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General Rules

1. It is a privilege to participate in the Jefferson County Fair. This privilege can be revoked for conduct unbecoming an exhibitor, parent, leader or volunteer. Exhibitors not adhering to rules may be disqualified, lose awards, premiums and/or lose eligibility to exhibit at the Jefferson County Fair.
2. It is the Exhibitor's responsibility to be aware of all dates, deadlines and updates which may be emailed or posted online at JcFairPark.com.
3. The Jefferson County Fair Park Committee reserves the right to interpret the rules and regulations listed in this entry information.
4. The Jefferson County Fair Park is not responsible for LOST or STOLEN articles, or for INJURY or DEATH of livestock. Owners/exhibitors assume full responsibility. Exhibitors exhibit at their own risk.
5. The Jefferson County Fair Park has the right to publish, and copyright any exhibitors image (including audio, moving image or photography) for educational programs, websites, and promotion of its programs.
6. All rules apply to all departments unless stated otherwise.
7. Open and Senior department entries are open to Jefferson and adjoining county residents, as space permits.
8. Junior Exhibitors must be 8-19 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year and in good standings of the youth organization they represent in order to participate in the fair. Jefferson County Fair Junior department entries are open to members of 4-H, FFA, a scouting program, a breed group, or another recognized youth organization under adult leadership which has an education program appropriate to that organization and is approved by the Fair prior to April 1st of the current Fair year.
9. All Divisions are limited to one entry under each Class unless otherwise stated.
10. No entry shall compete for more than one premium except showmanship (livestock exhibits).
11. Exhibits must be the result of the exhibitor's own labor or current Fair year projects (Fair to Fair) and may not have been shown at a previous Jefferson County Fair with the exception of animal projects.
12. Any exhibit containing illegal or protected materials will be disqualified.
13. Exhibits not fulfilling department rules and requirements may be disqualified or placings lowered. The Judge, Superintendent, and Fair Staff have the right to disqualify any exhibit.
14. Exhibitors entered in Face to Face Judging Divisions must be present when their exhibits are being judged.
15. Animal Exhibits:
 - Must be shown by the exhibitor unless special permission is granted by Fair Management because of a medical condition (i.e. broken leg) or conflicting JCF Junior division shows.
 - Animals not properly cleaned/groomed, halter broke or unsafe may be disqualified or forfeit premiums.
 - May not be unloaded or placed in housing facility until all necessary papers are checked by Fair Staff. Failure to do so may result in quarantine, disqualification and/or the animal being removed from the Fair Park.
 - Fitting: Only the exhibitor, immediate family (father, mother, grandparents, sibling or guardian), another Jefferson County Fair exhibitor or authorized organizational leader will be allowed to assist with show preparation/fitting at any time during the Fair. Animals may be fit in designated areas only. Additional Fitting Rules can be found under the Jefferson County Fair Ethics Policy.
 - Are at the risk of the exhibitor at all times. Proper animal husbandry management which includes feed, bedding, daily care and animal health is the responsibility of the exhibitor unless stated otherwise.
16. Premises ID number must be included at the time of entry submission.
17. All exhibits must be in place by the specified entry check-in deadline. Exhibits arriving after the deadline may not be eligible to be judged.
18. No advertising may be posted on any building unless approved by Fair Management.
19. Entry tags will be printed for non-animal classes and must be picked up at the Fair Office. Email updates will be sent when tags are available.
20. No tents or canopies allowed on the Fair Park grounds without prior approval of Fair Management unless part of designated camping which is authorized by Fair Management only.

Ethics Policy

1. Tampering, and/or inhumane treatment; and/or misrepresentation as to breeding, age, ownership and any irregularity in showing will be considered fraud and deception.
2. To maintain a high degree of confidence and integrity in the livestock shows, the Jefferson County Fair Park Committee reserves the right to disqualify any animal fitted in an unethical manner and/or disqualify the exhibitor. Unethical fitting shall include any injection of gas, solid or liquid to alter normal conformation. In addition, it shall include any cutting or tearing of the hide, cutting or tearing underneath the hide or removal of tissue in any attempt to alter the shape or appearance. It shall also include attempts to disrupt or change normal dental development, dyeing or coloring hair, adding artificial tailheads, switches, polls, hair and heels, as well as any attempt to change the conformation and degree of firmness by administration of fluids internally or externally in a liquid or solid state. The use of any medication not prescribed under a veterinarian's direction is prohibited.
3. All exhibitors, their immediate family and any other parties involved in the unethical fitting and showing of an animal will be subject to forfeiture of award(s) and premium(s), and/or dismissal from the Fair Park; and/or being barred from competition immediately in the department in which the violation has occurred and/or from all departments entered; and/or in future competition at the Jefferson County Fair.

International Association of Fairs & Expositions (IAFE)

National Code of Show Ring Ethics (Jefferson County Fair is a member of the IAFE)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to Junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs and livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in any event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other samples taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collections and preservation, transfer to the laboratory pertain to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions provided by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Vehicle Parking, Livestock Trailer Parking & Camping Information

Vehicle Parking: Complimentary vehicle parking will be available outside the Fair Park fence in the North and Northwest parking lots. For an additional fee, limited vehicle parking for the duration of the Fair will be available for exhibitors and the general public in a designated location inside the Fair Park fence. To purchase inside the Fair Park parking please visit JcFairPark.com.

Livestock Trailers: Exhibitors may park animal trailers inside the Fair Park in a designated location during the Fair at no charge if a trailer parking form is submitted to Fair Management at JcFairPark.com.

Camping: Limited inside the Fair Park camping is available for animal exhibitors only. The camping application and rules can be found at JcFairPark.com or by calling the Fair Office 920-674-7148.

2022 Animal Health Regulations for Wisconsin Fairs and Exhibitions

This is a summary of animal health requirements for fairs, shows and exhibitions only. They are not necessarily the same as requirements for importing animals into Wisconsin or moving them within the state for other purposes. They may change if animal diseases occur in Wisconsin or elsewhere, so you should always check our website or contact us for current information. Ref. s. ATCP 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code

General Requirements for show organizers	<p>All fairs or exhibitions of any length must obtain, review, and keep for five years all re-quired records and test results:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> · Exhibitor's name and address · Animal identification (number, type, description, and when required, official identification (see requirements for different animals)) · Documents showing compliance with disease testing and other health requirements · Livestock premises number, if any, where animals originated · Documentation showing legal importation to the event (if applicable) and, when re-quired, movement to the event (see requirements for different animals below) · For swine, a record of any swine transported directly to a slaughtering establishment · For swine, a record of any swine transported to an animal market where all animals sold at the market sale for that day were shipped directly to a slaughtering establishment <p>Fairs or exhibitions lasting more than 24 hours must appoint a licensed veterinarian to inspect all animals daily.</p> <p>Please note: Except in specific circumstances, if an animal already bears an official 840 eartag, that eartag must not be removed and additional official eartags must not be applied. Instead the existing eartag must be read and recorded when a record of that animal is required. (Ref. s. ATCP 10.045, Wis. Admin. Code)</p> <p>These regulations apply to all fairs and exhibitions, including additional events (like rodeos, shows, or other organized events) that occur in conjunction with the fair.</p>
Diseases	<p>Animals that show evidence of having contagious or infectious diseases may not be commingled (or housed/kept) with other animals at a fair, show, or other exhibition in such a way as to allow disease to spread. Such animals should not attend the fair, show, or exhibition. Animals may be denied entry if they arrive at these events with contagious or infectious diseases, isolated and/or removed if they develop disease after arriving, or be subject to other action as would be necessary to control disease.</p> <p>Bovine animals with ringworm, mange, warts or scab will be removed from the fair or exhibition premises, unless the veterinarian in charge finds warts or ringworm lesions are incapable of transmitting disease.</p>
Cattle and bison	<p>Cattle from within Wisconsin have no requirements for tests or health documents. Cattle from outside Wisconsin must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> · Be accompanied by certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate) documenting official animal identification (ID) and all required tests and certifications · Have at least one form of official individual ID (including steers) · Meet all of Wisconsin's normal requirements for import <p>https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/CattleBison.aspx)</p> <p>Acceptable animal IDs for all cattle from outside Wisconsin</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> · USDA metal ear tag number that is part of the National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) (starts with state 2-digit code, also known as "brite" tag); this includes the orange brucellosis vaccination tag · 15-digit "840" tags (visual or RFID) · Valid only if applied before March 11, 2015: · Manufacturer-coded RFID tag - 15-digit number with the first three digits in 900s · American ID tag – 8 to 12-digit number prefaced with "USA" · Brucellosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin · No cattle from outside Wisconsin are currently required to be brucellosis tested or vaccinated to come to fairs and shows in Wisconsin · Tuberculosis (TB) requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin <p>For requirements by state, see:</p> <p>https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/CattleBison.aspx</p>

Cattle and bison (cont.)	<p>Cattle from Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone (for cattle from Michigan's TB Free Zone, see requirements by state above) also need:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> · Import permit · To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older · Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin · To return directly to the state of origin after the show, and there must be a statement on the CVI that they will be doing so <p>For information on obtaining an import permit:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> · Online https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/AnimalMovementPermits.aspx · Email DATCPAnimalImports@wi.gov · Call 608-224-4872 <p>Cattle from Canada must meet current federal requirements to enter the United States. (See https://www.aphis.usda.gov/regulations/vs/iregs/animals/downloads/ca-protocol-imp-cattlebison.pdf)</p> <p>Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. For current information, check https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/CattleBison.aspx</p>
Swine	<p>Swine from within Wisconsin need a Wisconsin intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate):</p> <p><i>Note: Herd of origin means the herd in which the pigs currently reside, likely the exhibitor's herd. When pigs are purchased from a herd, the herd from which they originate is the herd of origin for the seller. Once the purchased pigs are added into the buyer's herd (even if the buyer's herd only consists of one or just a few animals), the buyer's herd becomes the new herd of origin and that herd must meet testing requirements to move pigs again.</i></p> <p>Stating that the entire herd of origin was inspected on the farm within 30 days before the show and showed no signs of disease.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> · Non-terminal Exhibitions: All swine must have a PRRS (Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome) and PEDv (Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus) test of the herd of origin within 90 days of the exhibition. Include test date, type, and results on the CVI. For swine originating from herds with positive tests, include the herd plan number on the CVI. · Terminal Exhibitions: No testing requirements. <p><i>Note: Terminal Exhibitions are those at which the swine go directly from the fair/show to the slaughtering establishment OR to a slaughter only market sale. If going to a slaughter only market sale, contact the Division of Animal Health fair inspector for required information to collect.</i></p> <p><i>Note: If the fair intends to use a load-out facility, contact the Division of Animal Health in advance to discuss requirements that must be met.</i></p> <p>Swine from outside Wisconsin need a certificate of veterinary inspection that includes the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> · The negative results of the PRRS test from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results. · The negative results of the PEDv test from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results. · A statement that the veterinarian has inspected the entire herd of origin within the past 30 days and that no clinical signs of PRRS and PEDv or any other apparent disease was present at the time of inspection · Official individual identification (ID) · If the herd of origin tests positive for PRRS and/or PEDv, contact the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection at 608-224-4872 for options. <p>Acceptable methods of ID for swine are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> · USDA silver ear tag · USDA 840 ear tag, either visual or RFID · Breed association tattoo if the pig is a purebred and the tattoo is registered · An ear tag with the premises identification number and a unique identifier · Ear notch if the pig is a purebred and the notch is registered <p>Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. Sheep and Goats	<p>Note: These rules do not apply to non-domestic sheep and goats. See Exotic ruminants below.</p> <p>Sheep and goats from within Wisconsin need:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> · If sexually intact, need official individual identification (ID) at any age · If not sexually intact, need official individual ID if they are 12 months or older · See below for official ID options · Cannot be under restriction for movement to fairs and shows · Sheep and goats which go to a market or slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the market/slaughter establishment. <p>Sheep and goats from outside Wisconsin need:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> · Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate) and official individual ID for all animals. · See below for Official ID options. · See below for additional requirements for goats from Michigan's Tuberculosis Modified Accredited Zone. · Sheep and goats that go to a market or slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the market/slaughter establishment. <p>Official Identification includes:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> · Scrapie ear tags (including tags on neck straps for animals with absent/injured ears or with official tattoos – see DATCP Website*) · USDA 840 ear tags · Legible breed tattoos (see DATCP Website* and NOTE below) · Legible scrapie tattoos (see DATCP Website* and NOTE below) · Approved microchips (Electronic Identification/EID) – There are many requirements that need to be met to use microchips including a requirement for accompanying tattoos. See DATCP Website* and NOTE below. · <i>NOTE: All sheep and goats which go through a market or to slaughter and require Official Identification must be ear tagged with Official ID. MASTER SHOWPERSON

On Sunday, July 17 at 10 am in the MAP Building/Indoor Arena, the best of the best show person from the 2022 Jefferson County Fair will compete for the title of Master Show Person. A representative from each of the below mentioned Supreme Show persons will participate in a multi species competition where talented show persons demonstrate their showmanship abilities in a variety of species to be an all-around 2022 Jefferson County Fair Master Show Person.

- 1) Eligibility: The Supreme Champion Show person from the following shows Dairy, Beef, Swine, Sheep, Goat and Horse are all eligible to participate. A Supreme Champion Show person participant may only represent one species in the Master Show Person competition. If a Supreme Champion has won the right to represent more than one species the following criteria will be used to determine which species they will represent:

- Species department the participant exhibited the most classes in at the current Fair
- Species which had the least amount of exhibitors who participated in showmanship

If an eligible participant chooses not to participate in the Master Show person competition, the option to participate will default to the species Reserve Supreme Champion Show Person, followed by species Honorable Mention Supreme Champion Winner. If an eligible participant is not identified for the species, the highest placing participant in the oldest showmanship age group will be offered the opportunity. If the supreme champion participants don't wish to participate in the Master show person competition they must notify the fair office by 4 pm on the Friday of Fair or they may lose future Jefferson County Fair eligibility or current years premiums.

- 2) Participants will be provided animals by Fair Management. Animal selection will be determined by random draw with the first person drawing in each species being the winner of that respective species, followed by the representative from the next species to be shown.
- 3) Show accessories such as combs, brushes, show sticks, show harness, etc., will be provided by the Fair Park.
- 4) Participants are encouraged to wear collared shirt, jeans, and closed toe footwear.
- 5) Participants are not allowed use of their cell phones once the competition begins until it is completed. Participants found with a cell phone will be penalized by losing one placing in the species they represent.
- 6) A Judge will rank each participant in each species from first place to last with a corresponding rank value (Ex. 1st = 1 pt., 2nd = 2 pts., etc.) The participant with the lowest overall score once all judging is completed will be the winner. In the event of a tie:

First Tie-Breaker = One High score and One Low score will be removed from the tied contestants and their scores recalculated, the person with the lower score will break the tie.

Second Tie-Breaker = The contestant with the most 1st place rankings will be the winner.

If a tie still remains after implementing Tie-Breaker criteria the results will be determined as tied and both participants will receive the prizes as posted.

- 7) Each participant is required to attend a meeting at 6 pm on Friday of Fair in the Conference Room located in the Activity Center across from the Fair Office. At this meeting the rules will be reviewed and each participant will receive their packet. All required document(s) must be turned in to the fair office by 9 am on Sunday.

1. Entry Fee: \$5 per class.
2. Exhibitors may enter an unlimited number of animal entries but each exhibitor may only check in and exhibit up to 4 dairy department animal entries at the Fair. Exhibitors who nominate and exhibit in the Miss Q Award program may bring up to an additional two animal entries for a total not to exceed 6 animal entries checked in and exhibited at Fair.
3. Substitutions: Are allowed within the division entered (Ex. Division B-Holstein for Division B-Holstein, it does not have to be within the same class). Fair Management retains authority to approve additional substitutions for animal health condition (Ex. ringworm, warts, etc.) with a veterinarian health certificate stating the unhealthy condition of the entry.
4. All State of Wisconsin mandatory animal health regulations apply. See 2022 Wisconsin Animal Health Regulations for Fairs and Exhibitions in the entry information.
5. All Jefferson County Junior Fair Rules, Ethics Policy and Show Ring Ethics apply as printed in the entry information. In addition, the following rules will also be enforced.
6. All junior fair dairy cattle must be stalled with the respective group exhibit. Consideration for stalling requests must be submitted to the Superintendent before July 1st.
7. **Breed Divisions: Registered and Grade animals will be shown together by Breed Type. If 10 or more grade animals per breed type are checked in at the Fair, Fair management retains authority to sub class those grade animals into an Official Breed Type Grade Division.**
8. Animal husbandry is the responsibility of each exhibitor. If space is limited, a one-day supply of feed and bedding will be allowed in the barn. Space updates will be posted at JCFairPark.com.
9. Bedding may not be put into the stalls until Fair Management posts stall assignments. Fair Management has the right to update stall assignments due to cancellations.
10. Show Clothing: White pants with an official show shirt may be worn during the heifer/cow classes. (No Group/Farm shirts accepted). White shirts and White pants WILL BE required for participation in showmanship classes. Failure to wear white clothing may result in the exhibitor being lowered one ribbon placing.
11. Show: The exhibitor making entry must show their entry, unless Fair Management has granted permission for another Jefferson County Fair junior dairy exhibitor to show the entry.

- Miss Q Awards are open to all junior dairy department exhibitors who have any of the following cow projects: Managerial, Owned, Registered, or Grade.
- Eligible cows must be on a processed DHI testing program. Cows on Profitest are not eligible.
- Cows must be identified with an official number (i.e. registration or official ear tag) which corresponds to the identification reported on the cow's DHI record.
- Award grouping: Recognition is based on the cow's number of lactations and include:
 - Lactation 1
 - Lactation 2
 - Lactation 3
 - Lactation 4 or greater
- Award criteria:
 - The cow in each lactation grouping with the lowest lactation Average Linear Score will be recognized as the award winner.
 - The Average Linear Score used will be for the current lactation as long as the cow has more than two tests recorded.
 - If a cow has less than two tests recorded in the current lactation, the Average Linear Score used will be from her previous lactation.
 - Dry cows are eligible for award consideration. Cows showing in a dry cow class which do not have a recorded dry date will compete using the Average Linear Score from the current lactation. Cows showing in a dry cow class which do have a recorded dry date will compete using the Average Linear Score from the recently completed lactation.
 - Tie breaker: the cow with the most test dates in that lactation will be recognized as the award winner. If a tie still exists the remaining tied nominations will be recognized as the award winners.
 - If a lactation grouping has no nominations there will be no grouping award winner recognized.

6. Exhibitors are only eligible to be recognized for one (1) Miss Q Contest award per year.
 7. AgSource will recognize and award only one cow in each lactation grouping, except as stated in 5b.

 - Questions and interpretations regarding rules are to be referred to the Fair Superintendent. Rule disputes will be handled by the Superintendent and their decisions will be final.
 - May combine or divide classes in accordance with ATPC 160.04 and ATPC 160.7 and their decision is final.
10. Once a horse is checked in and unloaded it may not leave the Fair Park until after 6 pm on Sunday unless authorized by the Superintendent/Fair Veterinarian or Fair Management.
11. Definitions:
 - Horse – over 56 inches.

- Pony – All ponies will be measured at check-ins, horses measuring 56” and under may show in the pony class or in the horse class if the exhibitor chooses. No cross exhibiting is allowed, you must show in either horse or pony classes.
 - Miniature – all miniature horses must enter and show in the pony classes for safety reasons.
 - Stallions may not be shown. A stallion is an unaltered male equine over 1 year of age.
 - Mares with foals at their side will not be allowed to exhibit.
12. Horses must be led to and from the stalling area. Exhibitors are ONLY allowed to ride the horse they entered and checked in. Riding is limited to riding arenas or when entering the show ring. NO EXCEPTIONS will be made for someone other than the exhibitor to ride the horse. For safety reasons, exhibitors may receive assistance with horse handling as long as exhibitor is in the immediate area.
13. No one may approach the judge before, during or after the show. Technical questions should be directed to the ring steward, or to the Superintendent.
14. For Safety Reasons:
- Known kickers must wear a red ribbon on their tail. It will not be judged against the horse.
 - Known biters must wear a green ribbon on their forelock. It will not be judged against the horse.
 - In driving classes an exhibitor may have an adult ride in cart (helmet required).
15. Premium Classes:
- Exhibitors may enter a maximum of 5 premium classes, unless entering Western Riding. Western Riding is the only exception to increase the 5-class maximum.
 - Exhibitors are REQUIRED to enter a showmanship class. Exhibitors choosing to enter the non-state qualifying showmanship class may not enter another showmanship class.
 - Exhibitors must be excused by the Superintendent from a premium class. Excused requests must be made at least 1 hour prior to class in order to be considered. Failure to follow this policy may compromise the exhibitor’s eligibility for state sponsored events.
 - WALK TROT EXHIBITORS MAY NOT CANTER in a premium class. They may enter Gymkhana classes but will be disqualified if they canter during the class.
16. Long pants, boots with a cut-out heel, and SEI approved (and fastened) helmets, must be worn when mounted/driving while on the Fair Park.
17. The entry gate will be held a maximum of two minutes. Exhibitors requiring a tack change must notify the gate person of the request a minimum of two (2) classes before their class is called.

Showmanship- (Required for all Exhibitors)

1. Judged on exhibitor’s ability to show the horse at halter.
2. All exhibitors MUST enter showmanship at time of entry to participate.

Trail

1. Exhibitor judged on training and handling of the horse & horsemanship.

Horsemanship/Equitation

1. Exhibitor’s ability to ride under saddle.

Pleasure

1. Judged as to its performance as a pleasure mount.

1. Exhibitor Eligibility & General Guidelines:

- Entry Fee: \$1 per class unless noted. Substitutions are allowed only within the division entered.
- Each exhibitor is allowed a maximum of 15 total entries within the Junior Poultry Department. Junior exhibitors may enter in the open show but may not exhibit the same birds in both shows.
- There will be a pre-fair poultry department exhibitor meeting for exhibitors who will be bringing live birds to the Fair. Exhibitors are strongly encouraged to attend, updated Fair and department information discussed will supersede printed entry information. Please watch the website at JCFairPark .com for meeting information.
- All Exhibitors are expected to assist with fair set up Saturday July 9th, fair take down Sunday July 17, and to complete 30 minutes barn duty during the fair.
- Exhibitors are encouraged to decorate their cooping area to promote a positive image of agriculture. Coops and animals must be kept accessible to the public while the barn is open or as designated by Fair Management. All waste, feed, manure and trash should be disposed of properly.
- Eggs laid at the Fair become Fair property and will be properly disposed of by Fair Management.
- All exhibits will receive the best care and protection the surroundings will afford, but they are at all times subject to the owner's risk. All exhibitors are expected to conform to Jefferson County Fair participation and exhibition policies. Failure to comply may result in premium and awards forfeiture, dismissal from the grounds and being barred from immediate and/or future exhibitions. Fair management reserves the right to interpret and enforce the rules and regulations; split or combine classes; accept or reject any entry entirely, partially or conditionally.

2. Animal and Exhibitor Safety:

- All exhibitors are expected to display positive animal welfare practices while at the Fair. Fair Management reserves the right to disqualify/remove exhibitors and/or entries deemed not presenting positive animal welfare practices.
- Due to animal wellness and safety concerns all poultry are restricted to the designated area and the immediate surrounding area. Animals found outside of the poultry barn area will be immediately disqualified. No animals other than those entered will be permitted in the Poultry Building. Fair Management has the discretion to approve special circumstances.
- For public safety and liability reasons exhibitors may not use space in or around their exhibits to conduct any type of direct contact/petting or photo opportunities geared toward fairgoers/public.
- Animals deemed uncontrollable and unsafe to exhibit will be dismissed from the show ring/Fair. Fair Management retains the right to warn the exhibitor and dismiss any animal deemed unsafe or uncontrollable at

any time. No prizes and awards will be awarded if an animal is dismissed.

Exhibitors and visitors are prohibited from handling birds other than their own without the consent of the Superintendent(s). Violation may result in loss of all prizes and awards.

3. Equipment:

- Tack: Show boxes, feed, bedding and other show equipment used for poultry care must be kept neatly in the club's designated tack area and out of the public aisles. It is important to keep all housing areas orderly and safe to promote positive animal agriculture to the public.
- Carrying Cases: Exhibitors must remove their carrying cases from the exhibit area after caging their entries.
- Coop Cups: Two cups of appropriate size must be provided and secured by the exhibitor for each bird being caged prior to the poultry being checked in. No disposable type cups; paper, plastic or Styrofoam allowed.
- Exhibitors are responsible to feed and water their own birds. Poultry must have access to fresh water at all times. The Fair will seek a sponsor for poultry exhibit feed but if not secured exhibitors must bring their own feed.

4. Health Records:

- Persons exhibiting poultry at Jefferson County Fair must send a copy of Official Documentation or Form 9-2 demonstrating their birds are pullorum-typhoid free prior to July 1. Poultry may not be exhibited at Jefferson County Fair unless accompanied by the required health forms. All documentation received will be retained by Jefferson County Fair and shall not be returned to the exhibitor. The Jefferson County Fair will not be responsible for pullorum testing. All poultry over 4 months of age, except pigeons, shown in public exhibition must show proof of disease status by presenting one of the following:
 - Certified flock status (Official Documentation)
 - NPIP Participant or Affiliate Flock Certificate
 - Wisconsin Tested Flock Certificate
 - Wisconsin Associate Flock Certificate
 - Wisconsin Individual Poultry Test Report (Form 9-2)
 - Individual identification must be on the test report
 - Youth Exhibition Exemption
 - Leader Letter and Hatchery Receipts
- All Poultry will be health inspected by Fair Management upon arrival before placing birds in coops. Poultry with any external parasites (lice, mites, fleas) will be disqualified from competition and removed from the Fair Park at Fair Managements discretion. Wet poultry will not be accepted at time of entry.
- If, at any time, any bird shows evidence of a contagious or infectious disease, it shall be removed immediately from the exhibit, quarantined, or harvested as directed by Fair Management, Fair Veterinarian or the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection Representative. All poultry exhibited may be subject to quarantine or harvest if any contagious or infectious disease is discovered among any of the poultry in the exhibit. Reference health regulations for more information.

5. Class Definitions:

- Cock, Hen, Old Male, Old Female - hatched prior to the calendar year shown.
- Cockerel, Pullet, Young Male, Young Female - hatched during the calendar year shown.
- Questionable age verification will be determined by the Superintendent(s) or by the department judge and that decision is final.
- Chicken and Pigeon: Must be at least eight (8) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
- Waterfowl: Must be at least ten (10) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
- Turkeys: Must be at least fifteen (15) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
- Birds must be entered and exhibited in the class created for that specific breed and variety. The Any Other Variety division is solely for varieties which have no other class. Birds incorrectly entered by the exhibitor will be disqualified.

6. Identification:

- Per state requirements all poultry must be identified with numbered leg bands which must be provided at entry/check-in and recorded on the back of the entry tag, by the exhibitor, when the bird is cooped. All pigeons must be seamless banded with a numbered band from a recognized banding organization in the current year.

7. Cooping

- Junior Show (except market classes) will be cooped by club/group. The market show will be cooped in a classified manner as to breed, variety and sex. Fair Management reserves the right to consolidate coops.
- Exhibitors must keep cages clean throughout the fair. Cages found to be in unsanitary conditions will receive a notice to remedy the situation. If conditions are not brought up to standard the entry shall be dismissed from the exhibit. No premiums will be awarded if a bird is dismissed.

8. Judging:

- Judges may disqualify birds which are incorrectly entered, in questionable condition or which are not true breed representative.
- Exhibitors and spectators shall not converse with the judge during judging unless the judge initiates communication.
- Exhibitors are responsible to bring their entries to the judging area for Face to Face judging with the exception of market class and open class birds which will be cage judged, exhibits which are cage judged will have coop tags covered during judging.
- Shows will be judged according to APA rules and regulations with the following exception:
 - Fowl shall be judged by standards of the latest revised edition of the American Standard of Perfection, copyrighted by the American Poultry Association, Inc.
 - Pigeons shall be judged by comparison and judges will use the National Pigeon Association Standards as their guide.
- Sticker awards will be placed on coop tags upon completion of judging. Exhibitors are to pick up their ribbon/trophy awards at the completion of the show on Friday.

3. Baled Hay exhibits: current year first crop OR second crop. Displayed as a slab approximately 6" thick, wrapped in a heavy-duty plastic bag. Plastic wrap or oversized bags should not be used. DO NOT TAPE entry tag to the bag.
4. Haylage exhibits: must indicate what type of storage it is from (ex. Sealed, stave, bunker).
5. Stalk exhibits: displayed in a 5 gallon bucket, tied loosely together with roots on and soil removed. No plastic bags.
6. Peck exhibits: exhibited in a One Gallon Zip Lock Bag. Grain and haylage must be 1" below the top. Grain judged based on uniformity of kernel, soundness, percentage of foreign matter, damaged grain and weight per bushel.

Exhibitor Eligibility & General Guidelines:

- Entry Fee: \$1 per class unless noted. Substitutions are allowed only within the division entered.
- Exhibition is open to persons of any age who are Jefferson County residents. Columbia, Dane, Dodge, Rock, Walworth and Waukesha County's residents may also exhibit as space permits
- Each exhibitor is allowed a maximum of 15 total entries within the Open Poultry Department. Junior exhibitors may enter in the open show but may not exhibit the same birds in both shows.
- Exhibitors are encouraged to decorate their cooping area to promote a positive image of agriculture. Coops and animals must be kept accessible to the public while the barn is open or as designated by Fair Management. All waste, feed, manure and trash should be disposed of properly.
- All exhibits will receive the best care and protection the surroundings will afford, but they are at all times subject to the owner's risk. All exhibitors are expected to conform to Jefferson County Fair participation and exhibition policies. Failure to comply may result in premium and awards forfeiture, dismissal from the grounds and being barred from immediate and/or future exhibitions. Fair management reserves the right to interpret and enforce the rules and regulations; split or combine classes; accept or reject any entry entirely, partially or conditionally.

Animal and Exhibitor Safety:

- All exhibitors are expected to display positive animal welfare practices while at the Fair. Fair Management reserves the right to disqualify/remove exhibitors and/or entries deemed not presenting positive animal welfare practices.
- Due to animal wellness and safety concerns all poultry are restricted to the designated area and the immediate surrounding area. Animals found outside of the poultry barn area will be immediately disqualified. No animals other than those entered will be permitted in the Poultry Building. Fair Management has the discretion to approve special circumstances.
- For public safety and liability reasons exhibitors may not use space in or around their exhibits to conduct any type of direct contact/petting or photo opportunities geared toward fairgoers/public.
- Animals deemed uncontrollable and unsafe to exhibit will be dismissed from the show ring/Fair. Fair Management retains the right to warn the exhibitor and dismiss any animal deemed unsafe or uncontrollable at any time. No prizes and awards will be awarded if an animal is dismissed.
- Exhibitors and visitors are prohibited from handling birds other than their own without the consent of the Fair Management. Violation may result in loss of all prizes and awards.
- Eggs laid at the Fair become Fair property and will be properly disposed of by Fair Management.

Equipment:

- Tack: Show boxes, feed, bedding and other show equipment used for poultry care must be kept neatly in the club's designated tack area and out of the public aisles. It is important to keep all housing areas orderly and safe to promote positive animal agriculture to the public.
- Carrying Cases: Exhibitors must remove their carrying cases from the exhibit area after caging their entries.
- Coop Cups: Two cups of appropriate size must be provided and secured by the exhibitor for each bird being caged prior to the poultry being checked in. No disposable type cups; paper, plastic or

Styrofoam allowed.

- Exhibitors are responsible to feed and water their own birds. Poultry must have access to fresh water at all times.

Health Records:

- Persons exhibiting poultry at Jefferson County Fair must send a copy of Official Documentation or Form 9-2 demonstrating their birds are pullorum-typhoid free prior to July 1. Poultry may not be exhibited at Jefferson County Fair unless accompanied by the required health forms. All documentation received will be retained by Jefferson County Fair and shall not be returned to the exhibitor. The Jefferson County Fair will not be responsible for pullorum testing. All poultry over 4 months of age, except pigeons, shown in public exhibition must show proof of disease status by presenting one of the following:
 - Certified flock status (Official Documentation)
 - NPIP Participant or Affiliate Flock Certificate
 - Wisconsin Tested Flock Certificate
 - Wisconsin Associate Flock Certificate
 - Wisconsin Individual Poultry Test Report (Form 9-2)
 - Individual identification must be on the test report
 - Youth Exhibition Exemption
 - Leader Letter and Hatchery Receipts
- All Poultry will be health inspected by Fair Management upon entry before placing birds in coops. Poultry with any external parasites (lice, mites, fleas) will be disqualified from competition and removed from the Fair Park at Fair Managements discretion. Wet poultry will not be accepted at time of entry.
- If, at any time, any bird shows evidence of a contagious or infectious disease, it shall be removed immediately from the exhibit, quarantined or harvested as directed by Fair Management, Fair Veterinarian or the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection Representative. All poultry exhibited may be subject to quarantine or harvest if any contagious or infectious disease is discovered among any of the poultry in the exhibit. Reference health regulations for more information.

Class Definitions:

Birds must be entered and exhibited in the class created for that specific breed and variety. The Any Other Variety division is solely for varieties which have no other class. Birds incorrectly entered by the exhibitor will be disqualified.

- Cock, Hen, Old Male, Old Female - hatched prior to the calendar year shown.
- Cockerel, Pullet, Young Male, Young Female - hatched during the calendar year shown.
- Chicken and Pigeon: Must be at least eight (8) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
- Waterfowl: Must be at least ten (10) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
- Turkeys: Must be at least fifteen (15) weeks of age at time of exhibit.

Questionable age verification will be determined by the Superintendent(s) or by the department judge and that decision is final.

Identification:

- Per state requirements all poultry must be marked with numbered leg bands which must appear on the entry forms and must be recorded on the back of the entry tag, by the exhibitor, when the bird is cooped. All pigeons must be seamless banded with a numbered band from a recognized banding organization in the current year.

Cooping:

- The show and will be cooped in a classified manner as to breed, variety and sex. Fair Management reserves the right to consolidate coops.
- Exhibitors must keep cages clean throughout the fair. Cages found to be in unsanitary conditions will receive a notice to remedy the situation. If conditions are not brought up to standard the entry shall be dismissed from the exhibit. No premiums will be awarded if a bird is dismissed.

Judging:

- Judges may disqualify birds which are incorrectly entered, in questionable condition or which are not true breed representative.
- Exhibitors and spectators shall not converse with the judge during judging.
- Coop tags will be covered at the time of judging.
- Shows will be judged in a cage format according to APA rules and regulations with the following exception:
 - Fowl shall be judged by standards of the latest revised edition of the American Standard of

- Perfection, copyrighted by the American Poultry Association, Inc.
- Pigeons shall be judged by comparison and judges will use the National Pigeon Association Standards as their guide.

Awards:

- Sticker awards will be placed on coop tags upon completion of judging. Exhibitors are to pick up their ribbon/trophy awards at the completion of the show on Friday.

 - Grass hay sheaves are to be 3" in diameter at the upper band. Samples should be selected when in the right stage for good hay, cured throughout, leaves left on, and as green cured as possible.
 - Clover and alfalfa sheaves are to be 3" at the largest diameter. Samples should be selected when in right state for good hay, cured throughout, leaves left on, and as green cured as possible.
 - Soybean sheaves are to be 4"-8" in diameter at the middle band exhibited fresh with the roots on and the soil washed off. Leaves must be removed.
 - Grains are to be 3" in diameter in the middle, tied with at least two bands and are to be dried throughout. Leaves must be removed.
5. Baled hay display is a slab approximately 6", wrapped in a heavy duty plastic bag. Plastic wrap or oversized bags are not to be used. Tape entry tag to the bag.
6. Stalk exhibits of corn are to be displayed in a clean 5 gallon bucket with water, tied together loosely with twine with their roots (soil removed) on. Do not use plastic bags.
7. Pecks are to be exhibited in a one Gallon Zip Lock Bag. Grain and haylage must be 1" below the top of bag.
8. Grain judging will be based on uniformity of kernel, soundness, percentage of foreign matter, damaged grain and weight per bushel.
9. Haylage must indicate what type of silo it is from.
10. Field Crops are to be identified with variety.

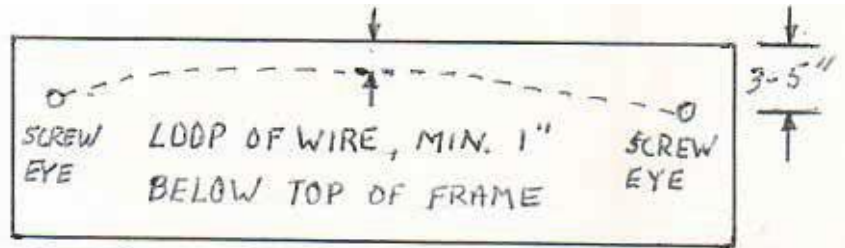
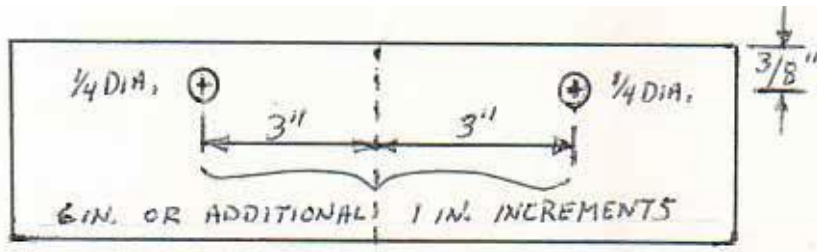

11. Wildlife entries to be as found in nature, not in a zoo or exhibit etc.
12. "Food" photo to be a prepared display like used in a printed advertisement.
13. All entries are to be single photos except the Collection entries.
14. Photo Size:
 - Individual photo entry size: minimum 5" x 7" and maximum 11" x 14". All entries must be mounted securely on a piece of mat/foam board or be framed and be prepared for hanging. Matting is allowed. Mat/foamboard size shall be: 8" x 10" for 5" x 7" entries and 11" x 14" for 8" x 10" or 8" x 12" entries. Frame side width allowed is 2".
 - Collection photo entry size: 4" x 6". Photos must be mounted on a 11" x 14" mat/foamboard and not framed. Poster/construction paper/tag board are NOT ALLOWED.
 - Panoramic: 8" x 20" maximum mat/foamboard or frame size
15. Matboard: Thickness such that it is rigid and will not fold up by itself (approx. 1/16"). Color: White preferred but other Color matboard is acceptable if it enhances the photo(s).
16. Foamboard: Thickness to be standard (approx. 1/4").
17. Mat/foamboard shall be prepared for hanging by using two 1/4" diameter holes spaced in 1" or 6" increments, and approx. 3/8" down from the top. This will allow exhibit to be displayed using two pegboard hooks. Dimensions given are guidelines for ease of display only. Do-its or hanging tabs are acceptable.
17. Frames: Sawtooth type hangers will not be accepted.
 - Wood shall be prepared for hanging using screw eyes (2" to 5" below the top) and/or stranded picture frame wire (loop of wire shall be a minimum 1" below the top of the frame. Dimensions given are guideline for ease of display only.
 - All other frames; metal, plastic, shadow box etc. must be prepared appropriately to hang straight on large pegboard hooks.
18. Entry tags should be picked up at the Fair office prior to drop-off day and mounted in the lower left or right hand corner as close to the frame/mat/foamboard as possible.
