GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

The Board of Directors of the Latah County Fair have endeavored to make this Fair representative of the agricultural interests, as well as the growing number of other interests, in Latah County, and to provide wholesome entertainment for the patrons. The board welcomes suggestions for improving the Fair. Plan to attend the Fair and pass along a good word. Exhibit your products and suggest your neighbors do the same.

ENTRIES, ENTRY FORMS, AND FEES

- Entries, unless stated in Special Rules, are open to residents of the Palouse region.
- All exhibits must be entered by & released through respective department superintendents.
- All exhibits are under the control and direction of the Fair Board, Fair Staff and superintendents while on exhibition.
- Management reserves the right to limit entries to facilities available, & to limit the number of entries of an exhibitor.
- Entries must be in place and must be removed only at the times specified; any exception to this rule shall be at the discretion of Management.
- Exhibits will be released at 5:00 p.m. Sunday
- All animal entries must turn in an official entry form by August 11. Animal entry forms are available at: www.latahcountyfair.com and in the Fair Office.
- General entries require an entry tag to be filled out at time of entry. Premiums and awards can not be awarded to incomplete entry tags.

Return address labels are recommended for entry tags.

CODE OF CONDUCT

 Anyone attending the Latah County Fair either as an exhibitor, relative, spectator, superintendent, judge or Fair official must conduct themselves in a manner that demonstrates the utmost respect for all other Fair attendees. They are to follow all rules and regulations outlined in the Fair book and by judges, superintendents and Fair officials.

EXHIBITS AND EXHIBITORS

- Management reserves the right to reject any exhibit offered if it is deemed objectionable in any way, or requires excessive space.
- Every exhibitor shall indemnify the Latah County Fair Board from and against all claims for damage to persons/property caused by them or by their exhibits.
- Exhibitor names and exhibit photos may be published.
- Management will take reasonable precautions to insure safety of exhibits while on the grounds, but will in no way be responsible for loss, damage, theft or injury of any kind to exhibits or exhibitors.
- Exhibitors found in violation of rules, or in practices unethical or adverse to the Latah County Fair, shall be penalized by forfeiture of awards and/or privileges.

JUDGING

- All classes and sections shall be judged under the Danish System of Judging unless another system is specifically indicated.
- A judge shall disqualify or transfer to the correct section any exhibit or animal which is not a true representative of the class or section in which it is entered.

- A judge may disqualify any exhibit not of show quality.
- No person attending the Fair shall criticize or interfere with judges, sponsors, Fair officials, or exhibits at any time during the Fair. Violators may be excluded immediately from the event and/or the fairgrounds and may be subject to further penalties, including cancellation of awards and loss of future Fair privileges.
- It is understood that the act of entering an exhibit or contest at the Latah County Fair is asking the Fair Management and Department Staff to secure a qualified judge to place a judgement on the exhibit or performance. It is therefore courteous to gracefully accept the decision of the judge, realizing that it may be in conflict with your set of standards. Every reasonable effort will be made to secure highly qualified and conscientious judges. If you feel you are not willing to accept this judgement, please write "exhibit only" on your entry. The decision of the judge is final. Any concerns should be directed to the Superintendent of the Division.
- Protests may be filed by exhibitors in writing to the Latah County Fair Board within 24 hours of the judging. Protests must be accompanied by a \$20 deposit, a sum which may be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Protests shall be adjudicated by the Fair Management.

RIBBONS

- All competitive static exhibits are judged for initial quality and ribbons are awarded as follows: Blue is the best followed by Red, White or Green.
- All the Blue Ribbon exhibits in a class are judged again and ribbons are awarded as follows: Best of Class, followed by Silver then Bronze.
- All Best of Class exhibits are again judged and one Best of Show ribbon is awarded per show.

AWARDS

AWARDS MAY VARY FROM BOOK LISTING.

- No more than one money award per class will be allowed per exhibitor, unless otherwise stated.
- Only the judges' results as recorded in the official entry books will be used as evidence for payment of awards. Ribbons and tags will not be accepted.
- Premiums are paid in this order for youth and adult divisions.
 Best of Class, Silver, Bronze
- Awards donated by our Fair sponsors are given to Best of Show winners, some Best of Class winners, or the sponsor's choice.
- Sponsored awards may vary from book listings.
- 2023 Premiums will be PAID IN CASH from the Fair Office during Fair. Friday 12pm to 6pm, Saturday 11am to 6pm, Sunday 1pm to 4pm and the week after Fair from 9am to 1pm. NO CHECKS WILL BE MAILED. All premiums or prizes not picked up by October 13, 2023 will be donated back to the Fairgrounds.

Commissioners' Award

Each Latah County Commissioner will award a special Rosette and a \$50.00 personal gift from the individual commissioner to an outstanding exhibit, display, individual or presentation which they feel best portrays the true spirit of the Latah County Fair.

Ribbons... Explained

For the Competitive Exhibit Shows, Latah Fair uses the "Danish System"







The Judges look at each entry in a particular CLASS and award each entry ONE of the following, based on individual merit of the entries:

BLUE: Excellent; exhibit most nearly meets the standard (does not indicate perfection). Example of numerical score = 90-100

RED: Good; relative to established standards, a few specific shortcomings have been identified. Example of a numerical score = 80-89

White: Fair; improvements are needed in order for the exhibit to meet the established standards. Example of a numerical score = 70-79

Then the Blue Ribbon entries are judged against each other and the Judges award a:



Best of Class = Best exhibit in the class **Silver** = Second best exhibit in the class **Bronze** = Third best exhibit in the class



Then the Judges look at all of the Best in Class Entries and pick a **BEST OF SHOW.**

Which is their pick for the best exhibit in the show.

The stand alone contests (such as Potato Family Adventure or King Arthur Baking) do not use the Danish system. Entries are judged, and awarded prizes as provided by the contest sponsors. If unique ribbons are not provided for the contest, a Judge's Choice is often used for first place, and a Silver for second.

The Floriculture Show is Judged using the National Garden Club Flower Show Guidelines.

The 4-H & FFA animal projects are judged using the Danish System, but Class winners are given a Grand Champion, Reserve Champion, and Bronze Ribbons.

3RD ANNUAL HISTORIC RECIPE CHALLENGE

Adventurous bakers are invited to test their skills with this historic recipe, first published by the Women's Civic Improvement Club of Bovill in their cookbook, "Recipes of 1924."

CREAM CAKE

- 3 eggs
- 1 C. sugar
- 1 C. cream
- 2 C. flour
- 3 T. baking powder flavoring

Mix eggs, sugar and cream together. Sift flour and baking powder, and add to first mixture. . Add flavoring and bake as a loaf. Ice or decorate as desired.



Avista is ready.

Dry vegetation and high winds increase the chances of wildfires. But Avista is doing our part to keep our system and communities safe.

We are partnering with property owners to remove or trim trees near our lines. We are making improvements to make our system stronger. And we are changing operations when hot, windy forecasts are predicted. In areas of higher risk, we can set the system to be more sensitive, meaning we don't try and reenergize automatically if something comes in contact with a line. We physically patrol the line when it's safe to make sure there is no fire danger before reenergizing.

Our system is built to keep outages to a minimum but help us keep you informed. Log in and update your contact information on our website. Also sign up to receive power-outage alerts by text or mobile app.





Lemon Blueberry Cornmeal Cakes

INGREDIENTS

Cake

- 1 1/4 cups (150g) King Arthur Unbleached All-Purpose Flour
- 1/4 cup (35g) yellow cornmeal
- 1/2 cup (99g) granulated sugar2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup (113g) buttermilk, or nonfat plain (not Greek) yogurt

- 1 tablespoon (14g) lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon lemon zest (grated rind) or 1/8 teaspoon lemon oil

- *Add an additional 1/2 teaspoon of lemon extract for enhanced lemon flavor, if desired.

Glaze

- 1/2 to 3/4 cup (57g to 85g) confectioners' sugar
- 2 teaspoons King Arthur Lemon Juice Powder, optional
- 1 tablespoon (14g) milk or lemon juice

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350°F. Lightly grease eight 5- to 6-ounce porcelain ramekins or bakers.
- **2. To make the cake:** Combine the dry ingredients in a large bowl.
- 3. Whisk together the remaining ingredients, except the blueberries, then stir them into the dry mixture until just combined.
- 4. Fold in the blueberries.
- 5. Scoop 1/3 cup batter into each baker.

- 6. Bake the cakes for 24 to 26 minutes, until the centers are firm to the touch.
- 7. Remove from the oven, and transfer to a rack to cool.
- 8. To make the glaze: Combine the sugar, lemon powder, and milk or lemon juice, stirring until smooth and adding more sugar if necessary to achieve a smooth, drizzle-able glaze.
- Drizzle the glaze onto the cooled cakes, and garnish with extra blueberries, if desired.

Cinnamon-Apple Twist Bread

INGREDIENTS

Dough

- 3 1/4 cups (390g) King Arthur Unbleached All-Purpose Flour
- 1/4 cup (43g) potato flour or 1/2 cup (43g) dried potato flakes (instant mashed potatoes)*
- 3 tablespoons (35g) granulated sugar
- 1 1/2 teaspoons instant yeast
- 1 1/4 teaspoons (8g) salt
- 3 tablespoons (43g) butter, softened
- 1 teaspoon King Arthur Pure Vanilla Extract 2. Knead the dough by hand,
- 1 large egg
- 1 cup + 2 tablespoons (255g) milk, lukewarm
- *Substitute 3/4 cup (170g) unseasoned mashed potatoes and reduce the milk to 2/3 cup (152g)

Filling

- 1 cup (170g to 227g) peeled, grated apple
- 1 tablespoon (14g) lemon juice
- 1/2 cup (99g) granulated sugar
- 3 tablespoons (21g) cornstarch or 2 tablespoons (21g) Instant ClearJel
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon

Glaze

- 1 cup (113g) confectioners' sugar
- 1 teaspoon King Arthur Pure Vanilla Extract
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 to 2 tablespoons (14g to 28g) water or 2 to 4 tablespoons (28g to 57g) heavy cream

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. To make the dough: Weigh your flour; or measure it by gently spooning it into a cup, then sweeping off any excess. Whisk together all of the dry ingredients, then add the butter, vanilla, egg, and milk, mixing until a shaggy dough forms. If your schedule permits, let the dough rest for 30 minutes; this resting period allows the flour to absorb the liquid fully, making it easier to knead.
- using a mixer, or in a bread machine set on the dough cycle — until it's smooth and soft, though still slightly sticky. Place the dough in a greased bowl, turning to coat. Cover the bowl, and let the dough rise until it's almost doubled in bulk, about 1 1/2 to 2 hours. The amount of time this takes will depend on the temperature of your kitchen; yeast works the fastest at about 85°F, but we prefer the flavor the bread gets from a longer, cooler (about 70°F) rise. If you're using a bread machine set on the dough cycle, simply allow it to complete its cycle.
- 3. While the dough is rising, make the filling.
- 4. To make the filling using

- cornstarch: Toss the grated apple with the lemon juice in a saucepan. Whisk together the sugar, cornstarch, salt, and cinnamon, and add to the pan, stirring to combine. Cook over low heat, stirring frequently, until the apple starts to release its juice. Increase the heat to medium, and bring to a simmer. Simmer, stirring, until the mixture thickens, 1 to 2 minutes; drawing a spatula across the bottom of the pan should leave a track that doesn't readily fill in. Remove from the heat, and set aside to cool to room temperature; if you want to hasten the process, place in the refrigerator.
- To make the filling using Instant ClearJel: Whisk together the sugar, ClearJel, salt, and cinnamon. Toss the grated apple with the lemon juice, then add that to the sugar mixture. Mix well, and set aside.
- 6. To assemble the loaf: Gently deflate the risen dough and turn it out onto a lightly floured or greased work surface. Divide the dough in half. Roll the first half into a 10" x 12" rectangle. Spread half the filling over the rolled-out dough, leaving a 1/2" margin clear of filling along all sides.
- 7. Starting with a long side, roll

- the dough into a log, sealing the edge. Use a bench knife, pizza cutter, or sharp knife to cut the log in half lengthwise. Place the half-logs, filled side up, side by side on a wellgreased or parchment-lined baking sheet. Keeping the filling side up, twist or "braid" the two logs together, working from the center to each end. Pinch the ends together. Repeat with the second piece of dough. Cover the twists lightly, and set them aside to rise for 1 to 2 hours; they should be puffy but not doubled in bulk.
- 8. To bake the bread: Bake the loaves in a preheated 350°F oven for 30 to 40 minutes, until they're lightly browned. Check the loaves after 20 minutes and tent with aluminum foil if they're browning too quickly. When the loaves are fully baked, a digital thermometer inserted into a loaf (be sure to position the thermometer in the bread, not the filling) should register about 190°F. Remove the bread from the oven and allow it to cool for about 1 hour before glazing and serving.
- **9. To make the glaze:** Mix together all of the glaze ingredients. Drizzle over the loaves once they're cool.







LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR RULES

- All 4-H exhibitors must be enrolled in the current 4-H year through the Latah County 4-H program and have paid annual member dues to compete. 4-H members may enter an exhibit for each project carried. All FFA members must be enrolled in a Latah County based FFA Program.
- Members who enroll in both 4-H and FFA must clearly designate the project animal that will be exhibited for each program during initial weigh-in and on fair entry forms. Members may not show the same project animals for both 4-H and FFA at the same contest/fair/show.
- Youth members of both 4-H and FFA must meet the requirements of both programs, including maintaining separate project records for each organization.
- All animals must remain at the Fair until 5:00pm on Sunday
- Livestock exhibitors may remove chutes and large tack boxes before 8am or after 5pm on Sunday
- Take down, including decorations, may not start until 4:30pm on Sunday
- No vehicles or trailers may enter the grounds between 8:00am and 5:00pm on Sunday
- No campers may leave until 5:00pm on Sunday

4-H LIVESTOCK PROJECTS:

- Unless otherwise specified, all breeds in all categories will compete in Quality and Fitting and Showing Classes. Members must compete in Fitting and Showing to complete the project.
 - Quality: Animals will be judged and shown according to breed standards. Quality classes for market animals will be based upon weight of the

- Fitting and Showing: Members are judged on fitting of the animal, training of the animal, and appearance of the exhibitor. Fitting and Showing classes will be based upon the exhibitor's age as of January 1 of the current year. If further classes are needed, the exhibitor's experience will be considered. Age divisions are as follows:
 - Junior 8 to 10 years old
 - Intermediate 11 to 13 years old
 - · Senior 14 to 18 years old
- A completed and signed Market Animal livestock record book is due to the Extension Mobile Office from 2:00 - 4:00 pm on Sunday.

- All 4-H projects exhibits shall be completed as outlined in the "Idaho 4-H Project" Requirements.
- All entries must be properly labeled.
- Record book displayed as a part of the exhibit MUST be signed by an authorized leader and parent.
- General 4-H Projects are due in the 4-H area of the Events Center Building Wednesday from 3:00pm - 7:00pm.
- All 4-H volunteers, youth members, and their parent(s)/ guardians, shall abide by the 4-H Code of Conduct and Idaho 4-H Policies and Procedures.

- 1. All animals must be fed and watered at least 2 times per day.
- 2. Exhibitors are responsible for all their animals care until close of fair at 5:00 p.m. Sunday.
- 3. Animal pens or stalls must be kept clean.
- 4. Animals NOT PROPERLY cared for may be sent home and premiums forfeited.
- Exhibitors NOT PROPERLY caring for their animals will not be allowed to enter future livestock projects.
- 6. Sheep and goats should not be washed without permission from their superintendent.

Market Animal Sales Rules & Regulations

- All consignors must be enrolled in a Latah County 4-H club or be a member of an FFA chapter in Latah County. Only one market project may be sold by each consignor.
- The market animals accepted, and the order of the sale will be determined by the Latah Market Animal Sale (LMAS) Committee.
- Market projects to be sold must be weighed the Wednesday of the County Fair on certified scales at the Fairgrounds.
 - Market Swine: 6:00 a.m. 11:00 a.m.
 - Market Beef: 11:00 a.m. 1:00 p.m.
 - Market Sheet/Goat: 1:00 p.m. 2:00 p.m.
 - Small Animals- at the direction of the superintendent
 - No Late Weigh-Ins

All selling weights of livestock must meet the following restrictions to be sold through the 4-H and FFA Market Animal Sale. (Beef, sheep, swine, & goats over the listed maximum weight will sell at the maximum weight)

- Beef: 1100-1550 lbs.
- Stocker/Feeder Beef: 550-900 lbs.
- · Lambs: 110-150 lbs.

- Goats: 70-120 lbs.
- Swine: 240-295 lbs.
- Rabbits: 3.5lbs. 5.5lbs each, and under 10 weeks of age
- Turkey: at least 15lbs (hen), 20lbs (toms) and under 20 weeks of age
- Chickens: Minimum of 5.5lbs each and under 12 weeks of age
- All youth most complete a LMAS Consignment/COOL Form with Fair Registration
- Animals entered in the sale must have been entered and judged for quality in the 4-H and 5. FFA Show of the Latah County Fair.
- Market beef project animals must have Brand Inspection papers, Hauling Permits and Bill of Sale to present to the Superintendent prior to weigh-in.
- It is the responsibility of 4-H and FFA exhibitors to understand and abide by the floateranimal policy and the sale procedure guidelines as found at https://www. latahcountyfair.com/p/fair/sale
- Animals awarded a white ribbon in the quality show will not be eligible for the sale.
- All Sheep/Goat Market Projects must have a Scrapie Tag

Livestock 4-H & FFA Quality Show

Show groups will at the discretion of the Superintendents, 4-H Director, and Fair Management and dependent on entry numbers. Market animals not making minimum weight will only show in an exhibition class and receive a participation ribbon only.

BEEF

All cattle must be doubled tied when in the barn with rope halters and neck ropes. NO chain halters or neck chains. Only de-horned or naturally polled cattle will be eligible to show. Horns over 2 inches from the skin at the base of the horn to the tip will be disqualified. Straight bred dairy steers, stags, and cryptorchids are not eligible.
