General Rules

- 1. It is a privilege to participate in the Jefferson County Fair. This privilege can be revoked for conduct unbecoming an exhibitor, parent, leader or volunteer. Exhibitors not adhering to rules may be disqualified, lose awards, premiums and/or lose eligibility to exhibit at the Jefferson County Fair.
- 2. It is the Exhibitor's responsibility to be aware of all dates, deadlines and updates which may be emailed or posted online at JcFairPark.com.
- The Jefferson County Fair Park Committee reserves the right to interpret the rules and regulations listed in this entry information.
- 4. The Jefferson County Fair Park is not responsible for LOST or STOLEN articles, or for INJURY or DEATH of livestock. Owners/exhibitors assume full responsibility. Exhibitors exhibit at their own risk.
- 5. The Jefferson County Fair Park has the right to publish, and copyright any exhibitors image (including audio, moving image or photography) for educational programs, websites, and promotion of its programs.
- 6. All rules apply to all departments unless stated otherwise.
- 7. Open and Senior department entries are open to Jefferson and adjoining county residents, as space permits.
- 8. Junior Exhibitors must be 8-19 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year and in good standings of the youth organization they represent in order to participate in the fair (with the exception of Future Exhibitors see Department #17). Jefferson County Fair Junior department entries are open to members of 4-H, FFA, a scouting program, a breed group, or another recognized youth organization under adult leadership which has an education program appropriate to that organization and is approved by the Fair prior to March 1st of the current Fair year.
 - * Youth age 8 who are not eligible to exhibit (animals) in Junior departments as a result of not meeting specific youth organization guideline must enter the Department #17 Future Exhibitor division to participate in the Jefferson County Fair.
- 9. All Divisions are limited to one entry under each Class unless otherwise stated.
- 10. No entry shall compete for more than one premium except showmanship (livestock exhibits).
- 11. Exhibits must be the result of the exhibitor's own labor or current Fair year projects (Fair to Fair) and may not have been shown at a previous Jefferson County Fair with the exception of animal projects.
- 12. Any exhibit containing illegal or protected materials will be disqualified.
- 13. Exhibits not fulfilling department rules and requirements may be disqualified or placings lowered. The Judge, Superintendent, and Fair Staff have the right to disqualify any exhibit.
- 14. Exhibitors entered in Face to Face Judging Divisions must be present when their exhibits are being judged.
- 15. Animal Exhibits:
 - Must be shown by the exhibitor unless special permission is granted by Fair Management because of a medical condition (i.e. broken leg) or conflicting JCF Junior division shows.
 - Animals not properly cleaned/groomed, halter broke or unsafe may be disqualified or forfeit premiums.
 - May not be unloaded or placed in housing facility until all necessary papers are checked by Fair Staff. Failure
 to do so may result in quarantine, disqualification and/or the animal being removed from the Fair Park.
 - Fitting: Only the exhibitor, immediate family (father, mother, grandparents, sibling or guardian), another
 Jefferson County Fair exhibitor or authorized organizational leader will be allowed to assist with show
 preparation/fitting at any time during the Fair. Animals may be fit in designated areas only. Additional Fitting
 Rules can be found under the Jefferson County Fair Ethics Policy.
 - Are at the risk of the exhibitor at all times. Proper animal husbandry management which includes feed, bedding, daily care and animal health is the responsibility of the exhibitor unless stated otherwise.
- 16. Premises ID number must be included at the time of entry submission.
- 17. All exhibits must be in place by the specified entry check-in deadline. Exhibits arriving after the deadline may not be eligible to be judged.
- 18. No advertising may be posted on any building unless approved by Fair Management.
- 19. Entry tags will be printed for non-animal classes and must be picked up at the Fair Office. Email updates will be sent when tags are available.
- 20. No tents or canopies allowed on the Fair Park grounds without prior approval of Fair Management unless part of designated camping which is authorized by Fair Management only.

Ethics Policy

1. Tampering, and/or inhumane treatment; and/or misrepresentation as to breeding, age, ownership and any irregularity in showing will be considered fraud and deception.

2. To maintain a high degree of confidence and integrity in the livestock shows, the Jefferson County Fair Park Committee reserves the right to disqualify any animal fitted in an unethical manner and/or disqualify the exhibitor. Unethical fitting shall include any injection of gas, solid or liquid to alter normal confirmation. In addition, it shall include any cutting or tearing of the hide, cutting or tearing underneath the hide or removal of tissue in any attempt to alter the shape or appearance. It shall also include attempts to disrupt or change normal dental development, dyeing or coloring hair, adding artificial tailheads, switches, polls, hair and heels, as well as any attempt to change the confirmation and degree of firmness by administration of fluids internally or externally in a liquid or solid state. The use of any medication not prescribed under a veterinarian's direction is prohibited.

3. All exhibitors, their immediate family and any other parties involved in the unethical fitting and showing of an animal will be subject to forfeiture of award(s) and premium(s), and/or dismissal from the Fair Park; and/or being barred from competition immediately in the department in which the violation has occurred and/or from all departments

entered; and/or in future competition at the Jefferson County Fair.

International Association of Fairs & Expositions (IAFE) National Code of Show Ring Ethics (Jefferson County Fair is a member of the IAFE)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to Junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, lengthof ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating there to is prohibited.
- 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs and livestock shows.
- Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in any event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other samples taken from live- stock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, it's integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collections and preservation, transfer to the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive orthreatening conduct toward them.
- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsibility person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions provided by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violationof federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Vehicle Parking, Livestock Trailer Parking & Camping Information

Vehicle Parking: Complimentary vehicle parking will be available outside the Fair Park fence in the North and Northwest parking lots. For an additional fee, limited vehicle parking for the duration of the Fair will be available for exhibitors and the general public in a designated location inside the Fair Park fence. To purchase inside the Fair Park parking please visit JcFairPark.com.

Livestock Trailers: Exhibitors may park animal trailers in a designated location during the Fair at no charge if a trailer parking form is submitted to Fair Management at JcFairPark.com.

Camping: Limited inside the Fair Park camping is available for animal exhibitors only. The camping application and rules can be found at JcFairPark.com or by calling the Fair Office 920-674-7148.

Animal Health Regulations Fairs and Shows in Wisconsin: 2024 Season

This is a summary of animal health requirements for fairs, shows and exhibitions. They are not necessarily the same as requirements for importing animals into Wisconsin or moving them within the state for other purposes. They may change if animal diseases occur in Wisconsin or elsewhere, so always check datcp.wi.gov or contact us for current information. Fairs or exhibitions may have additional requirements. Exhibitors should contact the event organizers for more information. Ref. s. ATCP 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code.

General requirements for event organizers

All fairs or exhibitions of any length must obtain, review, and keep for five years all required records and test results:

- Exhibitor's name and address
- Animal identification (number, type, description, and, when required, official identification (see requirements for different animals below))
- · Documents showing compliance with disease testing and other health requirements
- · Livestock premises number, if any, where animals originated
- Documentation showing legal importation to the event (if applicable) and, when required, movement to the event (see requirements for different animals below)
- · For swine, a record of any swine transported directly to a slaughtering establishment
- For swine, a record of any swine transported to an animal market where all animals sold at the market sale for that day were shipped directly to a slaughtering establishment

Fairs or exhibitions lasting more than 24 hours must appoint a licensed veterinarian to inspect all animals daily.

Note: Except in specific circumstances, if an animal already bears an official 840 eartag, that eartag must not be removed and additional official eartags must not be applied. Instead, the existing eartag must be read and recorded when a record of that animal is required. (Ref. s. ATCP 10.045, Wis. Admin. Code)

These regulations apply to all fairs and exhibitions, including additional events (like rodeos, shows, or other organized events) that occur in conjunction with the fair.

Diseases

Animals that show evidence of having contagious or infectious diseases may not be commingled (or housed/kept) with other animals at a fair, show, or other exhibition in such a way as to allow disease to spread. Such animals should not attend the fair, show, or exhibition.

Animals may be denied entry if they arrive at these events with contagious or infectious diseases, isolated and/or removed if they develop disease after arriving, or be subject to other action as would be necessary to control disease. (Ref. s. ATCP 10.08(1), Wis. Admin. Code)

Bovine animals with ringworm, mange, warts or scab will be removed from the fair or exhibition premises, unless the veterinarian in charge finds warts or ringworm lesions are incapable of transmitting disease.

Cattle and bison

Cattle from within Wisconsin have no requirements for tests or health documents.

Cattle from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s. ATCP 10.22, Wis. Admin. Code) must:

- Be accompanied by certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a documenting official animal identification (ID) and all required tests and certifications
- Have official individual ID (including steers)^b
- Meet all of Wisconsin's normal requirements for import (see https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs Services/CattleBison.aspx)

Acceptable animal IDsb for all cattle from outside Wisconsin

- USDA metal ear tag number that is part of the National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) (starts with state 2-digit code, also known as "brite" tag); this includes the orange brucellosis vaccination tag
- 15-digit "840" tags (visual or RFID)
- Valid only if applied before March 11, 2015:
 - Manufacturer-coded RFID tag 15-digit number with the first three digits in 900s
 - American ID tag 8 to 12-digit number prefaced with "USA"

Brucellosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin

No cattle from outside Wisconsin are currently required to be brucellosis tested or vaccinated to come to fairs and shows in Wisconsin

Tuberculosis (TB) requirements^c for cattle from outside Wisconsin

As of 1/1/23, all cattle from **Texas** and **Michigan's TB Free Zone** (for cattle from Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone see below), regardless of sex or age are required to have a negative TB test within 60 days prior to import.

Cattle from Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone – Alcona, Alpena, Montmorency, and Oscoda counties - (for cattle from Michigan's TB Free Zone, see requirements by state above) also need:

- Import permit^e
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older^c
- Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin^o
- A statement indicating the animals will return directly to the state of origin after the show^d.

Swine

Note: These regulations apply to all swine, including pet pigs and racing pigs.

Swine from within Wisconsin (Ref. s. ATCP 10.32(2) and 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code) need a Wisconsin intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a:

Note: Herd of origin means the herd in which the pigs currently reside, likely the exhibitor's herd. When pigs are purchased from a herd, the herd from which they originate is the herd of origin for the seller. Once the purchased pigs are added into the buyer's herd (even if the buyer's herd only consists of one or just a few animals), the buyer's herd becomes the new herd of origin and that herd must meet testing requirements to move pigs again.

- Stating that the entire herd of origin on the farm was inspected within 30 days before the show and no apparent disease was present at the time of inspection^d.
- Non-terminal Exhibitions: All swine must have a PRRS (Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome) and PEDv (Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus) test of the herd of origin within 90 days of the end of the exhibition^o. Include test date, type, and results on the CVI.
- Terminal Exhibitions: No testing requirements.^o

Note: Terminal Exhibitions are those at which all the swine go directly from the fair/show to the slaughtering establishment OR to a slaughter only market sale. If going to a slaughter only market sale, contact the Division of Animal Health fair inspector for required information to collect.

Note: If the fair intends to use a load-out facility, contact the Division of Animal Health in advance to discuss requirements that must be met.

Swine from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s. ATCP 10.30 and 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code) need a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a that includes the following:

- The negative results of the PRRS test^c from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results.
- The negative results of the PEDv test^o from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results.
- A statement that the veterinarian has inspected the entire herd of origin within the past 30 days and that no clinical signs of PRRS and PEDv or any other apparent disease was present at the time of inspection.^d
- Official individual identification (ID)^b

Acceptable methods of ID for swine areb:

- USDA silver ear tag
- USDA 840 ear tag, either visual or RFID
- Breed association tattoo if the pig is a purebred and the tattoo is registered
- An ear tag with the premises identification number and a unique identifier
- Ear notch if the pig is a purebred and the notch is registered

Note: Microchips are not accepted as official ID for any swine including pet pigs.

Sheep and goats

Note: These rules do not apply to non-domestic sheep and goats. See Exotic Ruminants below.

Sheep and goats from within Wisconsin need:

- If sexually intact, need official individual identification (ID)^b at any age.
- If not sexually intact, need official individual ID^b if they are 12 months or older.
- See below for Official ID options.
- Sheep and goats that go to a slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the slaughter establishment.

Sheep and goats from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.69, 10.76, Wis. Admin. Code) need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a and official individual ID^b for all animals.
- See below for Official ID options.
- See below for additional requirements for goats from Michigan's Tuberculosis Modified Accredited Zone.
- Sheep and goats that go to a slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the slaughter establishment.

Official Identification^b includes:

- Scrapie eartags (including tags on neckstraps for animals with absent/injured ears or with official tattoos – see DATCP Website*)
- USDA 840 ear tags
- Legible breed tattoos (see DATCP Website* and NOTE below)
- Legible scrapie tattoos (see DATCP Website* and NOTE below)
- Approved microchips (Electronic Identification/EID) There are many requirements that need to be met to use microchips including a requirement for accompanying tattoos. See DATCP Website* and NOTE below.
- NOTE: All sheep and goats that go through a market or to slaughter and require
 Official Identification must be eartagged with Official ID. Official ID in the form of a tattoo
 or Electronic Implantable Identification (EID) is no longer sufficient when moving through a
 market or going to slaughter.
- NOTE: If a Wisconsin origin animal is neutered, less than 12 months of age, and moving through a
 market after the fair, the market may require Official ID in the form of an ear tag.

Goats from Michigan's Tuberculosis (TB) Modified Accredited Zone –Alcona, Alpena, Montmorency, Oscoda counties- also need:

- Import permit^e
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older^c
- Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin^c
- A statement indicating the animals will return directly to the state of origin after the show.d

Equine

Equine animals from within Wisconsin need documentation of a negative EIA (Coggins) test^c done within the previous 12 months, which clearly identifies the animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip (if a reader is available). No test is needed for nursing foals accompanying negative dams. Documentation may be:

- Official test report VS 10-11, or
- USDA-approved electronic test form, or
- Global Vet Link EIA electronic form, or
- · Certificate of veterinary inspection with the test results listed

Equine animals from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.36, Wis. Admin. Code) need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a which clearly identifies^b the
 animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip
- Negative EIA (Coggins) test^c done within previous 12 months that is reported on the CVI
- · No EIA test is needed for nursing foals accompanying negative dams

Equines from Minnesota are exempt from the CVI requirement if:

- · Ownership does not change while the animal is in Wisconsin
- The animal remains in Wisconsin no longer than 7 days
- Proof of a negative EIA (Coggins) test^o in previous 12 months accompanies the animal

Poultry and waterfowl (Pigeons are not considered poultry for fairs and shows)

Poultry and waterfowl from within Wisconsin need ONE of the following:

- An NPIP certificate stating the flock of origin is a US pullorum-typhoid clean and for turkeys a Mycloplasma gallisepticum clean flock or NPIP affiliate flock^o or
- Documentation the flock of origin is a Wisconsin Tested Flock and has tested negative for pullorum-typhoid and for turkeys Mycoplasma gallisepticum,^c or
- Documentation the flock of origin is a Wisconsin Associate Flock^o, or
- Individual tests for sexually mature birds (turkeys over 6 months, all other birds over 4 months) within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band identification (ID). All birds must test negative for pullorum-typhoid, and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum. After testing there can be no change of ownership or commingling with other birds that are not part of the flock except at other shows/fairs.

Note: Flock of origin means the flock in which the birds currently reside, likely the exhibitor's flock. Once purchased birds are added to the buyer's flock, even if the buyer's flock only consists of one or just a few birds, the buyer's flock is the flock of origin and that flock must meet NPIP or WI Tested or Associate Flock status to avoid individual bird testing for shows/fairs.

Poultry and waterfowl from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.42, Wis. Admin. Code) need a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a or equivalent (such as form VS 9-3) specifically showing movement to the fair or show that states:

- They originate from a flock classified pullorum-typhoid clean and for turkeys Mycoplasma gallisepticum clean under NPIP or an equivalent state program^c, or
- If they are sexually mature, that they have tested negative for pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) within 90 days^c before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band ID^b.

Not required:

Import permit number

Exotic Ruminants

Note: Exotic ruminants are ruminants that are not native to Wisconsin, and are not cervids – for example, Old World camels, yaks, water buffalo, pronghorn antelope, giraffes, and non-domestic sheep and goats. In addition, please contact your county and local municipality for any restrictions.

Exotic ruminants from within Wisconsin have no requirements.

Exotic ruminants from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.82, Wis. Admin. Code) must have

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a
- Official individual identification (ID) as required for tuberculosis and brucellosis testing^b
- Import permit^e
- · Proof written on the CVI that they meet requirements for:
 - Tuberculosis (TB) negative test required within 60 days before entry^a
 - Brucellosis negative test required within 30 days before entry^c

Please call 608-224-4872 beforehand to determine which TB test to use.

South American camelids: Ilamas, alpacas, guanacos, vicuñas

South American camelids from within Wisconsin have no requirements.

South American camelids from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.85, Wis. Admin. Code) must have a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a and official individual identification (ID)^b. Official ID may be:

- Approved USDA ear tag number
- Microchip number
- Breed association registration number
- Breed association tattoo

Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. For current information, check https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/LlamaAlpacaMovement.aspx.

Small animals: Dogs. domestic cats, and other household pets (ferrets, pet birds, rabbits, gerbils, guinea pigs, hamsters. hedgehogs, chinchillas. domestic mice and rats)

Note: For animals that are part of menageries, see also rules below for menageries. Pot-bellied and miniature pigs fall under rules for swine. Dog hybrids, domestic cat hybrids, or exotic small cat species such as servals fall under rules for Exotic small animals. Native wild animals and birds, including raptors, and captive wild animals such as raccoons, opossums, and skunks fall under rules for wild animals.

Dogs from within Wisconsin (Ref. s.95.21, Wis. Stats.) that are 5 months or older need proof of current rabies vaccination.

Cats and other household pets from within Wisconsin have no requirements.

Dogs and cats from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.80, Wis. Admin. Code) that are 5 months or older need to be vaccinated against rabies^t by a licensed veterinarian, and regardless of age, need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates)^a stating the age of the animal and for animals 5 months and older the date of last rabies vaccination and revaccination due date

Other household pets from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.06, Wis. Admin. Code) need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates)^a but have no testing or vaccination requirements.

Small animals from other nations need to meet requirements of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (608-662-0600) and Centers for Disease Control (1-800-232-4636).

Exotic small animals (any species not covered by "small animals" above), exotic large animals, and other wild animals

Note: Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.

Animals from within Wisconsin do not have any requirements as long as they are legally possessed in Wisconsin.^f

Animals from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.84, Wis. Admin. Code) generally have no testing or vaccination requirements, but do need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a
- Import permit number^e

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin. These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice. Some animals may require permits from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. See http://dnr.wi.gov.

Circus, rodeo, racing and menagerie animals

Note: Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.

Animals from within Wisconsin must meet vaccination and testing requirements for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

Animals from outside Wisconsin need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates) and vaccinations, identification, and tests required for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

They also need import permit numberse (Ref. s.ATCP 10.81, Wis. Admin. Code) if they are:

- · Circuses and individual circus acts
- Rodeo stock other than individual participants' horses
- Multi-species menageries (defined as any animals kept in a collection primarily for purposes of exhibition or competition)
- Petting zoos

They do not need import permit numbers if they are:

- · Rodeo horses owned by individual participants
- Single-species groups

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin. These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice. Some animals may require permits from the Department of Natural Resources. See https://dnr.wi.gov/topic/wildlifehabitat/captive.html

Guidelines for housing and managing animals

The State Veterinarian recommends that exhibitors:

- Vaccinate breeding cattle against bovine viral diarrhea (BVD) at least 30 days before the event
- Test cattle for BVD-PI by immunoperoxidase test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- Test cattle for Johne's disease by ELISA test, and bring to shows only if negative test
- Clean and disinfect vehicles used to transport animals to and from the show, and vehicles used on the grounds before, during, and after the show
- Isolate exhibited animals returning to their farms or animals purchased at the show for 21 days before mingling them with other stock
- Additional biosecurity recommendations can be found at: www.youtube.com/widatcp Go to Created playlists and View full playlist under Farm Biosecurity Practices

The State Veterinarian recommends that show organizers:

- House cattle separately from South American camelids and other exotic ruminants
- House cattle separately from small ruminants, especially sheep
- House ostriches, emus, rheas and cassowaries separately from domestic poultry
- House swine separately from any other mammals
- . Include a space for the premises registration code on livestock entry forms
- · Provide hand-washing stations near all livestock facilities
- · Provide individual watering and feeding troughs rather than common ones

Instructions for Submitting Entries

Review the Fair Entry Information online at JcFairPark.com to determine the Departments, Divisions, and Classes you wish to enter. To enter please follow these steps:

- 1. Click the link provided at JcFairPark.com to enter the ShoWorks system.
- 2. Create a new account each year.
- 3. Save a username and password.
- 4. Enter exhibits in the respective departments, divisions, classes.
- 5. Review your entry. What is displayed is what you are entering.
- 6. Showmanship and Herdsmanship are automatic entry and CANNOT BE entered on-line. Fair Management will determine herdsmanship classes.
- 7. Cancellation of entry must be done before July 1st by submitting a completed Cancellation Form found online at JcFairPark.com.

Junior Division:

Entry submission: Junior division entries with correct fees must be submitted online by 11:59 pm June 1, 2024 or they will be considered late.

Late entry submission: accepted in printed form only until 4 pm on June 14, 2024 at the Fair Office. Late entries are subject to a \$100 exhibitor late fee in addition to all original fees. Late entries may be brought to the Fair Office during normal business hours (8 am – 4 pm) or left in the Fair Park Office Dropbox which is located near the front entrance to the Fair Park Activity Center building. As a result of mail service challenges, we will not accept mailed entries via the United States Postal Service (USPS). No entries will be accepted for Junior division competitions after 4 pm on June 14, 2024.

Open & Senior Divisions:

Online entry submission: Entries with correct fees must be submitted online by 11:59 pm June 1, 2024 or they will be considered late.

Paper entry submission: Printed paper entries may be submitted to the Fair Office by 4 pm on June 1, 2024 or they will be considered late. Paper entries may be brought to the Fair Office during normal business hours (8 am – 4 pm) or left in the Fair Park Office Dropbox which is located near the front entrance to the Fair Park Activity Center building. As a result of mail service challenges, we will not accept mailed entries via the United States Postal Service (USPS).

Late entry submission: accepted in printed form until 4 pm on June 14, 2024 at the Fair Office. Late entries are subject to a \$100 exhibitor late fee in addition to all original fees. Late entries may be brought to the Fair Office during normal business hours (8 am – 4 pm) or left in the Fair Park Office Dropbox which is located near the front entrance to the Fair Park Activity Center building. As a result of mail service challenges, we will not accept mailed entries via the United States Postal Service (USPS). No entries will be accepted for competitions after 4 pm on June 14, 2024.

Entry Cancellation Refund Request:

All 2024 Jefferson County Fair entry information is available at JCFairPark.com or by stopping in to the Fair Office during normal business hours 8 am – 4 pm Monday – Friday for specific department printed copies.

Entry cancellation refund request form must be submitted to the Fair Office by 4 pm on July 1, 2024 to receive entry fee refund consideration. Forms must be submitted on the "Entry Cancellation Refund Request Form" available at JCFairPark.com. Requests will be reviewed and status determined prior to the start of the 2024 Jefferson County Fair.

Entry Substitutions:

Entry substitutions will be accepted at no charge until July 1, 2024. Some departments may allow substitutions until Fair for an additional fee.

Additional Fees:

Other fees may apply. Please reference each Departments entry information.

Jefferson County Fair Admission:

Exhibitors and fair guests must have valid admission credentials to enter the Fair, admission is \$12.00 per day. An exhibitor wristband may be purchased at the time of entry for \$15.00 which is valid for the entire week of fair.

2024 JEFFERSON COUNTY FAIR MASTER SHOWPERSON

On Sunday, July 14 at 1 pm in the Indoor Arena, the best of the best show person from the 2024 Jefferson County Fair will compete for the title of Master Show Person. A representative from each of the below mentioned Supreme Show persons will participate in a multi species competition where talented exhibitors demonstrate their showmanship abilities in a variety of species to be an all-around 2024 Jefferson County Fair Master Show Person.

- 1) Eligibility: The Supreme Champion Show person from the following shows Dairy, Beef, Swine, Sheep, Dairy Goat, Meat Goat and Horse are all eligible to participate. A Supreme Champion Show person participant may only represent one species in the Master Show Person competition. If a Supreme Champion has won the right to represent more than one species the following criteria will be used to determine which species they will represent:
 - Species department the participant exhibited the most classes in at the current Fair
 - Species which had the least amount of exhibitors who participated in showmanship

If an eligible participant chooses not to participate in the Master Show person competition, the option to participate will default to the species Reserve Supreme Champion Show Person, followed by species Honorable Mention Supreme Champion Winner. If an eligible participant is not identified for the species, the highest placing participant in the oldest showmanship age group will be offered the opportunity. If the supreme champion participants don't wish to participate in the Master show person competition they must notify the fair office by 4 pm on the Friday of Fair or they may lose future Jefferson County Fair eligibility or current years premiums.

- 2) Past winners of Overall Master Showperson contest are ineligible to participate in the Master Showperson contest after they have won.
- 3) Master Show Person participants will be provided animals by Fair Management. Animal selection will be determined by random draw with the first person drawing in each species being the winner of that respective species, followed by the representative from the next species to be shown.
- 4) Show accessories such as combs, brushes, show sticks, Will be supplies with each animal.
- 5) Participants are encouraged to wear collared shirt, jeans, show harness, belt and closed toe footwear.
- 6) Participants must stay in the staging area during the entire competition. Participants can bring a Jefferson County Jr. Exhibitor assistant to staging area.
- 7) Participants are not allowed use of their cell phones once the competition begins until it is completed. Participants found with a cell phone will be penalized by losing one placing in the species they represent.
- 8) A Judge will rank each show person in each species from first place to last with a corresponding rank value (Ex. $1^{st} = 1$ pt., $2^{nd} = 2$ pts., etc.) The participant with the lowest overall score once all judging is completed will be the winner. In the event of a tie:

First Tie-Breaker = One High score and One Low score will be removed from the tied contestants and their scores recalculated, the person with the lower score will win the tie-breaker.

Second Tie-Breaker = The contestant with the most 1st place rankings will win the tie-breaker.

If a tie still remains after implementing Tie-Breaker criteria the results will be determined as tied and both participants will receive the prizes as posted.

9) Each Master Show Person participant is required to attend a meeting at 5 pm on Friday of Fair in the Activity Center Conference Room. At this meeting the rules will be reviewed and each participant will receive their packet. Each participant is require to write 3 thank you card at the mandatory meeting.

Rules:

- 1. Entry Fee: \$5 per class.
- 2. Entry limits: Dairy department exhibitors may enter an unlimited number of animal entries.
- 3. Substitutions: Are allowed within the division entered (Ex. Division B-Holstein for Division B-Holstein, it does not have to be within the same class). Exceptions may be considered by Fair Management for animal health conditions (Ex. ringworm, warts, or other) with a veterinarian health certificate stating the condition of the respective entry.
- 4. All State of Wisconsin mandatory animal health regulations apply. See 2024 Wisconsin Animal Health Regulations for Fairs and Exhibitions in the entry information.
 - All animals must be free of external parasites including ringworm.
 - All animals must be dehorned. If regrowth or scur it must be less than 1 inch. Fair management reserves the authority for final discretion.
- 5. All Jefferson County Junior Fair and department Rules, Ethics Policy and Show Ring Ethics apply as stated in the entry information.
- 6. All dairy cattle exhibits must be stalled with the respective group exhibit. Stalling consideration requests must be submitted to the Fair Office before July 1st. Bedding may not be put into the stalls until Fair Management posts stall assignments. Fair Management has the right to update stall assignments due to cancellations.
- 7. Breed Divisions: At the time of entry exhibitors of Grade entries have the option to enter and show in the respective type Breed Division or in Division D Crossbred/Grade.
- 8. Animal husbandry is the responsibility of each exhibitor. If space is limited, a one-day supply of feed and bedding will be allowed in the barn. Space updates will be posted at JCFairPark.com.
- 9. Show Clothing: White pants with an official show shirt may be worn during the heifer/cow classes. (No Group/Farm shirts accepted). White shirts and White pants WILL BE required for participation in showmanship classes. Failure to wear white clothing may result in the exhibitor being lowered one ribbon placing.
- 10. Show: The exhibitor making entry must show their entry, unless Fair Management has granted permission for another Jefferson County Fair junior dairy exhibitor to show the entry.
- 11. A mandatory exhibitor meeting will be set prior to fair to review rules, procedures and submit animal paperwork.
- 12. Check-in requirements:
 - Registered: Copy of breed registration certificate with one of the following identifications:
 - Breed ear tag/button (must match registration certificate)

- Tattoos (must match registration certificate)
- Picture/sketch on registration certificate

Grade/Crossbred: Must have one of the following identifications:

- Metal vaccination tag
- 840 animal ID ear tag
- Two pictures: Front/Head and side shot

Division A – Showmanship

- 1. All exhibitors will automatically be entered in showmanship.
- 2. Age Class: Exhibitor age as of January 1 of current Fair year
- 3. All exhibitors MUST show their own exhibit.

 - Fans: Limit of 2 per animal. Overhead fans no larger than 24" securely mounted above the animal are permitted. No Butt or floor aisle fans permitted.
- 8. Show: The exhibitor making entry must show their entry, unless Fair Management has granted permission for another Jefferson County Fair junior beef exhibitor to show the entry.
- 9. Fitting: Fitting Chutes/Tents may be set up around the outside of the beef barn in the area designated by Fair Management no more than 2 hours before the start of the show and removed no later than 2 hours of the completion of the beef show. No chutes allowed in the barn at any time. If not removed fair authority reserve the right to remove.
- 10. Exhibit Release: Exhibit MAY NOT be taken down or removed until the release time listed in the entry information. Bedding must be moved 2 feet from the front wall after animals are removed.

Bodywall Thickness: greater to or equal 0.45 inch but as little as possible above that

Loin Muscle Area: as large as possible; winners are typically 2.0 sq. inch or above

Leg Score: as high as possible -15 is the maximum; most goats are 7-10.

- Only one animal (horse, pony or draft) per exhibitor.
- Exhibitors may enter no more than 8 individual horse classes. After entry deadline, exhibitors may request a class change with the approval of Fair Management.
- 4. The shows will follow 4H State horse show guidelines.
- 5. Exhibitors must comply with State of Wisconsin, Jefferson County Fair, and Fair Management rules. Fair management will reference WI State 4-H Horse Association "Equestrian Guidelines" (Revised in 2022) and "2024 Gymkhana Rules & Class List" for detailed class guidelines. In instances where WI State 4-H Horse Association guidelines conflict with Jefferson County Fair's rules, the Fairs rules supersede.
- 6. Health Rules: All State of Wisconsin mandatory animal health regulations apply. See County & District Fairs, 2024 Animal Health Rules and Regulations in this entry information.
 - A negative EIA (Coggins) test is required for all exhibition equine. The test must be CURRENT and valid through September 30th of the current fair year. Original documentation must be presented to Fair Management prior to unloading.
 - It is recommended all horse be in good health and vaccinated prior to June 1 of the current Fair year for Eastern and Western Encephalomyelitis, Tetanus, and Equine Influenza.
 - Any animal health verification with out of state addresses listed with animal information will be considered by Fair Management as owned outside of Wisconsin and will require a current CVI for Jefferson County Fair exhibition.
- 7. Fitting regulations follow typical equine breed association rules and do not necessarily follow fitting rules in the fore mentioned entry information.
- 8. Fair Management:
 - Will assign stalls based on entry information provided by the exhibitor
 - Questions, interpretations, and any variance from participation rules or classes should be directed to Fair Management. Fair Managements decisions will be final.
 - Exhibitors should not approach the judge before, during or after the show. Questions and concerns regarding judges or judging should be directed to Fair Management.
 - Once a horse is checked in and unloaded it may not leave the Fair Park until after 7 pm on Sunday unless authorized by the Fair Veterinarian or Fair Management.

9. Definitions:

- Horse over 56 inches.
- Pony Ponies or horses measuring 56" and under are eligible to show in either the pony class or in the horse class (no cross exhibiting). Exhibitor must declare at check in.
- Miniatures must enter and show in the pony classes for safety reasons.
- Stallions are not allowed to be exhibited. A stallion is defined as an unaltered male over 1 year of age.
- Mares with foals at side are not allowed to exhibit.
- 10. Horse/Exhibitor Safety: For safety reasons, exhibitors may receive assistance with horse handling as long as exhibitor is in the immediate area.
 - Long pants, boots with a cut-out heel, and SEI approved (and fastened) helmets, must be worn when mounted/driving while on the Fair Park.
 - Exhibitors must lead horses to and from the stalling area. Exhibitors are ONLY allowed to ride the horse
 they entered and checked in, no exceptions. Riding is limited to designated riding arenas and when
 entering the show ring.
 - Kickers/Biters: Known kickers must wear a red ribbon on their tail. Known biters must wear a green ribbon on their forelock. Ribbons worn will not be judged against the horse.
 - In driving classes an exhibitor may have an adult ride in cart (helmet required).
- 11. Additional Division/Class Guidelines:
 - The entry gate will be held a maximum of two minutes. Exhibitors requiring a tack change must notify gate person of the request a minimum of two (2) classes before their class is called.

1. Exhibitor Eligibility & General Guidelines:

- Entry Fee: \$1 per class unless noted. Substitutions are allowed only within the division entered.
- Each exhibitor is allowed a maximum of 15 bird class entries within the Junior Poultry Department.
- Pre-fair exhibitor meeting for exhibitors bringing live birds to the Fair. Exhibitors are strongly encouraged to attend, updated Fair and department information discussed will supersede stated entry information. Please watch your email for Fair Information updates or the website at JCFairPark.com for meeting information.
- Exhibitors are expected to assist with Fair exhibit set up on Saturday June 29th, Fair exhibit take down on Sunday July 14, and to complete a 30 minute exhibit supervision duty during the fair.
- Exhibitors are encouraged to decorate their coop area to promote a positive image of agriculture. Coops and animals must be kept accessible to the public while the barn is open or as designated by Fair Management. All waste, feed, manure and trash should be disposed of properly.
- Eggs laid at the Fair become Fair property and will be properly disposed of by Fair Management.
- All exhibits will receive the best care and protection the surroundings will afford, but they are at all times subject to the owner's risk.
- Exhibitors are expected to conform to Jefferson County Fair participation and exhibition policies. Failure to comply may result in premium and awards forfeiture, dismissal from the grounds and being barred from immediate and/or future exhibitions. Fair management reserves the right to interpret and enforce the rules and regulations; split or combine classes; accept or reject any entry entirely, partially or conditionally.

2. Animal and Exhibitor Safety:

- All exhibitors are expected to display positive animal welfare practices while at the Fair. Fair Management reserves the right to disqualify/remove exhibitors and/or entries deemed not presenting positive animal welfare practices.
- Due to animal wellness and safety concerns all poultry are restricted to the designated area and the immediate surrounding area. Poultry found outside of the designated area will be immediately disqualified. No animals other than those housed in the exhibit area will be permitted in this area. Fair Management has discretion to approve special circumstances.
- For public safety and liability reasons exhibitors may not use space in or around their exhibits to conduct any type of direct contact/petting or photo opportunities geared toward fairgoers/public.
- Animals deemed uncontrollable and unsafe to exhibit will be dismissed from the Fair. Fair Management retains the right to warn the exhibitor and dismiss any animal deemed unsafe or uncontrollable at any time. No prizes and awards will be awarded if an animal is dismissed.
- Exhibitors and visitors are prohibited from handling birds other than their own without the consent of Fair Management. Violation may result in loss of all prizes and awards.

3. Equipment:

- Tack: Show boxes, feed, bedding and other equipment used for poultry care must be kept neatly in the
 designated tack area and out of the public aisles. It is important to keep all housing areas orderly and safe to
 promote positive animal agriculture to the public.
- · Carrying Cases: Exhibitors must remove their carrying cases from the exhibit area after caging their entries.
- Coop Cups: Two cups of appropriate size must be provided and secured by the exhibitor for each bird being caged. No disposable type cups; paper, plastic or Styrofoam allowed.
- Exhibitors are responsible to feed and water their own birds. Poultry must have access to fresh water at all times. Exhibitors must bring their own feed.

4. Health Records:

Exhibitors must send a copy of official documentation or Form 9-2 (demonstrating their birds are pullorum-typhoid free to the Fair Office after July 1st or bring it to check in at Fair. Exhibits without paperwork will not be allowed in the barn and they will be ineligible to exhibit. All health documentation received will be retained by Jefferson County Fair and shall not be returned to the exhibitor. The Jefferson County Fair will not be responsible for pullorum testing. All poultry over 4 months of age, except pigeons, shown in public exhibition must show proof of disease status by presenting one of the following:

Certified flock status (Official Documentation)
NPIP Participant or Affiliate Flock Certificate

Wisconsin Tested Flock Certificate

Wisconsin Associate Flock Certificate

Wisconsin Individual Poultry Test Report (Form 9-2)

Individual identification must be on the test report

Youth Exhibition Exemption

Leader Letter and Hatchery Receipts

- All Poultry will be inspected for health by Fair Management. Poultry with any external parasites (lice, mites, fleas) may be removed from competition and the Fair Park at Fair Managements discretion. Wet poultry will not be accepted at time of entry.
- At any time, any bird shows evidence of a contagious or infectious disease, it shall be removedimmediately from the exhibit, quarantined, or harvested as directed by Fair Management, Fair Veterinarian or the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection Representative. All poultry exhibited may be subject to quarantine or harvest if any contagious or infectious disease is discovered among any of the exhibited poultry. Reference health regulations for more information.

5. Class Definitions:

- · Cock, Hen, Old Male, Old Female hatched prior to the calendar year shown.
- · Cockerel, Pullet, Young Male, Young Female hatched during the calendar year shown.
- Questionable age verification will be determined by Fair Management or judge and that decision is final.
- Chicken and Pigeon: Must be at least eight (8) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
- · Waterfowl: Must be at least ten (10) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
- · Turkeys: Must be at least fifteen (15) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
- Birds must be entered and exhibited in the class created for that specific breed and variety. The Any Other Variety Class is solely for varieties which have no other class. Birds incorrectly entered by the exhibitor will be disgualified.

6. Bird Identification: (Per state requirements)

Poultry: identified with a numbered leg band provided at entry/check-in. Exhibitor must record band number on the back of the entry tag when the bird is cooped.

Pigeons: identified with a seamless numbered band from a recognized banding organization in the current year. Exhibitor must record band number on the back of the entry tag when the bird is cooped.

7. Cooping

- Poultry entries (except market entries) will be cooped by club/group. Market entries will be cooped in a classified manner. Fair Management may consolidate coops.
- Exhibitors must keep cages and birds clean throughout the Fair. Exhibits in unsuitable conditions will receive written notification to remedy the situation. If conditions are not brought up to standard the entry shall be dismissed from the exhibit. No award monies will be awarded if a bird is dismissed.

8. Judging:

- Judges may disqualify birds which are incorrectly entered, in questionable condition or which are not true breed representative.

1. Exhibitor Eligibility & General Guidelines:

- Entry Fee: \$2 per class unless noted. Substitutions are allowed only within the division entered.
- Exhibition is open to persons of any age who are Jefferson County residents.
- Each exhibitor is allowed a maximum of 20 total entries within the Open Poultry Department. Junior
 exhibitors may enter in the open show but may not exhibit the same birds they exhibited in the junior
 show.
- All exhibits will receive the best care and protection the surroundings will afford, but they are at all times subject to the owner's risk. Exhibitors are expected to conform to Jefferson County Fair participation and exhibition policies. Failure to comply may result in prize and award forfeiture, immediate dismissal and/or loss of future exhibition eligibility. Fair management reserves the right to interpret/enforce the rules and regulations; split or combine classes; accept or reject any entry entirely, partially or conditionally.

2. Animal and Exhibitor Safety:

- All exhibitors are expected to demonstrate positive animal welfare practices while at the Fair. Fair
 Management reserves the right to disqualify and/or remove exhibitors/entries deemed not presenting
 positive animal welfare practices.
- Due to animal wellness and safety concerns all poultry are restricted to the designated area and the immediate surrounding area or they will be disqualified. No animals other than those entered will be permitted in the designated area. Fair Management has the authority to approve special circumstances.
- For public safety and liability reasons exhibitors may not use space in or around their exhibits to conduct any type of direct contact/petting or photo opportunities geared toward fairgoers/public.
- Exhibitors and visitors are prohibited from handling birds other than their own without the consent of the Fair Management. Violation may result in loss of all prizes and awards.
- Exhibitors are responsible to feed and water their own birds.
- Eggs laid at the Fair become Fair property and will be properly disposed of by Fair Management.
- Tack: Show boxes, feed, bedding and other show equipment used for poultry care must be kept neatly in the exhibitor area and out of the public aisles. It is important to keep all areas orderly and safe to promote positive animal agriculture to the public.

Health Records:

Persons exhibiting poultry at Jefferson County Fair must send a copy of Official Documentation or Form 9-2 demonstrating their birds are pullorum-typhoid free prior to July 1. Poultry may not be exhibited at Jefferson County Fair unless accompanied by the required health forms. All documentation received will be retained by Jefferson County Fair and shall not be returned to the exhibitor. The Jefferson County Fair will not be responsible for pullorum testing. All poultry over 4 months of age, except pigeons, shown in public exhibition must show proof of disease status by presenting one of the following:

Certified flock status (Official Documentation) NPIP Participant or Affiliate Flock Certificate

Wisconsin Tested Flock Certificate
Wisconsin Associate Flock Certificate

Wisconsin Individual Poultry Test Report (Form 9-2)

Individual identification must be on the test report

Youth Exhibition Exemption

Leader Letter and Hatchery Receipts

All Poultry will be health inspected by Fair Management upon arrival. Poultry with any external parasites (lice, mites, fleas) will be disqualified from competition and removed from the Fair Park at Fair Managements discretion. Wet poultry will not be accepted at time of entry.

If, at any time, any bird shows evidence of a contagious or infectious disease, it shall be removed immediately from the exhibit, quarantined or harvested as directed by Fair Management, Fair Veterinarian or the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection Representative. All poultry exhibited may be subject to quarantine or harvest if any contagious or infectious disease is discovered among any of the poultry in the exhibit. Reference health regulations for more information.

4. Class Definitions:

Birds must be entered and exhibited in the class created for that specific breed and variety. The Any Other Variety division is solely for varieties which have no other class. Birds incorrectly entered by the exhibitor will be disqualified.

- · Cock, Hen, Old Male, Old Female hatched prior to the calendar year shown.
- · Cockerel, Pullet, Young Male, Young Female hatched during the calendar year shown.
- · Chicken and Pigeon: Must be at least eight (8) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
- · Waterfowl: Must be at least ten (10) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
- Turkeys: Must be at least fifteen (15) weeks of age at time of exhibit.

Questionable age verification will be determined by Fair Management or by the judge and that decision is final.

5. Identification: Per state (DATCP) requirement

- Poultry must be marked with numbered leg bands which must appear on entry forms and must be recorded on the back of the entry tag, by the exhibitor.
- Pigeons must be seamless banded with a numbered band from a recognized banding organization in the current year.

6. Judging:

- Judges may disqualify birds which are incorrectly entered, in questionable condition or which are not true breed representative.
- · Exhibitors and spectators shall not converse with the judge during judging.
- Shows will be judged in a face to face format according to APA rules and regulations with the following exception:
 - Poutry shall be judged by standards of the latest revised edition of the American Standard of Perfection, copyrighted by the American Poultry Association, Inc.
 - Pigeons shall be judged by comparison and judges will use the National Pigeon Association Standards as their guide.

- 15. Entry tags should be picked up at the Fair office prior to drop-off day and mounted in a lower corner as close to the frame/mat/foamboard edge as possible.
- 16. Exhibit will be hung using two pegboard hooks. Mat/foam board guidelines for ease of hanging are, two ¼" diameter holes spaced in 1" or 6" increments, approx. 3/8" down from the top. Do-its or hanging tabs are also acceptable.
- 17. Frames: Sawtooth type hangers will not be accepted.
 - Wood frame guidelines for ease of display shall be screw eyes (2" to 5" below the top) and/or stranded picture frame wire (loop of wire shall be a minimum 1" below the top of the frame.
 - All other frames; metal, plastic, shadow box etc. must be prepared appropriately to hang straight on large pegboard hooks.
