GENERAL GUEST CONDUCT

- **Smoking and/or vaping** is not allowed in any public buildings, or within 100' of any building entrance.
- **Personal golf carts, ATV's, motorized scooters or bicycles** are not allowed on the Fairgrounds during County Fair.
- **Dogs** are not allowed on the Fairgrounds during County Fair except for those dogs that are competing or performing during the Fair. Owners / Handlers must keep dogs under constant control. Dogs ARE NOT allowed into any of the livestock barns, Kirk Hall, Midway, or the James R. Sullivan Events Center. Under the ADA regulations, assistance animals are allowed.
- **Alcohol** is not to be brought onto the grounds and will be sold in designated areas only on the Fairgrounds during County Fair: Midway, James R. Sullivan Events Center and Indoor Arena. Otherwise, alcohol cannot be consumed or carried anywhere else on the grounds. No alcohol in any livestock barn.
- **Fireworks** are not allowed on the Fairgrounds.
- **Flyers and/or sale bills** may not be passed out in any areas of the Fairgrounds, with the exception of within a paid vendor booth space.
- **Placing flyers on automobiles** is prohibited.
- **Parking** vehicles for advertising purposes or sale of a vehicle is prohibited.
- **Any public display of photos or video** of any Douglas County Fair event, concert or rodeo for public dissemination without express written consent from Douglas County is strictly prohibited.
- **Douglas County Fair may take photos** of guests, contestants, employees and volunteers. These photos shall be the property of Douglas County and may be used by Douglas County Fair Management for educational or promotional materials.
- All guests, contestants and participants are **subject to a search** by security personnel.
- **All ticket sales are final** – no credits, refunds or exchanges. Douglas County Fair retains the right to refuse admittance to anyone.

DOUGLAS COUNTY FAIR & RODEO CARE & TREATMENT OF ANIMALS

The Douglas County Fair & Rodeo is committed to the proper care and treatment of all livestock associated with the Douglas County Fair & Rodeo. We strive to promote and preserve our Western Heritage in the safest manner for our animals, exhibitors, contestants and guests. Management and personnel of the Douglas County Fair & Rodeo have extensive knowledge and understanding in all sectors of the livestock industry as well as the sport of rodeo. These people routinely put the needs of the livestock before their own.

Our rodeo performances are proudly sanctioned by the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association (PRCA), the largest and oldest rodeo sanctioning body in the world. Together, the management of the Douglas County Fair & Rodeo and the PRCA enforce more than 70 rules that govern the care and treatment of livestock participating in rodeo events; these are the strongest rules enforced by any rodeo organization. ProRodeo Officials, as well as the on-site veterinarian assess each animal prior to competition to ensure all livestock are well-suited and fit for competition. In addition to monitoring the livestock prior to the competition, a veterinarian is on-site during each performance.

4-H Junior Livestock Shows and educational programs promote hands-on learning and help develop life skills. Hard work, dedication, respect and responsibility learned from an interaction with animals, aids youth in developing into tomorrow's leaders. Exhibitors adhere to competition rules and a code of conduct, ensuring the safety and welfare for animals and exhibitors alike.

The Douglas County Fair & Rodeo is proud to be continuing the western way of life and will continue to address issues, especially livestock welfare, with a productive approach. We would like to thank Littleton Equine Medical Center for being the official veterinarian of the Douglas County Fair & Rodeo.

EXPERIENCE CREATIVE ARTS THOMAS NETWAL

Thomas Netwal, originally from Wisconsin and wife, Carol, originally from North Dakota, have both entered numerous items in the Douglas County Fair since their move to Castle Rock in 2005.

As a young man, Tom was introduced to photography through his uncle who played old photo slides for him to watch, but at age 10 he was bored. Tom borrowed a camera from his uncle but had an accident that broke the camera and ended his short career for a time. While working for Colorado Bureau of Investigation (CBI), he found that there was a need for better photos of crime scenes. He was successful in obtaining a grant for CBI to allow a transition to digital photography, which inspired him to try photography again. Over the years Tom has entered 2 photos in each category (except portraits or story telling) every year, and has won many Ribbons and Rosettes.

Growing up on a farm in North Dakota, Carol was always involved in their county fair. She was a Medical Technologist for 22 years at Rose Medical Center and 10 years at Rocky Mountain Cancer Center.

Carol is a talented quilter and enters one or two quilts each year at fair. Not long ago, she took 1st place and Best of Show for her quilt at the Douglas County Fair & Rodeo. The following year, she entered the same quilt in the Colorado State Fair and won 1st Place and Best of Show too!!!

Tom and Carol say they can't wait to see what classes they can enter every year. *"There is always something new to see and experience. It is important to involve the community and young folks in activities they have never tried before!"*

THE COOKIE TRAIL THROUGH THE FAIR

There was a girl named Merry Baker who was eager and very interested in the Open Class Creative Arts Division of the Douglas County Fair & Rodeo. Merry looked up the website: fairandrodeofun.com and read all 444 classes she could enter in the Open Class section.

When she got to "Commissioner Cookie Jar" she said *"This is perfect for me!"* She read all the rules (there are a lot of rules!) and finds that she needs to make and hand decorate a container that must be filled and contain 4 different kinds of homemade cookies, individually wrapped. In addition, Merry needs to prepare a separate plate that contains one of each type of cookie to accompany the entry for judging purposes. The container must be wide-mouthed, approximately one gallon, and must be hand decorated as desired by the exhibitor. Cookies will count as 75% of the judge's score and the decorated cookie jar will count as 25% of the score.

Merry Baker says *"Time to get busy! I bake the best oatmeal, chocolate chip, snickerdoodle, and peanut butter cookies in the county!"* She rolls up her sleeves and starts baking. When the cookies are cooling she scratches her head *"This cookie jar needs to be decorated as part of the County Fair. What is there in the county fair that everyone would recognize? I've got it! It can be the Rodeo Clown in the Barrel!!! Yahoo!! Besides baking great cookies, I love to do decorating! My mama once told me you are never too old or too young to try something new!"* Once her decision was made Merry individually wrapped the cookies in plastic wrap and placed them in her Rodeo Clown Cookie Jar.

Entry Day – First Sunday! Merry proudly takes her Cookie Jar to the James R. Sullivan Events Center at the Fairgrounds. A team of Creative Arts volunteers is on hand to greet and guide her through the entry process. Merry is so pleased that there is no fee to enter – it's free and it's fun and so easy to enter her cookie jar. She fills out an Exhibitor 2-part form. The white copy is kept by the Entry Staff at the front table and Merry keeps the yellow copy for later use. She also has to fill out an exhibit manila tag that is attached to the Cookie Jar and the lower portion of the manila tag is kept by Merry to retrieve her exhibit at the end of the Fair. Merry then takes her Cookie Jar to the Baking Department to enter the Commissioner Cookie Jar Class. Merry Baker says, *"That was easy as pie (or maybe cookies)!"*

Judging Day – Monday. Exhibits are judged. Judging for the Baking Department is closed to the public.

Creative Arts Exhibits open to the public on Thursday and Merry rushes to see if her entry placed or won any ribbons. She won first place! And BEST OF SHOW! That means she will receive a blue ribbon, a big rosette ribbon and a premium – Money!

Friday evening is the Junior Livestock Sale. The Creative Arts volunteers pack up the cookies from all the Cookie Jars that were entered and proudly take them down to the Pavilion. Prior to the Sale, the three Douglas County Commissioners toss the cookies to the buyer crowd as part of the opening ceremony of the Junior Livestock Sale. This is a guest favorite at the Sale! There is cheering, yelling for tosses to the upper stands, and a general haggling for the cookies. There are always more guests than cookies to go around. The lucky guests of the Sale love the delicious homemade cookie varieties.

The Trail of Cookies is not just a story and lesson; it is our County heritage and legacy to follow to the end of the trail! Quite a trail the cookies followed!

Now it's your turn - Have you ever wanted to showcase your baking skills or other creativity in a fun and exciting competition? Look no further than the Open Class Creative Arts Division at the Douglas County Fair & Rodeo! Join individuals like Merry Baker, who embarked on a cookie-filled journey in the Commissioner Cookie Jar class, and discover the joy of participating in this beloved tradition.

The cookie trail awaits - come and be part of this delicious adventure!



BAREBACK RIDING

Both the rider and the bucking horse are judged in this event. It is a single-handhold, eight-second ride that starts with the cowboy's feet held in a position over the break of the horse's shoulders until the horse's front feet touch the ground first jump out of the chute. The rider earns points maintaining upper body control while moving his feet in a toes-turned-out rhythmic motion in time with the horse's bucking action. Points are awarded by the judges, up to 50 for the animal athlete and up to 50 for the cowboy's performance.

SADDLE BRONG RIDING

Known as rodeo's classic event, saddle bronc riding is judged similarly to bareback riding, but there are additional possibilities to being disqualified; that is, losing a stirrup or dropping the thickly braided rein that is attached to the horse's halter. The cowboy sits on the horse differently due to the saddle and rein, and the spurring motion covers a different area of the horse. Saddle bronc horses are usually several hundred pounds heavier than bareback horses and generally buck in a slower manner. Points are awarded by the judges, up to 50 for the animal athlete and 50 for the cowboy's performance.

STEER WRESTLING

This event was originally called "bull dogging" and requires the cowboy to leap from the running horse onto the back of a 600-pound steer, catch it behind the horns, stop the steer's forward momentum and wrestle it to the ground with all four of its legs pointing the same direction to stop the clock. The bulldogger is assisted by the hazer, typically another competitor, who rides along the steer's right to keep the animal running straight. This is a timed event.

TIE-DOWN ROPING

Tie-down roping is an authentic ranch skill that originated from working cowboys. Once the calf has been roped, the cowboy dismounts and runs down the length of the rope to the calf. When the calf is on the ground, the cowboy ties three legs together with a six-foot pigging string. Calves are given a head start, and if the cowboy's horse leaves the box too soon, a barrier breaks and a 10-second penalty is added to the roper's time. A fraction of a second can make the difference between winning and losing in all timed events. Tie-down roping is a timed event.

WOMEN'S BARREL RACING

This event is a horse race with turns. The cowgirl's time begins as she rides her horse across the starting line in the arena. She makes a run around three upright barrels, which are in a cloverleaf pattern, and back to the starting line where the clock stops. Tipping a barrel is permitted, but if it is knocked to the ground, a five-second penalty is added to her time. Fastest time wins.

TEAM ROPING

Team roping is the only rodeo event that features two contestants. The team consists of a header and a heeler. The header ropes the horns, then dallies or wraps his rope around his saddle horn and turns the steer to the left for the other cowboy who ropes the heels. The heeler must throw a loop with precision timing to catch both of the steer's hind legs; only catching one leg results in a five-second penalty. The time clock stops once both ropers have made a catch and brought the animals to a stop, facing each other. This is a timed event.

BULL RIDING

Bull riders, who might not weigh more than 150 pounds, place a flat braided rope around a bull that weighs almost 2,000 pounds. The bull rope is placed around the animal, just behind its shoulders. It is then looped and threaded through itself, and the cowboy wraps it around his riding hand with only his grip holding him in place. The rider relies on balance and leg strength to make the eight-second buzzer. Look for bull riders to sit up close to their bull ropes and turn their toes out because rides are judged on the competitor's riding style and the bull's bucking ability. Points are awarded by the judges up to 50 for the animal athlete and up to 50 for the cowboy's performance.
