RULES & REGULATIONS



1. The Fallon County Fair Board reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and settles and determine all matters, questions, and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, connected with or incident to the fair.

2. The Board reserves the right to formulate and announce new rules to meet emergencies all matters arising from the fair.

3. The Fair Management reserves the right to exclude from the fairgrounds any person or persons whom it may deem undesirable or who shall violates any of the rules laid down by the management or who shall in any way become offensive.

4. No claim for injury to any person or property shall ever be made or assessed, or suit instituted and maintained against the Fallon County Fair, its officials, or their agents, or on behalf of any person, firm, corporation or their agents, representatives, servants or employees having licenses or privilege to exhibit on the Fairgrounds or occupying space.

5. Every animal and article on the grounds shall be under the control of the Fair Board, but while every precaution will be taken for the safe keeping of the same, neither the Fair Board, its officers or agents will be responsible in any case for any loss, damage, or accident which may occur.

6. The board reserves the right to direct and regulate the parking of all vehicles or conveyances within the fairgrounds and to direct where they shall be driven therein. It may prohibit the running of automobiles in any section of the grounds whenever in its opinion common sense or safety demands it.

7. Each concessionaire must confine themselves to the space assigned to them. Failure to do this will subject him to forfeiture of the privilege without reimbursement.

8. The Management authorizes the letting of only such privileges or concessions as are required to supply the necessary wants of the people or that may add to their comfort, convenience and pleasure; but under no circumstances will privileges of questionable nature or of a demoralizing tendency be let in or in any manner tolerated upon the grounds or in the buildings; nor will any privileges be permitted where the business is conducted in other than a legitimate manner.

9. Space not occupied by vendor the second day of the fair will be resold and no refund made.

10. The distribution of handbills or other advertising matter is strictly prohibited and no tacking or posting of advertising bills, cards, etc., will be permitted on any of the buildings or elsewhere. Exhibitors may advertise and distribute from their booth or exhibit only.

11. The board will carefully guard against extortion in any form practiced on patrons of the fair. A violation of this rule will cause forfeiture of contract and money paid and involves expulsion from the grounds as the management may direct. Any fair patron purchasing goods from an exhibitor does so at his own risk.

12. Soliciting subscriptions: Resolution adopted by the Rocky Mountain Association of Fairs, January 28, 1986. All fairs holding membership in the RMAF voted unanimously to exclude all sheet writers from every fair in the State of Montana.

13. Concessionaires must not throw any refuse or water, or other fluids or grease on the ground. The first violation of this rule may cause concession to be closed and forfeiture of fees paid.



RULES & REGULATIONS

1. Note sections covering each department for any special rules pertaining to that department.

2. Only <u>one</u> entry in each class per exhibitor except in poultry. *Must choose between open class or 4-H*. No animal can compete for more than one premium. Excepting: Horses can compete for more than one premium ONLY IF it is a different combination of horse and rider in each class.

3. Exhibits are expected to be brought to the fairgrounds as per schedule of events. See back page. All open class items are to be brought in **Wednesday**.

4. Entry blanks must be in to the Fair Office by 9:00 am <u>Monday</u>, of fair week, for all open-class categories. Anyone under 17 needs to have their age on the entry form.

5. Every entry must be made in the name of the owner. Exceptions are poultry, llamas, alpacas and horse when the animal is judged verses the person showing the animal.

6. Applications for entry of all exhibits should be made on entry forms provided with this premium list. Additional forms may be obtained from Office at the Fallon County Fair, PO Box 998, Baker, MT 59313 or email us at <u>fairgrounds@falloncounty.net</u>.

7. Tags may be picked up at the Fair Office on Wednesday afternoon when exhibits may be placed.

8. All Exhibits in the exhibit hall must remain until 4:00 pm on Sunday or forfeit premiums. Livestock may start to at leave Sunday @ 3:00 pm, but need to be out of the barn by 5:00 pm. Checks may be picked up at 4 pm on Sunday at exhibit hall.

9. Exhibits not removed or arrangements made for their removal within ten days of the close of the fair will become property of the fair.

10. Suggestions or ideas for new divisions or classes to be added to the next years Fair Book can be brought in to the fair office. To be looked into by the Fair Board. The deadline is December 15.

11. In case of livestock, exhibitors must feed, water and clean stalls where stock is placed. Bedding will be furnished. Note number of stalls required on entry blank submitted. *All stalled horse exhibits need to have a signed receipt from Barn Superintendent before receiving premium check.*

12. Judges are instructed to award in each instance only prizes of such grade as the merits of the individual animal or article fully justifies. Absence of competition will not be accepted as justification for awarding a high-class prize to an animal or article of medium or inferior quality. Judges will make or withhold awards as they see fit in the absence of competition.

13. No person shall attempt to interfere with or influence the judges while discharging their duties. *Any exhibitor who publicly expresses disapproval in the arena or on the grounds of the decision of the judges or who by an act of interference shall be guilty of conduct unbecoming an exhibitor, shall forfeit the premium and be excluded from further competition.*

14. When entries are judged by the <u>Danish system</u> all will receive a placing, but this does not mean that a blue ribbon must be awarded if there is no entry deserving of award. Open: 1st, 2nd, and 3rd.

15. Money prizes will be paid only upon classifications listed in the premium catalogue and in strict compliance with rules. *Open class premiums will be paid at the Entry Office after 4:00 pm Sunday.*

16. Superintendents and judges may re-classify wrongly classified articles prior to judging.

17. *Return all unused exhibitor's tags for entries not exhibited.*

18. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives or show officials before, during or after competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, & fair livestock show management shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation & respect, no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them. The violation of this rule will involve expulsion from grounds and the exclusion from further competition.

Stalls, Pens, and Cages should be left clean.

NO TRAILERS OR AUTOMOBILES – shall be parked by the north or south sides of Livestock Barn.



IMPORTANT REMINDERS:

- Return tags made for entries not exhibited to allow removal from record.
- Only one entry in each class per exhibitor is allowed except in poultry, horse, llama and alpaca.
- All animals must be handled in a proper and ethical manner as per accepted modern animal husbandry and scientific practices, and anyone treating animals in any other manner may be asked to leave the grounds.
- Where there are fewer animals shown in classes that number premiums offered, the judge may, at their discretion, award a prize or prizes of such grade as the animal or animals deserve. No champion will be selected unless the animal is worthy of class. Judges must not award unworthy exhibits.
- ALL Exhibitors are requested to make application for stalls as early as possible, with Extension Office (406) 778-7110. Stalls are assigned in the order requests are received.
- ALL Exhibitors must keep space in rear of stalls and pens clean and well-bedded. Leave stalls and pens clean at termination of fair or open class checks will be withheld.
- All animals entered in the Livestock Department must be in their stall or pen by <u>8:00 am</u> <u>on Friday and are allowed to leave @ 3:00 pm,</u> <u>but must be out @ 5:00 pm on Sunday.</u>
- All animals must be clean and prepared for show. All livestock exhibited according to ethics of show ring.
- Superintendents have the right at their discretion for safety reasons, to say if the animal may show or not.
- <u>Assumption of Risk</u> must be signed & turned into office (This is on the Entry Blank Form).

ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS:

The Department of Livestock will no longer

require a current brucellosis test as a condition for exhibiting or showing cattle or swine for Montana-raised animals. Animals imported into Montana for show purposes must have a current health certificate. All sheep & goats must have a Scrapie Tag in their ear if they are a market animal.

Any animal showing signs of disease, emaciation,, ringworm, abscess (caseous lymphadenitis) pink eye, other skin disorders may be refused by the Barn Superintendent and/or the on call veterinarian.

NATIONAL CODE OF ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always show standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada. The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events.



The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.

2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.

3. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of volatile drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animals performance or appearance at the event.

4. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign or drug or the external application of a substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter the natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

5. The use of showing and/or handing practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

6. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In

the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

7. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

8. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

9. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and any special notices to members.

10. The act of entering of the animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.



The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.

2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.

3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.

4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of volatile drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animals performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administrated to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample tested by the laboratory to which it is sent the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer **Cattle Health Regulations:** The FCF Trailer Show requires that all cattle meet health requirements before being permitted in the Show building. All animals are subject to inspection by the Show Veterinarian upon arrival at the grounds.

Show & Exhibit Cattle: All cattle must be free of contagious disease and parasites, including ringworm, warts, scabies, lice and pink eye.

Montana Origin Cattle: All cattle are required to follow Montana regulations. Brand inspections are required when crossing a county line. All females over 6 months of age are required to be calf hood vaccinates. All non virgin bulls or bull over 1 year are required to have a negative trich test.

Out-of-state cattle: All cattle are required to comply with Montana state regulations which include a health certificate, permit, and brand inspection. All non virgin bulls or bulls over 1 year are required to have a negative trich test. All yearlings to be shown will be official calf hood vaccinates with a legible tattoo and will be identified by a federal or brucellosis tag or a registration tattoo. Any female calf coming in as a separate entity that is between the age of 4 and 12 months is required to be vaccinated for brucellosis.

All pertinent papers (health, brand inspections, trick test) shall be made available to the livestock superintendent upon arrival.

A special area will be set aside for clipping and/or blocking chutes. Such will not be allowed in any other area unless specifically authorized by Barn Superintendent.

The barn crew will remove chutes, not in the designated area.

Rules for Sheep and Goats

The Rule: The USDA has enacted a mandatory program to eradicate the disease scrapie from sheep and goats in the US. The program requires an official ID on sheep and goats. The rule also states that sheep and goats for exhibition (shown at fairs) are required to have an official scrapie ID. (Goats may have an ID tattoo.)

What is scrapie? Scrapie is a fatal, degenerative disease affecting the central nervous system of sheep and goats. Animals sold from infected flocks spread scrapie to other flocks. The presence of scrapie in the U.S. also prevents the export of breeding stock, semen, and embryos to many other countries.

How does this apply to our fair? The rule clearly states that all breeding sheep and goats at the fair are required to have an official scrapie ID. At a minimum, all market sheep and goats except castrated males under 18 months of age are required to have an official ID. However, it may be easier for us to expand the tag requirement to all sheep and goats rather than to have to differentiate between ewe and wether lambs. This recommendation is endorsed by the Montana Scrapie Committee.

WOOL-OPEN CLASS

The purpose of this division is to educate wool growers toward producing higher value fleeces. Twelve months' growth of wool is the maximum permitted, except in the case of yearling fleeces. All entries must be in the name of the grower. **Factors affecting exhibit are:** *Twine used in tying fleeces; excessive dung locks or tags; discoloration by excessive moisture; and weakness of staple.* Fleeces should be rolled in clear plastic bag, flesh side out, in a manner to allow their being handled without falling apart.

Do not enter a class number. This will be determined by the judge.

Health Requirements: In the interest of protecting health and sensibilities of the Fair-Attending public, exhibitors and other animals, goats with visible symptoms of any stage (still clinically contagious or not) of a communicable disease, may not be shown. Health papers must accompany all animals. Animals with symptoms of ringworm, pinkeye, caseous lymphadenitis (contagious abscesses), contagious eczema (sore mouth) or other communicable diseases will be required to be isolated or removed from the fairgrounds at the discretion of fair officials or the vet. Animals with scars consistent with caseous lymphadenitis (cl) must include negative test for

If a Alpaca/Llama is observed to be ill, injured, diseased or of a condition that threatens the health of other animals Superintendent will take prompt action to remedy the situation and to notify the exhibitor/owner.

LLAMA/ALPACA ACCOMMODATIONS

Llama/Alpacas will be housed in stalls pre-assigned by fair office by August 1. No more than 2 llamas or 3 alpacas per stall.

SHOW INFORMATION

Participants are encouraged to enter as many Divisions as desired, but no Exhibitor will be allowed more than two premiums in any one class.

Show time will be Wednesday @ 11:30 AM & in place by 8:00 AM Wednesday of fair week.





Dept J-Division 2 - Sheaf

For proper ripening, sheaf grain can be from the previous year. Get into the field a few days before grain is ready to cut with the binder, select a few samples and with a knife cut close to the ground so as to get the full length of the straw. Be careful not to break the straw in handling. Spread the sample on a board in the sun to bleach. See that samples never get wet after being cut. When green color is entirely gone and straw is perfectly dry, bind them together in bundles, tying them with a soft cloth which will not cut the straw. Make bundles from three to four inches in diameter, just below the head and tie securely in at least three places, and then hang in dry place with head down until time for exhibiting. Sunflowers: Bring four stalks cut at ground level.

<u>DEPARTMENT K - VEGETABLES -</u> <u>ROOT CROPS - POTATOES -</u> <u>HORTICULTURE</u>

Hints to Exhibitors:

• The outstanding points to be considered in selecting a vegetable exhibit are quality and condition. The judging of a vegetable exhibit is generally based on the readiness of the products for immediate use. The quality of the product is determined by actual test.

• Condition and Quality also include the points of freedom from disease, insect work, mechanical injury and defects. Vegetable exhibits should comprise specimens which are almost perfect from physical standpoint.

• Medium sizes are generally preferred to the very large sizes. Uniformity, a point which applies to exhibits that include more than one specimen is particularly important.

Following are some points to be especially observed with each type:

Asparagus-Merits-Straight, dark green spears with tight scales. Free of rust, injury or other blemishes. Faults-Crooked, off-color, over mature spears. Blemishes from insects, diseases, shriveling or wilting. Preparation-Trim to uniform length of 7 to 8 inches. Tie in two places with rubber bands or ribbon.

Beans-Merits-Good color, straight, free from defects and rust. Pods fleshy, well filled. True to variety, uniform, small seeds, free from stinginess. Faults: Cracked pods, poor color, seeds too large (over mature), disease, insect or mechanical injury. Preparation-Harvest fresh or in plastic bag and store in refrigerator until ready for exhibit. Leave calyx attached (stem).

Beets-Merits-Color dark red, globe shape, firm, tender, smooth 2 to 21/2 inches diameter. Faults-Poor color, misshapen, rough skin, oversized, insect or disease damage. Preparation-Cut tops to 1 inch long. Do not remove tap root. Roots may be washed.

Broccoli-Merits-Head firm, good color, tender and crisp, free of insects. Not showing yellow flowers. Faults-Wilted, poor color, open flowers, insect or disease damage. Preparation-Harvest fresh or keep refrigerated until ready to exhibit. Remove all leaves below the head. Minimum diameter of head (or heads) 3 inches. Stalk and head at least 6 inches long,

Cabbage-Merits-Head solid, firm and fresh, free from insect damage, tender and crisp, heavy for size. Faults-Lightweight, loosely formed, not firm, wilted insect, disease or mechanical damage, growth cracks. Preparation-Do not peel excessively. Two layers of sound, green outer leaves should be left on. Stems should be cut off.

Cantaloupe or Muskmelon-Merits-Medium to large size, smooth stem end, good color for variety, fragrant , free from decay spots. Faults-Rough stem, poorly colored, bruises or decay spots, insect damage, over or under ripe. Preparation-Do not wash.

Carrots-Merits-Smooth, straight, good bright color, free of cracking, insect and disease damage. Free of green or purpurpling crowns, uniform length and shape. Faults-Too large or too small, crooked, poor color, cracked, insect or disease damage, green core. Preparation-Cut tops to 1 inch long. Roots may be washed.

Cauliflower-Merits White, not rough and grainy, crisp, solid "Jacket" leaves, fresh and with good color, free from insects. Faults-Poor color (yellowish), grainy, wilted, insect and disease damage. Preparation-Trim jacket leaves even with top of head. Some of the older leaves may be removed.

Celery-Merits-Crisp, thick, free of insect, disease or mechanical injury. Faults-Wilted, small stalks, blemishes, poor color. Preparation-Cut roots even with stock. Trim leaves uniformly. Refrigerate until ready to exhibit.

Cucumbers-Merits-Straight, dark green color, free of "warts", uniform in diameter from stem to blossom end. Faults-Oversized, yellowish color, over mature. Preparation-Leave stems-inch long on pickling cucumbers only, wipe clean. end. Faults-Oversized, yellowish color, over mature. Preparation-Leave stems-inch long on pickling cucumbers only, wipe clean. **Dill**-Merits-Good color, mature, ready to use. Faults-Immature, small size. Preparation-Cut seed heads with 10-12 inch stems. Tie near lower end of stems and again just below seed heads.

Eggplant-Merits-Firm, medium to large size, uniformly purple, small blossom scar, fresh green calyx. Faults-Too small bronze or green color, dried calyx, immature. Preparation-Use thumb pressure to determine maturity. Leave one inch of stem attached. Large to medium size.

Kohlrabi-Merits-1 to 3 inches in diameter, tender, good color, free of insect, disease and weather damage. Faults-Too large, tough, poor color, weather or pest damage. Preparation-Cut tops at base. Remove stem and root at base.

Lettuce-Head-Merits-Fresh, crisp, well-colored leaves. Head should be large and firm. Faults-Wilted, yellowed leaves, insect damage, seed stalk. Preparation-Harvest fresh or place in plastic bag and store in refrigerator until ready to exhibit. Remove older outer leaves that show yellowing.

Onions (Flat)-Merits-Straight, white stem and dark green leaves. Bulbs not enlarged. Even length. Table ready. Faults-Too small or too large, crooked, poor color, dry or discolored leaves. Preparation-Trim tops to an even length, overall length of onions exhibited 6-8 inches.

Onions (Globe)-Merits-Firm, mature, well-shaped, free from sun scald, doubles and splits. Small neck that is well dried. Free from insect, disease and mechanical damage. Heavy for size, good color. Faults-Peeled bulbs a common fault. (White under skin should not be exposed.) Immature, misshaped, double or split bulbs, large soft neck. Poor color, size and finish. Disease, insect or mechanical injury. Preparation-Remove no more than one layer of skin to clean. Best if no skin is removed. Do not cut tips so low that bulb is injured. Leave one inch long. Do not wash. Trim roots to 3/4 inch. Do not trim roots closely or bulb may be damaged.

Parsley-Bring entire plant. Wash roots & be soil free. **Parsnips**-Merits-Clean, clear color, well tapered root, free of blemishes. Medium to large size, absence of side roots or branching. Faults-Poorly colored, crooked, misshapen roots, blemished, too small. Preparation-Cut tops to 1 inch length, do not trim off lower portion to tap root.

to tap root.

Peas in Pod-Merits-Bright green, well-filled pods. Table-ready, uniform size and shape. Faults-Poorly filled pods, off color, seeds past best stage for use, blemished. Preparation-Leave calyx on (stem).

Peas-Dry shelled, Judged from the standpoint of variety, uniformity of color and size, and freedom from mixture, dirt, impurities, and defective seeds.

Peppers-Merits-Large and uniform in size, dark green color, crisp, absence of blemishes, insect disease and mechanical damage. Smooth. Faults-Badly misshapen, rough, too small, off color or wilted. Sun scald, mechanical injury, insect or disease damage. Preparation-Size is of considerable importance. Leave the stem on.

Potatoes-Merits-Firm, medium size, clean. Mature, free of insect damage or mechanical injury. Typical shape and color for variety. Faults-Mechanical injury, unusually deep eyes for variety. Poor color, sunburn, hollow heart, "skinning" of immature tubers. Preparation-Brush or wipe off with soft cloth. Can be washed but do not damage shin.

Pumpkins-Merits-Good weight for size, good clear color. Unblemished from insects and diseases. Faults-Too small, immature, stem removed. Color and shape not typical of variety. Preparation– Exhibit with 2 or 3 inches of stem attached. Pumpkins have a hard rind.

Radishes-Merits-Fresh, firm, crisp, good color, smooth and free of blemishes. Faults-Spongy, wilted, poorly colored, rough. Preparation-Leave 1 inch top. Radishes can be washed. Harvest fresh or refrigerate until ready to exhibit.

Rhubarb-Merits-Young, tender stalks, good color, free of blemishes, straight, uniform size. Faults-Tough, over mature (coarse), poorly colored stalks, lower end of stalks cut. Preparation-Pull, do not cut stalks, Trim leaves so only 2 inches of leaf blade remain attached stalk.

Rutabagas-Merits-Good color, firm, smooth, free of side roots, baseball size or larger, free of insect, diseases or mechanical injury, uniform in size and color. Faults-Poorly colored soft and spongy, too small, rough, showing insect, disease or mechanical injury. Preparation-Cut tops back one inch. Leave two inches of tap root.

Squash-Merits-Good weight for size, good clear color. Unblemished from insects and diseases. Faults-Too small, immature, stem removed. Color and shape not typical of variety. Preparation-Exhibit with 2 or 3 inches of stem attached. Summer squash should have soft rind and be in eating stage (not over 8" long).

Sweet Corn-Merits-Kernels well filled, in milk stage and in even rows. No insect or disease damage. Good color for variety. Cob not filled to tip, dried husks, insect damage. Preparation-Do not remove husk. Corn deteriorates rapidly if husk is removed. Trim silk to within one inch of tip of husk. Shank one to two inches long.

Swiss Chard-Merits-Clean, fresh, well-colored leaves. Free of insect and disease damage. Bright, tender stems, leaves 8-12 inches long. Faults-Wilted, poorly colored, insect or disease damaged leaves. Preparation-Wash and keep fresh by refrigeration. Remove root from each plant.

Tomatoes-Merits-Uniform in size and color. Ripe but not overripe, smooth and well shaped. Free from sun scald, cracking, insect and disease damage. Medium size or larger. Faults-Poor color, Sun scald, too large or small. Misshapen, insect or disease damage. Overripe which causes softness and "leaky" fruit. Unsightly scars or blossom end, cracks on stem end. Preparation-Harvest fresh or refrigerate before displaying. Remove stems to prevent stem punctures.

Green Tomatoes-Should be entirely green with no red showing and in best stage of maturity for purpose intended.

Turnips-Merits-Good color, firm, smooth, free of side roots, medium size (baseball size or smaller), free of insect, disease or mechanical injury, uniform in size and color. Faults-Poorly colored, soft and spongy, too large, rough, showing insect, disease or mechanical injury. Preparation– Cut tops back to one inch. Leave two inches of tap root.

Watermelon-Merits- In best eating stage, medium to large size . Good color, free of blemishes. Faults-Immature or overripe, poor color, misshapen, blemished. Preparation- May be washed to remove soil.



DEPARTMENT N - NEEDLEWORK

Because of constant differing opinions of who is to be considered a "Pro" or "Semi Pro" there are classes to insure a place for all who wish to exhibit and be fairly judged among their peers listed as "Professional" or "Adult."

Professional refers to work produced primarily by:

- a) Those who sell their work.
- b) Those having a diploma, certificate, degree, or three or more years of training.
- c) Those that teach or have taught that category.

Adult- (18-64) & (65 & up) refers to those who:

- a) Do not derive income directly from their work.
- b) Have had little or no formal training in it.

c) Does the work for pleasure, and is often referred to as a "hobbyist."

- An exhibitor is allowed to make only one entry in each class.
- Articles must be the work of the exhibitor.
- No premiums will be awarded for articles which have been purchased, received as gifts, borrowed, soiled, unfinished or previously exhibited.
- No articles will be offered for sale.
- Bring small articles in plastic bags.
- Pin tags on the front of the item.
- Return exhibitor tags to office for entries not exhibited.
- Judging will award prizes according to the merits of each exhibit. Absence of competition does not justify awarding a high prize to an exhibit of medium or inferior quality.

All needlework will be judged with regard to beauty, degree of perfection, amount of work, suitability for purpose for which it is intended and cleanliness. Excellence in sewing is determined in part by width and evenness in size of seams, hems, gathers, darts, pleats, and tucks. Overall appearance of work should be neat. It should be pressed or blocked, aired, bastings removed, everything finished and ready to use.
