### Regulations

**Separate entries must be made to participate in the Clothing Revue - FairEntry Department: Clothing/Knitting & Crocheting Revue (See Classes K - V)**

1. This department is open to all youth carrying Clothing, Clothes Horse or Looking Good projects.
2. Garments entered under Dept. 26 - Clothing may also be entered under Dept. 26 - Clothing Revue (see classes K - V).
3. Pin entry tag on left shoulder of garments and on left front waist of skirts and pants (left side as worn).
4. Each piece of every garment must have member's name sewn, pinned or taped to inside of garment.
5. **Only standard hangers may be used for garments.** Pin non-wearable items to hangers, with the exception of pillows or quilts. No skirt hangers (due to the difficulty in displaying items on this type of hanger).
6. Entries are limited to eight (8) per member in Classes A - E.
7. Entries are limited to five (5) per member in Class F - G.
8. Entries are limited to three (3) per member in Classes H - I.
9. On the back of the Fair tag attached to the item, all project members must answer the following questions: 1. What is the fiber content of this fabric? 2. How do you clean this item? 3. How do you dry this item? 4. How do you iron this item?
10. Garments must be entered in the correct class and lot.
11. No kits, except where specified.
12. **Items entered in Clothing must have machine or hand stitching.**
13. No doll clothes. Infant sizes 1/2 or larger are acceptable.
14. Sleeveless tops include tank tops and dropped shoulder tops. Set-in sleeves refer to conventional or flat construction techniques. Raglan sleeves are set-in from the collar.
15. Sportswear is defined as clothing worn for sport or exercise. Examples include: karate gear, ballet outfit, golf outfit, cycling clothing, workout apparel.
16. All exhibits must be constructed after August 1, 2024.
17. Entries cannot be used for any other department, other than clothing, during the Fair.
18. Any violation of the above rules will result in a lower placing.

2. Class C: Open to all members enrolled in Clothing who are in grades 6 & 7
3. **To sign up for Clothing Revue enter Classes L & M.**

1. Class F: Open to all members enrolled in the Clothes Horse Project who are in grades 3 - 7
2. Class G: Open to all members enrolled in Clothes Horse Project who are in grades 8+

## CLASSES H. AND I. Looking Good

### Regulations

1. Class H: Open to members enrolled in the Looking Good Project who are in grades 3 - 7
2. Class I: Open to members enrolled in the Looking Good Project who are in grades 8+
3. Exhibitor will enter a 22"x28" poster that delivers a clear message about what was learned.

| 3) 6)    | <b>Idea:</b> Exhibitor will illustrate their efforts to understand better their body type, best colors, personality or other aspect of their self-concept and how this affects their clothing choices   |

## CLASS J. Consumer Savvy

### Regulations

1. Consumer Savvy offers youth an opportunity to be thrifty and fashionable. Project youth members may purchase thrifty, second-hand garment(s) to modify and assemble the outfit with accessories into something more fashionable.
2. Members enrolled in Consumer Savvy may have two (2) entries in Class J. Lot budget amounts are for the base outfit, accessories and/or alterations may be beyond the stated budget amount below.
3. Garment must be displayed at Fair with explanation on a 4x6" index card of:
  - 1) Why the items were purchased
  - 2) Where the items were purchased, include receipt(s)
  - 3) How does this purchase help your closet**OR**  
How will these pieces be used for 2 - 3 different style events
4. **To sign up for Clothing Revue enter Classes P**
