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





- NM crude oil production touched a high of 42,000 barrels in August 2021;
- NM's share of total US crude oil production also reached an all-time high of 12.5% in September of 2021 (by way of comparison, this level was 4% in 2016)





- Drilling activity has accelerated in New Mexico in the last five years;
- Prior to 2017, about 5.5% of all rigs operating in the US were in New Mexico; that percentage slowly increased, peaking over 20% by May 2020;
- Coinciding with the low West Texas
 Intermediate price, rig counts fell from about
 115 in March 2020 to a recent low of 41 in
 September 2020;
- Rig counts have recovered and by the end of 2021 totaled about 93;
- Currently, about 16% of all rigs operating in the US are operating in New Mexico.





- Oil & gas production in New Mexico has tended to increase relative to surrounding states that had produced similar volumes to the state beginning in 2011;
- Oil production in New Mexico now dwarfs production in Oklahoma, Colorado, and Wyoming and while New Mexico previously produced the smallest volume of natural gas, only Oklahoma currently produces a greater volume.








- New Mexico ranked 2nd in oil field production among the lower 48 states in 2021;
- Lea County has ranked among the top 3 crude oil producing US counties over the last several years, ranking 1st in December 2019 and January 2020 (2021 county level data is pending from the EIA);
- Lea County accounts for most of the crude oil production in New Mexico.

Top 5 States by Crude Oil Production (1,000 BLS), thru Nov. 2021



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

Lea County Contribution to NM Economy

- In 2020, approximately 22.1% of the value of all private sector economic output in New Mexico was from oil & gas extraction;
- This is greater than most surrounding states with only Oklahoma having a larger share (23.8%);
- Lea County contributes most of the crude oil & gas production in New Mexico.
- In 2020 (BEA data) Lea contributed \$9.3 billion to New Mexico's \$95.7 billion economy, or 9.4% of the state's Gross State Product (GSP);
- O Whereas NM GSP has grown at an annual rate of 1% over the last 15 years, Lea grew by 8% per year over the same time period.

Lea County Economic Profile – Gross State Product (GSP)

- According to BEA data, the mineral extraction sector accounts for 78% of GSP in the County;
- Other sectors making important contributions were Finance, insurance, real estate (5%); Transportation and warehousing (3%); Construction (3%); Manufacturing (3%); and Government (3%).










Lea County Economic Profile – Earnings (by Education Level)

Lea County Demographics - Population

- Lea's population was the fastest growing in the last ten years, increasing at a rate more than 5 times
 (15%) faster than the statewide growth rate of 2.7%;
- This is particularly notable given that many counties in the state experienced shrinking populations (some in the double digits) and shrinking GSP growth;
- The main driver of this growth is births (relative to the number of deaths) and, to a lesser degree, inward migration;
- The Lea County population is younger than the statewide averages with nearly 1/3rd of the population under the age of 18, compared to less than 1/4th in New Mexico;
- Th Median age in Lea is 32 compared to 38 for New Mexico, and the County (16%) has fewer seniors (over the age of 60) than the state (24%);



Economic Impacts – Employment & Output

- Economic activity in Lea contributed an average of 29,600 jobs per year over the last 5 years directly with a multiplier of 1.77, which has helped to support an additional 22,000 jobs;
- The total economic impact for Lea over the last five years averaged \$9 billion.






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

Lea County wishes to partner with local governmental entities on projects to improve the safety, quality of life and transportation network in Lea County.

Lea County's Five-Year Strategic Plan includes a goal of having a safe, reliable and efficient transportation network.

Commercial Street from New Mexico State Highway 18 to Avenue D is a roadway that is owned and maintained by the City of Lovington.

Lea County wishes to make improvements to a portion of Commercial Street to improve the transportation network.




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Consideration of Lea County Resolution No. 22-MAR-076R Approving a Cooperative Educational Services Task Order with Constructors, Inc. to Widen and Overlay South Commercial Street from Avenue D to NM 18. – Approximately 1.25 Miles

Lea County has budgeted, planned, and received pricing to widen and overlay Commercial Street from the Ave D to NM 18. This roadway is utilized by a large amount heavy commercial traffic, functions as the primary access to the Sheriff's Department, Detention Center, Lea County Fairgrounds, and Courthouse. It will also serve as the primary by-pass during the NM18 roadway project in Lovington.

Staff has engineered and estimated the work needed for this construction and wishes to contract Constructors Inc. through a CES contract to complete this work.






In 2014, Lea County began the master planning process to include a new fire station, a terminal expansion, a new aircraft apron, an enlarged parking lot, and utilities improvements for existing and future development at the Lea County Regional Airport.

A portion of the utility improvements would include the alternations that would allow Lea County to raze the existing 400,000 gallon water tank originally constructed in 1956 and end the use of the water well.

The installation of a municipal water and sewer system would also allow the future development of larger utility users such as car rental facilities, a hotel, and a restaurant.





Potential for Future Development and the Impact on Wastewater

It is noted that the County anticipates further development in the immediate area of the Lea County Regional Airport. Development includes a hotel (estimated 85 rooms), a restaurant (Applebee's or similar), and rental car facilities, although other entities may show interest in development too. Larger planes (seating 75) may frequent the airport. The anticipated flow resulting from these potential facilities and additional passengers is shown in Table 7.

2.3. Infrastructure

The planned land use require a number of infrastructure improvements. These improvements may happen over an extended period of time.

2.3.1. High Game Security Fence

Currently the airport perimeter is marked by a barbed wire fence. Wildlife management requirements, imposed by the FAA, dictate that the entire airport perimeter be protected by a high game fence to prevent wildlife entry. The design of this new fence is complete and construction is anticipated for 2016 or 2017. As this project progresses, it will be necessary to re-align certain locations of this fence, particularly around the airport entrance, in order to accommodate planned improvements at the airport entrance. Some realignment may also be required in conjunction with the new ARFF building, Terminal Expansion and Parking Lot expansion.

2.3.2. Utilities

Water & Waste Water

City of Hobbs water and waste water service will need to be extended to the development area from its current point of termination approximate 1 mile to the east, along Highway 62. The lines would be run along the main entrance drive to and along the internal access road to the pad sites. Refer to Table 1 on page 9 in Section 3 for the anticipated water and sewer requirements.

Natrual Gas

Zia Natural Gas currently serves the airport property with a line along Highway 62. An extension of their line to the development area would run along the main entrance drive to and along the internal access road to the pad sites. Refer to Table 1 in Section 3 for the anticipated natural gas requirements.

Electrical

In support of the master plan development of the Lea County Airport area, Xcel Energy (Utility provider to the Lea County Airport) would have to relocate / upgrade the existing utility feed to the area. As such, early coordination with Xcel energy would be required.

Emergency Power

Emergency power will be up to any tenants.

Telecom and Data

Telecom and data service in the vicinity of the Lea County Regional Airport is provided by CenturyLink. CenturyLink would provide services to the development area.

In April, 2021, the City of Hobbs awarded a water and sewer extension project to extend municipal water and sewer lines west along NM 62/180 adjacent to the Lea County Regional Airport.


The City of Hobbs awarded two bid lots that include the water line to from its termini near Pilot Truckstop to the water main at the Lea County Regional Airport and the gravity sewer main from to a location northeast of the Airport entrance road.

Lea County wishes to enter into a Memorandum of Agreement with the City of Hobbs to allow Lea County Regional Airport to connect to the municipal water system and utilize municipal water for potable water and fire suppression.

The agreement calls for Lea County to pay the City of Hobbs a sum of \$600,000. Included in the payment to the City of Hobbs would include all the waterline site work on Lea County Regional Airport property, and a portion of the water and sewer line along US 62/180.

Not included in this agreement is the sewer lift station, sewer road bore, and sewer line on Lea County Regional Airport property. These items were not awarded by the City of Hobbs in April 2021 and will need to be rebid and an additional Memorandum of Agreement will need to be reached at a later date.





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





Revenue versus Expenditures By Fund Type



Oil & Gas Production Revenue








Gross Receipts Tax – All Sources






