General Rules

2022 Indoor Creative Exhibits

****All Exhibitors MUST be from Sacramento County (unless otherwise noted)****

1. Entries must be made **ON-LINE** by April 15, 2022. **Late entries will not be accepted.** Staff will be available for everyone that needs on-line entry assistance.

2. Exhibit Delivery Date: Saturday, May 7, 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. EXCEPT Fresh Flowers & FOODS

3. Food & Flowers drop off May 25th, 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m.

Entry Procedure & Fees

Entry Fee Office Fee: \$5.00/entry (Entry fees are non-refundable)

Entry Processing Fee/Exhibitor: \$5.00/ exhibitor **(one time charge no matter how many entries are submitted)**

Deliver Exhibits: Cal Expo, Building C, to Judging of Exhibits (enter through Gate 12)

Pick-up Exhibits: Monday, May 30, between 7:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. Entries not picked up become property of the Fair.

Guideline

1. **Full entry fees must accompany all entries.**
2. Entry fees, processing fees and any fees associated with entries are non-refundable. Entry fees for exhibits that are withdrawn or not displayed by the exhibitor will not be refunded. Calculate fees carefully. **Overpayments due to calculation errors will not be refunded.**
3. A \$50.00 processing fee will apply to checks not honored by the bank.
4. Fair Management reserves the right to limit exhibits to facilities available and may limit the number of exhibits made by an exhibitor.
5. Fair Management reserves the right to return entries, cancel any division or class, or combine divisions and classes in which, in its judgment, the entries are insufficient to secure adequate competition.
6. A complete exhibit eligible in more than one division and/or class shall be entered and judged in the division and/or class for which it best qualifies. Fair management reserves the right to make this determination.
 - a. Exhibits must remain in place for the duration of the Fair and will not be released until after the Fair closes on Monday, May 30 at 7:00 p.m.
7. Exhibits being picked up by other than the exhibitor must have a signed letter of authorization by the exhibitor plus the entry claim check. **No Exceptions!**
8. The Sacramento County reserves the right to not display any art or photography that, in its' opinion is not suitable for family viewing.
9. *Liability:* Every precaution will be taken to ensure the safe handling of exhibits; however, the Fair will not be responsible for any loss or damage which may occur from any cause.
10. The SCF reserves the right to not display any art or photography that, is not suitable for family viewing.
11. All items must be ready for display at the time of delivery. Stands or other display items are the responsibility of the Exhibitor.
 - i. All items must be ready for display at the time of delivery. Stands, hangers or other display items are the responsibility of the Exhibitor.
12. Apparel must be delivered on hangers
13. All Junior in door shows are for exhibitors 9 years of age and older. For exhibitors under 9 years of age, see Primary Creative Exhibits.
14. All exhibits designed to hang must be appropriately wired or equipped for hanging or will not be displayed during Fair.
15. Articles must be finished, clean and sanitary.
16. Craft items must include the theme of the Fair (Let's Eat, Have Fun & Celebrate the Red, White & Blue).
17. **All Exhibitors MUST be from Sacramento County**
18. All unclaimed items will become property of the Fair.
19. The judges reserve the right to move any entry into the proper class or division prior to judging.
20. No mail in entries are accepted.

Classes & Eligibility

Primary Members

Sacramento County Fair supports the 4-H philosophy and rules regarding competition and youth under 9 years of age. "Fairs are open to primary members for exhibit only. The use of Danish and American systems of judging is not acceptable for use with primary members. Primary members should only receive recognition for their participation."

"ALL JUNIOR EXHIBITORS SHOULD FALL INTO ONE OF THE FOLLOWING ESTABLISHED CATEGORIES"

FFA Members

FFA members may exhibit at the Fair if they are enrolled in high school vocational agricultural classes. They may continue to exhibit as members for one full year following graduation.

4-H Members

Any 4-H member who is nine years-old or older on December 31st of the past year may exhibit as a 4-H member and participate in competitive 4-H classes, and may continue to do so until the end of the calendar year in which the member has his/ her 19th birthday. 4-H uniforms may be worn in appropriate divisions.

Grange Members

Any Grange member who is nine years-old or older on January 1st of the current Fair year may exhibit in competition as a Grange member until the end of the calendar year in which the member has his/her 19th birthday.

Independent Junior Exhibitors

Independent exhibitors must be at least 5 years old, but not older than 18, on January 1st of the current program year, and do not belong to 4-H, FFA or Grange.

Adult Exhibitors

Independent exhibitor that is older than 18 years of age

Definition of Terms

Show.....A group of divisions that make up a category, i.e. Crafts, Art, Photography, etc...

Class.....A group of items that are judged together, i.e. Dolls & Toys, Paintings, Cakes, etc...

Division.....Grouping of exhibitors

Entry Form.....The form used to register exhibits for competition and display in the Sacramento County Fair.

Entry..........Each instance of an exhibit listed on the entry form.

General Rules

Rules and Information:

1. Exhibits must be original artwork created by the exhibitor within the past two years.
2. Artwork previously exhibited at the Sacramento County Fair is ineligible.
3. Same or identical items cannot be entered and/or exhibited in more than one Division and Class.

Entry Fee.....Monies paid to enter an exhibit. Nonrefundable.

Exhibit.....Item, object or collection of objects entered in a division for competition and display.

Exhibitor..... The owner of the exhibit residing in Sacramento County and contiguous counties.

Judging and Awards

Danish System of Judging.

Each exhibit will be judged on its own merit. Exhibits are placed depending on values received based on the scorecard. There may be more than one 1st, 2nd, 3rd, etc. per class.

American System of Judging

Each exhibit is judged against other exhibits in the same class. There is only one 1st, 2nd, 3rd, etc. in each class.

Best of Class

A Best of Class rosette may be awarded to the exhibit selected as the best 1st place exhibit in each class within each division. Danish System of Judging.

Best of Division

A Best of Division rosette may be awarded where there is more than one Division within a show.

Best of Show

Within each show, all Best of Class or Best of Division winners will be considered for Best of Show. Best of Show winners may receive a rosette and premium, unless otherwise noted.

Awards

1. The judges may disqualify or transfer to the correct division (at his/her discretion) any exhibit that is not a

true representative of the division or class in which it is entered.

2. Checks become void after 90 days from the date of issue. Requests for checks to be reissued will be subject to a \$35 handling fee. Requests for a check to be reissued after 18 months will be denied.
3. All ribbons will be awarded at time of judging.
4. The judge's decision on awards cannot be protested. Protests will be considered only if there has been a violation of State or Local Rules. All protests must be presented to Management of the Fair in writing within 24 hours of the alleged violation and must be accompanied by a \$100.00 deposit (cash, money order, or certified check), or \$200.00 if the protest relates to a violations of State Rules X-XI, which will be returned if the protest is determined valid. Protests and appropriate action are decided by the Fair Management/Fair Board of Directors. If protests cannot be resolved with the Board of Directors, the Division of Fairs and Expositions may intervene.

Interactive Judging

All Junior Shows will have the option to be judged interactively:

You are scheduled to bring your exhibits on Saturday, May 7th from 8:00 a.m. – 12 noon. **Interactive Judging will be scheduled at check in and allows you to see and participate in the judging process as it takes place.**

1. Teachers who are delivering student work may do so at this time, however teachers are encouraged to invite their students to participate in Interactive Judging.
2. Exhibitors must be present to participate in Interactive Judging. All other exhibits will be processed and judged in the traditional manner.
3. Interactive Judging is done using the Danish System of Judging.
4. Only the shows listed above will be judged interactively. Exhibitors with exhibits in shows not listed above should refer to that show for instructions.

ONLINE ENTRIES

Before you submit an online entry you must agree to the following:

(You do this by clicking the "I Agree" link online after you have read and agree to all rules.)

- I have read and agree to all rules.
- I understand that, if I am entering an animal exhibit, it is my responsibility to have all the required supporting documents to the office by the deadline.
- I understand that if I am entering an animal my signature is assumed.
- I understand that no entry is valid until received in the Sacramento County Fair office and approved by staff. INCOMPLETE ENTRIES, INCLUDING MISSING FEES OR UNSUBMITTED ENTRIES, WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED AND/OR WILL BE DISQUALIFIED!
- I understand that there are minimum system requirements for online entries and that this service may not be available to me.

HOW TO ENTER ONLINE

The Sacramento County Fair uses ShoWorks, an on-line entry program. ShoWorks is an industry standard used by over 50 Fairs nationally. This user-friendly program can be trusted to accurately enter you into our competitions and allows for efficient communications via e-mail. We are excited to have ShoWorks to better facilitate entering Sacramento County Fair competitions. Then follow the easy steps listed below to enter the competition you have chosen.

1. Before proceeding with an on-line entry, please visit our website at www.sacFair.com to download the appropriate Competition Handbook (Livestock or Indoor) located on the "Competitions/Contest" page. *Note that sessions expire for security reasons after 20 minutes of inactivity, so "save the cart" often and if you plan on leaving the computer for more than 20 minutes. Entries **cannot** be retrieved by the Sacramento County Fair office.*
2. Everyone must register as a new exhibitor when logging in for the first time in 2022.
3. When logging in for the first time, please do the following:
 - a. Click "Login/Logoff"
 - b. Choose type "Exhibitor"
 - c. Type in "First Name"
 - d. Type in "Last Name"
 - e. Click on "I am a new exhibitor" and click continue
 - f. Create a new password when registering for the first time each year. Remember your password as this will allow you access for future sessions.

4. Complete the New Exhibitor Fields and click "Continue". When entering information, fields in BOLD are required. **Be sure email address is correct as this is where the receipt will be sent to. Receipts are only sent electronically and cannot be reproduced if your email address is wrong.** If a field/ box does not apply to you, please type "N/A". If pending, please type "PENDING". Please follow the directions as they should help lead you through the process.
5. Review Exhibitor Information and click Continue.
6. Choose a Department (i.e. Breeding Beef, Market Swine, Adult Art & Photography, etc.)
7. Choose a Division (i.e. English Breeds, FFA Market Duroc Hog, Painting, etc.)
8. Select a Class from the drop down menu.
9. Complete Exhibit Information.
10. Make sure to include the club associated with the entry, if necessary. If not with a club, select *Independent
11. Click Add Entry To Cart
12. If you only have 1 entry click Continue. If you have another entry in the same department, click Add Similar Entry and follow above steps. If you have another entry in another department click Add Different Entry and follow above steps.
13. Once your entry(ies) are entered, an Additional Items screen will appear. Add quantity for any presale tickets you wish to purchase or any relevant fees that apply to your entry. Click Continue
14. Review Your Cart and choose an option below:
 - a. Add more entries
 - b. Empty Cart
 - c. Save For Later (entries and fees must be paid and submitted by entry deadline)
 - d. Checkout
15. Once you click Checkout it will take you to the Payment Screen. Select Payment method: Visa or Mastercard. Entry fees **MUST** be paid on-line with a Visa or Mastercard. **No checks accepted online.** Entries fees and any fees associated with entries are non-refundable. Enter credit card information and click Continue.
16. Confirm: your entries are not submitted until you type YES in the box and click submit.
17. Summary: Print the Detailed Receipt Summary by clicking the Detailed Receipt Button. It is recommended this receipt be brought to Fair check-in for reference as needed.
18. We look forward to your participation at the Sacramento County Fair – Let's Eat, Have Fun & Celebrate the Red, White & Blue!

Credentials

Policy! Parking passes for exhibitors are now available at a rate of \$6/ day or \$30/ for a season pass valid for all 5 days of Fair. The Sacramento County Fair pays Cal Expo for parking and makes no income from parking. Note: The Fair does not supply free parking passes for exhibitors.

Additional parking pass pricing and availability:

1. **All vehicles parked illegally will be towed away at the owner's expense!**
2. Exhibitor parking passes will be available for purchase at special exhibitor rates at the Livestock office on May 23rd and May 24th.
3. All 4-H Community Leaders, FFA Advisors, Grange Coordinators and 4-H Project Leaders will be required to purchase parking passes.
4. No vehicle will be allowed on grounds before Fair closes at 10:00 p. m. on Thursday through Sunday of Fair. **A paid gate will be in effect at the 2022 Sacramento County Fair. Gates will be monitored beginning at 6:00 a.m., May 26-30.**
5. Exhibitor Credential Pricing: Season admissions pass, good for all five days at any gate, \$30. Credentials will be available for purchase at the Livestock office on May 23rd and May 24th.

Liability

1. The owner or custodian of property of any kind brought to Cal Expo either for exhibit or for other purposes assumes as a condition of its admission to the grounds, all risk and/or responsibility for its loss, damage or theft.
2. The Fair, its officers and employees cannot and will not accept responsibility and liability for any damage or injury resulting from theft, fire, the elements, accidents or other conditions or causes; whether to exhibits, property of exhibitor, vehicles on the grounds and articles left therein or any other property of any nature whatsoever.

Fairground Rules

1. The Sacramento County Fair is a smoke-free facility. Smoking is not permitted on the Fairgrounds.
2. The possession and/or use of alcoholic beverages and/or illegal drugs by any minor is prohibited on Cal Expo property and will result in immediate expulsion from the Fair and forfeiture of awards, premiums and monies received at auction. **This includes the camping facility on the Fairgrounds. Anyone caught violating rules will be disqualified and forfeit all JLA or premium monies.**
3. Absolutely **NO PETS ALLOWED** in the barn area or on the Fairgrounds. **Only animals entered in competitions are allowed on the Fairgrounds in designated show areas only!** Exceptions will be made for Service Animals on a leash.
4. All material and decorations used in an exhibit **must be made from a nonflammable material or treated and maintained in a flame-retardant condition.**
5. Exhibit Buildings will close and be secured at 8:00 p.m. on Thursday and Friday, 9:00 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday and 7:00 p.m. on Monday of Fair.
6. No skateboards, motor scooters, motorbikes, roller blades, roller skates, bicycles, or golf carts, or similar personal wheeled devices will be allowed on the Cal Expo grounds other than those operated by Fair personnel.
7. Fair Management reserves the right to disqualify and/or remove any exhibit that is not in the best interest of the Fair.
8. Exhibitors, Leaders, Advisors and Parents who violate these rules, or who are found to be involved in unethical or hostile practices with the Fair, shall incur penalties that may include (but are not limited to) disqualification, removal from the Fair, forfeiture of awards and ineligibility in future Fair competitions.

During the Fair

1. Please check the individual schedule for each show you are entering. Shows may have different arrival times, judging times, etc.
2. 4-H Project leaders, FFA Advisors and parents may provide instruction **only**. Other adults and non-exhibiting juniors are prohibited from assisting any junior exhibitor without permission from the Fair CEO/Fair Manager.

End of the Fair

All exhibits & displays must remain in place until release time, 7:00 p.m. on Monday, May 30, unless otherwise stated.

Rules are subject to change at any time based on the Fair Board of Directors and Fair Management.

1. American System of Judging.
2. Two-dimensional artwork may not exceed 4' by 4', including frame.
3. Three-dimensional artwork may not exceed 16 square feet of total floor space and a height of 10'.
4. Please list the dimensions of the artwork on the entry form.
5. All artwork (except photos) designed to hang must be appropriately wired or equipped for hanging. Artwork not meeting this criteria will not be displayed during the Fair.
6. Photographs must be properly matted (no frames) and not more than 16" x 20" including matte. May be surface mounted or between mattes. Photography must be equipped with Velcro for hanging. Any mattes turned in with writing on them will be disqualified.
7. Digital photographs will be accepted in all photography categories.

Category Rules

1. **Food entry delivery: May 25th 8:00 -11:00 a.m. Building C, Cal Expo enter through Gate 12.**
2. Danish System of Judging.
3. No prepared mixes except in designated categories.
4. For each exhibit the following quantities apply:
 - A. One full size item - (i.e. cake, pie, loaf of bread) that is at least 6" in diameter, or able to be divided into six or more generous servings.
 - B. Six individual size items - (i.e. cookies, pastries, yeast rolls, muffins)
5. Foods that require refrigeration will not be accepted.
6. Decorated cakes may be real cakes or Styrofoam forms or similar non-perishable material (*please indicate on entry form*).
7. Cake exhibits should be on covered cardboard (*no more than 1" larger than cake*). Pie exhibits should be in a disposable pan. Individual size food exhibits (i.e. cookies, pastries, etc.) must be on a white disposable plate. All food exhibits should be covered with transparent wrap.
8. Food entries will not be returned at the end of the Fair (*with the exception of decorated cakes using non-edible forms*). Awards can be picked up from display Monday, May 30 between 7:00 -9:00 p.m.

2. Home Canned Entries:
 - ☐ Home Canned entries must consist of two (2) jars of product.
 - ☐ One jar is for display and one is for judging.
 - ☐ These two jars must be identical (i.e. both jars must be the same size, same type and same brand -- Ball, Kerr, etc. -- of jar).
 - ☐ Both jars will be presented to the judge. The judge will choose the jar to be opened.
3. Home Canned Labels:

 - B. Pressure Canner Method: Low-acid foods, including vegetables, must be processed using the pressure canner method. Tomatoes, figs and low-acid fruits may also be processed by the pressure canner method.
 - ☐ Entries processed using the open kettle process; solar canning method, oven canning method and the microwave canning process **are not** eligible for competition at the Sacramento County Fair.
5. Listing Method/ Time:

- Please tag each fleece entered with the following information: **Exhibitor's name, Division, Class, specie, breed & sex of animal**. Either securely tape the information to the outside of the bag or place inside the bag. The Fair will not be responsible for incorrectly labeled fleeces.

 - ☐ Paraffin wax seal will be disqualified
11. Head Space: The following headspace must be utilized for each product:
 - ☐ ¼ inch head space: Jams, jellies, preserves, conserves, butters, marmalades and curds
 - ☐ ¼ inch head space: Fruits, tomatoes, sauerkraut, pickles, relishes, chutneys, sauces and salsa
12. Dried food: Dried food products must be submitted in two identical containers; sealed in a jar as stated above or in a Ziploc type bag.
 - ☐ Required quantity of dried product to be one half dozen.

The auction takes place; runs concurrently and adjacent to the Junior Livestock Auction on Sunday, May 29th and Monday, May 30th.

2. Group projects are accepted, however each participant is required to enter an individual project that is not eligible to sell in the silent auction.
3. Projects to be auctioned must have been entered in this year's Junior Mechanical Science Division 2050 or Division 205 (see Divisions noted in Junior Mechanical Science.)
4. On the entry form please list the sale price next to the entry description in parentheses. If entry is not for sale indicate 'NFS' as sale price.
5. Each exhibitor is required to enter 2 items. (even if item is not selling) one that is eligible to sell and one display. Both will be judged.
6. **Only projects that receive a blue ribbon will be able to sell.**
7. All projects sold will be assessed an auction cost fee of 6% which will be used to defray auction costs. Checks will be mailed to the exhibitor within 30 days of the close of the Fair. We accept checks, credit cards or cash.
8. Students selling projects are obligated to help with the auction activities during the hours of 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on selling days.
9. Only projects made in school under the supervision of a vocational instructor or sanctioned 4-H project may be entered. **There will be no independent entries.**
10. Projects exhibited must have been started and completed during the current school/project year.
11. Projects made from assembly kits are not eligible. Component parts should be made by the exhibitor whenever possible.
12. Failure to comply with the Silent Auction Rules will result in a student's ineligibility to participate in the auction.
13. Items that have declared for sale will be moved into the area adjacent to the Junior Livestock Auction arena on sale day. Exhibitors are responsible to move their item to designated area by 8:00 a.m. Sunday, May 29th.
14. **Signage:** signs will be allowed, however exhibitors may display a poster, no bigger than 8 ½" x 11", with a description of their project. Failure to follow this rule will result in the item not being included in the silent auction.
15. The Sacramento County Fair Junior Livestock Auction Committee provides buyers with a photo of the seller/

exhibitor. Photos are to be of the exhibitor only. Exhibitor is to be from the waist up to the top of their head. Please contact Karen Hein to scheduled pictures.

A. **All** exhibitors (4-H, FFA, and Grange) planning to sell their Ag mechanics project are required to have an official photograph by Karen Hein. 3. Only fleeces in the grease are eligible for competition.
4. Fleeces must not be more than 12-month's growth, as commonly accepted by the wool industry. If a fleece is actually slightly more than 12-month's growth due to unavoidable delays in shearing (i.e. weather or shearer availability), it will be termed a "12-month" fleece.
5. All fleeces must have belly wool and tags removed. Fleeces not in compliance will be disqualified.
6. Wether fleeces may be entered in Wether fleece divisions only.
7. Black faced ewes will show in Market Division only.
8. All fleeces entered must have been from animals owned by the exhibitor. Fleeces must have been shorn after September 1, 2021, unless otherwise noted.
9. Fair management reserves the right to combine or cancel any classes that have three or fewer entries.

Judging:

1. The Fair and/or judges reserve the right to move fleeces into the proper class or division prior to judging or to combine classes where entries (two or fewer exhibitors or entries) are insufficient to secure adequate competition.
2. The Sacramento County Fair Wool Show is a handspinner's show. Handspinning characteristics of the fleece are the primary judging criteria. Judges may carefully unroll a fleece to examine it completely.
3. Fleeces will be judged based on the following characteristics:
 - a. Quality of fineness.
 - b. Evenness of quality or fineness among the various parts of the fleece.
 - c. Length and strength of staple.
 - d. Estimated clean weight.
 - e. Condition.
 - f. Character, including crimp and color.
4. Any fleece with the following characteristics may be disqualified:
 - a. Showing any paint or tar brands (soluble branding fluids are acceptable).
 - b. Showing a weak staple or break in the fiber.
 - c. Containing any excess burrs or other vegetable matter.

Preparation and Delivery

1. All fleece for show must be properly rolled and placed in a clear plastic bag. Fine wool fleeces may be rolled with paper liners to prevent sticking. Mohair or other goat fleeces do not have to be rolled.
