EXHIBIT RULES & REGULATIONS

All entries must be registered on-line. This will be required for all exhibits and exhibitors that are entered in the fair. If you do not have access to a computer, then the library is your best option. There will also be a computer available for use at the fair office during normal business hours.

FAIR HOURS: 10 a.m. - 10:00 p.m. Thursday through Saturday. Only exhibitors and workers with passes will be allowed through the gate before or after these hours. No exhibitors will be allowed in barns without superintendent permission outside of barn hours. Pitch out is from 5:30am to 8am. **Barns are closed to exhibitors from 11:00 PM to 5:30AM with the exception to Dairy Cattle.**

2. No parking on fairgrounds. No vehicles allowed on fairgrounds between 8 a.m. and 11 p.m. Thursday through Saturday.

3. Exhibitor's and worker's passes will be available only to persons whose presence is required every day.

4. No person shall incur any financial obligation whatsoever against the Fair without first obtaining a requisition from the Manager.

5. Any persons handling or taking any exhibits that do not belong to them may be prosecuted according to the law.

6. The management shall have the general supervision of the grounds and the entire exhibition, control of the police regulations, and entrance and exit gates.

7. Should there be any disputes or misunderstandings which none of the By-Laws, Rules and Regulations will govern, whether in connection with judging or otherwise, they shall be referred to the Board of Directors whose decision shall be final.

8. The management reserves the final and absolute right to alter, interpret, or change the rules and regulations as may become necessary; also, to determine all matters, questions, and differences that may arise in/or out of an incident at the Fair.

9. The Fair will use every precaution in its power for the preservation of all articles and stock on exhibition but will not be responsible for loss or damage. Which, in the case the protest is not sustained, is forfeited, and is added to the funds of the Fair.

10. ALL ENTRIES:

A. Are required to be entered on-line by deadline listed in each department, or on entry days as specified in department rules.

B. Must be entered in the name owner/maker whose name must be endorsed on the entry card.

C. Close at the time designated in the rules of each department.

D. Must be in place and in final proper condition for the exhibition as specified in the department rules.

E. Exhibits shall be considered unclaimed thirty (30) days following the last day of the Fair and will be considered property of the Northwest Washington Fair Association. Any cost related to disposal will be passed on to the exhibitor. It is the full responsibility of the exhibitor to pick up their exhibit prior to such disposal and the Fair is not obligated to notify the exhibitor of the unclaimed exhibit.

F. Entries not picked up on Sunday at the specified time will remain in buildings which may be unlocked with no security.

G. Entries moved or removed before the Sunday release time will forfeit all premiums.

H. Entries will not be accepted by office staff with the exception of animal entry forms. .

I. Departments will not accept entries except at the published times and dates.

J. You need only ONE exhibitor number for ALL your entries at the fair.

K. Ribbons will only be available at pick-up/release time. They cannot be mailed and are not available at the office.

11. No animal or article will be allowed to compete for more than one premium, nor shall be entered in more than one class, except as one of a herd, or cows for milk, group classes, and/ or showmanship.

12. Open Class livestock are eligible to compete for premiums in the purebred class must be accompanied by a certificate of registration.

13. If it be ascertained that any exhibitor or spectator shall attempt to interfere with the judge in the performance of his/her duty in any matter, or shall refuse to accept the awards made, they shall be disqualified from further competition and shall forfeit any premiums and ribbons already awarded.

14. An exhibitor who may desire to enter a protest must enter such protest in writing before the closing of the show and must deposit \$5.00 with the Superintendent Coordinator for review with management.

15. Any person knowingly violating the rules of the Fair may forfeit any premium that may be awarded to them.

16. No alcoholic beverages allowed on fairgrounds except for designated areas. Exhibitors breaking this rule will forfeit all fair premiums.

17. All premium checks will be mailed by September 30th of the current year and must be cashed by December 1st of the same year.

18. Any error in the records of premiums caused by oversight or neglect shall be subject to correction whenever proof is furnished to the fair office that a mistake has been made. Errors and checks not received in the mail by October 15th must be reported before November 1st of the current year. Errors should be reported via either email at entries@nwwafair.com or in writing to the Fair office at 1775 Front Street, Lynden, WA 98264. Checks that are lost or damaged will be subjected to a \$35.00 fee for canceling and replacing a check.

19. No animals shall be withdrawn from the Fair before 10 p.m. Saturday (or specified time of department) of the Fair. No articles or exhibits are to be removed from the buildings until Sunday after closing of the Fair. Exhibits so withdrawn forfeit all claims to premiums.

20. Exhibitors of animals, machinery in motion, and other exhibits liable to occasional accidents, injury, or damage to persons coming in contact herewith shall guard their exhibits in such a way as to protect the public. Such exhibitors shall indemnify the Fair from and against any claims and demands, costs, charges, and expenses which may be incurred by reason of any accident.

21. Under no circumstances will anyone remove from the fairgrounds any grain, hay, straw, or milk.

22. The objectives of the Northwest Washington Fair Association shall be to hold an annual Fair in Lynden, Washington; and to engage in any lawful use, thereby promoting the agricultural, educational, business, and cultural growth of Northwest Washington.

23. **Note: ALL premium checks will be mailed no later than September 30th.**

If you have questions about your entries or premium check, please email us at entries@nwwafair.com. We will respond to your email within 1-2 business days. Requests for missing premiums must be made no later than December 1. All premium checks must be cashed by December 1 of the same year issued. 1099 Information: If you exceed \$600.00 in total premiums, you will need to file a W-9 form. These are available in the fair office. Premium checks will not be issued unless we have the completed W-9 form.

SHOW RING ETHICS

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

Administration of drugs of any kind or description, except for treating a recognized disease or injury and for the tranquilizing of bulls that may otherwise be dangerous to females in heat, shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited. Application of adhesives to fit the animal's hair is allowed in CATTLE ONLY.

The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether he or she was instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.

The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

METHOD TO REGISTER A FORMAL COMPLAINT:

Presenting a signed letter to the Superintendent of that department. A form letter is available at the Superintendent's office.

Be a current Northwest Washington Fair exhibitor competing in the same department as the complaint that is being registered.

The Fair Management will act upon all formal complaints.

VETERINARY INFORMATION

The check-in exam will be limited to meeting only the Health Requirements for entry into the Fair. No additional healthcare exams will be done during this time.

A KVH Veterinarian will stop in twice each day (a.m./p.m.) starting Thursday afternoon to attend to animal health needs. We will be available to answer general questions regarding animal health. There will be no farm call charged during a scheduled walk through – But owners will be required to pay KVH for services (including exams - \$45.00 minimum and treatment if needed).

Any other calls to the Fair outside of the above scheduled visits will be subject to a farm call as well as the appropriate veterinarian fees. The fair veterinarian's professional decision as to the health status of an animal is final and will be upheld by the fair board. Any animal refused by the veterinarian at check-in must be removed from the fair grounds and returned home immediately. There are no facilities to house animals that cannot be exhibited.

Animals on exhibit at the Fair are the very best of their species and must present this image to the viewing public.

Exhibitors should note and respect the potential for exposure to health-threatening conditions while at a fair. Crowding of animals, long distance hauling and changing environmental conditions are major stresses to which exhibit animals are subjected. Animals, like humans, have the capability to become recovered carriers of viruses or other infectious agents. Exhibition-imposed stress may cause a recrudescence or reactivation with resulting outbreaks of disease, as occurs with malaria in humans. The Fair management will do all in its power to protect each exhibit while on display.

CLUB & CHAPTER HERDSMANSHIP

1. Good care of your animal and assigned exhibiting space is an important part of the privilege and responsibility of exhibiting at the Northwest Washington Fair. Because many more people see your animal in the barn than the show ring, exhibitors are expected to maintain barn, feeding, and grooming conditions that will ensure the good health and safety of the animals in their care, and will show consideration and sensitivity toward the public visiting the Northwest Washington Fair exhibit. Exhibitors are expected to be available to the fair visitor to discuss their exhibit or project. Exhibitors are reminded that they are hosts/hostesses in their barn.

2. The public's interest in animal welfare, and their opinion of the quality of care given to animals, has become a critical issue.

3. Exhibiting members are to perform their own herdsman chores. Herdsmanship done by adult non-exhibitors can result in forfeit of all awards and premiums by the exhibitor involved. No more than 1 warning will be given by the superintendent.

4. Herdsmanship will be done by aisle. Each club will need to sign up for shifts with division superintendent during fair. Herdsmanship should be done during 9:00AM to 10 PM. A parent on duty for each club but shall not assist the exhibitors with maintaining of barn.

5. It is the intent of the Northwest Washington Fair to recognize every exhibitor who maintains adequate standards, it is a responsibility that comes with the privilege of participating at the fair and should come with personal pride and team support. Herdsmanship will be judged 2-3 times daily.

6. Barns and displays will be examined at least twice a day. Failure to maintain adequate standards will result in loss of premiums.

7. **NO COOKING IS ALLOWED IN THE BARN.** For your own health, and to demonstrate to your fair visitor appropriate hygiene habits for when humans are near farm animals, please do not cook, eat or drink while in the penning/stalling/public areas in livestock and equine barns. This applies to exhibitor and chaperone/parent, etc. and will be enforced by the fair. Superintendents will share more information about this very serious issue during exhibitor orientation meetings. We have provided an eating area for all exhibitors to use.

ANIMAL HEALTH AND THE USE OF ILLEGAL SUBSTANCES

The use of illegal drugs and/or the improper use of animal health products or foreign substances will not be tolerated. Exhibitors, families, youth, and fair/show officials have a legal and moral obligation not to misuse these products. We have the responsibility to tell others not to use these substances, and to report those who do use any illegal substance. The administration of any drug or medication, which could affect an animal's performance resulting in an unfair advantage or the disposition of the animal, is unacceptable. Additionally, there are federal penalties for using illegal substances in animals that are going into the nation's food supply.

QUALITY ANIMAL CARE AGREEMENT

This is an agreement, formal or implied, between open exhibitors and the management of this Fair. Its purpose is to:

- Encourage ethical decisions and activities by open youth exhibitors.
- Ensure the overall well-being of all animals exhibited
- Ensure the use of commonly accepted practices in preparing and exhibiting animals for show.
- Maintain a safe and wholesome food supply.
- Maintain the intent and integrity of animal competitions and displays for future generations.

1. The purpose of my participation in the NW Washington Fair is to strengthen my own knowledge, ability, and skill as a feeder, manager, trainer, caregiver, and exhibitor of animals and to develop my sense of responsibility and good character. If my project includes food production animals, my goal is to produce safe and wholesome food.

2. The purpose of Jr. show is for exhibitors to do their own project. Parents/leaders may supervise but not participate in herdsmanship, cleaning, grooming, or feeding. Exception: when safety is a concern. Exhibitors must remain present.

3. I will not use or allow abusive, fraudulent, or illegal practices or products to be used in the feeding, care, fitting, training, and showing of my animals.

4. I will not misrepresent my animals or myself in any way.

5. I will read, understand, and follow the rules, without exception, of animal shows in which I am a participant and ask that my parents and my leaders do the same.

6. My animal project is an example of how to accept what life has to offer, both good and bad, and how to live with the outcome. I will treat other people's animals with the same respect and care I give my own animals.

7. I realize that I am responsible for the proper care and safe, humane treatment of my animals. I realize that I am also responsible for demonstrating strong moral fiber and good character as an example to others.

8. I will voice any objections to events related to my participation by using the protest policy described in the premium book. I will not directly interfere with the judge, show management, or other exhibitors before, during, or after the event.

9. I accept that failure to uphold this commitment could result in forfeiture of my right to participate in the NW Washington Fair.

FFA RULES

1. When there is only one entry for the class, the placing shall be based on the merits of the one entry.
2. All animals shown in FFA classes must be housed in the FFA area while at the fair, except with Superintendent permission. Your animals must be identified with a stall card.
3. All animals shown in FFA classes must be at least four months of age on entry and must be carried as the member's vocational agriculture project during the last or next year (Exception - Poultry and Rabbits).
4. Graduate students may show in FFA classes for 3 years following graduation or until they are twenty-one, whichever comes first.
5. Animals will be judged on the Danish System.
6. Rosettes will be awarded at the discretion of the judges.
7. Owners will show their own animals (exception in rule 9). Animals may be shown by person of equal experience on permission of the Superintendent.
8. Incorrect entries will not be accepted. To show in Open Class, entries must be entered online or in the fair office by July 25th and follow the rules stated above. Each student must enter Fitting and Showing online or on the livestock entry form. Any changes in entries after the July 25 due date must notify Superintendent of change. After July 25 all late entries will need to pay a \$25.00 late fee per animal. If registration papers are required to show in Open Class, they must be to the Open Class Superintendent by August 1st or a late fee of \$10.00 per paper will apply. These late fees are NON-REFUNDABLE even if the exhibitor decides not to come after all.
9. Members may enter only one breed of dairy and beef in the fitting and showing contest. Members must show their own animals unless there is an agreement in place prior to June 1st of the current year in the agreement page of the record book. This agreement must be sent to Ms. Whitcomb (twhitcomb@mtbaker.wednet.edu) signed by all parties and submitted by the end of the school year. There is a limit of 4 animals from another owner unless the Superintendent gives permission. Students are limited to a total of 7 animals per division and more may be requested by Superintendent simultaneously enrolled in FFA and 4H must have separate projects or animals for each program during the same calendar year. The program year is October 1 to September 30. For example, a member may carry a dairy project for FFA and 4H as long as he or she uses a different animal and project for each program. The goal of both organizations is youth education. Involvement in both programs should result in the enhancement of the educational experience. You cannot keep an animal in the 4H area unless you have permission from the Superintendent.
10. Failure to Fit and Show will forfeit all FFA premiums.
11. Any member smoking, drinking alcohol, or having drugs in their possession in or about the barns will forfeit their premiums from the fair and will be discharged from the fairgrounds. There are NO second chances.
12. Beef bulls may be exhibited in the FFA section of the barn @ Superintendent's discretion. Bulls over one year of age may be required to have a restraining pen provided by the exhibitor. All bulls must have a nose lead. Dairy bulls are not allowed.
13. The Fair Association will provide hay and bedding.
14. Animals may be taken home on recommendation of fair veterinarian or FFA superintendent, and a haul out slip must be completed by owner before animal leaves fairgrounds.
15. Judging teams will be admitted on judging days when accompanied by their instructor or by Superintendent of FFA division. Please visit NWWF office at will call to get fair passes on morning of event.
16. All FFA exhibitors will only pay an entry fee for animals through the fair's online system or through their instructor prior to the first day of the fair.
17. Official rules for clipping and grooming of FFA animals will be according to breed association rules.
18. No FFA exhibits shall be withdrawn from the Fair before 9 p.m. Saturday of the Fair or their premiums will be forfeited. Please remove all items you have used in your stall area at that time.
19. All milk must be put into tank and will become property of the Fair. All medicated animals must be milked last if using parlor.
20. All exhibitors must be out of the barn from 11 p.m. to 5 a.m. unless they have written permission from the Superintendent.
21. Maximum of 2 entries per class
22. Fitting and Showing class definitions:
NOVICE: A contestant in FFA and in their first calendar year showing a specific species.
JUNIOR: Last year freshmen and sophomores with any previous experience. Also applies to incoming 8th graders or freshman with previous experience.
SENIOR: Last year juniors, seniors, and graduates with experience.
23. Official dress is recommended for Fitting and Showing where appropriate.
24. No mixing of animals between 4H and FFA. Members simultaneously enrolled in FFA and 4H must have separate projects or animals for each program during the same calendar year. The program year is October 1 to September 30. For example, a member may carry a dairy project for FFA and 4H as long as he or she uses a different animal and project for each program. The goal of both organizations is youth education. Involvement in both programs should result in the enhancement of the educational experience. You cannot keep an animal in the 4H area unless you have permission from the superintendent.
25. Due to space availability, exhibitors may be asked to leave animals home for a variety of reasons. The order in which exhibitors will be asked to leave animals at home is as follows:
 1. Late entries
 2. Out of county exhibitors.
 3. Two entries per class.
 4. Multiple entries in a division.
26. Students must fit their own animals. No one may fit the animals other than the exhibitor. Showing must be done by exhibitor unless an emergency situation (notify the Superintendent prior if this is necessary). Discretion on the part of outside parties is mandatory. Help must be limited to teaching and holding, but not doing. This will be strictly enforced in all FFA barns where animals are housed.
27. No animal will be allowed to compete for more than one premium, nor shall be entered in more than one class; except as one of a herd of cows for milk, sheep flocks, chapter herds.
28. **Accurate record books (including signatures, agreement, budget, expenses, labor, management/diary /journal, or AET single experience record book for each enterprise) for all animal projects all record books have to be turned in Monday August 9th (approx. 1 week prior to NWWF) to FFA Superintendent for advisor review. Failure to do so will result in disqualification from the fair and sale. FFA advisors will be provided with a list of FFA exhibitors that did not meet the minimum point requirement (received a Red or White Ribbon) on their record books. All changes that need to be made to record books must be completed by 5 pm on Tuesday (1st Day) of NWWF.**

Meat Goat Showmanship Attire: Collared shirt, dark jeans, belt, boots or shoes with closed toe AND closed heel. Goats show with chain collar or collar with lead. Horned meat goats only may show with show halter.

Dairy Goat Showmanship Attire: White collared shirt, white pants, belt, boots or shoes with closed toe AND closed heel. Goats show with chain collar.

ALL GOAT GENERAL RULES

1. All project animals must be owned by June 1st. Please refer to 4-H Policy 9.6 if borrowing an animal.
2. **Fitting, feeding and stall duty/cleaning tasks done by exhibitors only. (Parents may supervise but not participate unless in case of an immediate safety concern)**
3. Exhibitor and leader meeting on Tuesday morning time TBA in goat arena. Please have a leader or club rep meet with clerk or super after this meeting to confirm class entries.
4. Each 4-H member may in enter 7 goats in each goat division with stall space permitting. (7pygmies – 7 meat/dairy) If

showing in both 4-H and FFA the exhibitor may show no more than 8 animals between the two organizations. No more than two animals may be shown in each class.

5. Scrapies- Approved methods of ID: official USDA Scrapie ID tag, tattoo, microchip following USDA guidelines, or registry tattoo or microchip for pygmy goats. Market wethers or wethers under 18 months do not need a scrapies tag. Call USDA at 360-753-9430 for more information.

6. 4-H members must show in fitting and showing to show in type. Exhibitor chooses one animal for fitting and showing in this division (i.e., pygmy and meat/dairy are separate divisions).

7. Animals must be cleaned, clipped, and show ready prior to haul in.

8. Each animal shows in only one type class (exception: group classes).

9. Rosettes for Grand and Reserve awarded if deserving. Grand Champion Overall Showman qualifies to compete in the 4-H Round Robin on Saturday.

10. All animals, tack, feed, etc. must be stored within the number of assigned pens (and/or allotted areas). You may be asked to share tack space with other clubs.

11. No does allowed past 3 months pregnant.

12. No bucks allowed in barn. Exception: nursing offspring under 8 weeks of age; these must be included in entries (no premium) and will count toward exhibitor's total number of goats.

13. Water must be always available to all goats in pen.

14. **The following are prohibited:** muzzles, drenching/tubing; diuretics; inhumane or unethical treatment; paints/dyes; adhesives for attaching hair/hair substitutes/other objects for purpose of deception.

15. HORNS: Updated 2021 per 4-H Policy 9.7

a) Horned Boer goats may be shown in market and breeding classes

b) Horn tips must be covered by approved method for safety reasons.

c) Horned goats may be exhibited in 4-H fitting and showing classes as long as animals are not exchanged.

d) Scurs over 1 inch from skull must be covered.

e) Safety of exhibitors, the public, property, and other animals is the priority. Horns must follow standards for Boer breed; animals with unsafe horn patterns may not be exhibited. Exhibitors must be able to handle horned goat safely.

f) Please let super know number of horned goats prior to fair.

16. DAIRY GOAT DOES:

a. Senior Does (MUST BE IN MILK, 24 + months as of show day) Goats not in milk maybe shown for lower premium.

- b. Junior Doe (less than 24 months as of Monday of fair, never in milk. Goats less than 24 months in milk show with Sr. Does)
- c. MUST be clipped according to breed characteristics PRIOR to check in. Exception: kids under 4 months old, clipping is optional.
- d. Milking station available in front of goat barn. Exhibitors must clean area and check in with super for more details.
- e) No horns allowed on dairy does.

17. MEAT GOAT DOES:

Senior Doe – Doe 24 months+ as of show day. Does who have kidded or exhibited signs of pregnancy. (Doe under 24 months only if it has kidded.) Unfreshened Goats maybe shown for lower premium.

Junior Doe – Doe that is 24 months or younger, doe has not kidded.

See rule 15 for horn information.

18. MARKET GOATS:

- a. Must be fit with a “terminal clip” (uniformly body clipped to 3/8 inch or less above hocks and knees) prior to check in.
- b. Refer to Lynden Jr. Livestock Sale rules for more details: www.lyndenjrlivestock.org
- c. Market goats are to remain in their pen on Saturday night and MUST be left with a water and hay or premiums will be pulled.
- d. Refer to rule 15 for horn information.

****FLEECE GOAT ENTRANTS SEE SHEEP DEPARTMENT**

Entries can be placed on-line until July 18th. Late entries will be charged a fee of \$25.00 per head through July 31st. After July 31st late entries might not be accepted. All exhibits must be in place by 8 a.m. Tuesday of the fair.

ALL GOAT GENERAL RULES:

1. Fitting, feeding and stall duty/cleaning tasks done by exhibitors only. (Parents may supervise but not participate unless in case of an immediate safety concern)

2. Scrapies- all dairy and meat goats must have official USDA Scrapie ID in the form of USDA tag, tattoo or microchip following USDA guidelines. Market wethers or wethers under 18 months do not need a scrapies tag. USDA: 866-873-2824.

3. FFA members must show in fitting and showing to show in type. Exhibitor chooses one animal for fitting and showing in

this division (i.e., pygmy and meat/dairy are separate divisions).

4. Animals must be cleaned, clipped, and show ready prior to haul in.
5. Each animal shows in only one type class (exception: group classes).
6. Rosettes for Grand and Reserve awarded if deserving. Grand Champion Overall Showman qualifies to compete in the FFA Round Robin on Saturday.
7. All animals, tack, feed, etc. must be stored within the number of assigned pens (and/or allotted areas). You may be asked to share tack space with other clubs.
8. No does allowed past 3 months pregnant.
9. No bucks allowed in barn. Exception: nursing offspring under 8 weeks of age; these must be included in entries (no premium) and will count toward exhibitor's total number of goats.
10. Water must be always available to all goats in pen.
11. **The following are prohibited:** muzzles, drenching/tubing; diuretics; inhumane or unethical treatment; paints/dyes; adhesives for attaching hair/hair substitutes/other objects for purpose of deception.

12. DAIRY GOAT DOES:

- a. Senior Does (MUST BE IN MILK, 24 + months as of show day)

- c. MUST be clipped according to breed characteristics PRIOR to check in.
- d. Milking station available in front of goat barn. Exhibitors must clean area and check in with super for more details.
- e. No horns allowed on dairy does.

13. MEAT GOAT DOES:

Senior Doe – Doe 24 months+ as of show day. Does who have kidded or exhibited signs of pregnancy. (Doe under 24 months only if it has kidded.)

Junior Doe – Doe that is 24 months or younger, doe has not kidded.

* Horned Meat Does allowed only under following conditions:

- a. Horns allowed for ABGA-registered does only (American Boer Goat Association) w/ registration papers provided at check in
- b. Horns must be wrapped.
- e. Exhibitor must be able to handle their horned goat safely.
- f. Dairy, pygmy, and other non-ABGA papered breeds may not have horns.

14. MARKET GOATS:

- a. Must be fit with a "terminal clip" (uniformly body clipped to 3/8 inch or less above hocks and knees) prior to check in.
