


We're excited to be involved with the Douglas County Fair & Rodeo this year to put on a car show for the Fair & Rodeo spectators.

General Guest Conduct

- Smoking and/or vaping is not allowed in any public buildings, or within 100' of any building entrance.
- Personal golf carts, ATV's, motorized scooters or bicycles are not allowed on the Fairgrounds during County Fair.
- Dogs are not allowed on the Fairgrounds during County Fair except for those dogs that are competing or performing during the Fair. Owners / Handlers must keep dogs under constant control. Under the ADA regulations, assistance animals are allowed.
- Alcohol is not to be brought onto the grounds and will be sold in designated areas only on the Fairgrounds during County Fair: Midway, Events Center and Indoor Arena. Otherwise, alcohol cannot be consumed or carried anywhere else on the grounds. No alcohol in any livestock barn.
- Fireworks are not allowed on the Fairgrounds.
- Flyers and/or sale bills may not be passed out in any areas
 of the Fairgrounds, with the exception of within a paid vendor
 booth space.

- Placing flyers on automobiles is prohibited.
- Parking vehicles for advertising purposes or sale of a vehicle is prohibited.
- Any public display of photos or video of any
 Douglas County Fair event, concert or rodeo for public
 dissemination without express written consent from
 Douglas County is strictly prohibited.
- Douglas County Fair may take photos of guests, contestants, employees and volunteers. These photos shall be the property of Douglas County and may be used by Douglas County Fair Management for educational or promotional materials.
- All guests, contestants and participants are subject to a search by security personnel.
- All ticket sales are final no credits, refunds or exchanges.
 Douglas County Fair retains the right to refuse admittance to anyone.

Care & Treatment of Animals

The Douglas County Fair & Rodeo is committed to the proper care and treatment of all livestock associated with the Douglas County Fair & Rodeo. We strive to promote and preserve our Western Heritage in the safest manner for our animals, exhibitors, contestants, and guests.

Management and personnel of the Douglas County Fair & Rodeo have extensive knowledge and understanding in all sectors of the livestock industry as well as the sport of rodeo. These people routinely put the needs of the livestock before their own.

Our rodeo performances are proudly sanctioned by the Professional Rodeo Cowboys
Association (PRCA), the largest and oldest rodeo sanctioning body in the world. Together,
the Douglas County Fair & Rodeo Management and the PRCA enforce more than 70 rules
that govern the care and treatment of livestock participating in rodeo events. These are the
strongest rules enforced by any rodeo organization. Pro Rodeo Officials, as well as the on-site
veterinarian, assess each animal prior to competition to ensure all livestock are well-suited
and fit for competition. In addition, a veterinarian is on-site during each performance.

4-H Junior Livestock Shows and educational programs promote hands-on learning and help develop life skills. The hard work, dedication, respect, and responsibility learned from working with and caring for animals aids 4-H youth in developing into tomorrow's leaders. Exhibitors adhere to The Douglas County Fair & Rodeo Competition Rules and the 4-H Code of Conduct, which helps ensure the safety and welfare of the animals and exhibitors alike.

The Douglas County Fair & Rodeo is proud to be continuing the western way of life and will continue to address issues, especially livestock welfare, with a productive approach. We would like to thank Littleton Equine Medical Center for being the Douglas County Fair & Rodeo's official veterinarian.

Professional rodeo action consists of two types of competitions -

roughstock events and timed events. New in '22, the roughstock events of bareback riding, saddle bronc riding and bull riding will have their own fully sanctioned night in the Outdoor Arena on Thursday, August 4 at Bares, Broncs & Bulls - Roughstock at The Rock. In these events, the contestant is scored on both the animal's performance and their own. In order to score, the cowboy must stay on the animal while using just one hand to hold on for eight seconds. Combining the thrill of Bareback Riding with nothing more to hang on to than a riggin; rodeo's classic event, Saddle Bronc Riding, and the most dangerous sport on dirt, Bull Riding, this night will be sure to get your adrenaline running. Watch top ProRodeo athletes "make an ugly face and nod" as they compete for \$10,000 in purse money for an eight-second ride.



ROCK THE STOCK IN CASTLE ROCK

*Current Douglas County Fair & Rodeo arena records

BAREBACK RIDING

Both the rider and the bucking horse are judged in this event. It is a single-handhold, eight-second ride that starts with the cowboy's feet held in a position over the break of the horse's shoulders until the horse's front feet touch the ground first jump

out of the chute. The rider earns points maintaining upper body control while moving his feet in a toesturned-out rhythmic motion in time with the horse's bucking action. Points are awarded by the judges, up to 50 for the animal athlete and up to 50 for the cowboy's performance.

STEER WRESTLING

This event was originally called

"bull dogging" and requires the cowboy to leap from the running horse onto the back of a 600-pound steer, catch it behind the horns, stop the steer's forward momentum and wrestle it to the ground with all four of its legs pointing the same direction to stop the clock. The bulldogger is assisted by the hazer, typically another competitor, who rides along the steer's right to keep the animal running straight. This is a timed event.

SADDLE BRONG RIDING

Known as rodeo's classic event, saddle bronc riding is judged similarly to bareback riding, but there are additional possibilities to being disqualified; that is, losing a stirrup or dropping the thickly

braided rein that is attached to the horse's halter. The cowboy sits on the horse differently due to the saddle and rein, and the spurring motion covers a different area of the horse. Saddle bronc horses are usually several hundred pounds heavier than bareback horses and generally buck in a slower manner. Points are awarded by the judges, up to 50 for the animal athlete and 50 for the cowboy's performance.

TIE-DOWN ROPING

Tie-down roping is an authentic ranch skill that originated from working cowboys. Once the calf has been roped, the cowboy dismounts and runs down the length of the rope to the calf. When the calf is on the ground, the cowboy ties three legs together with a six-foot pigging string. Calves are given a head start, and if the cowboy's horse leaves the box too soon, a barrier breaks and a 10-second penalty is added to the roper's time. A fraction of a second can make the difference between winning and losing in all timed events. Tie-down roping is a timed event.

WOMEN'S BARREL RACING

This event is a horse race with turns. The cowgirl's time begins as she rides her horse across the starting line in the arena. She makes a run around three upright barrels, which are in a cloverleaf pattern, and back to the starting line where the clock stops. Tipping a barrel is permitted, but if it is knocked to the ground, a five-second penalty is added to her time. Fastest time wins.

*16.29 seconds in 2017 Cassidy Kruse

TEAM ROPING

Team roping is the only rodeo event that features two contestants. The team consists of a header and a heeler.

The header ropes the horns, then dallies or wraps his rope around his saddle horn and turns the steer to the left for the other cowboy who ropes the heels. The heeler must throw a loop with precision timing to catch both of the steer's hind legs; only catching one leg results in a five-second penalty. The time clock stops once both ropers have made a catch and brought the animals to a stop, facing each other. This is a timed event.

*4.7 seconds in 2020 Kaleb Driggers & Carson Johnson





BULL RIDING

Bull riders, who might not weigh more than 150 pounds, place a flat braided rope around a bull that weighs almost 2,000 pounds. The bull rope is placed around the animal, just behind its shoulders. It is then looped and threaded through itself, and the cowboy wraps it around his riding hand with only his grip holding him in place. The rider relies on balance and leg strength to make the eight-second buzzer. Look for bull riders to sit up close to their bull ropes and turn their toes out because rides are judged on the competitor's riding style and the bull's bucking ability. Points are awarded by the judges up to 50 for the animal athlete and up to 50 for the cowboy's performance.

Makayla was a senior at Ponderosa High School and a long time member of the Douglas County 4-H community. She was 17 years old when she tragically passed away in a motor vehicle accident on Parker Road while returning home with friends from a hunting trip on December 12, 2021.

Makayla was well loved, admired and respected by her family, friends and peers. She was planning on attending GCU in Arizona where she wanted to study to become an anesthesiologist because she wanted to help people.



Over the past several years she collected numerous medals, awards and champion belt buckles at shotgun shooting events with SCTP, NSCA and 4-H. Last year she attended 4-H Nationals in Grand Island, NE and represented the State of Colorado with pride. She was a fierce competitor in shotgun sports but also on the soccer field. She was a four-year varsity letter earner for Ponderosa High School and was named a team captain. Makayla was a talented artist who loved photography and animals but she will be mostly remembered as a loyal and trustworthy friend. Her absence leaves a hole in the heart of her family, friends and 4-H communities.

The Colorado State Patrol has created a "Click It for Makayla" campaign for Douglas County Fair & Rodeo in honor of Makayla. CSP hopes that everyone, every time, will buckle up. A seat belt can make all the difference.







The Man Behind the Sale

DR. PHILLIP J. RIESSELMAN, DDS



Phil is best known to everyone as Chairman of the Jr. Livestock Sale. His passion, dedication and commitment to the Sale speak for itself. Phil has been on the Douglas County Fair & Rodeo Fair Board since 1995 having started working with Cap Bell on the Jr. Livestock Sale Committee. One of his first assigned jobs was to run

the parking lot and park cars! He became the Jr. Livestock Sale Chairman when Cap Bell left in 1998.

Phil was the Fair Board President from 2004 to 2006. He joined the Douglas County Fair Foundation at its onset, served on its marketing committee and is currently the chairman of the Livestock Educational Grant Committee. He worked with then Commissioner Roger Partridge and Cherokee Ranch's James Holmes to start the program with its first donated calf in 2014. The now successful program has grown and includes steers, hogs, sheep, goats, rabbits and most recently poultry.

Riesselman states, "It's definitely a lot of hard work that pays off in more than dollars." Phil was awarded the "Meritorious Service Award in 1999 at 4-H achievement night and the FFA Honoree Member Award in 2006. Phil was inducted into the Wall of Honor at the fairgrounds Heritage Plaza in recognition of his exemplary service, leadership, dedication and commitment to the Douglas County Fair & Rodeo in 2019.

A native of Colorado, Phil was raised in the Plum creek area next to Riverside Acres; which is now the Chatfield State Park area. He was the fifth in a family of eight children. He grew up around horses where he and his family would go on long trail rides up Plum Creek. He remembers going to the Douglas County Fair as a youngster to watch his father race "Buck 49" in the Quarter Horse Sprint on the track. Yes, the fair had a racetrack! His first 4-H project was in Entomology.



Born in 1950, he attended Plum Creek Elementary School and then the Douglas County Jr. High School, which was in the old high school on Wilcox Street in Castle Rock. He participated in band, football, track, and swam as a member of the DU Hilltoppers in a youth swimming league. Phil won first place medals at the state music contest for the bass clarinet.

Riesselman then attended the Douglas County High School and participated in several activities. Phil continued in band, playing the clarinet, alto saxophone, baritone saxophone, and bass clarinet. He won several state medals at the state music contest. He was in several school musicals (Bye Bye Birdie, Little Mary Sunshine, and Carnival). Honored in high school with several band awards, he played in the dance band, the orchestra, and the pep band. Phil was given the first chair in the state band contests for alto saxophone and played in the orchestra that consisted of all top honored musicians in the state. He played football all four years as an interior lineman and linebacker, continued swimming and participated in the AAU and Junior Olympics. Phil was a gold medal winner in the breaststroke, the IM, and Medley relay. In addition, he started to ski and joined the Eskimo ski club, taking the train to Winter Park each weekend.

After graduating high school in 1968, Phil attended Regis
University, and graduated cum laude in premed with a major in
Biology, and minors in Chemistry & Philosophy. He was awarded
the biology student of year in 1971, a swimming scholarship
and an academic scholarship. He swam all 4 years breaking
school records in distance swimming and the backstroke
events. Unfortunately, he stopped participating in music, which
he regrets to this day. Throughout college, he continued to ski,
which became his favorite activity. He always had the horseman
in him, especially as he was seen riding his horse on campus
during Ranger Days at Regis College and consequently got in
BIG TROUBLE with the grounds staff, by leaving "slide" marks on
the manicured lawns while stopping "Susy Q" at full speed!

Graduating college in 1972 and being accepted into Loyola University Dental School, several jobs helped pay his way. He helped coach a swimming team, was a lab assistant, worked as a security guard at a hotel, and at the newly built Sears Tower in Chicago. In dental school he met his first wife, Dianne, (a

dental hygiene student) and was married in 1974. He graduated dental school in May of 1976 and headed home with a new baby (Amy) and new DDS degree! Phil started a practice in downtown Aurora in 1976 and had a son (Scott), two years later. Son, Kyle, followed and eventually the family moved out to Franktown where he lives today. He had his own dental practice in Aurora until 2004 when he joined Dental One and became a corporate dentist. He worked with Dental One Partners for over 12 years until he retired on December 31, 2016.

During these years, Phil continued to ski with his family, and enjoyed teaching them. He trained and joined the Loveland Sk Patrol as a National Ski patrol member in 1980, becoming the National Ski Patrol director at Loveland and the head trainer for new ski patrolmen teaching ski techniques and toboggan handling. Being trained in avalanche rescue and backcountry rescue he was awarded a national number (6792) in 1987. Riesselman was a ski patrolman for 17 years until he joined the Winkler Cattle Company.

In 1990, he married Karen Longworth Mullins and became a stepfather of Joe and Jameson Mullins. He worked at the

Winkler Ranch for 22 years until the ranch was sold. In 2006, Karen passed after a battle with breast cancer.

April 11, 2009, he married Jeanne Niehus Shropshire and became

the stepfather of Tyler Heaton, Lisa and Greg Daly. He and Jeanne have 15 grandchildren between their children and stepchildren.

Phil currently works at the Community College of Denver at the

Phil currently works at the Community College of Denver at the Dental Hygiene School. He serves as an adjunct clinic instructor and still does dentistry for the low-income clinic at the school for the patients who have been seen by the students. Phil also has a driveway business installing gravel driveways and has been doing that for 5 years (in his spare time!). Phil now goes

camping and fishing with his wife, Jeanne, and loves spending time with his children and siblings.

And now you know more about the man behind the Sale. Quite a remarkable life!



2022 DOUGLAS COUNTY FAIR & RODEO PRINCESS ATTENDANT





THE LIVESTOCK EDUCATIONAL GRANT PROGRAM IS NOW L.E.G. UP



The Douglas County Fair Foundation and the

Douglas County Fair Board along with Douglas County 4-H and FFA are proud to partner together and facilitate the Livestock Educational Grant Program now branded as L.E.G. Up. The Fair Foundation supports L.E.G. Up by providing a financial leg up and knowledgeable industry advisers to grant recipients. Recipients raise their market animal with intent to show and if they qualify, sell their livestock at the Douglas County Fair & Rodeo Junior Livestock Sale. Douglas County 4-H and FFA each provide the structured educational program that teaches participants about the livestock industry, and how to raise and care for market animals. Participants learn by doing, how to care for, raise, feed and sell a market livestock animal. Community sponsors contribute to provide youth with an opportunity to increase their education, learn responsibility, and improve their citizenship.

The program offers grants for steer, swine, lamb, goat and breeding rabbits In 2023, L.E.G. Up will introduce a market poultry grant which will includes funding and support from advisors for a market chicken or turkey project.
