## GENERAL RULES FOR FAIR ACTIVITIES

The following rules apply to Grange Youth members and leaders when participating in Grange Youth activities. Not following these rules may result in disqualification, forfeiture of all awards and potential removal from the NCW Fair and Grange Youth program.

1. Volunteers must adhere to the Washington State Grange Youth Fair Program policies.
2. All volunteers, participants, and parents must adhere to the Washington State Grange Code of Ethics.
3. No alcoholic beverages
4. No drugs
5. No smoking or chewing tobacco
6. No abuse of animals
7. No coaching of youth while they are in the ring or showing their animals
8. Adults may not groom or school an animal while on the grounds. Designated adults may help members with their project.
9. It is the judge's option to award a Best of Show in all classes, when and if they deem appropriate.

### CLASS 11 — NCW FAIR STYLE SHOW

Points Allowed: 70 50 30

Grand Champion plus 30 points and Reserve Grand Champion plus 20 points given to top blue ribbon entries in Beginner, Junior, Intermediate, Senior divisions at the discretion of the Judge.

The NCW Style Show is for Grange Youth Members enrolled in a clothing, knitting, and crocheting project. The Style Show showcases contestants in these projects and creative consumers of a fashion activity. Participants will bring a personal data form, style show commentary form, and participate in interview judging. Forms are due on Fair Entry Day.

#### Style Show Rules:

1. Participants must sign up with their respective project leaders no later than August 15.
2. Garments modeled in the style show must be entered as exhibits in Clothing, Knitting or Crochet Classes.
3. Garments are to be returned to the clothing exhibit area immediately following the Style Show.
4. Members need to schedule an interview judging time on Fair Entry Day.
5. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be given to the top blue ribbon entries in each lot (except Beginners) at the discretion of the Judge.

Contestants place a designated number of classes. Four shall constitute a class. Breed and color identification (based on ARBA show classifications) as well as general knowledge questions will be included.

13B Poultry Judging (Poultry Barn), Sunday, 10:00 a.m.

Contestants place a designated number of classes of birds. Four animals constitute a class. Breed identification and egg quality may also be included.

13C Horse Judging (Horse Arena), Sunday, 10:00 a.m. Each contestant places a designated number of classes of animals.

13D Cavy Judging (Rabbit Barn), Sunday, 10:00 a.m.

### CLASS 14 — FITTING & SHOWING CONTEST

Grand Champion plus 35 points and Reserve Grand Champion plus 25 points given to top blue ribbon entries in Beginner, Junior, Intermediate, Senior divisions at the discretion of the Judge.

**Fitting & Showing is Mandatory** in at least one class of Market Livestock in order to be eligible for the sale. Breed type and conformation are not considered in fitting and showing. All work in connection with the fitting & showing contest must be done by the contestant. All contestants must fit and show their own animal. Juniors are permitted to have a helper hold the animal while fitting (except for dogs).

### CLASS 14A – ROUND ROBIN

Grand Champion plus 100 points and Reserve Grand Champion plus 75 points

The Grange Youth Round Robin competition is limited to Grange Youth intermediates and seniors due to safety issues. The grand champion winners in both age groups will advance to the Round Robin with their animals. If a competitor qualifies for Round Robin in 4-H, FFA, or Grange Youth, the exhibitor must choose to participate in either 4-H, FFA, or Grange Youth competition. If an exhibitor wins a grand in more than one species, that exhibitor will decide which species to move forward. The vacancy will be filled with the reserve champion if that person opts to not participate, it will go to the top blue ribbon until the space is filled. If there is not an eligible winner, a show animal will be selected by the judge or superintendent with the owner's permission. This same process will be used if a member declines to participate in the Round Robin. Intermediate and seniors will show at the same time, but only compete in their division, not against each other. Each member will show a beef, sheep, swine, horse, and goat. A grand and reserve champion in each division will be selected.

## GOATS

All goats will be groomed only in grooming area, not along show arena fences or building.

**Horned market or meat goats** may be entered & shown but must have horns tipped to diameter of a dime AND be covered with tennis ball, hoses, or pool noodles taped in place and remain the duration of the Fair. Covering horns with electrical tape or duct tape is unacceptable. **No horned dairy, pet, pygmy, hair or other goat crosses** will be allowed. NO EXCEPTIONS. If scurs are present & exceed

1" in length, they must be covered. Goats with horns that fit into any of these categories will NOT be allowed to participate in the Fair and will be sent home immediately.

Breeds that have four (4) or more senior doe entries per class will be judged separately. Otherwise, breeds will be judged together in a Meat class or Dairy Goat class as follows:

## POULTRY

**General Health Requirements**, See General Rules & Regulations, Section D.

All poultry must test negative for Salmonella pullorum-typhoid (P-T). This rule applies to chickens, exotic fowl, and game birds; but excludes waterfowl, doves, and pigeons. Birds under the age of 16 weeks do not need to be tested for P-T. Exhibitors that meet one of the two options below do not need to have their birds P-T tested prior to exhibit:

- The exhibitor is a participant in the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP); or

- Within the past twelve months, the show birds were bought from NPIP participants, hatcheries, or feed stores. Exhibitors that do not meet the criteria above must test negative for P-T within 90 days of going to exhibit.
- A veterinarian, vet tech or trained personnel can draw ½ cc of blood from each bird and send the samples to the WSU Avian Health and Food Safety Laboratory in Puyallup, WA or a WSDA field veterinarian needs to perform a P-T testing prior to the Fair.

- Only one entry is permitted by each exhibitor in each lot. To prevent the possibility of spreading infectious poultry diseases, it is recommended that all poultry exhibited at the Fair not be returned to the farm.
- The superintendent and assistants reserve the right to act as a sifting committee and reject any entries on the basis of quality or signs of disease.
- All birds are to be shown by breed. Breeds listed above are not intended to be all inclusive, an exhibitor may enter more than one breed in E through W.
- Birds shown in a trio or pen cannot be shown as singles.

- Any canned food entered without a canning label or with incorrect information that could suggest a safety problem will not be judged.
- All canned products to be exhibited in standard canning jars.
- Rings should be removed.
- All jam and jelly products must be exhibited in standard canning jars, processed, and sealed with a lid. No paraffin is permitted.
- All jars must be labeled giving type of food, processing method and elevation, processing time and date. Labels are available from WSU Extension prior to the Fair. Place labels on top of jar.
