

- Wet your hands with clean, running water
- Apply soap
- Rub hands together to make a lather and scrub back of hands, between fingers and under fingernails.
- Rub hands at least 20 seconds
- Rinse hands
- Dry hands using a clean paper towel or air dry them.
- Always wash hands after touching animals or their living area, after leaving the animal area, after taking off dirty clothes or shoes, after going to the bathroom, before preparing foods, eating or drinking
