PASSES FOR 4-H AND FFA MEMBERS AND LEADERS AND/OR ADVISORS.

Only enrolled 4-H Club Leaders and FFA Chapter Advisors will be permitted to purchase passes for their enrolled members and leaders/advisors. Those persons not enrolled as members or leaders/advisors but needed by the club/chapter may be eligible to purchase a Season Worker Pass for \$11.00. Forms for 4-H/FFA passes will be provided to all 4-H clubs and FFA chapters. 4-H parents, guardians, or other adults assisting the 4-H members may be eligible to purchase either Daily Worker/Parent Passes for \$4.00/pass or Season Worker/Parent Passes for \$11.00/pass. THERE WILL BE A LIMIT OF 2 SEASON WORKER/PARENT PASSES PER ENROLLED MEMBER, OR IF PURCHASING DAILY WORKER/PARENT PASSES IN LUE OF SEASON PASSES, A LIMIT OF TWO PASSES PER DAY WILL BE ALLOWED. Worker/Parent Passes are not intended for general use by the public, relatives, or other fair attendees; they are for the responsible adult escorting an enrolled member only. The Fairgrounds Management reserves the right to limit passes sold, and to determine qualifying criteria. Misuse or misrepresentation of qualifying criteria for the purchase of discounted Exhibitor and Worker/Parent Passes may result in denial of entry, revocation/no issuance of passes, and/or ineligibility for future passes to be purchased. The deadline for groups purchasing passes is July 14, 2023. The Fairgrounds Management reserves the right to limit the number of discount passes sold, and to determine eligibility criteria for discount passes.

ALL PASSES MUST BE PURCHASED PRIOR TO THE OPENING OF THE FAIR. <u>Absolutely no passes will be sold after 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, August 1, 2023.</u>

PARKING: No parking will be allowed in areas other than designated parking lots. Overnight parking will be allowed only in designated areas. All trailers, including livestock and horse trailers, are to park in assigned areas only. **Exhibitor's trailers left in the general parking lot may forfeit their premium points.** Vehicles parked in undesignated places may be towed at owner's expense.

DELIVERIES: Deliveries should come through the Service Gate located on Fairgrounds Road. The fairgrounds will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. for delivery inside the grounds. All vehicles must be removed by 9:30 a.m. If a delivery must be made after 10:00 a.m. vehicles will stop at the Service Gate and make arrangements to move supplies onto the fairgrounds.

CASH MACHINE: There are two cash on the grounds, one is located in the Pavilion and one is located at the Front Ticket Booth, for the duration of the fair.

CHECK CASHING: The fair office and machines information booth will not cash checks. Commercial banks are located within one mile of the fairgrounds.

CONCERT SHOW ADMISSION: Concerts are free with fair admission.

Limited reserved Golden Circle Seating, which are the first fifteen rows, are available at a cost for some major concerts.

OFFICIAL RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE GRAYS HARBOR COUNTY FAIR 2023 (applicable to all departments)

- 1. The general supervision of the entire Fair, including all exhibits, entertainment, and concessions has been vested in the Officers and Directors of the Fair Board. "FAIR" includes members of the Fair Board, Manager, and employees of the Fair Department and Grays Harbor County. Additional or special requirements may be written into any exhibitor's or concessionaire's contract with the Fair. The management reserves the final and absolute right to alter, interpret, or change these rules and regulations as may become necessary and to determine all matters, questions, and differences that may arise incidental to the fair.
- 2.Each exhibitor is responsible for damage or personal injury caused by his/her animal.
- 3.Entries will be accepted on a space available basis with preference given to: #1 County Residents; #2 Adjoining County Residents; and #3 Other Areas.
- 4.No animal shall be withdrawn from the Fair before 10:30 p.m. Saturday, closing day of the fair, except by written permission of the Manager.
- 5. First place will be designated by blue tags or ribbons, second place by red tags or ribbons, and third place by white tags or ribbons.
- 6.Every animal or article must be entered in the name of the owners, maker, or grower whose name must be endorsed on the entry card that will specify the section and class, and such card will be attached to the article or pen. Anyone trying to deceive the fair in regard to ownership, manufacture, or production, shall forfeit all claims as an exhibitor. Only one article may be entered by an individual in any one class, except as otherwise specified under department rules.
- 7.Under no circumstances will any person or firm be allowed to place any advertising matter upon buildings or trees, or any place in the Fairgrounds, either during the fair or at any time before commencement of the fair, outside of the space assigned to them.
- 8.No person shall be allowed to sell or give away articles upon the Fairgrounds, either during the fair or at any time before commencement of the fair, outside of the space assigned to them, and not until the license for the privilege has been paid and a receipt therefore issued. This includes balloons and other novelties for which the fair contracts sale privileges.
- 9. The initial bedding for animals will be provided by the fair. Any additional bedding, after the initial bedding, is the responsibility of the exhibitor. Animal exhibitors are required to clean their stall space immediately following the closing of the fair.

- 10.In the livestock departments, all exhibits must be clean, the stall constantly kept clean, and no trash or supplies of any kind will be permitted to accumulate in or about the stalls. FFA and 4-H members showing livestock at the fair must house their stock in the area designated for their own group. A small attractive sign may be placed on the wall behind the stock indicating the owner, breed, or production. All livestock must be kept unblanketed from 10:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. each day of the fair, except on the day of judging until judging is completed. An exception may be made by the Department Superintendent for animals under a veterinarian's care.
- 11. Any animal that is unruly and considered a danger to the public may be removed at the discretion of the Fair Board Livestock Committee.
- 12. The management has the final decision on the location and display of exhibits. Any recommendations will be given complete review and consideration.
- 13.All concession space will be sold by the management and application must be made in writing. Under no circumstances will anyone be permitted to operate a concession without a signed contract.
- 14.Under no circumstances will articles that are offensive by reason of their explosive or combustible character be accepted or admitted, and if any such item is allowed admission through misrepresentation or acceptance, or otherwise, they may be removed by order of the Manager. No monstrosities will be allowed, nor begging or soliciting for private charity.
- 15. The Fair Board reserves the right to bar any exhibitor from exhibiting an entry, and upon such action, or in the event of any entry being disqualified from winning a prize by the decision of the committee, such decision shall be final and binding upon the exhibitor.
- 16.Exhibitor must provide for the delivery of their articles upon the exhibition ground. The fair will not, in any case, make provisions for their transportation or be subjected to any expense thereof either on their delivery or return from the fairgrounds. All expenses connected therewith must be provided for by the exhibitors themselves, and all freight, express, and carriage must be prepaid.
- 17.All exhibitors shall guard their exhibits and protect public for coming in contact therewith and every such exhibitor shall indemnify the fair from such claims, demands, costs, damages, charges, and expenses which it may occur, suffer to be put to, by reason of any accident, or of any such exhibit not being properly guarded or the public not being protected or failure to use reasonable care in any act or omission by exhibitor.

18.Use of intoxicants, narcotics, illegal drugs (except drugs used in strict compliance with a doctor's prescription), vulgarity, dishonesty, misrepresentation, and other undesirable behavior by anyone attending, producing, representing, chaperoning, acting in guardianship of, or profiting from a concession or exhibit will result in immediate closure of the concession and removal of exhibit in such violation.

19. No pets or other animals, except those on exhibit or assisting a physically impaired person, are allowed on the fairgrounds during the fair.

20. The fair will take reasonable precautions to insure the safety of exhibits but the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting them, and should any exhibit or portion thereof be injured, burned, lost, or stolen, the fair will give assistance toward recovery of same, but will not be liable or make payment for the value thereof. Small or valuable articles should be exhibited in showcases which may be securely locked.

21. The exhibitor must remove his exhibit by 3:00 p.m. on Sunday following closing of the fair. Any article or equipment left in a building or on the grounds after this date will be at the risk of the owner, and will become the property of the fair after three days.

22.Exhibitors must supply their own tools for the set up of their exhibit or display. The fair will not loan any tools.

23.NO PERSON SHALL INCUR ANY OBLIGATION WHATSOEVER AGAINST THE FAIR WITHOUT FIRST OBTAINING A REQUISITION FROM THE MANAGER. ANY PERSON CONTRACTING ANY OBLIGATION AGAINST THE FAIR WITHOUT FIRST OBTAINING A REQUISITION FROM THE MANAGER WILL BE HELD PERSONALLY LIABLE FOR SAME.

24. There will be no moving of cars or trucks upon the fairgrounds between the hours of 9:30 a.m. and 10:00 p.m. This will be strictly enforced.

25.4-H and FFA members who camp on the fairgrounds must be accompanied by either their advisor, parent, or leader, before the fair will grant permission for their overnight stay on the fairgrounds. Members will be assigned sleeping quarters by the Manager. Curfew time is 11:00 p.m. Anyone disobeying these rules will be sent home and premium money forfeited. Please refer to specific camping rules.

26.All large displays, such as tractors, trailers, etc., must be in place 48 hours prior to the fair opening, except where the manager permits later entry.

ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

The fair will have an official veterinarian on call. The fair office will call the veterinarian in case of emergencies or in special situations. Service call charges are the responsibility of the exhibitor.

All sheep and goats, except castrated male goats, must have official USDA National Scrapie Eradication assigned flock identification.

Individual health certificates for Washington animals are not required for entry into the fair. The fair veterinarian may issue a blanket health certificate covering all in-state entries to the fair.

No animal from a quarantined area or premises may be permitted to enter the fair or show.

All out-of-state animal entries must comply with State of Washington import requirements. No exceptions unless exempted by rule. Please call the fair office for more information on out-of-state animal entries.

Fair veterinarians will inspect all classes of livestock and poultry (including horses, pet animals, rabbits, fur-bearing animals, pigeons, ducks, geese, and turkeys) before they are exhibited to determine that the livestock and poultry show no clinical indications of contagious, infectious diseases and or ectoparasites.

Fair veterinarians will reject any animal with infectious or contagious diseases or ectoparasites. Exhibitors should be aware that ringworm, warts, pinkeye, strangles, contagious ecthyma, scabies, lice, mites, ticks, and fleas fall into these categories.

Animals exhibiting disease symptoms during the course of the fair will be rejected by the fair veterinarian and removed from the exhibit area to a quarantined area at the fairgrounds. The Fair Veterinarian will then make the determination whether or not to send the animal home.

It is strongly recommended, but not required, that cattle be vaccinated in the current show year against respiratory diseases.

The fair veterinarian's professional decision as to the health status of an animal is final and will be upheld by the fair board.

EXHIBIT/DISPLAY POLICY

The Grays Harbor County Fair wishes to promote a wholesome and educational event for the entire family. All exhibits and displays (4-H, FFA, Open Class, and Commercial) are subject to review by the Grays Harbor County Fair Board and Staff. Any items or material that are deemed inappropriate for display must be removed by the exhibitor upon the request of Fair Management and or Fair Board Committee. The following list of items are included but not limited to:

- o weapons (death stars, butterfly knives, etc.)
- sexually explicit or pornographic materials (As defined by Fair Management or Fair Board Committee).
- o vulgar or profane materials
- o drug paraphernalia

Exhibits and displays are meant to be enjoyed by all fairgoers. Please help us make the Grays Harbor County Fair a pleasant experience for people of all ages.

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DEPARTMENT A DAIRY (OPEN CLASS)

1. A stall fee of \$5.00 per animal will be charged on all entries in this department. Fees must accompany entry forms. Address entries to:

- 2. Entries will not be accepted after July 18th. All substitutions must be made by that date.
- 3. Entry form must include name of animal, breed, age, and classes in which they are entered.
- 4. All animals must be in the barn by 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, prior to opening day. Animals must remain in place until Fair Closure, or other arrangements are made, subject to special permission by the Fair Manager and the Department Superintendent.
- 5. Because of limited barn space, those entries received first will receive the first available barn space. The fair reserves the right to limit the number of animals per exhibitor.
- 6. Cattle entered in this department must be accompanied by registration papers.
- 7. 4-H and FFA exhibitors will be allowed to enter their purebred animals in open classes and will be entitled to premium moneys. Appropriate stall fees must be paid by all exhibitors in open classes. All 4-H and FFA exhibitors must participate in fitting and showing.
- 8. No exhibitor may receive more than two premium payments in any one class.
- 9. Exhibitors are required to perform herdsmanship duties. Exhibitors will be responsible for the entire care of their animals.
- 10. All animals must be kept unblanketed from 10:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m. each day of the fair, except on the show day when animals may be blanketed until showing is completed.
- 11. All animals on display at the Grays Harbor County Fair must be entered into competition, except with special permission of the Fair Board

Livestock Committee and Department Superintendent.

- 12. In order to make the show run smoothly, classes will not be held an unreasonable length of time for late entries. The judge may exclude these animals from the judging ring.
- 13. Feed and supplies may be delivered to the barn before 9:00 a.m. and after 10:00 p.m. There will be no moving vehicles on the fairgrounds at any other times.
- 14. All ribbons and awards won must be put on display.
- 15. For health requirements and official rules and regulations, please refer to general rules.
- 16. Beef and Dairy Mileage and Multiple Animal Incentives: Any Exhibitor in the Beef or Dairy Departments who transport their animals a distance of greater than 50 miles will be paid a Mileage Incentive of \$50. Any Exhibitor in the Beef or Dairy Depts. who transport their animals for a distance of over 150 miles will be paid a Mileage Incentive of \$100. In addition, any exhibitor in the Beef or Dairy Departments who bring more than three (3) Beef or Dairy Animals to the fair for all four (4) days of the fair will be paid a Multiple Animal Incentive of \$50.

Premium Awards:

1st - 160 points 2nd - 120 points 3rd - 80 points



1. A stall fee of \$5.00 per animal will be charged on all entries in this department. Fees must accompany entry forms. Address entries to:

Grays Harbor County Fair PO Box 1229, Elma WA 98541

- 2. Entries are due July 18th. All substitutions must be made by that date. Late entries may be accepted with Beef Superintendent and Fair Committee approval.
- 3. Entry form must include Name of Animal, Breed, Date of Birth, Registration Number, and Classes in which they are entered. (This MUST be legible.)
- 4. All animals must be in the barn by 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, prior to opening day. Animals must remain in place until fair closure on Sunday unless other arrangements are made, subject to SPECIAL PERMISSION by the Fair Manager and the Department Superintendent.
- 5. Because of limited barn space, those entries received first will receive the first available stall space. The fair reserves the right to limit the number of animals per exhibitor.
- 6. Cattle entered in this department <u>MUST</u> be accompanied by registration papers.
- 7. 4-H and FFA exhibitors will be allowed to enter their registered animals in open classes, and will be entitled to premium moneys. Appropriate stall fees must be paid by all exhibitors.
- 8. No exhibitor may receive more than two premium payments in any one class.
- 9. Exhibitors are required to perform herdsmanship duties. Exhibitors will be responsible for the entire care of their animals.
- 10. All animals on display at the Grays Harbor County Fair must be entered in their correct Section

and Class AND WILL BE subject to a Veterinary Inspection.



- 11. In order to make the show run smoothly, classes will not be held an unreasonable length of time for late entries. The judge may excuse and/or exclude these animals from the judging ring.
- 12. Feed and supplies may be delivered to the barn before 9:00 a.m. There will be no moving vehicles on the fairgrounds at any other times.
- 13. All ribbons and awards won must be put on display.
- 14. For health requirements and official rules and regulations, please refer to general rules.
- 15. Any bull over nine months of age must have a permanent or removable ring in his nose.
- 16. Steers entered in Open Class must be a recognized beef breed. (No dairy crosses will be allowed.) Steers exhibited in Open Class will not be offered in the Youth Livestock Auction.
- 17. *Mileage and Multiple Animal Incentives*: Any Open Class Beef Exhibitor who transports their animals a distance greater than 50 miles will be paid a Mileage Incentive of \$50.00. Any distance over 150 miles will be paid a mileage incentive of \$100. In addition, any Open Class Beef Exhibitor who brings more than three (3) animals to the fair for all four (4) days of the fair will be paid a Multiple Animal Incentive of \$50.00

- 6. 4-H and FFA exhibitors will be allowed to enter their purebred animals in open classes, and will be entitled to premium moneys. Appropriate stall fees must be paid by all exhibitors in open classes. All 4-H and FFA exhibitors must participate in fitting and showing.



2023 - RABBITS WILL NEED TO MEET VACCINATION REQUIREMENTS FOR RABBIT HEMORRHAGIC DISEASE (RHD) OUTLINED BY THE GHC FAIR VETERINARIAN, UNLESS PARTICIPATING IN GHLYA MARKET CLASSES.

- 1. This section is open to all youth ages 4-18
- 2. Rabbits are exhibited in wire cages provided by the fair.
- 3. Entries are subject to space available.
- 4. No decoration bigger than a 5 X 7 card on cages. Please keep everything contained to the 5 X 7 card.
- 5. No balloons, streamers, or glitter. This will be done after showing and judging.
- 6. Be mindful of all decorations due to the safety of all animals.
- 7. Transportation cages shall be removed from the fairgrounds between the time of entry and the time of removal of exhibits.
- 8. Rabbits may be rejected by the superintendent and/or yet because of insects or disease.
- 9. All rabbits must have legible tattoo in left ear. All cavies must have ear tag in left ear.
- 10. All rabbit & cavy project exhibitors must enter fitting and showmanship and the judging contests.
- 11. Exhibitors must use their own animals to enter the fitting and showmanship class, except by ruling of the superintendent.
- 12. Exhibitors are responsible for carrying their animals to the judging table or the animal will be disqualified.
- 13. Feed and water will be provided by the fair.

- 14. Containers will be provided for the rabbits, but cavy exhibitors should bring their own containers. No other material will be allowed in cages.
- 15. A rabbit may be entered in Type or Meat, but not both. A rabbit entered in Type or Meat may also be entered in Fur. *Please make all Fur entries in red ink.*
- 16. Exhibitors may enter more than one entry per class, except for the cross breed or altered classes where only one entry is allowed.
 - Entry fees shall be \$1.00 per entry.
- 17. All judging will follow ARBA standards, except for class 20 or 21, which will be judged on the general condition of the animal.
- 18. All exhibitors will be required to perform barn duty.
- 19. Check with the superintendent for days and time.
- 20. Rabbits injured after being checked in by the superintendent will not be disqualified for that year, but cannot be exhibited again.

The exhibitors will be awarded premiums and ribbons for providing education, demonstrations and information. Animals of the World is an educational exhibit therefore animals are not judged.

Premium Awards:

- Large Animals on exhibit during the entire fair will receive \$40.00 per animal, limited to 3 animals of the same species.
- Medium Animals on exhibit during the entire fair will receive \$30.00 per animal, limited to 3 animals of the same species.
- Small Animals on exhibit during the entire fair will receive \$20.00 per animal, limited to 3 animals of the same species.

All entries are due to the Grays Harbor Agriculture Building on Tuesday, August 1st, before the Fair, from 2 p.m. to 7 p.m. All entries and ribbons will be released on Sunday, August 6th, 2023, following the closing day of the Fair.

All useable produce remaining after 7:00 p.m. will be donated to a local food bank.

Arrangements for picking up hay bales, wheelbarrows, container edible plants, and other large display items must be pre-arranged with the Superintendent prior to Sunday, August 6th, 2023

- 1. Entries must be grown by exhibitor.
- 2 Exhibits will be judged according to blue, red, & white standards.
- 3. Threshed seeds shall be exhibited in pint jars.
- 4. Vegetables and fruits shall be exhibited on plates furnished by the fair.
- 5. Judging Factors: Type, quality, and uniformity are basic conditions that are used in judging. Type refers to specimens that are regular and typical of the variety. Quality includes primness for intended use: size, tenderness, cleanliness, and freedom from blemishes, damage, or defects. Uniformity relates to each specimen having the same shape, size, and colors as the others in the exhibit.
- 6. Multiple varieties may be entered in each class if they are different varieties and the variety is stated on the entry tag.
- 7. Exhibitor shall bring the correct number of exhibits as listed in each class.
- 8. No exhibits will be allowed that contain WSDA Prohibited/ Quarantined Plants and Washington State Noxious Weeds. Plant lists can be obtained from the Grays Harbor County Noxious Weed Control Board.

- 1. PREPARATION OF CUT FLOWERS: All entries in floral classes should be planned several days before the show, as all flowers need care after cutting to improve their staying qualities.
- 2. CUTTING AND CONDITIONING: Specimens should be cut in the early morning or evening at a long slant, a bit longer than needed and placed in a container of tepid water immediately, then store in a cool dark place free of drafts. To prevent evaporation, cover with plastic. The flowers should stand in deep water for several hours or overnight.
- 3. FOLIAGE: Cut flowers are shown with foliage attached to the stem. No accessory foliage is permitted. Any surplus foliage should be removed. No foliage below the water line in final exhibit. Be careful and neat in any disbudding, if required.
- 4. OWNERSHIP: All exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor except in the special classes for decorative arrangements. Potted plants must have been in the owner's possession for two (2) months.
- 5. GROOMING: Wipe off any traces of spray, dust, or insect damage. No oiling spray or artificial coloring is permitted. Container grown plants should be well watered and groomed. No visible props. The hangers should be long enough to permit viewing and judging, and a convenient size for handling.
- 6. TRANSPORTATION: Protect from sunlight and transport specimens in a container of water. Stems should be recut just before entry.
- 7. LABELING: Name your specimen (correct identification is essential). This is highly educational to the viewing public and a credit in judging. Assistance will be available to help exhibitors identify their entries.
- 8. ARRANGEMENTS: Flowers used in arrangements do not necessarily have to be grown by the designer. Open to all amateur or professional flower arrangers. Some fresh plant material must be used in all classes. Rock and weathered wood may be painted, dyed, varnished, but NO dyed or tinted

- fresh plant material may be used. NO artificial flowers or foliage, NO plastic or ribbon flowers allowed. One or more accessories may be used in all designs. If using accessories or more than one container, arrangements must be on a base to facilitate possible moving. All fresh flower designs must have suitable container to hold water. Growing plants in containers are NOT arrangements.
- 9. Vases will be furnished for all cut flowers in all classes, except FLORAL BOUQUETS-SECTION 11. Exhibitors shall provide own container for unusually large or top heavy exhibits, such as Giant Sunflowers.
- 10. Exhibitors will furnish their own containers and accessories for arrangements. All items must be well marked on the bottom of the container with the owner's name and address. The fair management will not be responsible for loss or damage of the containers and accessories.

All Granges must notify the Grange Display Superintendent by June 1 of their intention to enter classes in this department. Granges may begin setting up their exhibits prior to fair on Sunday, July 30th, beginning at 1:00 p.m. Exhibits must be in place no later than 10:00 p.m. on Tuesday, August 1st, before the Fair.

All entries and awards will be released on Sunday, August 6th, following closing day of the Fair, 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.

- 1. Each Grange will own its exhibit and will dispose of it in any manner it sees fit. Each Grange cleans their booth following the fair. This includes pulling of staples from the backboard of the booth. In addition, each Grange shall clean their area used in setting up their display. This includes tables and chairs utilized by others in the display building.
- 2. Each exhibitor must refrain from crowding the booth of an adjoining display. The slant of the basic riser in the booth must remain uniform. Shelves or brackets may be added, but they must be removed at the close of the fair.
- 3. No decorations will be allowed above the backboard.
- 4. Commercial items may be used in the booth without covering the name.
- 5. Glass jars used in the display must be recognized standard canning jars as recommended by USDA.
- 6. Agriculture products may be grown or purchased. All vegetables, fruits, herbs, and berries must be good quality, and prepared and displayed according to Washington State University recommendations. (Flyers are available from the Extension Office.) Highly perishable food items such as cauliflower, broccoli, fruits, and berries should be replaced in mid-fair. Fresh dairy products are not to be used, only the cartons or powdered products. Perishable items may be vacuum packed.
- 7. Any Grange interfering with the judges during the adjudication of awards will forfeit the rights to all premiums. All officials or judges are

- required and all exhibitors are requested to report any violations of this rule to Fair Management.
- 8. The name of the Grange exhibiting must be covered until judging has been completed. Please place the name of your Grange near the front of the booth, within an arms reach, so that the Superintendent may uncover the name without difficulty.



- 1. All boys and girls entering exhibits must be properly enrolled members of an FFA chapter that is in "good standing" with Washington State FFA Association. An official membership list of all participating chapters must be provided to the fair office by July 31.
- 2. All exhibits must be entered between 9:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. Tuesday, prior to opening day, unless otherwise stated. No early entries will be permitted in the barn. FFA exhibits (including animals, tack boxes, and decorations) may not be removed from the barns before 5:00 p.m. Sunday, closing day of the fair.
- 3. Refer to the general rules for animal health requirements.
- 4. Exhibitors will be responsible for their own exhibits. The Fair Management will not assume liability for loss or damage to exhibits.
- 5. All entries must be shown by the owner, unless it is a chapter owned project. Chapter owned projects will be judged for ribbon placing only (no premium money will be paid). Official chapter members must do herdsmanship on their own animals or premium money will be forfeited.
- 6. In the instance where two or more members work together to complete a project, the listed premium points will be divided between the members.
- 7. Livestock to be exhibited must be owned by the exhibitor and records kept after June 1, current year. Exceptions to this rule must receive written permission from their FFA Superintendent.
- 8. Entries for all animals must be sent by July 10th to the Grays Harbor County Fair PO Box 1229, Elma WA 98541

- 9. FFA members registered in Grays Harbor County Chapters and out of county Chapters may show their livestock in open class competition, with permission of the open class superintendent, their local FFA Advisor, and the FFA Superintendent, provided that an open class entry form has been completed and mailed to the fair office with the appropriate stall fee before the deadline. Please indicate on the entry form that this is an FFA animal and will be housed with the chapter. Refer to open class rules
- 10. Each exhibitor is required to furnish their own bedding, straw, grain, and hay. Initial bedding will be supplied by the fair. Exhibitor must clean their stall space within two days of the closing of the fair. Failure to do this will result in the forfeiture of premiums.
- 11. Each exhibitor is responsible for the cleanliness of the barn area assigned to them and must complete herdsmanship expectations assigned by the barn superintendent.
- 12. For those who are camping at the fairgrounds, please refer to the camping rules elsewhere in the Exhibitor Guide.
- 13. Dairy and beef exhibitors may enter up to six animals. More than six animals requires superintendent approval. Sheep, swine, and goat exhibitors may enter up to five animals. On animal entry form exhibitors may include up to two additional animals named as alternates if space.
- 14. All animal exhibitors must enter fitting and showmanship with their own animals, except by a ruling of the section superintendent and fair board.
- 15. Any undesirable conduct by FFA exhibitors will result in the forfeiture of premium money.
- 16. Each FFA exhibitor with livestock must purchase a Season Exhibitor Pass. Exhibitors will not be eligible for premium money until this purchase has been made. Only exhibitors who have the need of being on the fairgrounds in an official

capacity for five days are eligible to purchase this pass. Forms will be provided to the FFA chapter advisors prior to the fair. The deadline for purchasing passes is July 13.

- 17. Special one day tickets and car passes for FFA judging teams must be secured from the Fair Office by July 13.
- 18. All FFA livestock exhibitors will either judge in the livestock contest or handle animals for the Livestock Judging Contest on Wednesday.
- 19. Out of county FFA members may exhibit livestock at the Grays Harbor Co. Fair if room is available and with approval from the FFA Superintendent and the respective Barn Superintendent. Out of county members are not eligible for the Top Showman Award or the GHYLA Market Animal Awards.
- 20. FFA members participating in a GHYLA (Grays Harbor Youth Livestock Auction) project must adhere to the GHYLA rules. In case of discrepancies, GHYLA rules take precedence for those animals to be sold at GHYLA.

- 2. Fowl will be exhibited in wire cages provided by the fair. Entries are subject to space available.
- 3. Transportation cages shall be removed from the fairgrounds between time of entry and time of removal of the exhibits.
- 4. Only two entries will be permitted by each exhibitor in each class, per variety, except as stated otherwise, maximum of 16 birds per exhibitor.
- 5. Exhibitors will be limited to one crossbreed per exhibitor.
- 6. Birds shown in a trio or pen cannot be shown as individuals.
- 7. A trio is two females and one male; a pair is one male and one female of the same breed & variety.
- 8. A pen is three birds of the same sex, age, breed and variety.
- 9. The words "old", "hen", and "cock" mean birds over one year of age.
- 10. Poultry will be inspected for lice. Poultry having lice or showing signs of sickness or excessive dirt will be REFUSED entry by the superintendent and/or vet.
- 11. To prevent the possibility of spreading infectious diseases, it is recommended that all poultry exhibited at the fair not be returned to the farm.

- 12. All birds exhibited must show maturity. Chickens must be at least 16 weeks old, with the exception of live meat birds.
- 13. Poultry injured after being checked in by the superintendent should not be disqualified for that year, but the bird cannot be exhibited again.

INSTRUCTION TO JUDGES:

- A. All standard egg production breeds will be judged on the basis of production. Such birds may be dubbed or debeaked. All meat breeds will be graded in USDA grades. Chicken, turkey, duck, and goose classes shall be judged by the American Standard of Perfection and USDA grades.

DEPARTMENT RULES:

1. All youth entering exhibits in this department must be properly enrolled members of the 4-H Youth Development program. All 4-H club members must be enrolled by April 1 of the current year to participate in fair activities. An official membership list of all participating 4-H clubs must be provided to the fair office by July 1. Each exhibitor should have their exhibits checked by the project leader before making entries in the fair. When exhibits and contests are divided into age groups, the WSU Extension 4-H Youth Development Policy applies. (4-H Age is determined by October 1st of the current 4-H year)

Cloverbuds: 5 to 7 years of age Juniors: 8 to 10 years of age Intermediates: 11 to 13 years of age Seniors: 14 to less than 19 years of age

- All state 4-H policies (found in http://extension.wsu.edu/4h/) and the most recent revision of the Grays Harbor County 4-H Policies apply during the fair.
- 3. All 4-H club exhibitors shall observe the general rules and regulations of the Grays Harbor County Fair.
- 4. Members enrolled in both a 4-H club and FFA chapter may exhibit in both; HOWEVER, they must declare and document which animal is a 4-H animal and which animal is an FFA animal by July 10. The animal's tag, tattoo, leg band number, or other acceptable means of identification must be noted on the animal entry form at the time it is submitted to the Fair Office. No changes will be allowed after that date. A 4-H project will be used for 4-H fitting and showing contests, and likewise an FFA project must be used for FFA fitting and showing contests.

- 5. ANIMAL HEALTH AND THE USE OF ILLEGAL SUBSTANCES - The use of illegal drugs and/or improper use of animal health products or foreign substances will not be tolerated in the 4-H Youth Development Program. Extension personnel, 4-H volunteers, families, youth, and fair/show officials have a legal and moral obligation not to misuse these products. We have the responsibility to tell others not to use these substances, and to report those who do use any illegal substance. administration of any drug or medication which could affect an animal's performance resulting in an unfair advantage or the disposition of the animal, is unacceptable. Additionally, there are federal penalties for using illegal substances that are going into the nation's food supply.
- 6. All 4-H animals are to be left outside the 4-H barns until the animals are checked by the veterinarians outside the barns. Superintendents have the authority to refuse entry until the animal is examined and approved for entry by a If the animal shows signs of veterinarian. infectious or contagious diseases following the original inspection, a committee of three persons designated by WSU Extension Staff and the Fair Board Livestock Committee may ask for removal of the animal from the fairgrounds or a veterinary inspection paid for by the exhibitor. Consult your veterinarian as to diseases such as IBR, BVD, vaccinations P13. for which etc. recommended and for which preventative measures are indicated, and also proper timing for such actions. **DO NOT** leave this matter to the last week before fair and expect to accomplish effective disease management.
- 7. 4-H Equine entries are due by July 26 to the Grays Harbor County Extension Office, PO Box 3018, Elma WA 98541. All entry forms must be

- 8. accompanied by a signed Grays Harbor County 4-H Code of Conduct/Parental Consent and Release Form.
- Unless special arrangements are made in advance with individual superintendents, exhibit entry times will be as listed at https://extension.wsu.edu/graysharbor/4-h/links/
- 10. Exhibitors will be responsible for their own exhibits. Each exhibitor is responsible for damage or personal injury caused by his animal, and it is mandatory that you have liability insurance. Contact your insurance agent.
- 11. Each exhibitor is required to furnish their own straw, hay, grain, water buckets, barn tools, grooming equipment, and tack boxes. Initial bedding will be supplied by the fair. Grain must be kept in tack boxes or suitable containers. Feeding of poultry and rabbits will be provided for and feed furnished. Each exhibitor must clean their stall space within two days of the closing of the fair. Failure to do this will result in the scrutiny of future participation.
- 12. Entry forms and exhibit tags are available to 4-H leaders at the County Extension Offices in Elma or Shelton. Complete instructions for making members entries are also available.
- 13. 4-H livestock exhibits (including poultry, rabbits, tack, tack boxes, and decorations) may not be removed from the barns before closing time on the last day of the fair. All non-auction animals, leave after the conclusion of the fair. Market animals leave on the date established by the auction committee. 4-H equine exhibits will leave on the date established by horse superintendent.
- 14. Any member whose animals are removed from the fair before the established check out time must have approval from the WSU Extension Staff and Fair Board Livestock Committee.
- 15. Any exceptions to the printed rules must be approved in writing by WSU Extension Staff.

16. Animal Health Requirements:

The fair will have an official veterinarian on call. The fair office will call the veterinarian in the case of emergencies or in special situations. Service call charges are the responsibility of the exhibitor

All sheep and goats, except castrated male goats, must have official USDA National Scrapie Eradication assigned flock identification.

Individual health certificates on Washington animals are not required for entry into the fair. The fair veterinarian may issue a blanket health certificate covering all in-state entries to the fair.

No animal from a quarantined area or premise may be permitted to enter the fair or show.

All out-of-state animal entries must comply with State of Washington import requirements. No exceptions unless exempted by rule. Please call the fair office for more information on out-of-state animal entries.

Fair veterinarians will inspect all classes of livestock and poultry (including horses, pet animals, rabbits, fur-bearing animals, pigeons, ducks, geese, and turkeys) before they are exhibited to determine that the livestock and poultry show no clinical indications of contagious, infectious diseases and ectoparasites.

Fair veterinarians will reject any animal with infectious or contagious diseases or ectoparasites. Exhibitors should be aware that ringworm, warts, pinkeye, strangles, contagious ecthyma, scabies, lice, mites, ticks, and fleas fall into these categories.

Animals exhibiting disease symptoms during the course of the fair will be rejected by the fair veterinarian and removed from the exhibit area.

It is strongly recommended, but not required, that cattle be vaccinated in the current show year against respiratory diseases.

The fair veterinarian's professional decision as to the health status of an animal is final and will be upheld by the fair board.

SECTION 7: HERDSMANSHIP

Animal Barn Superintendent

- 1. Each 4-H member with animal exhibits is required to perform herdsmanship. Failure to do so means the animal may be sent home. Failure to perform herdsmanship duties on auction animals may preclude the exhibitor from selling the animal in the livestock auction.
- 2. The purpose of herdsmanship is for 4-H members to care for their animals and equipment properly, ensure safety, and to keep stalls, surrounding areas, and animals clean and attractive at all times. Educational displays and public relations are also important components of herdsmanship.
- 3. Exhibitors may perform herdsmanship by clubs or may form several clubs into herdsmanship groups with their section superintendent's approval.
- 4. Stall cards will be furnished for each animal and must be on display for the entire fair.
- 5. Pens must be kept clean before, during, and after the fair. 4-H members ONLY may perform duties of herdsmanship during the ENTIRE fair. Adults in charge may assist when safety requires it.
- 6. All 4-H exhibitors must be properly attired while on herdsmanship duty. Please refer to 4-

7. H project material and State 4-H Program Policies.

DIVISION A CLOVERBUD 4-H PROJECTS

- 1. Members enrolled as Cloverbud 4-H members in Mason and Grays Harbor County 4-H Clubs may exhibit for Cloverbud ribbons only. There will be no premium money paid.
- 2. Entry tags and forms are necessary for all still life exhibits.
- 3. Cloverbud members can submit still life entries during established pre-entry times, or can bring still life items to the Pavilion Meeting Room on Sunday, prior to opening, between 1:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. so that members can discuss their projects with a designated judge upon entry.
- 4. Entry for small animals are required by July 15. Small animals include pygmy goats, poultry, rabbits, dogs, cats, and cavies. All small animal entries must be approved by the appropriate superintendent.

DIVISION B EDUCATIONAL DISPLAYS

- 1. This division is open to all 4-H members and clubs from Mason and Grays Harbor County.
- 2. The display must be related to a project or activity of the club or member.
- To exhibit a large display or booth, send a
 description of the display (including size) to the
 4-H Fair Committee by the third Monday in
 July. Space limitations will be considered before
 display is approved for entry.
- 4. Copyrighted materials are not allowed on any educational display.
- 5. Posters must be neat and clean.
- 6. Name of exhibitor must be written on the back of all posters.
- 7. Lettering on posters must be readable from a distance of ten feet.
- 8. Upon completion of judging, posters will be sent to the appropriate area/barn for display purposes.

Note for posters: only BLUE ribbon posters created this current year will be selected for State 4-H Fair. If you are exhibiting an animal at state fair they most likely require educational posters for display in your exhibit areas. Your posters from County fair don't have to be submitted for judging/premium

points at state fair. You can simply take them up to display in your county's area of barn.

Types of 4-H Presentations

- A DEMONSTRATION puts words into action. An effective demonstration teaches others how to do something by showing while telling. At the end of a demonstration, you should have a finished product to show your audience.
 - Sample titles include: how to cook an egg, how to groom a dog, how to needle-felt
- An ILLUSTRATED TALK makes us of posters, pictures, digital presentations like PowerPoint, or other visuals to show how to do something or illustrate a process. No finished product is required.

 Sample titles include: how to plan a garden, how to distinguish horse markings, how to lead a fun and effective carwash
- **PUBLIC SPEAKING** is a prepared speech on a specific subject for an audience. Usually, no props or visual aids are used. 4-Hers use this type of presentation to teach, entertain, and/or inform their audiences. Sample titles include: why I like the 4-H cat project, 4-H around the world, what compassion looks like in my community

4-H IN ACTION:

- > This is a non-judged activity, with a one hour minimum.
- > This activity is not as formal as a demonstration, however the presentation should be planned and practiced. The presentation should reflect current year 4-H project work. Individuals, teams, and groups are encouraged to share an activity with the public. Information should be presented and questions answered. A minimum presentation of one hour is required. No additional points will be earned for longer times or multiple participation events, regardless of subject matter.

> Examples of activities that work well in this type of presentation are: spinning wool/fiber, using a serger to construct a garment, showing how to use

Each individual must exhibit his own project, which must have been in the care of the exhibitor by May 1, current year. NO EXCEPTIONS. Leaders are responsible for the eligibility of horses.
- 2. January 1 will be considered the birth date of all horses.
- **3.** No stallions are eligible. Exception: a colt foal of the current year may be shown.
- 4. Exhibitors must use a bridle or hackamore while riding; halters are not allowed.

- 5. Blankets are to remain off horses between 10 a.m. and 8 p.m., after completion of fitting and showmanship classes.
- 6. Horses will be fed only in stalls.
- 7. All 4-H horses must be inspected by the veterinarian before being allowed in the stabling area. All horses must be stabled immediately passing the mandatory veterinary upon inspection. Any animal suspected of harboring disease or parasites will not be allowed in the stabling area. The Section Superintendent and/or veterinarian's assistant shall have the right to refuse entry until the animal is examined and approved for entry by a veterinarian. Animals being trailered to and from the show area are subject to veterinary inspection prior to entering the stabling area. The 4-H Horse Program does not condone the use of drugs, herbal compounds, or surgical procedures which affect an animal's conformation, appearance, natural performance, or in any way alters its natural color. Horses requiring any medication should be identified upon arrival to the veterinarian check and also to the Horse Superintendent on check in day. Exhibitors should be prepared to present a valid prescription or a written explanation either or both to be signed by the animal's licensed veterinarian. If a horse requires medication or treatment after arrival at the fair, any medication used to protect the health and welfare of the animal must, at all times, be done in accordance with the specification and/or instructions given in the prescription. Liability for the correct administration of the prescribed drug is the responsibility of the exhibitor's parent or legal guardian. The use of Phenylbutazone ("bute") in older 4-H horses is acceptable when the drug is used with and according to a veterinarian's prescription.
- 8. Any exhibitor bringing a mare and foal must have experienced assistance to handle the mare.
- 9. Signs shall be placed on the stalls by the exhibitor stating "Do Not Touch".
- 10. Horses known to be kickers shall wear a red ribbon on the tail at all times. In addition, signs may be placed on stalls.
- 11. Each exhibitor is responsible for any damage or personal injury caused by his animal and it is MANDATORY THAT YOU HAVE LIABILITY INSURANCE to cover the same.
- 12. Any animal deemed unmanageable or dangerous must be removed from the fairgrounds; decision

- made by the 4-H Horse Council officer team and WSU Extension staff.
- 13. It is highly recommended that all horses be inoculated against distemper, influenza, tetanus, West Nile virus, and rhino prior to the fair.
- 14. Above the ankle boot with a minimum ½ inch heel, equestrian approved helmets and other proper attire are required while exhibitors are riding, handling, judging, or showing, refer to PNW574 4-H Horse Contest Guide for proper attire descriptions. For safety reasons exhibitors will be allowed to wear "romeo" type or "fat boy" type hard-soled shoes ONLY during herdsmanship.
- 15. In addition to these rules, all exhibitors must comply with the General Fair and the 4-H Department Rules.
- 16. The 4-H Horse Council officer team, working with WSU Extension staff, have the right to deem that a horse or horse/rider combination is not safe and may dismiss the animal from the Fairgrounds. Notification of dismissal will be given to the Fair Board.
- 17. Refer to the full class list and supplemental information distributed by the 4-H Horse Council.

SECTION 8: 4-H POULTRY

- Only one turkey entry will be permitted by each exhibitor. Any additional space available will be assigned by lottery system after check-in on Tuesday.
- 6. Exhibitors will be limited to one crossbreed per exhibitor.
- 7. All entries will be classified by breed and variety. Only recognized breeds are eligible for show except classes 11 & 17. The breed and variety must be stated on the entry form.
- 8. All poultry must be bathed. We recommend the three-bucket method.

- 9. Poultry will be inspected for lice. Poultry having lice or showing signs of sickness or excessive dirt will be REFUSED entry by the superintendent and/or yet.
- 10. To prevent the possibility of spreading infectious diseases, it is recommended that all poultry exhibited at the fair be examined and quarantined if necessary prior to returning to the farm.
- 11. Poultry injured after being checked in by the superintendent should not be disqualified for that year, but the bird cannot be exhibited again.
- 12. The poultry exhibitors must present a certificate to the superintendent prior to check in that certifies the entries are Samonell Pullorum-Typhoid clean **New State Requirement**
- 13. All turkey and waterfowl exhibitors are responsible to bring their own feed and feed pans. Chickens will be supplied with feed.
- 14. All birds exhibited must show maturity. Chickens must be at least 16 weeks old, with the exception of live meat birds.
- 15. It is **mandatory** for all poultry exhibitors to enter Fitting and Showing and Judging Contests.
- 16. Cloverbud exhibitors must have a parent present at all times.
- 17. Birds shown in a trio or pen cannot be shown as individuals.

- 1. This section is open to 4-H dog project members from Grays Harbor and Mason County only, provided the member is enrolled in the project prior to May 1 and the entry has been under the member's training since May 1.
- 2. Exhibitors must confine their dogs to the exhibit area, show ring, and designated exercise area. Members must keep dogs on a leash or training collar at all times, except when in obedience classes or benched. Each exhibitor must walk and exercise his own animals and is fully responsible for his animal's comfort.
- 3. When removing dogs from the approved dog areas, dogs must be taken directly to cars and off of the fairgrounds.
- 4. All 4-H animals are to be left outside the 4-H barns until the animals are checked by the veterinarians at the stations established by GHC Fair procedures. Superintendents have the authority to refuse entry until the animal is examined and approved for entry by a veterinarian.
- 5. No tranquilizers or stimulants will be allowed unless advised by veterinary personnel and cleared by the superintendent.
- 6. Members will be allowed to exhibit each dog in the next class upon receiving a blue ribbon placing in the previous class.
- 7. The winning of a blue ribbon in any obedience class prohibits entry in that class, by the member with the same dog again.
- 8. No dog will be crated or muzzled in the benching area. Dogs will be benched with a buckle

- collar. Training collars will be used outside the benching area.
- 9. Dogs must be wearing well fitted collars, either buckle or slip collar type. No fancy collars, spiked, or other special training collars are permitted. Nothing is to be hanging from the collars during competition. Exhibitors are to use a six foot training leash with a swivel snap and loop on opposite ends. Leather and fabric leads are preferred. Chain leashes are not allowed. Show leads may be used in fitting and showmanship.
- 10. Members are not allowed to do intensive training of dogs on the fairgrounds.
- 11. There will be no disciplining of dogs permitted during competition.
- 12. Abuse or severe unwarranted disciplining of dogs on the fairgrounds will be grounds for excusing the member from participation in fair 4-H dog activities for the year.
- 13. A female in season may be allowed at the fair at the discretion of the superintendent.
- 14. All participating 4-H members are responsible for sharing equally in demonstrations, barn duty, and other responsibilities. Failure to do so may result in the forfeiture of premium money.
- 15. Each 4-H member exhibiting a dog in the fair must enter the fitting and showmanship contest and the dog judging contest.
- 16. Individuals who have won a blue ribbon in Novice Fitting and Showmanship with the same dog they are presently showing and in the same age class, will enter Open Fitting and Showmanship.
- 17. Champion Rosettes and Reserve Champion Rosettes will be awarded in each Fitting and Showmanship and Obedience Class by division where performance warrants.
- 18. Any dog the superintendent feels is a danger to the viewing public or other animals may be dismissed from the fair by the superintendent.
- 19. ATTENTION: each animal entered must show proof of Rabies vaccination using 4-H Form WS4HF/1.30m. Blank forms may be picked up at the County Extension Office or
- downloaded from the State 4-H website at https://extension.wsu.edu/4h/fairs/state-4-h-fair.
 NOTE: Any animal with evidence of parasites, including fleas, will be turned away by the Fair Veterinarian.
- 21. Parents and/or leaders may not handle dogs on the fairgrounds.

- 1. This section is open to 4-H cat project members.
- 2. Cats to be exhibited in the 4-H department must be acquired and in the possession of the member no later than May 1st of the current 4-H year.
- 3. All cats must have been vaccinated against rabies with an approved vaccine within 12 months as per label directions. We will also recognize the 3vaccine the vear as per instructions. Exhibitors must present proof of current vaccination by a licensed veterinarian, against rabies. A rabies vaccination certificate (C1084E) is available from the County Extension Office or on the 4-H website. It must be completed at the administering veterinarian's office and submitted with the county animal entry form for all cats exhibited at the GH County Fair. If rabies inoculation was given by a veterinarian who is no longer available, the original receipt or veterinarian or veterinariangenerated document that includes (1) date of vaccination, (2) cat's name or ID and age, (3) brand or type of vaccine, and (4) the

veterinarian's signature or clinic stamp should be stapled to the vaccination certificate (C1084E) The exhibitor should complete all information required on the inoculation certificate – except the lower portion that is reserved for clinic/veterinarian use. Cats should be vaccinated against feline panleukopenia, feline

- rhinotracheitis, calici and leukemia viruses, and chlamydia per local veterinarian's recommendations for the protection of your cat and the other exhibitors. Proof of additional vaccinations is not currently mandatory.
- 4. All cats must be four months of age by show date.
- 5. All cats shown must be healthy, fully groomed, and free of parasites. No pregnant or nursing cats may be shown. Any cat not adhering to health rules will be sent home.
- 6. Cats will be checked in by the superintendent at 9 AM on the first exhibit day (Friday) in the Borden-Seabert Exhibition Building. Cats and cages are to be set up and in place by 10 am. Cats must be taken home at 10 PM Friday night and returned to their cage by 10 AM the next morning (Saturday). Clean up of the Cat Barn will start at 5pm Saturday night. Cats will be released after clean up and breakdown of the barn, including all cage decorations removed, all cages folded and stacked, all barn decorations taken down, all chairs stacked, and the floors swept.
- 7. All exhibitors must do herdsmanship. Herdsmanship time will be divided equally among members for the two days the cat exhibit is open. Sign up will be after mandatory meeting on the morning of the first day. Exhibitors that have other exhibits will take first priority for herdsmanship signup to reduce conflict of schedules.
- 8. Cage Decoration will take place after cages are set-up the night before exhibit (Thursday) or before 10am on the first exhibit day (Friday). Theme of cage must be appropriate and respectable. Safety for your cat must be considered when decorating the cage. The cage must be covered on 2 sides, back, and top with material that gives privacy and helps stop airborne diseases. A proper litter pan must be in the cage. Food and water dish must be non-breakable. Decorations on top of cage must be light weight and not fragile. A small informational display about the cat and exhibitor on the cage is permitted. Cage size will be no
- 9. bigger than 54 inches wide, 24 inches high, and 24 inches deep.

- 12. All items will be classified at the time of entry by the superintendent
- 13. Computer Generated art must be entered in the STEM division/computer technology Section into one of the following lots for premium purposes:

Framed entries and non-mounted entries will not be accepted. Small, flat hangers that are properly and securely attached to extend above the edge of the exhibit are acceptable.

Original image must be attached to the front of the presentation for comparison by audience. A 3"x5" card must be attached to the front of the presentation explaining what was done to arrive at the final image.

-20%, Color correction -20%, Retouching -10%, Cropping

Done Correctly – 10%, Mounting – 10%, Correct Category and

Info Cards – 10%.

- 3. Pickles, salsa and relish recipes and sauces must be included with the entry. Recipes and processing times listed by the National Center for Home Food Preservation are approved by the USDA. You may find this information on the website http://nchfp.uga.edu
- 4. All canned products are to be exhibited in standard tempered canning jars. These jars can be recognized by the brand name molded on the side. They are sold especially for home canning. Mayonnaise and pickle jars will be disqualified.
- 5. Labels with information on variety, date processed, and method used must be on top of the lid. **Please obtain C0803 for this purpose.** This label will take the place of any entry tags.

- 6. Jams and jellies shall be exhibited in either standard jelly glasses or standard canning jars. Frozen jams and jellies will not be accepted.
- 7. Jars must be clean.
- 8. All canned products must be exhibited in standard canning jars, sealed with flat metal lids, and screw bands rings. Rings should be included with the exhibit but must be able to be removed by the judge.
- 9. Only canned foods listed in classes may be exhibited. 4-H members may enter other items in open classes. Items must be different and not the same as in 4-H classes.

- 9. No exhibits will be allowed that contain WSDA Prohibited/

Quarantined Plants and Washington State Noxious Weeds. Plant lists can be obtained from the Grays Harbor Noxious Weed Control Board.

Vegetables (Extra Small) – six specimens are required for an exhibit: Snap Beans, Green Peas, Cherry Tomatoes, etc.

- 5. Vegetables (Live) enter one live plant growing in a container: Chard, Celery, Lettuce, Leeks, Spinach, etc.
- 6. Vegetables (Dried) enter one pint: Dry Beans, Dry Peas, etc.
- 7. Fruits (Small) ten specimens are required: Berries (any type)
- 8. Fruits (Medium) six specimens are required for an exhibit: Cherries, Crabapples, Small Plums, etc.
- 9. Fruits (Large) three specimens are required for an exhibit: Apples, Plums, Pears, Etc.
- 10. Herbs three stems required for an exhibit: all Herbs.
- 11. Herbs enter one live plant growing in a container: all Herbs.
- 12. Other Produce Item three specimens required for an exhibit.

SECTION 2: CUT FLOWERS

- 1. This section is open to those 4-H members enrolled in the Garden/plant science project.
- 2. Diseased and/or infested flowers and plants will be refused entry and the exhibit must be removed immediately.
- 3. All flowers and/or plants must be identified by proper name on the entry tag.
- 4. All flowers and/or plants must be grown and cared for by the exhibitor.
- 5. Containers will be furnished by the fair; however additional containers may be needed. All containers must be clear glass.
- 6. Special awards will be awarded to outstanding exhibits where warranted.
- 7. Natural foliage must be attached, if naturally grown in that manner.

- 2. <u>Annual Flowers</u> one blossom of each specimen, blossom size 3 inches and over: same species as class 1
- 3. <u>Perennials</u> three blossoms/spikes of each specimen, blossom size under 3 inches: Carnations, Chrysanthmums, Daisies, Delphinium, Geums, Golden Glow, Phlox, etc.
- 4. <u>Perennials</u> one blossom/spike of each specimen, blossom size 3 inches and over: same species as class 3
- 5. <u>Bulbs, Tubers, or Corms</u> one stem with blossoms required for an exhibit: Dahlias, Gladiolus, Lilies, Tuberous Begonias, etc.
- 6. <u>Shrubs, Trees, Vines</u> one stem with blossoms required for an exhibit: Heather, Hydrangea, Roses, etc.
- 7. **Any Other Flower** enter appropriate number for an exhibit

SECTION 3: FLOWER ARRANGEMENTS

- 1. This section is open to 4-H members enrolled in the 4-H foods, arts, and/or ornamental garden projects.
- 2. It is preferable to use home grown flowers, however flowers may be purchased.
- 3. Silk and/or dried flowers will be permitted at the county level but will be ineligible for the state fair.
- 4. Exhibitors must bring their own containers, which are labeled with surname on the bottom.
- 5. Accessories may be used.
- 6. Judging will be on flower selection, design, and workmanship.
- 7. If arrangement is following a specific theme or for a specific event (Christmas, birthday, etc), please note on entry.

Points: Blue 10, Red 8, White 6

CLASS:

1. Flower arrangement of any theme.

SECTION 4: CONTAINER PLANTS

All plants must have been in the care of the exhibitor since June 1. Plants grown any time from seed are also eligible for exhibit. All containers should be well marked on the bottom with the name of the exhibitor. There is a maximum of 4 entries per exhibitor per class.

SECTION 5: BEES & HONEY

This section is open to 4-H beekeeping project members.

Points: Blue 10, Red 8, White 6

CLASS:

- 1. <u>Display of live bees, Italian worker and</u> queen or other breeds
- 2. Display of molded wax, two or more molds
- 3. <u>Comb honey, white, light amber or dark</u> (three sections)
- 4. Extracted honey, white light amber or dark (one pint)
- 5. <u>Chunk honey, white, light amber or dark</u> (one quart)

SECTION 6: ENTOMOLOGY

- 1. The exhibits in this section are open to 4-H members enrolled in the entomology, plant science, and animal science projects.
- 2. All insect exhibits must be labeled with the order and common name of the insects in the collection and the scientific name to as many as possible.

 Exhibits previously exhibited are ineligible unless collections are materially enlarged, changed, or improved.

1. At least 3 items made for insect collecting

- 6. Exhibit of the special activities of one insect, beneficial or destructive

Points: Blue 30, Red 24, White 17

- 9. Insect collection, mounted and named to family and order, containing 75 insects involving 10 orders
- 10. Any other insect collection item (Points determined at time of entry)

DIVISON K 4-H SOCIAL SCIENCES

SECTION 1: 4-H SCRAPBOOKS

- 1. This section is open to all 4-H members.
- 2. Scrapbooks will be judged on originality, neatness, and completeness of information. Books should contain information of projects, club, and all other 4-H activities.
- 3. Record books are not considered scrapbooks and will not be accepted for entry into the fair.
- 4. Entries must be the current year or may be immediate past year if not entered before.
- 5. Enter club entries under club name.

Points: Blue 15, Red 12, White 8

CLASS:

- 1. Club Scrapbook, kept by club historian
- 2. Club Scrapbook on Community Service
- 3. **Project**
- 4. Personal Development Scrapbook
- 5. Project Scrapbook

SECTION 2: SOCIAL SCIENCE PROJECTS

4-H members may enter only in those projects in which they are currently enrolled, maximum 4 entries per class. Enter club entries under club name.

Points: Blue 8, Red 6, White 4

CLASS: (any item from the following projects):

- 1. Citizenship
- 2. International/Cross Cultural Program
- 3. Health
- 4. Leadership/Ambassadors
- 5. Career Exploration
- 6. Entrepreneurship
- 7. Community Service

DIVISON L SELF DETERMINED 4-H PROJECTS

- 1. This is a category of exhibits that are the end product of advanced learnings in the 4-H project areas. The exhibit may be the actual products of the project or may be a visual presentation of the work done.
- 2. There is a limit of one exhibit per project in which the member is enrolled, and a maximum of 4 exhibits per exhibitor.
- 3. Exhibits must show the quality of work done in the project.
- 4. Exhibits will be accepted only if facilities for displaying them are available.

Points: To be determined on an individual basis.

CLASS:

1. Any Self- Determined project exhibit

DIVISON M SPECIAL YOUTH AUDIENCES

This division is open to and designed for any 4-H member who has any degree of mental or physical handicap or disability. Two options are available for exhibiting at the fair.

OPTION 1: The member may enter any of the classes listed in the Exhibitor Guide (must be enrolled in the project you are exhibiting in) and have their exhibits judged in accordance with the standards in the various projects.


OPTION 2: They may enter their exhibits (must be enrolled in the project you are exhibiting) in the "Special Youth Audiences" Division. Check the



Ribbon awards for the project will be based on the exhibit and the individual's ability. Please plan to spend a few minutes with the judge when you bring your project to the fair on Sunday.

CLASS:

1. Special Youth Audiences (option 2) This may be from one or more project areas in which the member is enrolled. Points will be awarded depending upon the extensiveness of the exhibit and the number of different project areas covered. The points will be equal to those awarded elsewhere in the 4-H department.

Grays Harbor County Fair Livestock/Animal Haul-In and Vet Check Procedures 2023

- 1) Grays Harbor Veterinary Services will perform Vet Checks and limited veterinary services for the Fairgrounds, during the Fair. However, private veterinary services will not be performed on the Fairgrounds behalf, for individual livestock or animal owners, on site.
- 2) All Livestock/Animals must be vet checked **prior to entering barns**, except for Open Class Equine that arrives on Saturday morning (and do not stall overnight).
- 3) Haul-In and Vet Checks will take place on Tuesday, August 1st, for all livestock/animals, but Dogs and Cats. Those animals will be vet checked on their specified Haul-In date and times.
 - a. General Haul-In and Vet Check time for all 4H and FFA livestock and animals, will be from 8:00am to 6:00pm.
 - b. Haul-In and Vet Check time for all Equine Exhibitors will be from 2:00pm to 6:00pm.
 - c. HAUL-IN AND VET CHECK FOR ALL OPEN CLASS LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS WILL BE FROM 8:00am to 5:00pm.
- 4) All livestock/animals, except Equine will enter the Fairgrounds through the "Playground" Gate, or Pit Road.
 - a. The Vet Check lines will form in the Pavilion parking lot, in a similar manner as the Exit Strategy.
 - b. From 8:00am to 11:00am, there will be two lines. One line will be strictly for Swine Exhibitors. The other line will be for Sheep/Lambs.
 - c. From 11:00am to 6:00pm, there will be two lines. One line will be strictly for Beef, Dairy and Animals of the World. The other line will be for Rabbits, Poultry and Goats.
 - d. There will be five (5) Fair Board members (volunteers) serving as Line Assistants who will meter entry through the gate and manage the flow of the line.
 - i. Line Assistant "A" (Ken Waber) will be stationed at the head of the lines, near the Parking Lot Ticket Booth, at a Stop sign. They will be notified through radio communication what line to take the next vehicle(s) from, for entry.
 - ii. Line Assistant "B" (David Wyatt) will be stationed centrally, inside the gate, at the Vet Check Station that will be located near the northeast corner of the Beef and Dairy Barn. They will be communicating with the Vets and monitoring lines to determine what animal type can enter next. They will relay that information to Line Assistant "A".
 - iii. Line Assistant "C" will be stationed near the southwest corner of the Beef and Dairy Barn to help direct traffic toward Goat Alley and the Rabbit & Poultry Barn. They will also make sure people do not block the roadway when unloading.
 - iv. Line Assistant "D" will be stationed between Goat Alley and the Rabbit/Poultry Barn to make sure people do not block roadway when unloading and direct them to the Blue Gate, for exit.

- v. Line Assistant "E" will be stationed at the Blue Gate to make sure no one enters that gate and that it remains "exit only".
- 5) From 8:00am to 2:00pm there will be one Vet, as well as one Vet Technician at the Main Vet Check Station, located near the northeast corner of the Beef and Dairy Barn. At 2:00pm, the Vet Technician will move from this Vet Check Station out to the Equine Vet Check Station that will be located in the open, grass area of C Lot (prior to reaching the Ortquist Barn).
- 6) Haul-in Time and Traffic Flow for each Livestock Department
 - a. <u>Swine, Sheep/Lambs</u> will be hauled in, and vet checked between **8:00am and 11:00am**. Vehicles hauling in these animals will turn right just before reaching the beef barn and proceed toward the scales (behind the northeast ends of the barns). Animals will be vet checked and enter barns from this location. Vehicles will exit behind the barns, through the blue gate.

*Note: A CHUTE WILL BE CONSTRUCTED WITH PANELS THAT SWINE MUST USE WHEN TAKEN TO THEIR PENS IN SWINE ALLEY. SWINE CANNOT BE MOVED TO STALLS WITHOUT USE OF THE SHUTE OR A CART.

- b. <u>Beef, Dairy and Animals of the World</u> will be hauled in, and vet checked between 11:00am and 6:00pm. Vehicles hauling in these animals will turn right just before reaching the Beef and Dairy Barn and proceed toward the scales (behind the northeast ends of the barns). Animals will be vet checked and enter barns from this location. Vehicles will exit behind the barns, through the blue gate.
- c. Rabbits, Poultry and Goats will also be hauled in and vet checked between the hours of 11:00am and 6:00pm. However, vehicles hauling in these animals will continue just past the northeast corner of the Beef and Dairy Barn and will stop just in front of the location of the Monte Farm and Home booth, where vet check for these animals will take place. Please do not block entry to the area behind the barns where vehicles will turn into the scale area. At completion of vet check, these vehicles will continue just past the Beef and Dairy Barn, turn right at the southwest corner of that barn and proceed to unload at Goat Alley or the Rabbit/Poultry Barn. Please pull off to the side of the roadway. After unloading, these vehicles will also exit through the blue gate.
- d. **Equine** will begin haul-in and vet check beginning at 2:00pm, through no later than 6:00pm. All vehicles hauling in Equine will enter the Fairgrounds using Pit Road. They will proceed down Pit Road to the Vet Check Station that will be located in the grass area of C Lot, just prior to reaching the Ortquist Barn. After Equine vet checks, unloading and stalling are completed, exhibitors will park horse trailers in the designated, graveled area of E Lot only.
- c. <u>All Open Class Livestock/Animal Exhibitors</u> must haul-in and complete the vet check process between the hours of 8:00am and 5:00pm.
- c. Anyone exhibiting in more than one livestock barn is encouraged to begin bringing their animals as close to 11:00pm, as possible, in order to help keep the lines down, as much as possible.
- c. Livestock/Animals should be in barns by 7:00pm. The Livestock Meeting will start at 7:15pm at the Monte Farm and Home Livestock Arena.

- d. Dogs will be vet checked at the Borden Seabert Building at 8:00am, on Wednesday, August 2nd.
- e. Cats will be vet checked at the Borden Seabert Building at 8:00am, on Friday, August 4th.
- f. Open Class Horse will arrive on Saturday morning at 8:00am near the Ortquist Barn.

General Notes:

- Superintendents are asked to provide a full list of exhibitors in their departments to the Fair Office, no later than the day prior to the Vet Check. That list will be provided to the Fair Vet prior to the start of the vet check process.
- Flexibility in haul-in times may be granted to families with multiple participants, exhibitors with multiple animals, exhibitors needing to make multiple haul-in trips, or other special circumstances. To request special arrangements, please contact Fairgrounds Management.
- Please make sure to park off the roadway, while unloading. We need to make sure we have clear access and egress for vehicles.
- A Vet and/or Technician will be making rounds in the mornings and at night, through the week of the fair.
- If you identify an animal that you feel needs veterinary attention, please contact David Wyatt, who is the Fair Board Livestock Committee Chairman. In his absence, please contact Mike Bruner, the Fairgrounds Manager. Other Fair Board Livestock Committee Members include Ken Waber, Mike Machowek, and Marsha Whitaker is the Fair Board President.
- As the number of animals being exhibited in each barn fluctuates from fair to fair, and special circumstances can arise, adjustments may need to be made to the Vet Check process.
- If you make observations during the Vet Check/Animal Haul-in process and have thoughts you would like to share, please note them and communicate your ideas after the fair.
