



Northern Wisconsin State Fair Meat Animal Program and Auction

The Northern Wisconsin State Fair Meat Animal Program ('MAP') is developed to provide support, vision, educational experiences, youth leadership in livestock/animal production, and sustainability for Chippewa County youth development. This program is in addition to the Northern Wisconsin State Fair (NWSF) Junior Exhibit opportunities as referenced within the annual NWSF Exhibitor Guidebook.

It is the responsibility of exhibitors and their families to understand the expectations related to participating in the MAP and Auction. The NWSF Chippewa County Meat Animal Program objectives are to:

- To provide Chippewa County 4-H members and FFA members an inclusive opportunity to responsibly lead, manage, and celebrate quality market animal livestock projects
- To educate a thorough understanding of the meat animal industry and evaluation, animal husbandry, ethical care and treatment of animals, biosecurity, and showmanship skills

Leadership Structure

MAP is led by a Leadership Team consisting of volunteer program supporters and is a recognized committee of the Northern Wisconsin State Fair Association. Changes to the MAP can be presented and made through the MAP Leadership team.

The MAP Leadership Team consists of a Chair, Vice-Chair, Treasurer, Secretary, applicable Species Liaisons (3), and an NWSF Liaison. Chippewa County Junior & Open Fair Leadership Team members and other program supporters are welcome to attend regularly scheduled meetings, but voting rights will be that of the seven-person Leadership team, within the boundaries and direction of the Northern Wisconsin State Fair Association. Refer to the current year NWSF Chippewa County Junior and Open Fair Organizational Structure.

Leadership positions are volunteer roles, selected for a staggered two-year term beginning the September (MAP) meeting date representing the program's membership. The MAP Leadership Team receives feedback from MAP participants and makes decisions and updates which will be presented on an annual basis before that program year's registration date. When a role opens, it will be communicated to MAP members to show interest and the representative will be selected by the MAP Leadership Team and NWSFA Liaisons.

Members and families are required to be active in at least one subcommittee, educational offerings, and the two MAP meetings.

MAP Expectations (to be eligible to sell at the NWSF MAP Auction)

- Confirmed member of a Chippewa County 4-H Club or FFA Chapter and register into MAP by November 1
- MAP Member must be in the 3rd grade up until the year/Fair following one full post-high school graduation.
- Youth member, accompanied by parent(s)/guardian(s), to attend the two MAP Meetings (November and June)
- Participate in a minimum of two qualified in-person educational opportunities (FFA, 4-H, or species/professionally led)
- Submit all necessary Fair entry, animal health, and YQCA requirements by the dates noted to the NWSF Exhibit Department
- Maintain MAP Project Expense Records that shall begin at the weigh-in date, last throughout the entire feeding period, and be turned in to the NWSF Species Superintendent (or delegated contact) at the time of weigh-in
- MAP Exhibitor Sign must be completed and hung above their animal’s pen for Exhibition Shows and Auction, which will be provided before the Fair
- Submit MAP Project Expense Record and buyer Thank You letter/card in an addressed, stamped envelope before receiving their MAP auction check.
- Abide by all Northern Wisconsin State Fair and applicable State Rules and Regulations including DTCAP
 - Refer to last year’s NWSF Exhibit Registration Guide or the current Guide, after April 15
 - Specifically, these rules and regulations include, but are not limited to, the expectations related to animal husbandry, fitting and showmanship, and grievance submission policies.

MAP Animal Registration Process	<p>Each family can bring and weigh-in up to three animals per species per exhibitor at the initial weigh-in or in the case of swine identify three hogs.</p> <p>Each exhibitor can bring up to two animals per species to the Fair.</p> <p>Each family must state before animals go on the scale which exhibitor is weighing in said tag number.</p> <p>Each exhibitor can only sell one animal total through the NWSF MAP Auction.</p>		
Species-specific/Animal Requirements	<p>All beef must be born on or after January 1 of the year previous to the exhibit year.</p> <p>All males must show obvious signs of castration at the initial weigh-in.</p> <p>Any breed of beef, beef crossbred, dairy beef crossbred, and dairy steer is eligible.</p> <p>Steers must be dehorned. Auction Requirements	<p>Exhibitors and their family member's assistance are required for the MAP Pre-Auction Picnic/Reception and assisting with auction operational needs (auction set up/takedown and clean up).</p> <p>The number of animals sold through the auction may be limited to the amount of available space in the MAP Carcass Contest. The total number of animals allowed will be determined by a committee comprised of locker plant representatives and MAP Leadership Team members.</p> <p>If the exhibitor receives both Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion in the live show, he/she can only sell one animal. Therefore, the animal in third place will become the Reserve Grand Champion.</p>

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EDUCATION

Education is an integral part of the youth member’s MAP experience and NWSF story. Each exhibitor is required to participate in two approved in-person educational events related to animal showmanship or meat livestock animal production to participate in the MAP Program and Auction. These include but are not limited to, educational offerings hosted by the MAP or partnering fair/county programs, 4-H and/or FFA Organizations, or applicable educational exhibits/area shows or workshops.

RECOGNITION

MAP will provide recognition to the MAP Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champions in four categories for each Meat Animal Program species: Live Show, Rate of Gain, Carcass, and Total Performance. Three Bred & Own traveling trophies will also be awarded.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Additional cash incentives and scholarships, that are not included within the NWSF Exhibit (and Premium) Guide, will be presented by the MAP Leadership Team.

MAP will retain 3% of MAP Auction Sale proceeds for committee and programming needs and will reimburse NWSF \$4,000 per year over the next three years (beginning in 2023) for shared use of facilities, administrative services, marketing, printing, property & liability insurance, and storage.

Information will be posted on the Northern Wisconsin State Fair website, shared with 4-H and FFA Organization leaders, and/or emailed to members using the e-mail addresses provided by the members upon the program and/or exhibit registration. It is your responsibility to ensure that the contact information is correct, and that the communication sent is reviewed.

All MAP Members and Families will be engaged within a minimum of one sub-committee. Each sub-committee will have a Chair, serving as the main point of contact for communication and responsibilities.
