**All entries are due to the Grays Harbor Agriculture Building on Tuesday, August 9<sup>th</sup>, before the Fair, from 2 p.m. to 7 p.m. All entries and ribbons will be released on Sunday, August 14<sup>th</sup>, 2022, following the closing day of the Fair. All useable produce remaining after 7:00 p.m. will be donated to a local food bank. Arrangements for picking up hay bales, wheelbarrows, container edible plants, and other large display items must be pre-arranged with the Superintendent prior to Sunday, August 14, 2022**

1. Entries must be grown by exhibitor.
2. Exhibits will be judged according to blue, red, & white standards.
3. Threshed seeds shall be exhibited in pint jars.
4. Vegetables and fruits shall be exhibited on plates furnished by the fair.
5. Judging Factors: Type, quality, and uniformity are basic conditions that are used in judging. Type refers to specimens that are regular and typical of the variety. Quality includes primness for intended use: size, tenderness, cleanliness, and freedom from blemishes, damage, or defects. Uniformity relates to each specimen having the same shape, size, and colors as the others in the exhibit.
6. Multiple varieties may be entered in each class **if they are different varieties** and the variety is **stated on the entry tag**.
7. Exhibitor shall bring the correct number of exhibits as listed in each class.
8. No exhibits will be allowed that contain WSDA Prohibited/Quarantined Plants and Washington State Noxious Weeds. Plant lists can be obtained from the Grays Harbor County Noxious Weed Control Board.
9. Exhibits will be removed by the superintendent, as needed, if spoilage occurs.
10. Refer to general rules for all official rules and regulations.

**SPECIAL DEPARTMENT RULES FOR YOUTH:**

1. Exhibits must be grown by exhibitor. Youth under ten (10) years of age may have adult supervision as an aid to them in growing their exhibits. Junior exhibitors 10 thru 16 must grow their exhibits without adult supervision.
2. All youth under 10 years of age must bring in their exhibits in person and be prepared to meet with the Judge at the time of entry. Their exhibits will be judged at that time in order for the Judge to give them comments regarding their individual exhibits.

## HARVEST DISPLAY SECTION-SECTION 13

All entries will be judged for blue and red ribbons. The entry judged as the **Best Entry** will receive prize and a rosette. Only one entry per exhibitor allowed and each exhibitor must create their own design.

1. This contest is open to everyone
2. You may place your harvest display items in a cornucopia, a large shallow basket, or a shallow tray. The Fair will provide the mat for your display that measures 20" x 20" x 18" high. You must stay within this space.
3. Your display must be in place by Tuesday evening 8:00 P. M. before the fair.
4. All produce in your display must come from your garden or a family garden in which you worked.
5. Judging will be based on:
  - a. Artistic Arrangement
  - b. Quality of Produce
  - c. Good Use of Space
  - d. Variety of Produce
6. Flowers, canned goods or artificial produce will not be allowed in the display. Only edible fruits, herbs, and vegetables may be included in your display.

## SCARECROW CONTEST-SECTION 14

All entries will be judged for blue, red, and white placings. *The entry judged as the best of each section will receive 100 premium points. The overall best entry in the entire contest will receive 50 additional premium points.*

Scarecrows, in one form or another, have been around for thousands of years. As long as people have raised crops for food, they have needed to keep birds and other pests from devouring the plants before harvest. Making these traditional figures is becoming popular once more as an art form, and as a colorful and nostalgic addition to backyard gardens and orchards. To assist in keeping this tradition alive, we are offering this special contest.

1. All participants should use their creativity in developing their exhibits.
2. Entries may be displayed throughout the Fairgrounds (including outside locations) during the fair. The display location of each entry will be determined by the superintendent.

The following sections will be used:

- A. Youth – persons 16 years of age or under
- B. Adult – persons 17 years of age or older
- C. Groups – more than one persons contributing to the design and development of the entry

**All entries are due to the Pavilion Annex on Tuesday, August 9, before the Fair, from 2 p.m. to 7 p.m.  
All entries and ribbons will be released on Sunday, August 14<sup>th</sup>, following closing day of the Fair, from 10 am to 3 pm.**

- 1. PREPARATION OF CUT FLOWERS:** All entries in floral classes should be planned several days before the show, as all flowers need care after cutting to improve their staying qualities.
- 2. CUTTING AND CONDITIONING:** Specimens should be cut in the early morning or evening at a long slant, a bit longer than needed and placed in a container of tepid water immediately, then store in a cool dark place free of drafts. To prevent evaporation, cover with plastic. The flowers should stand in deep water for several hours or overnight.
- 3. FOLIAGE:** Cut flowers are shown with foliage attached to the stem. No accessory foliage is permitted. Any surplus foliage should be removed. No foliage below the water line in final exhibit. Be careful and neat in any disbudding, if required.
- 4. OWNERSHIP:** All exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor except in the special classes for decorative arrangements. Potted plants must have been in the owner's possession for two (2) months.
- 5. GROOMING:** Wipe off any traces of spray, dust, or insect damage. No oiling spray or artificial coloring is permitted. Container grown plants should be well watered and groomed. No visible props. The hangers should be long enough to permit viewing and judging, and a convenient size for handling.
- 6. TRANSPORTATION:** Protect from sunlight and transport specimens in a container of water. Stems should be recut just before entry.
- 7. LABELING:** Name your specimen (correct identification is essential). This is highly educational to the viewing public and a credit in judging. Assistance will be available to help exhibitors identify their entries.
- 8. ARRANGEMENTS:** Flowers used in arrangements do not necessarily have to be grown by the designer. Open to all amateur or professional flower arrangers. Some fresh plant material must be used in all classes. Rock and weathered wood may be painted, dyed, varnished, but **NO** dyed or tinted fresh plant material may be used. **NO** artificial flowers or foliage, **NO** plastic or ribbon flowers allowed. One or more accessories may be used in all designs. If using accessories or more than one container, arrangements must be on a base to facilitate possible moving. All fresh flower designs must have suitable container to hold water. Growing plants in containers are **NOT** arrangements.
- 9. Vases** will be furnished for all cut flowers in all classes, except **FLORAL BOUQUETS-SECTION 11**. Exhibitors shall provide own container for unusually large or top heavy exhibits, such as Giant Sunflowers.
- 10. Exhibitors** will furnish their own containers and accessories for arrangements. All items must be well marked on the bottom of the container with the owner's name and address. The fair management will not be responsible for loss or damage of the containers and accessories.
- 11. No exhibits** will be allowed that contain WSDA Prohibited/Quarantined Plants and Washington State Noxious Weeds. Plant lists can be obtained from the Grays Harbor County Noxious Weed Control Board.
- 12. Removal of exhibits** **MUST** be Sunday, August 9<sup>th</sup>, from 6 pm to 7 pm. Early removal of exhibit will result in the forfeiture of premiums and entries. Department Superintendent has the right to remove all or any part of an exhibit that has become unsightly. Special passes to remove entries are available upon request.

Ball brand lids may be used after the year of production. 1. Photographs previously exhibited in the Grays Harbor County Fair will not be accepted.
2. Photos must be a print size of 8 x 10 with an 11 x 14 single or double matte of your color choice. **No decorated mattes will be accepted.**
3. Entries mounted on **wood, foam, or framed or covered in glass or plastic** will not be accepted. No exceptions.
4. All entries must be firmly mounted. **DO NOT USE** a water based glue as it will cause photos to bubble.
5. For the purpose of judging and presentation, no description, name or decoration may be on the front of the mounting of photo area.
6. The name, address, and division of the exhibitor must be clearly printed on the back of each photo.
7. There is a limit **TEN (10)** total entries per exhibitor.
8. Professionals are defined as persons who give lessons, or who engage in a photography business for profit. These persons must enter the professional division.
9. All photos will be judged on composition, print quality, and visual impact.
10. Print entrants may choose to select "DO NOT RETURN PRINT" on their entry form.
11. All possible care will be taken to safeguard entries, but no responsibility will be taken for lost or damaged entries. All photographs are exhibited at owner's risk.
12. If the entry does not meet listed qualifications, entry will not be judged, displayed only.

### DEPARTMENT S GRANGE DISPLAYS

Superintendents: Davona Gwin & Lucy Vest

**All Granges must notify the Grange Display Superintendent by June 1 of their intention to enter classes in this department. Granges may begin setting up their exhibits prior to fair on Sunday, August 6, beginning at 10:00 a.m. Exhibits must be in place no later than 10:00 p.m. on Tuesday, August 9, before the Fair. All entries and awards will be released on Sunday, August 14, following closing day of the Fair, 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.**

1. Each Grange will own its exhibit and will dispose of it in any manner it sees fit. Each Grange cleans their booth following the fair. This includes pulling of staples from the backboard of the booth. In addition, each Grange shall clean their area used in setting up their display. This includes tables and chairs utilized by others in the display building.
2. Each exhibitor must refrain from crowding the booth of an adjoining display. The slant of the basic riser in the booth must remain uniform. Shelves or brackets may be added, but they must be removed at the close of the fair.
3. No decorations will be allowed above the backboard.
4. Commercial items may be used in the booth without covering the name.
5. Glass jars used in the display must be recognized standard canning jars as recommended by USDA.
6. Agriculture products may be grown or purchased. All vegetables, fruits, herbs, and berries must be good quality, and prepared and displayed according to Washington State University recommendations. (Flyers are available from the Extension Office.) Highly perishable food items such as cauliflower, broccoli, fruits, and berries should be replaced in mid-fair. Fresh dairy products are not to be used, only the cartons or powdered products. Perishable items may be vacuum packed.
7. Any Grange interfering with the judges during the adjudication of awards will forfeit the rights to all premiums. All officials or judges are required and all exhibitors are requested to report any violations of this rule to Fair Management.
8. The name of the Grange exhibiting must be covered until judging has been completed. Please place the name of your Grange near the front of the booth, within an arms reach, so that the Superintendent may uncover the name without difficulty.
9. Subordinate Granges may enter either the produce or project class. The Grange must specify which class they are entering. Each class will be judged separately, with premiums awarded in each class.
10. The Junior Granges must use their respective theme. Other rules as stated in the State Grange Junior Fair Booth Contest will apply.
11. Youth Granges must use their respective theme. Other rules as stated in the State Grange Youth Fair Booth Contest will apply.
12. The judge's will score each display separately, with the scores added together to determine the final placement of each display.

13. A copy of all scores will be posted. Comments will be given to each individual Grange.
14. If motion is included in the display, it must be motion throughout the entire fair.
