### GENERAL RULES FOR 4-H FAIR ACTIVITIES

Read the General Rules & Regulations for participating in the Fair and instructions for entry times, exhibits, judging, payment of premium points, and removal of exhibits. The following rules apply to 4-H members and leaders when participating in 4-H activities. Not following these rules may result in disqualification, forfeiture of all awards and potential removal from the 4-H program.

1. Barn Herdsmanship - All exhibitors are expected to care for their animals, maintain their pens and equipment properly and to keep stalls, walkways and animals always clean. The exhibitor will be responsible for feeding and watering their own exhibit.
2. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion given to top blue ribbon entries in Junior, Intermediate, Senior divisions at the discretion of the judge. These will only be awarded when there are five or more entries in a Class. Judges may award a Best Of Show Ribbon to an outstanding still-life exhibit. No extra points will be awarded.
3. Volunteers must adhere to the Washington State University 4-H Youth Program policies.
4. All volunteers, participants, and parents must adhere to the Washington 4-H Ethics Code - (C1000).
5. No alcoholic beverages
6. No drugs
7. No smoking or chewing tobacco
8. No abuse of animals
9. No coaching of youth while they are in the ring or showing their animals.
10. Adults may not groom or school an animal while on the grounds. Designated adults may assist members

### CLASS 1 — DEMONSTRATIONS

**Points Allowed: 50 35 20**

All demonstrations will be scheduled on Saturday and Sunday. Participants must sign up for demonstration time by contacting the WSU Chelan County Extension Office 509-667-6540 no later than 5:00 p.m. on August 15.

## 4-H FOOD & NUTRITION

The following contests are open to 4-H members who are enrolled in Foods and Nutrition projects. All activities are open to Junior, Intermediate and Senior foods project members unless indicated otherwise. Contact WSU Extension for general requirements, worksheets, and scorecards. Call 509-745-8531 for guidelines. All contests are held prior to the NCW Fair.

### CLASS 2 — FOOD FOR ALL OCCASIONS

**Points Allowed: 50 35 20**

Traditional meal or favorite food. Total cost of food not to exceed \$10.00 per person. Ask for general requirements and worksheet from Extension Office. Contestants will be expected to know nutritional value of food and safe food handling information.

2. Individual-Maximum contest time 2 hours; serve 2 guests, judges, and self.
  - 2A Team-Maximum contest time 2 hours; serve 3 guests, judge, and team.
  - 2B Individual-Maximum contest time 3 hours; serve 2 guests, judge, and self.
  - 2C Team-Maximum contest time 3 hours, serve 3 guests, judge, and team.

### CLASS 3 — LUNCH ON THE GO ACTIVITY

**Points Allowed: 30 20 10**

Contestant will prepare lunch to be eaten with the judge. Preparation should demonstrate food and kitchen safety and appropriate preparation skills. Consider how/where the lunch will be stored prior to eating, where it will be eaten and good food safety practices. Time limit is 45 minutes including clean up and judge's interview.

### CLASS 4 — QUICK TO FIX MEAL ACTIVITY

**Points Allowed: 30 20 10**

Contestant will make a simple meal that is easy to prepare using basic preparation skills. Contestant may not enter this activity and Foods for All Occasions too. Time limit for this activity is 1 hour, including clean-up and judge's interview.

### CLASS 5 —FAVORITE FOOD ACTIVITY

**Points Allowed: 30 20 10**

Contestant will prepare their favorite food. The food prepared should depend on the skill level and ability of the exhibitor. Junior time limit: 1 hour; Intermediate and Senior time limit a maximum of three

hours.

### **CLASS 6 — BREAD ACTIVITY**

Points Allowed: 50 35 20

Contestants will prepare a yeast or quick bread product. The judge and contestant will taste the finished product.

1. Yeast breads - Maximum contest time 3 hours.
- 6A Quick breads - Maximum contest time 2 hours.

### **CLASS 7 — FOOD PRESERVATION**

Points Allowed: 50 35 20

Contestants may demonstrate canning or freezing. Contestants must be enrolled in a food preservation project.

2. Canning - Maximum contest time - 3 hours 7A  
Freezing - Maximum contest time - 2 hours

### **CLASS 8 — FOODS OF THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST**

Points Allowed: 50 35 20

Contestants will bring an educational display and prepare a dish which features an agricultural product produced in the Pacific Northwest. The judge and the contestant will taste the food.

Contestant must be prepared to discuss with the judge the preparation and quality of the food product, the educational display, and nutritional, historical, and cultural aspects of the agricultural product used in the activity.

### **CLASS 9 — JUNIOR FOOD ACTIVITIES**

Points Allowed: 30 20 10

These activities are for 4-H members enrolled in a foods project and ages 8-10 as of October 1 of current year. Members may enter Lots 1 and/or 2.

Class:

- 9 LET'S COOK - Member will prepare and serve a simple refreshment (nutritious snack) and beverage within a one- hour time limit. Contestants will serve the judge, one invited guest and themselves. Member will fill out the "Let's Cook Worksheet" and give it to the judge before beginning the contest. Member must be prepared to tell why the snack was selected and know the basic food groups.

- 9A LET'S BAKE - Member can prepare any quick bread product that can be prepared and served in an hour such as muffins, biscuits, waffles or pancakes. Member must participate as an individual and will serve the judge and themselves. Member will fill out the "Let's Bake Worksheet" and give it to the judge before the contest starts.

### **CLASS 10 — CLOTHING ACTIVITY CONTEST**

Points Allowed: 50 35 20

Schedule will be arranged prior to the Fair

Lot:

1. Junior
2. Intermediate
3. Senior

Participants bring their own sewing machine and sewing/pressing equipment and make a simple garment in 2 hours or less. There are no requirements as to the type of garment. Participants need to prepare a verbal explanation for the judge and the public. The

verbal explanation should include information about what they are making, various time-saving techniques, why fabric was selected, etc. Participants are expected to work independently.

### **CLASS 11 — NCW FAIR STYLE SHOW**

Points Allowed: 70 50 30

Grand Champion plus 30 points and Reserve Grand Champion plus 20 points given to top blue ribbon entries in Junior, Intermediate, Senior divisions at the discretion of the Judge.

The NCW Style Show is for 4-H members enrolled in a clothing, knitting and crocheting projects. The Style Show includes contestants in these projects and Creative Consumers of Fashion activity. Participants will bring a personal data form, style show commentary form and participate in interview judging. Forms due on Fair Entry Day.

**Style Show Rules:**

1. Participants must register with the WSU Chelan/Douglas 4-H office by August 15.
2. Garments modeled in the style show must be entered as exhibits in Clothing, Knitting or Crochet classes.
3. Garments to be returned to the clothing exhibit area immediately following the Style Show.
4. Members need to schedule an interview judging time on Fair Entry Day.

### **CLASS 12 — CREATIVE CONSUMERS OF FASHION**

Points Allowed: 70 50 30

Grand Champion plus 30 points and Reserve Grand Champion plus 20 points given to top blue ribbon entries in Junior, Intermediate, Senior divisions at the discretion of the Judge.

The Creative Consumers of Fashion Activity is open to all members enrolled in clothing projects. The outfit may consist of garments and accessories purchased, remodeled/recycled by the contestant or part of an existing wardrobe.

The activity is designed as a fun learning experience for youth to showcase their clothing and textile knowledge and their creative consumer skills. 4-H members will select an outfit, articulate the consumer decisions made in the selection and model it for a judge.

The activity highlights consumer knowledge, making clothing choices and communication of self-through clothing.

1. Members may enter one outfit.
2. Creative Consumers of Fashion activity includes two parts-
3. one is interview judging and the other is modeling in the NCW Fair Style Show.
4. Participants must register with the Chelan/Douglas 4-H office.
5. Contestants shall bring a completed Creative Consumers of Fashion Activity Data Sheet and a typed Style Show Commentary form with them on Fair Entry Day.
6. Members need to schedule an interview judging time on Fair Entry Day.

## **ANIMAL JUDGING/FITTING & SHOWING**

### **CLASS 13 — ANIMAL JUDGING CONTEST**

Points Allowed: 40 30 20

Grand Champion plus 30 points and Reserve Grand Champion plus 20 points given to top blue ribbon entries in Junior, Intermediate, Senior divisions at the discretion of the Judge.

13. Livestock Judging (Livestock Arenas), Sunday, 11:00 a.m. Contestants place one or more classes of hogs, sheep, meat goats, and beef. Four animals constitute a class.

# HORSES

- 13A Rabbit Judging (Rabbit Barn), Sunday, 10:00 a.m. Breed and color identification (based on ARBA show classifications) as well as general knowledge questions will be included.
- 13B Poultry Judging (Poultry Barn), Sunday, 10:00 a.m. Contestants place a designated number of classes of birds. Four animals constitute a class. Breed identification and egg quality may also be included.
- 13E Horse Judging (Horse Arena), Sunday, 9:00 a.m. Each contestant places a designated number of classes of animals.
- 13F Cavy Judging (Rabbit Barn) Sunday, 10:00 a.m.

## CLASS 14 — FITTING & SHOWING CONTEST

Points Allowed: 70 50 30

Grand Champion plus 35 points and Reserve Grand Champion plus 25 points given to top blue ribbon entries in Junior, Intermediate, Senior divisions at the discretion of the Judge.

Friday, Livestock Arenas (except Rabbits, Poultry, Goats, & Horses)

Entries must be registered by 8:00 p.m. Wednesday.

**Fitting & showing is MANDATORY in at least one class of Market Livestock to be eligible for the sale.** Breed type and Conformation are not considered in fitting and showing. All work with the fitting and showing contest must be done by the contestant. Contestants must fit and show their own animal. Juniors permitted a helper to hold the animal while fitting & Showing.

## CLASS 14K — ROUND ROBIN

Grand Champion plus 100 points

Reserve Grand Champion plus 75 points

The 4-H Round Robin competition is limited to 4-H intermediates and seniors due to safety issues. **The grand champion winners in both age groups will advance to the Round Robin with their animals.** If a competitor qualifies for Round Robin in 4-H, FFA, or Grange Youth the exhibitor must choose to participate in either 4-H, FFA or Grange Youth competition. If an exhibitor wins a grand champion in more than one species, that exhibitor will decide which species to move forward. The vacancy will be filled with the reserve grand champion, if that person opts to not participate, it will go to the top blue ribbon until space is filled. If there is not an eligible winner, a show animal will be selected by the judge or superintendent with the owner's permission. This same process will be used if a member declines to participate in the Round Robin. Intermediate and seniors will show at the same time, but only compete in their division, not against each other. Each member will show a beef, sheep, swine, horse, and goat. A grand and reserve champion in each division will be selected.

## GOATS

All goats will be groomed only in grooming area, not along show arena fences or building. **Horned market or meat goats** may be entered & shown but must have horns tipped to diameter of a dime AND be covered with tennis ball, hoses, or pool noodles taped in place and remain the duration of the Fair. Covering horns with electrical tape or duct tape is unacceptable. **No horned dairy, pet, pygmy, hair or other goat crosses** will be allowed. NO EXCEPTIONS. If scurs are present & exceed 1" in length, they must be covered. Goats with horns that fit into any of these categories will NOT be allowed to participate in the Fair and will be sent home immediately.

Breeds that have four (4) or more senior doe entries per class will be judged separately. Otherwise, breeds will be judged together in a Meat class or Dairy Goat class as follows:

### CLASS 25 — MARKET GOATS

Entries must be either enlargements of black/white or color negatives or colored slides or digital captures that have not been manipulated in any way: 5"x7", 5"x14", 8"x10" or 8"x12". (Photos must be one of these sizes). Color enhancements and changes may not be made to the original photo unless it is entered in the digitally enhanced lot.

Members may exhibit two photographs in all the following lots unless otherwise noted.

- M. Darkroom Skills (entries in this lot should include a 3"x5" card defining chemicals, exposure and paper used.

**Points Allowed: 20 15 10**

- N. Photo Story: A series of 3 to 6 photos that tell a story with a beginning, middle and end. All photos are mounted on one board with a title and captions are preferred. Photos may be black/white or color, each photo is 3 ½"x5" or larger up to 8"x12" or 5"x14".
- O. Theme Board: A series of 3 to 6 photos depicting a specific theme. All photos are mounted on one board with a title, captions, or poem. Photos may be black/ white or color, each photo is 3 ½"x5" or larger, up to 8"x12" or 5"x14".
- P. Album/Portfolio: minimum of 25 pictures all taken by the exhibitor, arranged in an artistic or themed way.
- Q. Photojournalism: All photos must be of newsworthy nature. They must be captioned. Include information on who, what, where, when and why in each caption. Photos may be black/white or color. Entries will be scored on journalistic value, quality of photo and captions.
  - One enlarged photo mounted and captioned.
  - (5"x7", 8"x10", 8"x12", 4"x12", or 5"x14")
  - Story board: 2 to 4 pictures depicting a single newsworthy story, any size but the total exhibit must not exceed 11"x14", mounted and captioned.
  - Album: minimum of 10 newsworthy photos with captions.
- R. Digital Imaging: Images can be sandwiched, cut & paste, retouched, cloned, filters or any other special effects can be used. Original image and modified image should be mounted on exhibit mat. An index card should explain what was done to arrive at the final image. Finished pictures must be 5"x7" and no larger than 8"x10".
  - Regular film and camera, black/white or color.
  - Digitally imaged by scanning then enhanced or manipulated and printed by exhibitor.
  - Digital capture, black/white or color. Photo taken with digital camera then enhanced or manipulated and printed by exhibitor.

- S. Digitally Restored Photos: Scanned photo taken by regular— not digital - camera. Original photo may have been taken by a person other than the exhibitor. The exhibitor will scan the photo and repair the photo using modern techniques. The original photo may have been damaged in some manner. Judging will be on how well the exhibitor repaired the original photo. Finished pictures must be 5"x7" and no larger than 8"x10". An untouched copy of the original photo must accompany the entry along with an index card explaining how the photo was restored and special techniques used.

Members may enter as many different exhibits as desired. More than one exhibit in a lot requires a different recipe and preparation technique.

- All canned products must be preserved according to USDA and Washington State University recommendations.
- Only products canned and dried according to USDA and WSU recommendations will be judged at the Fair.
- Jam, Jelly, and pickle products need not be WSU Extension recipes, but processing recommendations must be followed.
- Contact WSU Extension for current canning books and recommendations.
- Any canned food entered without a canning label or with incorrect information that could suggest a safety problem will not be judged.
- All canned products to be exhibited in standard canning jars.
- Rings should be removed.
- All jam and jelly products must be exhibited in standard canning jars, processed, and sealed with a lid. No paraffin is permitted.

All jars must be labeled giving type of food, processing method and elevation, processing time and date. Labels are available from WSU Extension prior to the Fair. Place labels on top of jar.

## EDUCATION DISPLAYS/POSTERS

### CLASS 65 — EDUCATIONAL DISPLAYS/POSTERS

#### Points Allowed

Educational posters & displays highlight what the members have done in their 4-H projects. They will be displayed in the 4-H Building and cannot be the same educational posters that are expected to be in the livestock barns. Educational displays may show any topic of education nature that relates to the 4-H members project that they are enrolled in.

- Still life educational displays may show any topic of an educational nature. The size may range from a poster format to a table display. The display will be judged on educational value (50%), design (30%), and originality, creativity, and neatness (20%). Ask for C0679 for judging details.
- Possible entries could include various flours with bread exhibits; products prepared from animal byproducts: shearing, carding and/or weaving of wool; clothing care labels with samples showing proper and improper care.
- All 4-H members are expected to keep a Record Book for their project each year. Record books that are up to date through August 1<sup>st</sup>. can be exhibited at the fair to highlight what a member has learned & accomplished.
