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FAIR REGULATIONS

Fair Management and Extension Staff reserve the final and absolute right to interpret the rules and regulations of the fair and will arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions or differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of or in connection with the fair.

Liability

- a. Exhibitors of animals, machinery in motion and other exhibits liable to occasional accidents, injury or damage to persons coming in contact with them, shall guard their exhibits and protect the public from coming in contact with them. Every such exhibitor shall indemnify the Fair Association from any and all claims and demands, costs, charges and expenses which may occur, suffer, or be put to, by reason of any exhibit not properly guarded or the public not being properly guarded therefrom. Presentation of entry submission shall be deemed acceptance of this rule.
- b. The Fair will take reasonable precautions to ensure the safety of the exhibits sent to the exhibition, but the owners themselves must take the risks of exhibiting them. Should any exhibit or portion thereof be injured, lost or stolen, the Fair Association will provide assistance towards the recovery of the same, but will not be liable or make any payment for the value thereof.
- c. The Fair shall not be liable for any loss to an exhibitor occasioned by fire, accident, condition of structure or the negligence of other exhibitors or officials.

FAIR RULES

GOLF CARTS will be allowed for medical reasons ONLY
All golf carts must be registered once they are on
grounds with the Dane County Fair Administration
office, upper level of the Exhibition Hall. Golf carts are
not permitted in the Midway. All carts are the sole
responsibility of the registered user.

- 1. Junior Fair exhibitors must be members of a youth organization with adult leadership and an educational program approved by the Fair; and, be residents of Dane County or a neighboring county. Exhibitors must be enrolled in a youth organization by March 1 to exhibit at that year's Dane County Fair. Organizations must be headquartered in Dane County (examples include 4-H, FFA, FHA-HERO, YMCA, YWCA, Scouts BSA, Girl Scouts, Pioneers, after school clubs, Youth Civil Air Patrol, Junior Breed Organization, etc.). All 4-H enrollments must be filed at the Extension Office (5201 Fen Oak).
- 2. Exhibitors must list age & grade as of January 1 of exhibit year on entry form. NOTE: Exhibitors who have learning or physical disabilities may exhibit according to their developmental or functional age. A letter from the parent and adult leader must be emailed to/submitted to the Fair Office to be considered.
- 3. Exhibitors must not have reached their 20th birthday by January 1 of the current year to exhibit. Other than Cloverbuds, exhibitors must be enrolled in third grade to participate at the Dane County Fair, as of January 1 of the exhibit year.
- 4. All exhibits must be the result of exhibitor's work in the current exhibit year.
- 5. 4-H exhibitors may exhibit only in those departments or classes which correspond to projects in which the exhibitor is enrolled. Project changes (additions/drops) must be filed through the Extension Office and completed by March 1 for that year's Fair.
- 6. Individual school projects, if enrolled in the corresponding 4-H project, are allowed and will receive no discrimination.
- 7. Exhibitors from other (non-4-H) youth organizations must exhibit in departments corresponding to the educational focus of their organization.
 - a. FFA exhibitors may exhibit in departments that correspond with courses taken through FFA or departments in which students have taken courses at school.
 - b. Other non-4-H organizations may only participate in departments that correspond with the educational focus of the organization.
 - c. In all cases, entries must be authorized by an advisor or club leader, verifying the departments the exhibitor plans to participate in at the Dane County Fair were in fact part of that exhibitor's educational focus for the current year.

8. Entry deadlines and leader authorization.

Dane County Fair entry forms must be received via the Dane County Fair online entry system by 11:59 p.m. CST on Thursday, June 1, 2023. All entries must be submitted online at www.danecountyfair.com under the Youth Exhibitors page. Specific department supplemental entry info must also be submitted. All entry fees and season pass orders are due from each club at fair entry tag pick-up, around July 1.

Late Entries will be accepted for \$25/submission June 2-8, 2023, 11:59 p.m. Submission is defined as one or multiple Department/ Class/Lot entries in one transaction per exhibitor.

Leaders will be emailed an entry confirmation listing exhibitor, entries and fees due for the club/chapter. Entries must be reviewed for member eligibility and project enrollment by **Noon, June 9**. After the 9th, all submitted entries are final. Leaders are required to reply to the confirmation email stating club/chapter entries have been reviewed and are eligible.

a. A lot entry within a class may be substituted for an existing entry within the same class.

9. Entry Form Instructions:

- a. Only one item may be exhibited in a lot unless specifically stated in the lot description (ex. Pen of Rabbits, Pair of Calves).
- b. Department is represented by a number (located under the department name). Class is represented by a capital letter. Lot is represented by a number followed by a ")".

EXAMPLE: DEPT CLASS LOT Description
5 A 3) Jr. Showmanship

- c. Each department has its own regulations. Read carefully. Individual classes may have additional regulations.
- d. Exhibitors may only enter the number of lots permitted by department. Entries with more than the allowed lots will not be accepted.
- e. Other information, in addition to the entry form, are required for some departments (Dairy, Dog, Horse and Shooting Sports). Please review individual department regulations.

10. Exhibitor Fees

All youth exhibitors, except Cloverbuds and club-specific entries, will be required to pay a \$8 exhibitor fee by June 1 at 11:59 p.m. (includes wristband). For entries received **June 2-8**, the late entry fee is \$25 per submission. Youth exhibitors entering animals at the Dane County Fair will also be responsible to pay the following fees:

- a. Large animal fee \$1 per head
 <u>Large animals include</u>: Dairy, Beef, Swine, Sheep, Goats, Horses and Donkey
- b. Small animal fee \$0.50 per animal or lot for pens of animals Small animals include: Poultry, Rabbit, Dog, Cat, Pocket Pets, Peacock/Peahen, Cavies, & Any Other Small Exotic Animal

These fees can be paid by credit card at the time of entry or by check paid by each family payable to Dane County Fair, and mailed by June 8, 2023 to PO Box 287, Oregon WI 53575. All fees are non-refundable.

- 11. The type of judging for each Class or Lot is indicated in the department. The four types of judging are:
 - a. <u>Individual Conference Judging</u> (face to face judging): Allows a youth exhibitor to bring his or her exhibit directly to the evaluator. Together, the evaluator (judge) and project member look at the results of the member's work, talk (individual conference) about the planning and effort that went into the project and decide what kind of placing the exhibit deserves. This decision is based on the individual exhibit and what the exhibitor has learned, not on comparison with other exhibits. Therefore, any number of exhibitors may receive a blue, red, white or pink placing in a Lot. Friends and family in the vicinity of the judging area are asked to respect the need for quiet and private discussion between the judge and the youth exhibitor.
 - 1) Any exhibit that is entered in an Individual Conference judging lot, and the exhibitor is not able to be present for judging, will result in lowering the placing by one color and no premium will be paid for this exhibit. Exhibits will also be ineligible for special awards.
 - 2) Live interactive video judging (by Face-Time, Skype, etc.) is an option for youth exhibitors unable to be present at the Fair during Individual Conference Judging. Project must be physically presented at Fair with a representative for the youth providing their own electronic equipment (i.e. iPad/tablet with an 8-inch or larger screen) for the youth to speak live through interactive video with the judge. Specific Departments/Classes/Lots will be allowed for live video conferencing. Request to live video judge the project must be made by entry deadline; the form may be found at danecountyfair.com/YouthExhibitors. Youth participating in electronic presentation, as well as their on-site representative, must be prepared to wait in line to present their project(s), as do all youth exhibitors for individual conference. The youth's project must be presented directly and in person to the judge. The on-site representative must establish internet connection and administer their electronic device. All discussion regarding the project must be communicated only by the youth to/with the Judge. Staff and Department chair will be the final decision maker to confirm or deny this live video conference judging request. Technical difficulties experiences with an exhibitor's electronic device, resulting in the inability for the judge to adequately evaluate his/her project will result in rule 11.a.1. above.

- b. Conference Judging (group judging): Provides an opportunity for the exhibitor to discuss with the judge the qualities of the exhibit, the problems involved and how to make improvements. All exhibitors in the Lot come before the judge at one time. The judge talks to each exhibitor individually, but all present are able to hear what is being said and, thereby, learn. Placement is decided by comparing all the products in the Lot. The Danish Judging system is used to determine the number of blue, red, white or pink placements in the Lot. The major objective is for everyone to learn from each other; therefore, it is important that all exhibitors from the Lot sit and listen as the judging takes place.
- c. <u>Danish Judging:</u> Exhibits in each Lot are placed into four groupings: 1) Blue 1st place; 2) Red 2nd place; 3) White 3rd place and 4) Pink 4th place. Exhibitors need not be present as there is no interaction with the judge, with exception of animal lots exhibitor must present their animal entries to the judge. The maximum placements as established by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture Trade and Consumer Protection are listed in this book.
- d. Regular Judging: Occurs when only one first, second, third and fourth placing is given per Lot. Other exhibits may be placed but do not receive premiums.
- 12. Any rule or regulations not met will result in lowering ribbon placing by one color, only if the exhibit can be placed into a correct lot. No premium money will be paid. If the exhibit does not fit into any lot, the exhibit will be given a participation ribbon and put on display.

Any exhibit that is not entered in the correct class will be allowed to be given comments from the judge and put on display; however, no premium will be paid for the exhibit.

13. Non-animal project check-in must be made during the check-in time slot per department. Wednesday animal entry check-in deadline is 8 p.m. Please take into consideration travel time, long judging lines and fair layout. Beef, Swine, and Sheep must check in by 7 p.m.

Late check-ins will only be allowed in extreme circumstances (ex. hospitalization, death in the family). Circumstances will be evaluated independently by Fair Management.

14. Protests and Appeals.

- a. The decision of judges or superintendents shall be final in all cases except where fraud, misrepresentation or collusion not discovered at the time of the decision is apparent. In such cases, an impartial committee composed of a UW Extension Agent, a Dane County Vocational Ag teacher and a member of the 4-H Leaders Association, Inc. called together by the Fair Manager shall make recommendation(s) to the Fair Manager.
- b. Protests based on fraud, misrepresentation or collusion must be made in writing and accompanied by a \$10 cash deposit which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Such protests must state the reason for the complaint or appeal. It should include facts relied upon or the rule violated and naming witnesses and the witnesses address. The person filing the complaint must sign his/her name and give his/her address and phone number. Protests or appeals must be presented to the Fair Manager prior to the close of the Fair.
- c. Other disputes or differences, especially those not provided for under the General Class Rules, shall be referred to the Fair Manager. The Fair Manager may render a decision when it is clear that either the system had failed the exhibitor or the exhibitor had failed the system. When a decision is not clear, the Fair Manager may refer the case to the Education Committee, Executive Committee or Fair Board as deemed appropriate.
- d. Decisions made by Fair Management and/or Extension Staff are final
- 15. Official forms of identification, including RFID tags, are intended to provide permanent identification of livestock and to ensure the ability to find the source of animal disease outbreaks. Removal of these devices is prohibited except at the time of slaughter and can be heavily fined if illegal removal has occurred. If it is determined a form of identification has been intentionally removed, the Grievance Committee will review the case and determine the appropriate course of action.

- 16. Special Awards: Departments are encouraged to establish and obtain sponsorship for special awards for the various classes. Special awards must receive approval from Fair Management. The judge's decision on special award winners is final.
- 17. Premiums offered are at levels governed by established statutes. Actual premiums paid reflect these; or, any statutory revisions that may be made after the publication of this Premium Book. Premiums will be paid after the Fair.
- 18. All rules and regulations listed within a specific department, class or lot are applicable. Also, management reserves the right to interpret rules and regulations.
- 19. Animals must be shown by the exhibitor unless the department superintendent grants permission for assistance. Superintendents have authority to designate show people for exhibitors unavoidably absent on show day. Any alternate leadsman must meet the eligibility requirements of the Department (ie: education member of project area, department regulations, etc.) and be eligible to participate in the Dane County Fair.
- 20. All exhibitors are responsible for the general housekeeping and clean-up in their area. Tack, equipment and feed may be transferred to and from the barns daily. All transfers must be done prior to 8 a.m. and after 9 p.m. Sunday transfers must be done prior to 8 a.m. or after 6:30 p.m. Vehicles will only be permitted for morning transfers.

Livestock exhibitors must clean up after their animals and regularly dispose of waste in an appropriate manner. Exhibitors must completely clean out their spaces at release time. Examples: cages, clean off boards, fold cages and stack in a pile. Exhibitors must provide their own tools and equipment for clean-up. Department superintendents will explain proper procedure for the department. All exhibitors share the responsibility of keeping the grounds neat and tidy.

- 21. Livestock exhibitors must routinely feed, water and care for exhibit animals. Health care of exhibited animals will remain the responsibility of the owner/exhibitor. In an emergency and in the absence of the exhibitor, contact the Fair Office. Management will make every attempt to locate the owner/exhibitor. However, in the event contact cannot be made, management reserves the right to seek medical care at owner/exhibitor's expense. Those choosing to not routinely/properly care for their animals will forfeit all premiums as determined by the department's superintendent.
- 22. No portable misting or sprinkler systems may be used. Discretion by Superintendents and Fair Administration will be used based on weather conditions.
- 23. All animals must display a barn card with their animal's information.
- 24. All animals on the Dane County Fairgrounds must be entered in the Fair. Companion animals are not permitted.
- 25. Alteration of any portion of any stalling panel is strictly prohibited. Drilling, taping, stapling, nailing, welding, screwing, and adhesives are prohibited from use on any livestock stalling or building surfaces. Altering or damaging of any County owned property will result in financial damage repair or replacement.
- 26. All animal exhibitors must abide by and agree to the Youth Animal Exhibitor Code of Practice to be eligible to exhibit at the Dane County Fair. Failure to sign this form forfeits any opportunity to exhibit. A parent/guardian's name and contact information must be included.
- 27. Release of Unhealthy Animals Policy (for all departments): Animals must be seen by a veterinarian and a signed health document by a veterinarian must be filed with the Fair Office. Fair Management, together with the Department Superintendent, will then issue a release.
- 28. No household furniture is allowed in the Pavilions or Arena Building.
- 29. **Overnight Barn Policy.** "Sleeping" overnight in any Pavilion or the Arena Building is prohibited. No one under the age of 16 is allowed in the barns after 12 a.m. (midnight) without adult supervision (adult

defined as a parent, legal guardian, superintendent or chaperone over the age of 21). Any exhibitor, regardless of age, must request a pass from the Dane County Fair Administration Office to be in the Pavilions or Arena Building after 12 a.m. midnight.

An overnight pass will be available from the Dane County Fair office for circumstances that require exhibitors to care for animals between 12 a.m. - 5 a.m. Examples of this may include: milking cows prior to show day, tending of animals, veterinary authorization to care for ill animals. Overnight pass requests must come from the exhibitor's parents or legal guardian before 6:00 p.m. on the night the pass is needed. The pass must be worn by the exhibitor at all times between the hours of 12 a.m. midnight and 5 a.m.

Overnight passes must be returned to the Fair Office by 9 a.m. the following morning. Each club or chapter will be allotted two (2) youth passes per night per animal species exhibited. Any adult that intends on being in the barn from 12 a.m. - 5 a.m. is asked to adhere to the same rules and procedures that youth exhibitors do and obtain an overnight pass. This is necessary so our on-grounds security knows who should and should not be in the barns taking care of animals.

A final ruling on whether or not an overnight pass will be given is up to the discretion of the Dane County Fair Staff, Dane County Extension Staff and Department Chairperson.

30. Other than guide or service animals (dog or miniature horse), only animals registered as exhibits are allowed on the grounds. Service animals in-training must be identified with an appropriate jacket, collar, or harness. All exhibit animals must be kept within their respective exhibition areas or barns. Visitors found in violation will be asked to leave the Fair; exhibitors risk expulsion, forfeiture of all premiums, and denial from future Fair participation. This rule applies to junior exhibitors, parents, and Fair attendees.

31. Exhibit Release on Sunday of Fair Week

- a. Admission is charged to enter the fairgrounds on exhibit release day. Between 5:30 8 p.m. one parent/guardian and one youth exhibitor will be allowed to show the exhibitor's claim ticket at any gate and receive free admission. This time will be strictly enforced.
- b. No animals may be removed from assigned stalling locations to be housed in other areas without approval by the department superintendents and Fair Management.
- c. Release of Animals: Decorations, tools and tack necessary for daily care of animals must remain in barns until 5:30 p.m. Sunday evening. Animal tack and decorations ONLY may be removed beginning at 5:30 p.m. Animal projects housed in the Pavilions and Arena Building are released Sunday at 6:30 p.m. Swine unable to load out Sunday evening due to biosecurity purposes may be left overnight. Remaining Swine must be removed between 6:30 7:30 a.m. Monday morning. Families electing this option MUST designate their intent at Swine registration or the overnight hold will not be allowed.
- d. Trailer parking is prohibited in the South Lot (behind the Exhibition Hall). All trailers must be parked in the Upper West parking lot, except during ingress and egress. Trailers may queue in the North Lot on Wednesday and Sunday. Walking animals out to trailers on Willow Island or Olin Ave access road is NOT allowed.
- e. Release of Projects in the Exhibition Hall: The Exhibition Hall will close at 5:30 p.m. to prepare for exhibit release. Exhibition Hall projects will be released Sunday beginning at 6:30 p.m. Enter through the North doors and proceed to Halls B&C to retrieve your projects; exit through the loading dock. All other doors will be locked.
- f. Dane County Fair is not responsible for exhibits that are not picked up after Sunday. Exhibits left in the Exhibition Hall after 8:00 p.m. Sunday will be discarded.
- g. The penalty for early departure, without permission from Fair Management, is forfeiture of premiums. The exhibitor will also be barred from exhibiting for at least one year.

Wisconsin Administrative Code ATCP 160 - County & District Fairs

Subchapter 1
General Requirements and Definitions

ATCP 160.01 Definitions:

- 1. "Breed class" and "breeding class" mean a specific breed within a class such as holstein in the dairy class.
- 2. "Class" means a grouping in which exhibits may be entered, including an animal breed or age group for animal exhibits; a type of produce, crop or food; or a specific age, age group or educational grade level of exhibitor.
- 2m. "Conference judging" means a judging system using a discussion about each exhibit with the entire group.
- 3. "Danish judging system" means a judging system that allows for multiple first, second, third and fourth class selections as provided in s. ATCP 160.91 (4) (b).
- 4. "Department" as it relates to the organizational structure of a fair, means an animal species, production group, or other principal classification of exhibits. As used in any other context, "department" means the state of Wisconsin department of agriculture, trade and consumer protection.
- 5. "**Division**" means one of 3 exhibitor group classifications for a fair and is limited to junior division, open division and senior citizens division.
- 6. "Entry class" means a class in which the fair allows exhibitors to submit entries.
- 7. "Exotic domestic animal" means an animal that is not a common farm animal.
- 7e. "Face-to-face judging" means a judging system using a semiprivate discussion between the judge and the exhibitor with the following phases:
 - (a) Get acquainted.
 - (b) Learn the background of the exhibit.
 - (c) Self-evaluation.
 - (d) Evaluator comment.
 - (e) Parting.
- 7m. "Fair" means a county or district fair eligible to receive state aid under s. 93.23 (1) (b) or (c), Stats.
- 7s. "Fair board" means the governing entity of a fair.
- 8. "Lot" or "lot number" means the numerical designation assigned by a fair for a specific category of exhibits within a class.
- 9. "Market class" means a class that includes animals of a certain weight for the species that can be sold for slaughter.
- 10. "**Premium**" means a monetary prize that a fair awards to an exhibitor after judging all competing exhibits in the class to which the premium pertains.
- 11. "Regular judging system" means a judging system that allows for one first, second, third and fourth class selection as provided in s. ATCP 160.91 (4) (c).
- 12. "Self determined project" means a project that meets all of the following criteria:
 - (a) It is approved by the fair board.
 - (b) Its subject matter is related to any of the junior fair departments 9, 10, 13 to 16, 18, or 20 to 29.
 - (c) It does not fall into a defined entry class within any department.
 - (d) It is carried out by a member of a youth organization.
- 13. "Youth organization" means an organization under adult leadership that has educational programing.

ATCP 160.02 Premium Requirements:

1 General

- a. The state aid authorized by s. 93.23 (1), Stats., may be paid on net premiums paid by a fair. The department may withhold state premium aid from any fair that does not enforce animal health pro- visions under ch. ATCP 10 that are applicable to animals exhibited at the fair. State aid will be paid only on premiums actually paid by bank check or draft.
- b. No deductions may be made from premium money won by an exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition rules established by the fair association are violated. A writ- ten statement of violation shall be submitted to the department to justify actions taken by a fair.
- c. Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of the financial condition or the organization or for any other reason.
- e. No fair may receive state aid for a premium awarded to any exhibitor in the open division if that exhibitor entered the same exhibit in the junior division at the same fair. This paragraph does not apply if the exhibit was entered in the junior division only as part of a herd group, carcass class or performance class.
- f. No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups, trophy prizes or entertainment contests.

2. Premium Lists

- a. Premiums for which state aid is requested by county and district fairs shall conform with the uniform premium list and other requirements set forth in these rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net premiums shall submit to the department a printed copy of the premium list used at the fair, as required under s. ATCP 160.92 (3) (c).
- b. The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the premium list to other associations, societies, or boards conducting a fair in Wisconsin upon request.
- c. (c)Sections ATCP 160.01 through 160.07 and 160.91 shall be published in premium books used by a fair for which state aid is requested.

3. Entry Fees.

- a. A fair may charge an exhibitor an entry fee or charge stall rents for animals, or both.
- b. Exhibitors in department 35 shall not be required to purchase an exhibitor's ticket. Any other exhibitor may be required, if no entry fee is charged, to purchase an exhibitor's season ticket at a price not to exceed that charged for a non-exhibitor's season ticket.

4. Split Fair Dates.

- a. For purposes of this subsection, "split fair dates" occur when a fair organization judges exhibits or contests and pays premiums at more than one time or at more than one location during the calendar year.
- b. Except as provided under par. (c), the department may not pay state aid for a fair having split dates unless the department gives advance written approval for a split fair. The department may approve split dates based on hardship.
- c. The department may pay state aid for the following exhibits or contests in a fair having split dates with advance notification to the department:
 - 1. Clothing revue
 - 2. Demonstrations
 - 3. Favorite foods revue
 - 4. Dogs
 - 5. Small animals
 - Rocketry
 - 7. Shooting sports
 - 7m. Mechanical projects
 - 8. Other exhibits and contests that are similar to those identified in subds. 1. to 7.

d. If there are split dates under par. (b) or (c), all blue ribbon winners shall repeat their demonstrations or exhibits at the regular fair dates unless the department grants a hardship exemption. An exhibitor may use audio-visual media, still photography or an educational display to repeat a demonstration or exhibit.

ATCP 160.03 Exhibition Requirements:

A fair shall meet all of the exhibition requirements of this section to be eligible for state premium aid.

- 1. No fair society or other organization sponsoring a fair may require an exhibitor to become a member of the organization in order to enter an exhibit at the fair, nor may the sponsoring organization make any deduction from an exhibitor's premium as a donation to the fair society, or require an exhibitor in any other way to make a donation to the society.
- 2. State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aid may not be approved for payment of premiums to an exhibitor having an out-of-state address but claiming Wisconsin residency unless the fair secretary provides the department with an affidavit that the exhibitor's residence is geographically located within the state.
- 3. State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in an exhibit building or actually shown in the show ring on regular fair dates unless approval for split fair dates is obtained under s. ATCP 160.02 (4). State aid may not be paid on Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, transportation aid, production contests or other special educational exhibits unless prior approval is obtained under s. ATCP 160.49 (7).
- 4. State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the fairgrounds before 4 p.m. on the last day of the fair, or such other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior approval of the department. Authority for earlier removal may be granted by the department in case of meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before the beginning of the fair. In other hard-ship cases, approval may be granted by the fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes may be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain present during the entire fair. The fair may prescribe the length of time junior fair exhibitors of horses shall keep their animal on the ground.

ATCP 160.49 Junior Fair Division-General Requirements:

- 1. In the junior fair division, the department may pay state aid on prizes offered to exhibitors who are ages 8 to 20 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year and exhibitors who are 5 to 9 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year who are exhibiting under s. ATCP 160.65. A fair board may establish specific entry classes within each department. A fair board may establish subgroups within a junior fair entry class based on the exhibitor's age or grade in school. The department may not pay state aid on prizes for club parades, club floats, song contests, or a project which is not an exhibit or demonstration at the fair.
- 2. All exhibitors in the junior fair division shall be members of a youth organization approved by the fair board.
- 3. Exhibits in the junior fair shall be the product of the exhibitor's own labor. An exhibit may include a study project, merit project or other special project, a skill area, or a supervised occupational experience in which the exhibitor is regularly enrolled, provided that the fair board approves the project, skill area, or supervised occupational experience as an exhibit.
- 4. State aid may not be used to award more than one premium to an exhibitor in a premium or lot number in the junior fair divi- sion, except for any of the following:
 - a. A premium may be awarded to each member of a group that collectively owns and enters a livestock exhibit in departments one to 5 of subch. IV.
 - b. An exhibitor may receive a separate premium for showmanship where authorized under subch. IV.

- c. An exhibitor may receive more than one premium in a department for which additional premiums are specifically authorized under subch. IV.
- 5. State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item or animal that has been exhibited in the junior division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item or animal.
- 6. Special educational exhibits may be established if the proposal is presented to the department before October 1 of the year preceding its proposed establishment and the exhibit is approved by the department.
- 7. Within any junior fair department, a fair may establish special classes where none are specified under this subchapter. Special classes may include classes for grade and crossbred females in the beef, swine, sheep and horse departments. Premiums for special classes created under this subsection shall be equal to premiums for comparable classes established in the same department under this subchapter.
- 8. The fair board may establish specific classes are age or grade level groupings within classes for each of the junior fair departments 14 to 16, 18, 20 to 29, 31, 33, and 34.
- 9. Judging in the junior fair division may be done using the regular, face-to-face, conference or Danish judging system.

ATCP 160.07 Classes; general requirements

- 1. Classes may be combined if the number of entries in several single classes is insufficient. If any classes are combined, state aid shall be limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class of animals, items or articles in that department.
- 2. a. Except as provided under par. (b), no fair may receive state aid for premiums awarded for sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, goats, swine or horses unless those animals are registered. Registered status shall be documented by a certificate of registry from the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the application for registration.
 - b. Paragraph (a) does not apply to dairy cattle exhibited at a fair if a national breed association certifies that those dairy cattle are recorded in that breed association's qualified herd book which records the genealogy of that breed.
- 3. Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be exhibited in a class for individual animals
- 4. Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine department unless their tusks have been removed.
- 5. The age of an animal, for purposes of determining its entry class under this chapter, shall be determined as of the opening day of the fair.

ATCP 160.91 Judging regulations

- 1. Judging shall be done at fairs by individuals who are registered with the department. In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair; nor shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department.
- 1m. a. An individual shall register by submitting to the department an application. The department shall register all individuals who qualify to be judges, including having the knowledge, training, or experience in the specific classes to be judged and adhering to ethical judging practices. The registration is valid for five years.
 - b. An individual submitting an application after July 1 may not judge for the current fair year.
 - c. A fair representative may request the department waive par. b in cases of unanticipated emergency situations.
- 2. Each judge at a fair shall be provided with a copy of the fair's premium book or list of entry classes at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair.

- 3. No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class.
- a. Danish system judging may be used in the junior fair division. State aid may not be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any other division.
 - b. When classes in the junior fair division are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placings shall be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first 2 groups and not more than 6 in the first 3 groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the class, there shall not be more than 25% in the first group, not more than 50% in the first 2 groups, and not more than 75% in the first 3 groups.
 - c. (c)The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.
- 4g. When classes in the junior fair division are judged using the conference judging system, the judge shall use sub. (4) (b) and (c) to award placements in a class.
- 5. If any class of exhibits at a fair is judged according to the regular system, the judges for that class may give only one first-place, one second-place, one third-place and one fourth-place award in that class

County Fairs

Rules & Regulations of Animal Health Subject to Change

All Exhibitors must comply with the following health regulations.

Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. For current information, check https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/AnimalMovement.aspx.

Diseases

Animals that show evidence of having contagious or infectious diseases may not be commingled (or housed/kept) with other animals at a fair, show, or other exhibition in such a way as to allow disease to spread. Such animals should not attend the fair, show, or exhibition. Animals may be denied entry if they arrive at these events with contagious or infectious diseases, isolated and/or removed if they develop disease after arriving, or be subject to other action as would be necessary to control disease.

Bovine animals with ringworm, mange, warts or scab will be removed from the fair or exhibition premises, unless the veterinarian in charge finds warts or ringworm lesions are incapable of transmitting disease.

Cattle and Bison

From within Wisconsin have no requirements for tests or health documents.

From outside Wisconsin must be accompanied by certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate) documenting official animal identification (ID) and all required tests and certifications; have at least one form of official individual ID (including steers); meet all of Wisconsin's normal requirements for import. (see https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs Services/CattleBison.aspx)

Acceptable animal IDs for all cattle from outside Wisconsin:

USDA metal ear tag number that is part of the National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) (starts with state 2-digit code, also known as "brite" tag) - this includes the orange brucellosis vaccination tag; 15-digit "840" tags (visual or RFID); valid only if applied before March 11, 2015: Manufacturer-coded RFID tag - 15-digit number with the first three digits in 900s and/or American ID tag - 8 to 12-digit number prefaced with "USA".

Brucellosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin: No cattle from outside Wisconsin are currently required to be brucellosis tested or vaccinated to come to fairs and shows in Wisconsin.

Tuberculosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin: For requirements by state, see: https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_services/CattleBison.aspx

Cattle from Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone (for cattle from Michigan's TB Free Zone, see requirements by state above) also need: Import permit; to originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older; negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin; to return directly to the state of origin after the show, and there must be a statement on the CVI that they will be doing so.

Cattle from Canada must meet current federal requirements to enter the United States. (See https://www.aphis.usda.gov/regulations/vs/iregs/animals/downloads/ca-protocol-imp-cattlebison.pdf)

Swine

Swine from within Wisconsin need a Wisconsin intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate):

Note: Herd of origin means the herd in which the pigs currently reside, likely the exhibitor's herd. When pigs are purchased from a herd, the herd from which they originate is the herd of origin for the seller. Once the purchased pigs are added into the buyer's herd (even if the buyer's herd only consists of one or just a few animals), the buyer's herd becomes the new herd of origin and that herd must meet testing requirements to move pigs again.

- Stating that the entire herd of origin was inspected on the farm within 30 days before the show and showed no signs
- Non-terminal Exhibitions: All swine must have a PRRS (Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome) and PEDv (Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus) test of the herd of origin within 90 days of the exhibition. Include test date, type, and results on the CVI. For swine originating from herds with positive tests, include the herd plan number on the CVI.
- **Terminal Exhibitions:** No testing requirements.

Note: Terminal Exhibitions are those at which the swine go directly from the fair/show to the slaughtering establishment OR to a slaughter only market sale.

Swine from outside Wisconsin need a certificate of veterinary inspection that includes the following: the negative results of the PRRS test from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results; the negative results of the PEDv test from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results; a statement that the veterinarian has inspected the entire herd of origin within the past 30 days and that no clinical signs of PRRS and PEDv or any other apparent disease was present at the time of inspection; official individual identification (ID). If the herd of origin tests positive for PRRS and/or PEDv, contact the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection at 608-224-4872 for options.

Acceptable methods of ID for swine are: USDA silver ear tag, USDA 840 ear tag (either visual or RFID), breed association tattoo if the pig is a purebred and the tattoo is registered, an ear tag with the premises identification number and a unique identifier or ear notch if the pig is a purebred and the notch is registered.

Sheep and Goats

Note: These rules do not apply to non-domestic sheep and goats. For these animals see the section on Exotic ruminants.

From within Wisconsin need: If sexually intact, need official individual identification (ID) at any age. If not sexually intact, need official individual ID if they are 12 months or older. See below for Official ID options. Cannot be under restriction for movement to fairs and shows. Sheep and goats that go to a market or slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the market/slaughter establishment.

From outside Wisconsin need: Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate) and official individual ID for all animals. See below for Official ID options. See below for additional requirements for goats from Michigan's Tuberculosis Modified Accredited Zone. Sheep and goats that go to a market or slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the market/slaughter establishment.

Official Identification includes: Scrapie eartags (including tags on neckstraps for animals with absent/injured ears or with official tattoos see DATCP Website*); USDA 840 ear tags, legible breed tattoos; legible scrapie tattoos, approved microchips (Electronic Identification/ EID) - There are many requirements that need to be met to use microchips including a requirement for accompanying tattoos.

Note: All sheep and goats that may go through a market or to slaughter and require Official Identification must be eartagged with Official ID. Official ID in the form of a tattoo or Electronic Implantable Identification (EID) is no longer sufficient when moving through a market or going to slaughter.

Note: If a Wisconsin origin animal is neutered, less than 12 months of age, and moving through a market after the fair, the market may require Official ID in the form of an ear tag.

Goats from Michigan's TB Modified Accredited Zone also need: An import permit; to originate from a herd that has a negative wholeherd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older; negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin; to return directly to the state of origin after the show, and there must be a statement on the CVI that they will be doing so

Equine

From within Wisconsin need documentation of a negative EIA test done within the previous 12 months, which clearly identifies the animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip (if a reader is available). No test is needed for nursing foals accompanying negative dams. Documentation may be: Official test report VS 10-11, or USDA-approved electronic test form, or Global Vet Link EIA electronic form, or certificate of veterinary inspection with the test results listed

From outside Wisconsin need: Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate) which clearly identifies the animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip; negative EIA test done within previous 12 months that is reported on the CVI. No EIA test is needed for nursing foals accompanying negative dams

Equines from Minnesota are exempt from the CVI requirement if: Ownership does not change while the animal is in Wisconsin, the animal remains in Wisconsin no longer than 7 days, proof of a negative EIA test in previous 12 months accompanies the animal.

<u>South American Camelids</u> *From within Wisconsin* have no requirements.

From outside Wisconsin Must have a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate) and official individual identification (ID). Official ID may be: approved USDA ear tag number, microchip number, breed association registration number or breed association tattoo

Poultry and Waterfowl

(Pigeons are not considered poultry for fairs and shows)

From within Wisconsin need a NPIP certificate stating that the birds originate from a US pullorum-typhoid clean or NPIP affiliate flock and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum, or a DATCPissued certificate stating they are from a Wisconsin Tested or Associate Flock and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum.

OR

IIndividually test sexually mature birds within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band identification (ID). All birds must test negative for pullorumtyphoid, and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum.

From outside Wisconsin need a certificate of veterinary inspection or equivalent (such as form VS 9-3) that states: they originate from a flock classified pullorum-typhoid clean under NPIP or an equivalent state program and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum, or if they are sexually mature, that they have tested negative for pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band ID.

Not required: Import permit number

Small Animals: Dogs, Domestic Cats, Other Household Pets (Includes: ferrets, pet birds, rabbits, gerbils, guinea pigs, hamsters, domestic mice and rats)

Note: For animals that are part of menageries, see also rules below for menageries. Pot-bellied and miniature pigs fall under rules for swine. Dog hybrids, domestic cat hybrids, or exotic small cat species such as servals fall under rules for Exotic small animals. Native wild animals and

birds, including raptors, and captive wild animals such as raccoons, opossums, and skunks fall under rules for wild animals.

Dogs from within Wisconsin that are 5 months or older need proof of current rabies vaccination.

Cats and other household pets from within Wisconsin: See page 41 for DCF Cat health requirements. No DATCP requirements for other household pets.

Dogs and cats from outside Wisconsin - 5 months or older need to be vaccinated for rabies by a licensed veterinarian, and regardless of age, need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates) stating the age of the animal and for animals 5 months and older the date of last rabies vaccination and revaccination due date.

Other household pets from outside Wisconsin need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates) but have no testing or vaccination requirements.

Small animals from other nations need to meet requirements of the U.S. Department of Agriculture ((608) 662-0600) and Centers for Disease Control (800-232-4636).

Exotic Ruminants

Note: Exotic ruminants are ruminants that are not native to Wisconsin, and are not cervids – for example, Old World camels, yaks, water buffalo, pronghorn antelope, giraffes, and non-domestic sheep and goats. In addition, please contact your county and local municipality for any restrictions.

From within Wisconsin have no requirements.

From outside Wisconsin must have: A certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate); official individual identification (ID) as required for tuberculosis and brucellosis testing; import permit; proof written on the CVI that they meet requirements for: Tuberculosis (TB) — negative test required within 60 days before entry and Brucellosis — negative test required within 30 days before entry.

Please call (608) 224-4872 beforehand to determine which TB test to use

Exotic Small Animals

(Any species not covered by "small animals" above)

Note: Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.

From within Wisconsin do not have any requirements as long as they are legally possessed in Wisconsin.

From outside Wisconsin generally have no testing or vaccination requirements, but do need: a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate) and an import permit number

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin. These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice. Some animals may require permits from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. See http://dnr.wi.gov.

Circus, Rodeo, Racing and Menagerie Animals

Note: Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.

From within Wisconsin must meet vaccination and testing requirements for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

From outside Wisconsin need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates) and vaccinations, identification, and tests required for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document. They also need import permit numbers if they are: circuses and individual circus acts; rodeo stock other than individual participants' horses; multi-species menageries (defined as any animals kept in a collection primarily for purposes of exhibition or competition); petting zoos. They do not need import permit numbers if they are: rodeo horses owned by individual participants or single-species groups

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin. These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brushtailed porcupines and striped mice. THE YOUTH ANIMAL EXHIBITOR CODE OF PRACTICE

This code of practice applies to anyone exhibiting animals and members of their immediate family (parents, siblings, and/or grandparents) at Dane County Fair in Madison, Wisconsin. It includes junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. All classes of livestock offered at the livestock event are included; Cattle (Beef and Dairy), Goats (Angora, Dairy) Equine (Donkey, Horses), and other specialty animals, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, Swine and any other livestock class offered. The Youth Animal Exhibitor Code of Practice will be enhanced with additional rules and regulations which individual fairs and livestock shows impose on the local, county, state, regional, and national levels.

The following practices or procedures are unacceptable and are defined as being deceptive, fraudulent, unethical, misrepresentative, and inhumane in the care, fitting, preparation and showing of all animals. The use of any illegal drugs is prohibited. Legal or illegal substances used to phenotypically alter the appearance of an animal. (See rule #4) Use of illegal drugs is considered a pre-meditated act! Furthermore, any information obtained in the practice of illegal alteration of an animal will be turned over to proper authorities. THIS IS A ONE STRIKE AND YOU ARE OUT POLICY! Exhibitor will forfeit any premium, awards, or auction proceeds, and will be prohibited from further competition in the United States, as well as being subject to criminal prosecution if proven guilty.

The following is a listing of guidelines all exhibitors must follow to enter animals at organized competitive events.

- 1) All exhibitors must have viable proof (junior division) of ownership available to prove length of time animals have been owned. Market animals (Beef, Sheep, Swine, and Goats) must be owned and under exhibitor's daily care according to established rules and regulations for the fair or livestock exposition. This also includes all small market animals (Rabbits and Poultry). The official ownership date is the date shown on the bill of sale, unless the animal was bred by the exhibitor, in which calving or birthing records must be shown. (Local rules may determine ownership requirements for non-market animals). Registered breeding livestock must show the exhibitor as the sole owner of the animal on the breed Association papers or certificates.
- 2) Any method used to misrepresent the age of an animal for a class in which it is shown is deceptive and considered illegal. Showing an animal for another individual by claiming ownership in order to show in a specific class is prohibited. False ownership is illegal.
- 3) It is recommended that Junior Exhibitors care for and groom their own animals while at the fair. Specific regulations may exist. Please refer to each department's regulations for any additional guidelines.
- 4) Treating an animal internally or externally, with any irritant, counter-irritant, or other substance used to artificially change the conformation or appearance of an animal for show is considered unethical, inhumane, and is prohibited. This includes, but is not limited to the use of graphite, powders, hemp, artificial hair coloring, common products such as fly spray, ointment or liniment used to the point that it is irritating, (unless it is required to reduce edema at the time of calving) or similar type products. The use of dyes, spray paint or other artificial coloring which result in altering an animal's true and natural appearance and/or color is prohibited. Adding false hair or hair-like material, fleece, or skin at any point, spot or area of the animal's body is illegal and will result in immediate disqualification. Any liquid or substance not considered part of an accepted and normal diet for livestock is deemed illegal and inhumane. For example: the use of alcoholic or carbonated beverage as a drench or filler, etc.
- 5) The use of tranquilizers, sedatives, or depressants which alter the physical or physiological state of the animal is illegal. Exceptions to this rule would be a licensed, certified veterinarian's treatment for a recognized disease or injury, or recommendation for tranquilizing breeding animals in heat that might compromise the safety of others.

The drugs must be approved by the Food and Drug Administration for use in meat producing animals. All exhibitors shall advise show management of any drugs and/or medications administered to an animal that might be detected at the time of showing or at meat inspection. The name of the drug, its purpose, the person who administered the drug, time and date of administration shall be

presented to show management prior to showing and sale of the animal. Failure to report this information to the show management will result in severe penalty and/or disqualification. Any use of drugs or substances not approved by the Food and Drug Administration is strictly prohibited. All animals entered into livestock competition shall be subject to testing for foreign substances that exceed acceptable levels established by the FDA, FSIS, USDA, or EPA.

During the animal events, in case of animals requiring treatment, all medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian and the show officials shall be notified.

- 6) Surgery, injection or insertion of foreign material under the skin/ or flesh of an animal to change the natural contour, confirmation or appearance of an animal's body is illegal. This includes vegetable oil, silicon or any other substance used to alter the shape of the animal. Acceptable practices of physical preparation which are allowed include clipping of hair, trimming of hooves, dehorning, or removal of ancillary teats.
- 7) The balancing of the udder by abnormal means that includes the use of a mechanical contrivance or the injection of fluid or drugs, setting the teats and/or occluding (sealing the ends) with a mechanical contrivance or with the use of chemical preparation is illegal. Treating or massaging the udder or its attachments with an irritant or counter irritant is prohibited.
- 8) The use of inhumane fitting, showing and/or handling practices shall not be tolerated. For example, breaking of tails, striking of animal to cause swelling or for bracing purposes, use of an electrical contrivance, or use of overly severe bits is not acceptable.
- 9) Direct criticism, interference, involvement with an altercation, and use of offensive language with the judge, show management, Chairs, Superintendents, other exhibitors, breed representatives, show officials, or attendees, during pre-Fair and Fair events is prohibited.
- 10) At the time an animal is sold at auction at the livestock show, the exhibitor shall be held directly responsible for animals that are rejected at the time of processing due to the presence of foreign residues. The seller will also be liable for attorney's fees and civil penalties. Show management may share acceptable intelligence and evidence information with FDA and USDA. If for any reason, any part of a meat animal carcass must be removed by the FDA or USDA inspectors, the market price will be discounted.
- 11) Show management reserves the right to require animal health certificates. Health inspection and diagnostic test may be made before or after animals are on the show premises for exhibitor and animal safety, or to inaugurate disease control procedures which may become necessary in emergencies as determined by animal health officials.

Any violation of "The Youth Exhibitor Code of Practice" or specific rules as designated by individual fairs and livestock shows will result in forfeiture of premiums and awards, disqualification for the youth exhibitor for the present Fair year, and a minimum one-year suspension from showing livestock at the Dane County Fair for the youth exhibitor and immediate family members, and may result in a loss of eligibility for future participation in an organized livestock competition for the youth exhibitor and immediate family members. Possible civil penalties may be imposed by the proper authorities based on evidence provided by the show of exhibitors in violation of the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic act/or the animal mistreatment, neglect and abandonment laws that apply on local, state, and national levels.

Other cooperating shows will be notified of the action taken by show management, which may affect the eligibility of the individual, immediate family members, group, or sponsoring organization at other shows

The decision of Dane County Fair Management will be final.

The decision of Dane County Fair Management will be final. The youth animal exhibitor and parent/guardian will accept and abide by the Dane County Fair Code of Practice as a term and condition of submitting entries with FairEntry. The club or project leader will review and acknowledge the 'exhibitors with entries summary report' and confirm the youth animal exhibitor is in active participation with the animal species.

To exhibit dairy cattle at the 2023 Dane County Fair, ALL exhibitors must submit, their educational requirements card (found at the Dane County 4-H Youth Development web page), by June 15, stating at least one educational events/programs they have participated in. Youth must upload YQCA and Education Requirement Forms online. No mailed forms will be accepted. Should you have any questions what events qualify or to confirm you have met the stated requirements, contact the Dane County Dairy Education Committee Chair: Mitch Breunig at mysticvalley336@gmail.com. NO exceptions will be made.

NEW THIS YEAR

All exhibitors **MUST** enter Showmanship in the species they exhibit at the DCF. Exhibitors who are not entered in showmanship will automatically be entered prior to the Fair. If an exhibitor does not wish to participate in showmanship, they can scratch on-site at the Fair.

Regulations:

- A Stalling Request Form must be completed by all Dairy clubs to indicate the number of calves, yearlings and cows. Clubs wanting to be stalled adjacent to one another must both submit a form indicating as such. Club leaders must notify Fair Staff of final exhibitor and animal numbers by July 6 to allow Superintendents an opportunity to better plan and assign stalling locations. Leaders can report numbers via the web at: bit.ly/DairyStallingRequestForm
- Exhibitors must house and tie their animals with the club they submit entries with.

- 3. Upon arrival to the Fair on check-in day, veterinarians will inspect animals for general health (warts, ringworm, etc.). Infected animals will be sent home at the discretion of the veterinarian. Inspection must be completed by 8 p.m. Wednesday to remain on the grounds. Animals and registration papers must be brought to the Dairy check-in area in Pavilion 2 to be evaluated for health check-in, prior to stalling.
- 4. All exhibitors are responsible for the general housekeeping and clean-up in their area. All animal exhibitors must work together to keep the grounds clean. Livestock exhibitors must clean-up after their animals and regularly dispose of waste in an appropriate manner. Wheelbarrows may not be left with manure. Common water tubs are not allowed.
- Exhibitors must be capable of controlling their animal in the showring. Any exhibitor not capable of controlling his or her animal may be excused by the superintendent(s) or judge.
- 6. Entry Regulations:
 - a) Exhibitors may not enter more than one animal per lot.
 - b) Grade 3: You may show one animal spring, winter or fall heifer calf.
 - c) Grade 4: You may show two animals spring, fall or winter calves. A yearling may be shown by a fourth grader if the animal was a project the previous year.
 - d) Grade 5 or over: You may show up to four animals; five, if at least one is a cow.
 - e) Up to three managerial animals may be shown.
 - f) All animals must be purchased before June 1 of exhibit year.
 - g) Animal registration of ownership in exhibitor's name must be completed before June 1 of exhibit year for all registered lots. ***Wisconsin State Fair dairy rules and regulations will be referenced should managerial/ownership questions arise for the Dane County Fair. ***
- All exhibitors must read and adhere to the Youth Animal Exhibitor Code of Practice as stated on page 12.
- 8. Tents are prohibited throughout the animal housing area.
- 9. Long white pants and white shirts are required for show.
- 10. **Terms:**

Rules:

- Open to all 4-H, FFA and Dairy Breed Association exhibitors enrolled in the dairy project with registered or grade dairy cows entered at the Fair.
- Eligible animals must be on a processed DHI testing program. Cows on Profitest are not eligible.
- Cows must be identified with an official number (i.e. registration or official eartag) that corresponds to the identification reported on the cow's DHI record
- 4. Class Entry Can be entered in FairEntry!
 - a. Classes are based on the cow's number of lactations and include: Lactation 1, 2, 3 and 4 or greater.
 - b. Only animals pre-entered for the Miss Q contest submitted with Fair entries are eligible to participate in the contest and corresponding auction.
 - c. Each exhibitor entering the contest must submit a minimum of two (2) names and addresses of potential buyers with their entry. *Free admission tickets will be provided to potential buyers.*
 - d. An Udder Health Management Cow List or an Individual Cow Record (ICR) from May 2023, or most current DHIA test day must be uploaded via FairEntry at the time exhibitor submits entries for the Fair, or emailed to the Fair (fair@wdexpo.com) by June 24th.

Winning Entries

- a. The animal in each class with the lowest lactation Average Linear Score will be declared the winner.
 - The Average Linear Score used in the competition will be for the current lactation as long as the cow has more than two tests.
 - ii.) If a cow has less than two tests recorded in the current lactation, the Average Linear Score used in the competition will be from her previous lactation.
 - iii.) Dry Cows are eligible for the competition.
 - iv.) Cows shown in a dry cow class, that do not have a recorded dry date, will compete using the Average Linear Score from the current lactation.
 - v.) Cows showing in a dry cow class that do have a recorded dry date will compete using the Average Linear Score from the recently completed lactation.
- b. In case of tie, the animal with the <u>most test dates</u> in that lactation will be declared the winner.
- c. If a tie cannot be broken, all animals with the lowest lactation Average Linear Score in that lactation class will sell one (1) pitcher of milk in the auction.
- d. If a lactation class has no entries, there will be no winner for that class. Another class cannot have two winners to make up for the class with no entries.
- Each exhibitor is allowed to win only one (1) Miss Q Contest lactation class and thereby sell only one (1) pitcher of milk.
- 7. Each Exhibitor may only participate in one (1) Miss Q Contest per year.
- 8. VAS will recognize and award only one winner in each of the lactation classes, except in case of a tie as stated in 5b. If each class does not have an entry, the number of winners will be adjusted accordingly as stated in rule number 5d above.

Regulations:

- All County Fairs Rules and Regulations of Animal Health applicable to cattle (outlined in the front of this Premium Book) must be met.
- All County and District Fair Wisconsin Administrative Code Regulations applicable to cattle (outlined in the front of this Fair Book) must be met.
- All exhibitors must read and adhere to the Youth Animal Exhibitor Code of Practice as stated on page 12.
- All beef animals must be checked by a veterinarian at the Veterinarian Check-in at the northeast side of Pavilion 2 on arrival before going to their stalling locations.
- All animals need official I.D.: Heifers: tattoo, Steers: RFID tags.
 The last four digits of these I.D. tattoos and RFID tags must be
 listed on your fair entry form.
- In order to be eligible for entry and show, all steers must be RFID tagged and weighed on the designated Dane County Beef Weigh-In Day. If tag is lost, exhibitor must contact the Extension Office and Department Chair to report the missing tag(s).
- 7. All beef exhibitors (heifer and steer) must meet YQCA requirements. Youth must complete a training program each year by either attending an in-person session or completing an online course. Visit https://www.danecountyfair.com/p/youth-exhibitors/education-requirements--opportunities/livestock-departments for more information. Exhibitors must also attend

one additional beef educational qualifying meeting. The beef education requirement form must be on file with the Extension Office by June 15. Youth must upload YQCA and Education Requirement Forms online. No mailed forms will be accepted. Exhibitors who have not met these requirements will be ineligible to exhibit beef projects at the Fair.

- **NEW THIS YEAR** Animals in the championship drive will be evaluated for the top five placings.
- 9. All beef exhibits must be in place by 7 p.m., Wednesday.
- All beef animals must be housed in the Beef Area of Pavilion 2.
 All stalls will be assigned by the superintendents.
- 11. All exhibitors are responsible for the general housekeeping and clean-up in their area. Livestock exhibitors must clean-up after their animals and immediately dispose of waste in an appropriate manner. Please provide your own tools and equipment for clean-up. No common water tubs. No floor fans allowed in aisles in Pavilion. Fans must be securely attached. No cords intended to be in place all week are allowed on the floor. No wheelbarrows should be left with manure. No feed pans or water buckets should be left in pens with animals during the day. ALL FITTING CHUTES MUST BE REMOVED BY 8 a.m. FRIDAY.
- No portable misting or sprinkler systems may be used. Discretion by Superintendents and Fair Administration will be used based on weather conditions.
- All animal entries must have the provided Dane County Fair animal information card displayed with their animal's information.
 No farm advertising is permitted in the youth animal exhibit area.
- 14. All animals exhibited must be the result of beef project work that has been signed up for through the County Extension Office, FFA Chapter (exhibitor is listed on County Extension Office or on FFA records as a project member), or junior breed association.
- 15. Exhibitor is limited to a total of five (5) animals in the Junior Beef Department with not more than three (3) steers or Beef Market Lot animals. Exhibitor may enter only one animal per lot in the breeding classes.
- 16. Managerial breeding stock is allowed. A managerial animal is an animal that is under the daily care of, but not owned by, the exhibitor. The animal must comply with the beef project requirements of the organization under which the participant is exhibiting the managerial animal.
- 17. All purebred junior calves, senior heifer calves, summer yearling heifers, junior yearling heifers, senior yearling heifers and cows must be registered in the exhibitor's name before **May 1** of the exhibit year to be shown on an ownership basis. Registration papers shall be submitted to the beef superintendent at check-in.
- 18. Grooming, fitting and clipping of show animals while on exhibit at the Fair is limited to the exhibitor, the exhibitor's immediate family (defined as father, mother, grandparents, sister, brother or legal guardian or stepparent with proof of relationship) and/or other participating Dane County Fair Beef member junior exhibitors. Managerial animals cannot be fitted by the owner unless the owner is a junior or related as stated previously. Fitting includes, but is not limited to, the day to day management practices of feeding, exercising and show preparation. Failure to comply with this rule will result in animal disqualification, immediate exhibitor disqualification and possible future exhibitor disqualification.
- All animals must be shown by the project member unless special permission, to do otherwise, is given by the superintendent in charge.
- In pair classes and cow-calf classes, additional handler must be a current year Beef project member.
- 21. In breeding stock, if the breed characteristic includes horns, they **must** be capped while on grounds.

22. BREED CLASSIFICATION

<u>ANGUS</u>: Registration papers from the American Angus Association must show parentage to be 100% registered Angus.

<u>HEREFORD</u>: Registration papers from the American Hereford Association must show parentage to be 100% registered Hereford.

<u>SHORTHORN</u>: Registration papers from the American Shorthorn Association must indicate that the animal is of 15/16 Shorthorn parentage or higher. These registration papers are red.

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<u>SIMMENTAL</u>: Registration papers from the American Simmental Association must indicate that the animal is 7/8 Simmental parentage or higher.

ANY OTHER BREED HIGH PERCENTAGE: Registration papers from respective breed associations, must indicate the animal is 75% or greater of respective breed parentage. Does not include Angus, Hereford, Shorthorn or Simmental breeds. ALL BREEDS LOW PERCENTAGE: Registration papers from respective breed associations for animals that do not meet the above listed criteria for those breeds (Shorthorn less than 15/16, Simmental less than 7/8 and all other breeds less than 75%)

<u>CROSSBRED</u>: Animals not meeting the above requirements or without registration papers will be considered unregistered and will be shown in the crossbred class.

The DCF Swine Show is NON-TERMINAL

All swine must have a PRRS (Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome) and PEDv (Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus) test of the herd of origin within 90 days of the exhibition. Include test date, type, and results on the CVI. For swine originating from herds with positive tests, include the herd plan number on the CVI. All exhibitors are responsible for taking pigs home, or to slaughter, including those sold in the Meat Animal Sale. Animals are released at 6:30 p.m. Sunday. Swine unable to load out Sunday evening due to biosecurity purposes may be left overnight. Remaining Swine must be removed between 6:30 - 7:30 a.m. Monday morning. Families electing this option MUST designate their intent at Swine registration or the overnight hold will not be allowed.

NEW THIS YEAR

All exhibitors **MUST** enter Showmanship in the species they exhibit at the DCF. Exhibitors who are not entered in showmanship will automatically be entered prior to the Fair. If an exhibitor does not wish to participate in showmanship, they can scratch on-site at the Fair.

Regulations

- Use of Ractopamine (Paylean) in DCF swine is prohibited.
 This action was taken to insure a market for all show swine. If use is detected, the exhibitor will face loss of exhibiting privileges (similar to use of other banned or illegal drugs).
 Exhibitors will be required to certify (at weigh-in) that ractopamine has not been fed to their hogs.
- Exhibitors are responsible for meeting State, County and District Fair Rules and Regulations of Animal Health as printed in the front of this book. DATCP has recommended all swine should be vaccinated for influenza; be sure to follow label directions.
- All exhibitors must read and adhere to the Youth Animal Exhibitor Code of Practice as stated on page 12.
- 4. All exhibitors are responsible for daily general housekeeping in

- their area. Livestock exhibitors must clean-up after their animals and regularly dispose of waste in an appropriate manner. All hogs must be fed, watered and pens cleaned by 9 a.m. each day of the fair. Swine exhibitors are encouraged to have waterers in pens at the Fair. Please provide your own tools and equipment for clean-up. Department superintendents will explain proper procedures for the department.
- 5. An exhibitor is limited to not more than three (3) hogs of which only two (2) per sex are shown. e.g. Two (2) market barrows and one (1) market gilt, or one (1) market barrow and two (2) market gilts. Classes are determined by final weigh-in weights, so there is a chance an exhibitor can have two animals in one class if they are the same breed and close to the same weight.
- 6. Barrow and Gilt information:
 - a) All barrows & gilts will be weighed on check-in day to determine final weight and arrange classes.
 - b) All barrows & gilts must be identified by breed and ear notch identification at the County Spring Swine Registration, April 22 from 9:00 - 11:00 a.m. at the 4-H Extension Office. Failure to provide ear notch information will prevent registration of that animal. Additional details will be announced on the Dane County 4-H Youth Development website. All swine registered will be provided with an RFID tag to be placed in the ear by the exhibitor or their representative. Cost of the RFID tag will be \$5 per animal. The records of the official ear notch and RFID tag will be verified at the Fair weigh-in. The information at weigh-in must match that provided at registration for the animal to be eligible to show. If an exhibitor is found to be swapping animals he/she will forfeit premiums, Meat Animal Sale income, and be banned from exhibiting at the Dane County Fair for two years. It is illegal, by state law, to remove RFID tags. All registration material must be returned or delivered (not postmarked) to Richard Straub, 292 Glenway Road, Brooklyn, WI 53521 on or before May 6, 2023. Failure to provide this will result in loss of exhibiting privileges. For point of reference, the suggested minimum weight is 60-90 pounds at the Spring Swine Registration. Be aware of and use your own herd data to predict the rate of gain to insure that you meet the required weights listed in (c).
 - c) All hogs must meet the weight requirements of 230 300 pounds on the final weigh-in day to be eligible for the Meat Animal Sale.
 - d) Required to sell at the Dane County Meat Animal Sale (see sale requirements) will be the Champion & Reserve Champion market barrows. Elimination from the sale will be based on the lightest weight in the 230 to 300 weight range.
 - d) Breeding gilts may not be shown as both a market gilt and a breeding gilt. Breeding gilts are not eligible for the Meat Animal Sale.
 - e) All gilts must be farrowed prior to March 1.
- 7. All swine exhibitors must meet YQCA requirements. Youth must complete a training program each year by either attending an in-person session or completing an online course. Visit https://www.danecountyfair.com/p/youth-exhibitors/education-requirements--opportunities/livestock-departments for more information. Exhibitors must also attend one additional swine educational qualifying meeting. A copy of the swine education requirement form must be on file with the Extension Office by June 15. Youth must upload YQCA and Education Requirement Forms online. No mailed forms will be accepted. Exhibitors who have not met these requirements will be ineligible to exhibit swine projects at the Fair.
- **NEW THIS YEAR** Animals in the championship drive will be evaluated for the top five placings.
- A Swine Department Superintendent must inspect all health papers and animals <u>before</u> unloading.
- Swine exhibits must be <u>owned</u> by the exhibitor prior to April 15 of exhibit year.
- Hurdles will be furnished by the Dane County Fair Association. However, exhibitors may use their own hurdles if no farm name is used.

- 12. Purebred and crossbred barrows & gilts may be shown. Purebreds must represent the breed. For all purebreds (barrows and gilts) original pedigree forms, from the purebred organization, must be presented in the name of the exhibitor and/or the exhibitor's family. If a pig does not have pedigree papers, it will default to the appropriate crossbred class.
- 13. Barrows & gilts will be shown in separate lots on Friday.
- 14. The Exhibitor must designate their sale animal on Wednesday at weigh-in. Performance information will be available.
- 15. No straw will be used for bedding. Wood shavings are required.

Regulations:

- Exhibitors are responsible for having read State and County Fair Regulations and Animal Health Regulations as printed in the front of this book.
- All exhibitors must read and adhere to the Youth Animal Exhibitor Code of Practice as stated on page 12.
- All exhibitors are responsible for the general housekeeping and clean-up in their area. Livestock exhibitors must clean up after their animals and dispose of waste in an appropriate manner. Please provide your own tools and equipment for clean-up.
- 4. All breeding sheep must be owned on or before May 31 of exhibit year. Market lambs must be owned by May 1, 2023. Market lambs will be tagged on May 6, 2023 at the Stoughton Fairgrounds from 9:00 11:00 a.m. Exhibitors may tag up to 10 lambs. Market lambs must have attached scrapie tags by May 7, 2023.
- Exhibitors are limited to not more than 11 animals from all breed lots (including market and feeder lambs).
- All purebred sheep must have breeder's and association tags (for the breeds that have them) in the ear. The superintendent will check papers on Wednesday. Mouth must be right with papers.
- 7. Pens will be assigned by the superintendents.
- Management health suggestion (not mandatory): Exhibitors
 are encouraged to vaccinate their exhibits for contagious
 sheep diseases. Check with your 4-H leader, FFA advisor, local
 veterinarian or Dane County UW-Extension Office for information.
 All sheep MUST have scrapie tags in order to exhibit,
 including Market Lambs.
- 9. No muzzles on sheep.
- 10. **NEW THIS YEAR** No belly wool is permitted.
- 11. No icing, drenching or toweling of market lambs.
- 12. No blankets or sweaters may be worn at weigh-in. All sheep will be checked for lamb fungus. Any sheep showing signs of lamb fungus will not be allowed to exhibit and must be removed from the Fairgrounds. An on-grounds vet will check to determine if an animal may stay or must be removed.

- 13. All sheep exhibitors (breeding and market) must meet YQCA requirements. Youth must complete a training program each year by either attending an in-person session or completing an online course. Visit https://www.danecountyfair.com/p/youth-exhibitors/education-requirements--opportunities/livestock-departments for more information. Exhibitors must also attend one additional sheep educational qualifying meeting. A copy of the sheep education requirement form must be on file with the Extension Office by June 15. Youth must upload YQCA and Education Requirement Forms online. No mailed forms will be accepted. Exhibitors who have not met these requirements will be ineligible to exhibit sheep projects at the Fair.
- 14. **NEW THIS YEAR** Animals in the championship drive will be evaluated for the top five placings.
- Market lambs over 150 pounds are eligible to show, but are NOT eligible to sell.
- 16. If the number of animals consigned exceeds 50 head for the Meat Animal Sale, selection of the 50 sale animals will be based on:

General

The Dane County Meat Animal Sale is managed by the Dane County Meat Animal Sale Association. This association is an organization of interested persons whose purpose is the organization and operation of the Dane County Meat (Large) Animal Sale. This is an independent association and is not connected to the Dane County Fair Board, Dane County 4-H Leaders Association, UW-Extension Office or any other group.

Objectives

- To provide incentive for and to encourage participation in Beef, Swine and Sheep projects.
- To provide livestock (Beef, Swine and Sheep) project members with a marketing opportunity.
- To teach a greater understanding of livestock feeding, livestock marketing and meat animal science.

Weigh-in and Pre-Registration Information

Winter/Spring animal weigh-in must be on the designated weigh-in or pre-registration (swine) date and at the approved location.

Youth ownership of animals is limited to the project member youth or <u>his/her immediate family only.</u> Immediate family is defined as: sister, step-sister, brother or step-brother.

Regulations

The following requirements are in effect concerning the Dane County (Large) Meat Animal Sale. The requirements apply to all prospective participants and their consignments.

- The Meat Animal Sale (MAS) is limited to beef, sheep and swine exhibitors who reside in Dane County. Out of county exhibitors belonging to a Dane County 4-H, FFA or other approved youth organization are subject to the following rules:
 - Out of county exhibitors are <u>required</u> to meet all "in-county" exhibitor requirements, in addition to the following requirements, to be eligible to participate in the Dane County Meat Animal Sale:
 - a) Must meet the MAS exhibitor qualifications (meetings, dates) for two (2) years prior to selling and provide appropriate documentation to the Dane County Meat Animal Sale Committee (DCMASC) by June 15 each year.
 - b) Must exhibit in the species they plan on showing or qualifying for the MAS in for two (2) years prior to selling.
 - c) The DCMASC will limit the number of out-of-county animals that will sell to the top five in any one species.
 - d) Once a member of a family from an out-of-county family meets the above requirement, the other members of the immediate family (defined above), will not have to wait the two years.
- 2. Dane County Meat Animal Sale participants may not sell in another county fair meat animal sale in the same year they sell at the Dane County Meat Animal Sale. Proof of another county fair sale will make the exhibitor ineligible for the next Dane County Meat Animal Sale following the sale in question, as determined by the Dane County Meat Animal Sale Committee. The only exception would be selling at the Wisconsin State Fair.
- Sale participants must be enrolled as a livestock project member with the Dane County Extension Office or a Dane County FFA Chapter before January 1 of the current year.

- All consignments must be made from animals entered in the Dane County Fair.
- 5. **NEW THIS YEAR** All exhibitors wishing to participate in Meat Animal Sale must complete the Specie(s) (beef, sheep and/or swine) animal identification form. This form will be distributed at the species weigh-in/identification and must be turned in immediately. Exhibitors must complete this identification form for each species they intend on selling. Exhibitors who do not submit this form for each species are NOT eligible to sell ONLY show the animal. NOTE: It is not the responsibility of the Meat Animal Sale Association to track down misdirected forms or to process forms that are late.
- 6. Sale animals must conform to Department of Agriculture animal health regulations and drug withdrawal times. Consignors will be required to sign drug withdrawal certificates at weigh-in. Animals not complying (or are found to be misrepresenting their animal) will be disqualified from the sale. Drug withdrawal forms must be filled out and signed by parent or legal guardian on entry day.
- ELIGIBILITY & QUALIFICATION for Meat Animal Sale Grand and Reserve Grand Champion: Market animals entering the show ring for each specie for selection of Meat Animal Sale Grand and Reserve Grand Champion must be eligible for and meet the eligibility and qualification conditions for the Meat Animal Sale.
- 8. Livestock sold must meet the following weight requirements to qualify for the sale:
 - a) Steers: Straight/Crossbred Beef Breeds: minimum 950 lbs.
 - b) Steers: Dairy/Dairy Cross Breeds: minimum 1,200 lbs. Note: For any animals exceeding 1,500 lbs., that are sold in Dane County Meat Animal Sale, consignors/exhibitors will only be paid to 1,500 lbs., and buyers will only pay for 1,500 lbs.
 - c) Market Lambs: 105 150 lbs.
 - d) Hogs: 230 300 lbs.
- 9. Beef, Sheep and Swine are limited to one weigh-in per animal at check-in. Only rope halters are allowed at weigh-in for beef steers. Steers with neck straps will not be weighed until a rope halter is put on. All beef animals will be subjected to a live grade and point evaluation to prioritize steers for sale eligibility. Beef steers must grade "select plus" or better to sell. Only steers with no permanent teeth in place and all milk teeth in their mouths will be eligible to sell. Please see page 17, Market Steer Regulation #2 for an in-depth description.

Note: Exhibitors with more than one steer to be considered for the sale are required to bring all of those steers for weighing and grading at the same time. Decisions on which steer exhibitors will submit for sale must be made immediately at live grade assignment prior to leaving the scale area.

- 10. Sale order is determined by drawing numbers. The Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Steer, Swine and Market Lambs will sell first. All above listed champions are to be sold in the Meat Animal Sale, provided Meat Animal Sale eligibility requirements have been met. An exhibitor (consignor) may sell two animals of different species in the Meat Animal Sale. In the event one exhibitor receives multiple Grand and/or Reserve Champions in one species, all Champions and Reserves sell.
- 11. Livestock purchased through the sale Friday do not become the responsibility of the purchaser until release time of the Fair (Sunday night or Monday morning). The consignor/seller:
 - a) Is responsible for feeding and care of animals through the duration of the fair.
 - b) Must check with the purchaser for any special arrangements until delivery is taken.
 - c) Must deliver purchased animal to the purchaser (or representative/trucker/processor, etc) at that species' load out area at release time Sunday night.
 - d) **NEW THIS YEAR** Buyer must designate sale night where animal is going. Sale invoice must be in hand of trucker/ buyer when animal is picked up at Fair.

- Beef consignors/sellers must provide a rope halter with their consignment.
- 13. If show rights on sold animals are to be retained, it is suggested the seller/consignor/exhibitor, for their own protection, obtain a signed release form from the buyer indicating he/she understands the concept associated with show rights and has agreed to allow the seller to retain those rights on the identified animal (animal identified by sale number and State Fair tag or other identifying data). A notation of how the sale of the identified animal will be addressed should the animal qualify for sale at another show also should be included. The release should be obtained before load out Sunday night and a copy should be left with the sales species load out representative then. The Meat Animal Sale Association will not be responsible for any misunderstanding, damage or delays in delivery resulting from the granting of show rights to any consignor or seller. An announcement to this effect will be made at the sale and included in any sale-related information.
- 14. Since this a non-terminal Fair, exhibitors who sell at the MAS may be responsible for transporting their animal home on Sunday and then to the processor designated if the buyer wants the hog processed (unless the processor choses to provide transport on Sunday afternoon). For swine retained by the exhibitor when the buyer chooses the premium option, the exhibitor must transport their animals back home Sunday evening. For youth that cannot take animals home due to biosecurity concerns, they must designate this at swine registration in April and will be allowed to keep their hogs at the Alliant Energy Center overnight. They must load out those animals between 6:30 and 7:30 AM on Monday morning for disposition directly to a market or processor.
- 15. Substituting of animals is not allowed.
- 16. In addition to champions, Sale quotas are 50 steers, 50 barrows/ gilts and 50 lambs. Animals will be ranked for sale consignment eligibility based on show ring placing, live grade or points depending on the species. Consignors will meet before steer, swine and lamb shows to explain this provision if it is to be applied to that particular species. In the event that one or more species has less than the allotted sale quota(s), species with qualifying animals in excess of their quota (of 50) will be allowed to increase their number of sale animals up to a maximum of 156 animals in the sale, including the champions. If 2 species have excess qualifying exhibitors/animals, the specie with the greatest number of potential exhibitors eliminated from the sale will receive the first open sale consignment, with the species alternating in selection until the maximum number (156) of sale consignments has been met. If there is an odd number of open sale positions and equal numbers of qualifying exhibitors/animals facing elimination, a coin toss witnessed by the species superintendents will determine which specie gets the greater number of slots.
 - a) A sales commission of 4.5% will be deducted from each sale to provide sales promotion, buyer recognition, scholarships, exhibitor education, etc., to be given to the Dane County Meat Animal Sale Association.
 - b) An additional sales commission fee of 3% will be deducted from each sale. This fee goes directly to the Dane County Fair Association.
- Animals will be weighed and tagged on Fair check-in day to coincide with sale order.
- Consignors are responsible for contacting, soliciting and providing buyers for their consignments at the sale. There is no guarantee as to sale prices.
- 19. Consignors are responsible for the behavior of their consignments both in and out of the sale ring. The Meat Animal Sale Association reserves the right to dismiss from the sale any animals that are a threat to the welfare of others including, but not limited to: consignors, volunteers, buyers and audience.
- 20. Any consignor/seller found violating any of these rules is subject to disciplinary action.

- 21. All consignors must meet YQCA requirements.
 - **NEW THIS YEAR** Consignors in the beef project must meet the YQCA training, attend the qualifying meeting. and be a member in good standing in the beef department. Youth must complete a training program each year by either attending an in-person session or completing an online course. Visit https://www.danecountyfair.com/p/youthexhibitors/education-requirements--opportunities/ livestock-departments for more information. Consignors/Exhibitors must also attend one additional educational qualifying meeting per species. A copy of the beef/ sheep/swine educational requirement card/form must be on file with the Extension Office by June 15 of the current year. Youth must upload YQCA and Education Requirement Forms online. No mailed forms will be accepted. Exhibitors who have not met these requirements will be ineligible to exhibit projects at the Fair, therefore unable to consign a project in the sale.
- 22. Exhibitors must cash their checks by November 15th in the year the animals were sold. A stop payment will be made on any auction check not cashed by November 15th and a \$100 fee will be deducted from the exhibitor's check when re-issued. Any fees associated with the re-issuing of lost checks prior to November 15th will also be deducted from the exhibitor's check.

Visit https://www.danecountyfair.com/p/youth-exhibitors/education-requirements--opportunities/livestock-departments for more information. Youth must upload YQCA certificate online. No mailed forms will be accepted. Exhibitors who have not met these requirements will be ineligible to exhibit dairy goat projects at the Fair.

Regulations:

- All Exhibitors must read and adhere to the Youth Animal Exhibitor Code of Practice as stated on page 12.
- 2. All goat exhibits must be in place by 8 p.m. on Wednesday.
- Wisconsin-origin sheep and goats moving within the state of Wisconsin do not require a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

Animal's official ID must be provided at time of entry. Official ID includes: Scrapie eartags; USDA 840 ear tags; legible breed tattoos; legible scrapie tattoos; and approved microchips (Electronic Identification/EID). Scrapie Flock ID numbers will also be recorded. See DATCP health regulations on page 8 for additional information.

- All Lots will be judged on the Danish System, except Lots for Breeders Improvement and Produce of Dam which will be regular judging.
- Exhibitors must have goat projects by May 1 of exhibit year except junior kids.
- 6. All exhibitors are responsible for the general housekeeping and clean-up in their area. Livestock exhibitors must clean-up after their animals and regularly dispose of waste in an appropriate manner.
- 7. Exhibitors must furnish their own feed, bedding and equipment.
- 8. Bucks or wethers are not to be shown.
- All non-dairy goats including Angora and Pigmy are shown in the Exotic Department.
- Goats with full natural horns may <u>NOT</u> be entered <u>unless</u> full natural horns are a standard for a specific breed.
- 11. Base Dates:

- 1. The following departments will participate in the Master Showman Contest: Dairy, Beef, Swine, Sheep, Dairy Goats, Poultry, and Rabbit.
- 2. Each species representative will be the winner of the following showmanship classes (7 participants):

Dairy: Overall Champion Showman Beef: Senior Showman (Grades 11+) Swine: Senior Showman (Grades 11+) Sheep: Senior Showman (Grades 11+) Dairy Goats: Senior Showman (Grades 9+) Poultry: Senior Showman (Grades 9+)

Rabbit: Senior Showman (Grades 9+)

- If a winner from one of the above stated classes chooses not to participate in the Master Showman Contest, the option to participate will default to the second place winner in that class.
- If a member is eligible to participate in the Master Showman Contest in more than one species, he/she must choose the species in which he/she will participate within one hour of winning the second species contest. The member must inform BOTH species Superintendents and the Fair office of his/her decision. The second place winner in their non-chosen species will have the option to participate.
- All youth, excluding those who have previously been named Champion Master Showman, are eligible to participate in the Master Showman Contest.
- 3. Each participant will show their project animal first, then an animal from each of the other six species through rotation. If the participant's animal is not available, the participant is responsible for finding a replacement.
- 4. There will be seven judges, one representing each species.
- 5. Each judge will use the same scorecard to evaluate each participant in the following categories: Animal & Equipment (first round only), Showing the Animal, Species Knowledge and Appearance/Attitude.
- 6. Five minutes will be allowed for the participants to show each species. The time keeper will notify the participants and the judges when one minute is left for each round. Please note all species will be shown simultaneously in the same Showring. The rotation of species shown will be discussed at the pre-contest meeting.
- 7. If items such as a brush, show stick, comb, etc. are necessary to show your species, please bring them with you to the Master Showman contest. These items will be passed to the next participant who will show that species.
- 8. Each participant should wear the provided "Showmanship Award" t-shirt, jeans, boots, and belt so that their attire is not an issue for cross species showing.
- 9. Each participant must remain in the Showring at all times during the contest and wear the species identification harness provided by the Master Showman Contest committee.
- 10. Trophies will be awarded for 1st and 2nd place.
- 11. Cash prizes will be awarded:
 - The winner of the Master Showman contest will receive \$100
 - Second place will receive \$75
 - Third place will receive \$50
 - Fourth place will receive \$40
 - Fifth place will receive \$30
 - Sixth place will receive \$20
 - Seventh place will receive \$15
- 12. All Master Showman participants will meet in Pavilion 2 Showring B at 5 p.m. on Saturday to review the rules.
- 13. No cell phones are allowed in the ring.

To exhibit any equine at the 2023 Dane County Fair, exhibitors must submit a completed educational requirements card, *specific to their organization*, following the submittal rules printed on the educational requirements card. The form must be submitted online by the June 15 deadline; postmarks do not count. If this requirement is not met, the exhibitor will not be eligible to show. NO exceptions will be made.

REGULATIONS

- All exhibitors must read, sign and adhere to the Youth Animal Exhibitor Code of Practice as stated on page 12 in the front of the Fair Book
- Exhibitors are responsible for complying with State and County Fair Regulations contained in this fair book and the Horse and Pony Rules & Guidelines. A complete set of guidelines, rules and descriptions can be obtained through your club, Dane County Extension Office (website: https://fyi.extension.wisc.edu/dane4hyouth/4-h-projects/horse-pony/) or Dane County Fair Office (website: https://www.danecountyfair.com/p/youth-exhibitors/premium-book).
- Any Dane County Fair Department 6 Horse and Pony questions are referred first to the Dane County Fair Book. If they can not be answered there, they are then referred to the Department 6 Horse and Pony Rules & Guidelines and finally to US Equestrian Federation Rule Book.
- Formal disputes and/or appeals should be referred to the front of this book under Rules & Regulations or contact the Fair Office.
- It is a privilege to participate at the Dane County Fair, however, this privilege can be revoked by no less than three (3) Department 6 Superintendents. Exhibitors, parents, guardians, leaders and volunteers are expected to conduct themselves in an appropriate manner at all times.
- 6. Abuse of any animal will be grounds for disqualification.
- Each horse and pony exhibitor, including horseless horse, must submit a Project Animal Declaration Form for their project animal(s) they intend to show. Only two animals may be shown. This must be submitted via online form no later than May 1, 2023. If it is not received by 11:59 p.m. May 1, you will not be allowed to show. This rule will be strictly enforced.
- 8. Animal Substitution Policy: If a declared animal dies or becomes lame or injured, you may request a substitution as follows:
 - a) Submit a written request prior to July 16, 2023 with a letter from your veterinarian as to the reason the animal will not be able to attend.
 - b) Send requests to Horse and Pony Dept. 6, Dane County Fair, PO Box 287, Oregon, WI 53575 or email to <u>info@danecountyfair.com</u>.
 - c) All substitutions are evaluated on an individual basis and

- are subject to the superintendent's approval.
- 9. All horses/ponies are required to stable and remain on the fairgrounds Wednesday through Sunday. Animals that have a chronic health issue that does not allow them to be stalled for the duration of the Fair must submit a completed Trailering-In Request form, which can be obtained from the Dane County Fair website. This form must be submitted to the Fair Office for approval by July 16, 2023.
- On-Site Veterinarians may examine any horse at any time.
 Those found lame or posing a health hazard to themselves, other animals or people may be ordered off the fairgrounds.
- The age of an animal is determined as of January 1 of the current year. Stallions must have been born in the current year to be exhibited at the Fair.
- 12. Exhibitors, including Horseless Horse, must electronically submit the appropriate information into FairEntry by June 1, 2023. Cancellations can be made by calling the Fair Office at (608) 960-7910 by 5 p.m. the Monday prior to the start of the Fair.
- All stalls will be assigned by the superintendents. All horses must exhibit in at least one lot in Department 6. Tack stalls are assigned depending on availability.
- 14. Stall decorations can be taken down after 5:30 p.m. on Sunday. Horses cannot be removed before 6:30 p.m. on Sunday. If not followed, the Fair Office requires that the premiums for the entire club be forfeited.

CHECK-IN

All Animals and Exhibitors, including Horseless Horse exhibitors, must be checked in on Wednesday the week of the Fair between the hours of 12 - 8 p.m.

The following must to be completed at check-in:

- Complete a veterinary examination either by presenting your animal for inspection on Wednesday at horse check-in outside of Pavilion 1 or turning in an Intrastate/Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection completed no sooner than July 12, 2023.
- A negative EIA (Coggins) test is required for all equine. The test
 must have been conducted after July 18, 2022. A copy of this
 test is required to be turned in at check in. Horses may not enter
 the pavilion until this coggins has been turned in.
- If multiple horses are listed on the Intrastate/Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, an individual copy of the form must be provided for each exhibitor's folder.
- Review your class entries, verify they are correct and sign your folder.
- 5. Provide emergency contact information while at the Fair.
- 6. All equines entered as a pony (56" and under) will be measured at time of check in.

No animals or exhibitors will be checked in to the Fair after 8 p.m. Wednesday. If you are not checked in, you may not show.

EVENTS AND CLASSES

- An animal may not be shown in more than 10 lots unless it is being shared by family members or with a horseless horse member. The animal may then be shown in up to 12 lots.
- 2. Ten total lots are allowed per exhibitor.
- 3. Showmanship is mandatory for ALL exhibitors in Grades 3-8.
- An animal may be shown in up to two (2) showmanship classes of different disciplines per exhibitor.
- Hippology events are open to anyone on the fairgrounds. Time and location will be posted in Pavilion 1.
- Fun Show will be held Thursday. Look for postings in Pavilion 1 for more information.
- 7. Some trail obstacles may be set up for practice prior to the show.
- 8. Exhibitor meeting, including elections for the Fair Superintendents and youth Superintendent will be held on Thursday. Time and location will be posted in Pavilion 1. All arenas will be closed during the meeting time. Project members, their parents or guardians and Horse Project Leaders are encouraged to attend, provide feedback, and vote. Any person interested in running for a superintendent position should make their intentions known to a current superintendent at least one hour prior to the meeting.

- Club Showcase Award. Awarded on a club/chapter basis. Award will be based on:
 - The cleanliness and neatness of project animal and stall area.
 - The immediate disposal of waste.
 - The cleanliness and neatness of aisles. Chores must be done by 9 a.m. daily during Fair.
 - Good sportsmanship among exhibitors, leaders, superintendents, judges and spectators.
 - Added consideration will be given to clubs/chapters with educational displays on Learning Lane and additional volunteer efforts during the Fair.
- 10. The Dane County Fair Horse and Pony Superintendents reserve the right to combine or divide lots in accordance with ATCP 160.04 and ATCP 160.07 in the front of this book. If a question arises, the judgment of the superintendents shall prevail.
- 11. Lot Splitting: If a riding lot has more than 18 exhibitors it will be split. The splits will exhibit separately and the top placings from each split will be brought back for a ride off. The split will be determined by the order listed in Pavilion 1. You must be checked in prior to the start of the lot even if you are in the second split to be able to show in this lot.
- 12. **Lot Combining:** Lots may be combined to a maximum of 18 exhibitors, but each lot will be judged separately.

NEW THIS YEAR

All exhibitors **MUST** enter Showmanship in the species they exhibit at the DCF. Exhibitors who are not entered in showmanship will automatically be entered prior to the Fair. If an exhibitor does not wish to participate in showmanship, they can scratch on-site at the Fair.

Regulations:

- Youth planning to show OR sell a small animal at the Dane County Fair MUST attend at least one educational meeting pertaining to the species of animal they intend to show or sell. Youth intending to sell an animal MUST attend a Small Animal Market Sale Meeting. They will then fill out an Educational Card to show they attended these meetings.
 - a) If an exhibitor plans to sell their animal at the Small Animal Market Sale, they MUST attend a qualifying meeting <u>specifically targeted</u> to those participating in the sale. This meeting is also considered an educational meeting.
- 2. All poultry exhibitors (breeding and market) must meet YQCA requirements. Youth must complete a training program each year by either attending an in-person session or completing an online course. Exhibitors must also attend one additional poultry educational qualifying meeting. A copy of the poultry education requirement form must be on file with the Extension Office by June 15. Youth must upload YQCA and Education Requirement Forms online. No mailed forms will be accepted. Exhibitors who have not met these requirements will be ineligible to exhibit poultry projects at the Fair.
- All exhibitors must read and adhere to the Youth Animal Exhibitor Code of Practice as stated on page 12.
- Exhibitors with birds in the Small Animal Market Sale will be required to sign a form stating proper withdrawal times have been observed for any drug used, to be turned in at check-in. (Poultry - 7 days withdrawal).
- Up to 20 Lots may be entered per exhibitor, excluding Showmanship.
- All show coats shall be white and are to be free of patches, names and any sponsors.
- All entries must be owned or managed by the exhibitor by May 15
 of the exhibit year. <u>Exhibitors may show two managerial animals</u>
 <u>as long as the form is filled out and on file at the Extension Office</u>
 <u>by May 15 of the exhibit year. Exhibitors showing managerial</u>
 <u>animals may not own or show any other Poultry.</u>
- Entries must have a numbered leg band. Record number on online entry form.

- Exhibitors are responsible for daily feed and care of entries. In addition, exhibitors are responsible for bringing their own bedding, such as wood shavings. Exhibitors not providing adequate food and water or neglecting to perform housekeeping duties may forfeit their premiums for said birds.
- 10. All exhibitors are responsible for the general housekeeping and clean-up in their area. Exhibitors must clean-up after their animals and regularly dispose of waste in an appropriate manner. Exhibitors must completely clean out their spaces at release time. Example: cages, clean off boards, fold cages and stack on pile. Please provide your own tools and equipment for clean-up. Department superintendents will explain proper procedure for the department.
- 11. All exhibitors are encouraged to enter Poultry Showmanship.

- Open to Poultry exhibitors who entered a rooster in a breed or showmanship class at the 2023 Dane County Fair. Contact one of the Poultry Department Chairs at the fair to enter the contest.
- You must be entered in the Rooster Crowing Contest by 9 a.m. on Saturday, July 22. No entries will be accepted after 9 a.m.
- 3. Each exhibitor may enter one rooster. Only one rooster per cage is acceptable.
- One to two judges (non-participating exhibitors or parents) will be assigned to each cage to count crows.
- 5. Over the time span of 20 consecutive minutes, the crows of each rooster will be counted. A declared "go time" will be given to start counting crows. The rooster with the most crows during that time will be the winner.
- Participants may not touch animals to make them crow.
- Cruelty to the animals will NOT be tolerated and will result in automatic disqualification from the contest.
- 8. Prizes will be awarded to the top crowing rooster and the top three participants.

NEW THIS YEAR

All exhibitors **MUST** enter Showmanship in the species they exhibit at the DCF. Exhibitors who are not entered in showmanship will automatically be entered prior to the Fair. If an exhibitor does not wish to participate in showmanship, they can scratch on-site at the Fair.

Regulations:

- Youth planning to show OR sell a small animal at the Dane County Fair will need to attend at least one educational meeting pertaining to the type of animal they intend to show or sell. Youth intending to sell an animal MUST attend a Small Animal Market Sale Meeting. They will then fill out an Educational Card to show they attended these meetings.
 - a) If an exhibitor plans to sell their animal at the Small Animal Market Sale, they MUST attend a qualifying meeting <u>specifically targeted</u> to those participating in the sale. This meeting is also considered an educational meeting.
- 2. All rabbit exhibitors (breeding and market) must meet YQCA requirements. Youth must complete a training program each year by either attending an in-person session or completing an online course. Visit https://www.danecountyfair.com/p/youth-exhibitors/education-requirements--opportunities/small-animal-departments for more information. Exhibitors must also attend one additional rabbit educational qualifying meeting. A copy of the rabbit education requirement form must be on file with the Extension Office by June 15. Youth must upload YQCA and Education Requirement Forms online. No mailed forms will be accepted. Exhibitors who have not met these requirements will be ineligible to exhibit rabbit projects at the Fair.
- All exhibitors must read and adhere to the Youth Animal Exhibitor Code of Practice as stated on page 12.
- This Fair will be judged under the latest show rules of the American Rabbit Breeders Association. Ask any chair/superintendent for information on how to obtain a copy of these rules.
- Showmanship is recommended for all exhibitors. Be sure to enter the appropriate grade category. Judging is individual conference and will be done on a first come basis. A sign up sheet will be posted and judging will start at 9 a.m.
- Up to 15 lots may be entered per exhibitor, excluding Showmanship and Costume.
- All entries must be owned by the exhibitor by April 15 of the exhibit year.

- 8. An exhibitor enrolled in the rabbit project may show two managerial animals. Exhibitors or their family members, showing managerial animals, may not own or show any other rabbits. A rabbit managerial form is available through the Extension Office and must be filled out and on file at the Extension Office by April 15 of the exhibit year.
- Commercial, Market and Fancy breeds must be purebred. Breed must be included on the Fair entry form.
- Pet rabbits may be crossbreds.
- 11. If unsure of rabbit's sex or breed, call the department chair. **Try to purchase rabbits with pedigree papers**. This can be important. Junior rabbits must be <u>at least 12 weeks</u> old to exhibit. Any animal(s) of questionable age will be accepted at the discretion of the committee. Showing animals younger than 12 weeks is very stressful and could stunt future growth.
- 12. Exhibitors are responsible for the daily feeding and care of entries. Exhibitors are required to provide crocks or bottles for water and feed. Rabbits with improper dishes may be sent home. In addition, exhibitors are responsible for bringing their own bedding, such as wood shavings. **NEW THIS YEAR** Feeding, watering and cleaning must be completed by 10:00 a.m. each day of the Fair.
- 13. All exhibitors are responsible for the general housekeeping and clean-up in their area. Exhibitors must clean-up after their animals and regularly dispose of waste in an appropriate manner. Exhibitors must completely clean out their spaces at release time. Example: clean off boards, fold cages, and stack in a pile. Please provide your own tools and equipment for clean-up. Department chairs/superintendents will explain proper procedure for the department.
- Exhibitors must be present for judging. See a superintendent for any judging conflicts.
- 15. All rabbits must be permanently and legibly tattooed. Tattoo number must be listed on the exhibitor's Dane County Fair entry form. All tattoos should be done before the Fair; contact Co-Chair, Mikayla Brey, with any questions and to schedule a tattoo appointment. Tattoo assistance will be available on Sunday, April 30 (9 11 a.m.) or Saturday, June 3 (1 3 p.m.) at the Dane County 4-H Extension Office.
- 16. All Market Rabbits must be raised from birth by the exhibitor.
- 17. All Market Rabbits will be weighed on check-in day. This weight will be used for judging. Any animal not making weight or over weight by more than 1/4 lbs. will not be eligible to sell in the Small Animal Market Sale. See further sale requirements under Small Animal Market Sale.
- 18. Any rabbit showing signs of disease and/or colds will be removed from the show and sent home promptly. If one or more entry is showing signs of a highly contagious disease (ear mites, lice, snuffles, etc.), the superintendents have the right to send home all animals in that entry for the protection of the other animals.
- Superintendents have the right to carefully check the tattoo, condition, behavior or welfare of any animal as is necessary and bring any questions to the owner's attention.
- 20. Any rabbit found to have been entered in the wrong class at the time of judging will be dropped a placement and be ineligible for further judging (e.g.: Best of Breed). Rabbit may still be shown in showmanship and costume class, if entered. If an exhibitor has any question on class entry, rabbit color, sex, weight, etc., Superintendents will be happy to assist to enter the rabbit in the proper class on check-in day, if asked.

Recommendations:

- A long sleeve shirt or show coat should be worn when handling or showing your rabbit.
- Exhibitors are encouraged to enter appropriate lots in Animal & Vet Sciences, Department 10.
- Clubs or individuals are encouraged to decorate their area and cages, display their club signs, and keep their area clean. Please use displays that are informative and educational to the general public. Please remove all decorations at the end of the Fair.

Single rabbit entries of either sex must have been in the exhibitor's possession since April 15 of the current year. Pet Rabbit Lots must be shown by the owner. Pet Rabbit Lots do not compete in Best of Show. This rabbit may only be shown in the owner's correct grade class, showmanship, and costume class; this rabbit may not be shown in breed class. The owner has chosen this rabbit to enter in the pet class and not breed class, meaning their maximum lots will be 6 lots in total instead of 15 lots. These Lots include pet class, showmanship, costume class, meat pen, single fryer, and roaster (has to be a meat breed rabbit). Exhibitors must also attend one additional small animal educational qualifying meeting. A copy of the small animal education requirement from must be on file with the Extension Office by June 15. Youth must upload YQCA and Education Requirement Forms online. No mailed forms will be accepted. Exhibitors who have not met these requirements will be ineligible to exhibit small animal projects at the Fair.
- 3. Any exhibitor who is attending college or university and is unable to attend any one of the qualifying meetings will be required to write a 1000 word essay on a current industry topic in each species area (poultry, waterfowl, rabbits) in which there is intent to sell. This option and topic must have approval from the Small Animal Sale Committee. The essay is due to the 4-H Extension Office, 5201 Fen Oak Court, Rm. 138 Madison, WI 53718-8812 on or before June 15. In addition to the essay, a minimum of one year prior sale participation is required to be eligible to sell.
- 4. Upon check-in, all exhibitors and their parents with animals in the Small Animal Market Sale will be required to sign a form stating proper withdrawal times have been observed for any drugs used. Read and observe proper withdrawal times stated on drug labeling. To be safe, do not medicate your animals/birds.
- If at any time, prior to or after judging, an animal(s) shows signs
 of disease and/or colds or neglect, said animals(s) will not be
 eligible to sell in the Small Animal Market Sale.
- 6. Even if eligible, any exhibitor who decides not to sell an animal in the Small Animal Market Sale after showing in the Market Classes will be barred from the Market Classes and Sale for the next year.
- All exhibitors must be available one hour before the sale, during the sale, and after the sale to sign their paperwork.

- To recognize members who do quality work in breeding, selecting, feeding and showing their market poultry and rabbits.

What Will Be Offered:

- Poultry to be auctioned are the qualifying entries in each Poultry Market Class (Class G).
- Rabbits to be auctioned will be the qualifying entries in each Rabbit Market Class (Class B).

NOTE: PLEASE enter your animals in the Market Classes and Small Animal Market Sale only if you intend for it to be sold and butchered.

Who Can Buy:

- 1. Anyone interested in encouraging youth.
- 2. Anyone who enjoys and appreciates good quality white meat.
- Anyone who would gain beneficial advertising value.
- 4. Anyone interested in buying good market breeding stock.

Sale Provisions:

- Potential bidders register at sale ring (no obligation).
- Animal weights will be provided, but bidding will be based on entry basis (i.e. meat pen, pair or single animal class entry).
- 3. All accounts are to be settled with clerk immediately after sale.
- Sale order will be determined by drawing numbers except Champions and Reserve Champions.
- Sale participants must be present when their animal is called to the auction block or they forfeit the right to sell. This will be strictly enforced. Participants are responsible for bringing their animals to the sale ring.
- Neither the Fair nor the Sale Committee or Small Animal Committee will make a guarantee as to sale price. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to help bring in prospective buyers.

Special Requirements:

- Entries open to all bona fide 4-H, FFA members or any other youth organization in Dane County. See Regulation #1 for educational qualifying meeting requirement.
- Make entries in the Dane County Fair FairEntry system under the respective Market Classes as noted in the Fair Premium Book.
- The number of animals exhibited and the number of premiums given will follow County Fair Regulations.
- 4. It will be up to the exhibitor who sells an animal to see that the live or (if the buyer wants) dressed animal is delivered to the buyer within 30 days of the sale unless prior arrangements are made. When other arrangements are made, the agreement is to be between buyer and seller, and buyer should sign-off on the animal. All books on the sale will close 30 days after sale. Failure to deliver an animal within this time period will result in a one year ineligibility status from sale participation the following year.
- 5. The sale will be conducted by the Dane County Small Animal Market Sale Committee. Ten percent (10%) of the selling price will be deducted from the exhibitor's receipts to go into a fund to pay for advertising, buyers awards and conducting the sale. This includes a 3% charge from the Dane County Fair Association.
- Checks will be mailed to the exhibitors after the animals have been delivered to the buyers and the proper form has been received at the 4-H Office.

NEW THIS YEAR

All exhibitors **MUST** enter Showmanship in the species they exhibit at the DCF. Exhibitors who are not entered in showmanship will automatically be entered prior to the Fair. If an exhibitor does not wish to participate in showmanship, they can scratch on-site at the Fair.

Regulations:

- All exhibitors must read and adhere to the Youth Exhibitor Code of Practice as stated on page 12.
- 2. All dogs showing in Department 9 must be trained by the exhibitor.
- All exhibitors must meet their educational requirements through the Dane County 4-H Dog Education Committee and abide by their rules for showing.
- 4. No dogs may be left unattended in or tied to cars.
- 5. All dogs must be leashed at all times.
- 6. Crating spaces will be available in Exhibition Hall; crates are to be supplied by the exhibitor.
- 7. Dogs are only allowed in the show area of the Exhibition Hall.
- Exhibitors are required to clean up after their dog(s) in any area on the Fairgrounds or the Exhibition Hall. Failure to do this will result in forfeit of the exhibitor's premiums.
- All project animals must be under the supervision of the exhibitor by February 1 of the current year.
- 10. All exhibitors and dogs must enter through back loading dock.
- 11. Department Superintendents have the right to dismiss any dog that inhibits safety of the show.
- 12. All dogs at the agility show must be crated. If this is not followed, this may lead to dismissal from the show.
- Once a dog/exhibitor combination has moved up a class level, they can not move down.

- 14. Obedience: After the first qualifying score of 170 or above at the Dane County Fair or State 4-H Dog Show, you will be encouraged to move up a class level. After the second qualifying score of 170 or above, the dog/exhibitor will be required to move up a class level.
- Agility: After the first qualifying score of 70 or above at the Dane County Fair or State 4-H Dog Show, you will be required to move to Division B.
- Showmanship: If you receive a blue ribbon in a Novice class, you will be required to move to Open Showmanship.

Exhibitors:

- Each family, with one or more dog exhibitors, must complete an online Volunteer Registration committing to at least two (2) hours of volunteer time to support the Dog Project at the Dane County Fair.
- Exhibitors are encouraged to enter Showmanship.
- Exhibitors should be clean and well groomed. Closed toed footwear (no heals) should be worn. Showmanship attire should be business casual. Jeans and shorts are not considered appropriate attire for showmanship.
- 4. Athletic wear is appropriate for the agility show.
- Exhibitors may exhibit up to three (3) animals. The third dog may only be entered in Showmanship, Brace, Veteran Dog, Rally or Team.
- It is the exhibitor's responsibility to check-in at the ring they will be showing in before their class begins. Please let the ring stewards know if you have a conflict between two rings.
- 7. Exhibitor and dog combinations may only enter in one obedience lot.
- 8. Exhibitor may only enter in one showmanship lot.
- In the case of tied scores, the exhibitor must be present for a run off, or the award will go to the other exhibitor.
- Any exhibitor showing in Team Obedience must have those lots listed on their Fair entries.

Animal:

- **REMINDER** All dogs must bring a copy of their Rabies Vaccination (good through July 16, 2023) to check in at the Dog Show
- 4-H dogs may only be shown at Dane County Fair if they have attended obedience classes offered through the 2023 Dane County Fair 4-H Dog Program.
- All dogs must be taken home after the show.
- General condition of the dog, excluding shedding or being out of coat, will be considered in judging.

Class Description & Class Exercises Showmanship Lots

<u>Novice Showmanship Lots</u>: Exhibitor has never received a blue ribbon in any previous years in showmanship.

<u>Open Showmanship Lots</u>: Any exhibitor that has received a blue ribbon in Novice showmanship.

<u>Best in Show</u>: Top blue ribbon exhibitor of each age group will compete against each other for Best in Show.

NEW THIS YEAR PeeWee Showmanship: Cloverbud exhibitors will present a stuffed dog for judging. Questions may include: What color is your dog? Do you have a dog at home? What is your favorite breed of dog? What's your dog's name?

Obedience Lots

<u>Pre-Novice Trial A</u>: Handler and dog combination that has never previously trained.

<u>Pre-Novice Trial B</u>: Handler or a dog that have previously trained in a Pre-Novice class.

<u>Pre-Novice Trial C</u>: Handler and dog that has trained in Pre-Novice dog and cannot advance to Off Lead classes.

<u>Novice</u>: Handler and dog combination that have trained in Pre-Novice and have not trained in Novice.

<u>Graduate Novice</u>: Handler and dog combination that have not previously trained in Graduate Novice.

Pre-Open: Handler or dog that is not ready to move to Open.

Open: Handler or dog that is not ready to move to Pre-Utility.

Pre-Utility: Handler or dog that is not ready to move to Utility.

Utility: Handler or dog that is ready to show at highest level.

<u>Veteran Dog</u>: Dog must be at least 7 years old. Novice exercise will be judged.

<u>Brace</u>: Two dogs shown in tandem, trained by the same exhibitor or family members. There are two levels in Brace competition: Pre-Novice and Novice. If exhibitor has one or both dogs that is Novice or above, they must enter in Novice Brace.

<u>Team Dog</u>: There will be two levels of team: Pre-Novice and Novice. Only one dog and handler combination can sign up for Team Dog. All dogs in the team must be showing at that level of exercises.

<u>Agility</u>: All agility classes are off leash. Depending on their demonstrated abilities, handler/dog teams may enter JTT and Standard. All dogs will jump at their designated heights, which will be determined by the agility leader using measuring wickets. JTT (Jumps, Tunnels, Table) Class will consist of 7-10 obstacles with a course time of 75 seconds.

- <u>Jumps, Tunnels, and Table Division A off leash</u>: for new members and members that have not received a qualifying score
- <u>Jumps, Tunnels and Table Division B off leash</u>: for members that have received a qualifying score.

Standard Agility Class will have 10 - 15 obstacles and will include A-Frame (maximum height of 4' 6"), dog walk and teeter, 12 weave poles along with jumps, table, and have a course time of 120 seconds.

Obedience Lot Exercises

All Pre-Novice Trial: All exercises on lead: Heel, figure 8, stand for inspection, long sit (1 minute) and long down (1 minutes).

All Novice Trial: On lead: Heel, figure 8, long sit (1 minute), long down (1 minute). Off lead: Heel, stand for inspection, heeling, recall with finish.

<u>Graduate Novice Trial</u>: On lead: Heel. Off lead: Stand for inspection, figure 8, heel, recall with drop and finish, long sit (2 minutes), long down (3 minutes).

<u>Pre-Open</u>: All exercises off lead. Heel, figure 8,drop on recall, retrieve dumbbell on flat, retrieve dumbbell over broad jump, long sit (3 minutes), long down (5 minutes).

<u>Open</u>: All exercises off lead: Heel, figure 8, drop on recall, retrieve dumbbell on flat, retrieve dumbbell over broad jump, retrieve dumbbell over high jump, long sit (3 minutes), long down (5 minutes).

<u>Pre-Utility</u>: Retrieve dumbbell over high jump, retrieve glove, signal exercise, direct jumping and moving stand.

<u>Utility</u>: Scent discrimination, direct retrieve, signal exercise, directed jumping and moving stand.

Rally

Novice: All exercises are performed with the dog on leash. There is a requirement of 10-15 stations to complete with no more than five stationary exercises. The exercises performed vary from turning 360 degrees to changing paces during the course. Exhibitors at this level may clap their hands and pat their legs through the course.

Advanced: All exercises are performed off-leash. There is a requirement of 12-17 stations with no more than seven stationary exercises. Exercises include a jump as well as calling your dog to the front of you instead of to a heel position.

Excellent: All exercises are performed off-leash, except for the Honor exercise. There is a requirement of 15-20 stations with a maximum of 7 stationary exercises. Handlers are only allowed to encourage their dogs verbally. Physical encouragement is not allowed at this level. The Excellent level exercises include backing up three steps, while the dog stays in the heel position and a moving stand, while the handler walks around the dog.

Pet Class

Pet Class 1: This class focuses on teaching your dog skills to create a more harmonious household. All skills are on leash: Wait at the door, sit to greet, loose leash walking, focus skills and tricks.

- Entry tag MUST be attached to the upper left-hand corner of any poster, foam board, or display board. All other exhibits must have all parts labeled with the exhibitor's name and entry tag.
- 3. Any failure of following rules may result in one lower placing.
- All animal exhibitors must read and adhere to the Youth Animal Exhibitor Code of Practice as stated on page 12.
- 5. All animal exhibitors are responsible for caring for their animals and general housekeeping and clean-up of their area. Animal exhibitors must clean-up after their animals and regularly dispose of waste in an appropriate manner. Exhibitors must COMPLETELY clean-up their spaces at release time.
- 6. All animal exhibits should be brought in a cage suitable to display the animal comfortably and safely. Please wire shut your cages. For fish safety place a screen/mesh over the container to keep fingers or other items out of the water. Cages will not be available from the Dane County Fair.
- All animals will be health checked and any showing signs of disease and/or colds will be sent home. Any animals that are not properly cared for may be sent home.
- Animal exhibits MUST either be raised or purchased by the exhibitor. NO exhibits are to be captured from the wild.

 - a) A copy of the Small Animal Educational Card must be on file with the Extension Office by June 15. Youth must upload Education Requirement Forms online. No mailed forms will be accepted. Failure to do so will result in ineligibility to show at the Dane County Fair.
- All entries must be owned by the exhibitor by April 15 of the exhibit year.
- A long sleeve shirt or show coat should be worn when handling or showing your cavy.
- Cavies will be housed in Pavilion 2 Southwest corner. Animals

Cavy Cage Recommendations: Cavies over 12 oz. shall have

- Each model exhibited must have an identification tag with the project member's name attached to a hind leg; other exhibits should similarly labeled.
- Advanced classes are encouraged to use tack and costumes made by the exhibitor but are not required to do so.
- 7. Model Horses need to be shown with appropriate halter/tack.
- Showmanship classes may have a rider/handler with horse in hand or in saddle. To enter showmanship classes, an appropriate rider/handler with outfit must be used as the handler. Entry must have narrative card for Showmanship/Equitation entries.
- If handler/rider is mentioned in information card for entry, display MUST include a handler/rider figure.
- 10. All training equipment/techniques/farm setting, over fence and trail classes must have proper training equipment, obstacles or training technique must be present in entry. Narrative cards must explain the purpose of training equipment or training technique or scene.
- 11. Champion and Merit awards are based on a point system. Exhibitors earn points for each class they exhibit in as follows:
 - · Blue: 4 points
 - Red: 3 points

Proof of attendance must be shown to the registration table attendee at the Fair. Participating in 3 competition shoots will not be accepted. All shooting sports members must attend at least one practice. The signed green card will be required at the Fair to participate in the Fair shoots. If the green card is not present and shown when asked for, the youth will not be allowed to participate. (Proof of two competitions in place of two of the three required classes will be allowed in addition to the green card). Instructors will have final decision on whether a senior shooting sports member may need extra practices to participate in the Fair shoot.
- Classes A H: Participants must wear appropriate footwear (closed-toe shoes or boots) to participate in shooting sports training and the Fair Shoot event(s)
- Classes A H: Parents/Guardians may not coach at the shooting line.
- Participants must be 8 years of age and in at least 3rd grade to participate in 4-H Shooting Sports.

- Each pistol shall have an empty chamber indicator which may consist of a "weed wacker" cord.
- Standard .22 short, long or long rifle ammo is required. NO .22 magnums or HYPERVELOCITY ammunition (like "stingers") will be allowed.
- .22 pistol competition will be held at 50 feet. Pistol must be open sighted.
- k. Targets to be used are NRA licensed B2/B3.
- Course of fire:

Intermediate & Senior: Slow-fire Bullseye. Shooting position will be standing, 2-handed allowed. 40 shots slow fire (40 shots for records). 10 sighters or warm-up shots. 10 minutes per 10 shot string, four strings of fire.

- m. NRA International pistol rules govern anything not covered
- Tiebreakers: ties will be broken with most number of "x", most number of "tens", etc. until tie is broken.
- The Match Director reserves the right to alter the event as weather, terrain or enrollment dictates.
- Ribbons and premiums will be based on the scores in the chart on page 50.

Per BATF regulations, all .22 pistol shooters under the age of 18 must have in their possession a written permission statement from their parent or guardian stating their permission to possess and fire Smallbore Pistols. In accordance with federal laws pertaining to youth and pistols (see Youth Safety Handgun Act), the National 4-H Shooting Sports Program prohibits the transportation of a pistol for any reason by a youth under 18 years of age. Arrangements must be made for an adult to transport all smallbore pistols. Youth under the age of 18 may NOT possess a smallbore pistol without adult supervision. This includes driving themselves to the event or even walking from the parking lot into the building. Similarly, at any match, parents may not just hand the cased gun to their youth in the parking area and send them on their way to the pistol event. A parent or guardian needs to accompany the youth to and from the .22 pistol event.

- 4. Capping, Snapping, Firing: All loading will be done at the loading bench located behind the firing line. All capping, snapping of caps, flash pan charging and firing will take place at the firing line. Shooters are expected to load and fire their guns on their own. If they need assistance, the range commander should be notified.
- 5. Propellant: Propellant to be only Black Powder, Pyrodex or any other NMLRA approved Black Powder substitute of appropriate granulation for your rifle. A powder measure, separate from the powder container, must be used when charging. No open containers of powder will be allowed on the loading benches. Load charge must be only what is considered light to moderate for your rifle.
- Ammunition: Projectiles will be patched round ball or lubricated bullet. Plastic patching or synthetic fabric patching may not be


