# OPEN COMPETITIONS & EVENTS GENERAL TERMS & CONDITIONS

## GENERAL PRINCIPLES

1. By submitting an Indiana State Fair Entry Form or online entry, Open Exhibitors agree to all Terms & Conditions.
  - a. Exhibitors entered under one account are also responsible and held accountable to all Terms and Conditions.
2. In the interest of all exhibitors, the Indiana State Fair Board, the agriculture industry, and all breeders of livestock, the following general terms, conditions and listing of prohibited activities are presented to maintain, insure and present a wholesome, high quality educational program. As the showcase of Indiana, it is imperative to promote and allow only ethical behavior by exhibitors at the Indiana State Fair.
3. **The Indiana State Fair Board reserves the final and absolute right to interpret any and all terms and conditions, contained in any and all parts of the Handbook/Premium List and to unilaterally settle and determine all matters, questions or differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, connected with, or incidental to the Indiana State Fair. They further reserve the right to resolve unforeseen matters not covered by general or Department terms and conditions published in the Handbook/Premium List, to amend or add to these terms and conditions as in its judgment it may determine, and to withdraw all premium offerings in all Departments should any emergency exist and circumstances demand.**
4. Fraud, deception, any prohibited activities, or violations of general or Departmental terms and conditions, or any activity determined to be improper or unethical by the Board or Department Superintendent shall not be allowed. Any exhibitor found in violation is subject to sanction and/or disqualification.
5. TAMPERING, ALTERING, AND/OR MISREPRESENTATION relative to any exhibit is prohibited
6. No Exhibitor may take exception to the decisions of an official and/or judge in an unprofessional and/or public manner nor shall any exhibitor or person representing the exhibitor interfere with or show disrespect to any judge or show official.
7. Advertising – Commercial advertisement names or insignia, farm names and family names on 4-H exhibitors or exhibits while showing is prohibited. Distribution or posting of flyers, advertisements or posters are prohibited from being hung in the Coliseum, Youth Arena or any other building, except for those in preapproved areas.

## DETERMINATION OF VIOLATIONS OF TERMS AND CONDITIONS

8. The Executive Director or their designee assigned by the Indiana State Fair Board to the Department where a violation of any term or condition established for the Indiana State Fair is reported to have occurred prior to, during or after judging shall make an initial determination as to whether a violation has occurred upon determining a violation has occurred, the Executive Director or their designee shall make a determination as to the appropriate penalty to impose upon the violating person(s). The Executive Director or their designee may choose to impose one, all, or a combination of the following penalties.

## PENALTIES

9. The exhibitor in question is disqualified and forfeits all entry and other fees and all premiums, trophies, and awards from the Department.
10. Any or all State Fair premiums, trophies and awards won by an exhibitor in any and all State Fair Departments shall be withdrawn and required to be returned to the State Fair. All entry and other fees are forfeited.
11. The exhibitor and/or his/her immediate family shall be barred from State Fair competition for a period determined by the Executive Director or their designee that may include up to a lifetime.
12. The Executive Director or their designee may impose any other penalty deemed appropriate.

## DUE PROCESS

The following due process rights and right of appeal shall be utilized.

13. The Executive Director or their designee shall notify the exhibitor in writing of the violation and penalty imposed within 15 days of the determination of a violation.
14. Within 15 days of receipt of written notification, the exhibitor may appeal the decision in writing to the Indiana State Fair Board. The written appeal must be delivered to the office of the State Fair Board within the 15 days.
15. Within 15 days of receipt of the written appeal, the Executive Director or their designee may rescind his/her initial determination. No further determination as to the reported violation may be subsequently made by the Superintendent. The exhibitor shall have no further remedy available upon the rescission of the initial determination.
16. Should the Executive Director or their designee take no action on the appeal within 15 days from the date of receipt in the office of the Fair Board, the exhibitor may request an appeal hearing no later than 18 days of the initial violation determination. Requests for an appeal hearing must be sent to the State of Indiana Office of Administrative Law Proceedings (OALP) by submitting a petition for review. To submit a request, go online to <https://www.in.gov/oalp/>, select that you are an individual filing for a petition for review. Then:
  - a. Fill out the online form via the link at the bottom of the page (you will be asked to upload a copy of the violation determination);
  - b. Download a paper copy of the request form and mail it to OALP; or
  - c. Personally appear at OALP's office located at 100 N. Senate Avenue N802, Indianapolis, IN 46204.
17. OALP shall appoint an Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) to conduct an appeal hearing. The ALJ shall issue an order to parties setting a date for the appeal hearing.
18. OALP's assigned ALJ shall issue a final order concluding the Administrative Review.
19. Either party wishing to appeal the ALJ's final order may file for judicial review of the order. Any judicial review shall take place in a competent court situated in Marion County, Indiana.

#### GRIEVANCE

20. Within twenty-four (24) hours of observing any suspected infraction, Exhibitors competing in an Open Class competition shall personally present a Grievance Form (found at [www.indianastatefair.com](http://www.indianastatefair.com)) to the Entry Office in the Communications Building. No other persons have standing to present a Grievance Form. In all cases of grievance affecting an exhibitor, the statement must be verified.
21. A grievance must also be personally presented to the Entry Office within 24 hours of the occurrence of the suspected infraction for all livestock activities and for all other activities prior to the official closing of the State Fair (5 pm the last Sunday of the Fair). In the event a grievance is presented after judging has begun on the item or activity in question, the judging will proceed, and the grievance will be handled as if the grievance were presented following the judging.
22. A grievance must be presented in writing, verified and accompanied by a \$500 cash or money order made out to the Indiana State Fair. The grievance must state the name of the exhibitor, the exhibit and class in question, the specific reason for ineligibility and the terms and conditions that govern the case.
23. The \$500 will be returned if the grievance is upheld. The \$500 will be forfeited if the grievance is not sustained.
24. The Executive Director or their designee shall notify, in writing and within 15 days of receiving the grievance, the person(s) submitting the grievance as to his/her determination of the validity of the grievance and the actions taken as a result of upholding the grievance. If the grievance is denied, the notifications shall state the reasons for denial.
25. The person(s) submitting the grievance shall have the due process rights set forth in the Due Process section of this Entry Book.

#### JUDGES AND JUDGING

26. The awards will be made by judges who are hired by the Executive Director or their designee.
27. The time at which the judges will pass upon the different classes is determined by the Executive Director or their designee. All exhibition times are subject to change without announcement.
28. Any exhibit not presented promptly when called will be ruled out.
29. The judge, must, if any attempt be made by an exhibitor or his agent to interfere with or influence his decision, report the fact at once to the Executive Director or their designee.
30. An exhibitor who removes a placing ribbon, or authorizes another person to do so, in the presence of the judge, or in any manner insults the judge, shall forfeit all premiums, and be excluded from exhibiting, and the Fair Board may impose any additional penalty it so desires.
31. **Regardless of the number of entries in each class by one exhibitor, only two premiums will be paid in any of the single classes and only one premium in any of the group classes.**
32. Judges shall not award prizes to unworthy exhibits, whether there is competition or not, nor shall they award premiums on articles incorrectly entered or incorrectly named.

#### APPEALS FROM DECISIONS OF JUDGES

33. The right of an exhibitor to appeal the decision of a judge will exist only when it is charged that the award has been made in violation of the terms and conditions governing the exhibit, or when it is charged that the decision of the judges has been influenced or interfered with by another person.
34. The appellant must give verbal notice to the Executive Director or their designee in which the judging occurred within 2 hours of the judging. The written appeal as described below must be received within 24 hours of the verbal notice. The written appeal must be given to the Entry Office.
35. Appeals from the decision of a judge must be made in writing and must contain at least one specific charge, stating at length the facts relied upon and the term and condition violated, and naming witnesses and their addresses by whom proof is to be made.
36. The Executive Director or their designee shall notify the exhibitor in writing within 15 days of receipt of the appeal as to their findings and actions resulting therein.
37. The exhibitor shall have the due process rights forth in the Due Process section of the Entry Book.

#### PREMIUMS

38. **Premium checks will be mailed in October for all departments.**
39. Premiums will be paid according to official judges' result sheets and payable to exhibitor name as entered.
40. To expedite delivery of premiums, any exhibitor receiving \$600.00 or more in monetary awards will be required to provide the Indiana State Fair with a completed IRS Form W-9 (W-8BEN for foreign exhibitors) providing a taxpayer identification number. Failure to provide this information will result in the forfeiture of all premium monies. Forms may be picked up at the Barn Offices, at the Entry Office in the Communications Building, or found on the IRS website [www.irs.gov](http://www.irs.gov).
41. Questions and/or discrepancies noted in issued premium checks must be addressed to the Indiana State Fair Entry Department prior to **December 1, 2025** for resolution. Premium records will be considered closed on **December 1, 2025** and any exhibitor right of protest or re-issue is thereafter relinquished. A \$35.00 handling charge will be subtracted from a replacement check if check is lost, shredded, not cashed timely etc. **Premium checks must be cashed within 90 days of receipt.**

#### LOSS OR DAMAGE Waiver

42. It is mutually agreed that the Indiana State Fair assumes no liability for any loss of property or any claim for personal injury, including death. The exhibitor herein agrees to release, discharge and indemnify the Indiana State Fair Commission, its component members, and their successors from liability by reason of injury to property and/or persons, including death, which may occur within or upon the premises herein described in any manner connected with use thereof by exhibitor.

## Department Terms & Conditions

1. **Indiana State Fair General Terms and Conditions** – By entering exhibits at the Indiana State Fair, you agree to the Indiana State Fair General Terms and Conditions.
2. **Indiana Arts General Terms and Conditions** – Please read the Indiana Arts Department Terms and Conditions, as well as each section's terms and conditions. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to be familiar with and understand all terms and conditions concerning exhibition.
3. **Conflict of Terms and Conditions** – In the event of conflict between general and departmental terms and conditions, the latter will govern.
4. **Exhibitor Qualifications** - Entries in the Indiana Arts Department are limited to present residents of the state of Indiana.
5. **Disqualifications** – Any item that is disqualified will not be displayed during the Indiana State Fair.
6. **Disputes** – Should any dispute arise, the Indiana State Fair Executive Producer, Program and Exhibits Manager or Department Superintendent's decision is final.
7. **Damaged/Lost Items** – The Indiana State Fair Commission is not responsible for any damaged or lost items.
8. **Admission** – All exhibitors entering the Fairgrounds on or after Friday, August 2nd, must pay admission or an exhibitor ticket is required. Any exhibitor leaving the Fairgrounds, wishing to return the same day must obtain a hand stamp from the gate attendant or pay admission to re-enter. This policy will be strictly enforced. Pass outs are not permitted after 8:00pm.
9. **Exhibit Drop off** - Exhibitors that have a check-in times during the Fair will receive the necessary unloading pass and admission ticket to enter the grounds on those dates specified.
10. **Judging** - Judging will be based on workmanship, preparation, and cleanliness of articles for exhibit, suitability for purpose, and beauty and originality of design as well as harmony of colors materials. Judges shall not award prizes to unworthy exhibits, whether there be competition or not. Exhibitors will not be allowed to be in the building while judging is taking place. They will also not be allowed to talk to the judges about the exhibit pieces. The judge is the "judge and jury" and will have the final decision on exhibit pieces.
11. **Premiums** - Premiums are awarded on a class by class basis. Please review class listings for premium assignments. Regardless of the number of entries that placed in a class by one exhibitor, the exhibitor will only receive two premiums for that one class.

## Entry Information

1. All entries must be made in accordance with the terms and conditions.
2. **Online Entry** - To enter the Indiana State Fair, please go to <https://exhibitorscorner.indianastatefair.com/> and enter online. Each exhibitor is required to pay an entry fee at the time of entry. An exhibitor will not be considered entered into the Indiana State Fair until payment is made in full. Payment can be made online with a valid credit card. Entries will not be accepted over the phone.
3. An Unloading permit/Load Out permit, and 6 admission tickets will be included with the department fee. Purchasing of Parking Passes are optional and are sold separately through Exhibitor's Corner.

4. **Entry Deadlines and Fees** – see below.

**Enter between May 19, 2025 – July 1, 2025**

- Department Fee: \$35 (includes unloading/load out permit if necessary and 6 admission tickets)
- Per Item Entry Fee: \$1.00 per class entered (except Professional Fine Arts Classes)
- Professional Fine Arts Per Item Entry Fee: \$3.00 per class entered in the Professional Fine Arts Division

**Enter between July 2, 2025 – July 26, 2025**

- Department Fee: \$55 (includes unloading /load out permit if necessary and 6 admission tickets)
- Per Item Entry Fee: \$1.50 per class entered (except Professional Fine Arts Classes)
- Professional Fine Arts Per Item Entry Fee: \$5.00 per class entered in the Professional Fine Arts Division

5. **NO ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER July 26, 2025, EXCEPT SPECIAL CULINARY CONTEST**

6. Exceptions regarding entry dates will be made for specialty culinary contest to the start of the competition. However, **pre-entry is strongly encouraged** to ensure a smooth and quick check-in.
7. Exhibits must be made or prepared by the exhibitor and shown in his or her own name (excluding the Antiques Division).
8. All exhibits must have been produced during the past three years and never before show in any division (excluding the Antiques Division). Items cannot be entered in multiple divisions.
9. Exhibits for which there is no classification will not be accepted.
10. Any article which is not entered in the proper section will be moved to correct section and class at check-in.
11. **Confirmation of Entry**- A confirmation email will be sent to the email address used to sign in for the account once entries have been paid in full.
12. **Exhibitor Packets**- Exhibitors will have the option to have their exhibitor packet sent to them electronically via email at no charge or have the packet mailed to them with an additional fee applied . Packets will include department information, admission tickets, unloading/load out permits, and any additional items that were purchased during time of registration. Electronic Packets (E-Packets) will be sent automatically as soon as the order has been submitted. If an exhibitor chose to have a copy of their packet mailed to them, the Indiana State Fair Entry Department will mail out the packet if the entry is made prior to July 12. Entering on July 12 or after, packets will only be mailed if there is sufficient return mail time based on the department’s arrival times. If a packet cannot be sent out, payment will have to be made to get into the fair, then packets can be picked up in the Entry Office. Refunds will not be given for gate admission and/or parking fees. Packet information will be available to all exhibitors by logging into their Exhibitor’s Corner account. Admission tickets, unloading/load out permits, and parking passes will be scanned when coming through a gate.

## Check-in and Exhibit Release Procedure

---

1. **Entry Tags** – The entry tag must be securely attached to each article before bringing it to the Fair. The Claim check attached to the tag serves as the exhibitor’s claim check for exhibit release. This should be removed at check-in.
2. **Exhibits** – if there is more than one item for an exhibit, fasten all articles securely together before bringing to exhibit check-in. an exhibit must only contain the number of pieces listed. Additional pieces will not be accepted.
3. **Check-in Schedule** – Please refer to the schedule below.
4. **Check-in** – Exhibits must be hand delivered to the Indiana Arts Building only on specified check-in dates. No early exhibits will be accepted.
5. **Exhibit Release** – No items will be released on Sunday, August 17 2025. Exhibits can be picked up Monday, August 18 – Tuesday, August 19. Exhibits not picked up by Tuesday, August 19 will become property of the Indiana State Fair, NO EXCEPTIONS. See designated release hours in the below schedule.
6. **Claiming of Exhibits** – Claim check or photo I.D. must be presented at the time of exhibit pick-up.

3. One entry per class.
4. Any exhibit not in clean or good condition will be disqualified.
5. No exhibit may be larger than 30" x 30" x 16" unless otherwise specified. Items must also weigh no more than 15 lbs.
6. Any item entered must not have been entered in the last 5 years. Classes termed "At Large" may only be used if there is not an existing class for the item.
7. NO BOXES will be accepted with exhibits except when stated in class list.
8. No writing, added labels or attached pictures on entry tags.

2. All entries suitable for hanging (pictures, wall hanging, etc.), must be ready to hang with hangers. Paintings must be wired. No sawtooth hangers. Exhibitors must provide stands or easels for items that need to be displayed as such.
3. Decorative art exhibits that are not hand painted will be disqualified. Decal and Airbrush work are not acceptable and will be disqualified. Designs may be original or painted from a pattern or in a class.
4. In Decorative Arts if the exhibitor has sold more than \$500 worth of work during this year, he/she must enter the professional class. Once an exhibitor has entered as a professional, he/she may not return to non-professional classes.
5. Artists who are in the Decorative Artists Painting/Teaching Profession or doing extended exhibiting or other professionally related activities, including basketry, are considered professional artists.
6. All Decorative Arts Items that are Holiday themed must be entered in classes that specifically include holiday items.
7. **An exhibitor may only enter 2 items per class in the Decorative Arts Division.**
8. Professional Fine Artists cannot enter Decorative Arts paintings. This includes Tole Painting, Watercolor or Holiday.
9. NO NEEDLE WORK – it will get disqualified.

1. Please read the Indiana State Fair, Indiana Arts Department and Professional Fine Arts Division Terms and Conditions. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to be familiar with and understand all terms and conditions concerning exhibition.
  2. All professional artists may choose to place their artwork up for sale in the gallery. 20% of the sale will go to the Indiana Arts Department and 80% to the artist. Exhibitor determines selling price for the art piece at check-in. The exhibitor **must fill out a consignment form and turn it in at check-in**. These forms are available online at [www.indianastatefair.com](http://www.indianastatefair.com) under the **Indiana Arts tab**. Items that are sold must remain in the gallery throughout the fair.
  3. **All work entered must be an original production of the exhibitor**. Copies of painting or published photographs are prohibited and will be disqualified. Artwork made from a kit is not acceptable in this division. Artwork must have been produced during the last 3 years.
- IMPORTANT**
4. A professional artist is defined as an artist or craftsman who is in the Arts and Crafts teaching profession or doing extensive exhibiting and selling of their work. Professional artists must enter under their legal name. Once exhibited as a professional in a class, an artist may not return to a non-professional status in that class.
  5. All drawings, paintings and prints must be appropriately framed. Paintings on Masonite or boards must be framed. Gallery wrap is acceptable. Items may be framed in glass or Plexiglas; however, it will not be replaced if broken.

Exhibitor determines selling price for the art piece at check-in. The exhibitor will be expected to fill out a consignment form and turn it in at check-in. These forms will be available at check-in, as well as online at [www.indianastatefair.com](http://www.indianastatefair.com). Items that are sold must remain in the gallery throughout the fair. Offering artwork for sale in the Non-Professional gallery does not change the exhibitor's status from Non-Professional to Professional. An exhibitor may continue to enter the Non-Professional Fine Arts Division unless his/her status changes to Professional as described in Terms and Conditions in the Professional Fine Arts Division.
3. Size limit of 48" height and 48" width, including frame, for all paintings, drawings, prints and other exhibits which are intended to be hung for display.

1. Please read the Indiana State Fair, Indiana Arts Department and Culinary Arts Division Terms and Conditions. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to be familiar with and understand all terms and conditions concerning exhibition.
2. **All entries must be accompanied by an accurate and complete a recipe.** All recipes must be typed on an 8 ½" x 11" sheet of paper. **Please include-** The entry #, category name (such as Cookies), class number and name (53 -chocolate chip without nuts) are TYPED AT THE TOP OF THE PAGE. Recipe comes next and include number of servings and prep time. Then please put your NAME, address & phone number AT THE BOTTOM OF THE PAGE.
3. All recipes become property of the Indiana State Fair
4. Punch hole in plate at edge and attach entry tag with twisty, place into a zip lock type bag, where class number, bar code and name can be easily seen. No scotch tape. Place recipe inside the bag, under the plate with your name folded under and visible through the plastic.
5. All food exhibits, except for decorated cakes and food preservation exhibits, will be disposed of by the Indiana Arts Department in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Indiana State Board of Health.
6. **New Food Safety Regulation:** Fillings, frostings, glazes and meringues are not permitted to contain cream cheese, sour cream, heavy cream or whipped cream if they are not fully cooked/baked. These items are allowed as ingredients in food products IF the final product is cooked/baked. Additionally, raw milk, raw milk products or uncooked eggs/egg whites are not permitted. Eggs/egg whites that have been cooked to 160 degrees F (i.e. pasteurized OR included as part of a batter and baked) are acceptable. No home-canned fruits, vegetables or meats are permitted as ingredients in food products.
7. Contestants should carefully wash their hands and make sure that their hands do not have any open cuts before preparing foods.
8. **If you enter in youth, you cannot enter as an adult in the same category.**
9. **A recipe can only be entered in one class.**
10. More than one different recipe may be entered in the same class. For example, you may enter 2 different recipes of chocolate chips cookies in the same class.
11. **All culinary ribbons MUST be picked up during the fair or at exhibit release. Ribbons will no longer be mailed.**
12. An exhibit entered in the incorrect class may be transferred to the appropriate class at the discretion of the department coordinator prior to the start of judging.
13. NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED. Exhibits must be checked in with the food.

4. Punch hole in plate at edge and attach tag with twisty, place into a zip lock type bag, where class number and name can be easily seen. No scotch tape.
5. All food exhibits, except for decorated cakes and food preservation exhibits, will be disposed of by the Indiana Arts Department in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Indiana State Board of Health.
6. Food Safety Regulation: Fillings, frostings, glazes and meringues are not permitted to contain cream cheese, sour cream, heavy cream or whipped cream if they are not fully cooked/baked. These items are allowed as ingredients in food products IF the final product is cooked/baked. Additionally, raw milk, raw milk products or uncooked eggs/egg whites are not permitted. Eggs/egg whites that have been cooked to 160 degrees F (i.e. pasteurized OR included as part of a batter and baked) are acceptable. No home-canned fruits, vegetables or meats are permitted as ingredients in food products.
7. Contestants should carefully wash their hands and make sure that their hands do not have any open cuts before preparing foods.
8. Exhibitors in Youth Culinary Arts Division is open to contestants in grades 1-12 or 17 and under as determined by the 2023-2025 school year
9. **If you enter in adult category you cannot enter in youth in the same category. Recipes can only be entered in ONE category.**
10. **New for this year: In Sponsored Culinary Contests Division- YOUTH King Arthur Baking Company Contest – Cookies, Peach Cupcakes Contest, Wings & Sauce Contest and Burton's Maplewood Farm: Cooking with Maple Syrup are open to contestants of any age.**

## CHOCOLATE CRINKLE COOKIES (YOUTH ONLY)

- 2 cups white sugar
- 1 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
- ½ cup vegetable oil
- 4 large eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 2 cups of King Arthur All-Purpose Flour

Gently combine and form a very shaggy dough. Dump the dough onto a lightly floured work surface. Very gently knead the dough until just beginning to combine. Gently form the dough into an approximately 1.5-inch thick disk. Slice into 8 triangles and place each triangle 2 inches apart on the baking sheet. Freeze for 15 minutes. Lightly brush each scone

with buttermilk. Bake the scones for 18-25 minutes, or until golden brown on the bottom and slightly golden on top.

#### OBJECTIVE:

- Adult Team - To prepare washed or unwashed fleece for spinning then weave it into a Shawl in a four (4) hour time limit.
- Youth Team - To prepare washed or unwashed fleece for spinning then weave it into a Scarf in a four (4) hour time limit.

**FLEECE:** A natural colored washed or unwashed fleece that has been skirted may be used. Teams will furnish their own fleece. The fleece will be prepared during the contest for spinning by flicking, teasing or hand carding.

No teasing of fleece prior to contest.

**EQUIPMENT:** Team member may use flickers or hand cards only. Any foot powered or hand powered spinning equipment may be used. A standard harness table or floor loom whose major functions including; operation, selection and sequencing that are manually controlled are permitted. A maximum of four (4) harnesses may be used and only direct tie up is allowed. (NO DOBBY OR FLY SHUTTLE PERMITTED). Design, color and pattern of shawl will be determined by each team.

Each team will have one table in their area that will need to be covered to the floor, that will be used for team display and poster and then to finish shawl once off the loom.

**WARP:** Will consist of washed or unwashed, single or two-ply natural color or naturally dyed handspun wool to be spun ahead of time by a team member(s). The loom should be pre-warped before the start of the contest.

NO WEAVING OF HEADERS BEFORE CONTEST. NO FRINGE MAKERS ALLOWED.

**WEFT:** Will consist of single or two-ply washed or unwashed wool, may be naturally dyed, to be spun by team members during the time limits of the contest.

**SIZE:** Adult Team - Shawl woven area will be 20-22 inches wide and 76-78 inches long. Youth Team - Scarf woven area will be 8-10 inches wide and 62-64 inches long. A point will be deducted for each inch over or under.

**FRINGE:** in addition to the woven area, shawl or scarf must have appropriate fringe finish to be created during the time limits of the contest.

**ADULT TEAM:** There shall be no substitution of team members after the contest has started.

**YOUTH TEAM:** Once contest has begun the team may do substitutions if there are extra youth who want to participate, however there will continue to be only six (6) team members working at all times.

Judges and team captains only will meet at 9:30 am for any questions or clarifications. Teams must be set up by 9:45 am for inspection of the wool and equipment. All premium winning shawls and scarves will be auctioned off with the money going to the individual teams. Remaining teams have the option to auction their shawls and scarves.

Decisions of the judges will be final.

Teams are to bring a sign with Team's name to be kept at the team's location.

Only Juniors, Seniors, and Adults can enter these classes:

- e. One-piece garment: dress, jumper, outerwear jacket, coat, or cape.
- f. Two-piece outfit: outerwear coat, jacket, cape; blouse/shirt/vest or sweater with dress, jumper, skirt, pants, or shorts.
- g. Ensemble: 3 or more garments worn together at one time: outerwear coat, jacket, cape; blouse/shirt, vest and/or sweater with dress, jumper, skirt, pants, or shorts.

Pre Teens may enter:

- h. Dress, jumper, skirt, pants, shorts, vest, sweater, shirt/blouse, jacket, or a combination of garments. **No wool testing required for pre-teen class.**

### **Judging Criteria:**

- The Make it with Wool class will be based on fit and overall appearance, construction quality, coordination of fabric/yarn with garment style and design, creativity in design and use of wool and contestant's presentation.

### **Requirements:**

- For pre teen, junior, senior and adult contestants, they must construct and model their own garment(s).
- To be eligible, a garment/outfit/ensemble must have been completed after January 1 of the state contest year.
- On the day of the contest, items must be checked in by 9:30 am.

### **Wool Testing:**

**IMPORTANT**

Wool fabric or yarn used to construct outfits in only the Junior, Senior and Adult classes will be tested for wool content. A minimum of 60% wool or specialty wool fiber must be used. Pre teens or Made for Others do not have the wool test requirement.

- Please send 5x5 fabric swatch or 12-inch yarn sample with \$7.00 fee for each swatch to the state for testing. Testing must be completed prior to the day of the contest.
- Please send swatch with your entry fee no later than July 1, 2025, to ensure timely testing.

### **Fees for MIWW Class:**

- \$10.00 state entry fee made payable to "Indiana Sheep Association"
- \$12.00 national entry fee made payable to "National MIWW" are required for this category.

**Note: 4-H project garment that complies with the wool contest rules also may be entered in the state MIWW contest. Even 4-hers that do not advance to State Fair at the county level can still enter with-in this open division.**

**2. Wearable Accessories Class** – An accessory that can be worn with an outfit and may include but not limited to hats, scarfs, purses, shoes, jewelry, lapel pins, scarves, hat decorations, vests when only making a vest.

**Requirements:**

- Wool or yarn used for the accessory class must be at least 60% wool. **No wool testing required for this class.**
- All items must be made during the contest year.
- On the day of the contest, items must be checked in by 9:30 am.

**Fees for Wearable Accessories Class:** \$10.00 state entry fee with entry form made payable to “Indiana Sheep Association”

**3. Home Décor Class** - Any item that can decorate your home including hooked rugs, pillows, wool quilts, table runners, seat covers, placemats, wall hangings, afghans, lamp shades and more! After all...wool is versatile!! You may sew, hook, knit, crochet...let your creativity soar!

**Requirements:**

- Any wool home décor item may be entered.
- Wool content should be 60% or more.
- All visible sides of item must be wool with the exception of backings and or trim.
- Size of item must be relevant to article.
- You may enter as many items as you wish. For example, a **SET** of 4 placemats will be considered as one item and only needs **ONE** entry fee. If you decide to also enter a quilt, then it will require a separate entry fee.
- All items must be made during the contest year.
- On the day of the contest, items must be checked in by 9:30 am.

**Fees for Home Décor Class:** Each entry fee will be \$10.00 made payable to “Indiana Sheep Association.” No National MIWW fees required for this category.

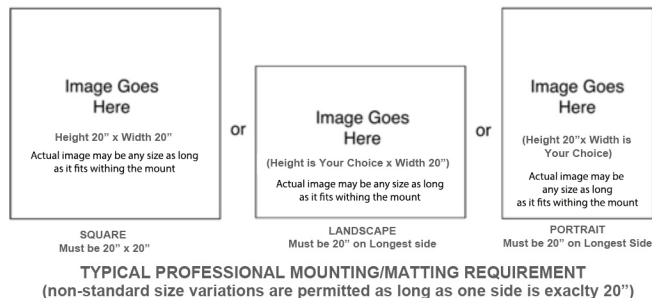

### Photography Division Terms & Conditions: READ CAREFULLY

1. Please read the Indiana State Fair, Indiana Arts Department and Photography Division Terms and Conditions. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to be familiar with and understand all terms and conditions concerning the exhibition. Entries not meeting specified requirements will be disqualified and not hung.
2. Category Descriptions:
  - a. Professional – Photographers engaged in creating prints for payment regardless of the percentage of the total income.
  - b. Amateur – Photographers who do not sell their work
  - c. Youth – Grades 7-12
  - d. Elementary – Grades 1-6
  - e. University – Enrolled in a College, University or Trade School
  - f. Camera Club – Camera Club Group, Guild, Society. Entries must be from 5 different members of the club. Print entered in Camera Club **may not be entered in an individual category as well.**
3. Professional vs. Amateur – Any person who promotes the sale of their images through any means, must enter the professional categories regardless of the percentage of his or her total income. Amateurs will be asked to sign a release stating they do not solicit photography jobs for monetary gains. Professionals entering in Amateur class may be disqualified or reassigned to the Professional categories.
4. This contest is open to all photographers, both professional and amateur alike
5. All entry final image must have been created during the past three years and have never been shown in any Indiana State Fair competition division or Photography Division category.
6. **Number of prints**
  - a. **Professional Categories – Up to 3 prints, 1 album and 1 State Fair Special Category (5 items)** can be entered by a single exhibitor in the Photography Division. **NOTE: Album and State Fair Special Category scores will not be included towards overall scoring for Top Ten Photographer in the Professional Category.**
  - b. **Amateur Categories – Up to 3 prints and 1 State Fair Special Category (4 items)** can be entered by a single exhibitor in the Amateur Photography Division.
  - c. **Camera Club Categories –** Limit 5 different prints per club submitted by 5 different club members. Club submissions (all 5 prints) must be submitted under the Club name by a **singular** club official.
  - d. No print or image may be entered in more than one category or division. No exceptions.
7. **All class changes are the responsibility of the exhibitor to arrange with the State Fair's Indiana Arts Office on the first floor of the building prior to check-in with the Photography Division on the 3rd floor. New entry "tags" must be printed by that office and the exhibitor must attach to the back of their print(s) prior to check-in.**
8. **Print Sizes and Mounting:** (for special instructions see the link or QR code at the bottom of this section.)
  - a. **Professional Category** – Mounted prints entered must measure exactly 20 inches on the longest side. The maximum size accepted would be 20" x 20". Image within the mount may be any size. Prints must be mounted on a solid photographic mount board or foam core. No Masonite, corrugated cardboard or thin poster board. No metal or glass. **Thickness not to exceed 3/16."**

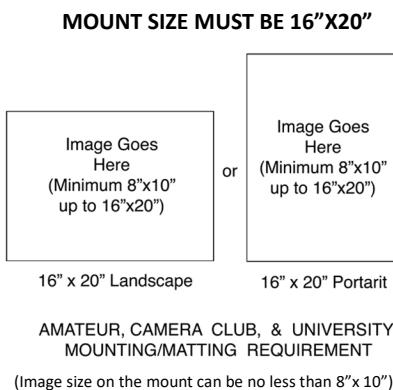

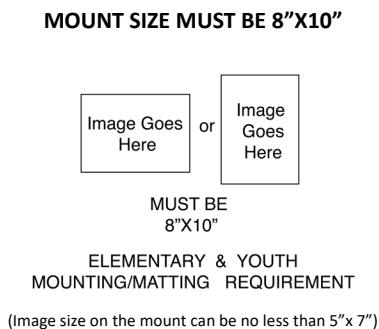




- b. **Amateur Category & University** – Minimum image area of 8" x 10" to a maximum of 16" x 20". **The entry must be mounted on a solid photographic mount board or foam core measuring exactly 16" x 20"**. No Masonite, corrugated cardboard or thin poster board. No metal or glass. **Thickness not to exceed 3/16"**



- c. **Youth and Elementary Categories** – Minimum image area of 5" x 7" to a maximum of 8" x 10". **The entry must be mounted on a solid photographic mount board or foam core measuring exactly 8" x 10"**. No Masonite, corrugated cardboard or thin poster board. No metal or glass. **Thickness not to exceed 3/16"**



- d. **Camera Club Category** – (see diagram with Amateur & University) - Minimum image area of 8" x 10" to a maximum of 16" x 20". **The entry must be mounted on a solid photographic mount board or foam core measuring exactly 16" x 20"**. No Masonite, corrugated cardboard or thin poster board. No metal or glass. **Thickness must not exceed 3/16"**. **MOUNT SIZE MUST BE 16"X20"**
- e. **Thickness** on all images must not exceed **3/16 of an inch**. Digital Mats are preferred for handling purposes, but overlay mats are acceptable as long as the total thickness of exhibits is no more than 3/16". Overlay mats must be attached on all 4 sides. Exhibitors should be aware that double faced tape, or a thin layer of spray glue will not hold up in high heat and humidity. Entries that fall apart before or during judging will be disqualified. If your entry does not meet these standards, the entry will be disqualified and not hung.

9. **Entry tag must be placed on the back upper left-hand corner of the entry. Placement of the tag determines the orientation of the print.**
10. Print titles should be written on the top on the back of the print.
  11. Name, previous awards, seals, ribbons or any other identification may not appear on the front of the entry. No prints in frames, under glass, plastic covers or shrink wrap will be accepted. No hangers, rough, raised or sticky substance on the back or the front of the prints .
  12. Prints previously displayed at the Indiana State Fair may not be entered again.
  13. No two (2) prints shall be of the same subject matter unless treatment is such as to produce two entirely different photos.
  14. The official judges will assign points to each entry. The highest score will determine awards and premiums.
  15. The Indiana Arts Department Superintendent and State Fair Officials reserve the right to disqualify prints deemed to be in poor taste, or to remove after hung, if public complaints arise.

16. All possible care will be taken to safeguard the exhibits, but no responsibility will be assumed by the Indiana State Fair for any loss or damage in transit or while in our possession.
17. The original exposure and image must be that of the exhibitor. Copies of photographs or photographs taken during an instructional class will not be allowed.
18. It is the photographer's responsibility and not the obligation of the Indiana State Fair nor IPPG to secure a release of any individual in a photograph. Likewise, permission in the form of a written release is required for any photograph on private property including Rail Road property.
19. **VERY IMPORTANT** All photographic entries must be created by the entrant. Photographs created in any part by the use of Artificial Intelligence (i.e., not by the use of a camera) will be automatically disqualified. Artificial Intelligence is commonly abbreviated as "AI."

### Judging:

A 3-person panel composed of professional photographers will judge all photographs in each classification. The judges will have the authority to decide any question not specifically covered by these terms and conditions and their decision will be final. Judges also have the right to reclassify any print.

1. **Impact** is the sense one gets upon viewing an image for the first time. Compelling images evoke laughter, sadness, anger, pride, wonder or another intense emotion. There can be impact in any of these 12 elements.
2. **Technical excellence** is the print quality of the image itself as it is presented for viewing. Retouching, manipulation, sharpness, exposure, printing, mounting, and correct color are some items that speak to the qualities of the physical print.
3. **Creativity** is the original, fresh, and external expression of the imagination of the maker by using the medium to convey an idea, message or thought.
4. **Style** is defined in a number of ways as it applies to a creative image. It might be defined by a specific genre or simply be recognizable as the characteristics of how a specific artist applies light to a subject. It can impact an image in a positive manner when the subject matter and the style are appropriate for each other, or it can have a negative effect when they are at odds.
5. **Composition** is important to the design of an image, bringing all the visual elements together in concert to express the purpose of the image. Proper composition holds the viewer in the image and prompts the viewer to look where the creator intends. Effective composition can be pleasing or disturbing, depending on the intent of the image maker.
6. **Presentation** affects an image by giving it a finished look. The mats and borders used, either physical or digital, should support and enhance the image, not distract from it.
7. **Color Balance** supplies harmony to an image. An image in which the tones work together, effectively supporting the image, can enhance its emotional appeal. Color balance is not always harmonious and can be used to evoke diverse feelings for effect.
8. **Center of Interest** is the point or points on the image where the maker wants the viewer to stop as they view the image. There can be primary and secondary centers of interest. Occasionally there will be no specific center of interest, when the entire scene collectively serves as the center of interest.
9. **Lighting** —the use and control of light—refers to how dimension, shape and roundness are defined in an image. Whether the light applied to an image is manmade or natural, proper use of it should enhance an image.
10. **Subject Matter** should always be appropriate to the story being told in an image.
11. **Technique** is the approach used to create the image. Printing, lighting, posing, capture, presentation media, and more are part of the technique applied to an image.
12. **Story Telling** refers to the image's ability to evoke imagination. One beautiful thing about art is that each viewer might collect his own message or read her own story in an image.

### Classifications:

#### PROFESSIONAL

**Portrait** – An image of an individual or group

**Wedding** – An image taken with a wedding theme

**Commercial** – An image taken for advertising, product, or POS

**Open** – Creative, experimental, any subject, and any technique excluding Artificial Intelligent (AI) created images and other components not of the photographer's own making

**Nature** – An image that the main subject is animals, insects, landscapes, or plants

**Album/Book** – Album or book of images that tell a story of a person, couple, place, or pet

**Pets** – An image of a domesticated pet. May be posed or staged

**Photographic Artist** -- Prints using more than one element in an image/print not taken by the photographer that aid in telling a visual story may be entered in the Photographic Artist class. **Guides of small thumbnail images must be included** showing all elements used in the creation of the larger image. These prints are judged on the total artwork. The final image is judged by the same 12 elements

### Critiques

Print critiques may be purchased for an additional fee. Interested entrants must sign up for critiques when dropping off their prints for competition (not when registering online) and prior to the official opening of the State Fair.

### Live Streaming

Live Streaming on the day of Judging will be offered at an additional cost. Competition entrants must be sign up for this option when submitting their prints for competition. (not when registering online)

**Clarification of scoring:** Numeric scores are determined by the judges. Any score of 80 or above not awarded a 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, or 3<sup>rd</sup> place ribbon shall be awarded Honorable Mention.

**Indiana Photographer of the Year:** This is awarded in the professional division only to a professional photographer with the highest case score (total of three images entered not including State Fair Theme print or album).

**Scoring Ties:** When necessary, the judges will determine the placement of all ties.

# INDIANA STATE FAIR

## Safety Information

All emergencies, safety concerns and suspicious activity should be reported immediately to the Indiana State Fair Operations Center at (317) 927-7520.

### Prohibited Items

- No alcoholic beverages may be brought on to the Fairgrounds during the annual Indiana State Fair.
- No person in possession of a deadly weapon shall be permitted onto or be permitted to remain on the Fairgrounds, unless that person can demonstrate that the deadly weapon is intended for sale or trade at an event that is taking place on the Fairgrounds (Indiana Administrative Code, Title 80, Section 11-2-2(b)).
  - The definition of a deadly weapon includes firearms, knives or sharp bladed items (regardless of blade length), or any object carried or possessed with the intent to be used as a deadly weapon.
  - Exhibitors will be permitted to carry and use knives and other tools necessary for the proper care of their animals, tack, and equipment. However, these items may only be carried within the confines of the barn in which the animal(s) is housed. Knives and other tools carried outside of the barn are subject to confiscation under the deadly weapon rules found in the Indiana Administrative Code, Title 80, Section 11-2-2.
- Any deadly weapon found in the possession of a person while on the Fairgrounds is subject to immediate confiscation by persons authorized to provide security protection services as well as city, county, and state police agencies. Federal, state, or local law enforcement officers or those employed or authorized by the Indiana State Fair Commission are excepted from this rule (Indiana Administrative Code, Title 80, Section 11-2-2 (a), (c), and Section 11-2-3 (1) and (2)).
- Any person properly licensed to carry a firearm must secure the firearm in a locked compartment of his/her vehicle and it shall not be visible to passersby (Indiana Administrative Code, Title 80, Section 11-2-2(d)).
- No generators (not attached to a working/in transit RV/trailer/living quarters) or animal scales are permitted on the Fairgrounds except those furnished by the State Fair.

### Animal Policies & Procedures

- The only animals permitted on the Fairgrounds during the Indiana State Fair are animals registered, boarded or entered for exhibition, show or other competition; animals that will be used in a scheduled performance or to perform work at the Fair; law enforcement animals and service animals. Household and family pets, whether domestic or wild, and service animals not recognized by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Section 36.104 are not permitted on the Fairgrounds during the Indiana State Fair. No person in possession of or having control over an unauthorized animal shall be permitted onto or be permitted to remain on the Fairgrounds (Indiana Administrative Code, Title 80, Section 11-2-4).
- Animals entered for exhibition, show or competition and animals scheduled to perform must remain in approved areas at all times. Violation may be disqualifiable offenses. See individual department terms and conditions for more specific information.

### General Safety Policies & Procedures

- Smoking is not permitted inside barns and buildings. Smoking is only permitted in designated areas on the Fairgrounds.
- Cameras are located throughout the Fairgrounds for security and promotional purposes.
- Motorized vehicles, including golf carts, are not permitted in any barns or buildings (IFC 313.1). This does not apply to personal mobility devices. A valid State issued driver's license is required to operate a motorized vehicle including a golf cart on the Fairgrounds.
- Fans are permitted, so long as they have safety-approved shrouds. See individual department requirements pertaining to size, allowable number, and placement of fans.

### Tents, Canopies, & Stall Coverings

- Any tent, canopy, or stall covering in a building must be made of a material to allow for or not block water distribution as well as meet or exceed NFPA Standard 701.
- A portable fire extinguisher must be located under each tent, canopy, or covering.

### Fire Safety

- The Indiana State Fire Marshal's Office conducts regular inspections of all barns and buildings during the Indiana State Fair to identify any potential fire hazards or threats to life safety. The decisions of the fire marshal are final and will be enforced.
- Fire extinguishers are located throughout every barn and building. They may be used for approved purposes only. Do not use a fire extinguisher if you are not trained on its proper use.
- Most buildings and barns are equipped with fire alarm and/or fire suppression systems. In the event of a fire, these systems should be activated.
- Emergency exits are clearly marked in all barns and buildings. In the event of an emergency, calmly evacuate through the nearest

- accessible emergency exit.
- Do not store tack/supplies in primary aisle or in front of exit doors.

### **Severe Weather**

- In the event of severe weather impacting the Fairgrounds, be it a severe thunderstorm or tornado, you may receive instructions over the barn or building public address system. If the barn or building is not equipped with a public-address system, State Fair staff will notify people in person.
- During a severe weather situation, you will be asked to remain inside, away from windows and doors whenever possible. Staff may be instructed to close all doors and windows, including overhead doors.
- Larger barns and buildings will be used for shelter-in-place (points of refuge) to allow Fairgoers to seek shelter. This may cause an influx of people into livestock areas and result in the postponement of a show or exhibition. Exhibitors should be mindful of this, keep aisles and walkways clear, and tend to their animals accordingly.

### **Food Preparation/Cooking Policies & Procedures**

- Cooking inside and adjacent to barns and buildings is not advised. The Indiana State Fair Biosecurity plan recommends that food be excluded from animal areas. If cooking and/or food preparation is necessary, the following policies and procedures must be followed:
  - Cooking devices that use open flames, including charcoal and gas grills, exposed heating elements and non-electric power/fuel sources are not permitted inside or outside barns or buildings.
  - Approved cooking devices are limited to crockpots, or similar slow cookers, and microwave ovens. Cooking devices must have a cover approved for use with the device and comply with all applicable electrical and fire codes. Cooking devices are also required to be powered by approved cords that are not frayed or malfunctioning in any way.
  - Exhibitors cooking in the barns and buildings do so at their own risk and assume all liability for their actions concerning food contamination from pathogens that may be present in or near a livestock area.

### **Extension Cords**

- Extension Cords shall not be a substitute for permanent wiring. IFC 2012 (605.4.1)
- Extension Cords shall not be affixed to structures. IFC 2012 (605.5)
- Extension Cords shall not extend through walls, ceilings, doorways, or floors. IFC 2012 (605.5)
- Extension Cords shall not be buried under carpet or animal bedding.

### **Multi-plug Adapter/Power Strip**

- Multi-plug adapter(s) are prohibited. IFC 2012 (605.4)
- Power strip(s) shall be grounded and be equipped with overcurrent protection. IFC 2012 (605.4.1)
- Power strip shall be directly connected to an electrical outlet (no piggy-backing). IFC 2012 (605.4.2)
- Power strip cords shall not extend through walls, ceilings, doorways, or floors. IFC 2012 (605.4.3)

### **Animal Wellness & Care**

The Animal Wellness & Care Plan (AWAC) was established to reinforce the Indiana State Fair's commitment and belief in the proper treatment of all animals in exhibition. The Indiana State Fair holds exhibitors of the various species of animals being exhibited to the highest standards in wellness, care and ethics of exhibition. The AWAC is responsible for ensuring the most up to date standards as well as to be a source for the public to seek answers to their questions relating to the health and safety of the animals involved in the Indiana State Fair. Failure or refusal by an exhibitor or fairgoer to comply with the Animal Wellness & Care Plan can result in penalties up to and including but not limited to removal and a ban from the Fairgrounds for the duration of the event.

### **Biosecurity**

The Indiana State Fair Biosecurity Plan was developed to prevent the outbreak of diseases carried by both animals and humans that spread pathogens that can be transmitted to and from farm animals, as well as through the food supply. Many diseases and pathogens can be prevented through maintaining the cleanliness of facilities and encouraging good hygiene. The Biosecurity Plan will be enforced during the Indiana State Fair and all exhibitors are expected to carryout and preform basic biosecurity and hygienic task including:

- Hand Washing/sanitizing following exposure to animals and always before consuming food or drinks
- Excluding human food and food preparation from animal areas
- Maintaining general cleanliness of animals and animal areas
- Properly disposing of animal waste/soiled bedding in properly identified/designated areas
- Cleaning-up after your animal if it soils/has a biological event in a building/Fair common space
- Reporting the appearance or evidence of animal/human sickness or distress to Fair officials

Failure or refusal to comply with the above can result in penalties up to and including but not limited to removal and a ban from the Fairgrounds for the duration of the event.

The Indiana State Fair is committed to providing opportunities for all 4-H participants to show their animals as part of the State Fair. The State Fair also wants to ensure the integrity of its 4-H competitions as is evidenced by the various terms and conditions set forth in this Entry Book, including its policy with respect to testing for unauthorized substances in certain animals that are entered into these competitions and the penalties associated with positive results. By entering into these competitions, you agree to these terms and conditions and as such, we strongly recommend that you read this information carefully prior to submitting your entry.
