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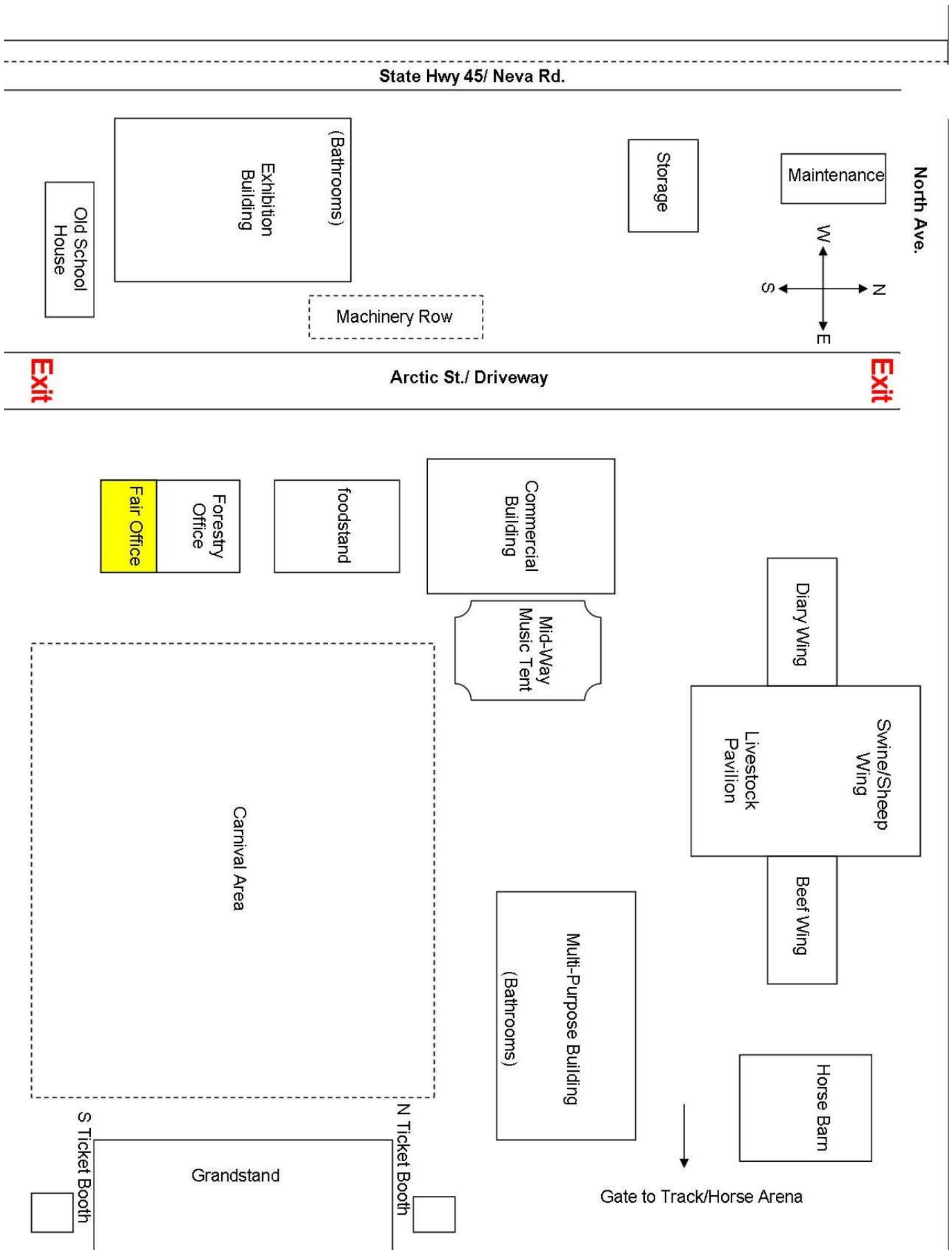
Fair Entry:

- **Final Submit Date: July 1st!** Be sure to complete your entry (including the final "Submit" step) prior to the cut-off date.
- **ALL FEE Payments are due on Fair Entry prior to final Submission.** Any exhibits without paid fees will be scratched.
- Register all entries for each exhibitor in the family before proceeding to the Payment section.
- Be sure to click the "Submit" button when you have completed your entries. Entries are not final until they have been submitted & approved.
- Recommended browsers: Google Chrome or Mozilla Firefox. Older versions of Internet Explorer may cause unexpected results.
- Verify ALL demographic information including email, mailing address and phone numbers prior to submitting entries.
- Check your email inbox for a confirmation email with a list of your entries and any related fees.
- You will receive a second email when your entries have been approved by the fair, not instantly.

1. Go to <https://faireentry.com/Fair/SignIn/19009> or <http://www.faireentry.com> then "Find your Fair" & search "Langlade"
2. All **4-H Youth** must register using their family's 4-H online account. Do not create an account with Fair Entry! ***FYI – You can add Open Class entries for the rest of your family, in the family account once you enter through 4-H Online.
 - a. If you don't remember your 4-H Online Password, request a new one through 4-H Online. Follow these steps:
 - i. Go to <http://WI.4honline.com>.
 - ii. Enter the email address that is associated with your 4HOnline account and select the Forgot Password option.
 - iii. After receiving a temporary password, go to <http://WI.4honline.com> to sign in with the email address and temporary password.
 - iv. The system will ask to set a new permanent password.
 - v. After the permanent password is set, go to Fair Entry website.
3. **NON 4-H/OPEN CLASS First time users** - Click on the link to "create a Fair Entry Account".
 - a. Enter your email address twice and click Create Account. IMPORTANT: This must be a valid email address, so that you can receive the necessary confirmation messages.
 - b. On the Account Creation page, enter information into the fields (all are required). Account Name, Phone, Password (enter twice to confirm). Click Create Account.
4. **NON 4-H/OPEN CLASS Logging back in** - Enter the email & password that you created and click "Sign in"
5. Click "Begin Registration"
 - a. 4-Hers will be listed & other family members will need to create an account by clicking "Register an Exhibitor".
 - b. If not listed, register as an "Individual." Enter all information into the fields, all are required. When all information is correct Click Continue to entries.

Creating Entries:

1. Each exhibitor can have multiple entries. One entry must be made for each item, animal, class, etc. For example, if an exhibitor is bringing 2 photographs, two entries into the photography class must be created. If an exhibitor is showing one horse in 5 events, five class entries must be created. Once all entries have been created for the first exhibitor, you have the choice of creating another exhibitor in this family (and entries) or proceeding to check-out (submitting the entries)
- ******CLUB ENTRIES:** To make a "club" entry Leaders should enter the "club" as an exhibitor under their accounts. Put the name of the club as the first/last name (if 4H, use "4-H Club" as the last name). Then make the entries for the club under that "exhibitor."
2. Click Add an Entry beside the correct exhibitor (if more than one has been created).
 3. Click Select beside the first department you wish to enter. Any departments that are not available for entry will be noted as "Not Available" with a short explanation.
 4. After you select a department, you will see a list of divisions to select from, and then a list of available classes. Also notice that there are blue "Change" links in case you mistakenly select an incorrect department, division, or class.
 5. Click Select beside the first department you wish to enter. Any departments that are not available for entry will be noted as "Not Available" with a short explanation.
 6. After you select a department, you will see a list of divisions to select from, and then a list of available classes. Also notice that there are blue "Change" links in case you mistakenly select an incorrect department, division, or class.
 7. If this is an animal class entry, you may be required to specify which animal will be exhibited in this class; that may be optional; or you may NOT be able to specify the animal at entry time. If you can, you will see the option to "Add an animal."
 8. Fill in all the fields with information about the animal you intend to exhibit. Click Create and Add Animal when finished.
 9. If the animal information was entered incorrectly, you have the option to either Remove from Entry (creating a new animal) or Edit Animal Details. When it is correct, click Continue.
 10. Any questions or file uploads related to entry in this class will be next. Click Continue after answering those questions or uploading documents.
 11. The Review screen allows you to double check this entry for accuracy and make any changes necessary. When the information is correct, click Continue and that class entry is complete.
 12. When each class entry is complete, you have 3 choices for what to do next:
 - a. If all class entries have been completed for one exhibitor, you can Register another Exhibitor in this family.
 - b. If this exhibitor has more class entries to make, you can Add another Entry for this Exhibitor.
 - c. If all entries for all exhibitors in the family have been completed, Continue to Payment to finalize, and submit your entries.
 13. Review your entries for completeness and accuracy. *Notice the Summary and Detail buttons at the top of the list on the right. If there are errors, click on the green Entries section at the top of the page. *
 14. Click Continue when all information is correct.
 15. Read the payment instructions and select your method of payment. NOTE: all entries require payment.
 16. You must click Continue to the last "Confirm" step to submit your entries.
 17. Read the information in the "After you submit" section. You may also have to check a box to "Agree to Terms."
 18. Click Submit to finalize the entries for all the exhibitors in this family.
- ******After you click Submit, no changes are possible to these entries until they are approved or denied.**



Langlade County Fair General Rules and Regulations:

Interpretations, Amendments, and Violations:

1. The Langlade County Fair Board reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions, and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, connected with, or incident thereto, the Langlade County Fair.
2. The Langlade County Fair Board reserves the right to amend or add to these rules as they, in their judgment, may deem advisable.
3. Any person who violates any of the following or special rules shall forfeit all privileges and premiums and be subject to such penalty as the fair management may order.
4. Premiums in all departments will be paid as soon as possible after the fair, depending upon the date of release of state aid. Fair checks shall be cashed within 60 days of issue date. After 60 days, fair checks shall be void and will not be reissued.
5. The Langlade County Fair Board will not be responsible for any articles lost, destroyed, or stolen from the fair. The Langlade County Fair Board will provide responsible supervision and a night watchman.
6. General supervision of the grounds and the exhibition is vested in the Langlade County Fair Board who shall see that order is maintained.
7. Exhibitors will be held responsible for any damage or accident, which may be caused by their entries.
8. All persons shall make no claim against the Langlade County Fair for loss, damage, or injury to animal or themselves for any cause.

All Exhibitor Entry Requirements - Read Carefully *Important*

1. All exhibitors in the junior fair division shall be in grades 3rd-13th and under 20 years of age as of January 1 of the current fair year and who are members of 4-H, FFA, a scouting program, a breed group, or another recognized youth organization under adult leadership that has an education program appropriate to that organization and is approved by the fair board (does not include athletic teams). These groups must also follow the grade/age rule listed.
2. Youth in grades K-2nd shall only exhibit in the Youth Organization Early Childhood department, Little Britches, or Open Class.
3. Open class division is open to all persons living in Langlade County.
4. Senior citizen division is limited to persons 62 years of age and over living in Langlade County.
5. The Langlade County Fair Board reserves the right to require presentation of record books or similar organization project requirements as proof of qualification of exhibitor.
6. The Langlade County Fair Board reserves the right to accept or reject any entry offered.
7. Each exhibitor is allowed only one entry for each lot. Be sure to enter in proper class and lot. You may not enter the same project item in any other county fair. Exhibitors may enter all exhibits under department and class unless stated otherwise.
8. **Exhibitor Fee:** Fee to be paid on Fair Entry. All fees must be PAID by July 1st through Fair Entry; failure to pay will result in non-entry.
 - a. **All Animals** (Beef, Cat, Dairy, Dog, Domesticated Exotic, Goats, Horses, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep & Swine): \$2.00 per animal. This means two or more animals may be stalled together depending on project(s) numbers and capacity.
 - b. **All other entries** other than Animals: Processing fee of \$2.00 for the first 50 entries or \$5.00 for 51 or more entries per exhibitor. Non-Animal exhibitor processing fee is paid per number of entries entered.
 - i. **Hearts that Shine Department** entries are exempt from any fees (\$0).
9. Only Online Entries & payments for all classes will be accepted. Entries on Fair Entry shall be completed on or before July 1st.
10. Additions, changes, or substitutions are allowed from July 1st until July 7th. They will be accepted in person to the Exhibitor Coordinator, Rebecca Seis, call 715-610-5085 to set up a time to meet. Only 1 submission per exhibitor of all additions, changes or substitutions is allowed. The fee for additions, changes, or substitutions is \$25/per exhibitor, cash or check.
11. Detailed entry and fair information are available at <https://www.langladedecountyfair.net/> Under the Get Involved Tab.
12. The online Premium Book supersedes Printed Book.
13. All exhibits shall have been raised, grown, or made since last year's fair, by the exhibitor, unless otherwise specified. All animals exhibited shall be in the possession of the exhibitor prior to sign up deadline, except poultry which must be possessed by June 1st and rabbits which must be possessed by June 15th. Exhibits not following these rules will be disqualified.
14. Exhibitors who will not be present at time of judging can only be excused by the Langlade County Fair Board by writing a paragraph on their project and presenting before the board at a board meeting prior to the fair for it to be judged.
15. Exhibitor tags will be ready for pick up during fair week at the fair office; Monday from 4p-7p or Tuesday from 8:30a – 6p.
16. No exhibits may be placed until their designated check-in times.
17. Keep your entry ticket to claim exhibits on Sunday of the fair.
18. Exhibitors who do not conduct themselves in an orderly and respectful manner will forfeit all their premiums and will remove their exhibits from the fairgrounds. (Ex: water fights, horseplay, drinking alcoholic beverages, etc.)
19. All animal & non-animal exhibits shall only be removed from the fairgrounds on Sunday of the fair, from 4pm to 7pm. Earlier removal of exhibits will result in premiums being withheld.
20. All Food exhibits will be discarded prior to release times. Any other remaining exhibits will be discarded at the end of the fair, except Auction Cakes.
21. A poster is defined as being 14" x 22" tagboard.
22. A scrapbook is defined as being 8 1/2 x 11"
23. A flyer consists of 8 1/2" X 11" sheet of paper printed on one side.
24. A display is defined as having a 3-Dimensional aspect to it.
25. All items should be named or labeled.
26. Procedure to withhold premiums:
 - a. Any adult fair helper may report violations to the superintendent of the fair department in which the violation occurred. If the department superintendent feels that the exhibitor is in violation, they will write a letter to the Langlade County Fair Board within two weeks after the fair for the Langlade County Fair Board's determination.
27. No food or drink will be served or be made available to any person other than your immediate family members within 100 feet of any animal barn or animal display. Repercussions will be determined on an individual basis by the Langlade County Fair Board.

Exhibitors of Animals

1. Please take note of when forms & entries are due. Forms will not be accepted past deadlines, and failure to upload forms may result in not exhibiting/showing regardless of situation.
2. Exhibitors of animals shall show their own animals except for herds, flocks, champion drives and in cases of exhibitor's illness or serious accident, the Langlade County Fair Board must approve exceptions to this rule prior to the fair.
3. All exhibitors are encouraged to participate in Showmanship in each species shown. Dairy, beef, goat swine, and sheep shown in showmanship classes shall also be entered and shown in regular fair classes.
4. Exhibitors of animals shall supply feed, water cups, water, and bedding other than shavings which will be provided. Keep animals, pens/stalls, equipment, feed, and bedding clean and orderly. All animals shall be fed by the exhibitor by 10am each day of the fair.
5. No animals are to be taken out of their stalls after 10 a.m. unless it is for pictures, classes, fitting/clipping, milking, needs to be taken out to the wash rack or if permission is given by a superintendent in charge.
6. Exhibitors of poultry and rabbits wishing to lock their cage must supply their own lock. However, the key must be accessible to the department superintendent in case of emergency.
7. All Exhibitors of animals shall clean out their stalls after exhibits are released on Sunday of the fair.
8. All animals must be free of any infection/disease, if in question, the animal will have to be examined by the fair veterinarian before animal can be unloaded or at any time. The fair vet or the Animal Health Inspector with DATCP will have final say in if an animal needs to be sent home.
9. No one except the official fair judge, exhibitor, and fair department committee members or those designated by the fair department committee shall be allowed in the show ring/area during judging.
10. On judging day, exhibitors of any animal shall be ready to exhibit their animals whenever required by the department committee members.
11. Exhibitors of purebred animals will be required to upload either registration papers or a letter from the breed organization stating that the animal's application has been received as proof that the animal is purebred at the time of entry in the Fair Entry system.
12. Premise ID number is MANDATORY for all beef, dairy, swine, poultry, sheep, goat, horse, gamebirds, domesticated exotic animal exhibitors. All premises that contain or host livestock will be required by the State of Wisconsin to have a premise ID (see definition of livestock by the State of Wisconsin). Premise ID is required when entering Fair Entry data.
13. Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) training will be mandatory for all youth beef, sheep, swine, dairy, goat, poultry & rabbit exhibitors. Exhibitors of these animals must be in Grade 3 as of January 1 of the current year. Exhibitors have the option to complete the training on-line or at one of the face-to-face workshops. <https://yqcaprogram.org> Your completion certificate will be required in Fair Entry. Your animal(s) will not be permitted onto the fairgrounds if the YQCA Training is not complete by July 1st.
14. All animals must have an acceptable form of identification and the identification number must be entered in Fair Entry. Acceptable forms of ID are ear tags, USDA Tags, RFID Tags, Scrapie Tag OR Permanent tattoos depending on species. If you have any questions, contact The Livestock Pavilion Committee or species superintendent.
15. All exhibitors must wear proper attire, including appropriate boots while working with the animals. Show attire may affect your place in showmanship; deductions for show attire will be at the judge's discretion.
16. All Livestock Pavilion exhibitors are required to help with barn cleanup on the Monday morning following the fair. Youth will sign-up for a shift at the mandatory meeting Sunday prior to the fair.
17. Fitting of an animal shall be done by the youth exhibitor with assistance from other youth exhibitors, immediate family living in the same household, caregiver, or guardian. Others may coach and offer tips/suggestions to assist the exhibitor.
18. The exhibitors are responsible for supervising and caring for their animal(s). Exhibitors may be assisted with the daily care of the animals, washing, walking, cleaning, and feeding.
19. Exhibitors should keep the stall and barn areas clean during the fair. Care of the animal and stall cleaning should be done by 8:00a on show days and 10:00a on non-show days. Barn hours are 6:00a to 10:30p for exhibitors, 10:00a to 10p for the public.
20. No animal shall be reweighed. Each exhibitor will have one opportunity to weigh their animal. The only exception will be immediate reweigh if there is a question of a discrepancy.
21. Stall/pen decorating may be done beginning Monday morning of fair week, until species check-in time.
22. All Livestock Pavilion exhibitors and a parent are required to attend a mandatory meeting the Sunday prior to fair at 4pm in the Livestock Pavilion followed by mandatory setup. Failure to attend will result in youth not being able to show their animal.

Market Animal Sale requirements: (Beef, Goat, Sheep, Swine)

1. Participants need to invite a minimum of 5 buyers to the sale.
2. Youth selling an animal are required to bring a 4"x6" horizontal photo of youth with animal, and ear tag number written on the back for each animal they may potentially choose to sell to the mandatory Sunday meeting, which will be placed on a plaque to be presented to the buyer at the sale.
3. Family weigh-ins for each species will be allowed at a maximum of 2 animals per market class per child. Family is defined as immediate family living in the same household.
4. Only fair animals will be weighed-in, remaining family animals will not be put on the scale, they can be loaded for the meat facility.
5. Exhibitors may weigh-in or submit 2 animals per market class and must select 1 for each market class at the final weigh-in. Any non-showing animal must be removed from the facility.
6. All exhibitors and parents shall complete a wholesomeness of meat form at the final weigh-in.
7. Immediately after the market animals are judged for placement at the fair, the member who has weighed in more than one species shall decide which animal will sell and inform the species chair. If the exhibitor receives Grand or Reserve Champion, that animal must be sold and if Grand or Reserve Champion is received in more than one species, exhibitor must choose only one to sell.
8. Sale order numbers will be drawn by the exhibitor at the Sunday Mandatory Meeting. See sale show program for order of sale which will be available at the sale. Any animal sold and donated back to sell shall be resold at the end of the sale in the order that the animal was donated back.
9. A member may buy his/her own animal.
10. All youth who sell their animals shall pay a 4% sale commission to the Livestock Pavilion Committee and 2% to the auctioneer. In addition, there is a \$1.00 check-off fee for beef and a .0045 check-off fee of the gross sale price for swine.

11. The sold animal shall be under the care and supervision of the member until the animal is picked up for transport to the locker plant. If the animal does not pass state health inspection at the locker plant, the youth must replace the animal for the buyer. If the buyer decides not to have the animal slaughtered and inspected (except for swine), the animal is the property of the buyer, and the member is paid.
12. Youth also planning to exhibit the animal being sold at the Langlade County Fair at the State Fair, must have a signed agreement from the buyer to release the animal to be exhibited at the State Fair. If the animal should sell at State Fair or for some reason is not able to be processed, exhibitor must replace said animal for the buyer. Forms will be available from the committee at the sale.
13. Thank you cards to buyers shall be completed and turned in by the Awards presentation on Sunday. Cards will be provided.
14. Sale Checks will be mailed to exhibitors when they become available. Checks are held until all animals are paid for.

Additional Requirements of the Langlade County Fair:

Dairy & Beef: All heifers and cows shall have been previously dehorned. Removal of animals because of horns will be at the discretion of the Livestock Pavilion Committee and the veterinarian. Animals must be checked by the committee prior to being unloaded. Animals with signs of infection/disease need a written exam from their veterinarian within 10 days prior to the start of the fair.

Horses: The original negative report for a test for equine infectious anemia (Coggins test) conducted within the calendar year must be uploaded on Fair Entry at time of registration. Vaccination certificates or proof of vaccination must be uploaded on Fair Entry no later than July 1st.

Dogs: All dogs shall have current vaccinations for rabies, distemper, hepatitis, and leptospirosis. Dog vaccination records need to be shown at sign up for dog obedience training. A copy must be uploaded on Fair Entry by July 1st.

Cats: All cats shall have current vaccinations for rabies and panleukopenia (distemper) before July 1st. Kittens under 6 months of age at fair time do not require the rabies shot. Vaccination certificates shall be uploaded on Fair Entry by July 1st.

Poultry: All poultry (except waterfowl) over 4 months of age must have negative test results of a pullorum-typhoid test conducted within 90 days of the fair (see state health rule). Proof may also be in the form of a hatchery certificate (form 3) with the owner's name and type of poultry listed. Exhibitors are responsible for having this testing done. Poultry older than 4 months of age without this negative test result will be sent home. Pullorum-typhoid certificates shall be uploaded on Fair Entry by July 1st.

ATCP 160 Wisconsin, County, District & State **Subchapter I — General Requirements and Definitions**

ATCP 160.01 Definitions. As used in this chapter:

- (1) "Breed class" and "breeding class" mean a specific breed within a class such as holstein in the dairy class.
 - (2) "Class" means a grouping in which exhibits may be entered, including an animal breed or age group for animal exhibits; a type of produce, crop or food; or a specific age, age group or educational grade level of exhibitor.
 - (2m) "Conference judging" means a judging system using a discussion about each exhibit with the entire group.
 - (3) "Danish judging system" means a judging system that allows for multiple first, second, third and fourth class selections as provided in s. [ATCP 160.91 \(4\) \(b\)](#).
 - (4) "Department" as it relates to the organizational structure of a fair, means an animal species, production group, or other principal classification of exhibits. As used in any other context, "department" means the state of Wisconsin department of agriculture, trade and consumer protection.
 - (5) "Division" means one of 3 exhibitor group classifications for a fair and is limited to junior division, open division and senior citizens division.
 - (6) "Entry class" means a class in which the fair allows exhibitors to submit entries.
 - (7) "Exotic domestic animal" means an animal that is not a common farm animal.
 - (7e) "Face-to-face judging" means a judging system using a semiprivate discussion between the judge and the exhibitor with the following phases:
 - (a) Get acquainted.
 - (b) Learn the background of the exhibit.
 - (c) Self-evaluation.
 - (d) Evaluator comment.
 - (e) Parting.
 - (7m) "Fair" means a county or district fair eligible to receive state aid under s. [93.23 \(1\) \(b\)](#) or [\(c\)](#), Stats.
 - (7s) "Fair board" means the governing entity of a fair.
 - (8) "Lot" or "lot number" means the numerical designation assigned by a fair for a specific category of exhibits within a class.
 - (9) "Market class" means a class that includes animals of a certain weight for the species that can be sold for slaughter.
 - (10) "Premium" means a monetary prize that a fair awards to an exhibitor after judging all competing exhibits in the class to which the premium pertains.
 - (11) "Regular judging system" means a judging system that allows for one first, second, third and fourth class selection as provided in s. [ATCP 160.91 \(4\) \(c\)](#).
 - (12) "Self determined project" means a project that meets all of the following criteria:
 - (a) It is approved by the fair board.
 - (b) Its subject matter is related to any of the junior fair departments 9, 10, 13 to 16, 18, or 20 to 29.
 - (c) It does not fall into a defined entry class within any department.
 - (d) It is carried out by a member of a youth organization.
 - (13) "Youth organization" means an organization under adult leadership that has educational programing.

ATCP 160.08 Class definitions; individual classes.

- (1) DAIRY CATTLE. [ATCP 160.08\(1\)\(a\)](#)
 - (a) A spring calf is one born on or after March 1 of the exhibit year.
 - (b) A winter calf is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year.
 - (c) A fall calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
 - (d) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between June 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
 - (e) A spring yearling is one whose date of birth is between March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

- (f) A winter yearling is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

- (h) A 2 year-old is one born between September 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year. A 2-year-old includes a yearling that has freshened.
- (i) A 3 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.
- (j) A 4 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.
- (2) BEEF CATTLE.
- (a) A junior calf is one born on or after January 1 of the exhibit year. The calf shall be at least 4 months old at the time of exhibit.
- (b) A senior calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (c) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between May 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (d) A junior yearling is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and April 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (e) A senior yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.
- (f) A 2 year-old or older cow is one born before September 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and which has calved during the past year.
- (4) SWINE.
- (a) A junior yearling boar or sow is one born between January 1 and June 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (b) A senior boar or sow is one whose date of birth is between July 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (c) A senior spring boar or sow pig is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year. A fair board may subdivide this entry class into January-born and February-born sows or boars.
- (d) A junior spring boar or sow pig is one born during the month of March of the exhibit year.
- (5) SHEEP.
- (a) A spring lamb is one born on or after February 16 of the exhibit year.
- (b) A fall lamb is one born between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (c) A winter lamb is one born between January 1 and February 15 of the exhibit year.
- (d) A yearling ram or ewe is one born outside the date of birth limitations in pars. (a) through (c). The age of yearlings may be subject to verification by a veterinarian's examination whose findings shall be final.

Subchapter V — Judging and Accounting

ATCP 160.91 Judging regulations.

- (1) Judging shall be done at fairs by individuals who are registered with the department. In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair; nor shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department.
- (1m)(a) An individual shall register by submitting to the department an application. The department shall register all individuals who qualify to be judges, including having the knowledge, training, or experience in the specific classes to be judged and adhering to ethical judging practices. The registration is valid for five years.
- (b) An individual submitting an application after July 1 may not judge for the current fair year.
- (c) A fair representative may request the department waive par. (b) in cases of unanticipated emergency situations.
- (2) Each judge at a fair shall be provided with a copy of the fair's premium book or list of entry classes at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair.
- (3) No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class.
- (4)(a) Danish system judging may be used in the junior fair division. State aid may not be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any other division.
- (b) When classes in the junior fair division are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placings shall be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first 2 groups and not more than 6 in the first 3 groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the class, there shall not be more than 25% in the first group, not more than 50% in the first 2 groups, and not more than 75% in the first 3 groups.
- (c) The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.
- [ATCP 160.91\(4g\)](#) (4g) When classes in the junior fair division are judged using the conference judging system, the judge shall use sub. (4) (b) and (c) to award placements in a class.
- (5) If any class of exhibits at a fair is judged according to the regular system, the judges for that class may give only one first-place, one second-place, one third-place and one fourth-place award in that class.

- Open to purebred or grade goats. Purebreds shall be registered; papers will be checked.
- All goats of any age must be identified with official scrapie ear tags and number must be entered on Fair Entry
- All milk produced by lactating does is the full responsibility of the exhibitor.
- No uncastrated males may be brought or shown at the Fair.
- Goats that have freshened within 60 days of the fair date are not to be brought to nor shown at the fair in compliance with Scrapie regulations.
- 1st & 2nd year Goat exhibitors are not required to sell their animal. All market animals for 3rd year or more Goat exhibitors must sell the animal unless the Livestock Pavilion Committee is notified at the time of weigh-in.
- If exhibitor is showing multiple market species, exhibitor must choose which animal will be sold at the final weigh-in.
- Proper dress code is required. A dress shirt or western type shirt that is buttoned to the next to last button, blue jeans, belt and sturdy shoes or boots (no tennis shoes allowed)
- Goats Breeds by their use: This list is a composite of different sources. The judge's decision as to use is final.
 - Dairy: Alpine, LA Mancha, Nigerian Dwarf, Saanen, Oberhasli, Toggenburg

It is a privilege to participate at the Langlade County Fair; however, this privilege can be revoked. Exhibitors, parents, guardians, leaders, and volunteers are expected to always conduct themselves in an appropriate manner.

- Refer to all **Langlade County Fair General Rules and Regulations & Chapter ATCP160** at the beginning of this book.
- Horse exhibitors must be in 3rd grade to exhibit. A maximum of two animals may be entered by a single exhibitor. One shall be owned by the project member (or their family); the other may be managed by the exhibitor as defined by project requirements. **Managed means the animal is under the care of the exhibitor, i.e., care, expenses, grooming, exercising, etc.** For those families who own, up to three exhibitors from the same family may enter the same animal in showmanship or horsemanship in different classes. One of the exhibitors from the same family may also enter the same animal in either the pleasure or halter class.
- **Horseless Horse-** The horseless project member may enter in the following horseless horse classes; Showmanship, Horseless Horse Walk/Trot Equitation, horsemanship, Walk/Trot Trail, and Pleasure. Horseless horse exhibitors may also participate in the Costume class, Model horse classes & the Fun Show classes at a walk/trot.
- **Each horse may receive only two paid premiums.** One will be in either the showmanship or horsemanship class under the Danish system and one will be in either halter or pleasure under regular judging. (Note the classes to be paid premiums in Fair Entry). Premiums are paid only to top four winners in regular judging classes. Ribbons awarded for the remaining premium places, non-premium entries, and Danish judging class winners.
- Proof of the animals' age and breed shall be furnished if requested. Age of equines is as of January 1 of current year. Only stallions born on or after January of fair year may be shown. Equines under 2 years of age must be shown at halter. Suckling colts may be shown with mare; mare is not to be judged. Two-year-olds may be shown at halter or under saddle.
- Ponies may only enter riding classes designated as pony classes. Ponies include heights of 56" and under. Any equine over 56" is considered a horse. If a purebred registered horse measures as a pony, it must be entered as a horse. Only a half-registered horse (such as a half Arab) measuring as a pony, may be shown as a pony.
- **Veterinary excuses (from Certified Equine Vet) allowing for animals to exhibit, but not stall at the fair must be approved by the Fair Board no later than July 1st.** No prior veterinary excuses will be accepted for removal of animals from the fairgrounds once they have arrived. Any excuses for removal of an animal during the fair time must be signed by the attending veterinarian and witnessed by a fair board member. If an excuse is altered by an exhibitor, that youth will not be allowed to exhibit. Animals approved to exhibit, but not stalling cannot enter any other competitions during fair time.
- Stall decorating may be done beginning Monday morning of fair week, until check-in time on Thursday 8:00 a.m.
- Exhibitors shall contact a horse and pony fair superintendent right away if you cannot exhibit your animal, will be late getting it to the fair, other conflicts, or special requests.
- Each exhibit must have a serviceable halter with lead, water bucket, salt and adequate amount of feed brought with it and kept in the barn during the fair. Stall bedding will be provided by the horse and pony project.
- The time and areas for exercise will be set by the horse and pony project board.
- Exhibitors shall clean out their stall after exhibits are released at 4:00 p.m. on Sunday of the fair.
- All youth are asked to help with barn/grounds clean up on Monday after the fair.
- Those who keep their horse trailers at the fair are responsible for cleaning up the area around them.
- Exhibitors will follow Wisconsin 4-H horse project rules for proper attire and equipment. Helmets will be worn while mounted on or driving a horse or pony.
- Riding classes (English and Western) – snaffle and bosal allowed for horses 5 years old and under.
- Only blue and red ribbon place winners may enter championship classes.
- 4-H members 6th grade and up who participate at the county fair in the premium class qualify for State Gymkhana.
- In the event of a rain day, premium classes will be done on Sunday as weather permits. The fun show will be rescheduled by the H&P project.

- Poultry exhibitors are required to comply with all the statutory and regulatory provisions of the State of Wisconsin relating to animal health. See current animal health regulations.
- Each exhibitor shall be allowed one entry per lot number with a maximum of 15 total breed class entries.
- All poultry will need an identifying leg band.
- All poultry must be owned by the exhibitor by June 1st of the current fair year. Exhibitor must show their own animal.
- All poultry must be feathered – birds younger than 6 weeks may not be shown.
- All poultry must originate from an NPIP participating flock, Wisconsin Tested Flock, Wisconsin Associate Flock or shall be individually tested for Pullorum-Typhoid within 90 days of exhibition. Birds for exhibition may not be housed or co-mingled with any untested/uncertified birds. Exhibitors are required to provide a photocopy of one of the following as proof of Pullorum-free status: Pullorum-free certificate from breeder or hatchery, which includes the NPIP number, DATCP letter of acceptance as a Wisconsin Tested or Associate Flock, or a Wisconsin Individual Poultry Test Report. These photocopies must be presented to the superintendent or associate before unloading birds and will not be returned to the exhibitor.
- If exhibiting eggs, exhibitors must test whole flock for Pullorum-Typhoid or must originate from a NPIP participating flock. If exhibitor does not have flock certification, eggs will not be exhibited.
- Poultry showing signs of disease when checked in or during fair will be removed immediately. Animals will be inspected at check in by the superintendent or another Poultry leader.
- Birds must be free of lice. Birds with lice or other pests will be sent home.
- Exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their own poultry. They are expected to replace shavings daily. Shavings will be provided. Cages and floor around the cages should be clean. Exhibitors must provide their own food and water dishes.
- Exhibitors are required to participate in barn duty. Sign-up sheet will be available to the fair.
- The American Standard of Perfection will govern poultry judging.
- Poultry judging will take place in the center ring of the building. Handling of the birds is important as the exhibitor will have to walk his or her birds to the center ring for judging. Only the department superintendent may assist a youth member.
- Showmanship judging will follow breed judging.
- Proper Show attire is important! Jeans and long sleeve shirts or show coats are acceptable.
- See the Vet Science Department for Educational Exhibits.
- Fur & Feather Sale (Poultry & Rabbits): Sunday of fair at 2:00 p.m. Only one animal (rabbit, or poultry) may be sold in the auction. Exhibitors may sell any breed. Youth wishing to participate in the Fair Small Animal Auction must pick up an informational packet from the mandatory small animal auction meeting to be held in June.

Theatre Arts - Class K:

- All prop weapons must be made of cardboard, plastic, resin, foam, rubber or wood, no sharp edges, or points. Any entry found with the stated criteria will be rejected and asked to be removed from the Langlade County fairgrounds.

Definitions:

- **Fashion makeup:** Fashion makeup is used in magazine photography as well as on the fashion runway. Avant-garde makeup is also an applicable technique used for projects that require experimental themes. Fashion makeup is also commonly used in television and film ranging for the natural *prime look* to more sophisticated applications such as *color balance*.
- **Theatrical makeup:** Stage makeup is used as a method in conjunction with stage lighting to highlight the actors' faces in order make expressions visible to the audience from moderate distances. This often includes defining the eyes and lips as well as the highlights and lowlights of the facial bones.
- **Special effects makeup (FX makeup):** The use of special effects techniques enhancing physical features to exhibit metaphysical characteristics as well as fantasy makeup. The use of prosthetics and plaster casting are also required for projects that entails non-human appearances. Accents such as theatrical blood and ooze are also techniques applicable to this type of makeup.
- **Airbrushing:** The use of an airbrush which is a small air-operated device that sprays various media including alcohol and water-based makeup by a process of nebulization. Liquid foundations that are high in coverage but thin in texture are applied with the airbrush for full coverage without a heavy build-up of product.
- **Special occasion makeup:** Special occasion makeup is a new segment in a makeup artist's repertoire. From ethnic, to glamorous, to contemporary, makeup artists are now an important part of event planning.
- **High definition:** This is an art which involves the use of light reflectors and ingredients such as minerals to give the skin a flawless finish. This was developed due to the further development of high definition mediums and the cost implications of airbrush makeup.
- **Character makeup:** Is used to create a character to the extent of changing a subject's physical configuration to suit the requirements of a script. It encompasses a great deal: varying age levels, character delineation, personality traits, unusual facial features, symbolic figures, men's facial hair application, cuts, scars, bruises, burns, tattoos, disfigurements, horror designs, and anything on the face or body that is created without embellishing or enhancing the corrective and/or beauty aspects of the human face or figure.

- Exhibitors **must additionally** enter into "Class A -Decorating" to be eligible to sell a cake in the Cake Auction.
- Cakes for the Cake Auction must be homemade, not purchased.
- No use of toothpicks allowed for cake auction cakes (for the safety of buyers).
- Exhibitors must attend the auction and help sell their cake. If the exhibitor is not present the cake will not be sold.
- Bring cake in a cake box to be judged. (Cake box provided by the exhibitor) **Cake must be made to fit into box and close securely.** If Cake box does not close completely the cake will not be entered into the auction or refrigerated. The cake will be put on display for the remainder of fair.
- Cakes must be frosted using 2 or more colored icings or fondant
- 2 or more decorative techniques (rosebud, shell, flat line, etc.) must be used on the cake, even when using fondant
- Cakes must be decorated out of baking pan on a sturdy flat surface (cakes crack easily when the board is too flimsy), fit to size of cake; no more than 1-1½ "larger than cake. Cake plates are non-returnable; covered cardboard cakes "plates" are suggested.
- Cakes should be flat. No bigger than 9" x 13" x 4, 8"/ 9" layer, or shaped. No pillars are allowed.
- Cake must be prepared for human consumption – no inedible ingredients.
- No raw egg whites in frosting (powdered is acceptable).
- Only cakes will be auctioned
- Exhibitors will be assigned a number and seated accordingly prior to the auction. They will wait there to be called to the auction.
- Exhibitors shall receive checks by mail after the fair.
- Only one cake per exhibitor in the Cake Auction. Remaining cakes will be served to bidders or left on display and disposed of after the fair.

Theater Arts - Class B:

- All costumes and photos must be PG13 rated and kept age appropriate. All photos must be non-explicit or suggestive. All makeup must be done on face, neck, shoulder, shoulder blade, leg, arm, or hand.
- All prop weapons must be made of cardboard, plastic, resin, foam, rubber or wood, no sharp edges, or points. Any entry found with the stated criteria will be rejected and asked to be removed from the Langlade County fairgrounds.

Definitions:

- **Fashion makeup:** Fashion makeup is used in magazine photography as well as on the fashion runway. Avant-garde makeup is also an applicable technique used for projects that require experimental themes. Fashion makeup is also commonly used in television and film ranging for the natural *prime look* to more sophisticated applications such as *color balance*.
- **Theatrical makeup:** Stage makeup is used as a method in conjunction with stage lighting to highlight the actors' faces in order make expressions visible to the audience from moderate distances. This often includes defining the eyes and lips as well as the highlights and lowlights of the facial bones.
- **Special effects makeup (FX makeup):** The use of special effects techniques enhancing physical features to exhibit metaphysical characteristics as well as fantasy makeup. The use of prosthetics and plaster casting are also required for projects that entails non-human appearances. Accents such as theatrical blood and ooze are also techniques applicable to this type of makeup.
- **Airbrushing:** The use of an airbrush which is a small air-operated device that sprays various media including alcohol and water-based makeup by a process of nebulization. Liquid foundations that are high in coverage but thin in texture are applied with the airbrush for full coverage without a heavy build-up of product.
- **Special occasion makeup:** Special occasion makeup is a new segment in a makeup artist's repertoire. From ethnic, to glamorous, to contemporary, makeup artists are now an important part of event planning.
- **High definition:** This is an art which involves the use of light reflectors and ingredients such as minerals to give the skin a flawless finish. This was developed due to the further development of high definition mediums and the cost implications of airbrush makeup.
- **Character makeup:** Is used to create a character to the extent of changing a subject's physical configuration to suit the requirements of a script. It encompasses a great deal: varying age levels, character delineation, personality traits, unusual facial features, symbolic figures, men's facial hair application, cuts, scars, bruises, burns, tattoos, disfigurements, horror designs, and anything on the face or body that is created without embellishing or enhancing the corrective and/or beauty aspects of the human face or figure.
