GENERAL RULES FOR ALL EXHIBITORS

1. It is the expectation of the King County Fair that all exhibitors' actions, displays and/or behaviors will promote a safe family experience for patrons and exhibitors, and anything judged to be inappropriate by the King County Fair Board are grounds for removal and disqualification from the King County Fair.

2. Exhibitors of articles, animals and/or livestock at the fair accept the risk of loss or damage to their articles, animals and/or livestock while displayed at the fair and agree to hold the King County Fair harmless if such damage or loss should occur. Exhibitors shall be responsible to secure any insurance or other protection against said damage or loss.

3. The Fair Board reserves the right to accept, reject, or accept conditionally any entry or application.

4. Exhibits entered in the wrong lots may be reclassified by the superintendent.

5. Smoking and vaping is prohibited in and around barns and buildings at Enumclaw Expo Center

GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES 4-H - FFA - OPEN CLASS

1. JUDGING ORDER - The order of showing livestock will be as listed in the premium book. All items not covered in the premium book shall be left to the decision of the Barn Superintendent.

2. JUDGING SHOW TIME - Exhibitors will promptly lead their animals into the ring for competition when called by the Superintendent or may forfeit premiums. If you are showing in both 4-H/FFA and Open Class, you must pay attention to show time. Youth exhibitors also in 4-H and FFA will be required to do their own fitting and prepping.

3. ANIMAL CONTROL - All unruly animals or animals that require medication or special equipment to handle or restrain are not to be brought to the Fair. (Exception: open class bull with approval from Livestock Superintendent.) If an animal is unruly or the exhibitor does not show he or she can control the animal, the Superintendent can disqualify the animal. (Exception: open class bull with approval from Livestock Superintendent.) Exhibitors are liable for damage caused by animals they entered.

4. Any deviation from these guidelines may result in loss of premiums and/or disqualification from the Fair.

PROHIBITED ITEMS

No person shall possess or discharge any firearm, bow and arrow, air or gas weapon, slingshot, fireworks, or explosive at the Fair. Exceptions made for archery competitions. Persons on the premises must abide by the Enumclaw Expo & Event Center policies. Prohibited items include skateboards, rollerblades, animals other than registered projects and official service animals, weapons, alcoholic beverages, controlled substances, and marijuana. *All bags, blankets, coolers etc are subject to search by Fair Management and/or Security and Law Enforcement on-site.*

PREMIUM CHECKS

Premium checks will be made available around October 1 of the current year and will be mailed to exhibitors at the mailing address associated with their entry form. Checks must be cashed by December 31st of the current year issued. No checks will be reissued after December 1 of the current year. All checks not cashed by December 31, will be considered a donation to the Fair.

Any error in the records of premiums caused by oversight or neglect shall be subject to correction whenever proof is furnished to the fair office that a mistake has been made. Errors and checks not received in the mail by November 1st of current year should be reported via email to renep@enumclawexpo.com.

Checks that are lost or damaged will be subjected to a \$35.00 fee for canceling and replacing a check.

1099 Information: If you exceed \$600.00 in total premiums, you will need to file a W-9 form. These are available in the fair office. Premium checks will not be issued unless we have the completed W-9 form.

EXHIBITOR PARKING PASSES

It is mandatory that all exhibitors entering livestock and/or small animals into the King County Fair and who will be parking a vehicle, must purchase an Exhibitor Pass at time of entry.

- Exhibitor Parking Permits may be purchased only at the Fair Office or on-line.
- All parking permits are issued for one vehicle.

EXHIBITOR ENTRY TICKETS

Information will be available on the King County Fair website. Tickets available beginning May 1st - link to buy tickets will also be shared in the 4-H Newsletter.

STALL / PEN / CAGE / TACK REQUESTS

The Livestock Superintendents shall assign all spaces, stalls, pens, and cages. Each 4-H, FFA, OC Livestock Superintendent must indicate on entry forms the number of pens requested. The following is needed for EACH club/chapter: number of exhibitors, number of pens, stalls, cages, and/or benches and number of tack/carding pens.

TACK/PEN SPACE - is available as room allows. Space will be assigned on set-up day. Stall, pen and cage assignment and structure of pens will not be altered without approval from Fair Manager or designee – NO EXCEPTIONS.

FEED & ANIMAL BEDDING

ANIMAL FEED - Each exhibitor shall furnish necessary feed for his animals and arrange for their care.

BEDDING - Sawdust bedding will be provided by the Fairgrounds for all barns. Sawdust is to be used moderately. The amount used will be monitored and regulated by superintendents.

STRAW will be ordered in advance and must be included on the supply list by each superintendent or leader. Straw will be made available to other exhibitors based on leftover availability only.

CLEANLINESS DURING AND END OF FAIR

BEDDING AND MANURE must be deposited in DESIGNATED AREAS. Dumpsters are provided at that North end of the Livestock Barn and on the East side of the Horse Barn for manure disposal. Anyone dumping or depositing bedding or manure in the Fair garbage containers or any other area is subject to forfeiture of premiums or disqualification in future fairs.

CLEAN UP - At the conclusion of the fair, all animal owners will remove their animal's bedding before departure from the fairgrounds, if exhibitor does not comply, they will be billed a \$50 pen/tie/stall cleaning charge, or the amount will be withheld from premium checks.

PROPERTY OF ENUMCLAW EXPO CENTER

The general supervision of the grounds, and the entire exhibition, are vested in Enumclaw Expo Center management. Property of the Enumclaw Expo Center may not be removed from the grounds.

LOAD-IN DAY

Please contact your Department Superintendent for the authorized date and time to drive onto the fairgrounds. Load-In times will be assigned by animal species. Non-authorized vehicles are not allowed on the fairgrounds. No vehicle entry Thursday, Friday, Saturday, or Sunday. Absolutely, no inside fairground parking allowed. Your vehicle will be towed.

VETERINARIAN CHECK & ANIMAL ILLNESS

VETERINARIAN INSPECTION - All animals will be subject to a clinical inspection by the veterinarian in charge at the time of entry. Any animals showing evidence of disease may be refused entry. The professional advice of local veterinarians will be considered by barn superintendents when decisions are made about an animal's admittance to the grounds.

EVIDENCE OF DISEASE - Any animal or bird showing evidence of contagious or infectious disease, including but not limited to, abscess, sore mouth, mastitis, foot rot, warts, boils, or ringworm, will be refused entry into the fairgrounds or removed from the fairgrounds at the discretion of the superintendent.

SICK ANIMALS – when an animal or bird develops a disease condition during the Fair, please notify the barn superintendent to begin the process to determine if the animal will need to be released. One criterion for release of a sick animal will be a rise in temperature.

THE EXHIBITOR IS FINANCIALLY responsible for veterinary care received during the Fair for animals sick or injured. (Department Superintendent can make a vet call if attempts to contact the exhibitor are unsuccessful).

DOGS & PETS

No dogs or other pets are permitted at Enumclaw's Expo Center. Exception: on duty police dogs, service animals (as defined by ADA), trained animals in scheduled acts, and animals entered in competition. Household and family pets, whether domestic or wild, and service animals not recognized by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Section 36.104 are not permitted on the Fairgrounds during the King County Fair.

HERDSMANSHIP

Herdsmanship at King County Fair is required in each animal department. 4-H exhibitors are required to do exhibitorship in the Still Life building. Accommodations can be requested for 4-H youth - contact Nancy at nbaskett@wsu.edu.

LOAD OUT AND RELEASE OF ANIMALS

RELEASE OF LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS - No livestock exhibit will be permitted to be removed before 6:00 PM, Sunday of Fair. Any exception to this rule must be with the approval. Any animal released early will not be permitted to return to the Fair.

Animals located in the Livestock barn will be informed of the time vehicles can enter through gate 1. Large livestock that was auctioned at the sale is being transported off-site. The transporters have priority through gate 1 and it must be kept clear until the large livestock is loaded and removed from the grounds. NO EXCEPTIONS!

STATE 4-H FAIR

4-H Still Life Exhibitors who qualify by receiving a blue ribbon placing in a still life project are eligible to enter at the 4-H State Fair hosted at the Washington State Fair in Puyallup.

Animals will be eligible to enter the 4-H State Fair based on allocations and placing. For more information, contact Nancy Baskett at 253-224-2884.

Poultry are shown at the Junior Poultry Show at the Washington State Fair.

GROUNDS & BUILDIG USE

- All 4-H exhibitors who are in the campsite must be accompanied by an adult chaperone. 4-H members are not allowed to sleep overnight in any building or barn.
- 4-H members staying overnight with other than a parent/legal guardian should have a medical release form with them at night. Club leaders must have a medical form for all members of their club on fair site with them for the duration of the fair.
- Smoking is prohibited in and around barns and buildings. Expo Center will designate smoking areas.

Benching & Herdsmanship All cats entered must be benched during published exhibit times and members must participate in herdsmanship as outlined by the Superintendent/clubs. Upon closing, all members and cats must be signed out by the Superintendent. Failure to comply with any of the above will result in loss of ribbons and State Fair attendance. Members that choose to participate only in written and oral exams will be eligible for the State Fair only if they follow the herdsmanship guidelines.

Vaccines & Cat health All cats entered must be healthy, free of fleas and ear mites, have their claws clipped and have current FVR-CP and Rabies vaccinations. Proof of vaccine is required. No visibly pregnant cats may be entered.

Limit of two (2) cats per member. Kittens for the show must be at least four (4) months old, but less than eight (8) months old.

All cages must be covered on the floor, back and sides, unless the weather dictates otherwise. The provided cage size is approximately 45" x 21" x 21." Exhibitors must provide litter pan, litter, food, and water dishes. The exhibitor must do all the grooming, preparation and exhibiting. Cats must be removed from the building each night. Please notify the Superintendent of any cancellations prior to the Fair.

- Families (parents and children) who do not fulfill their herdsmanship responsibilities may forfeit awards.
- Cavies will exhibit Thursday, July 11th to Sunday, July 14th, Incomplete entry forms will be returned to club leaders.
- Every club is responsible for removing their items and helping with cleanup of the barn.
- A separate entry form must be used for each member. Members may enter both categories (Rabbits and Cavies) but must use separate forms.
- Herdsmanship ALL EXHIBITORS must COMPLETE barn herdsmanship requirements. EXHIBITORS who do not fulfill their herdsmanship responsibilities may forfeit awards. The purpose of herdsmanship is to help exhibitors learn the skills of courtesy, public speaking, neatness, and the ability to demonstrate the proper care of rabbits. Herdsmanship sign- up will be available after the barn meeting each day of fair; a minimum of one hour of herdsmanship is expected each day during fair. Additional hours may be required based upon the number of exhibitors.
- Entries for the sow and litter competition qualify as one entry.
- Sows must have a minimum of two (2) pups to qualify for sow and litter.
- Sows entered in this competition are not allowed to compete in other type competitions. Pups must be 2-3 weeks old at the time of fair and must not have been previously weaned.
- Animals entered in Breeder's Choice Competition must have been bred and raised by the exhibitor.
- Members entering Breed Class must show in Fitting and Showing class.
- Your Fitting and Showing animal must be entered in breed class and be part of the exhibitor's project. Pet class is available for cross breeds and cavies that don't meet their breed type.
- A cavy project member who does not have a cavy in the Fair can still participate in the Judging Contest, Cavy Bowl, and/or Cavy Breed ID.

- Animals will be inspected before caging. Cavies exhibiting signs of mites, lice, colds, or other infectious diseases will not be caged and must be removed from the fairgrounds without delay. Cavies must have ear tags prior to health check.
- Exhibitors are required to bring bowls and water bottles for feeding and watering their animals. Animals will be disqualified from type competition by the judge if they meet any of the disqualifications as listed in the ARBA Standard of Perfection, with the exception of pet class.
- It is the responsibility of the exhibitor or a youth member of your club to see that your cavy gets to the judging table when its Class is called. Parents and other adults are not to handle exhibitor animals unless there is an emergency.
- Breeding or selling of cavies during the fair will result in forfeiture of awards and State Fair Qualification.

SHOW RULES

- Exhibitors are obligated to read and follow all the rules and regulations in this guidebook as well as King County Policy and Procedures including fair dress code. Any exhibitor or adult displaying unacceptable conduct (i.e. profane language, abusive treatment, poor sportsmanship) may at the discretion of the Superintendent(s) be dismissed and jeopardize awards or future fair participation.
- Poultry will exhibit during the duration of the King County Fair, from Thursday Vet Check to Sunday closing.
- Leaders & parents from each club/family must help on set up day Saturday, July 6th,
- Please bring your own supplies: club decorations, herdsmanship equipment (broom, buckets, water refill container, aprons, etc.), cage cups (9 oz. tapered clear plastic 4 per bird), and own feed to provide self-care during the fair. Containers will not be allowed to set in shavings. Rubber bands were provided to secure cups. Exhibitors bringing ducks, geese, turkeys, game birds, or pigeons must provide adequate containers to suit the needs of the animals, as well as proper feed.
- NOTE: If bedding supplies are not donated by set up day (white shavings, tar paper, and plastic table skirting) exhibitors will be asked to pay a portion of the cost, up to \$10 per exhibitor. To donate any of these items, contact nbaskett@wsu.edu.

Entry times:

- a. Non-animal projects Class 18-21 set up day before fair.
- b. Live birds @ Vet Check Classes 1-17 See Vet check above.

Health notice: Poultry must be clean, in good condition, free of parasites and disease. Dust your birds 2 weeks before the fair. Birds with missing feathers or injuries are not suitable for public display. Birds must pass vet checks including WSDA conducted NPIP testing (or receipt of NPIP hatchery purchase) prior to placement in cages.

Entry limits:

- Each exhibitor may enter up to 8 birds (at least 6 months old this is a change since last Fair.) Please list your top 5 entries. Additional entries, after top 5, need to be listed in the order of preference for entry. Premium points will be paid on listed top 5 entries regardless of the number entered at fairs. No additional cage space allocated after the entry deadline.
- Eggs enter one dozen per lot in each class (must be from the laying flock of exhibitors).
- Poultry project members with no poultry entered in the Fair may participate in Classes 18- 21 complying with all entry requirements and deadlines.
- Entering birds at fair means that each exhibitor must provide self-care of animals (bring your own 9 oz. clear plastic cage cups allow 4 per bird & poultry feed), participate in an educational display (poster), showmanship, poultry judging, and complete minimum requirement of herdsmanship duty to include set up, clean up, and check out.
- Primaries are eligible to enter any activity & are awarded for participation without competition according to the WA State 4-H Program.
- To complete entry forms list birds in class order. Birds are cooped & judged in order of class, so contact your leader if you need help identifying class of entries.

Each club leader or designated resource leader/parent shall:

- Be responsible for correctness of club entries: breed, class, & variety according to the Standard.
- Provide the number of cages needed by the club with a club entry form packet.
- Verify club bird entries and changes on Set-up day.
- Be present for Set-up day, duration of Entry times, and Clean-up/check out at end of Fair.
- Complete and hang cage cards for club entries on Set-up day before the fair.
- Participate in barn duty one evening & 2 hours daily 9am 5pm. In addition an overnight in the barn as security if other livestock departments decide is necessary. Additional shifts may be required to adequately supervise the barn activities based on entry numbers and weather conditions.
- Be responsible for providing adult supervision appropriate for the number & age of members.
- Each club is encouraged to provide club decor, an educational display, & poultry activities assistance.
- Purpose of club sign and cage decorations is to distinguish each cage from other clubs as well as make the barn more interesting. For safety reasons no decorations may be suspended from the ceiling, but may be mounted on and above cages or walls, but may not restrict the flow of air to the birds. Use durable materials (no paper streamers) to keep decorations neat and attractive for the length of the fair.

7. Showmanship

- Will follow rules in 4-H Poultry Fitting & Showmanship Contest Outline EM4263, June 1984 and APA Poultry Showmanship Manual. Suggested subjects for studying by age group may be downloaded from http://apa-abayouthprogramsite.org/showmanship.htm.
- Exhibitors shall have a neat and clean appearance, wear long sleeve white shirt with black pants, jeans or skirt. Showmanship is judged on appearance of the exhibitor; handling, condition, and training of bird; and general knowledge of poultry.
- Senior, Intermediate, and Junior Showmanship Champions will participate in the Small Animal Round Robin (Cats, dogs, poultry, cavy & rabbits) on Sunday, July 14th in the Poultry Barn. Blue alternate will be the Reserve Champions. Check with Supt. for updates.

8. Judging

- Poultry and exhibits are judged on a Danish system based upon established standards of quality for each type of entry. Each exhibit is judged according to how well it meets the standard.
- All standard bred poultry will be judged by comparison to the latest edition Standard of Perfection. All commercial utility fowl (classes 12-13) will be judged on condition and suitability to utility. Please be sure to enter birds accordingly and have numbered leg bands on all birds. Websites for more information and how to purchase standards: APA is www.amerpoultryassn.com ABA is www.bantamclub.com.

- A **modified Danish system** is then used to determine best of class awards (Champion) for the poultry and exhibits judged Blue place. Best of division (Grand Champion) winners are judged against each other to select the Best in Show winner.
- The judge may not award a champion ribbon if the exhibit does not merit the placing.
- Exhibits that contain incorrect information may be judged, but not displayed at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- All 4-H members are eligible for participation at the Washington Junior Poultry Exposition at the Western WA State Fair in Puyallup September & April of each year. Exhibitor information available at www.thefair.com.

Herdsmanship

- A minimum of **1 hours per day.** Additional hours may be required based on the number of exhibitors and will be available on Set up day along with duty signup sheets. Bring your schedule. The purpose of **herdsmanship** is to help 4-H members learn how to make a presentable exhibit for the public as well as learn skills in courtesy, neatness, and proper care of poultry. Poultry that are securely caged, clean and comfortable, well fed and cared for. Exhibit area aisles and cages, attractive, feed and equipment safely stored.
- Barn closes on **Sunday 6 pm**. Each club is responsible for removing their items and cleaning of the barn to include removal of shavings and tar paper, stacking of broken down cages, and sweeping the floor. No one will be dismissed until our area of the barn is clean.
- Exhibitors must check out with the Superintendent upon completion of barn clean up as the final part of herdsmanship duty.

- Each exhibitor may enter up to three in each lot for each variety entered (as long as total birds do not exceed 8). Remark cards and score sheets will be released on Sunday, July 14 at checkout. Each club is responsible for sending a representative to daily 10:00 am barn meetings and relaying information to other club members who may not be present.

- **Health Check** Animals will be inspected before caging. Rabbits exhibiting signs of ear mites, infected hocks, vent disease, snuffles, or other infectious diseases will not be caged and must be removed from the fairgrounds without delay. Rabbits must be clearly and permanently tattooed prior to health check.
- Herdsmanship ALL EXHIBITORS must COMPLETE barn herdsmanship requirements. EXHIBITORS who do not fulfill their herdsmanship responsibilities may forfeit awards. The purpose of herdsmanship is to help exhibitors learn the skills of courtesy, public speaking, neatness, and the ability to demonstrate the proper care of rabbits. Herdsmanship sign- up will be available after the barn meeting each day of fair; a minimum of one hour of herdsmanship is expected each day during fair. Additional hours may be required based upon the number of exhibitors.
- Exhibitors are required to bring cups or cans for feeding and watering their animals. Water bottles are acceptable, but they must be mounted on the inside or back of cages. Cages may have decorations, but they must not obstruct the view of the rabbits on exhibition.
- Carry cages must be removed from fair grounds upon coop-in, and will be allowed back in the barn at 6pm Sunday for coop out.
- **Right to limit entries** At this time we reserve the right to limit entries based on space/ equipment available. **Please enter your top 5 entries**. Additional entries, after top 5, need to be listed in the order of preference for entry. Premium points will be paid on listed top 5 entries regardless of the number entered at the fair.

- Members entering Breed Type must also show in Fitting & Showing class to receive awards and to qualify for the State Fair. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor or a youth member of your club to see that your rabbit gets to the judging table when its Class is called. Parents and other adults are not to handle exhibitor animals unless there is an emergency. Animals will be disqualified from type competition by the judge if they meet any of the disqualifications listed in the Standard with the exception of Pet and Crossbreed classes.

- 4. Participants should be able to shoot 30 arrows at 20 yards on 40-cm FITA 10 10 ring target and score at least 60 Barebow or Basic Compound, 90 Olympic Recurve Freestyle, or 120 Compound Freestyle. These Shooting Requirements Must be followed by all age groups to follow safety guidelines. Participants must be able to shoot 90 arrows consecutively for the 900 round. All Para Shooters are Welcome without minimum Score Requirement, must make arrangements with the Superintendent before the shoot.
- 5. Participants should be knowledgeable and proficient in safe use of the equipment, and knowledgeable of the general rules events/and or games.Range Masters may dismiss or disqualify any participant if he/she believes the participant does not demonstrate the basic proficiency and knowledge required.

 - **Compound** Sights (Either up to 5 fixed pins or movable fixed pin allowed), peep sight, release aids, stabilizer not to exceed 12 inches from back of the bow, V-bar allowed.
 - **Arrows** Bring 6 to 12 arrows; no wood (unless shooting Traditional), plastic, graphite, or fiberglass arrows allowed. Must be either Aluminum or Carbon Fiber. Ribbon Placing is based on a maximum/minimum score for blue, red, and white ribbons with the top two archers in each division receiving Grand & Reserve Champion

i.First Game -Three ends at 10 yards (5 for Jr.s), one end at 15 yards (7.5 for Jr)

ii.Second Game- Three ends at 15 yards (7.5 for Jrs), one end at 20 yards (10 for Jr)

iii.Third Game -Four Ends at at 20 yards (10 yards for Juniors)

b. <u>Indoor NFAA Blue Face Event:</u> This event consists of 60 arrows, shot as three games, at a distance of 20 yards (Juniors only, shoot 30 arrows, at 10 yards). Each game has four ends of five arrows per end. The target is the standard NFAA indoor target of 40 centimeters with a blue and white face and a 8 centimeter center ring. Participants can choose from a 1 spot scoring 5,4,3,2,1 or a 5 spot score 5,4. Ribbon Placing is based on a maximum/minimum score for blue, red, and white ribbons with the top two archers in each division receiving Grand & Reserve Champion

c. <u>Indoor 900 FITA Multi Color Event:</u> This event consists of 90 arrows on a FITA 40cm target at 20 yards, shot in 30 ends of 3 arrows for Intermediate & Seniors. Juniors will shoot at 10 yards and shoot 15 ends of 3 arrows for a total of 45 arrows. Participants can choose to shoot a 1 spot target scoring 10, 9, 8, 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 or a 3 spot target scoring 10, 9, 8, 7, 6. Ribbon placing is based on a maximum/minimum score for blue, red, and white ribbons with the top two archers receiving Grand & Reserve Champion.

8. **Judging**: Two or more adults trained in scoring Archery will use a combination of Interview, Danish System, and Shooting Score to Evaluate a Participants Ability to meet established quality Standards.

9. **Shooting Form**: Participants will be judged on their shooting form and provided with Feedback.

May compete as an individual or team (2 per team). Juniors may enter in food dehydration or food freezing only. May can, freeze, or dry fruits, vegetables, meat, fish and poultry, pickles, syrups or preserves, jams or jellies. 1 hour is allowed for food dehydration

1¹/₂ hours for food freezing and jam/jellies 2 hours for water bath canning

3 hours for pressure canning

Current USDA processing recommendations must be followed.

Demonstrate knowledge and skill in preparing an attractive, nutritious and good tasting food product that highlights an agricultural product of the Pacific Northwest. Ingredients must be brought in their original packaging. Be prepared to discuss with the judge the educational display and the nutritional, historical and cultural aspects of the Pacific Northwest agricultural product highlighted in the activity. 3 hours (2½ hours average) allowed to complete the activity. This includes set up and display, use of the kitchen, evaluation by Product.

Class 9: Food for All Occasions County and State Contest

Premium Points, Blue 75 - Red 55 - White 40

or

May compete as an individual or in teams (2 Juniors, 2 Intermediates or 2 Seniors per team). Juniors may NOT compete at State level. Total cost of food is not to exceed \$10 per guest. Contestants must furnish all foods and needed supplies and do full preparation of meal in the Fair kitchen. Individual contestants will prepare and serve a complete meal for four people. Guests must be invited by the exhibitor and notified to arrive 15 minutes before the meal is served. Family members are not allowed to participate as guests. Lot B - A two person team activity. Team members must both be either intermediates or seniors. Teams will prepare a meal for six, themselves and four guests,

Class 10: Lunch On The Go County and State Contest

Prepare lunch for one (1) from beginning to end and demonstrate food and kitchen safety, appropriate preparation skills and knowledge appropriate for the age and experience of the member. Activity is 300 minutes - with 10 minutes for clean-up. A short interview with the judge will follow. Foods may be cookies, puddings, cupcakes, etc. Items such as sandwiches, tortilla wraps, bagel sandwiches, fruit salads, etc. should be made on site. Include beverages in the lunches

3. Each entry must include a design plan or design sheet (instructions) and have been flown prior to exhibit.

4. Rockets will not be displayed with live engines.

5. All exhibits in Classes 210 - 213 must have been successfully flown prior to exhibiting. A completed Certificate of Flight must accompany each entry in Classes 210-212.

6. Model rocketry will be judged on workmanship and stability according to degree of challenge as determined in model rocketry catalogs.

7. Class 215, "Aerospace Project" is intended for entries from the 4-H aerospace project curriculum. Attach a 3"x5" card to the entry form telling what the item is, its use, what you did, and what was learned from doing the project. Also list the publication title and the page number where the goals are listed for this project.

8. Each entry must include a design plan or design sheet (instructions) as well as method(s) used to verify stability prior to first flight and have been flown prior to exhibit.

9. Certification of flight required for all exhibits. (Word, PDF or Photo)

10. Model rocketry exhibits will be judged on stability, workmanship, methods of construction appropriate for the type/power the rockets is flown under, and the degree of difficulty/challenge. *Premium Points: Blue 30 - Red 23 - White 17*

Class 210 - Model rockets built from plans other than commercially available kits

Class 211 - Model rocket designed and built by the exhibitor, "scratch built".

Exhibits must include design plan followed and method(s) used to verify stability prior to first flight.

Class 212 -Model rocket from commercially available kits.
