

#### **ELIGIBILITY**

- 1. All exhibitors are required to read and abide by the Georgia National Fair General And Regulations. Rules PLEASE NOTE ... IT IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY TO READ AND UNDERSTAND THE RULES. If you have questions, may certainly vou e-mail at contests@gnfa.com. us Please help us prevent entry disqualifications.
- 2. All flower shows in this department are open to any amateur gardener in the state of Georgia. Entries must be made in the individual's name. No entry fee is required. Please check each show for rules pertaining to that show.
- 3. Youth Horticulture entries MUST STATE EXHIBITOR'S SCHOOL ON ENTRY CARD. Any entry without this information will be judged with adult entries.

#### **ENTRY REQUIREMENTS**

- 4. Exhibitors must complete an official entry form of the Georgia National Fair to be eligible for cash awards.
- 5. Special Exhibits and Design Classes of the Standard Flower Show are open to any amateur designer, but must be registered with the entries chairman.
- 6. PREREGISTRATION IN ALL SECTIONS IS ADVISED.
- 7. Only one entry per class, per exhibitor, except where class is

- subdivided according to color, variety, or kind. Duplicate entry tags will be disqualified.
- 8. Two or more persons may not exhibit the same variety from the same garden. <u>Gardens located at the same address are considered</u> the same garden.
- 9. Exhibits must be checked by Classification Committee for each show to receive an entry tag. Both entry form and tag must be properly completed by the exhibitor and tag must be attached to exhibit prior to being placed in the show. The decision of the Classification Committee is final. Exhibitors bringing more than 15 specimens must obtain entry tags in advance and should arrive two hours prior to close of entries for that show.
- 10. Except where noted in the Camellia Show rules, all flower show exhibits must have been grown by exhibitor or have been in the possession of the exhibitor for at least 90 days and be named by common and botanical names (if possible) on the entry tag. Named varieties will be given precedence over unnamed ones. Plants that are staged on a table for the protection of the plant may be elevated with a clay pot not to exceed 15".
- 11. REMOVAL No exhibit or part

of an exhibit shall be removed at any time during the Fair except by authorized personnel at designated times. Any violation of release time will result in forfeiture of all premiums earned by exhibitor and disqualification from future shows.

12. While the Georgia National Fair and participating flower societies will exercise due caution in safeguarding exhibits, they cannot assume responsibility for injury or loss. Valuables used in exhibits should be insured by the exhibitor.

13. The management reserves the right to reject any exhibit which does not meet its standards for exhibition and the Superintendent shall have the right to remove or exclude from the show at any time any exhibit, or part thereof, which is below the standards of good showmanship.

#### **AWARDS AND PREMIUMS**

14. Georgia National Fair ribbons and cash prizes may be awarded in each Class or variety where noted and a Georgia National Fair Rosette may be awarded in Sections where noted.

15. Mark C. Ford, Jr. Georgia National Sweepstakes Plaque will be awarded to the winner of the most blue ribbons in the Horticulture division of the Standard Flower Show.

16. Cash awards (premium checks) will be mailed within six weeks after the Fair is over to the address listed on the official entry form. NOTE: For premiums less than \$15, please refer to the premium section of the General Rules.

17. Please notify the fair if you have not received your premium check by December 31, 2024.

18. Checks must be cashed within 90 days of original premium issue date. Checks not cashed in a timely manner will not be replaced.

19. Consult schedules of each show for special awards offered by participating societies and organizations.

#### **GENERAL RULES**

- All exhibitors are required to read and abide by the Georgia National Fair General Rules and Regulations the Horticulture Department Rules as set forth by the Georgia National Fair (found at https://www. georgianationalfair.com/p/other/ finearts). PLEASE NOTE: IT IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY TO READ UNDERSTAND THE RULES. If you have questions, you may e-mail us at contests@gnfa.com. Please help us prevent entry disqualifications.
- 2. All divisions of the Standard Flower Show will be located in the Miller-Murphy-Howard Building at the Georgia National Fairgrounds. Exhibitors must use the NORTH or WEST Gates and follow the Flower Signs to the designated area at the Miller-Murphy-Howard Building.
- 3. This Flower Show conforms to the standards established by National Garden Clubs, Inc. (NGC) The *Handbook For Flower Shows*, 2017 edition, with revisions posted on the NGC website, is the authority for all issues not covered by the schedule, which is the Law of the Show.
- Any amateur gardener may enter in the Horticulture Division, and is encouraged to do so. The Design Division and Educational Division are open to exhibitors who are familiar with the National Garden Clubs, Inc. Principles and Elements of Design and with Design Division Policies and with flower show requirements and considerations. The Youth Division is open to any youth, preschool through eighteen years of age. Pre-registration through the Youth Chairman for youth entries from a class or club is highly recommended. Pre-registration is required through the appropriate Design Entries Chairman for the Design Division and through the Education Exhibits Chairman for the Educa-

tion Division.

- 5. Entries must be submitted via the Entries Registration Table on Thursday, October 3, 2024 from 3:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. or on Friday, October 4, 2024 from 7:30 a.m. until 9:00 a.m. at The Miller-Murphy-Howard Building (Georgia National Fairgrounds, Perry, GA). Entries must be removed after 5:00 p.m. on Sunday, October 6, 2024, but not later than 7:00 p.m. from the same building. Information concerning access for retrieval of exhibit/s should be obtained at the Entries Registration Table at the time exhibit is submitted.
- **EXTREMELY IMPORTANT: DUE** TO HOTEL CONSTRUCTION AREA. PLANTS, FLOWERS, SUPPLIES, ETC. MUST BE UNLOADED IMMEDIATELY AND VEHICLES MOVED IMMEDIATE-LY OR THEY WILL BE TOWED. If possible, bring and use a garden wagon with your name on the handle. Please cooperate and help keep the loading area clear. One GNF form per exhibitor and one NGC entry card per exhibit must accompany each flower show entry. Both the GNF form and NGC entry card are available at the Entries Registration table when exhibit is submitted. NGC entry cards are available if needed in advance from the Entries Registration Chairman.
- The NGC entry card must be filled out on both top and bottom sections. Exhibitors are requested to legibly complete entry cards using pencil or water proof ink and, if a horticulture entry, fill in the Botanical Name or Currently Accepted Scientific Identification. Entry is not considered eligible for an NGC Top Award if the correct Botanical Name or Currently Accepted Scientific Identification is not present. Genus and species are underlined when handwritten and italicized when mechanically printed. For the individual's name, computer-generated address labels may be used if waterproof (must match your official entry form).

- 9. The Classification Chairmen for each division checks exhibits for conformity to the schedule prior to judging. Final determination for conformance is the judges' responsibility. Any Horticulture entry that does not meet its class requirements or is not of show quality will be disqualified
- 10. Judging will begin at 10:00 a.m., Friday, October 4, 2024. The General Chairman and the Classification Chairman for each Division are available during judging for possible consultations. They along with the judges and clerks, are the only personnel allowed on the floor during judging. The Photographer may take photos before and after judging, but not during judging.
- 11. The use of any part of plants on the State Conservation List is strictly prohibited. The State Conservation List is located at the end of the schedule, or at https://www.georgianationalfair.com/p/other/finearts.
- 12. There must be an emphasis on fresh plant material; no artificial plant material is permitted in any exhibit in any Division.

  13. The American flag and other national flags must be displayed in a respectful manner. American and other national flags may not be incorporated into any competitive designs and may not be used as underlays, swags, or the like.
- 14. All personal property should be clearly labeled. The Show Committee, Camellia District and Magnolia District, as well as the Georgia National Fair, will strive to assure the safety of all items after arrival and placement, but they are not responsible for any loss or damage to exhibits.
- 15. Each exhibitor is limited to one entry per class except in the Horticulture Division. An exhibitor can have more than one entry in horticulture when classes are subdivided and the additional entry/entries is/are entered into separate subclasses. If each is a different species, variety, cultivar, type, or color *Handbook For Flower Shows, p 25.*
- 16. The National Garden Clubs, Inc.

- Standard System of Awarding will be used for all competitive judging. Only one first place (blue dot) per class or sub-class (must score 90 or above), only one second place (red dot) per class or sub-class (must score 85 or above), only one third place (yellow dot) per class or sub-class (must score 80 or above), and one or more honorable mention (white dot) as merited (must score 75 or above) may be placed at the discretion of the judges. Decisions of the judges is final. Awards may be withheld if not merited. 17. Judges are requested to review the red, yellow, and white winning exhibits in all divisions to determine if any of them scored 90 or above (90+). An Accredited Judge must sign and date all blue dot entry cards (tags), 90+ entry cards (tags) and NGC Top Exhibitor Award Rosettes. Judges are requested to leave written comments on exhibits in Division II, Design, Division III, Education, and Division IV, Youth.
- 18. Each exhibit to be judged and to be considered for NGC Top Awards must be the work of one individual. Designs and/ or Educational Exhibits must not have been exhibited in previous flower shows or any other venue for judging and point scoring by the NGC Standard System of Awarding.
- 19. The Flower Show opens to the public beginning on Friday, October 4, 2024 at 1:00 p.m. and closes Sunday, October 6, 2024 at 5:00 p.m. During those times the Show may be seen when the Georgia National Fair is open. Access will require a Fair entry ticket.
- 20. Georgia National Fair premiums will be paid based on punched cards (tags) turned in by the Show Committee. NOTE:

  Due to increased administrative costs, exhibitors who place and earn less than \$15 in total premiums will receive a ribbon, but will not be issued a check.

#### **Georgia National Fair Horticulture Awards**

The Mark C. Ford, Jr. Georgia National Fair Horticulture Sweepstakes Plaque will be awarded to the winner of the most blue ribbons in Horticulture, Division I.

#### National Garden Clubs, Inc., Awards

The National Garden Club (NGC) Standard System of Awarding is used in all divisions as follows:

Only one (1) first-place (blue) dot per class or sub-class; must score 90 points or more.

Only one (1) second-place (red) dot per class or sub-class; must score 85 points or more.

Only one (1) third-place (yellow) dot per class or sub-class; must score 80 points or more.

One (1) or more honorable mention (white) dots are merited; must score 75 points or more.

In a Standard Flower Show, a minimum of 5 classes and 20 exhibits is required. To be considered for any of the NGC Top Awards in Horticulture, each exhibit must be correctly identified by its binomial name or its currently accepted scientific identification and must be the highest scoring 95+ blue ribbon winner. To be eligible for an NGC Top Exhibitor Award in the Youth Division, an exhibit must have been the highest scoring blue ribbon winning exhibit scoring 90 or above in each age category.

#### **Horticulture Division I**

**Award of Horticultural Excellence**, one is offered to the highest scoring blue ribbon/ dot winner and correctly named exhibit in the entire Horticulture Division. It is also available to all first place blue ribbons scoring 95 or above not in sections designated for a Section Top Exhibitor Award. It is a rosette of green, orange, and blue ribbons (*Handbook For Flower Shows*, p 40).

**Arboreal Award**, rosette of green ribbons in two shades, may be given to the highest scoring correctly named shrub and tree exhibit scoring 95 or above in Division I. Two may be awarded, one in each of the following sections (*Handbook For Flower Shows*, p 40).

Division I, Section I, Classes 63-79 Shrubs Division I, Section J, Classes 80-93 Trees **Award of Merit**, rosette of orange ribbons in two shades, may be given to the highest scoring correctly named cut non-arboreal exhibit scoring 95 or above in Division I (*Handbook For Flower Shows*, p 41). Five may be awarded, one in each of the following sections:

Division I, Section A, Classes 1-6 Annuals and Biennials

Division I, Section B, Classes 7-17 Flowering Perennials

Division I, Section C, Classes 18-28 Rosa

Division I, Section D, Classes 29-34 Bulbs, Corms, Rhizomes and Tubers (flowering)

Division I, Section O, Classes 115-126 Legumes and Vegetables

**Collectors Showcase Award**, rosette of brown and green ribbons, may be given to the highest scoring correctly named exhibit scoring 95 or above in each section of Division I listed below (*Handbook For Flower Shows*, p 41). Two may be awarded, one in each of the following sections:

Division I, Section K, Classes 94-98 Collections

Division I, Section L, Classes 99-103 Displays

**Grower's Choice Award**, rosette of dark green ribbons in two shades, may be given to the highest scoring correctly named exhibit, scoring 95 or above in each section of Division I listed below (*Handbook For Flower Shows*, p 41). Three may be awarded, one in each of the following sections:

Division I, Section P, Classes 127-132 Flowering Container-Grown Plants

Division I, Section Q, Classes 133-148 Foliage Container-Grown Plants

Division I, Section S, Classes 158-160 Combination Planting

#### **Design Division II**

**Award of Design Excellence**, a rosette of gold ribbons, one is offered to the highest scoring blue ribbon/dot winner in the entire Design Division (*Handbook For Flower Shows*, p 42). A Standard Flower Show must include a minimum of 5 classes with 4 exhibits per class.

**Tricolor Award,** rosette of red, blue and yellow ribbons, may be given to the highest scoring exhibit, scoring 95 or above in Division II, Section A, Classes 1, 2 and 3, with 4 exhibits in each class. Each exhibit must contain only fresh plant material. (*Handbook For Flower Shows*, p 43)

**Table Artistry Award**, a rosette of burgundy ribbons, may be given to the highest scoring exhibit, scoring 95 or above in Division II, Section B, Classes 4, 5 and 6, with four designs in each class (*Handbook For Flower Shows*, p 43).

**Designer's Choice Award**, rosette of purple ribbons, may be given to the highest scoring exhibit, scoring 95 or above in Division II, Section C, Classes 7, 8 and 9, with four designs in each class. Plant material used in the exhibit may be dried, and/or fresh (*Handbook For Flower Shows*, p 42).

#### **Education Division III**

**Educational Top Award,** rosette of brown & white ribbons, may be given to the highest scoring exhibit scoring 95 or above in Division III, Education, Section A, Class 1, Exhibits 1, 2, and 3, may be the work of an individual or organization. One per show may be awarded. A minimum of two educational exhibits designated as eligible must be present (*Handbook For Flower Shows*, pp 43-44).

#### Youth Division IV

**Youth Top Exhibitor Award,** rosette of red, white and blue ribbons, one may be given to the highest scoring exhibit scoring 90 or above. A total of 9 Top Youth Awards may be awarded: One award may be placed in each age group in each of the three sections. (*Handbook For Flower Shows*, p 44).

#### **Division I - Horticulture Rules**

- 1. The Horticulture Division is open to any amateur gardener. Entries must be made in individual's name. Read the General Rules of this schedule which govern this competition. The NGC exhibit policies are printed in the *Handbook for Flower Shows*, Chapter 6, Exhibiting in the Horticulture Division.
- Entries will be accepted from 3:00 PM until 7:00 PM on Thursday, October 3, 2024, and 7:30 AM until 9:00 AM on Friday, October 4, 2024, at the Miller-Murphy-Howard Building. NO ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER 9:00 AM ON FRIDAY, OCTOBER 4, 2024. Entries may be brought through the North or West gates; follow the flower show signs to the designated unloading area at the Miller-Murphy-Howard Building. **EXTREMELY HOTEL** IMPORTANT: DUE TO CONSTRUCTION AREA, PLANTS. FLOWERS, SUPPLIES, ETC. MUST BE UNLOADED IMMEDIATELY AND VEHICLES MOVED IMMEDIATELY OR THEY WILL BE TOWED.
- 3. Exhibit release begins at 5:00 PM (not before), and ends at 7:00 PM on Sunday, October 6, 2024. The Show Committee will not be responsible for property left after that time. Exhibits removed early will result in forfeit of any winnings, and disqualification from future shows.
- Exhibitors are limited to a maximum of 50 entries in Division I. Horticulture, which includes cut, container-grown, and fruit/ vegetable specimens. NO MORE THAN CONTAINER-GROWN **PLANTS** WILL BE ACCEPTED FROM ANY ONE **EXHIBITOR**. Exhibitors bringing more than 15 total specimens must obtain entry cards in advance from the Registration Entries Chairman and should arrive on Thursday, October 3, 2024 from 3:00 PM to 7:00 PM. Each entry submitted must be one cut specimen or one plant per container except for self-multiplying and other multiple container-grown plants.
- 5. An NGC entry card (tag) must accompany each entry. Each entry tag/card (both portions) must be completely

- filled out by the exhibitor with water-proof ink, labels or by pencil before being passed by the Classification Committee. GNF entry forms and NGC entry cards may be obtained when exhibits are submitted at the Entries Registration Table or NGC entry cards may be obtained in advance from the Entries Registration Chairman. Exhibitors will forfeit prize money if both portions of card and GNF entry form are not completely filled out. All exhibitors are encouraged to secure cards (tags) from the Entries Registration Chairman well in advance of the show date. (Handbook For Flower Shows, Chapter 6). The name and address on the entry card must match the name on the GNF entry form.
- 6. An exhibitor may make more than one entry in any one class or subclass provided each entry is of a different cultivar, color, or type, unless otherwise specified in a particular class. The entry card must specify the difference on the top and bottom of the card. The entries must be clean, well-groomed and of show quality.
- 7. ΑII specimens, whether cut or container-grown, MUST be fresh plant material grown by the exhibitor. Cut annuals, biennials, and perennials must have been in the exhibitor's possession from seeds, cuttings, or immature plants and grown to maturity. Bulbous blooms must have been in exhibitor's possession from planting of bulb, tuber, corm, or rhizome, or it must have been cared for as a mature plant for at least 90 days. Container-grown plants must have been in the possession of the exhibitor for not less than 90 days. Exception: multiple plantings must have been grown together by the exhibitor for a minimum of six weeks.
- 8. Specimens with a class designation in the schedule may not be entered in the "Any Other Worthy" class.
- All entries must have been checked by the Classification Committee. THE COMMITTEE MAY RE-LABEL ANY

# INCORRECTLY LABELED ENTRY AND DISQUALIFY ANY SPECIMEN THAT IS NOT OF SHOW QUALITY, OR DOES NOT MEET CLASS REQUIREMENT/S.

- 10. Exhibiting plants that are on the State Conservation List is prohibited. A list of protected species is available at the end of this schedule. Native plants other than those on the State List can be exhibited in the Horticulture Division provided they are grown by the exhibitor.
- 11. Each horticulture specimen must be identified with its binomial name or its currently accepted scientific identification. Only those specimens correctly named will be eligible for NGC National Top Awards. Include variety or cultivar when possible. The common name may be added and placed in parentheses. Trademarked or registered trademarked names are a legal entity that may or may not be the actual cultivar name. Trademarked names are acceptable in an NGC Standard Flower Show in place of a cultivar name. Trademarked names are not enclosed in single quotes (consult Handbook For Flower Shows, "Exhibiting in the Horticulture Division". Chapter 6).
- 12. The Horticulture Classification Committee Chairman and/or the General Show Chairman are free to subdivid classes by color, form, size, cultivar, variety, or other distinguishing characteristics. There must be 3 or more exhibits of botanically identical, or similar in form, color, size or description to justify forming a subclass, with the exception of petite horticulture specimens that are never in competition with standard-sized specimens but are subdivided into their own class or subclass (Handbook For Flower Shows, p.3).
- 13. Cut horticulture specimens will be exhibited in clear glass bottles furnished by the Show Committee. Fruits/nuts/vegetables will be exhibited in baskets furnished by the Show Committee.
- 14. If a plant is considered a flowering plant, it should be exhibited as a flowering specimen. Foliage plants may flower, but should be exhibited as foliage plant if they are grown for their leaves.
- 15. Plant material may not be altered by the application (treatment) of oil,

- commercial "shine" product, dye, etc., that may artificially change the natural color or texture. No wiring is allowed for single specimens (exception, trained plants).
- 16. Cut specimens should not have any foliage below the water line, (except for Gladiolus).
- 17. Arboreal specimens must be no more than 30" from the tip of the specimen to the cut end. Each branch must be at least 12" long, include several nodes (see specific section requirement) and have an apical tip. Dwarf/miniature specimens can be no shorter than 6" and must contain at least two nodes and have an apical tip.
- 18. Cut specimens of *Hedera helix* (English ivy) and vines should be no longer than 24" and must have an apical bud or new growth.
- 19. Containers for container-grown plants may not exceed 14" in diameter and should be in proportion to the plant size. A saucer underneath is required. 20. Double potting is permitted; however, inner pot must not be visible.
- 21. Cut horticulture specimens may be wedged with a small piece of green Styrofoam or celery furnished by the exhibitor.
- 22. Only members of the Horticulture Placement Committee are eligible to place entries, with the exception of collections which are placed by exhibitor.
- 23. Reservations for exhibiting large specimens must be made in advance with Show Co-Chairman by October 1, 2024, in order to assure space for each exhibit. This includes container-grown, collections, and displays entries.
- 24. Judges are eligible to enter in Horticulture Division, except those Sections that they are judging.
- 25. Judges are requested to review the red, yellow, and white winning exhibits to determine if any of them scored 90 or above and to so indicate on the entry card. AN ACCREDITED JUDGE ON THE JUDGING PANEL IS REQUESTED TO SIGN AND DATE ALL BLUE AND 90+ ENTRY CARDS (TAGS) AND TOP AWARD ROSETTES.
- 26. The Scales of Points for Horticulture are located in Chapter 14 of the *Handbook For Flower Shows*.

Eligible for Award of Merit

Cut Specimens, Flowering, One Stem

#### Class

#### **Division II - Design Rules**

- 1 The NGC exhibit policies are printed in the *Handbook for Flower Shows, Chapter 7*, exhibiting in the design division.
- The exhibitor is required to conform to the stated descriptions and limitations of the design type if named in the class.
- 3. The exhibit entered into competition must be the work of one exhibitor whose name must appear on the entry card.
- 4. If the exhibitor is unable to place a design, it is the designer's responsibility to find a substitute and to notify the Design Entries Chairman. All four designs must be present in a class for the class to be judged.
- 5. If the designer is unable to transport the completed design on the day assigned for submission, someone else may bring the exhibit for the designer and enter it in the designer's name.
- 6. A single flower is not a design. Container-grown plants are not considered a design.
- 7. Landscapes, scenes, or anything representing an actual item of clothing, person, animal, etc., are not considered acceptable in the Design Division.
- 8. Religious symbols used in a design must be displayed in a respectful manner.
- 9. All Plant material used in the design must be identified on a white 3"x 5" index card provided by the exhibitor and included with the entry card.
- 10. Plant material used in the design does not have to be grown by the exhibitor.
- 11. Plant material and non-plant material permitted and not permitted in the Design Division are printed in the *Handbook for Flower Shows, Chapter 7, p 80.*
- 12. The following are NOT permitted in the design division:
- a. Plants on the State Conservation List which may be found at the end of this schedule.
- b. Painting, flocking, glittering, or dyeing fresh plant material in any manner. (All other embellishments of fresh plant material are permitted.)
- c. Artificial flowers, foliage, fruits, and vegetables. (Artificial is defined as an imitation or copy handcrafted or manufactured to represent and/or appear as real plant material.)

- d. Silk, plastic or other imitation plant material.
- e. Manufactured items simulating plant material. (Examples - singing/ speaking flowers, motorized flowers, and metallic flowers and foliage, fountains featuring metal cattails and/or waterlilies.)
- 13. Non-plant material permitted in the design division:
- a. Accessories (a subordinate object) and featured objects (an object that is dominant in the design).
- b. Dinnerware inspired in design by the form of a plant (flower, fruit, leaf, vegetable, etc.) created not to replace the actual plant material, but to serve as an interesting piece of dinnerware. (Cabbage-shaped tureen, apple-shaped luncheon plate, floral-motif napkin ring). A traditional container with a three-dimensional motif is essentially a container.
