Frequently asked questions:

What is the Diner Night & Poker Run?

This event was created as a family event for our community. We have some wonderful diners/restaurants in our community. We want to encourage everyone to get back to the days where families went to their local diners and had a meal with their family. By combining this with a Poker Run, we give families the opportunity to see some classic cars in action. This is the perfect occasion to cruise around town and get some great food along the way.

Do I have to have a classic car to participate?

No, the poker run is open to everyone! We encourage families to come out to our local diners and have a meal. Join the Poker Run and cruise alongside some of the most beautiful classic cars in the northwest.

Where do I sign up?

You can purchase a Poker Score Sheet for \$5 each at any Poker Run location on the day of the event starting at 3:45pm. *Cards cannot be picked until 4:00pm. This allows you to start from any location you choose.

Is there a limit to how many cards we can play?

One Poker Run Sheet per person is allowed. <u>Example</u>: if you have four people in your car, you can get up to four cards per run. You can play more than once by purchasing additional Sheets after you finish your first run. *A run is a completed card of all 5 locations.

Where do we meet after the Poker Run Ends?

The JOCO Fairgrounds at the Midway Park. Starting at 5:00pm there will be 50's music and at 6 pm there will be a Sock Hop with Music etc to entertain you while you are awaiting the raffle and winners **There will be a limited amount of Classic Car parking on the Midway.** When you are done with your Run, head on over to the Fairgrounds and hang out with your friends. Score Sheets must be turned in no later than 6:30pm. We will be announcing winners about 6:45pm at the Sock Hop on the Midway Grass Park.

What are the Poker Run Prizes?

The Poker Run is a 50-50 net payout of the participation. It pays five places and the percentages are listed on your poker run card.
