## **General Rules**

- 1. Open to anyone.
- 2. Children age 7 and under before December 31, 2021 may enter "Children's Corner." Participants age eight (8) and above by December 31, 2021 may enter exhibits the same as adults. No entry fee will be charged and ribbons will be given at check-in (no competition, no prize money).
- 3. Late entries will not be accepted. Items must be entered within specified time frame.
- 4. Exhibits must be made/prepared within the past three years by the exhibitor and entered in his or her own name. <u>All exhibits shall have never before been shown at the Elkhart County 4-H Fair.</u> (Exception: See special rule in the Quilting Department; exception for Culinary Arts department.)
- 5. No duplicate entries. Example: If you have two exhibits that fit in the same class, you cannot enter the second exhibit as "other than above." Only one entry per class. Example: If you would like to enter three loaves of bread in the Quick Bread section, you can enter one loaf of bread in each class: one in B61, one in B62, and one in B63.
- 6. Exhibits entered in the wrong class will be disqualified. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to know which department, section, class name and number to enter. Example: Food Preservation Canning is the department, Meat is the section, and the class number is C28 Beef.
- 7. **Size limitations apply.** Exhibit not to exceed 25 lbs. nor larger than 36" in its largest dimension except where otherwise stated.
- 8. All foods exhibitors must follow Food Safety Regulations and recipe requirements as stated under Culinary Arts-Baking Department rules.
- 9. Exhibits for which there is no classification will not be accepted.
- 10. The Fair Board will NOT be responsible for damage or theft of articles.
- 11. Exhibits will be mixed within departments to make best use of space and create a more interesting display.
- 12. Entries must be clean and free of odors and insects.

### How to Enter

- Bring your entries to the Home & Family Arts Building on the day of checkin. NO PRE-REGISTRATION.
- 2. Entry fee is \$1.00 per entry, paid at time of entry.
- 3. No refunds will be made.
- 4. Option: Enter a minimum of 5 exhibits (general or baked goods) and pay a \$30 entry fee to receive 5 daily fair passes. You can enter up to 20 entries with no additional cost. After 20 entries, the fee of \$1 per entry applies.

## **Judging and Awards**

- 1. General entry judging is CLOSED.
- 2. Baking and Cake Decorating will be judged Thursday, July 21 at noon. The public may observe the foods judging; however, contestants are asked not to converse with judges, or their exhibit will be disqualified. Judging order will be: President's Item, Children's Food, Baking, and Cake Decorating. THE REST OF THE BUILDING IS NOT OPEN TO THE PUBLIC.
- 3. With the exception of Children's Corner, premiums are: 1st: \$3 and ribbon; 2nd: \$2 and ribbon; and 3rd: \$1 and ribbon. A Sweepstakes ribbon will be awarded in each section and a \$10 "Grand Champion" awarded in each department. The judges are instructed not to award premiums unless the articles are deemed worthy of merit.
- 4. Only first, second, and third place will be awarded in each category.
- 5. Judging will be based on workmanship, preparation of articles for exhibit, suitability for purpose, beauty and originality of design as well as harmony of colors, materials, and cleanliness. Judges shall not award prizes to unworthy exhibits, whether there is competition or not, nor shall they award premiums on articles incorrectly entered or incorrectly named.

- 1. No pick-up until stated time.
- 2. Exhibits removed without permission will forfeit any premiums awarded.

## Culinary Arts—Baking

Check in: Th, July 21 - 7:30 to 11 a.m. (Open Judging: noon)

Awards by Sweet-Em's Cake Shoppe

- 1. See general rules on page 4.
- 2. After entering your items, please park outside the fairground gates.
- 3. Food items must be covered. Covers/containers must be labeled with participant's name. Items will be sitting for some time prior to judging. Entries need to be on a sturdy surface stable enough for the entry to be moved several times.
- 4. Bread entries must be standard size loaves, no minis. Entries need to be whole items (ex. whole pies).
- 5. Recipes <u>must be provided</u> that show which ingredients were used in each part of the product. Recipes should be complete and typed or neatly written on one side of an 8-1/2" x 11" piece of paper.
- On the back side of the recipe, be sure to include your name, complete address and phone number as well as the year, the section and category. These recipes will become the property of the Elkhart County Extension Homemakers with the right to use them for fair publicity.

#### **Food Safety Regulations**

- For food competitions: Filling, frosting, glazing, pie filling, and meringue, (whether uncooked or cooked) are not permitted to contain cream cheese, sour cream, heavy cream, or whipped cream as the nature of these products increases the moisture content and water activity of the food. Foods with a higher moisture content and water activity can be ideal growing conditions for foodborne pathogens, even if the ingredient is part of a batter and baked.
- 2. Additionally, raw milk, raw milk products or uncooked eggs/egg whites are not permitted. Eggs/egg whites that have been cooked to 160° F (i.e. pasteurized or included as part of a batter and baked) are acceptable.
- 3. No home-canned fruits, vegetables, or meats are permitted in products.
- 4. Contestants should carefully wash their hands and make sure that their hands do not have any open cuts before preparing foods. Contestants should not prepare food exhibits for competition within 48 hours of recovering from any illness.
- 5. Whenever possible, baked products should be transported and stored in chilled coolers (40° F). Only portions of food products will be exhibited except in the Grand Champion. Other food may be taken home following the judging. Any food remaining after 3 p.m. will be destroyed unless arrangements were made at check-in.

## Culinary Arts—Food Preservation Canning

Check in: M, July 18 – 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. (Closed judging)

- 1. See general rules on page 4.
- Please use current canning techniques from USDA/National Center for Home Food Preservation: https://nchfp.uga.edu; we'll also continue using Ball: www.freshpreserving.com and 1-800-240-3340
- 3. All canning must have been completed within the last year.
- 4. All canned goods must be in colorless standard canning jars with a two-piece lid and band. All jelly, jam, preserves, and butters should be in a standard jelly glass or pint jar with a two-piece lid. Leave the band on the jar.
- 5. All containers must be sealed to be judged; no canned goods will be opened.
- 6. Entries must be labeled on top of jar with product name, date of preparation, processing method, and processing time. (See label example.)
- 7. Electronic programmable pressure cookers <u>cannot</u> be used for canning.

# Item Date: Year Processing method: Processing time:

#### **Quality Criteria:**

Safety is of utmost importance. Any entry exhibiting spoilage or not in compliance with judging guidelines must be disqualified. Quality criteria are based on visual judging only.

#### Filled Jar:

- Headspace must correspond to instructions from the reference guides listed.
   The top of the project or liquid covering product must provide adequate headspace as stated in approved guidelines.
- Air bubbles must be kept to a minimum. (Gas bubbles denote spoilage and can be identified by movement of bubbles to the surface of the product while the jar is stationary. Products indicating gas bubbles are present WILL be disqualified.

- Method used to heat process food must comply with current preserving guidelines as stated in the approved reference guides. The boilingwater process for acid food and pressure process for low-acid food are the only recommended methods.
- Times for heat processing food correctly vary depending on each specific recipe or food type. Processing time must be in agreement with the approved reference guides.

#### **Product Appearance:**

- Produce should be free from blemishes, disease, and spoilage. Recipes prepared with stems, pits and peels intact are acceptable if the recipe is in keeping with all other preserving guidelines.
- Liquid must be clear and free from cloudiness and small particles unless recipe ingredients have a natural affect on product clarity.
- Color of the finished product should be as close as possible to its natural characteristics or that for cooked product.
- Texture is affected by heat processing; however, the finished product should not appear overcooked or easily break down.
- Ingredients should retain their shape and size based on the type and preparation method. Cut pieces of uniform size should be packed evenly in the jar yet allow adequate room for liquid to circulate throughout the jar.





- 1. All residents of Elkhart County and/or people who participate in Elkhart County Extension activities are eligible to participate.
- 2. Garments modeled must have been made after September 1, 2021. Any suitable fabric or technique (knitting, crocheting, etc.) may be used.
- 3. Contestants may enter in multiple categories. The same garment may also be entered and win in the Special Wool Fashion Show.
- 4. Contestants must model their own garment EXCEPT in categories with the "sewing for others" designation.
- 5. Participants are encouraged to enter their garments in the Sewing section of the Home and Family Arts Department. Garments entered in open class clothing construction must be returned following the public show.

#### **Registration and Award Process**

- 1. Complete registration form and submit by July 1.
- 2. Contestants attend two events: 1) judging, 2) public fashion show.
- 3. A judging schedule and information will be mailed to all participants.
- 4. The public fashion show will be held during the Open House. Results will be announced and prizes will be awarded. Written comments will be made on a score sheet and will be available for pick up in the dressing area after the Open House.

#### Awards

- 1. Ribbons will be awarded to the first and second place in each category in each division.
- 2. A prize will be awarded to the first place winner in each category.

#### Scoring

Following is a summary of the score sheet that the judges will use. The score sheet has been developed to help you understand the points the judges are looking at:

- I. The Contestant appearance, posture, poise, and grooming...... 35%
- II. The Costume on the Contestant becoming, fit, style, texture, fabric, effect of undergarments, and accessories ............ 40%

#### Divisions — Non-Professional and Professional

**Professionals** are considered as "one who has received any monetary compensation in excess of \$1,200 per year over the last five years in any phase of clothing (clothing construction, judging, modeling, fabric sales, teaching or has a degree in clothing and textiles)." All others shall be considered Non-Professional.

#### Categories

- A. **Aprons** One or more aprons that you have sewn.
- B. **Coats or Suits** (1 person modeling) Separate coat for your wardrobe, to be solely a coat with its own accessories. Suits being two or more pieces (i.e., skirt or pants with jacket, cape, or vest of the same fabric, shown with or without its own blouse or shirt). Jacket, coat, cape or vest must be lined.
- C. **Dresses** (1 person modeling) One or two piece. Includes a dress with own jacket, coat, vest or jumper and blouse.
- D. Family Outfits— Person wearing outfit she/he has made, plus any other individuals wearing garments sewn for them with a coordinated or themed look.
- E. My Choice— (1 person modeling) Active wear (i.e., tennis wear/swimwear), western, loungewear or costumes (such as historic, dance, international or Halloween) which do not fit in the other classes listed. (No bridal gowns—see wedding gowns)
- F. **Embellished w/Hand or Machine Embroidery** (1 person modeling) Any garment that has been embellished by hand or machine embroidery.
- G. Separates (1 person modeling). True coordinates. May be 2, 3, or more garments selected and modeled together for a complete look. All garments must be worn. Each piece should be important enough to stand on its own with other garments. Accessory items such as a sweater, blouse or shirt may be a purchased garments.
- H. Sewing for Others/Children Birth to Age 5 (as of January 1) One child's garment or outfit. Any type of garment. Seamstress must be present.
- Sewing for Others/Children Ages 6-12 (as of January 1) One child's garment or outfit. Any type of garment. Seamstress must be present.
- J. Sewing for Others/Teen Ages 13-17 (as of January 1) One teen's garment or outfit. Any type of garment. Seamstress must be present.
- K. Sewing for Others/Adult Over Age 18 (as of January 1) One adult's garment or outfit. Any type of garment. Seamstress must be present.
- L. **Wedding Gowns** (1 person modeling). Seamstress of the garment must be present at the judging.
- M. **Bridesmaids or Formal Dresses** (1 person modeling) Seamstress of the garment must be present at the judging.
