evenings and place stems immediately in cool water. Place the container in a cool place overnight. To increase water uptake, use a sharp knife-cutting stem on a slant. Crush woody stems for at least 2 inches and stand in water overnight.
- 10. Do not place U.S. Flag (or flag symbols) within plant material, water, or container. The U.S. Flag can be used in an appropriate stand, placed beside the arrangement.
- 11. Do not use artificial flowers or plant materials in arrangements, or silk, plastic, paper, wax fruit, etc. Exceptions by the judge can be made when there is no competition represented.
- 12. Dried plant material must be entered in Division 802 (Artificial & Dried Flowers) of Department V: Hobbies & Crafts.

There are three accepted categories of plant materials:

- Treated: Naturally-growing and treated with glycerin, antifreeze, color preservative, stained, dyed or colored using food coloring, for example.
- Fresh: Naturally-growing, freshly cut, untreated.
- Native: Collected from nature in a legal manner, untreated.

RULES & GUIDELINES FOR OPEN CLASS FLORAL HORTICULTURE

- One entry per class, per exhibitor. Specimens should be named correctly.
- 2. Only fresh plant material may be exhibited. Horticulture specimens cannot be treated in any manner, but disbudding is required for some classes.
- 3. Specimens must be grown by the exhibitor.
- 4. After initial judging on 8/8, exhibitors will be judged on Showmanship throughout the duration of Fair. Exhibitors should replace wilted flowers and material (additional plant materials cannot be stored at the Fairgrounds). CFH assistants will freshen water regularly.
- Specimens should be displayed in <u>clear glass containers</u>.
 Stems should reach deeply into the container, if possible.
- 6. To keep specimens upright in their containers, bridge with clear plastic wrap, allowing ample space for water. (Loosely roll plastic wrap in a rope and gently pack it around plant stems at point fitting into mouth of container). Floppy specimens such as vines, etc. may be tied to small bamboo sticks or dowels, then braced upright with bridging.
- Unless specified, foliage is required for all specimens.
 Remove foliage that is submerged in water. When attached foliage isn't possible, please include unattached foliage.
- 8. Gather flowers when temperatures are cool in mornings or evenings and place stems immediately in cool water. Place the container in a cool place overnight. To increase water uptake, use a sharp knife-cutting stem on a slant. Crush woody stems for at least 2 inches and stand in water overnight.
- Annuals (incl. marigolds, asters, bachelor's buttons) only require to be placed in water overnight.
- 10. Please refer to all other rules for Dept. P.



GO GREEN!

Pick up a green leaf label during exhibit drop-off to indicate the specimen is organic.

Land Products (Dept. N), House Plants (Dept. O), Floral Design (Dept. P), and Floral Horticulture (Dept. Q) are eligible to have a special label indicating that the specimen is organic. This allows the public to determine what the differences are in the appearance and quality of organic specimens in comparison to non-organic.

Organic agriculture is the growing and caring of plants without the use of synthetic fertilizers or pesticides. In the US, to have the classification of "organic" agricultural farms and products claiming to be organic must be guaranteed by a USDA-approved independent agency and meet certain guidelines. It is up to the exhibitor to abide by the these organic guidelines:

- Abstain from the application of prohibited materials (including synthetic fertilizers, pesticides, and sewage sludge).
- Prohibit the use of genetically modified organisms and irradiation.
- Employ positive soil building, conservation and manure management and crop rotation practices.





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

RULES & GUIDELINES FOR OPEN CLASS FOOD PRESERVATION

- Exhibit canned products of good quality that are prepared for home use. Jars should be clean and have a new ring and lid. (An entry consists of one standard jar. Freezer jams can be submitted in a standard jar, or Ball Freezer Jar with a plastic ring.)
- All entries, including dried foods and leathers, must be submitted in a standard jar (a clean container designed for canning purposes, no colored glass, size: pint or quart). No plastic containers. No 1/4 pint jars unless exhibiting dried herbs.
- 3. All entries must have been preserved within the last year of judging date, and can only be entered into Fair once.
- 4. Each entry needs the following: Exhibit Tag and round Exhibit Label on lid.
- The exhibit tag should include the Department, Division, and Class. Tape the tag string to the bottom of the iar.
- 6. The exhibit label describes the contents, processing method (i.e. hot pack, raw pack, water bath, pressure cooker), altitude, recipe source, and preservation date. <u>LABELS MUST BE PLACED ON LIDS</u>. Failure to correctly label an exhibit may result in disqualification. <u>Labels are available at the Fairgrounds Office through 8/4, and at CFH on 8/7.</u>
- Not following altitude charts for processing times in Ball Blue Book or other approved sources will result in disqualification.
- 8. No fancy lid decorations except on gift packs.
- 9. A referenced recipe must be from USDA-recommended procedures and recipe in the OSU Extension Instruction Book, Ball Blue Book, or Kerr Canning Book from 1991+. Recipes and procedures from any other sources, including online, MUST be written out completely and attached to jar in addition to the label and exhibitor tag. Whenever more than one ingredient is combined, a recipe or reference to a recipe MUST BE INCLUDED.
- 10. All products must be processed according to the most recent recognized canning methods (i.e., Kerr, Ball, OSU Extension Service Bulletins, USDA Guidelines).
- 11. Judges may open any jar for inspection, however, if

- visible characteristics of the product eliminate the product from consideration of award, the judge is not obligated to open the jar for further evaluation.
- 12. Clerks are not responsible for receiving incorrect or incomplete entries on entry day, submitting appropriate and correct entries are the responsibility of the exhibitor.

- You may not enter in more than one division (for example-Adult or Senior and Professional).

- FRAMED artwork must be ready-to-hang or will not be accepted. Please make sure there is a wire or hook(s) attached for hanging.
- UNFRAMED artwork must be matted or mounted onto a stiff backing such as foam core.
- It is recommended that each entry be labeled on the back with the following information: Name of Artist, Artwork Title, Medium, and date of creation.
- 6. All artwork must be completely dry.
- An exhibitor may enter in more than one class, but will only be paid one premium per division.
- An artwork can only be entered one time, under one division/class. Exception: artworks that fall under Division 839: "Fair Theme Contest" may also be submitted in another applicable division.
- Note: if artwork is entered in the wrong class or division, the superintendent will place the work in the proper category at her discretion.

When choosing which division to enter under for each Art category, use the following definitions:

- <u>PROFESSIONAL ARTISTS</u> make a living selling their artwork, have formal training/schooling in their practice, and often instruct younger artists in their field
