All premium monies earned in the FFA Exhibits and Contest will be paid to the FFA Chapter and not the individual student. All FFA Chapters participating in the FFA Exhibits and Contest must provide a tax identification number for the premiums to be paid to the FFA Chapter. ALL exhibits must be identified by the chapter name. ALL individual exhibits must be identified with the members' name.

Entering an exhibit:

- **Use Student's name unless it is a group project. If a group project, enter school name (First name of school, etc).**
- **Enter all required information, including a description of the item.**
- **When entering an exhibit (page __1__ of the registration page, please select school)**
- **If questions, please call the Fair Office at 620-669-3621.**

KSF GENERAL AND DEPARTMENTAL RULES

1. **DEADLINE DATES:** All FFA exhibitors are required to submit their entries online by the deadline date of Tuesday, **August 26, 2025**. Assistance for online entries is available during regular business hours only. (Monday – Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.) by calling the fair office at 620-669-3621.
2. **REQUIRED EXHIBITOR FEES:** MKC is covering all required entry fees.
3. **ENTRIES/LATE ENTRIES:** FFA Entries will be accepted beginning May 1, 2025. **In accordance with the following schedule, no entries will be accepted after August 26, 2025.**
4. An individual member/exhibitor may enter one (1) item per class, unless noted differently.
5. Exhibitors have up to 15 minutes to arrange, display, or touch-up their exhibit upon arrival, prior to check-in. Exhibits cannot be prepared or assembled on-site unless it is a "real-time" contest, and it is stated in the rules. Department Managers have the right to disqualify an entry or exhibit if anyone, other than the exhibitor, has prepared it. **ALL WORK MUST BE THAT OF THE EXHIBITOR.**
6. Displayed exhibits may be limited — KSF reserves the right to display only what the room allows. Any item not being displayed will have designated pick-up times. First place through third place is guaranteed to be shown. Every effort will be made to display ALL items entered in the fair.
7. Any item not meeting Kansas State Fair requirements will not be accepted. If an item is accepted in oversight, it may later be disqualified and/or not judged or displayed.
8. During check-in, a Kansas State Fair staff member may question if you entered your item properly, but only if it is obvious that the item may not meet the class requirements. If an exhibitor is not sure if they entered their item(s) properly, they must ask a staff member for assistance **BEFORE** the item is checked in. This process can only be done during receiving hours and at the request of the exhibitor. If you question the class entered, and the Department Manager can justify the error, it may be moved to the proper class. Once an item has been checked in, **IT CANNOT BE MOVED**, without the prior approval of the Competitive Exhibit Coordinator. Check-in finalizes your entry. **Kansas State Fair does not allow any item substitutions.**
9. Entries will not be judged in "Any Other Items" or "Not Specified" class, if there is already a class for that item available.
10. All exhibits must have been created, grown, or harvested by the exhibitor during the season of the current year unless otherwise stated. All creative items must have been completed since the 2024 Kansas State Fair (Since September 15,

2024).

11. If a "real-time" contest has fewer than two entered contestants, the contest may be changed to allow walk-up entries, with the approval of the KSF Competitive Exhibit Coordinator and sponsor (if the Division is sponsored).
12. After arrangements of exhibits for prizes, no change will be allowed except on authority from KSF Competitive Exhibit Coordinator.
13. **Our primary audience consists of family and youth. We reserve the right to reject any entry that may be considered objectionable by that audience.**
14. A brief description of your item when entering online (as to color, size or pattern, brand) is appreciated.
15. For the protection of the exhibitor, claim stubs are encouraged at the time of release for items. If the claim stub is lost, you must have a valid photo ID to claim the items.
16. Each article in a collection or plural exhibit must show the exhibitor's name and class of competition.
17. All exhibits will receive the best care and protection in their surroundings. The exhibits, at times, are subject to owner's risk, and in no event will the Kansas State Fair, KSF staff, or volunteers be responsible for any damage that may occur. Delicately constructed items requiring more than normal careful handling should not be submitted. All exhibits will be displayed at the discretion of the KSF Staff.
18. The Kansas State Fair reserves the right to cancel any class or placing if the entries are insufficient to secure adequate competition or an award is not merited.
19. Participants will have no access to their products once they have been received by the Kansas State Fair staff.
20. The Kansas State Fair reserves the right to cancel, eliminate, or change the published premium amounts due to lack of sponsorship.
21. If, at the Judge's discretion, an entry does not merit a placing, the Judge shall give no award under any circumstances. The rule applies whether there is one or more exhibits in the class. If a tie occurs in any division or class, a judge will determine the winner.
22. When attending the Kansas State Fair, you enter an area where photography, audio, and video recording may occur. By entering the Fairgrounds, you consent to such recording media and its release to be used for news, telecasts, web casts, promotional purposes, advertising, social media, and websites. You further waive all rights you may have to any claims in connection with publication of these materials, regardless of the purpose or sponsoring of such publication.

SHIPPING:

SHIPPED ITEMS

Shipping charges on all exhibits must be prepaid. Packages should be addressed to: Kansas State Fair, ATTN: (*Fine Arts, Clothing, etc*) Department, 2000 N. Poplar, Hutchinson, KS 67502 and *must* arrive by September 3, 2025. A copy of your entry receipt should also be included in your package with your pre-registered items. Please make sure all items are labeled in a manner that can be removed before judging (a note attached by a rubber band, twist tie, masking tape, safety pin, etc.)

ITEMS TO BE RETURNED

Nonperishable item(s) will be shipped back at the exhibitor's request and expense after the fair and in its original packaging.

A Prepaid shipping label must be included with the original packaging, along with any special instructions.

Additional insurance must be included on the Prepaid Shipping Label. KSF will not add additional value to any shipment.

ARRIVAL AND JUDGING DATES FOR FFA EXHIBITS AND CONTESTS

Wednesday, September 3: Buildings will be open for entries from 12 noon to 6:00 PM

Thursday, September 4: Buildings will be open for entries from 9:30 AM to 6:00 PM

Friday, September 5: Buildings will be open to receive entries at 8:30 AM. **All FFA Exhibits must be in place by 10:00 AM**

Sunday, September 14: Release time for exhibits is 6:00 PM. For exhibitors that live more than 150 miles away, small items that can be hand-carried out can be picked up between 2:00 PM and 6:00 PM. No vehicles are permitted to load out until 6:00 PM. All exhibits are released from 6:00 PM to 8:00 PM on Sunday, Sept. 14, and from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM on Monday, Sept. 15.

DIVISION 900 – COUNTY COLLECTIVE BOOTH

1. Competition will be open to any FFA Chapter in the State of Kansas. More than one chapter may be from the same county. Two chapters may partner for one exhibit, provided they are in the same county.
2. Entries for the County Collective exhibits are limited (first-come, first-served basis) and will close when full or on August 26. Late entries may be accepted – if the number received by August 26 is not sufficient to fill all spaces. The entry will state the name of the Chapter making the exhibit, and the person who will be in charge of the exhibit. Contact Anthony Meals, State FFA Advisor, for late entries.
3. Exhibits are limited to one collective exhibit per chapter.
4. Each exhibit must be prepared, entered, and displayed by a resident of the county it represents.
5. Samples used in exhibits shall not be procured from the grounds of any county or state institution. Samples must be grown or produced in each respective county during the current year.
6. County collective agricultural exhibits are designed to be educational, to show the agricultural possibilities of the chapter making the exhibit, and to present the products of the entire county. Therefore, the samples comprising the exhibit shall have been gathered from at least ten different farms. No farm shall furnish or exceed 25 percent of the exhibit samples.
7. Photographs, diagrams, models, and figures may be used to illustrate the importance of livestock to the county.
8. All exhibits must be placed within the limits of the space provided. The booths will not be altered. The exhibitor is permitted to place sheets of plywood or wallboard on the back wall of the exhibit space. The use of crepe paper is not permitted. The booths must be kept in a condition satisfactory to the superintendent until the exhibits are officially released.
9. Each exhibit will be allotted space in the FFA Showcase Building (not to exceed 69 1/2" wide, 8' deep but may extend past the height of 7' 9 3/4" high) on a first-come, first-served basis (7 spots are available). The sheaf grain and grasses are to be displayed on the wall in decorative form; the threshed grain, seeds, fruits, vegetables, etc., will be shown on the table. **Note:** there are slight differences in the size of the exhibit space; the above dimensions are an approximation.
10. Sheaf grain is to be bound in bundles not less than two and one-half inches (2 1/2") in diameter at the middle band. Unless otherwise noted, threshed grain and seeds will be shown in quantities of one gallon each. Each article must be labeled with the name of the variety. Only one exhibit of a variety will be judged. No extra credit will be given for more exhibits than those required in the scorecard.

Entries are for individual FFA members only, no Chapter/Group Projects, and must be a product of their own Supervised Agricultural Experience program or a product of their own production/collection; not purchased, borrowed, leased, or received through gift. All exhibits must be identified with the individual's name, grade, chapter, and exhibit description. Exhibits not meeting class criteria may be discounted or disqualified.

DIVISION 901 – FFA AGRONOMIC CROP DISPLAY

Premiums/Awards for this Division: 1st – 5th place - Ribbon; Champion – Ribbon; Reserve Champion – Ribbon

An FFA member may exhibit one entry in this division. Crops used in this display should be common agronomic crops grown in Kansas. Display can be corn ears (10 ears), grain sorghum (10 heads), sunflower heads (2 heads), cotton (20 open bolls) or threshed grain (approximately one peck). All exhibits should be in a sturdy container with see through access. **Each display should be identified with the common name of the agronomic crop displayed.** All exhibits must be identified with an individual's name, grade and chapter. Top 5-10 may be displayed. Only one exhibit allowed per individual. **Exhibits not meeting class criteria may be discounted or disqualified.**

DIVISION 902 – FFA TAME AND LEGUME FORAGE GRASS EXHIBIT One Bundle

Premiums/Awards for this Division: 1st – 5th place - Ribbon; Champion – Ribbon; Reserve Champion – Ribbon

Bundles must be not less than 3 inches but no more than 5 inches at center band when cut near the ground. Should be cured (dry) before forming bundles. Will be judged on feeding value (green color, leafiness, fineness of stem, and best stage of maturity for each kind) and preparation of bundle, including neatness, cleanliness, uniformity and overall appearance. Undersized bundles, and wet or moldy bundles, will be disqualified. If Superintendent or judge deems that any bundle is old, from previous years, or is masked (New leaves over old) the Supt. has the right to disqualify the bundle. **All exhibits must be identified with an individual's name, grade, chapter, and description.** Only one exhibit allowed per class per individual. **Exhibits not meeting class criteria may be discounted or disqualified.**

CLASSES

1. Short Fine-stemmed Tame Forage Grass Bundle (Bermuda grass, Crabgrass, Kentucky Bluegrass etc.)
2. Fine-stemmed Forage Legume Bundle (Alfalfa, Sweet clover, Lespedeza, Vetch)
3. Tall Fine-stemmed Tame Forage Grass Bundle (Old World Bluestem, Weeping Lovegrass, Tall Fescue, Ryegrass, German Millet, etc.)
4. Coarse-stemmed Tame Forage Grass Bundle (Forage Sorghum, Sudangrass, or Sudangrass, X Sorghum Hybrids or Pearl Millets)

DIVISION 903 – FFA NATIVE GRASS EXHIBIT

Premiums/Awards for this Division: 1st – 5th place - Ribbon; Champion – Ribbon; Reserve Champion – Ribbon

Should be headed but not ripe enough to shatter and shown full length (cut near the ground). Bundle should be not less than 3 inches or more than 5 inches at center band. Should be cured (dried) before forming bundle. Each bundle will be considered on basis of early stage of maturity, leafiness, and green color, and on preparation and appearance of bundle. Undersized and oversized bundles and wet or moldy bundles will be disqualified. If Superintendent or judge deems that any bundle is old, from previous years, or is masked (New leaves over old) the Supt. has the right to disqualify the bundle. **All exhibits must be identified with an individual's name, grade and chapter, and description.** Only one exhibit allowed per class per individual. **Exhibits not meeting class criteria may be discounted or disqualified.**

DIVISION 904 – FFA PASTURE AND RANGE PLANT DISPLAY EXHIBIT

Premiums/Awards for this Division: 1st – 5th place - Ribbon; Champion – Ribbon; Reserve Champion – Ribbon

These displays consist of ten representative plants mounted on LIGHTWEIGHT boards, measuring 3 feet square, strong enough to stand upright. Any other size will result in disqualification. The plants should be cut to prevent any part of the plant from extending beyond the edge of the board. Grasses and other fine-stemmed plants may be shown as bundles not to exceed one inch in diameter, and single plants that are heavy-stemmed or bushy may be used. Plants should be headed and in bloom or seed stage, but not ripe enough to shatter. Label with common name. **All exhibits must be identified with an individual's name, grade, chapter, and description.** Displays will be judged on choice of species; quality of samples (green, color, leafiness, dryness, and stage maturity); neatness and arrangement of samples in general appearance of display; and correctness and readability of labels. Entries that are found to be misidentified or identical as a result of group preparation will be disqualified. The top five (5) in each class may be displayed. Only one Tame and one Native Display allowed per individual. **Exhibits not meeting class criteria may be discounted or disqualified.**

3. Native Range Plants (Grades 7, 8, 9) — Consists of Ten Native Plants (Grasses, Legumes and Forbs) Representative of Native Prairie Mixtures
4. Native Range Plants (Grades 10,11, 12) — Consists of Ten Native Plants (Grasses, Legumes and Forbs) Representative of Native Prairie Mixtures

DIVISION 905 – FFA HAY SHOW

Premiums/Awards for this Division: 1st – 5th place - Ribbon; Champion – Ribbon; Reserve Champion – Ribbon

1. Limited to 5 entries per school per class and only one entry per student per class One small square bale will constitute an entry. **All exhibits must be identified with an individual's name, grade, chapter, and description.**
2. Classes of hay will include legume and non-legume.
3. Bales may be displayed outside for the duration of Fair or sprayed with fire retardant.
4. Factors considered by the judge will include maturity, texture, leafiness, freedom from foreign material, color, size and shape of bales, odor and freedom from mold.

DIVISION 206 – FFA AGRONOMIC PLANT LIFE CYCLE DRAWING

Premiums/Awards for this Division: 1st – 5th place - Ribbon; Champion – Ribbon; Reserve Champion – Ribbon

This drawing should show all different stages of growth of the **WHEAT plant (2025)** (seed, seedling, vegetative, flowering and mature). Drawing to be done by hand and not printed. Additional stages of growth may be displayed if it adds to the exhibit. Each stage of growth should be indicated. Colors should be as near as possible to natural colors. Special characteristics for identification should also be labeled. **Drawing must include the title "Life Cycle of the Wheat Plant." Use a half sheet of white poster board (finished size approx. 22" x 14") to be displayed for landscape view. All exhibits must be identified with an individual's name, grade, chapter, and description.** Only one exhibit allowed per individual. **Exhibits not meeting class criteria may be discounted or disqualified.**

DIVISION 907 – FFA SOIL SCIENCE DISPLAY POSTER

Premiums/Awards for this Division: 1st – 5th place - Ribbon; Champion – Ribbon; Reserve Champion – Ribbon

For 2025, this drawing should show all the different layers of a Soil Horizon (O, A, E, B, C,R). Each layer should be indicated. Colors should be as near as possible to natural colors. Special characteristics and definitions for identification should also be labeled. Drawing must include the title "Average Soil Texture". **Use a half sheet of white poster board (finished size approx. 22" x 14") to be displayed for landscape view. All exhibits must be identified with an individual's name, grade, chapter, and description.** Only one exhibit allowed per individual. The top 3-5 drawings will be displayed. **Exhibits not meeting class criteria may be discounted or disqualified.**

DIVISION 908 – FFA “Agronomic History” DISPLAY POSTER
Historical Events that Shaped Crop Production

Premiums/Awards for this Division: 1st – 5th place - Ribbon; Champion – Ribbon; Reserve Champion – Ribbon

The purpose of the contest is for FFA members to research and build a display to educate the public about historical events that have affected crop production in Kansas and the U.S. *The topic for 2025 is the John Deere Steel Plow.* FFA members must research and write a brief description of the event and how it has changed agriculture, then and now. The story must be in manuscript form with not more than two double-spaced typewritten pages. In addition, one, and not more than one, 4” x 6” or 5” x 7” color or black and white photograph must accompany the story depicting the event. Each page of the story must be mounted on **a half sheet of white poster board (finished size approx. 22” x 14”) to be displayed for horizontal view. All exhibits must be identified with an individual’s name, grade, chapter, and description.** Only one exhibit allowed per individual. **Exhibits not meeting class criteria may be discounted or disqualified.**

These exhibits must be Supervised Agricultural Experience program projects of the FFA members who exhibit in this department. All fruits and vegetables exhibited must be grown by and cared for by the exhibitor and not purchased, borrowed, leased, or received through a gift. Only one exhibit is allowed in each class per individual. There are no chapter exhibits in this division, only individual exhibits. All entries must be pre-entered on Showworks by

August 26, 2025. **All exhibits must be identified with the individual's name, grade and chapter. Any exhibit not properly identified or entered in the wrong class will be automatically disqualified.** All exhibits must not have been exhibited previously at the Kansas State Fair. The department manager reserves the right to not display any exhibits. All measurements and size specified are approximate according to industry standards. Exhibits that show signs of stress or damage may be removed with the approval of the department manager. Exhibitors provide their own containers for exhibits. Exhibits of over-ripe and poor quality will be discarded and not judged. **All edible horticulture exhibits may be donated to an area food bank or other charitable group and may not be displayed based on the decision of the department manager.** Ribbons will be awarded to each class top five (5) exhibits.

DIVISION 909 – VEGETABLE AND FRUIT EXHIBITS

Awards for this Division: 1st – 5th place - Ribbon; Champion – Ribbon; Reserve Champion – Ribbon

Most items are to be displayed for judging on either disposable plates or bowls – provided by exhibitor. All edible horticulture exhibits will be donated to an area food bank or other charitable group if possible and may not be displayed based on the decision of the superintendent. Exhibits of over-ripe and poor quality will be discarded and will not be judged.

1. Potatoes, White or Red, 4 specimens (displayed for judging on disposable plates– Exhibitor provided)
2. Okra, 6 specimens (displayed for judging on disposable plates– Exhibitor provided)
3. Onions, Yellow, White or Red, 4 specimens (displayed for judging on disposable plates– Exhibitor provided)
4. Eggplant, 2 specimens (displayed for judging on disposable plates– Exhibitor provided)
5. Pepper (Hot Peppers), 6 specimens (displayed for judging on disposable plates– Exhibitor provided)
6. Pepper (Sweet Peppers), 6 specimens (displayed for judging on disposable plates– Exhibitor provided)
7. Tomatoes (Large type), 4 specimens (displayed for judging on disposable plates– Exhibitor provided)
8. Tomatoes (Cherry type), 6 specimens (displayed for judging on disposable bowls– Exhibitor provided)
9. Pumpkin, 1 specimen

4. Exhibitors participating in Tractor Repair/Restoration will be expected to participate in a 20-minute interview about their project on Friday afternoon, beginning at 1 p.m.
5. Pictures showing operation of the project may be displayed with the exhibit.
6. Each exhibit shall have a sign showing chapter, ownership, a detailed bill of materials with cost, and a suggested retail price.
7. Entries will be judged on the basis of workmanship, structure and design, practicability, safety, and materials used.
8. Exhibits in Classes 3-5 must be factory-manufactured equipment that has been reconditioned/repaired/restored. It is recommended that 1 to 3 photographs of the project, before the start of restoration, be included with the material list.)
9. Exhibits in Classes 16, 17, and 18 "Small Projects" should be less than 2 ft. in length or less than 20 lbs. in weight.
10. Where an exhibit is entered in the wrong class, the Superintendent will make the determination and transfer it to the proper class.
11. The judges will not award premiums or points for entries in any class that do not meet acceptable standards of quality.
12. All exhibits are to be displayed in a safe manner.

2. The Agriscience Project Display is not to exceed the dimensions of 36" high (from top of table to top of display), 48" (width), and 30" deep (the distance from front to back).
3. Due to space limitations only the top 5 Agriscience Projects may be displayed.
4. Judging criteria for the Agriscience Project Display: Creative ability/originality: 25 points, Scientific thought/goal: 25 points, Supporting evidence: 25 points, Poster appearance: 25 points, **TOTAL: 100 points**
5. Interviews will not be conducted. Only the display board/poster will be evaluated.
6. Ribbons awarded to 1st-5th in each category: Animal Systems, Plant Systems, Food Products & Processing, Environmental Science/Natural Resources, Power, Structural and Technical Systems, Social Science.

2. Students would create a 3D model of facilities attached to a base of approximately 1/8" thick OSB, plywood, sheet metal, or similar materials, not to exceed **18 inches by 18 inches**. The base must be strong enough to support moving by hand but not so heavy or bulky that it would present difficulty in judging or displaying.
3. The 3D model should be constructed to scale and may **not exceed 1 foot in height**. Materials used can be virtually anything non-edible and non-perishable.
4. An **essay** of up to ONE, page (12-point font) must accompany the display. The essay should explain such items as purpose, features, design concepts, and rationale. Essay must identify the name of the student, name of FFA chapter and identify the design. The essay must be in a clear page protector or laminated and attached to the display in a manner that would allow for easy viewing by judges and spectators.
5. Due to space limitations, only the top 5 Animal Science Facilities Models may be displayed.
6. Judging criteria for the Animal Science Facilities Model Display: Creativeness/originality: 25 points, Effectiveness, Efficiency and Functionality of Design: 25 points, Animal Safety: 15 points, Overall Appearance: 10 points, Accompanying Essay: 25 points, **TOTAL: 100 points**

3. An **essay** of up to **ONE** page (12-point font) must accompany the display. The essay should explain the exact proportion of the feedstuffs used, what type/class of animal the feed is for the rationale for selecting the ingredients, the projected nutritional value for protein, fat, and fiber, the manner in which the ration should be feed, and the approximate cost of the ration. Essay must identify the name of the student, name of FFA chapter and identify the design. The essay must be in a clear page protector or laminated and attached to the display in a manner that would allow for easy viewing by judges and spectators.
4. Due to space limitations, only the top 5 Animal Science Balanced Ration Display and Essay may be displayed.
5. Judging criteria for the Animal Science Balanced Ration Display and Essay: Nutritional Value and Palatability: 25 points, Accuracy and Proportionality: 25 points, Creativeness/originality/use of resources: 15 points, Overall Appearance: 10 points, Accompanying Essay: 25 points, **TOTAL: 100 points**

Purpose: To promote the benefits of enrolling in Agricultural Education and joining FFA. Booth will be of the type that could be used in various settings, such as FFA Week booths, shopping center displays, local fairs, etc.

Design: Booth will consist of a 6' tabletop display. **The table will NOT be provided and must be 6' in length.** The table must be a standard height (approximately 32" inches) and 28" to 34" wide. The display board will be constructed to an overall 4' x 8' size. The display is to be hinged to consist of two 2' wings and a 4' center back. Absolutely no part of the display is to extend past the left, right or front sides of the six-foot table. Nothing can be placed in front of the display. Tabletop displays that are more than 6' tall above the table and/or are "top heavy" may be discounted in the scoring process or disqualified. Due to space limitations, only a standard 6' folding table will be allowed to be used.

Appearance: All tables must be skirted to the floor. It is recommended that the back side of the display board be painted dark in color. Tables will NOT be provided by the Fair. The chapter is responsible for bringing their own table and covering the top of the table and skirting the table on three sides from tabletop to floor.

Theme: "Seek. Grow. Innovate" is the theme for 2025. The Chapter name must be displayed. The Superintendent will assign booth space upon arrival. Booths that do not meet requirements or follow guidelines (size, theme, division, etc.) may be disqualified from the competition and/or removed from the display area.

Active Display: Chapters may include components in booths with a moving or active display involving powered devices. Examples may include water wheels, fans, rotating devices, talking booths, and electronic devices.

Electrical Supply: The chapter will be responsible for access to electrical power for the active display or any lighting used to enhance the display. There is no guarantee of the availability of electrical outlets. Electrical outlets may be provided, pending availability, and an extension cord may be required and will NOT be provided.

Set-up: Booths MUST be completely set up and ready for judging by 10 AM on Friday. Any booth not set up before 10:00 AM will not be judged and may not be displayed.
