General Livestock Rules

Introduction

1. Governing Rules and Regulations:

The rules of the New Mexico State Fair govern all competitions in the Junior Division. General Exhibitor Information is considered a part of New Mexico State Fair Junior Division General Rules and Regulations. All rules listed in a specific division apply where entry is made into that division. All exhibitors must read and abide by these rules. Exhibitors not abiding by these rules are subject to the penalties stated in these rules.

2. Interpretation and/or Administration of Rules and Regulations:

The New Mexico State Fair reserves to itself the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and to fairly and impartially settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of or connected with or incident to the fair, and the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine. An exhibitor who violates any of the rules or regulations may forfeit all privileges and premiums and be subject to such penalties as the Fair may order and other such penalties as prescribed by law.

3. Loss, Damage or Injury:

The New Mexico State Fair and the State of New Mexico will not be responsible for loss, damage or injury to exhibits or animals exhibited, or for any article of any kind that may be lost or destroyed, or in any way damaged. Each exhibitor will be responsible for any injury that may be occasioned by any person whomsoever, by an animal owned or exhibited by him or her.

Exhibitor shall indemnify the New Mexico State Fair or the State of New Mexico against all claims, demands, suits or judgments of any kind or nature, including attorney's fees and costs that may grow out of an injury, damage or loss occasioned by any animal owned or exhibited by him or her, or arise from any person in charge of any such animal. All animals exhibited in this show will be exhibited entirely at the owner's risk.

The New Mexico State Fair or the State of New Mexico will not be responsible or liable for any injury sustained in any way to exhibitors or spectators.

4. Requirements Regarding Disease:

All animals presented for exhibition at the New Mexico State Fair shall be free from contagious and infectious diseases and shall be subject to examination on arrival at the fairgrounds and to daily inspection during the fair. Should any animal be found to be infected with any contagious, infectious or communicable diseases, it shall immediately be removed to a place of quarantine. The show pens or stalls in which such diseased animals were kept must immediately be cleaned and disinfected under the supervision of the official veterinarian.

5. IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics:

The International Association of Fairs and Expositions National Code of Show Ring Ethics are incorporated herein and made a part hereof. New Mexico State Fair rules shall supersede.

Exhibitor Eligibility

1. FFA & 4-H Membership Requirements:

All contestants in this department must be bona fide 4-H Club members enrolled in projects they are exhibiting or FFA Members in the State of New Mexico for the current school year, as certified by their County Agent or Agricultural Education Advisor. Contestants are to be members in good standing and have received an overview of the NMSF rules. The Junior Dairy Department is exempt from this rule as exhibitors do not have to be in either 4-H or FFA.

2. Age:

Only New Mexico boys and girls who have not reached their 20th birthday as of the close of fair are eligible, and they must be members of the youth organization as certified by an official of the organization they represent. 4-H members must follow the age requirements set forth by the 4-H organization.

Showmanship:

Novice - Ages 9 to 11, youth exhibitor must have passed his/her 9th birthday or be 8 years old in the third grade but cannot be in 6th grade and not have passed his/her 12th birthday prior to January 1 of the current year.

<u>Junior - Ages 12 to 13</u>, youth exhibitor must have passed his/her 12th birthday or be 11 years old in the 6th grade but cannot be in 8th grade and not have passed his/her 14th birthday prior to January 1 of the current year.

<u>Senior - Ages 14 to 19</u>, youth exhibitor must have passed his/her 14th birthday or be 13 years old in the eighth grade but not have passed his/her 20th birthday prior to September 21st of the current year.

Entry Requirements

1. Entry Eligibility:

All entries must be certified as to eligibility by County Agent or FFA Advisor. No individual entries or entries without certification will be accepted. The sponsoring Agent or Advisor will be

held accountable and may be requested to appear before the New Mexico State Fair Commission and/or designated committee to inform the New Mexico State Fair as to the sponsoring Agents' or Advisors' efforts to educate its members.

2. Ownership:

Animals must be owned by the exhibitor submitting the entry. All documents (bills of sale, lease agreements, and certificates of registration) establishing ownership shall be in the name of the exhibitor. No market animals may be owned or exhibited in a partnership, or jointly owned; however, animals may be transferred between immediate family members (i.e., brothers and sisters) at the time of classification. Animals may not be transferred from 4-H Club to FFA or vice versa after the ownership deadline. Animals must be owned by the deadlines listed in the rules of its appropriate division and proof of ownership must be made available if requested by NMSF officials. Exhibitors in violation of ownership requirements will be subject to the penalties outlined in these rules. Any animal that has been sold through a premium sale (fair/expo sale) in any state or county or any representation of said animal through such a sale may not be exhibited at the New Mexico State Fair.

3. Care and Custody:

All animals must remain in the continuous possession of the exhibitor and be personally cared for by the exhibitor during the feeding period.

4. Registration:

Animals in breeding classes must be registered in the name of the exhibitor. Registration numbers and also the names and numbers of sire and dams must be listed on the entry for breeding stock requiring registration. Entries sent in without proper information will be returned. Certificates of registration must be available to be checked by superintendent of department.

5. Market Animals and Replacement Dairy Heifers:

Market animals and replacement dairy heifers must be tagged with a NMSF tag by June 15th of the current year. Entries are due August 1st of the current year.

6. Late Entry Fee:

Late Entries will be accepted until August 10 of the current year with a late fee of \$250.00 per animal.

7. NMSF Ear Tags (required):

Removal of or tampering with a NMSF ear tag will result in dismissal from the show. Should an animal lose their ear tag, you must notify your 4-H Agent or FFA Advisor immediately to obtain a new tag. The Agent/Advisor must then notify the NMSF via email of the new tag number immediately. Animals that arrive at the NMSF without a NMSF ear tag will not be able to show. Dairy Heifers will be the exception. Breeder tags will be taped over or removed.

Show Rules

1. Exhibitor Showing Requirements:

Exhibitors will be required to show their own animals. A substitute exhibitor may be allowed to present an animal for classification or in the show ring during official judging at the sole discretion of the Department Superintendent; 1) if the exhibitor has documented health reasons after arrival at the fair, or 2) if an exhibitor has more than one entry in the Youth Livestock Show showing at the same time. Any substitute exhibitor must be a bona fide member of 4-H or FFA. In no case may a parent, agent or advisor present any animal for judging.

2. Exhibitor Responsibilities (Animal Care & Delivery):

Each exhibitor is responsible for the care, showing and selling of his or her own animals until the superintendent has issued a release. It is the responsibility of the owner to see that sale animals are delivered to buyer or correct packer. If livestock is not properly cared for, labor, feed requirements and other necessary items will be supplied, with all costs thereof charged against such exhibitor. Any sale money won by such exhibitor will be withheld under such circumstances to apply toward any expenses incurred. Exhibitor's failure to provide proper care to his or her animals will be subject to the penalties outlined in these rules.

3. Animal Inspections:

As a condition for participation in the show, every exhibitor must agree to submit any animal entered by exhibitor to inspection by a veterinarian appointed by the management, FDA, USDA/FSIS, New Mexico Department of Agriculture, and/or New Mexico Department of Health and agrees to have such animal submitted to any tests as may be designated and requested by the veterinarian or fair official.

The State Fair specifically reserves the right to have hair, tissue, blood or urine laboratory analysis made on any animal entered for competition. The conclusions reached by the veterinarian, as to whether such animal has been administered or given a substance or drug in violation of the rules or has not been properly withdrawn from approved drugs shall be final, without recourse against the State Fair or any of its officers.

In addition, during the fair, every exhibitor agrees to allow NMSF officials to collect hair follicles. These hair follicles may be used to perform analyses to verify identification of an entry in the show using the DNA sample collected at the time of enrollment. Any and all samples collected are the property of the NMSF and may be compared with samples collected by other fairs in order to confirm entry identification.

4. Winners Eligibility to Show:

Winners of first and second place in each class will be eligible to show for the Champion and Reserve Champion of the breed they represent.

5. Rules Governing Auction:

An Auction of Junior Livestock will be held; see the Special Rules in Division 38 found in the Livestock Sale PDF on this web site.

6. In Case of Animal Death:

If an exhibitor's animal dies while at the New Mexico State Fair, the exhibitor is responsible for either disposing of the carcass properly or for paying the disposal fee. Please notify a department superintendent or the livestock office immediately. The animal should be moved to a remote location or covered until it can be removed. UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES should an animal be placed in a trash can or dumpster.

7. Barn:

All exhibitors staying past the day of their respective show, may be asked to move to a designated layover area as directed by the superintendent within four (4) hours of completion of each species show in order to cooperate with incoming exhibitors.

8. Penning:

Exhibitors will only be given space for the number of animals that are brought to the fairgrounds, not the number entered.

Conduct

1. Conduct:

Any act of discourtesy or disobedience to the officials on the part of the exhibitor, parents or sponsors will disqualify exhibitor from the contest, and the owner shall forfeit his entrance and other fees. Any exhibitor, parent or sponsor who shall attempt to interfere with judges in the performance of their duties, or who shall make any false statement in regard to any animal exhibited or shall interfere with clerk's and judge's books shall be excluded from the competition and may be subject to other disciplinary actions.

2. Delinquent Acts:

If an exhibitor is caught having any involvement in any delinquent act, they may be removed from the grounds forfeiting any further competition, awards, premiums, sale slots and/or proceeds. Fees will not be reimbursed and the exhibitor may be barred from future competition at the New Mexico State Fair. Delinquent acts include but are not limited to vandalism, use of alcohol or drugs, and aggressive or violent behavior.

3. Protest:

The decision of Classifiers, Weigh Masters, Judges and Veterinarians shall not be subject to protest or appeal.

Prohibited Acts

The following are Prohibited Acts:

- a. The injection, use, or administration of any drug to the animal that is prohibited by Federal, State, or Local Law or any drug that is used in a manner prohibited by Federal, State or Local Law.
- b. The injection or internal or external administration of any product or material, whether gas, solid, or liquid, to an animal for the purpose of deception, including concealing, enhancing, or transforming the true conformation, configuration, color, breed, condition or age or by making the animal appear sounder than otherwise appear. No stomach pumping allowed.
- c. The administration, use of, or application of any drug or feed additive affecting the central nervous system.
- d. The administration of diuretics for cosmetic purposes, tissue manipulation, removal, surgical attachment or otherwise to change, conceal, enhance, or transform the true conformation or configuration of the animal. Attaching to the hide foreign objects including hair or hair substitutes, cloth or fiber for the purpose of deception.
- e. Any physical or physiological attempt to alter the natural musculature or weight by use of injections or ingested material not conductive to the continued health or marketability of bovine, sheep, swine or goat carcass or for deception.
- f. Violations of the Wholesome Meat Act.
- g. Violations of the New Mexico State Fair ownership requirements or care and custody rules listed in this premium book. This includes the manipulation of documents or providing false statement as to affect ownership of an animal and its eligibility to be exhibited at New Mexico State Fair.
- h. Violations of New Mexico State Fair animal care and fitting regulations as listed in this premium book.

Exhibitor Responsibility:

It is the sole responsibility of the exhibitor to follow all the rules contained herein. Extent of knowledge on the part of the exhibitor with regard to the animal being subject to any prohibited act is not relevant to any issue, and it shall not be a defense that a person or persons unknown subjected the animal to any prohibited act.

Penalties

An exhibitor who violates any of the rules contained herein, or whose animal has been found to be in violation of the rules is subject to:

- a. May permanently bar such animal from competition at the New Mexico State Fair.
- b. May bar the exhibitor from entering and/or participating at the New Mexico State Fair.
- c. May bar the exhibitor, the exhibitor's family, representative or agents or any or all of them from any further participation in the New Mexico State Fair.
- d. May submit name and address of exhibitor and action taken against exhibitor to other

cooperating livestock exhibitions, shows and sales, affecting eligibility.

- e. Awards may be withheld. In the event any awards shall have been given by the New Mexico State Fair to an animal in violation of these rules, the exhibitor will, upon demand by the New Mexico State Fair, immediately return all awards given to such animal.
- f. The exhibitor may forfeit all money derived from the New Mexico State Fair Junior Livestock Sale Association (a 501c3 Corporation)
- g. Exhibitor will be liable to the New Mexico State Fair and shall indemnify and hold the New Mexico State Fair harmless from all damages, including but not limited to all expenses and costs for blood, tissue, urine, hide and/or carcass sampling and testing, State Fair management labor and expenses, consultant legal and court costs incurred as a result of violations of New Mexico State Fair rules and regulations. If any substance is found, a 2nd sample will be sent to lab at exhibitor's expense.

Person's Involved in Prohibited Act:

Any person that in any way performs any prohibited act, with or without the owner's permission, may be forever barred from showing at the New Mexico State Fair. In addition, the case will be turned over to an appropriate authority.

Any sponsoring agent, advisor or person associated with the sponsoring agent, advisor, leader, parent or guardians who are found to be involved with the encouragement of prohibited acts may be barred from future participation at the New Mexico State Fair.

Right of Decision Review:

If an exhibitor is subject to any penalty or violation under these rules, the exhibitor has the right to have the decision reviewed by the New Mexico State Fair. Exhibitor must contact the livestock manager to obtain the procedure for review. Please note there are specific time deadlines and notification requirements that are strictly adhered to.



Open Livestock General Rules

1. Competition

Open to the world, unless otherwise stated. Application for entry must be made online. Call (505)319-0251 or email nmsf.livestock@state.nm.us with questions.

2. Entries

Each animal <u>must be entered online</u> and a W9 must be completed before the entries will be considered a completed entry. The W9 must also be completed by August 1 online **NO REFUNDS**. Entries close August 1 of the current year. **Payments will be due online**.

3. Arrival & Release

See individual departments for times of arrival and release. All animals must arrive at the time designated in each department unless an exhibitor is exhibiting at another fair, making it impossible to arrive in time. In such cases, special permission must be granted by management when entry is made. Entries must remain in place until the superintendent of the department gives a properly signed release. Failure to observe these regulations may disqualify entries or the governing board may order forfeiture of all privileges, premiums, or such other penalties as it may desire. In order for NMSF to prepare for other shows, we ask that you vacate the barns at the specified times.

4. Feed and Bedding

Straw, wood shavings and feed will be sold on the grounds. Please call ahead with special requests at (505) 934-2681. Exhibitors are warned that adequate arrangements must be made to pay for feed and other costs by cash, certified check, money order, etc. All stalls and pens will have dirt footing.

5. Stalling Assignments

Stalls will be assigned by each division's superintendent and may not be changed without written permission from same superintendent.

6. Grooming

Animals in the livestock classes must at all times be kept thoroughly groomed, clean and in show condition. The State Fair Commission reserves the right to refuse entry of stock for competition that is not in suitable show condition. Stalls and pens must be neatly kept and supplied with necessary clean bedding. Stalls and pens will have dirt footing. Aisle ways and approaches must be kept clean for the convenience of spectators. This work must be completed by 10:00 am each day.

7. Fitting

Any livestock doctored, colored, or in any way artificially, improperly or unfairly prepared or tampered with before going into the show ring will be disqualified.

8. Transport & Loading

The New Mexico State Fair will not assume or pay transportation charges on livestock, or assume or pay expenses for their delivery to the grounds. Animals may be unloaded in designated areas only. Absolutely no unloading will be permitted onto Main Street.

9. Water Pails & Feed Boxes

Exhibitors must furnish all water pails and feed boxes.

10. Exclusion Due to Delays

Should there be any unnecessary delay in bringing animals into the show ring; the superintendent will exclude such animals from competition in the class called.

11. Prize-Winning Animals

All prize-winning animals that can be led, driven or will follow must appear in parades when so directed or forfeit premiums awarded. At the discretion of show management, Champions and Reserve Champions of each breed will be presented at the rodeo.

12. Group Classes

Entries in livestock group classes must be so indicated on entry form. In Produce of Dam and Get of Sire classes, dam or sire must be named. Names of other animals in these classes must be furnished to clerk of the show. Group classes will pay entry fee.

13. Entry Fees

An entry fee for all entries in the livestock department will be charged according to the following schedule and must accompany entries when same are forwarded to the entry office. No entry fee will be refunded.

14. Premium Payments

Premiums will be paid to registered owners only. A W-9 form must be submitted to the New Mexico State Fair prior to any monies being issued.

15. Trailer Parking

Special parking facilities will be provided for livestock trailers. Immediately after unloading, all trailers must be moved (location to be announced).

Premium Award Requirements

All animals must be entered, shown in the ring, and judged in order for premiums to be awarded.

Late Entry Acceptance

NMSF reserves the right to accept entries **online only** after the entry deadline if management deems that action necessary for the overall good of the show. The livestock manager reserves the right to accept the exchange of entries on a case by case basis.

Registration

No animal can be entered or exhibited unless that animal has been recorded in the recognized Book of Records for its respective breed. For an exhibitor to be able to show an animal, the exhibitor's title of ownership must be shown on the registration certificate at the time of the exhibition. These registration certificates will be checked by the superintendent on arrival and must be available for review at any time during the Fair.

Judging

- 1. The single judge system is the policy of the New Mexico State Fair. In every case the judge will be selected with utmost care, and as much as possible, will be of national reputation. The management, however, reserves the right to substitute the three- judge system should circumstances arise where it would prove of mutual benefit to the exhibitors and the State Fair.
- 2. Should any doubt arise as to the regularity of any entry, or any other important matter that the judge feels unable to decide, he shall report the same to management through the Superintendent in charge of the department.
- 3. The management reserves the right to cancel any class where there are less than four entries and combine classes should the best interest of the show require it. In the Open Beef division, any breed show with less than 10 head entered may be cancelled.
- 4. The management reserves the right to award only one premium in classes where only one exhibitor makes entry. The judge may, at his discretion, withhold any or all premiums where the animal or article is not worthy of an award.
- 5. Premiums at the New Mexico State Fair will be awarded as listed in the premium schedule.
- 6. The decision of the judges shall be final and no appeal will be considered except in case of protest.
- 7. Any exhibitor attempting to interfere with the judges during their adjudication, or who publicly expresses disapproval of the decision of the judges, or who by act of influence shall be guilty of conduct unbecoming an exhibitor, shall forfeit the premium and be excluded from further competition.
- 8. Exhibitors are urged to have neatly attired attendants in charge of animals in the show ring.
- 9. No premiums, ribbons or decorations previously won by any animal shall be exhibited prior to the judging.
- 10. Exhibitors may enter as many in a class as they wish. This rule shall have no bearing or

consideration in the placing of entries by the judges. Ribbons will be presented in the order of placing by judges. The fair shall, however, pay third place money to fourth place winner, etc., when the third-place winner is prohibited from receiving the third-place cash award under the provision of this rule.

Protests

- 1. All protests will be adjudicated by the State Fair Commission and must be made in writing to the general manager, accompanied by an affidavit setting forth grounds for protest and a deposit of \$250, which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained.
- 2. Protests against the exhibition of any entry must be filed, considered, and determined before a section is judged.
- 3. Protests against an award must be filed within 1 hour after conclusion of show on the day award was made, and will be considered and determined at the first meeting of the fair commissioners, following the fair.
- 4. In addition to the right of protest guaranteed above to interested parties, the fair commission reserves the right to take cognizance of any fraud, consummated or attempted, and to deal with all persons implicated therein, in such manner within the limits of the power of the commissioners as may, from the evidence relating thereto, be deemed just and proper.
- 5. Interested parties will be duly notified of the time and place for considering protests and given the opportunity to submit evidence.

Liability

The exhibitor shall defend, hold harmless, and indemnify the New Mexico State Fair or the State of New Mexico and its employees from any and all liabilities of any type or description whatsoever arising from the performance of the exhibitor and/or its employees/members under this agreement. The exhibitor shall not be responsible to defend, hold harmless, and indemnify the New Mexico State Fair, the State of New Mexico for any liability to the extent such liability is directly caused by wrongful acts, errors, or omissions of the Fair, the State of New Mexico, or their officers, agents, employees or servant.



Junior Exhibitor Info

Parking and Passes

Parking Permits and Passes:

Youth entering on-line can order parking permits and exhibitor passes. Exhibitors will be able to purchase passes until August 1st of the current year. Youth entering via mail will order parking permits and passes on the entry form (excluding Exhibitors in the Junior Market Divisions). Permits will then be mailed to the Youth and their Families. Parking permits will be issued for Junior Week, September 9-19, 2021.

Parking Permit:

Youth that are exhibiting animals at the 2021 New Mexico State Fair may purchase a parking pass valid at Gate 6 (\$40.00). **Parking space is based on availability**.

Unlawfully Parked Vehicles:

Any motor vehicle which is unlawfully parked is subject to wheel booting immobilization by New Mexico State Fair personnel. An immobilization notice will be placed on your windshield. Upon payment of a one-hundred fifty-dollar (\$150) wheel boot removal fee, the wheel boot mechanism will be removed promptly as reasonable. Where the owner or operator of a wheel booted vehicle fails to make all payments within twenty-four (24) hours from the time the vehicle is wheel booted, said vehicle becomes subject to being towed. Once a vehicle has been wheel booted and subsequently towed, the registered driver/owner will be responsible for all fees incurred (including wheel boot removal fee, towing and storage fee). Any person(s) who tampers with or damages an immobilizer wheel boot will be responsible for an immobilizer wheel boot replacement cost of Five-hundred dollars (\$500) and face criminal charges.

Assigned Gate Entry:

All livestock will be admitted to the Fairgrounds at <u>Gate 6 only</u>. Special parking facilities will be provided for livestock trailers. Immediately after unloading all trailers must be moved. Location will be announced. Only one parking pass per family.

Passes & Fees:

Exhibitors must have an exhibitor's pass to enter Gate 6 – Junior Week pass fees are \$15.00 for livestock exhibitors/adults, and children 5 & under are free. Poultry and Rabbit exhibitors must purchase a daily parking pass for \$7.00 upon receipt of valid entry. Parking permits will be issued but these permits do not guarantee a parking space as parking is based on availability.

Once an exhibitor obtains a written release, they may leave the grounds at any time two (2) hours after completion of the show for each species if exhibitor's animal is not eligible for the Jr. Livestock Sale.

Junior Livestock General Rules

Introduction

1. Governing Rules and Regulations:

The rules of the New Mexico State Fair govern all competitions in the Junior Division. General Exhibitor Information is considered a part of New Mexico State Fair Junior Division General Rules and Regulations. All rules listed in a specific division apply where entry is made into that division. All exhibitors must read and abide by these rules. Exhibitors not abiding by these rules are subject to the penalties stated in these rules.

2. Interpretation and/or Administration of Rules and Regulations:

The New Mexico State Fair reserves to itself the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and to fairly and impartially settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of or connected with or incident to the fair, and the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine. An exhibitor who violates any of the rules or regulations may forfeit all privileges and premiums and be subject to such penalties as the Fair may order and other such penalties as prescribed by law.

3. Loss, Damage or Injury:

The New Mexico State Fair and the State of New Mexico will not be responsible for loss, damage or injury to exhibits or animals exhibited, or for any article of any kind that may be lost or destroyed, or in any way damaged. Each exhibitor will be responsible for any injury that may be occasioned by any person whomsoever, by an animal owned or exhibited by him.

Exhibitor shall indemnify the New Mexico State Fair or the State of New Mexico against all claims, demands, suits or judgments of any kind or nature, including attorney's fees and costs that may grow out of an injury, damage or loss occasioned by any animal owned or exhibited by him, or arise from any person in charge of any such animal. All animals exhibited in this show will be exhibited entirely at the owner's risk.

The New Mexico State Fair or the State of New Mexico will not be responsible or liable for any injury sustained in any way to exhibitors or spectators.

4. Requirements Regarding Disease:

All animals presented for exhibition at the New Mexico State Fair shall be free from contagious and infectious diseases and shall be subject to examination on arrival at the fairgrounds and to

daily inspection during the fair. Should any animal be found to be infected with any contagious, infectious or communicable diseases, it shall immediately be removed to a place of quarantine. The show pens or stalls in which such diseased animals were kept must immediately be cleaned and disinfected under the supervision of the official veterinarian.

5. IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics:

The International Association of Fairs and Expositions National Code of Show Ring Ethics are incorporated herein and made a part hereof. New Mexico State Fair rules shall supersede.

Exhibitor Eligibility

1. FFA & 4-H Membership Requirements:

All contestants in this department must be bona fide 4-H Club members enrolled in projects they are exhibiting or FFA Members in the State of New Mexico for the current school year, as certified by their County Agent or Agricultural Education Advisor. Contestants are to be members in good standing and have received an overview of the NMSF rules. The Junior Dairy Department is exempt from this rule as exhibitors do not have to be in either 4-H or FFA.

2. Age:

Only New Mexico boys and girls who have not reached their 20th birthday as of the close of fair are eligible, and they must be members of the youth organization as certified by an official of the organization they represent. 4-H members must follow the age requirements set forth by the 4-H organization.

Showmanship:

Novice - Ages 9 to 11, youth exhibitor must have passed his/her 9th birthday or be 8 years old in the third grade but cannot be in 6th grade and not have passed his/her 12th birthday prior to January 1 of the current year.

<u>Junior - Ages 12 to 13</u>, youth exhibitor must have passed his/her 12th birthday or be 11 years old in the 6th grade but cannot be in 8th grade and not have passed his/her 14th birthday prior to January 1 of the current year.

<u>Senior - Ages 14 to 19</u>, youth exhibitor must have passed his/her 14th birthday or be 13 years old in the eighth grade but not have passed his/her 20th birthday prior to September 21st of the current year.

Entry Requirements

1. Entry Eligibility:

All entries must be certified as to eligibility by County Agent or FFA Advisor. No individual entries or entries without certification will be accepted. The sponsoring Agent or Advisor will be held accountable and may be requested to appear before the New Mexico State Fair Commission and/or designated committee to inform the New Mexico State Fair as to the sponsoring Agents' or Advisors' efforts to educate its members.

2. Ownership:

Animals must be owned by the exhibitor submitting the entry. All documents (bills of sale, lease agreements, and certificates of registration) establishing ownership shall be in the name of the exhibitor. No market animals may be owned or exhibited in a partnership, or jointly owned; however, animals may be transferred between immediate family members (i.e., brothers and sisters) at the time of classification. Animals may not be transferred from 4-H Club to FFA or vice versa after the ownership deadline. Animals must be owned by the deadlines listed in the rules of its appropriate division and proof of ownership must be made available if requested by NMSF officials. Exhibitors in violation of ownership requirements will be subject to the penalties outlined in these rules. Any animal that has been sold through a premium sale (fair/expo sale) in any state or county or any representation of said animal through such a sale may not be exhibited at the New Mexico State Fair

3. Care and Custody:

All animals must remain in the continuous possession of the exhibitor and be personally cared for by the exhibitor during the feeding period.

4. Registration:

Animals in breeding classes must be registered in the name of the exhibitor. Registration numbers and also the names and numbers of sire and dams must be listed on the entry for breeding stock requiring registration. Entries sent in without proper information will be returned. Certificates of registration must be available to be checked by superintendent of department.

5. Market Animals and Replacement Dairy Heifers:

Market Beef must be tagged with NMF ear tag and submit hair DNA and entry fees postmarked by May 1 of the current year to be eligible for entry.

Replacement Dairy Heifers, Market Lambs and Market Goats must be tagged with NMSF ear tag and submit hair DNA and entry fees postmarked by June 15 of the current year to be eligible for entry.

Market Barrows and gilts must be tagged with NMF ear tag and DNA sample submitted to Veterinary Diagnostic Services by June 15 of the current year to be eligible for entry. Hair DNA sample and entry fees must be post marked no later than June 15 of the current year.

6. Late Entry Fee:

Late Entries will be accepted until August 10 of the current year with a late fee of \$250.00 per animal.

7. NMSF Ear Tags (required):

Removal of or tampering with a NMSF ear tag will result in dismissal from the show. Should an animal lose their ear tag, you must notify your 4-H Agent or FFA Advisor immediately to obtain a new tag. The Agent/Advisor must then notify the NMSF via email of the new tag number immediately. Animals that arrive at the NMSF without a NMSF ear tag will not be able to show. Dairy Heifers will be the exception. Breeder tags will be taped over or removed.

Show Rules

1. Exhibitor Showing Requirements:

Exhibitors will be required to show their own animals. A substitute exhibitor may be allowed to present an animal for classification or in the show ring during official judging at the sole discretion of the Department Superintendent; 1) if the exhibitor has documented health reasons after arrival at the fair, or 2) if an exhibitor has more than one entry in the Youth Livestock Show showing at the same time. Any substitute exhibitor must be a bona fide member of 4-H or FFA. In no case may a parent, agent or advisor present any animal for judging.

2. Exhibitor Responsibilities (Animal Care & Delivery):

Each exhibitor is responsible for the care, showing and selling of his or her own animals until the superintendent has issued a release. It is the responsibility of the owner to see that sale animals are delivered to buyer or correct packer. If livestock is not properly cared for, labor, feed requirements and other necessary items will be supplied, with all costs thereof charged against such exhibitor. Any sale money won by such exhibitor will be withheld under such circumstances to apply toward any expenses incurred. Exhibitor's failure to provide proper care to his or her animals will be subject to the penalties outlined in these rules.

3. Animal Inspections:

As a condition for participation in the show, every exhibitor must agree to submit any animal entered by exhibitor to inspection by a veterinarian appointed by the management, FDA, USDA/FSIS, New Mexico Department of Agriculture, and/or New Mexico Department of Health and agrees to have such animal submitted to any tests as may be designated and requested by the veterinarian or fair official.

The State Fair specifically reserves the right to have hair, tissue, blood or urine laboratory analysis made on any animal entered for competition. The conclusions reached by the veterinarian, as to whether such animal has been administered or given a substance or drug in violation of the rules or has not been properly withdrawn from approved drugs shall be final, without recourse against the State Fair or any of its officers.

In addition, during the fair, every exhibitor agrees to allow NMSF officials to collect hair follicles. These hair follicles may be used to perform analyses to verify identification of an entry in the show using the DNA sample collected at the time of enrollment. Any and all samples collected are the property of the NMSF and may be compared with samples collected by other fairs in order to confirm entry identification.

4. Winners' Eligibility to Show:

Winners of first and second place in each class will be eligible to show for the Champion and Reserve Champion of the breed they represent.

5. Rules Governing Auction:

An Auction of Junior Livestock will be held; see the Special Rules in Division 38 found in the Livestock Sale PDF on this web site.

6. In Case of Animal Death:

If an exhibitor's animal dies while at the New Mexico State Fair, the exhibitor is responsible for either disposing of the carcass properly or for paying the disposal fee. Please notify a department superintendent or the livestock office immediately. The animal should be moved to a remote location or covered until it can be removed. UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES should an animal be placed in a trash can or dumpster.

7. Barn:

Due to the shortened schedule and lack of barn space, all exhibitors staying past the day of their respective show, may be asked to move to a designated layover area as directed by the superintendent within four (4) hours of completion of each species show in order to cooperate with incoming exhibitors.

Conduct

1. Conduct:

Any act of discourtesy or disobedience to the officials on the part of the exhibitor, parents or sponsors will disqualify exhibitor from the contest, and the owner shall forfeit his entrance and other fees. Any exhibitor, parent or sponsor who shall attempt to interfere with judges in the performance of their duties, or who shall make any false statement in regard to any animal exhibited or shall interfere with clerks' and judges' books shall be excluded from the competition and may be subject to other disciplinary actions.

2. Delinquent Acts:

If an exhibitor is caught having any involvement in any delinquent act, they may be removed from the grounds forfeiting any further competition, awards, premiums, sale slots and/or proceeds. Fees will not be reimbursed and the exhibitor may be barred from future competition at the New Mexico State Fair. Delinquent acts include but are not limited to vandalism, use of alcohol or drugs, and aggressive or violent behavior.

3. Protest:

The decision of Classifiers, Weigh Masters, Judges and Veterinarians shall not be subject to protest or appeal.

Prohibited Acts

The following are Prohibited Acts:

- a) The injection, use, or administration of any drug to the animal that is prohibited by Federal, State, or Local Law or any drug that is used in a manner prohibited by Federal, State or Local Law.
- b) The injection or internal or external administration of any product or material, whether gas, solid, or liquid, to an animal for the purpose of deception, including concealing, enhancing, or transforming the true conformation, configuration, color, breed, condition or age or by making the animal appear more sound than otherwise appear. No stomach pumping allowed.

Drenching will be allowed.

- c) The administration, use or application of any drug or feed additive affecting the central nervous system.
- d) The administration of diuretics for cosmetic purposes, tissue manipulation, removal, surgical attachment or otherwise to change, conceal, enhance, or transform the true conformation or configuration of the animal. Attaching to the hide foreign objects including hair or hair substitutes, cloth or fiber for the purpose of deception.
- e) Any physical or physiological attempt to alter the natural musculature or weight by use of injections or ingested material not conductive to the continued health or marketability of bovine, sheep, swine or goat carcass or for deception.
- f) Violations of the Wholesome Meat Act.
- g) Violations of the New Mexico State Fair ownership requirements or care and custody rules listed in this premium book. This includes the manipulation of documents or providing false statement as to affect ownership of an animal and its eligibility to be exhibited at New Mexico State Fair.
- h) Violations of New Mexico State Fair animal care and fitting regulations as listed in this premium book.

Exhibitor Responsibility:

It is the sole responsibility of the exhibitor to follow all the rules contained herein. Extent of knowledge on the part of the exhibitor with regard to the animal being subject to any prohibited act is not relevant to any issue, and it shall not be a defense that a person or persons unknown subjected the animal to any prohibited act.

Penalties

An exhibitor who violates any of the rules contained herein, or whose animal has been found to be in violation of the rules is subject to:

- a) May permanently bar such animal from competition at the New Mexico State Fair.
- b) May bar the exhibitor from entering and/or participating at the New Mexico State Fair.
- c) May bar the exhibitor, the exhibitor's family, representative or agents or any or all of them from any further participation in the New Mexico State Fair.
- d) May submit name and address of exhibitor and action taken against exhibitor to other cooperating livestock exhibitions, shows and sales, affecting eligibility.
- e) Awards may be withheld. In the event any awards shall have been given by the New Mexico State Fair to an animal in violation of these rules, the exhibitor will, upon demand by the New Mexico State Fair, immediately return all awards given to such animal.

- f) The exhibitor may forfeit all money derived from the New Mexico State Fair Junior Livestock Sale Association (a 501c3 Corporation)
- g) Exhibitor will be liable to the New Mexico State Fair and shall indemnify and hold the New Mexico State Fair harmless from all damages, including but not limited to all expenses and costs for blood, tissue, urine, hide and/or carcass sampling and testing, State Fair management labor and expenses, consultant legal and court costs incurred as a result of violations of New Mexico State Fair rules and regulations. If any substance is found, a 2nd sample will be sent to lab at exhibitor's expense.

Person's Involved in Prohibited Act:

Any person that in any way performs any prohibited act, with or without the owner's permission, may be forever barred from showing at the New Mexico State Fair. In addition, the case will be turned over to an appropriate authority.

Any sponsoring agent, advisor or person associated with the sponsoring agent, advisor, leader, parent or guardians who are found to be involved with the encouragement of prohibited acts may be barred from future participation at the New Mexico State Fair.

Right of Decision Review:

If an exhibitor is subject to any penalty or violation under these rules, the exhibitor has the right to have the decision reviewed by the New Mexico State Fair. Exhibitor must contact the livestock manager to obtain the procedure for review. Please note there are specific time deadlines and notification requirements that are strictly adhered to.

Special Rules

- 1. Junior Livestock Exhibitors must comply with the Junior Livestock Rules and Regulations.
- 2. Animals eligible to sell are a maximum of 30 Market Beef, 30 Market Lambs, 30 Market Hogs, 2 Replacement Dairy Heifers, and 10 Market Meat Goats. The maximum number of items to be sold are 30% of the number of animals exhibited in each species. Selected animals to be sold in proper order as placed by judges. Champion of divisions and 1st place are eligible for the sale. All animals must be sold through the regular sale. A seventh place class finish is the lowest placing that will be eligible for the sale.
- 3. Any exhibitor whose livestock is eligible but wishes to withdraw such livestock from the sale must notify the superintendent in the department within two hours after the Market Beed Show show. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to be available during this time in the event their entry should pull into the sale. The decision of the superintendents at the conclusion of the two-hour period following end of the steer show will be final.

No animal may be substituted or withdrawn after being committed. Failure to appear for the sale after being accepted and included in the sale order shall bar the exhibitor from selling in the sale for the following two years.

4. An exhibitor is eligible to sell only one animal at the Junior Livestock Sale. Exhibitors of Grand Champions and Reserve Grand Champions are required to sell these animals in the Junior Livestock Sale. In the case of an exhibitor having won more than one Grand or Reserve Grand Champion, the Grand Champion must be sold and the youth must decide which species they wish to sell at the sale. Only animals entered in the individual name of the owner are eligible. Exhibitors are required to sell their own animals unless excused by the sale director for documented health reasons. Exhibitors MUST be present at the start of the sale or the animal will be pulled from the sale order and ineligible.

5. Slaughter and Inspection of Sale Animals:

If any tissues of the animals or carcass is found to be subject to any prohibited acts, or carcass is condemned, for any reason the penalties described in the Jr. Livestock General Rules shall apply. The New Mexico State Fair will in no way be liable or responsible for condition of carcass or sale price of animal if the carcass is condemned.

- 6. Market livestock will be sold in the following order: Grand Champion Market Beef, Grand Champion Market Lamb, Grand Champion Market Hog, Grand Champion Replacement Dairy Heifer, Grand Champion Market Goat, Reserve Grand Champion Market Beef, Reserve Grand Champion Market Lamb, Reserve Grand Champion Market Hog, Reserve Grand Champion Replacement Dairy Heifer, and Reserve Grand Champion Market Goat.
- 7. The seller is wholly responsible for delivering such animals and/or removing such animals from the fairgrounds. The State Fair will not be responsible for the sale, delivery or payment, nor for any negotiation between the seller and purchaser of any animal.
- 8. The New Mexico State Fair will not be responsible for collection of monies for sold animals. Exhibitors will not be paid until the buyer of said animal has paid the livestock sale in full.
- 9. Exhibitors are responsible for the care and safe delivery of all sold animals BEFORE and AFTER the sale.
- 10. In the event an eligible animal dies or is declared unfit by the New Mexico State Fair Veterinarian and/ or New Mexico State Fair before the sale, that sales slot will remain open. If the owner is not present to sell his/her animal that sales slot will remain open. Should an animal which has been sold die before it is loaded on the truck, the sale monies will be forfeited by the exhibitor and refunded to the buyer.
- 11. Any junior exhibitor having an animal or animals entered in the sale is prohibited from seeking special privileges from buyers such as asking permission to re-purchase the animal from the buyer or packer to be shown again or to be used for other purposes is considered unethical practice. Such act shall bar the exhibitor from selling in the sale for the following two years.
- 12. Any animal that has been through a premium sale in any state shall not be eligible to sell in the New Mexico State Fair Junior Livestock Sale. Any ownership manipulation that affects the New Mexico State Fair is considered an unethical practice.
- 13. If an exhibitor is subject to any penalty or violation under the Junior Livestock Rules, the exhibitor agrees that the decision of the New Mexico State Fair is final.
- 14. The New Mexico State Fair Junior Livestock Sale will deduct a 9% fee from the sale price and add-ons to cover costs associated with the livestock sale. 7% will go back into the New Mexico Junior Livestock Foundation to support youth in agriculture and 2% will go to the New Mexico State Fair Junior Livestock Sale expenses.

- 15. All rules and regulations are to be enforced by the New Mexico State Fair. All animals are assigned by the New Mexico State Fair and determined by the results of the individual classes and superintendents for each division.
- 16. Exhibitors who sell an animal will be required to provide a completed W-9 form, the Notice of Intent to sell, and three (3) Thank You cards to the livestock office before leaving the sale meeting on Thursday. Monies for sale items will not be distributed without these forms. An additional ten (10) percent may be deducted from sale proceeds for failure to provide these required documents to the New Mexico State Fair by December 15th of the current year.
- 17. The New Mexico State Fair Junior Livestock Sale anticipates payment by December 15th of the current year.
- 18. All exhibitors accepted for the sale will be required to put their sale animal on display in designated pens at the discretion of the sale.
- 19. Exhibitors will only be allowed to sell one animal, unless they are named Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion in more than one species.

Special Rules

Please Read Carefully

- 1. All rules governing livestock in the General Rules and Regulations apply to this department.
- 2. Entry fees- Please see individual breed rules.
- 3. No animal can be entered or exhibited unless the same has been recorded in the recognized Book of Record kept for its respective breed, and exhibitors must produce the certificate of registry at the request of the Superintendent in charge anytime during the Fair. Name and registry number of sire and dam must be given for animals under six months. If cattle are registered in more than one association, all certificates must be available for inspection by the Superintendent.
- 4. * All animals must be entered in the name of the owner and must have been owned by him/her not less than sixty days prior to the opening day of the Fair.
 - *All Beef Cattle entering the New Mexico State Fairgrounds must have a "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection".
 - *All Beef Cattle breeds requiring "proof of pregnancy" must have a certificate of Veterinary Inspection stating the cow is bred or written proof of pregnancy by a recognized pregnancy testing firm within 30 days of show. Exhibitors may not pregnancy test their own cattle as verification.
- 5. Individual animals shown in all group and herd classes must have been entered and shown in one of the classes for single animals. Group classes will pay an entry fee.

- 6. All bulls must be shown with nose lead.
- 7. Any animal not having a legible tattoo or brand as required by their respective breed associations will be barred from showing.
- 8. All exhibitors must wear exhibitor harness.
- 9. All open division cattle must remain in assigned stall until 6:30 pm. Early tie out will result in forfeiture of premiums. Note: all pairs must be tied no pens allowed. Exception: Texas Longhorns.
- 10. Tie-outs will be taken on a first come, first served basis. Tie-outs must be claimed by tying a neck-rope at the tie-out for each animal. Signs may be used with neck-ropes, but a sign without neck-ropes is not considered reserving a spot.
- 11. Open Beef breeds that have less than 25 head showing in a given year may be eliminated from the show schedule the following year.
- 12. Open Beef breed shows that have less than 10 entries may be cancelled.

Herdsman Awards

The New Mexico State Fair offers Herdsman Awards to show appreciation to the herdsman for their cooperation in making the best possible presentation of their exhibits to the public and for their help in keeping our show buildings attractive. Awards will be presented to: AOB, Angus, Brangus, Hereford, Texas Longhorn, Aberdeen and Mini Hereford.

Ownership:

Breeding Heifers must be owned by May 1st of the current year and managed under supervision of County Agent or Agricultural Education Advisor. Animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor and certificate of registration must be checked with Superintendents of department at checkin. If the animal is not registered a Bill of Sale or Affidavit stating the heifer was farm raised must be presented. Heifers which are not registered must be tagged with a NMLB ear tag by June 15th of the current year. Breeder names will not be allowed to be seen, the breeder tags must be taped over or removed.

Entries:

The entry deadline is midnight August 1st. Entries will only be accepted on-line through the New Mexico State Fair website. The entry fee is \$20.00 per heifer. The entry fee for the Showmanship Class is \$5.00. Late Entry Fee: Late Entries will be accepted until August 10th of the current year with a late fee of \$250.00 per animal. ALL ENTRIES WILL BE ENTERED & PAID ONLINE

Neck Ropes:

For the safety of the animal, exhibitor, and general public, neck ropes for steers and heifers are mandatory while in stalls.

Trimming Chutes and Fans:

No trimming chutes are to be set up before 9:00 a.m. Monday, unless specifically permitted to do so by the Superintendents. Chutes will be permitted as space permits and only in designated areas of the Southwest Dairy Farmer's Dairy Barn at the discretion of the Superintendents. No more than one

chute per exhibitor or two per family will be allowed. Only one fan per heifer will be allowed and ground based fans (butt fans) will not be permitted.

Classification:

Jr. Breeding Heifers will be classified immediately following Steer classification, in the Beef Barn. Any animal not having a legible tattoo is ineligible to compete in the breed classes but can be shown in A.O.B. (All Other Breeds).

Fitting Regulations are as follows:

Heifers may only be washed, blown and combed prior to judging and classification. Absolutely NO artificial coloring, glues, or any adhesives will be allowed, no exceptions, while on the NMSF, Expo NM premises. Heifers may be subject to a white towel/glove test at any time. Violators of this rule may be disqualified from the show.

Releases:

Superintendents will release animals starting two hours after the show on Thursday, September 16, 2021. Once an exhibitor obtains a written release, they may leave the grounds at any time.

2. Ownership:

Market beef must be owned by May 1 of the current year and managed under supervision of County Agent or Agricultural Education Advisor. Market beef animals may be purebred or grade. Market beef must be tagged with NMSF ear tag and by June 15 of the current year to be eligible for entry. Market beefs must have been continuously owned in the name of the exhibitor and personally cared for and may be transferred from 4-H Club to FFA or vice versa or within family during the feeding period. Bill of Sale must be available to be checked by the Superintendent if requested. Breeder names will not be allowed to be seen, the breeder tags must be taped over or removed.

3. Entries:

The entry deadline is midnight August 1 of the current year. Entries will only be accepted online through the New Mexico State Fair website. The entry fee is \$20 per market beef. The entry fee for the Showmanship Class is \$5.00. Late Entry Fee: Late Entries will be accepted until August 10 of the current year with a late fee of \$250 per animal. ALL ENTRIES WILL BE ENTERED & PAID ONLINE

4. Arrival:

Jr. Market Beef entries must be on grounds by 9:00 am Monday September 13th for classification.

5. Neck Ropes:

For the safety of the animal, exhibitor, and general public, neck ropes for Market Beef are mandatory while in stalls.

6. Trimming Chutes, Fans & Outside Scales:

Chutes will be permitted as space permits and only in designated areas of the Southwest Dairy Farmer's Dairy Barn at the discretion of the Superintendents. No more than one chute per exhibitor or two per family will be allowed. Only one fan per animal will be allowed and it must be suspended. NO ground based fans (butt fans), including porta coolers, will not be permitted. There will be scales available for weighing. Hours that the scales will be open will be at the discretion of the superintendents.

7. Lounging Areas:

Lounging area set up only if space permits and at the discretion of the superintendents. Aisles must be kept clear for access to fair visitors. All tack boxes, chairs, tools, etc. must be kept out of the walkways.

Absolutely no Junior Market beef will be permitted to tie outside the Beef Barn or Southwest Dairy Farmer's Dairy Barn. All Junior Beef entries may feed and/or exercise outside the Southwest Dairy Farmer's Dairy Barn but must return to their designated bedding area at all other times. NO Junior Beef entries are permitted to spend the night anywhere other than their designated bedding area.

8. Classification:

Market beef will be classified on Monday, September 13th at 9:00am by breed in order of breed in the rules. Market beef entering classification as a cross or market heifer will remain as such, and not be reclassified. Declaration cards obtained from the superintendents must be filled out by all Junior Market beef exhibitors and turned in at classification with a weight declared by exhibitor. This will become the official weight for that animal. At the time of classification only the exhibitor, the classifier, state fair personnel, and NMLB personnel (brand inspectors) will be allowed in the ring. No one else is allowed unless previous permission is given. The ring is off limits to spectators, breeders and parents. Classification is based on visible characteristics of the steer. The judgment of the breed classifier(s) is final and not subject to protest.

9. Weight:

Minimum weight is 1,000 lbs. with no maximum show weight. Classes will be determined by breeds and declared weights. On show day Market beef will be weighed at a holding area prior to entering the show ring. Market beef must weigh within 5% above or below the declared weight or will be disqualified from the show. NO FEEDING OR WATERING will be allowed in the holding area.

10. Request For Re-Weigh:

A second weight will be allowed at the request of the exhibitor. The request must be made to the Weigh Master official, before animal leaves the scale. The second weighing will be the official weight of record.

11. Fitting Regulations are as follows:

Market Beef may only be washed, blown and combed prior to judging and classification. Absolutely NO artificial coloring, glues or adhesives will be allowed, no exceptions, while on the NMSF, Expo NM premises. Market Beef may be subject to a white towel/glove test at any time. Market Beef are allowed to be drenched, no stomach pumps.

Official NMSF ear tags are only tags permitted, absolutely no breeder names will be visible while entering the show ring.

The minimum number of Market beef required to establish a class will be determined by multiplying 1/30 times the total number of Market

beef in the show and rounding off to the nearest whole number. All 30 (+ or -) sale positions will be determined by the percentage method. There will be no exceptions. This means that in some cases involving small classes, a Reserve Breed Champion will not be eligible to sell in the Jr. Livestock Sale. In those breed classes where an odd number of sale positions result, the Breed Champion will pull the next highest placing market beef in the class up to fill the odd sale slot. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion are required to sell - Breed Champions are not.

12. United States Department of Agriculture Wholesome Meat Act

The United States Department of Agriculture Wholesome Meat Act applies to the sale of market livestock sold during the New Mexico State Fair as follows:

- a. Animals must be in good health and carcasses free of drug or chemical residues.
- b. Antibiotics and sulfonamides have required withdrawal periods.
- c. Drug label directions for use and withdrawal periods must be followed.
- d. If drug or other chemical residues are found in tissue of carcasses, the entire carcass may be condemned.

A licensed veterinarian should be consulted, and drug label directions read, before administering any antibiotics or sulfonamides.

13. YQCA Certification

Any exhibitor entering a Junior Market Show at the New Mexico State Fair is required to take the YQCA test and receive their YQCA Certificate of Completion.

The YQCA otherwise known as the YOUTH FOR QUALITY CARE OF ANIMALS is multi species assurance program. Visit: http://yqca.org/ to obtain your certification if you have not already done so.

This will replace Market Certification Forms.

14. Releases:

Superintendents will release animals not making the sale beginning two (2) hours after the show on Wednesday, September 15th, 2021. Once an exhibitor obtains a written release, they may leave the grounds at any time. Once an animal(s) has left the grounds, it WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO RETURN.

1. American Angus Association Premium Assistance

The American Angus Association, 3201 Frederick Avenue, St. Joseph, Missouri 64506, will participate in premiums offered for open class Angus breeding cattle classes according to the premium assistance provided by the American Angus Association for participation in this show is in addition to the premiums offered by the show itself.

The premium assistance should not be used to offset show expense and shall be included in the premium payments distributed by the show to the exhibitors.

A minimum of 50 head must be shown in the open class division to receive American Angus

Association premium participation.

Premiums from the Association are paid only to registered Angus cattle and only if the registration number is a part of the show report provided to the Association. Therefore, all cattle should be registered at the time of entry to make certain they receive the association's portion of premiums. The Association does not pay on championship or any group classes (i.e. get-of-sire, junior get-of-sire or breeder six-head).

2. Registration Requirements

Exhibitors must have the original registration certificate on each animal available for inspection at the show. Any animal, upon check-in, which does not have a legible permanent identification mark (ear tattoo marks, freeze-branded marks or hot-branded marks) corresponding to the permanent identification mark on the registration certificate, is ineligible to show. Once disqualified due to an incorrect or illegible tattoo, animals cannot be re- tattooed and rechecked at the show.

3. Female With Calf

Any female with calf at side, the calf must be the cow's most recent natural calf, must be registered by show date, have the original registration certificate at check-in and be no more than 280 days of age on the day of the show.

4. Lead

Only one person at a time shall lead animals into the show ring.

5. Association Rules

Exhibitors who participate in shows that accept premium monies contributed by the American Angus Association are subject to the Association Rules as found in the Breeders Reference Guide of the Association. These rules are found in Part 2; Association Rules. The rules relating directly with the exhibition of Angus cattle are Part 2: Association Rules; Rule 800 Series; including Rule 800-811. These rules can be found at www.angus.org.

6. Prohibited Acts

Any product administered internally or used externally to alter the conformation and/or appearance of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes the covering of white skin, false tail heads (or use of any false hair), use of graphite, powders, hemp, or other similar substances externally and steroids, growth stimulants or artificial filling internally. Any animal found to be in violation will be barred from showing. The exhibition of cattle displaying false hair will not be allowed, with the exception of false tail switches.

7. Coloring Agents

Effective July 1, 2004, at any show for which the American Angus Association appropriates the funds toward the payment of premiums, no exhibitors, individual's assisting exhibitors or member owners at such show shall be allowed to use any coloring agents, on any animal exhibited. The Association may adopt and implement various tests designed to monitor this prohibition, including but not limited to a "white towel" or "white glove" test. No aerosol cans or other pressurized containers will be allowed in designated make up areas.

8. DNA / Blood Marker Tests

All animals exhibited are subject to DNA marker or blood type test to verify accuracy of parentage as covered under the Association Rules and for other testing as required by the individual show.

9. Rule Enforcement

Authorized representatives of the Association have the authority to enforce the rules set forth herein as well as in the Association Rules, including the barring of a registered animal from a livestock show at which it is to be shown, if there are reasonable grounds to believe a violation has occurred.

All in-state junior livestock (cattle, sheep, goats and swine) showing at New Mexico fairs must have an NMLB APPROVED 840 tag and a Form 1 inspection issued by the NMLB before entering any county or state fair. All out of state livestock must comply with New Mexico import requirements. The Form 1 inspection will be issued at the time the NMLB APPROVED tag is placed in the animal. The application of the tag will be done by the extension agent, FFA advisor or fair personnel. All animals must be tagged and inspected no later than June 15 of the current year. The purpose of these requirements is to keep on file a record of animals that are commingled at fairs and shows.

CATTLE

1. Proof of ownership (NMLB "Form 1" inspection certificate) must accompany the animal when traveling, whether in or out of the district; this is the assurance that all requirements have been met.

2. Brands:

a. All in state show cattle must be branded with a New Mexico registered brand; if not that of the brand's registered owner, a bill of sale and a letter of permission from the brand's owner is required.

- b. Fresh brands are not allowed the brand must be "peeled and healed".
- c. A freeze brand does not qualify as a New Mexico registered brand.
- d. Cattle may be shown with the originating herd's New Mexico registered brand with a bill of sale and a letter of permission from that brand owner.
- e. Certificates of Brand Exemption are allowed only on registered breeding cattle under that ownership. Steers do not qualify for a Certificate of Brand Exemption.
- 3. All breeding bulls require a negative trichomoniasis test.
- 4. All dairy cattle over 4 months of age are required to have a negative TB test. Test is good for 120 days prior to showing.
- 5. Breeding show heifers must be identified by breed registry number; tattoo or tag for purposes of traceability.
- 6. Accredited TB-Free Herd status will be recognized.
- 7. Proof of ownership (e.g., Bill of Sale) will be required. Animals shown in this department must have been continuously owned and personally cared for by the exhibitor since June 15 of the current year or be participating in a 4-H or FFA lease program. Replacement Dairy Heifers must be tagged with NMSF ear tag and mailed the DNA envelope(s) by June 15 of the current year to be eligible for entry.
- 8. The entry deadline is midnight August 1 of the current year. Entries will only be accepted on-line through the New Mexico State Fair web-site. The entry fee is \$20 per heifer. The entry fee for the showmanship class is \$5.00. **ALL ENTRIES WILL BE ENTERED & PAID ONLINE**
 - \$5. Late Entry Fee: Late Entries will be accepted until August 10 of the current year with a late fee of \$250 per animal.
- 9. Jr. Replacement Dairy Heifer entries must arrive first Tuesday of fair. Move in hours are 8:00 am until 5:00 pm.
- 10. Heifers will be toothed and pregnancy checked beginning at 5:00 pm on Tuesday.
- 11. Replacement dairy heifers will be classified by age.
- 12. Tooth Rule: Any heifer having two sets of permanent incisors that have broken through the skin will not be eligible to show. Any heifer having one set of permanent incisors that have broken through the skin will automatically be placed in Class 7.
- 13. Any heifer obviously in the wrong class will be moved to the appropriate class or be excused from the show at the superintendent's discretion.
- 14. Verification of Date of Birth forms must be signed by the breeder, and presented to the division superintendent at the time of pregnancy testing.

- 15. Animals in classes 6 and 7 must be bred to be eligible to show.
- 16. Registration is not required, but animals must show predominant breed characteristics. Sire and dam should be given.
- 17. In the event that not enough heifers are shown, breeds may be combined at the discretion of superintendent.
- 18. Fitting Regulations are as follows: Absolutely NO artificial coloring, glues or adhesives will be allowed, no exceptions, while on the NMSF, Expo NM premises. Violators of this rule may be disqualified from the show.

19. United States Department of Agriculture Wholesome Meat Act

The United States Department of Agriculture Wholesome Meat Act applies to the sale of market livestock sold during the New Mexico State Fair as follows:

- a. Animals must be in good health and carcasses free of drug or chemical residues.
- b. Antibiotics and sulfonamides have required withdrawal periods.
- c. Drug label directions for use and withdrawal periods must be followed.
- d. If drug or other chemical residues are found in tissue of carcasses, the entire carcass may be condemned.

A licensed veterinarian should be consulted, and drug label directions read, before administering any antibiotics or sulfonamides.

15. YQCA Certification

Any exhibitor entering a Junior Market Show at the New Mexico State Fair is required to take the YQCA test and receive their YQCA Certificate of Completion.

The YQCA otherwise known as the YOUTH FOR QUALITY CARE OF ANIMALS is multi species assurance program. Visit: http://yqca.org/ to obtain your certification if you have not already done so.

20. Superintendents will release animals not making the sale two (2) hours after the show. Once an exhibitor obtains a written release, they may leave the grounds at any time. Release forms for sale animals will be written following the conclusion of the sale. **No releases will be written until stalls are clean.** Once an animal(s) has left the grounds, it WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO RETURN.

- 1. Exhibitors may wear white shirts and blue denim jeans or dairy colors while in the show ring.
- 2. No animal can be entered or exhibited unless the same has been recorded in the recognized book of records for its respective breed, and exhibitors must produce the certificate of registry at the request of the superintendent in charge anytime during the fair. Name and registry number of sire and dam must be given for animal under six months.

- 3. All animals must be entered in the name of the owner and must have been owned by him not less than 30 days prior to the opening day of the fair.
- 4. In Produce of Dam Class, each exhibitor is limited to one group entry produced by the same dam. Entries need not all be owned by one exhibitor.
- 5. A bull over one year old without a ring in his nose may be excluded from the show ring at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- Individual animals shown in all groups and herd classes must have been entered and shown in one of the classes for single animals. In breeder's herd and best three female classes, each exhibitor is limited to one entry consistent with premier breeder and premier exhibitor designations by the exhibitor.
- 7. In classes for cows in milk, it is recommended that the cow be milked out after the judge has observed the udders distended.
- 8. Senior yearling heifers that have freshened may show in the 2 year old class.
- 9. Displays must remain in place until the end of the dairy cattle show on Sunday.
- 10. Bedding will not be provided by the New Mexico State Fair. Straw will be available and may be purchased at the feed store located on the fairgrounds.
- 11. Only 1-2 people may stay with the animals overnight. If additional accommodations are needed, the Youth Hall Dorms may be available.

Premier Exhibitor Award

The exhibitor winning the most points on, but not to exceed, six animals owned and exhibited by himself in the open single classes, shall be designated the premier exhibitor. The scale of points will be the same as that for determining premier breeder (one per breed).

- 2. Cattle can be double registered but must present their registration to the TLBAA.
- 3. The owner of the cattle entered in a qualifying show must be a member in good standing of the TLBAA.
- 4. All cattle must be 120 days of age to exhibit at any show.
- 5. The section on grooming of animals will be strictly adhered to.
- 6. Any female over 30 months of age must have either a nursing Texas Longhorn calf at side or the results of a pregnancy test listed on the health certificate. ***This applies to any female born before April of the previous year.***
- 7. Females will be shown in one of two divisions: free or haltered. Produce of Dam and Get of Sire classes will be shown at halter. NURSING calves (205 days or less) may be shown with its dam at the owner's discretion. These calves must be currently nursing on a daily basis. Calves that have bee weaned at home are not eligible to be show at side. Calves shown with dams must be eligible for registration in the TLBAA Texas Longhorn registry (no crossbred calves).

 - Proof of ownership (NMLB "form 1" inspection certificate) must accompany the animal when traveling, whether in or out of district; this is the assurance that all requirements are met.
 - A NMLB APPROVED fair ear tag provided by the NMLB, a N.M. registered tattoo and a Form 1 inspection issued by the NMLB.
 - Sexually intact sheep and goats must have an official USDA Scrapie tag applied to the ear and/or breed registration tattoo.
 - This rule applies to all species and breeds entered in junior shows.
- 2. Any animal shown in this department must continuously have been owned and personally cared for by the exhibitor since June 15 of the current year. Market Lambs must be tagged with NMLB ear tag, (no breeder names will be visible) and send in DNA and entry fees by June 15 of the current year to be eligible for entry. Breeder names will not be allowed to be seen, the breeder tags must be taped over or removed.
- 3. Any animal that has been sold through a premium sale (fair/expo sale) in any state or county may

not be exhibited at the New Mexico State Fair.

- 4. Only wethers and ewe lambs may be exhibited in Market Lamb Classes. Zia Market lambs may be purebred or grade. Only lambs (animals under one year of age) are eligible to show in the junior market classes.
- 5. At classification, market lambs head and legs must be washed, show milk teeth and must be slick shorn with a uniform fleece no longer than 1/4" upon arrival at show ring.
- 6. The entry deadline is midnight August 1 of the current year. Entries will only be accepted on-line through the New Mexico State Fair website. The entry fee is \$15 per lamb. The entry fee for the Showmanship Class is \$5. There is no limit on the number of lambs each exhibitor may enter. Late Entry Fee: Late Entries will be accepted until August 10 of the current year with a late fee of \$250 per animal. ALL ENTRIES WILL BE ENTERED & PAID ONLINE
- 7. Health Requirements & Inspection Procedure: All Junior Market Lambs will be checked by the New Mexico State Fair Vet at classification.
 - All lambs will be individually inspected at classification.
 - The fair and show management will provide trained personnel with capability of sampling skin lesions and conducting a microscopic examination to determine the presence of ringworm at classification.
 - Sheep with active ringworm lesions will be denied entrance to the show.
 - Lambs must also be free of scabies, sore mouth and foot rot and other contagious diseases or will not be allowed to show.
 - No active lesions of trichophyton (Club Lamb Fungus).

Attention Sheep and Goat Exhibitors-Federal Sheep and Goat ID Requirements for Scrapie:

Sheep and goats that are sexually intact and used for breeding, show and/or exhibition are required to have official individual animal and premises identification prior to sale or movement. For further information, contact Dr. Paul Sciglibaglio, USDA, Albuquerque Office, (505) 761-3160.

- 8. Exhibitor will declare own lamb's show weight. Classification will be conducted at 6:00 pm on Sunday, September 12th of 2021. Market Lambs will be classified, provide the declaration of weight, brand inspected and inspected by the veterinarian. Weight declaration forms with breed designation will be given to exhibitors as this time. At judging the judge will pick the top lambs. These lambs will be re- weighed. Weights must correspond to declared weight within 5 pounds to the top side (example: declared weight 100 pounds lamb cannot weigh over 105 pounds, but can weigh any amount under 105 pounds). The lambs will then be placed. Any lamb not meeting the weight tolerance will be disqualified. NOTE: present weight breaks are listed under breeds' classes.
- 9. Absolutely NO dressing (such as oil, paint, dye, powder, etc.) other than water may be used on lambs. Any lamb with dressing other than water will immediately be removed from the ring and will not be allowed to compete.

Violators of this rule can be disqualified from the show by the judge and/or the superintendent.

- 10. Box fans will be allowed in sheep barn only with the approval of the superintendent. All electrical cords must be underwriters approved. Metal fans cannot be attached to pens.
- 11. Pen bedding is allowed in the form of shavings or straw. No grass.
- 12. Sale lambs: decoration of market lambs is prohibited; lambs must be presented for sale in their natural state (i.e. No glitter, oil, paint, balloons, etc. allowed).

All 30 (+ or -) sale positions will be determined by the percentage method. The maximum number of items to be sold are 30% of the number of lamb exhibitors. There will be no exceptions. This means that in some cases involving small classes, a Reserve Breed Champion will not be eligible to sell in the Jr. Livestock Sale. In those breed classes where an odd number of sale positions result, the Breed Champion will pull the next highest placing lamb in his class up to fill the odd sale slot. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion are required to sell - Breed Champions are not. See Junior Livestock Sale Rule, Division 38 and Individual Breeds/Divisions for number of animals to sell per class.

13. United States Department of Agriculture Wholesome Meat Act:

The United States Department of Agriculture Wholesome Meat Act applies to the sale of market livestock sold during the New Mexico State Fair as follows:

- a. Animals must be in good health and carcasses free of drug or chemical residues.
- b. Antibiotics and sulfonamides have required withdrawal periods.
- c. Drug label directions for use and withdrawal periods must be followed.
- d. If drug or other chemical residues are found in tissue of carcasses, the entire carcass may be condemned.

A licensed veterinarian should be consulted, and drug label directions read, before administering any antibiotics or sulfonamides.

16. YQCA Certification

Any exhibitor entering a Junior Market Show at the New Mexico State Fair is required to take the YQCA test and receive their YQCA Certificate of Completion.

The YQCA otherwise known as the YOUTH FOR QUALITY CARE OF ANIMALS is multi species assurance program. Visit: http://yqca.org/ to obtain your certification if you have not already done so.

14. Superintendents will release animals not making the sale two (2) hours after the show. Once an exhibitor obtains a written release, they may leave the grounds at any time. Once an animal(s) has left the grounds, it WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO RETURN.

- 1. New Mexico Brand Requirements: SHEEP AND GOATS
 - Proof of ownership (NMLB "form 1" inspection certificate) must accompany the animal when traveling, whether in or out of district; this is the assurance that all requirements are met.
 - A NMLB APPROVED fair ear tag provided by the NMLB, a N.M. registered tattoo and a Form 1 inspection issued by the NMLB.
 - Sexually intact sheep and goats must have an official USDA Scrapie tag applied to the ear and/or breed registration tattoo.
 - This rule applies to all species and breeds entered in junior shows.
- 2. Any animal shown in this department must continuously have been owned and personally cared for by the exhibitor since June 15 of the current year. Market Goats must be tagged with NMSF ear tag and submit a hair sample that is postmarked by June 15 of the current year to be eligible for entry. Breeder names will not be allowed to be seen, the breeder tags must be taped over or removed.
- 3. Any animal that has been sold through a premium sale (fair/expo sale) in any state or county **may not** be exhibited at the New Mexico State Fair.

- 4. Only wethers and doe kids will be exhibited in market goat classes. All goats will be required to have milk teeth in normal positions and no permanent teeth showing at time of arrival. Any goat having lost one or both milk teeth will be disqualified.
- 5. The entry deadline is midnight August 1 of the current year. Entries will only be accepted on-line through the New Mexico State Fair website. The Entry fee is \$15.00 per goat. The entry fee for the showmanship class is \$5.00. Late Entry Fee: Late entries will be accepted until august 10 of current year with a late fee of \$250 per animal. ALL ENTRIES WILL BE ENTERED & PAID ONLINE

6. Health Requirements & Inspection Procedure:

All junior market goats will be checked by the New Mexico State Fair Vet or a New Mexico State Fair Livestock Management Official

- a. All market goats must be uniformly shorn 3/8 inches or less above the knee and hocks upon arrival at show ring for judging.
- b. All market goats will be individually inspected at classification. Any market goats entering the barns without being ear tagged will be barred from the show and sent home.
- c. The fair and show management will provide trained personnel with capability of sampling skin lesions and conducting a microscopic examination to determine the presence of ringworm.
- d. Goats with active ringworm lesions will be denied entrance to the fairgrounds. However, goats hauled on same trailer will be allowed to show.
- e. Goats must be free of external parasites, scabies, sore mouth, foot rot and other contagious diseases or will not be allowed to show.
- 7. Market goats will be classified, provide the declaration of weight, brand inspected and inspected by the veterinarian. Exhibitor will declare own show weights. Classification cards will be available through the superintendent. Weight Declaration forms must be returned by (noon) 12:00 pm on Saturday, September 11, 2021 to the Jr. Market Goat Superintendents. Declared weights for goats must be in a range from 55 pounds to 135 pounds. At judging the judge will pick the top market goats. These will be reweighed. Weights must correspond to declared weight within 5 lbs. plus or minus. The market goats will then be placed. Any meat goat not meeting the weight tolerance will be disqualified. (Example: declared weight is 100 lbs. goat cannot weigh over 105 lbs.).
- 8. Absolutely NO dressing (such as oil, paint, powder, adhesive, etc.) other than water may be used on junior market goats. Any goat with dressing other than water will be immediately removed from the ring and will not be allowed to compete for premiums.
- 9. Violators of this rule may be disqualified from the show by the superintendent or livestock manager.
- 10. All market goats will be required to have horns tipped, NO SHARP POINTS ALLOWED UPON ARRIVAL. See Jr. Livestock Sale Rules, Division 38.

11. A total of ten (10) market goats will sell. 1st and 2nd place animals from each class will show for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will sell. Champion and Reserve Champions of their Division will be eligible to sell. A 3rd, 4th, and 5th overall will be placed after the selection of the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion are chosen.

See Jr. General Livestock Rules

Ownership:

All hogs to be farrowed on or after January 1 of the current year. Any animals shown in this department must have been continuously owned and personally cared for by the exhibitor since June 15 of the current year and may be transferred from 4-H or FFA or vice versa, or within family during the feeding period. All bill of sales must be dated on or prior to June 15 of the current year. Breeder names will not be allowed to be seen, the breeder tags must be taped over or removed.

**Market Hogs must be tagged with NMSF ear tag and Hair DNA sample postmarked to NM Veterinary Diagnostic Services by June 15 of the current year to be eligible for entry.

Entries:

The entry deadline is midnight August 1 of the current year. Entries will only be accepted online through the New Mexico State Fair website. The entry fee is \$15 per hog. The entry fee for the Showmanship Class is \$5. There is no limit on the number of hogs each exhibitor may enter; however, exhibitors are limited to bringing a maximum of six (6) hogs. All pens will contain at least 2 hogs. ALL ENTRIES WILL BE ENTERED & PAID ONLINE

Late Entry Fee:

Late Entries will be accepted until August 10 of the current year with a late fee of \$250 per animal. Gilts will show with barrows in the Jr. Market Hog Show.

Arrival:

Jr. Market Hog entries must be on grounds by 5 pm Saturday, September 11th, 2021 for declaration card submission. Check in with the office will be between the hours of noon to 5p.m. only.

Classification:

Market hogs will be classified Monday September 13th, 2021 at 8:00 am during the hog show. Exhibitors will need to provide their declaration card to the superintendent no later than 5:00 pm on Saturday, September 12, 2020. Late declaration cards will not be accepted. The decision of the classifier shall not be subject to protest or appeal.

Show Weight:

Exhibitors will declare their own show weight rather than traditional weigh-in process. Weight will be declared by the exhibitor at time of turning in your declaration card to the Jr. Swine superintendent no later than 5:00 pm Saturday, September 11, 2021. At judging, the judge will identify the top hogs. These hogs will then be weighed. Weights must correspond to the declared weight within 10 pounds plus or minus. Any not meeting the weight tolerances will be disqualified. Watering of pigs after pig is officially weighed and before the class is judged is prohibited and will be subject to disciplinary action. The hogs will then be placed. Declared weights for hogs must be in a range from 210 pounds to 280 pounds. Entries will be divided into equal sized classes based on declared weights. Any discrepancy will be resolved at superintendent's discretion.

Market Hog Fitting:

No dressing (such as oil, paint, powder, etc.) other than water may be used on hogs. Any hog with dressing other than water will immediately be removed from the ring. Classifier will check for dressing, if found the animal and exhibitor will be disqualified. The classifier has the final say.

Box Fans:

Will be allowed in the swine barns only with the approval of the superintendent. Fans will not be allowed in the aisles or attached to the fence. All electrical cords must be underwriters approved.

Shavings will not be furnished by the New Mexico State Fair, but may be purchased at the feed store located on the fairgrounds.

Water:

There are no automatic waterer's in the barns.

Sale:

See Junior Livestock Sale Rules, Division 38.

- a. Sale Hogs: decoration of market hogs is prohibited; hogs must be presented for sale in their natural state (i.e. No glitter, oil, paint, balloons, etc. allowed).
- b. All 30 (+ or -) sale positions will be determined by the percentage method. The maximum number of items to be sold are 30% of the number of hog exhibitors. There will be no exceptions. This means that in some cases involving small classes, a Reserve Breed Champion will not be eligible to sell in the Jr. Livestock Sale. In those breed classes where an odd number of sale positions result, the Breed Champion will pull the next highest placing hog in his class up to fill the odd sale slot. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion are required to sell Breed Champions are not.

United States Department of Agriculture Wholesome Meat Act

The United States Department of Agriculture Wholesome Meat Act applies to the sale of market livestock sold during the New Mexico State Fair as follows:

- a. Animals must be in good health and carcasses free of drug or chemical residues.
- b. Antibiotics and sulfonamides have required withdrawal periods.
- c. Drug label directions for use and withdrawal periods must be followed
- d. If drug or other chemical residues are found in tissue of carcasses, the entire carcass may be condemned. A licensed veterinarian should be consulted and drug label directions read, before administering any antibiotics or sulfonamides.

Medications & Substances:

Any substances from syringes and needles must be administered by a vet ONLY! Any exhibitor that does not follow this may be disqualified and asked to leave the grounds.

YQCA Certification

Any exhibitor entering a Junior Market Show at the New Mexico State Fair is required to take the YQCA test and receive their YQCA Certificate of Completion.

The YQCA otherwise known as the YOUTH FOR QUALITY CARE OF ANIMALS is multi species assurance program. Visit: http://yqca.org/ to obtain your certification if you have not already done so.

This will replace Market Certification Forms.

Releases:

Superintendents will release animals two (2) hours after the show. Once an exhibitor obtains a written release, they may leave the grounds at any time. Once an animal(s) has left the grounds, it WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO RETURN.

Dark OPB

Includes Berks, Spots, Poland and other dark PB breeds.

Berkshire

- Black and white with erect ears exhibiting Berkshire character.
- A Berkshire must have white on face and tail (unless tail is docked). Three of the four legs must be white.
- A Berkshire must NOT have a solid white or a solid black face from the ears forward.
- A Berkshire must NOT have a solid black nose (rim of nose).
- White is allowed on the ears, but neither ear can be entirely white.
- An occasional splash of white may appear on the body.

Spotted Swine

- Must be black and white.
- Must possess Spotted breed character.
- Ears cannot be erect.
- Any red tinted or brown spots are ineligible.
- No solid black head from ears forward. No distinct white belt pattern (hair or skin) encircling and extending down and onto each shoulder.
- Any signs of weighted ear tags or evidence of past existence such ear tags are determined to be not permissible and are grounds for disqualification.

Poland China

- Must possess Poland China breed character.
- Must be black with a white face and switch (unless tail is docked). Three of the four legs must be white. May have an occasional splash of white on the body.
- Must have ears down.
- Must not have evidence of belt formation.
- Cannot have any red or sandy hair and/or pigment.
- Hogs that have weighted ear tags or evidence of tampering of ears with possible ear tags are ineligible.

Duroc

- Must be red in color and possess Duroc breed character. (ears must be down and medium size)
- Must NOT have any white hair located on the animal.
- Must NOT have any black hair.
- Must NOT have more than three black spots on the skin and none of these spots can be larger than two inches in diameter.
- Must NOT have any shading or indication of a belt.

Hampshire

- Must be black in color with a white belt starting on a front leg. The belt may partially or totally
 encircle the body.
- Must possess Hampshire Breed character. (ears must be erect and not rounded)
- Must NOT have any white hair or indications of streaking on the forehead.
- Must NOT have any red hair.

Light OPB

• Light OPB will include Chesters, Landrace, and Herefords.

Chester White

- Must possess Chester White breed character.
- Must be solid white in color, no color on the skin larger than a silver dollar, no colored hair.
- Ears must be down and medium size.
- Any signs of weighted ear tags or evidence of past existence of such ear tags are determined to be not permissible and are grounds for disqualification.

Landrace

- Must be white in color and possess Landrace breed character. (ears must be down)
- Must NOT allow any color hair other than white.
- Must NOT allow more than three spots of skin pigmentation.
- Must NOT allow any spot of skin pigmentation larger than one U.S. minted quarter.

Hereford

- The ideal color markings of all Hereford breeding hogs shall be red, light or dark however, deep red is preferred.
- White head, ears and 4 white legs

Yorkshire

- Must be white in color and possess Yorkshire breed character. (ears must be erect)
- Must NOT have any colored hair other than white.
- Must NOT have colored skin pigmentation larger than one U.S. minted silver dollar.
- Must not have masking above the eyes larger than a silver dollar.

Crossbred

• Hogs of any coloration pattern or pigmentation are eligible for entry in this breed.

Arrangements with the superintendent need to be made if departure is later than noon on Monday. Absolutely no poultry will be allowed on grounds except those entered in competition.

Special Rules - Junior Division

2. Entries:

An Entry Fee of \$3 per single bird and \$5 per breeding pen will be charged. Turkeys, geese, are to be entered only as singles. **ALL ENTRIES WILL BE ENTERED & PAID VIA MAIL**

3. Parking Permits and Exhibitor Passes:

Daily Gate 6 Parking Pass is \$7 per day. Exhibitor Passes are \$7 per day. The passes are available online or in the livestock office.

4. Judging will begin Saturday, September 11th at 9:00 AM. Birds must be owned and records kept as of May 1st of current year (Poultry meat pens must be owned no later than July 15 of the current year).

5. Classes & Awards:

Junior exhibitors will use the same classes and will receive the same premium pay- back as the open poultry department.

Special Rules - Open and Junior

The New Mexico State Fair is a member of the American Poultry Association, Inc. and will hold its show under the rules of the association. Prizes will be awarded in accordance with the APA and ABA Standards of Perfection and placed by APA and ABA licensed judges.

1. Read Open Livestock General Rules and Regulations.

- 2. Send properly filled out entry blanks with entry fees to the Entry Department, New Mexico State Fair, P.O. Box 8546, Albuquerque, NM, 87198 (505) 222-9700. The Management reserves the right to reject any and all entries that are deemed undesirable or to reject entries if space is not available. Entry fee will be refunded on rejected entries.
- 3. Passes: Drop-Off and Pick-Up Passes will be issued at no cost. These passes are available in the Livestock Office from the Poultry-Rabbit Superintendent. There will be no driving on Main Street after 9:00 AM.
- 4. Poultry entered should come from a pullorum free flock or hatchery.
- Each bird must be marked with leg band bearing legible numbers and must be properly listed on entry blanks. Birds without leg bands will not be accepted. Substitutions permitted only in class of original entry.
- 6. Entries must be made in the name of the actual owner. Absolutely no breeding will be allowed in the show room. Substitutions permitted only in class of original entry. Poultry may not leave the show room until released at the conclusion of the show. Failure to follow this rule will cause exhibitor to forfeit all prize money and awards.

- 7. Exhibits will be fed, watered and cared for by special, qualified watchmen who will be on duty day and night to properly protect birds. Exhibitors are required to furnish their own cups for water and feed. Exhibitors are required to provide adequate food and water bowls for their animals. Food and water bowls must be secured to the cage and of adequate size to accommodate the animals. Paper cups, Styrofoam cups or cut-off soda cans are not acceptable.
- 8. All eggs laid during the show will be gathered by the superintendent or her assistants and their vitality destroyed, and will be the property of the New Mexico State Fair.
- 9. A breeding pen shall consist of three chickens (two females and one male). These must be shown as young or old pens. A mixed pen of young and old will be excluded. Birds entered as a breeding pen cannot compete in single bird classification, except for championships. Turkeys, geese and ducks are excluded.
- 10. The terms cock, hen, cockerel, pullet, old pen and young pen are defined as follows: Cock, a male bird hatched prior to January 1 of the current year; Hen, a female bird hatched prior to January 1 of the current year; Cockerel, a male bird hatched during the year current year; Pullet, a female bird hatched during the prior year; Old Pen, one cock and two hens. Young Pen, one cockerel and two pullets. All birds in pen must be same variety. An old duck, drake, goose, gander and tom are defined as those hatched before January 1 of the prior year. A young duck, drake, goose, gander and tom are those hatched after January 1 of the current year.
- 11. No person will be permitted to handle exhibits during judging without permission of show official. Any person interfering with judge or judging in any way will cause his exhibits to be disqualified.
- 12. No diseased stock will be admitted to the show room for any reason. Any stock arriving sick will be returned to the owner or placed in quarantine. Birds will be inspected daily and any birds showing signs of contagious diseases will be removed and placed in quarantine.
- 13. The poultry building is equipped throughout with uniform standard size cooping and the right is reserved to place more than one female of the same variety belonging to the same exhibitor in one coop.
- 14. No exhibit unworthy of an award shall receive one, even though there is no competition, nor shall any exhibit receive an award greater than its merits justify.
- 15. Any breed or variety recognized by the American Bantam Association and the American Poultry Association is eligible to be shown even if that class is not listed.
- 16. The New Mexico State Fair will not be responsible for any loss or damage or injury to poultry exhibited, or for any article of any kind or nature that may be lost or destroyed. The New Mexico State Fair and the State of New Mexico will not be responsible or liable for any injury or loss of or damage to property sustained in any way to exhibitors or spectators.
- 17. At the discretion of the superintendent or the assistant superintendent, animal or animals may be

medicated.

- 18. Exhibitor recognizes that marketing of the fair and its grounds requires use of photography and video. Exhibitor hereby expressly grants to the fair the irrevocable, assignable right and license to take, use and publish exhibitor images and property without the need for any other approval. Exhibitor also releases the fair, its agents or assigns, from all claims related to the licenses that have been granted in this release.
- 19. Must be an active member in either 4-H or FFA in New Mexico and cannot have shown in any other state other than New Mexico.
- 20. Grand Champion will only be awarded in classes where there are three (3) or more entries.

- 2. Arrangements for space must be made through the State 4-H Office. There are a limited number of booths. County 4-H booth space is allocated on a first-come, first-served basis by reservation. Counties should reserve space by mail or email to TBA. Reservations will be confirmed by email. Any county wishing to reserve a 4-H Booth must make a \$20 deposit. If the county sets up their booth, they will get the\$20 back, if not, the money will go into a fund to repair booths. Reservations will be taken beginning in July. If a deposit is not paid by August 1st, the booth will go to the next county on the waiting list.
- 3. Each county may put in only one booth exhibit. It may be entered by a club or by the county. Cloverbud exhibits are not eligible for competition. This year's booth exhibits should use the theme: "4-H IS MORE......".
- 4. Person(s) responsible for putting in a county 4-H booth will be responsible for keeping the booth clean and orderly at all times. Working parts projectors, moving items should be inspected regularly to be sure they are operating properly.
- 5. Each booth is 3' 4" high, 4' deep at the base, and 8' across the front with a slanting glass front,

and glass sides. Back of booth is formed of sliding wooden panels.

- 6. County 4-H booth signs are furnished by the State 4-H Office.
- 7. Booth exhibits are to be designed and put in place by 4-H members with little or no assistance from the Agents and leaders. Failure to comply will result in disqualification of booth.
- 8. A committee of judges will determine prize winners. Decision of the judges is final.
- 9. Booths must be in place for the entire fair. 2021 booths may be set up between noon on September 7th and noon on September 11th, 2021. Booths must be taken down between 5 pm on September 18 and 1 pm on September 19.

**Read these rules carefully - they apply to all entries for the NMSF 4-H indoor exhibits!

1. The New Mexico State Fair and 4-H Department shall not be held responsible for damage, loss, or theft of exhibits. All items are entered at your own risk. While we do our best to handle each item carefully and respectfully, there is always some risk of damage.

- 2. County Extension Agents or their designated representative are responsible for county exhibits. Individual entries will not be taken without explicit permission from the County Extension Office. Each County is responsible for their own entries. There will be no early drop-off of entries. Entries received with incorrect numbers will be returned to that County for renumbering.
- 3. Each county may bring only the first-place exhibits from county fairs or achievement days in each class. Therefore, each county may enter only one exhibit per class, per section (novice, junior, senior).
- 4. Items must be entered in the appropriate age category: all ages are as of January 1st of the current 4-H year.
 - a. Novice 8 years old and in the 3rd grade or 9 11 years old
 - b. Junior 11 years old and in the 6th grade or 12 13 years old
 - c. Senior 13 years old and in the 8th grade or 14 18 years old
 - * Cloverbuds according to NM 4-H Policy, Cloverbuds are not eligible for competition and therefore cannot be qualified at the county level. No Cloverbud entries are taken at the State Fair.
- 5. 4-H'ers must be enrolled in the appropriate project to compete in that class.
- 6. Judging will be based on the standards listed including any size guidelines in the 4- H project book. Judges determine the merit of each exhibit. If multiple qualified items are in a class, they will be placed 1st-3rd, however, a judge may determine that no item meets the standard for 1st and choose not to award one. No more than one of each placing may be awarded in each class. If an item is the only entry in a class, judges will judge the item against the standard and may choose to award a 1st, 2nd or 3rd place or no placing at all.
- 7. Tape or sew a label giving the exhibitor's name, county, and year of project on each article. This is in addition to the fair exhibitor label which must be placed on the front of the item and attached securely.
- 8. All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor and completed during the current 4-H year.
- 9. At the close of the fair, exhibit must be claimed by County Extension agent or an official representative of the exhibitor.
- 10. If necessary, exhibits may be sent by prepaid express or parcel post addressed to:

Superintendent 4-H Department New Mexico State Fair 300 San Pedro Blvd NE Albuquerque, New Mexico, 87108 Phone (505) 265-1791 No later than 10 days prior to the entry date. Mailed or shipped entries will be returned in the same manner and in the same container received, provided funds to cover the transportation cost are included with the entry.

- 11. All items are displayed to the best of our ability. Cases will not be opened to move items, the exception being if items are upside down or mislabeled.
- 12. All entries must have an entry tag attached. Tags are color coded by age level: pink for Novice, yellow for Junior and green for Senior. Tags should contain the class number, project item description, member's name and county. Tags must be securely attached to the front of the item to allow for judging and display.
- 13. All Self-Determined entries must be accompanied by a completed Self-Determined Project Record Form 100.SD-1 (R-03). Self-Determined items that do not have a sheet will be disqualified be sure the sheet is securely attached.

14. Exhibit sizing guidelines:

- a. **Posters:** Posters may be no larger than 14 x 22 inches (this is half of a standard sheet of poster board). Posters are defined as any flat paper, foam board, cardboard, or other backing appropriate for hanging on the wall for display. Flat items placed on stands or with stands attached will be considered posters and the stands will not be utilized for display.
- b. **Display Boards:** Display boards may be no larger than 18 x 48 inches (this is a small size display board or half of a standard display board). Display boards are defined as scored, freestanding science boards that may be purchased at any school supply store. These are boards made freestanding by the sides being folded in slightly.
- c. **Other Exhibit Boards:** Exhibit bases for three dimensional vertical displays may be no larger than 24x24 inches. A vertical display is defined as an exhibit with a solid base where the exhibit itself rises up. This would apply to small engines, self-determined, or any other appropriate 3-D Display.
- d. **Project Specific Boards:** Some project boards are given specific measurements within the project. For example, leather craft and braiding have guidelines in the project book. If an exhibit is defined by the project book that is the rule members must follow.
- e. **Oversized Exhibits:** Because of security and space limitations, extremely large/heavy project exhibits may not be accepted for display in the 4-H Department; call (505) 646-1166 for prior approval on large woods, welding or other large project displays. Livestock Inspection

All in-state junior livestock (cattle, sheep, goats and swine) showing at New Mexico fairs must have an NMLB APPROVED fair tag furnished by the NMLB and a Form 1 inspection issued by the NMLB before entering any county or state fair. All out of state livestock must comply with New Mexico import requirements. The Form 1 inspection will be issued at the time the NMLB APPROVED tag is placed in the animal, tags will be issued by the NMLB. The application of the tag will be done by the extension agent, FFA advisor or fair personnel. All animals must be tagged and inspected no later than June 15th. The purpose of these requirements is to keep on file a record of animals that are commingled at fairs and shows.

Sheep

- 1. Proof of ownership (NMLB "form 1" inspection certificate) must accompany the animal when traveling, whether in or out of district; this provides the assurance that all requirements are met.
- 2. A NMLB APPROVED fair ear tag provided by the NMLB, a NMLB registered tattoo (tattoo registered with NMLB) and a Form 1 inspection issued by the NMLB. The tattoo can be the 4-H or FFA tattoo.
- 3. Market or breeding sheep and goats purchased from out of state, must comply with NM livestock entry rules and USDA interstate transport rule including a CVI, USDA scrapie identification and an entry permit number.
- 4. All sexually intact sheep and goats entered in market or breeding classes must have an official USDA scrapie tag applied to the ear. Registered breeding goats may utilize a legible breed registry tattoo in lieu of a scrapie tag.
- 5. Please see 2020 Exhibition Season: Additional Guidelines for Breeding Sheep and Goats in Junior Livestock General Rules.

Additional rules

- 1. No copies or faxed copies of TB test charts (VS Form 6-22) or health certificates will be accepted, unless signed by the veterinarian (who administered the test) in blue ink certifying the copy. The exhibitor must bring these documents to fair check-in.
- 2. NMLB approved regulatory identification is required for all test eligible animals.
- 3. Any clinical signs or evidence of an infectious and/or contagious disease will result in that animal's immediate removal from the fair grounds.
- 4. Out of state equine and livestock entries must adhere to New Mexico entry requirements and all current New Mexico fair entry requirements. Please review NM livestock entry requirements at www.nmlbonline.com and contact the NMLB office for any updates regarding state entry requirements.
- 5. ANY ANIMAL, ARRIVING AT A SHOW OR FAIR, FOUND NOT TO BE IN COMPLIANCE WITH NEW MEXICO STATE STATUTES OR LIVESTOCK BOARD RULES WILL BE SENT HOME AND GIVEN THE OPPORTUNITY TO BECOME COMPLIANT FOR FUTURE SHOWS AND FAIRS.
- 6. This information is provided only as a guide and may not contain all necessary requirements for livestock bound for exhibitions and shows. It is extremely important to consult your 4-H Leader, FFA Advisor, County Agent and your Livestock Inspector for updated information well ahead of your planned date of transport. Be sure to contact the destination fairs and livestock shows for their own rules.

Division 30 Sheep

Sheep commentary is due at time of entry. Late commentary will not be accepted. All entrants must have two (2) commentaries - 1 about sheep ONLY and 1 about garment. All commentaries must be emailed to both Superintendents. Entrants in this class must be residents of New Mexico between the ages of 2 and 19. Junior and Senior Divisions must show at halter a sheep with no more than two (2) teeth. Pee-Wee and Novice Divisions must show at halter a weaned lamb or a sheep with no more than two (2) teeth. Purebred ewes of any wool breed are eligible. Ewes will be checked in Friday, September 11th, 2020 between 8:00 AM and 5:00 PM. If the ewe has more than two (2) teeth, an automatic deduction of 50% will occur on the ewe.

Judging

The entrants will be judged as followed:

Junior and Senior Division

- Interview 30 points Each contestant within the division will individually answer questions with the judges. Questions will be randomly selected by the judges, but will pertain to contestant's garment, ewe, lifestyle as well as the wool industry. Interview will be held before the show. Garments are not to be worn during interview. Garments must be presented for judges to look at individually. Interview attire will not be judged.
- 2. <u>General Appearance 20 points</u> Poise, balance, attitude, and grooming of the contestant will be judged. Hairstyle, makeup and accessories (Non-wool accessories are permissible) should enhance the total appearance.
- 3. <u>Fashion Consciousness 20 points</u> The garment should complement the contestant as well as be in step with current fashions.
- 4. <u>Sewing Technique And Fit 30 points</u> Major articles of clothing must be made of at least 60% wool and be homemade or handmade. Ready-made woolen garments are not permissible. The garment should fit well and be neatly constructed. Garments will be displayed for judges during the interview process.

Pee-Wee and Novice Division

1. <u>General Appearance – 20 points</u> Poise, balance, attitude, and grooming of the contestant will be judged. Hairstyle, makeup and accessories (Non-wool accessories are permissible) should enhance the total appearance.

- 2. <u>Fashion Consciousness 20 points</u> The garment should complement the contestant as well as be in step with current fashions.
- 3. <u>Sewing Technique And Fit 40 points</u> Major articles of clothing must be made of at least 60% wool and be homemade or handmade. Ready-made woolen garments are not permissible. The garment should fit well and be neatly constructed. Garments will be displayed for judges during the personality process.
- 4. <u>Personality 20 points</u> Each contestant within the division will individually answer questions with the judges. Questions will be randomly selected by the judges but will pertain to garment, ewe and lifestyle. They will be judged on self- confidence, attitude and goals.

The Sheep:

It is mandatory that each entrant have a ewe. Pee-Wee and Novice Divisions may bring a weaned lamb.

- 1. <u>Fitting of the Ewe 20 points</u> The ewe should be attractively fitted and groomed, but not colored or in any way artificially prepared. The ewe should be clean, smoothly blocked in long wool (Wool should be at least one (1) inch long) in good condition, alert, stylish and well balanced.
- 2. <u>Best Breed Representation/Characteristics 35 points</u> The ewe should be of good breed character, size and scale, body confirmation, soundness of feet, legs and mouth, and wool quality representative of breed.
- 3. <u>Wool Marketability 35 points</u> Wool needs to grade in the Fine grade, which is classified as 64s, 70s or 80s. The finer the better. It should also have the character of a Fine grade: 20-30 crimps per inch with distinct points at the corners.
- 4. <u>Ease, Calmness and Leading Ability 10 points</u> The ewe should respond calmly to the halter and stand quietly when handled by the judge.

Winners from the junior and jenior divisions will be required to present their winning garment at either a NM Wool Growers or Sheep and Goat Council meeting. The directors will arrange a date and time for such. Winners will model their garment and present a short appreciation speech for their sponsorship of the event.

Purpose

To promote wool improvement and to create an awareness of the many qualities of wool and its uses.

Special Rules

- 1. This is the official annual wool show of the New Mexico Wool Growers, Inc., but competition is open to the world. Only members of the New Mexico Wool Growers, Inc., however, are eligible to receive special awards as presented by their association.
- 2. All entries and awards in this department will be subject to the General Rules and Regulations.
- 3. This department will be open to receive fleece exhibits Thursday, September 9, 2021 from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm in the Southwest Dairy Farmer's Dairy Barn Show Ring. If fleece exhibits are shipped, carrying charges must be prepaid and exhibits must arrive not later than Wednesday, September 8, 2021
- 4. Each exhibitor will be limited to two premiums in each class.
- 5. For eligibility, each fleece entered must:
 - a. Have been shorn in current season.
 - b. Must be a ram or ewe (wether fleeces will not be accepted).
 - c. Represent not more than 12 month's growth, except lamb fleeces where 14 months' growth will be allowed.

- 6. Points of disqualification:
 - a. Improperly prepared for show.
 - b. Contaminated with sisal or polypropylene fibers.
 - c. Inclusion of parts of another fleece.

7. Category:

Fleeces should be labeled and classified into the following categories:

- a. Range Fleeces from sheep run strictly under native western range conditions receiving minimum supplemental feed. For the New Mexico Wool Show, this division is subdivided into a Northern and Southern division, with Highway 48 (Pine Lodge Road) being the line of differentiation.
- b. Purebred Fleeces from purebred and/or registered sheep only are eligible to compete in this category.
- c. Farm Flock Fleeces from sheep raised on farms.
- d. Indian Fleeces Fleeces from sheep owned by Indian sheep producers
- e. Junior All Fleeces grown by junior producers which are high school or younger age.
