

GENERAL RULES

The San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo Association is a non-profit organization that strives to provide an outlet for the youth of Texas to participate in the agricultural industry. SASSRA is committed to the humane treatment of every animal exhibited and takes every possible precaution to insure the safety and well-being of participating animals and exhibitors.

The San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo Association (SASSRA), its officials, directors, employees and agents from hereinafter referred to as **Show Management**.

Statement of Liability

All exhibits are under the control and direction of the Stock Show Management, but in consideration of being allowed to participate, it is agreed that the San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo is not responsible to rany loss or damage that may occur even as a result of the negligence of San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo. The exhibitor will be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury or damage done to, or occasioned by, or arising from, any animal or article exhibited by him/her and for its description as given in the catalog. The exhibitor agrees to indemnify the San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo against all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto, as well as any damage or injury to any other person or property, cause by the exhibitor or any of the animals exhibited with such exhibition or any of the animals exhibited, even if caused by the negligence of the San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo. Exhibitor and each signatory hereto, and any servant, agent, family member or employee of the Exhibitor hereby waives all right to sue the San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo, even as a result of the Stock Show's negligence or any matter related to exhibiting in the San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo or making any challenge to our determination of a violation of its rules. When San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo is referred to herein, also included are any of its agents, servants, volunteers, employees, attorneys or any other individuals associated or affiliated with San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo.

- 1. Interpretation and Violation of Rules: Individuals, including participants, are requested to report any rule violation(s) to the Show Management immediately so that appropriate action may be taken. The San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo Association Executive Committee reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and settle and determine all matters, questions and amend or add to these rules as its judgment may determine. Any exhibitor who violates any of these rules will forfeit all privileges and premiums and may be subject to such penalty as the Executive Committee may order.
- **2. Special Rules:** Special Rules are published in any department where necessary. If there is a conflict between the Special Rules and the General Rules, Show Management will govern the final ruling. To be eligible to enter, exhibitors and their livestock must meet the special requirements of the animal or breed of animal to be exhibited.
- **3. Eligibility:** Competition is open to the world, with the exception of the Junior Show (see Junior Show Rules), age regulations on Youth Shows, and any other event noted in an event's Special Rules. This is an invitational Livestock Show; SASSRA reserves the right to extend or withhold an invitation to any exhibitor.

4. Ineligible Entries:

a. Disqualified Exhibitors: The Show, cooperating with member shows of the North American Livestock Show and Rodeo Managers Association and using the Rule Infraction Database, reserves the right to refuse entry of any exhibitor who has been barred from any other show on the basis of unethical practices. An exhibitor found in violation of any Show rules is subject to have his/her name and the result

of the rule violation submitted to the Rule Infraction Database administered by the North American Livestock Show and Rodeo Managers Association.

- **b. Diseased Animals:** Diseased animals cannot enter the Livestock Show area or grounds. Superintendents will refuse unloading privileges to animals showing signs and symptoms of disease.
 - c. Barren Animals: Barren animals are not eligible for breeding classes.
- **5. Social Security Number Requirement:** Every exhibitor and contestant must have a Social Security Number or Tax Identification Number to be eligible to participate in the San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo. **Social Security Numbers must be recorded on entry forms.**

6. Entry Procedure:

- **a. Entry Forms:** All entries are required to be submitted on current, official entry forms available at http://www.sanangelorodeo.com. Photocopies are acceptable though **original signatures** are required on all entries.
- **b. Junior Show Entry Submission:** Entries are not considered complete unless they have been submitted online and postmarked on or before December 1, 2021, except for judging contest, ag speaking, rabbits, youth food challenge, and robotics entries. Incomplete entries (entries not submitted online or postmarked) will be assessed an additional 10% fee. Ag speaking online entries must be submitted online on or before January 10, 2022. Judging Contest and junior food challenge entries must be made through www.judgingcard.com, no paper form is required.
- **c. Open Show Entry Submission:** Open show entries must be entered online and/or postmarked on or before January 10, 2022.
- **d. Entering both Open and Junior Shows:** Exhibitors are allowed to enter both the Junior Show and Open Show when applicable; however, separate entry forms and fees are required.
- **e.** Acceptance of Entry: The right is reserved to Show Management to reject entirely or accept conditionally any entry and to refuse any accepted entry admittance to the fairgrounds. Entry does not guarantee space in the exhibition buildings. All fees will be forfeited.
- **f. Completion of Entry:** Entry forms must be completed in its entirety. If any blank is left unfilled, the entry may not be accepted and will be returned to the exhibitor.
 - g. Mailing: Please mail the following items to the Livestock Department:
- 1. All completed entry forms (Open Show, Junior Show, etc.). Include ALL original signatures and social security numbers.
 - 2. Payment-
 - *Junior Show: Only checks from 4-H or FFA accounts, money orders, and cashier's checks will be accepted. Personal checks are NOT accepted.
 - *Open Show: Personal checks are accepted. Online entries must be paid for with online payment.

h. Erroneous Entry: At the discretion of Show Management, exhibits that have been erroneously entered may be transferred to their proper classes prior to judging. Show Management will decide the disposition of each case of erroneous entry upon its merits. If such classes have been judged they shall not

be reopened. No animal shall be changed from one class to another after deadline date unless it is ineligible for the class it is entered.

7. Entry Deadlines: All paper entry forms and payment are due on dates listed below. All Junior Show entries due on December 1, must also be submitted online.

December 1: Junior Market Steer, Junior Market Barrow, Junior Market Lamb, Junior Market Goat, Junior Breeding Gilt, Junior Stars Gilt, Junior Ewe Lamb Futurity, Junior Breeding Sheep, Junior Angora Wether Goat Futurity, Junior Angora Goat, Junior Texas Stars Wether Doe, Junior Boer Goat, Heifer Futurity, Junior Breeding Heifer, and Ag Mechanics entries.

December 2-15: Junior Show (listed above) Late Entry- Double original entry fee. Mail in only.

January 10: Ag speaking entries must be fully submitted online (including all documents/forms uploaded) and full payment mailed in to the SASSRA office. Junior Market & Breeding Rabbits, Open Breeding Sheep, Open Boer Goats, Open Llama Show, Open and Youth Miniature Hereford Show entries, Open and Youth Longhorn Show, Junior Robotics with forms and payment mailed in only. Junior Food Challenge entries submitted through www.judgingcard.com; no forms or payment due to SASSRA. Online payment may be accepted for some entries.

February 10: Judging Contest Entries must be submitted through <u>www.judgingcard.com</u>; no forms or payment due to SASSRA.

8. Late Entry:

- **a. Late Junior Show & Agriculture Mechanics** entries will be accepted postmarked December 2-December 15, 2021 for double entry fee.
- **b. Extra Late Junior Show** entries will be accepted from December 16, 2021 until the end of check in for the show the entry is made and will automatically be charged a \$200 late fee per entry in addition to the original entry fee. Payment will only be accepted as cash, cashier's check, or money order.
- **c.** Late Open Show entries will be accepted postmarked January 11, 2022 until the end of check in for the show for double entry fee. No credit card payments will be accepted.
 - d. Rabbit Show no late entries will be accepted.
- **e. Judging Contests** entries will be accepted online from February 11, 2022 to the day prior to the contest for double fees. Additionally, entries will be accepted the day of the contest, onsite for double fees by cash payment only.

Show Management reserves the right to accept or deny any late entry. Late entries must still meet any and all ownership requirements.

9. Entry Fees: No entry will be accepted if payment for entry fees does not accompany entry forms. If the check accompanying the entries should be returned by the bank for any reason, the entry will be cancelled and returned. There will be a \$25 service charge on all returned checks. The San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo has the right to ban any exhibitor from future participation should there be a continuous problem with fees from an exhibitor.

10. Division Transfers: Exhibitors will be charged a \$100 fee for any division transfers made after the time of entry up to the time of check in.

^{*}Please see specific show rules for more details.

11. Drug Testing Fees: A \$3.00 per entry drug testing fee may be applied to any show which animals will be drug tested. The income from this fee will help off-set the expenses of such tests. These fees will automatically be added to the entry fee of the show on the official San Angelo Stock Show Entry Form(s).

12. Miscellaneous Fees:

Junior Show Processing Fee, per club/chapter \$10.00

Junior Show Late Entry Fee (Dec. 2-15), per entry Double Fee

Open Show Late Entry Fee (Jan. 11- Check In) Double Fee

Junior Show Late Entry Fee (Dec. 16- Check In), per entry \$200+ Entry Fee

Division Transfer Fee (Entry Deadline – Check In) \$100 Fee

13. Passes: Passes for junior show exhibitors will be mailed prior to the show, excluding robotics, food challenge, ag mechanics, and judging contest contestants which will be handed out on arrival. Junior passes will be mailed to the Supervisor that submitted entries.

Gate Passes: Each exhibitor will be issued one (1) free Gate Pass valid for the duration of the Livestock Show and may purchase additional passes in advance or at the gate. CEA's and AST's who are supervising projects will be issued one (1) free Gate Pass valid the duration of the show. Open show entries will grant one pass per exhibitor, and one pass per owner (if different than exhibitor).

Exhibitor Pass \$15.00 (Valid for duration of Livestock Show)

Starting January, 30th, all passes will be **Season Passes** available for **\$30.00**. Passes are valid during Rodeo/Midway events as well.

Car Passes: Exhibitors and Supervisors will be eligible to purchase Car Passes good for the duration of the show. Car passes must be fully affixed to the windshield of the vehicle. Partially applied, laminated, wrapped or taped stickers are not valid. Failure to comply will result in confiscation of Car Pass and loss of parking privileges. These passes allow access to parking lots at Gate 4. Purchase of parking pass does not guarantee parking. CEAs and ASTs will **NOT** be sent a complimentary parking pass with entries.

- Car passes allow purchaser to enter Gate 2 on south end of fairgrounds and park along west side of
 the Gandy Ink Livestock Barn and in designated parking lot located just north of the Gandy Ink
 Livestock Barn. Parking alongside the Gandy Ink Livestock Barn may be prohibited during some
 arrival and/or show days to accommodate the flow of traffic.
- Parking lots located south and southeast of Foster Communications Coliseum, north of carnival and north of the Horse Barn do NOT require parking pass.

Car Pass \$25.00 (Valid for duration of Livestock Show & Rodeo)

- **14. Project/Animal Substitutions:** Substitutions will be allowed within the same breed and division as the original entry at the time of check-in. Substitutions will not be allowed once check-in is completed. Any animal substituted must meet any and all requirements for the show it is to be entered. There is no fee for substitution. Ag Mechanics projects may be substituted prior to the event with the Livestock Office for no fee, or the day of check in for a fee (see Ag Mechanics Rules). Substitutions across divisions (or shows, including heifers across breeds) will be allowed for a \$100 substitution fee, due at the Records Office.
- **15. Refunds:** There are absolutely no refunds of entry fees, passes, or other related fees.
- **16. Checks:** Premium (prize money) and floor checks will be issued in March or April following the show, and mailed to the 4-H Club or FFA chapter through which entries were made. Premium Sale checks will be

issued once payment has been received from buyers, typically mid-June, and mailed directly to the exhibitor. In the event checks are not cashed within 90 days, they will be considered stale and must be reissued. There will be a reissue charge of fifty dollars (\$50.00) in addition to any stop payment or other bank charges.

17. Judges:

- **a. Selection of Judges:** Show Management is solely responsible for the selection of judges and determining judging systems. Judges will be familiar with all rules, regulations and procedures of the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo.
- **b. Judges' Decision:** The judges' decisions are final. If fraud, misrepresentation, error or collusion is discovered after awards have been given, the show Management or appointed referee will make a decision regarding final placement. Such decisions may be appealed to the Executive Committee from whose decision there will be no appeal. Protests alleging that the judges overlooked exhibits will not be considered.
- **c. Interference with Judges:** An exhibitor or his representative who interferes with or displays disrespect to a judge or the Show could forfeit any monies earned or be subject to other penalties assessed by the show.
- **18. Sifting/Classifying Committees:** The San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo reserves the right to appoint sifting committees to determine the eligibility of animals by inspection prior to judging. Animals must have blankets removed and be ready for inspection when called upon by the committee. The sifting committee will eliminate any animal which, in its judgment, is not qualified to compete and may be required to leave the grounds. Decisions of the sifters and/or classifiers will be final and protests will not be considered. Interference with sifters and/or classifiers will not be tolerated.
- **19. Official Protests:** All protest must be made in writing and accompanied by a fee of \$100, which will be refunded if the protest is sustained. Such protests and fees must be submitted to the Livestock Office. Protests must clearly state the cause of complaint or appeal, giving good and sufficient reasons therefore, and must be delivered to the Management immediately upon the occasion for such protest. Protests not officially filed within 12 hours of the alleged incident will not be considered. These cases are referred to the Executive Director, who will have full power to act, and from whose decision there can be no appeal. Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation.

20. Breed Representation:

- **a. Sheep or Goats:** Should any breed represented in the open or junior breeding sheep or goat shows not have a minimum of four (4) breeders and sixteen (16) sheep or goats entered in their respective show at the time of entry deadline, their fees will be returned to the exhibitors and no show will be held. The show will be discontinued for the following year, unless the breed association pays the premium for the succeeding year.
- **b. Cattle:** Should any breed represented in the Youth Longhorn Show or Open Longhorn Show not have a minimum of five (5) breeders and a total of twenty five (25) animals in their respective show at the time of entry deadline, their fees will be returned to the exhibitors and no show will be held for two consecutive years.

In the Junior Heifer Show, if any breed has less than thirty (30) head entered on a three year average the breed will be dissolved into the appropriate ORB or ARB division. Additionally, at any time a breed has less than twenty (20) head entered the following year, the breed will be dissolved into the appropriate ORB or ARB division. Any breed that has more than thirty (30) head entered on a three year

average will be given its own separate breed show. Any breed that has more than forty (40) head entered in a single year will be given its own breed show the following year.

21. Show Ring Competition:

- **a. Entry Numbers:** Each entry will be assigned a number. In some divisions exhibitors will receive corresponding cards with numbers which must be displayed by exhibitors during judging.
- **b. Requirement to Show:** Animals properly entered in a show class and passed on by the sifting committee as eligible for competition must be brought into the show ring for competition. Exhibitors who refuse, without Show approval, to lead their animals for parade or for competition in the show ring will forfeit any and all prizes previously won. Also, by refusing the exhibitor may be barred from further participation in the Show and may be required to remove their stock from Show ground immediately.
- **c. Arena Promptness:** Exhibitors are responsible for knowing the times at which their projects will be judged. Judging will not be delayed for animals entering the arena late. Any exhibit not presented promptly will be ruled ineligible and barred from competition the class.
- **d. Judging Contests:** If and when an exhibitor is called upon to furnish one or more animals for the students judging contest, he or she will cooperate with the Show. Refusing to allow an animal to be used in this manner, without Show approval, could result in the forfeit of any prizes or such other action as the Show deems necessary. Selection of animals will be made under the direction of the department superintendent.
- **22. Disqualification:** Should any animal, project, contestant, or team awarded a prize be disqualified, the lower placing animal, project, contestant or team will not move into the higher position, with exception to market show animals disqualified in a champion drive for weigh out on return to the show ring. Review market show specific rules for more information.
- **23. Animal/Exhibitor Disqualification:** To support fair competition, to provide a level playing field and to protect the safety of food, the showing of unethically fitted livestock, livestock of any ineligible age for exhibition in the class entered, and/or animals being administered unapproved drugs is strictly prohibited. Additionally, any animal that has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species is subject to disqualification if that animal test positive for that drug upon arrival at the San Angelo Fairgrounds. All animals must remain free and clear of all drug and chemical residues while on show grounds. How or under what circumstances the animal came to ingest the drug is not relevant to any consideration.
- **23a. Unethical Fitting:** Unethical fitting is defined as any attempt to alter an animal's performance or alter the natural contour, confirmation, or appearance of the animal's body, hide, hair, or feet by any unnatural means.

Examples of unethical fitting include, but are not limited to:

- Treating or massaging any part of the animal's body, internally or externally, with an irritant, counterirritant, or other substance to temporarily improve conformation.
- Surgical alterations, excluding the removal of warts or horns
- Use of Injections
- Striking the animal to cause swelling in a depressed area
- Use of electrical contrivances
- Feeding of material not conducive to the health of the animal, safety of food or marketability of its carcass
- Blocking of nerves to prevent limping or switching of the tail
- The use of diuretics

- The use of alcoholic or carbonated beverages in the feed or administered as a drench
- **23b.** Over Age Animals: Any animal over the age requirement set forth by rules specific to that division will be disqualified.
- **23c. Unapproved Drug Use:** The showing of any animal that has been administered during its life any quantity of any unapproved drug, chemical or medication is strictly prohibited. Such drugs include, but are not limited to, any diuretic, any unapproved growth stimulant or other unapproved medication. Unapproved means not approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and/or the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) for slaughter animals including that may be destined for human consumption.
- **23d. Approved Drug Use:** If an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species, sufficient time must have passed so that the animal does not test positive for that drug upon arrival to the Grounds. **Animals must remain free and clear of all drug and chemical residues while on show grounds.** Please note that elimination time (the time it takes for no drug residue to be found in the system) is typically longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most approved drugs.
- **23e. Animal Inspection & Testing:** As condition for participation in the show, every exhibitor must agree to submit any animal entered by the exhibitor for inspection at any time. Exhibitors agree to have such animal submitted to any test requested by the Show at any time. The exhibitor also agrees that the opinion reached by the Show or its officials as to whether such animal is unethically fitted or over age shall be final and binding without recourse against the Show or any of its officers. Further, the Show specifically reserves the right to have ultrasound, D.N.A., tissue, blood and/or urine laboratory analysis made on any animal entered for competition. The conclusions reached by the laboratory and/or veterinarian shall be final and binding without recourse against the Show or any of its officers. An exhibitor, and members of the exhibitors family, of an animal that is found to be unethically fitted, over age, and/or testing positive for any drug or medication or unapproved chemical may forfeit all rights and privileges to exhibit livestock in the future at the Show.
- **23f. Unruly Animals:** Show Management, Livestock Committee Leadership, and/or Ring Stewards may remove an unruly animal from the show at any time, if they see fit. There will be no appeal. Cattle must be shown with a halter and sufficiently tame enough to be properly handled by the exhibitor as entered. If the animal exhibited poses a danger to the exhibitor and/or other parties, Show Management reserve the right to remove the project from competition. Depending on the case, projects may be instructed to be removed from the grounds by Show Management. Substitute exhibitors will not be allowed for unruly animals.
- **23g. No adherence to Rules:** Any person found guilty of misrepresentation or not abiding by the Show rules will be disqualified and denied the privilege of showing in the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo.
- 23h. Medication Received Prior to Show: Animals under the care of a licensed veterinarian and/or taking any type of performance enhancing medication to include but not limited to, steroids, diuretics, anti-inflammatories, tranquilizers and pain killers are ineligible for competition. In instances where an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species, the exhibitor must be aware that the time it takes for all drug residue to completely clear the system is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most drugs. SASSRA maintains a ZERO TOLERANCE POLICY for unethically fitted

livestock. Adequate time must have passed so that the animal does not test positive for drug upon arrival. Once the animals arrive on the SASSRA grounds, they must remain free and clear of all drug and chemical residues.

- 23i. Emergency Treatment: If an animal requires emergency treatment while on Show grounds, only a licensed veterinarian will be allowed to administer any drug, chemical or feed additive. An exhibitor may choose a licensed veterinarian other than the official Show veterinarian, but the official Show veterinarian MUST be notified in advance and he/she MUST be present. Animals which are administered treatments with a withdrawal or extended elimination time period will be disqualified from competition. Furthermore, the Official Show Veterinarian, in agreement with Show Management, reserve the right to treat any animal if, in the opinion of the Official Show Veterinarian, it is in the best interest of the animal's health and well-being to be treated. If the Official Show Veterinarian administers treatment to an animal, and therefore uses any medication that does not meet the appropriate withdrawal and or elimination time, will be determined ineligible to show for competition.
 - **23j. Treatment Cost:** All treatment costs are the responsibility of the exhibitor.
- 23k. Consequences: In the event any animal is declared by the veterinarian or testing agency to be unethically fitted, test positive for the presence of prohibited drugs or other substances, or disqualified for any reason, the SASSRA President will appoint an Ethics Committee to evaluate the findings. In the event the Ethics Committee shall make a determination whether the exhibitor shall permanently barred or barred for a specific period, from further participation in the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo. Reinstatement of anyone barred as set forth herein, may be made only by the Ethics Committee. Further, in the event of disqualification as set forth herein, the Ethics Committee is empowered to determine that the exhibitor shall forfeit all titles, awards, prizes, auction proceeds, premiums, and scholarships for all entries if the animal and/or exhibitor is disqualified. Market/Floor money shall be forfeited if the animal is condemned at slaughter. The San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo, may in its sole discretion, submit the name(s) of any disqualified exhibitor to the Rule Infraction Database of the North American Livestock Show and Rodeo Managers Association.
- **231. Probation:** An exhibitor may be placed on a probationary status if results of drug tests are inconclusive, confirmation of a primary test cannot be granted, or another situation questioning the ethical fitting of livestock arises. The probation grants the right for the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo to collect ultrasound, D.N.A., blood, tissue and/or urine samples for laboratory analysis on any animal entered by an exhibitor on probation at the exhibitor's expense. An exhibitor may remain on probation for any amount of time and may be released from probation only by the Board of Directors upon recommendation from the Ethics Committee.
- **24. Wholesome Meat Act:** The USDA Wholesome Meat Act applies to all market livestock. Only animals eligible for immediate slaughter may be brought onto the grounds and exhibited:
 - a. Animals must be in good health and carcasses free of drug or chemical residues.
- b. Drug label directions for use and withdrawal periods must be followed. Please note that elimination time (the time for no drug residue to be found in the system) is typically longer than the withdrawal time for most approved drugs.
- c. If drug or chemical residues are found in tissue of carcasses, the entire carcass may be condemned.

The San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo will in no way be liable or responsible for the condition of the carcasses or the sale price of the animal. In such cases, the exhibitor forfeits all rights to any and all proceeds including: Auction Price, Scholarships, Premium Awards, Market (Floor) Price and Special Awards.

- **25. Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act:** As required, in 21 CFR 589.2000, entry in the Junior Market steer, lamb, and goat shows shall serve as verification by the exhibitor that, to the best of their knowledge, while under their ownership, possession or direct control, the animal(s) were not fed any feed containing ruminant-derived meat or bone meal. Entrants agree to allow packer inspections of feed ingredient records and facilities.
- **26.** Disqualification/Condemnation of Animal: "The Show practices a Zero Tolerance policy on all residue violations." The Show reserves the right to condemn and/or disqualify any animal, either live or slaughtered, found in violation of Rule 22 of the General Show Rules and Regulations listed in the handbook and the exhibitor will forfeit all auction sale and/or premium money if the animal is disqualified. If an animal(s) is disqualified, the class placing will not change. A disqualified exhibitor may forfeit all rights and privileges to exhibit livestock in the future at the Show.
- **27. Disclaimer of Warranties:** The San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo expressly disclaims any express or implied warranties (including merchantability), whether the goods or services are provided by the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo or by others (such as drug testing). The San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo does NOT provide security or guard services and is not responsible for the acts of third parties. Exhibitor and exhibitor's parents and/or guardians agree that the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo shall be entitled to disqualify any exhibitor whose animal tests positive for any drug even if the exhibitor and the exhibitor's parents or guardians are innocent of any wrongdoing and had no role in the administration of the drug shown by the drug test. Even if the source of the drug is unknown, the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo shall be entitled to disqualify the exhibitor. Disqualification results in forfeiture of all prize money and auction proceeds.
- **28. Rule Infraction Database:** As a member of the North American Livestock Show and Rodeo Managers Association (NALSRMA), the San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo reserves the right to refuse entry to any exhibitor that is entered into the NALSRMA Rule Infraction Database (RID). Furthermore, any exhibitors that violate the rules and regulations of the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo are subject to being reporting to the NALSRMA RID. Information reported to the NALSRMA RID is available to all members of the NALSRMA.
- **29. Animal Health Regulations:** State Law requires most stock entering the grounds to be accompanied by proper health papers that shall be presented at the time stock arrives on the grounds. See Texas Animal Health Commission Rules for detail, there will be no exceptions.
- **30. Unauthorized Animals:** Any animals brought onto grounds which are not entered for competition or exhibition will become property of SASSRA and will be disposed of by discretion of the Executive Committee.
- **31. Objectionable Exhibits:** Show Management reserves the right to remove from the grounds any exhibit, animal or entry that may be falsely entered, or deemed unsuitable, or objectionable, without assigning a reason therefore. All fees will be forfeited.

32. Ownership Requirements: All animals must be entered in the name of the owner(s) as shown on the Registration Certificate. All parties in a multiple ownership must be on the entry form. Firms and partnerships must be in existence at the time of making entry.

All animals in the breeding shows must be recorded or accepted for record in the recognized books of record for their respective breeds, and exhibitors must produce original certificates of registry at the request of the Superintendent of the show at any time during the show or registration for the show. For specific ownership deadline requirements please see the specials rules regarding the specific show.

Registration and health certificates must be available at all times during the show. Validation, bill of sale or other proof of ownership may be required for other animals.

- **33. Animal Care:** All owners or persons in charge of property, or livestock, shall care for, guard, protect, and preserve same, as the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo does not undertake to do so, and it shall not be held responsible for any loss, shrinkage, or damage to said property or livestock or the owners or exhibitors thereof. All exhibitors are responsible for security of their own animal/project(s) until they depart for their final destination (processing/ranch/etc.) The exhibitor is the absolute insurer of and is responsible for the condition of their animal/project(s). The San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo is not responsible for the acts of third parties.
- **34. Photographs:** Exhibitors must present themselves and their animals at the request of show officials for official photographers. All photographs taken by the official photographer(s) become property of the San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo. Exhibitors wishing to purchase photographs must contact the Official Photographer.

Commercial photography and filming are often conducted at the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo. You may be depicted in photographs or video recording of any San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo event, and by entering the grounds and/or competitive events associated with the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo, you consent to the use of any depictions in connection with advertising, news reporting, public relations, webcasts or other broadcasts, or any other activities relating to the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo, and you further release and waive all claims for compensation and any rights of review and approval, copyright, and right of publicity with respect thereto.

- **35. Release:** Exhibitors and their animals must remain on the Show grounds until animals are released by the Show Superintendent. An animal on exhibition may not be removed from the grounds prior to its release time without a special order. No animal will be released from the fairgrounds without a proper release form filled out and signed by Show Management. Any violation of this rule will cause forfeiture of all premiums earned by this exhibitor.
- **36. Project Care:** Exhibitors must remain in charge of their exhibits and care for them for the duration of the show or have a competent caretaker in charge of them who will be on duty at all times.
- **37. Group Classes:** All group class entries will be made upon arrival at the Show with the Superintendent. There is no entry fee to enter a group class.
- **38. Stalling:** All show entries will be stalled upon arrival. Swine, market lambs and goats stall assignments will be made at Gate 5. Cattle stalls assignments will be made at the Stall Office in the Cattle Barn which

requires entry at Gate 6 off Lake View Heroes Drive (formerly 50th Street). Breeding Sheep & Goat stall assignments will be made in barn of showing.

39. Stalls, Pens, Alleys: Stalls, pens, alleys and exhibit spaces must be cleaned before 8:00 a.m. each day. Dispose of matter in the following ways:

Manure and/or Bedding Designated Dumpsters

Trash Trash Barrels

All chairs, equipment boxes, feed, etc. should be kept from the main alleys in the barn and should always allow for through traffic. Lights are not allowed on stalls or pens. Exhibitors are granted access to the barn 24 hours per day; however, exhibitors are not allowed to sleep in the barns.

- **40. Scales:** Exhibitors will not be allowed to bring portable scales in the Gandy Ink Livestock Barn. Scales will be provided by the show in all barns; such scales are unofficial and are provided for exhibitors' convenience only.
- **41. Trim Chutes:** No trim chutes will be allowed on the grounds during the Junior Market Steer Show or Junior Breeding Heifer Shows.
- **42. Signs:** Exhibitors may display a sign over each exhibit advertising their own herds, FFA Chapter or 4-H Club. Signs must be put up in such a way as not to interfere with the exhibit. All forms of signs must be approved by Show Management, and the Livestock Superintendents reserve the right to have to objectionable signs removed.
- **43. Feed:** Feed will not be sold on the fairgrounds. You need to bring your feed or plan to purchase feed at local stores after arrival. The San Angelo Stock Show does not guarantee storage space.
- **44. Hay:** Any hay fed within the livestock barn must be placed in a feed trough or feed tub in an amount an animal may consume in a single feeding. Free-choice hay is NOT allowed. No hay bags or hay racks will be allowed. Bales of hay will not be allowed in the barn. All hay in the barn must be kept in a container, bucket, or bag from which it cannot spill and must be kept out of aisles. This applies to the Gandy Ink Livestock Barn only (Sheep, Goat, and Swine Barn). Not applicable to Cattle Barn.
- **45. Shavings/Bedding:** Bedding is included with stalls. Any and all additional bedding must be purchased from Show Management. No outside shavings will be allowed. Straw will be allowed in for cattle tie-outs only.
- **46. Electrical Equipment:** Any equipment brought in to be used in the exhibit stall or space must comply with and be used in compliance with all Federal, State, and Municipal Occupation Safety and Health Regulations. Show Management will determine what equipment is allowed on Show grounds.
 - **a. Fans:** Fans are not permitted in the Gandy Ink Livestock Barn (Sheep, Goat and Swine barn), unless the temperature exceeds 90 degrees Fahrenheit. Announcements will be made.
 - **c. Generators:** Generators are not allowed.
 - **d.** Heat Lamps/Propane Heaters: Heat lamps and propane heaters are not allowed in the barn.
- **47. Pets:** Service animals as well as any other animals under contract with the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo are permitted to be on the Show grounds while personal pets are not allowed.

JUNIOR SHOW RULES

The San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo Association, its officials, directors, employees and agents from hereinafter referred to as **Show Management**.

Statement of Liability

All exhibits are under the control and direction of the Stock Show Management, but in consideration of being allowed to participate, it is agreed that the San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo is not responsible for any loss or damage that may occur even as a result of the negligence of San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo. The exhibitor will be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury or damage done to, or occasioned by, or arising from, any animal or article exhibited by him/her and for its description as given in the catalog. The exhibitor agrees to indemnify the San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo against all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto, as well as any damage or injury to any other person or property, cause by the exhibitor or any of the animals exhibited with such exhibition or any of the animals exhibited, even if caused by the negligence of the San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo. Exhibitor and each signatory hereto, and any servant, agent, family member or employee of the Exhibitor hereby waives all right to sue the San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo, even as a result of the Stock Show's negligence or any matter related to exhibiting in the San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo or making any challenge to our determination of a violation of its rules. When San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo is referred to herein, also included are any of its agents, servants, volunteers, employees, attorneys or any other individuals associated or affiliated with San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo.

- **1. Rules:** All general rules apply to all shows within this division, as do the rules stated in the Junior Show Specific Rules and Regulations section and the specific show pages. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to know and understand each and all of the rules applicable to them and their exhibits.
- **2. Eligibility:** The term "exhibitor" shall mean the bonafide owner of the project. To be eligible to compete in the Junior Show exhibitors must:
 - Reside and attend school in Texas.
 - ➤ Be a bonafide member of a Texas 4-H Club or FFA Chapter, who have continuously owned and personally fed and cared for their animals under the direct supervision of a CEA or AST.
 - > Be enrolled and attend a public, private or home school elementary or secondary school in
 - ➤ Be between the ages of 9 and 18 on or before August 31, 2021, or 8 years old and in the third grade.
- **3. Social Security Number Requirement:** All exhibitors and contestants must have a personal Social Security Number to be eligible to participate in the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo. Social Security Number must be recorded on entry forms.
- **4. Scholastic Eligibility:** All 4-H and FFA members are considered to be eligible by the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo for participation in the Junior Livestock Show at the time entry applications are received from the AST/CEA. Any AST/CEA who has a member that becomes ineligible to participate, for any reason, must provide written and signed notification to Show Management at least 24 hours prior to any Junior Show activity in which the ineligible exhibitor is to participate. If an exhibitor is ineligible, then the entry is ineligible.

- **5. Foreign Exchange Students:** Non-United States citizens and Foreign Exchange students are ineligible for competition in the Junior Livestock Division. Such individuals are eligible to participate in the Open Division if all other requirements are met.
- **6. Entry**: The San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo allows CEAs and ASTs in charge of 4-H Clubs or FFA Chapter programs the opportunity to enter members of their programs in the Junior Livestock Show, subject to the Junior Rules. These rules are only minimum requirements for participation in the Show and are not intended in any way to limit the right of any CEA or AST, or the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension or the Texas Education Agency, to impose additional requirements as they may deem necessary regarding participation in the Junior Livestock Show. The opportunity to enter 4-H Club and FFA members' projects in the Junior Livestock Show is made available only to CEAs and ASTs supervising these Junior Show projects. In no event are these rules to be construed as making any offer or opportunity available to any 4-H club or FFA member. In no event shall any CEA or AST be considered to be an agent of the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo for any purpose.

All entries in the Junior Livestock Show must be made by the CEA or AST under whose supervision the animals were fed. The CEA or AST must certify on the entry form that the animal and the owner(s) are eligible under the rules of this show. It is the responsibility of the CEA or AST to read all rules and check each entry form carefully before signing it. If entries are not correctly submitted they will be returned. Entries submitted by anyone other than the CEA or AST will be returned.

Entries must be submitted online by the CEA or AST and further directions on steps to follow are available on the website. CEA's and AST's must submit the original paper entry form with original signatures from the exhibitor, the exhibitor's parent and/or guardian, and the CEA or AST overseeing the project. Entry forms must also be submitted for all Ag Mechanics projects and these must be signed by the CEA or AST. All entries submitted must have original signatures-photocopied or faxed signatures will NOT be accepted. Copying the entries before submitting them for personal records will be allowed.

All entries must be made together and paid by one check payable to the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo, and sent in by the county agent or vocational agriculture teacher with the entry forms. Payment must be in the form of a school check, 4-H club check or money order. Personal checks will not be accepted for junior entries. All Judging Contest entries and payment will be handled through judgingcard.com

7. Quality Counts Verification: All junior show exhibitors are required to have gone through the Quality Counts program, complete and pass the on-line test through which they will be assigned a unique verification number. Each exhibitor's verification numbers must be recorded on their entry forms at the time of entry. This rule applies to ALL Junior Market Shows and Junior Breeding Shows.

Judging Contests, Agriculture Mechanics, Robotics, Food Challenge and Ag Speaking Contest exhibitors are exempt from this requirement. Though it is strongly encouraged, Youth Longhorn exhibitors will not be required to take this test.

Please refer to the website http://qualitycounts.tamu.edu for information on how to become verified.

8. Ownership: Exhibitors must own their animals/projects at the beginning of and throughout the entire feed and fitting period. Exhibitors must feed, care for, and exhibit their animals/projects without any aid or assistance during the entire feeding and fitting period except from the exhibitor's parents/guardian, CEA, AST or other 4-H or FFA members from the 4-H Club or FFA Chapter from which the animals/projects are

entered. Show Management will rule on all issues regarding ownership (i.e. Ribbon, Premium, or Other Auction/Sale).

9. Ownership/Fitting Periods: The required ownership and fitting periods are:

Market Animals: Validation and/or sales receipt will be used to verify ownership date for market animals.

Market Steers July 1, 2021

Market Lambs November 1, 2021
Market Goats November 1, 2021
Market Barrows December 1, 2021

<u>Breeding Animals:</u> Original Registration Certificates will be used to verify ownership date for breeding animals with the exception of the Stars Gilts, Texas Star Wether Does. Animals must be registered in the Herdbook of their Association in only the name of the Junior owner on or before the required ownership date (see below). Original registration certificates must state the name of the Junior owner only.

Purchase, delivery, possession, transfer and registration must all take place on or before the required ownership date listed below. Superintendents will check Original Registration Certificates at the time of check-in. Registration certificates must be available at all times.

Breeding Sheep: October 1, 2021 (Must be validated through Breeding Sheep Validation by November 1, 2021)

Angora Wethers: October 1, 2021

Boer Goats: October 1, 2021 (State Validated through Breeding Goat Validation by November 1, 2021)

Texas Star Wether Does: October 1, 2021 (State Validated through Lamb & Goat Validation by November 1, 2021)

Texas Star Wether Dams: October 1, 2021 (State Validated through Lamb & Goat Validation by November 1, 2021)

Breeding Beef Heifers: November 1, 2021 (Must be validated through Texas 4-H and FFA Breeding

Heifer Validation administered by the Texas AgriLife Extension Service and the

Texas Education Agency by November 14, 2021.)

Angora Goats: December 1, 2021

Breeding Swine: December 1, 2021 (Must be state validated through Swine Validation)

- **10. Partnerships:** Partnership animals are not eligible in the Junior Show. Entries must be made in one exhibitors name.
- **11. Dual Show Entry:** Animals entered in the Junior Breeding Sheep Show and Junior Boer Goat Show may also enter their respective Open Shows.
- **12. Ineligible Animals:** Any animal that has sold at auction at any major livestock show is not eligible for the Junior Show.
- **13.** Ineligible Exhibitors: Exhibitors placing a Grand Champion Market Steer, Lamb, Barrow or Goat are not eligible to participate in the respective species in future shows.
- **14. Substitute Exhibitors:** All entries in the Junior Show must be exhibited and sold by the owners. Exception: A substitute exhibitor will be allowed to show in place of the owner under the following circumstances:
 - When an exhibitor has more than one entry in one class or another entry in the Junior Show and cannot be present.
 - When an exhibitor is ill or injured. (Must be accompanied by a doctor's note)
 - Approved school activity or state testing (Must be accompanied by a statement from a school official on official school letterhead). Attending school does not constitute.

The substitute must be an eligible Junior exhibitor from the same 4-H Club or FFA Chapter entered in the same department of the show. Parents, teachers, extension agents or other adults will not be allowed to show. Substitutions are not allowed for academic ineligibility.

Previous exhibitors of Grand Champions in the Jr. Market Steer, Jr. Market Barrow, Jr. Market Lamb and Jr. Market Goat shows may not serve as a substitute exhibitor in the respective division.

In any and all situations the Superintendent of the show and staff may use his/her own discretion as to whether a substitute showman will be allowed.

These same substitute exhibitor rules are applied to the Junior Premium Sale.

- **15. Refunds:** Refunds will not be made for any reason.
- **16. Country of Origin:** To meet Country of Origin labeling requirements, any and all market animals entered and/or exhibited must be bred, born and raised in the United States of America. Please check specific show rules for additional eligibility regulations on market animals, such as Junior Market Lambs must be Texas bred.
- **17. Stalling:** All junior shows will be stalled upon arrival to the San Angelo Fairgrounds. To pen together, groups must arrive and remain in line together.
- **18. Terminal Shows:** This is a terminal show for all market lambs, market barrows, and market goats, as well as any steer that qualifies for the Premium Sale. All market lambs, market barrows, market goats, and all 1^{st} and 2^{nd} place steers must go to the market. Non-placing steers may be sold at the market price or they may be released.
- **19. Sift, Non-Place, Premium and Auction Checks:** Owners will be paid by the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo for sifted and non-placing animals based on weigh-in weight. Checks will be mailed directly from the San Angelo Stock Show. If applicable, premium monies for class placings will be distributed by the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo and mailed with sifted and non-placing checks to the 4-H or FFA address. Auction sale checks will be issued by the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo and may be mailed separate from premium checks and floor checks directly to the exhibitors mailing address.

Market Animal Disposition

The San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo strives to ensure a fair price for market animal projects. Market conditions may dictate the sale of market animals be conducted through local terminal markets (i.e. sale barns, etc). The San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo reserves the right to charge the exhibitor freight, yardage, and any and all marketing fees applicable to the sale of each animal. Any animal deemed unmerchantable due to lameness, illness, etc. will receive no value.

20. Disqualification: In the event an exhibitor engages in any conduct which results in disqualification, the San Angelo Stock show and Rodeo Association, may, in its sole discretion, prohibit future participation by the exhibitor and all members of the exhibitor's family, in any event which San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo sponsors.

- **21. Weighing:** Market steer, barrow, lamb, and goat exhibitors will turn in their official show weight. The management reserves the right to weigh-back any animal at any time. Animals not weighing within the defined range set forth by the specific show rules are subject to a \$10.00/cwt fee.
- **22. Bedding:** Bedding is included with stalls. Any and all additional bedding must be purchased from Show Management. No outside shavings will be allowed. Straw will be allowed in for cattle tie-outs only.
- **23. Health Papers:** Health papers are not required for junior market animals; however, they may be required for all breeding animals and will be checked at the gate of entry. Refer to Animal Health Regulations for full details.
- **24. Blocking Tables & Trim Chutes:** Blocking tables or any form of stanchion will not be allowed during the Market Lamb and Goat shows. Trim chutes will not be allowed during the Junior Market Steer or Breeding Heifer Shows.

ANIMAL HEALTH REGULATIONS

San Angelo Stock Show officials are allowed to impose animal health requirements that are more restrictive than those imposed by the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC). Specific TAHC regulations will supersede the Show requirements if there is a dispute between the two in which the Show rules are less restrictive than TAHC regulations. The show considers itself an interstate (accepting entries of livestock from within Texas and from other states) show for livestock entries. Exhibitors with livestock originating outside the State of Texas are encouraged to contact their state Animal Health officials to confirm specific requirements, if any, their state may impose on animals returning from a Texas show. All swine shows are intrastate (accepting entries from within the state of Texas only) for entries.

CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION: The certificate must indicate that the accredited veterinarian found the animals or fowl to be free of symptoms or evidence of communicable disease and that all tests, immunizations, or treatments required by the Commission were completed. For certain diseases, a specific statement may be required indicating disease free status. The certificate is required to accompany animals and fowl entering the State of Texas as stated in the following summary of entry requirements. The certificate is valid for 30 days for all species.

PRIOR ENTRY PERMITS: Entry permits are required as noted in the following summary of entry requirements. Permits may be obtained by calling 512/719-0777(24 hours), or 1/800-550-8242 or by writing the Texas Animal Health Commission, 2105 Kramer Lane, P.O. Box 12966, Austin, Texas 78711-2966.

ROUTINE INSPECTION PROCEDURES

- 1. Representatives of the Show should meet all incoming livestock vehicles at entry gate to Show Grounds.
- 2. At this point, all required documents will be inspected as well as a visual inspection of the shipment.
- 3. If shipment meets all requirements, the driver will then be allowed on grounds.
- 4. If the shipment does NOT meet the requirements, they will be asked to pull from the flow of traffic. Show Officials will then take necessary steps to correct the issue or dismiss the animals from premises. However at NO time will these animals be allowed on grounds to co-mingle with others.

CATTLE

OPEN & YOUTH LONGHORNS

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued within the past thirty (30) days.
- 2. All bulls entering for show purposes, only, which are more than (12) months of age may enter with an entry permit in lieu of the Trich test. Bulls permitted for entry into the State of Texas under the provisions of this subsection shall not be commingled with female cattle or used for breeding. Bulls that stay in the state more than sixty (60) days must be tested negative for trichomoniasis with an official Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test.

JUNIOR BREEDING HEIFERS

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is **NOT** required.

JUNIOR MARKET STEERS

2. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is **NOT** required.

GOATS

OPEN & JUNIOR BREEDING BOER GOATS

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current within thirty (30) days.

- a. Note: All goats coming from a vesicular stomatitis virus (VSV) affected state must have a CVI issued within 14 days prior to entry and a VSV status for the premises or area should be recorded on the CVI.
- 2. Official Identification:
- a. All exhibition goats entering the State must have a scrapie identification eartag except registered goats with a registration tattoo and accompanied by registration papers listing the scrapie premise ID number.
- b. All exhibition breeding goats must have a scrapie identification eartag except registered goats with a registration tattoo and accompanied by registration papers listing the scrapie premise ID number.

JUNIOR ANGORA GOATS & JUNIOR WETHER DOES

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is **NOT** required.
 - a. All exhibition breeding goats must have a scrapie identification eartag except registered goats with a registration tattoo and accompanied by registration papers listing the scrapie premise ID number.

JUNIOR MARKET GOATS & JUNIOR ANGORA WETHER GOATS

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is **NOT** required.

SHEEP

TEXAS ORIGIN SHEEP (Jr. Breeding Sheep, Open Breeding Sheep, Ewe Lambs)

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued within the past thirty (30) days.
- 2. Sexually intact animals must have official USDA Scrapie Eradication Program Identification.

OUT OF STATE ORIGIN SHEEP (Jr. Breeding Sheep, Open Breeding Sheep, Ewe Lambs)

- 1. Must meet the same requirements as for Texas Origin Sheep.
- 2. Negative ELISA brucella ovis test within thirty (30) days for all breeding rams 6 months of age or older. Each ram shall be individually identified with an individual ear tag or registration tattoo. This number, along with the test results and name of the approved laboratory and date of test, shall be entered on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. Exemption for rams from a certified brucella ovis free flock and Texas origin rams; certified flock number must be recorded on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- 3. All blackface ovine females and all blackface crossbred females, except hair sheep, imported into the State of Texas for breeding purposes shall originate from a Scrapie Certified Free Flock or have documentation supporting that the animals are of the genotype RR at codon 171 or AA at codon 136 and QR at codon 171.

JUNIOR MARKET LAMBS

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is **NOT** required.

SWINE

BREEDING GILTS

- 1. All certificates must be issued on or after January 17, 2022, with the following information:
 - A. Leptospirosis vaccination is required on breeding swine within 30 days prior to date of the sale (on or after January 17, 2022) with vaccine containing the following strains: Canicola, Hardjo, Icterohaemorrhagiae, Grippotyphosa, and Pomona. Vaccination date must appear on the health certificate.
 - B. A statement must appear that says the animal has not been fed garbage, has not been exposed to hog cholera or pseudorabies, does not originate from a quarantined herd, nor

- has the herd of origin had PRV within the last six months, nor have the entries themselves been vaccinated for PRV.
- C. Gilt identification must be included on health certificate in form of validation number and ear notches.
- D. ALL gilts must have tested negative for Brucellosis and Pseudorabies. Blood test must have been conducted within 30 days prior to the show. Results should be listed on health certificate.

All health certificates left in possession of show management at the conclusion of all Gilt Shows will be disposed of. Exhibitors must pick up health certificate in Livestock Office before leaving the fairgrounds.

JUNIOR MARKET BARROWS

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is **NOT** required.

LLAMAS

ALL LLAMAS

- 1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection current within thirty (30) days of show.
- 2. An entry permit on any llamas entering the state of Texas for exhibition and sale.

SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS SAN ANGELO STOCK SHOW FOUNDATION.

The San Angelo Stock Show Foundation Scholarship fund will make available \$1,000 renewable scholarships to qualifying high school seniors. The Scholarships may be used to attend a Texas vocational/technical school or accredited Texas college or university. Applicants must be 4-H, FFA or FHA members. Applicants do not have to pursue a career in agricultural or related fields.

Eligibility Requirements:

- ★ Member of 4-H, FFA, or FHA
- ★ Resident of Texas
- ★ Must be or have been a participant of San Angelo Stock Show
- ★ Satisfactorily complete the requirements for a high school diploma in the spring of the current year OR for renewal recipients satisfactorily completed the previous semester(s) of college with an overall grade point average of 2.5
- ★ Be accepted to a Texas vocational/technical school or accredited Texas college or university OR for renewal recipients, be enrolled in a Texas vocational/technical school or accredited Texas college or university.
- ★ Enroll for a minimum of 12 hours.
- ★ Meet the minimum requirements for the educational institution of their choice if graduating from high school this year.
- * Renewal applicants must submit fall grades by January 15th to receive funding for the spring semester and July 15th to receive funding for the fall semester. Reports received after these dates will result in loss of funding for the semester.
- ★ Applicant must have taken either the ACT or SAT to be eligible.
- ★ Scholarships must be claimed within one year of high school graduation or the scholarship will be forfeited.

Eligibility Requirements:

- ★ Member of 4-H, FFA, or FHA
- **★** Resident of Texas
- ★ Must be or have been a participant of San Angelo Stock Show
- ★ Satisfactorily complete the requirements for a high school diploma in the spring of the current year OR for renewal recipients satisfactorily completed the previous semester(s) of college with an overall grade point average of 2.5
- ★ Be accepted to a Texas vocational/technical school or accredited Texas college or university OR for renewal recipients, be enrolled in a Texas vocational/technical school or accredited Texas college or university.
- ★ Enroll for a minimum of 12 hours.
- ★ Meet the minimum requirements for the educational institution of their choice if graduating from high school this year.
- * Renewal applicants must submit fall grades by January 10th to receive funding for the spring semester and July 15th to receive funding for the fall semester. Reports received after these dates will result in loss of funding for the semester.
- ★ Applicant must have taken either the ACT or SAT to be eligible.
- ★ Scholarships must be claimed within one year of high school graduation or the scholarship will be forfeited.

1. All animals selected for the sale are required to sell, with the exception of the Market Steer Show. The following animals will be eligible for the sale:

72 Lambs- 1st – 4th Place Finewool, Finewool Cross, Southdown, & Medium Wool 1st-2nd Place Dorper Lambs

84 Barrows- 1st – 3rd Place Barrows in each class

40 Wether Goats- 1st – 4th Place in each class

26 Steers- 1st and 2nd Place in each class.

- 2. The buyer pays amount bid and will not receive credit for the packer price. Buyers are responsible for paying the full amount of any and all bids submitted. All monies collected from the packer for the premium sale animals will be used to fund the Junior Breeding Livestock Show incentive program and additional premium sale monies.
- 3. All first and second place animals qualifying for the Premium Sale <u>MUST</u> have their photos made with the Official Show Photographers before placing their animals on the truck.
- 4. **All exhibitors from Grand Champion down through second place must attend the sale.** Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Overall will walk through the sale ring with animals. All other breed champions, reserve breed champions, first and second places must be present at the sale.

Exhibitors placing third and lower will not present in the sale ring and are not required to attend the sale. Exhibitors with animals placing third or lower will be guaranteed a sale price at a date close to the premium sale and will be eligible for add-ons.

- 5. A substitute exhibitor will be allowed to show in place of the owner under the following circumstances:
 - ★ When an exhibitor is ill or injured. (Must be accompanied by a doctor's note)
 - ★ Approved school activity or state testing. (Must be accompanied by a statement from a school official on school letterhead.)

All documentation must be presented prior to the onset of the premium sale to Show Management. A substitute exhibitor from the same county/FFA who does not already have a position in the sale will be allowed to present in the ring. If there is no other exhibitor from the same club or chapter, another exhibitor present at the premium sale will be sufficient.

If an exhibitor is absent from the sale without an approved substitute exhibitor form, the exhibitor will forfeit their sale monies.

- 6. The Stock Show and Rodeo Association guarantees each steer sold in the Premium Sale a price of \$500 above the packer price, provided a packer bid is available.
- 7. There will be no guaranteed minimum price for the market lambs, barrows or goats.

- 8. There will be no charge for this sale. Junior Exhibitors selling animals in the Premium Sale will receive payment by check, by mail after the show closes and upon payment by the buyer for the full amount of the price.
- 9. Animals that are sold through the auction ring cannot be bought back by the exhibitor. Any exhibitor, or anyone acting for an exhibitor, who is found guilty of asking a purchaser to either give him his animal or sell it back to him will be barred from further participation in this show and forfeit all premiums and sale money above market value of the animal.
- 10. Any animal which has sold at auction at any major livestock show is not eligible for the sale.
- 11. All exhibitors must arrange to take care of all animals entered in any show as long as they remain on the grounds. Only live animals at delivery will be paid for.
- 12. Non-premium sale animals will be sold on packer bid. Pay weight will be the official show weight. All calves must be supplied with a good rope halter. Animals not exhibited in any market class will not be eligible for any sale. All market steers not eligible for the Premium Sale will be sold at packers bid unless reported as NO SALE with the Superintendent as the steer leaves the show ring. There will be no exceptions to this rule.
- 13. In the event the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo is unable to obtain an adequate packer bid, all animals will remain in the possession of the exhibitor and will be taken home by the exhibitor.
- 14. Exhibitors participating in the Premium Sale are required to write a "Thank You" letter to all buyers of their lot(s). Exhibitors are not required to mail these to Show Management.

1. All rules apply to the Junior Steer Show. Please refer to the General Rules and Junior Show Rules.

2. To be eligible to exhibit in the 2022 Steer Show, all steers must be validated in the Texas 4-H and FFA Steer Validation Program. Each entry must have been recorded on a 4-H or FFA Steer Validation Form Master List between June 1 and June 30. Exhibitors must have owned and cared for their steers continuously since June 30, 2021.

A hair follicle sample will be collected from all breed champions and all reserve breed champions and DNA analysis will be conducted on each of these hair follicle samples. The Steer Committee may also collect a hair follicle sample from any other steer entry from the purpose of conducting a DNA analysis. Any steer not having a positive match from the DNA analysis of this hair follicle sample, compared to the DNA analysis of the hair follicle sample taken from it at the time of enrollment in the validation program will be disqualified.

Steers arriving at the show without an official Texas Steer Tag must be validated by the Steer Committee. The official State Validation tags will be the show tag. Separate tags will not be issued.

- 3. Previous exhibitors of the Grand Champion Steer are not eligible to enter the Junior Steer Show.
- 4. Each exhibitor will be permitted to enter no more than two (2) steers.
- 5. Steers will be stalled in the Housley Communications Cattle Barn located North-East of the Coliseum. Enter Gate 6 off of 50th Street/Lake View Veterans Memorial Drive. Stalling assignments will be made upon arrival.
- 6. Official disposition forms must be picked up in the staging area at the time of check in. All steers will be required to be presented for classification. English steers will begin at 3:00 p.m., followed by American, Black European, and Other European. The steer may be led through by the exhibitor, the exhibitor's parent/guardian, the exhibitor's CEA/AST, or an approved substitute exhibitor. Each breed will be called to report to the 1st Community Credit Union Spur Arena.

Exhibitor's will need to present their disposition (weight) card with the validation number and show weight completed at the time of classification. Hair length will be checked at this time, as well as other show requirements such as horns and tags in addition to validation tags.

Classifiers will then determine if the animal meets breed standards. If it does not, they will determine which breed the animal should show in at that point, instead of the animal being presented multiple times. Show management or committee representatives will take the disposition (weight) card and mark the breed determined. At that point, check-in will be complete. There will be no kiosk system for the market steer show.

Superintendents will break classes immediately following classification.

- 7. Steers must weigh a minimum of 1000 pounds. Any steer weighed in under this will be sifted.
- 8. The Steer Show Superintendent will have the right to weigh any animal in the barn at any time. Any animal not weighing within 5% of the weight turned in will be sifted and assessed a \$10.00 cwt. penalty. Any re-weighed steer weighing less than 1000 pounds will be sifted.
- 9. Steers will be designated for re-weighing during judging in the show arena at a time designated by the Superintendent. Any steer leaving the show ring and later returning for additional judging may be reweighed. Any steer weighing more than 5% above his initial official show weight will become ineligible for any award or the premium sale. Steers coming back for the grand drive may be reweighed before the start of the grand drive, by superintendents. Any steer not within 5 percent of his initial official show weight will become ineligible to compete, however will still be eligible to sell in the premium sale as a breed champion. If a breed champion steer weighs out, the reserve breed champion within the same breed will be able to compete for grand. No other animals will be allowed to advance placing.
- 10. Steers will be shown in four breed classifications. These four breed classifications are: English Breeds, American Breeds & Crosses, Black European Breeds & Crosses & Other European Breeds & Crosses. Purebred Hereford, Polled Hereford, Angus, Red Angus and Shorthorn will be classified as English breeds. Steers that exhibit visibly obvious characteristics of Bos indicus genetics that support the commercial industry will be classified as American Breeds & Crosses. Steers not classified as English Breeds or American Breeds & Crosses will be classified as European Breeds & Crosses.
 - English Breeds Purebred Angus, Hereford, Polled Hereford, Red Angus, & Shorthorn Steers.
 - American Breeds & Crosses Any steer that exhibits visibly obvious characteristics of bos indicus genetics i.e. ear length and amount of hide & hump crest. Includes purebred Brahman, Brangus, Santa Gertrudis, Simbrah & other American Breed Crosses.
 - Black European Breeds & Crosses: To include purebred black Limousin, Maine-Anjou & Simmental cattle AND any cross bred calf.
 - Must have a black body cavity. Defined as the area behind the top of the shoulder blade down to the point of the shoulder and above the belly line.
 - White in the body cavity is only acceptable in the following instances:
 - § White is a continuation of the feathering
 - § White is at the fore and/or rear flanks similar to Hereford color pattern
 - § White spotting not collectively larger than 9 inches (basketball size) in diameter per side (cannot be all on the same side)
 - Skunk tail cattle are permitted provided the white above the rectum does not exceed the amount of white spotting allowed (basketball size)
 - Absent of diluter gene
 - No roan or brindle cattle permitted

- -Other European Breeds & Crosses: Steers of any coloration pattern are acceptable.
- *For complete listing of breed standards please review the 2017-2022 Texas Show Steer Breed Classification Guidelines.
- 11. A three-man classifying system will be used for classifying all steers.
- 12. No sifted steers will be sold. All sifted steers are required to leave grounds immediately.
- 13. All steers to be floored should be taken to the floor pen, outside the show arena, immediately following their class. All floored animals MUST be in the designated area by thirty minutes after the selection of the Grand Champion Steer. After the thirty minute time period following the show, animals are not guaranteed the ability to be floored. Steers may not be floored without a valid and correct disposition form.
- 14. All steers must be shorn prior to arrival at the fairgrounds. Hair must not exceed $\frac{1}{2}$ " on any location of the body excluding the tail switch. The tail switch being no more than 12 inches above the end of the cartilage of the tail. Steers will be checked at classification for $\frac{1}{2}$ " length; violation of $\frac{1}{2}$ " uniform length over the entire body will result in immediate disqualification.
- 15. No trimming on the grounds. No trim chutes.
- 16. The Champion Steer from each breed division will compete for Grand Champion Steer. Reserve Champion steers from each breed division are required to be brought into the arena. The Reserve Champion Steer from the breed division furnishing the Grand Champion Steer will become eligible to compete for Reserve Grand Champion Steer.
- 17. The Grand Champion Steer, Reserve Grand Champion Steer and all first and second place steers must sell in the premium sale, and will not receive any additional premiums. The Stock Show & Rodeo Association guarantees each steer sold in the Premium Sale a premium price of \$500.00 above the packer bid, provided a packer bid available. All 1st and 2nd place exhibitors are required to attend the sale, Saturday, April 16, unless a substitute exhibitor exception is granted by show management. Any exhibitor not in attendance and that does not have an approved substitute exhibitor will forfeit premium sale monies.
- 18. Health papers are not required.
- 19. Steers must be dehorned, polled or scurred. Scurs/horn growth must not exceed three inches from the base of the head.
- 20. All ear tags except the Texas validation tag must be removed before steers enter the classifying area.
- 21. Only the exhibitor (or approved substitute) may lead their steer into the staging area or judging arena. One parent/guardian will be allowed to be in the staging area with their child, only if their child's animal is required to take a drug test. There will be a designated area within the staging area for drug testing. No other persons will be permitted into those areas.
- 22. Show management, Livestock Committee Leadership, and/or Ring Stewards reserve the right to remove an unruly animal from the show. Cattle must be shown with a halter and sufficiently tame enough to be properly handled by the exhibitor as entered. Cattle shows will follow a three strike rule. If an animal is to

become uncontrollable or not within the exhibitors possession more than two times, the exhibitor and the animal will be excused from the ring and disqualified on the third time. If the exhibiting of an animal poses a danger to the exhibitor and/or other parties, Show Management reserves the right to allow remove the project from competition immediately; this includes but is not limited to charging, excessive kicking, etc. Show Management, also reserves the right to remove that animal before the third strike rule, if they feel it is a necessity for the safety of exhibitors and/or other parties.

- 2. To be eligible to exhibit in the 2022 Barrow Show, all barrows must be validated in the Texas 4-H and FFA Swine Validation Program. Each entry must have been recorded on a 4-H or FFA Swine Validation Form Master List between November 1 and November 30. Exhibitors must have owned and cared for their barrows continuously since November 30, 2021.

A hair follicle sample will be collected from all breed champions and all reserve breed champions and a DNA analysis will be conducted on each of these samples. The Barrow Show Committee may also collect a hair sample from any other barrow entry for the purpose of conducting a DNA analysis. Any barrow not having a positive match from the DNA analysis of this hair follicle sample, compared to the DNA analysis of the hair follicle sample taken at the time of enrollment in the validation program, will be disqualified.

Validation tags will be used for identification. Separate tags will not be issued.

- 3. Previous exhibitors of the Grand Champion Barrow are not eligible to enter the Junior Barrow Show.
- 4. Each exhibitor will be permitted to enter no more than two (2) barrows.
- 5. Barrows will be stalled in the Gandy Ink Livestock Barn. To enter the grounds for livestock unloading and loading, all trailers will enter the fairgrounds on the North side at Gate 6 off of Lake View Heroes Drive. There will be two lots indicated for trailer staging. At the direction of officials, trailers will be allowed to back up to the West Side of the Livestock Barn for unloading. Once unloaded, vehicles will exit Gate 2, circle back towards Gate 6 to proceed toward the trailer lot.

- 6. Pen assignments will be made upon arrival.
- 7. Official disposition forms must be picked up from the staging area when getting pen assignments at the time of check in. Exhibitors will be required to turn in official disposition cards (Herein after referred to as weight cards) after the completion of the Self-Check-In process at the kiosks located in the Sale Pavilion.

To check in, Exhibitors will scan the independent barcode located on the weight card. Exhibitors will be prompted by the kiosk to enter all information from the weight cards, such as breed, weight, etc. The Self-Check-In process is subject to change. All four weight cards must be filled out in addition to the information entered in the kiosk. The information entered into the kiosk at Self-Check-In must match the weight cards and will prevail in the instance of a discrepancy. All information must be entered into the kiosk and weight cards turn into show personnel by 4:00 pm on the day of check-in.

After completing the Self-Check-In, the kiosk will generate a confirmation receipt. It is the responsibility of the Exhibitor to ensure that all information on the receipt is correct. Exhibitors must submit the weight cards in its entirety to show personnel, who will then give the exhibitor a portion back that will be required for placement on the truck. It is recommended that exhibitors keep confirmation receipts from the kiosk throughout the duration of the show.

Superintendents will break classes immediately following the weight card & Self-Check-In deadline.

- 8. Barrows weighing less than 250 pounds or more than 290 pounds will be sifted. There will be a 10 pound weigh back on both the top and bottom of the weight submitted.
- 9. The Barrow Show Superintendent will have the right to weigh any animal in the barn at any time. Any animal not weighing within 10 pounds of the weight turned in will be sifted and sold based on their actual weight and not the weight in which was turned in on their disposition card. There will be a \$20.00 penalty charge taken from the exhibitor's floor check.
- 10. Barrows will be designated for re-weighing during judging in the show arena at a time designated by the Superintendent. Any barrow leaving the show ring and later returning for additional judging will be reweighed. Any barrow not weighing within 10 pounds of his initial official show weight will become ineligible for any award or the premium sale.

Barrows coming back for the grand drive may be reweighed before the start of the grand drive, by superintendents. Any barrow from Wave 1 not weighing within 20 pounds of his initial official show weight will become ineligible to compete. Any barrow from Wave 2 not weighing within 15 pounds of his initial official show weight will become ineligible to compete. Barrows weighing out in the grand drive will still sell in the premium sale as a breed champion. If a champion barrow weighs out and is disqualified, the reserve champion within the same breed division will be able to compete for grand.

- 11. There will be no clipping of barrows after arrival. No artificial color, paste, powder, oil or other dressing is allowed.
- 12. There will be no washing of feed pans in the wash rack at any time. Do not dump or wash pans inside the barn. Dumpsters will be located just outside the barn for excess feed and trash.

- 13. The Junior Market Barrow Show is a terminal show. All barrows arriving on the grounds must be sold (included sifted, non-placing and ribbon winning barrows) according to show procedure.
- 14. All barrows remain the property of the exhibitor until they are loaded on the packer truck. Any unethical practice will release the show from liability and remains the responsibility of the exhibitor. In the event the Stock Show is unable to obtain an adequate packer bid, all animals will remain in the possession of the exhibitor and will be taken home by the exhibitor.
- 15. All animals that qualify for the sale must sell in the premium sale and will not receive any additionally premium monies. All 1st and 2nd place exhibitors are required to attend the sale, Saturday, April 16, unless a substitute exhibitor exception is granted by show management. Any exhibitor not in attendance and that does not have an approved substitute exhibitor will forfeit premium sale monies.
- 16. Health Certificates are not required.
- 17. All 1^{st} & 2^{nd} place exhibitors are required to attend the premium sale. 3^{rd} place exhibitors do **NOT** attend the sale but are eligible for add ons.
- 18. Hereford barrows will be allowed to show in the Dark OPB division.
- 19. The crossbred division will be split into Light Crossbred and Dark Crossbred. See classification information below for details. There will be a total of TEN crossbred classes, that will be split into each color division after arrival based on the percentage of entries in each division.
- 20. Barrows may be classified by a classifying team, breed must be determined upon check in. Show management reserves the right to re-classify any barrow entered.

BARROW SHOW CLASSIFICATION STANDARDS

Barrows will NOT be classified but must follow these classification standards.

BERKSHIRE

- 1. Black and white with erect ears exhibiting Berkshire character.
- 2. A Berkshire must have white on face and tail (unless tail is docked). Three of the four legs must be white.
- 3. A Berkshire must **NOT** have a solid white or a solid black face from the ears forward.
- 4. A Berkshire must **NOT** have a solid black nose (rim of nose).
- 5. White is allowed on the ears, but neither ear can be entirely white.
- 6. An occasional splash of white may appear on the body.

CHESTER WHITE (LIGHT OPB)

- 1. Must possess Chester White breed character.
- 2. Must be solid white in color, no color on the skin larger than a silver dollar, no colored hair.
- 3. Ears must be down and medium size.
- 4. Any signs of weighted ear tags or evidence of past existence of such ear tags are determined to be not permissible and are grounds for disqualification

DARK CROSSBRED

- 1. Barrows with black and/or red pigmentation, (i.e. not sandy, rusty, orange, roan, gray or blue) on any part of the body amounting to 20% <u>or more</u> of total body area.
- 2. Barrows may be black or red belted, black or red patched or spotted.
- 3. Barrows with only blue, rusty, sandy, orange, and gray pigmentation are **NOT** considered a Dark Cross.

DUROC

- 1. Must be red in color and possess Duroc breed character. (ears must be down and medium size)
- 2. Must **NOT** have any white hair located on the animal.
- 3. Must **NOT** have any black hair.
- 4. Must **NOT** have more than three black spots on the skin and none of these spots can be larger than two inches in diameter.
- 5. Must **NOT** have any shading or indication of a belt.

HAMPSHIRE

- 1. Must be black in color with a white belt starting on a front leg. The belt may partially or totally encircle the body.
- 2. Must possess Hampshire Breed character. (ears must be erect and not rounded)
- 3. Must **NOT** have any white hair or indications of streaking on the forehead.
- 4. Must **NOT** have any red hair.

LANDRACE (LIGHT OPB)

- 1. Must be white in color and possess Landrace breed character. (ears must be down)
- 2. Must **NOT** allow any color hair other than white.
- 3. Must **NOT** allow more than three spots of skin pigmentation.
- 4. Must **NOT** allow any spot of skin pigmentation larger than one U.S. minted quarter.

LIGHT CROSSBRED

- 1. Barrows with blue, gray, sandy, rusty, orange or roan pigmentation. (coloration may be belted, patched or spotted.)
- 2. Barrows with predominately white, blue, gray, rusty, orange or roan pigmentation which have small areas of black and/or red pigmentation on any part of the body that amount to <u>less</u> than 20% of total body area.

POLAND CHINA (DARK OPB)

- 1. Must possess Poland China breed character.
- 2. Must be black with a white face and switch (unless tail is docked). Three of the four legs must be white. May have an occasional splash of white on the body.
- 3. Must have ears down.
- 4. Must not have evidence of belt formation.

- 5. Cannot have any red or sandy hair and/or pigment.
- 6. Hogs that have weighted ear tags or evidence of tampering of ears with possible ear tags are ineligible.

SPOTTED SWINE (DARK OPB)

- 1. Must be black and white.
- 2. Must possess Spotted breed character.
- 3. Ears cannot be erect.
- 4. Any red tinted or brown spots are ineligible.
- 5. No solid black head from ears forward.
- 6. No distinct white belt pattern (hair or skin) encircling and extending down and onto each shoulder.
- 7. Any signs of weighted ear tags or evidence of past existence such ear tags are determined to be not permissible and are grounds for disqualification.

YORKSHIRE

- 1. Must be white in color and possess Yorkshire breed character. (ears must be erect)
- 2. Must **NOT** have any colored hair other than white.
- 3. Must **NOT** have colored skin pigmentation larger than one U.S. minted silver dollar.
- 4. Must not have masking above the eyes larger than a silver dollar.

1. All rules apply to the Junior Market Lamb Show. Please refer to the General Rules and Junior Show Rules.

2. To be eligible to exhibit in the 2022 Junior Market Lamb Show, a lamb must be validated in the Texas 4-H and FFA Lamb Validation Program. Each entry must have been recorded on a 4-H or FFA Sheep Validation Form between October 1 and October 31. Exhibitors must have owned and cared for their animals continuously since October 31, 2021.

Hair follicle samples will be collected from all Breed Champions and all Reserve Champions, and a DNA analysis will be conducted on each of these hair follicle samples. The Lamb Committee may also collect hair follicle samples from any other lamb entry for the purpose of conducting a DNA analysis. Any lamb not having a positive match from the DNA analysis of the hair follicle samples, compared to the DNA analysis of the hair follicle sample taken from it at the time of enrollment in the validation program, will be disqualified. Any lamb without a valid TLBA tag from the breeder of the lamb placed in the ear of the lamb and recorded on Texas Lamb Validation paperwork will be disqualified.

The validation tag will be the show tag. A separate tag will not be issued.

- 3. To be eligible to exhibit in the 2022 Junior Market Lamb Show, a lamb must be bred by a member of the Texas Lamb Breeder's Association, and have an official TLBA tag belonging to the breeder of the lamb in its ear. Tags are to be obtained from the breeder of the lamb. TLBA tags must be present in the ear of the animal at the time of validation through the Texas 4-H and FFA Lamb Validation Program and <u>must be recorded on official validation paperwork.</u> The TLBA tag must be present in the lamb's ear at the show as well.
- 4. Previous exhibitors of the Grand Champion Lamb are ineligible to enter the Market Lamb Show.
- 5. Each exhibitor is entitled to enter five (5) total lambs, with no more than two (2) per breed. ONLY wethers may be shown. Exhibitors are only entitled to two (2) premium awards per breed.
- 6. Lambs will be allowed to arrive from 12:00 p.m. (Noon) until 5:00 p.m., Friday, February 4, 2022. All animals in line by 5:00 p.m., Friday will be allowed to unload Friday evening. Trailers arriving after 5:00 p.m., Friday, February 4, will not be unloading until arrival resumes at 8:00 a.m., Saturday, February 5, 2022. All trailers must be on grounds and in line for unloading by 1:00 p.m., Saturday, February 5.

7. Lambs will be stalled in the Gandy Ink Livestock Barn. To enter the grounds for livestock unloading and loading, all trailers will enter the fairgrounds on the west side at Gate 5 off of Grape Creek Road. At the direction of officials, trailers will be allowed to back up to the West Side of the Gandy Ink Livestock Barn for unloading. Once unloaded, vehicles will exit Gate 2, circle back towards Gate 6 off of Lake View Hero's Drive to proceed toward the trailer lot.



8. Only one tack vehicle will be allowed per trailer to unload at the barn to unload.

9. Official disposition forms must be picked up in front of the show office at the time of check in. Exhibitors will be required to turn in official disposition cards (Herein after referred to as weight cards) after the completion of the Self-Check-In process at the kiosks located in the Sale Pavilion.

To check in, Exhibitors will scan the independent barcode located on the weight card. Exhibitors will be prompted by the kiosk to enter all information from the weight cards, such as breed, weight, etc. The Self-Check-In process is subject to change. All four weight cards must be filled out in addition to the information entered in the kiosk. The information entered into the kiosk at Self-Check-In must match the weight cards and will prevail in the instance of a discrepancy. All information must be entered into the kiosk and weight cards turn into show personnel by 4:00 pm on the day of check-in.

After completing the Self-Check-In, the kiosk will generate a confirmation receipt. It is the responsibility of the Exhibitor to ensure that all information on the receipt is correct. - 10. All weight classes will be broken after arrival. The five-pound weigh back is applicable on light weight classes. There will be no pre-set lightweight classes.
- 11. Finewool, Finewool Cross and Medium Wool lambs weighing less than 100 pounds and Southdown and Dorper lambs weighing less than 90 pounds will be sifted. No Junior Market Lamb may weigh over 170 pounds. There will be a 5 pound weigh back on the top and bottom of the weight submitted.
- 12. Lambs will be designated for re-weighing during judging in the show arena at a time determined by the Market Lamb Show Superintendent. Any lamb weighing more than 5 pounds above or below his initial official show weight will become ineligible for any award or premium sale and may be assessed a \$10.00 cwt. penalty. Lambs coming back for the grand drive may be reweighed before the start of the grand drive, by superintendents. Any lamb not within 5 pounds of his initial official show weight will become ineligible to compete, however will still sell in the premium sale as a breed champion. If a breed champion lamb weighs out, the reserve breed champion within the same breed division will be able to compete for grand. No other animals will be allowed to advance placing.
- 13. All market lambs must possess no more than their first set of yearling teeth, at the time of classification.

- 14. Three man classifying system will be used. Lambs that are classified out will progress to the appropriate breed division. Finewools classified will advance to Finewool Cross, and Finewool Crosses, Southdowns, and Dorpers classified will advance to the Medium Wool Division. Exhibitors should be familiar with the current Classification Guidelines for market lambs.
- 15. All lambs must be shorn prior to arrival on grounds. The pelt must be uniform in length over entire body at the time of showing. Boots will be optional and no top knots will be allowed.
- 16. No electrical equipment of any kind is allowed. Hay, heat lamps, ice packs or propane heaters will not be allowed in the barns. CLIPPERS, BLOWERS, BLOCKING TABLES, BLOCKING STATIONS, ETC. ARE NOT ALLOWED IN THE BARNS! Head stalls will be permitted if attached to the INSIDE of a pen. NO BASES ALLOWED. Battery powered clippers will be allowed for touch-ups.
- 17. The only tags lambs may have in their ears are State Validation, TLBA, and Federal Scrapie tags. All others must be removed.
- 18. Lambs may be washed after arrival.
- 19. The Junior Market Lamb show is a terminal show, thus there will be no "take-home" lambs. All lambs arriving at the show MUST BE SOLD (including sifted, non-placing and ribbon winning lambs) according to the show procedure. In the event that the Stock Show is unable to obtain an adequate packer bid, all animals will remain in the possession of the exhibitor and will be taken home by the exhibitor.
- 20. All animals that qualify for the sale must sell in the Premium Sale and will not receive any additional premiums or floor monies. Animals placing 5th through 10th will not receive any floor monies in the Finewool, Finewool Cross, Southdown and Medium Wool breeds. Dorper lambs placing 3rd through 5th place will not receive any additional floor monies.
- 21. All 1st and 2nd place exhibitors are required to attend the premium sale. 3rd and 4th place exhibitors do **NOT** attend the sale, but are eligible for add-on money. All 1st and 2nd place exhibitors are required to attend the sale, Saturday, April 16, unless a substitute exhibitor exception is granted by show management. Any exhibitor not in attendance and that does not have an approved substitute exhibitor will forfeit premium sale monies.
- 22. Health papers are not required.

Should the Reserve Grand champion market goat come out of the same class as the Grand Champion Market Goat, then the second place class winner will also have hair follicle samples collected. The Market Goat Committee may also collect hair follicle samples from any other market goat entry for the purpose of conducting a DNA analysis. Any market goat not having a positive match from the DNA analysis of this hair follicle sample, compared to the DNA analysis of the hair follicle sample taken from it at the time of enrollment in the validation program, will be disqualified.

Validation tags will be used. A separate tag will not be issued.

- 3. Previous exhibitors of the Grand Champion Market Goat are ineligible to enter the Junior Market Goat Show.
- 4. Each exhibitor is entitled to enter no more than two (2) market goats.

At the direction of officials, trailers will be allowed to back up to the West Side of the Gandy Ink Livestock Barn for unloading. Once unloaded, vehicles will exit Gate 2, circle back towards Gate 6 to proceed toward the trailer lot.

Any entry weighing more or less than 4 pounds above or below the initial official show weight will become ineligible for any award or premium sale and may be assessed a \$10 cwt penalty. Goats coming back for the grand drive may be reweighed before the start of the grand drive, by superintendents. Any goat not within 4 pounds of his initial official show weight will become ineligible to compete, however will still sell in the premium sale as a division champion. If a division champion goat weighs out, the reserve division champion within the same division will be able to compete for grand.
- 11. There is no tooth rule.
- 12. Goats must be UNIFORMLY shorn 3/8" or less above the knee and hock joints before arrival on the grounds. NO clipping will be allowed on the grounds. Removal of horns on grounds is not permitted. No sharp points allowed on horns.
- 13. No painting, powdering, or artificial coloring is allowed.
- 14. No electrical equipment of any kind is allowed. Hay, heat lamps, ice packs, or propane heaters will not be allowed in the barns. CLIPPERS, BLOWERS, BLOCKING TABLES, BLOCKING STATIONS, ETC. ARE NOT ALLOWED IN THE BARNS! Head stalls will be permitted if attached to the INSIDE of a pen. NO BASES ALLOWED. Battery powered clippers are allowed for touch-ups.
- 15. The only tags goats may have in their ears are State Validation, Federal Scrapie tags, and Texas Goat Breeders' Association. All others must be removed.

1. All rules apply to the Junior Rabbit Show. Please refer to the General Rules and Junior Show Rules.

- 2. All exhibitors must check in between 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. Substitutions will be allowed only in the Commercial and Fancy division between 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. Substitutions may only be made if the animals are within the same breed, sex and class and will not be accepted after the show begins. There will be a \$1.00 charge for substitution. No changes or substitutions will be allowed in the Market Division.
- 3. There will be a designated area for exhibitors, staff, and Superintendents only. Parents may help exhibitors but **MAY NOT PLACE RABBITS ON TABLES.** The superintendents or staff will assist the exhibitors in doing this.
- 4. Each exhibitor will be responsible for furnishing carriers and waterers for their exhibits. Standard size 1, 2 or 3 hole carriers with bottoms (not larger than 24 x 24) are allowed. NO CAGES.
- 5. All rabbits MUST have a legible and permanent tattoo in the left ear and the tattoo <u>MUST</u> be sent with entry form at time of entry or entry will be disqualified. ALL OF THE NUMBERS MUST BE LISTED ON THE ENTRY FORM EXACTLY AS TATOOED IN THE EAR. DO NOT DUPLICATE NUMBERS. Trio Fryer entries MUST have three different numbers and be indicated as a trio entry on the entry form (Example D1, D2, D3). If tattoo is not readable and does not match entry card, entry will be disqualified.
- 6. No tattooing will be allowed on the fairgrounds. Entries will be disqualified- no exceptions.
- 7. Rabbits should be free of all disease symptoms. Rabbits showing signs of disease will not be allowed to show. Rabbits showing signs of sickness may be pulled at any time during the show by the superintendent only and at the superintendent's discretion. Any rabbit with symptoms of disease MUST BE IMMEDIATELY REMOVED from the barn.
- 8. Rabbits will be called to the table 3 times only, and then will be eliminated. Market entries will be weighed in, and then placed on the table.
- 9. There will be two judges for the show. One judge will place meat pens and fancy rabbits, while the other places commercial rabbits. The two judges will be working simultaneously. If an exhibitor has rabbits showing on both tables, a substitute exhibitor will be allowed.
- Showmanship will be judged with each exhibitor asked to handle and present one rabbit for showing.
 There will be a junior and senior class buckle awarded.

- 11. The Champion, Reserve Champion and 3rd Place Market Division Rabbits will receive the following premiums respectively, \$500, \$250, & \$125. Rabbits will **NOT** sell in the Premium Sale.
- 12. Health papers are not required.
- 13. Rabbits will be shown in the 1st Community Federal Credit Union Spur Arena. Exhibitors should enter Gate 6 off of Lake View Heroes Drive (formerly 50th Street). Exhibitors will be allowed to unload their animals at the Spur Arena, and then park in the lot North of the Horse Barn.

- 1. All rules apply to the Junior Heifer Show. Please refer to the General Rules and Junior Show Rules. Additionally, read the specific breed rules for additional information.
- 2. To be eligible to exhibit in the 2022 Junior Heifer Show, all heifers must be validated in the Texas 4-H and FFA Heifer Validation Program. Each entry must have been recorded on a 4-H or FFA Heifer Validation Form Master List between October 1 and November 14. Additionally, a copy of the original registration paper of each heifer must be uploaded through the Texas 4-H and FFA Validation Program by November 14, 2021. Exhibitors must have owned and cared for their heifers continuously since November 1, 2021.

A hair follicle sample will be collected from all breed champions and all reserve breed champions and DNA analysis will be conducted on each of these hair follicle samples. The Heifer Committee(s) may also collect a hair follicle sample from any other heifer entry for the purpose of conducting a DNA analysis. Any heifer not having a positive match from the DNA analysis of this hair follicle sample, compared to the DNA analysis of the hair follicle sample taken from it at the time of enrollment in the validation program will be disqualified.

All potential substitute heifers must meet the validation requirements.

- 3. All exhibitors must have owned the heifers shown in the name continuously since November 1, 2021, and the official registration certificate must indicate that the exhibitor was the sole owner of the heifer on or before November 1, 2021 and that the registration certificate was processed by the respective breed association on or before November 1, 2021.
- 4. Exhibitors are only allowed to enter a maximum of three (3) heifers total regardless of wave or breed.

- 5. To be eligible to show, all heifers must have been calved after September 1, 2019.
- 6. All animals must be registered in the exhibitor's name.
- 7. Substitutions are only allowed within the same breed, and there is no charge for substitutions. A substitute from one breed to another is considered a division change, and a \$100 division change fee applies. Substitutions of heifers already entered may be made as long as the substituted heifer conforms to all rules applying to its specific show.
- 8. **THIS IS A NON-FIT SHOW. BLOW & SHOW ONLY!** Show sheen products will be allowed, however the use of paint, glue or other adhesives on your heifers is prohibited.
- 9. No Trim Chutes will be allowed during the Junior Breeding Heifer Show.
- 10. Stalls will not be assigned until heifer(s) arrive on fairgrounds. Reservations for stalls or tie outs will not be taken. Tack/bedding arriving before heifer(s) will not be allowed to unload or be set up in barn without heifer(s) present. Once purchased tie-outs are non-refundable.
 - Dirt tie outs: \$20/each cash only, no refunds
 - Asphalt tie outs: \$15/each cash only, no refunds
 - o The use of the outdoor arena pens for tie outs will NOT be permitted
- 10. All exhibitors will be issued a show number for each heifer entered in the show, and no heifer will be allowed in the show ring to be judged unless the exhibitor leading the heifer is wearing the number assigned to the heifer being shown.
- 11. Exhibitors entering this show are eligible to enter the All Breed Junior Heifer Futurity. However, entry to the Futurity requires separate designation on the entry form, as well as, additional entry fees. Exhibitors are NOT automatically entered into the Futurity.
- 12. An animal that is disqualified for ANY REASON in its respective breed show will be disqualified from the Heifer Futurity, as well. Additionally, the exhibitor will be required to forfeit any premiums, ribbons and/or any other prizes won in the Futurity Show, but in no event shall it affect the order of finish of any of the other animals competing in the Futurity Show.
- 13. The exhibitor of the Grand Champion Angus, ARB, Beefmaster, Brangus, Braunvieh, Charolais, Chianina, Hereford, Limousin, Maine Anjou, ORB, Red Angus, Santa Gertrudis, Shorthorn, and Simmental Heifer will receive a \$500.00 incentive. The exhibitor of the Reserve Champion Angus, ARB, Beefmaster, Brangus, Braunvieh, Charolais, Chianina, Hereford, Limousin, Maine Anjou, ORB, Red Angus, Santa Gertrudis, Shorthorn, and Simmental Heifer will receive a \$250.00 incentive. Incentive recipients may enter future shows and may receive another incentive. Exhibitors must be present and exhibiting their own animal to be awarded the incentive.
- 14. Show management, Livestock Committee Leadership and/or Ring Stewards reserve the right to remove an unruly animal from the show. Cattle must be shown with a halter and sufficiently tame enough to be properly handled by the exhibitor. Cattle shows will follow a three strike rule. If an animal is to become uncontrollable or not within the exhibitors possession more than two times, the exhibitor and the animal will be excused from the ring and disqualified on the third time. If the exhibiting of an animal poses a

danger to the exhibitor and/or other parties, Show Management reserves the right to remove the project from competition immediately, i.e. charging, excessive kicking, etc.

1. All animals to be eligible to show must be recorded in the American Angus Association Record. Exhibitors must file with the Stock Show Office the name and herd book of each animal entered.

- 2. Only Black Angus are allowed in this show.
- 3. All exhibitors are eligible to compete for a Junior or Senior Showmanship award. Exhibitors 13 years old or younger on January 1, 2022, will be eligible to compete for Jr. Showmanship, and exhibitors 14 years old or older on January 1, 2022 will be eligible to compete for Sr. Showmanship.
- 4. If any classes have an excessive number of entries, they will be divided into two or more classes according to American Angus Association guidelines.

The American Angus Association, 3201 Frederick Avenue, St. Joseph, MO, will participate in premiums offered in individual classes for Junior Angus heifers, as included in its standard show classifications, according to the premium schedule based on the number of head shown. The Association's contributions will be included in the premium checks issued by the show.

A minimum of fifteen (15) head must be shown in the Junior Angus heifer classes to receive American Angus Association premium participation. The show is not required to have all classes to be eligible for premiums. Separate classes for bred and owned heifers may be held if the size of the show merits a separate class.

To be eligible for association premiums, the entries must be recorded in the sole name of the junior exhibitor and the issue date on the registration certificate must conform to the individuals show's requirements regarding ownership. The Association's contribution is included in the total premiums listed in each class. Premiums from the Association are paid only to registered Angus cattle and only if the registration number is a part of the show report provided to the Association. Therefore, all cattle should be registered at the time of entry to make certain they receive the Association's portion of premiums. The Association does not pay a percentage on premiums offered in the championship classes. An animal may only be counted one time toward the total count for premium participation by the Association.

Exhibitors must have the original registration certificate on each animal available for inspection at the show.

Any animal, upon check-in, which does not have a legible permanent identification mark (ear tattoo marks, freeze-branded marks or hot-branded marks) corresponding to the permanent identification mark on the registration certificate, is ineligible to show. Once disqualified due to an incorrect or illegible permanent identification mark, animals cannot be re-tattooed and rechecked at the show.

When any female is shown with a calf at side, the calf must be the cow's most recent natural calf, and the calf must be registered by show date and have the original registration certificate at check in.

Only one person at a time shall lead animals into the show ring.

Any product administered internally or used externally to alter the conformation and/or appearance of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes the covering of white skin, false tail heads (or use of any false hair); use of graphite, powders, hemp or other similar substances exhibition of cattle displaying false hair will not be allowed, with the exception of false tail switches.

For an exhibitor to be eligible at shows for premium monies contributed by the American Angus Association, each exhibitor is subject to Part 3, Section IX of the Association's rules entitled "Eligibility, Conformation, and Structure of Animals Presented for Exhibition." Included in this is Rule 11: "Effective July 1, 2004, at any show for which the American Angus Association appropriates funds toward the payment of premiums, no exhibitors, member owners, or individuals assisting an exhibitors at such show shall be allowed to use any coloring agents on any animal exhibited." The Association may adopt and implement various tests designed to monitor this prohibition, including but not limited to a "white towel" or "white glove" text. No aerosol cans or other pressurized containers will be allowed in designated make up areas.

DNA marker or blood type for parentage verification – Under Association Rules each animal, for which entry application (registration) is received, may be subjected to a DNA marker type or blood type test to verify ACCURACY OF PARENTAGE as covered under Association Rules. Staff of the American Angus Association must supervise the collection of DNA or blood samples. Animals are often sampled at shows, fairs, or events where the American Angus Association contributes premiums or where Association personnel participate.

If a recorded parent is excluded (as a parent) as a result of DNA or blood type, the owner may request, at his own expense, the Association to determine the actual parent. Failure to determine the sire and dam disqualifies the animal's eligibility in the Angus Herd Book and the registration certificate becomes null and void.

Alteration or modification shall be defined to include any surgical, chemical, electrical or other (including banding or other circulatory constriction) appearance change for cosmetic purpose, save only branding, tattooing, foot trimming or dehorning. Silicone injection or other injection for cosmetic purpose shall be prohibited. Anabolic steroid use shall likewise be prohibited and any animal testing positive for anabolic steroid or diuretic use shall be presumed to be altered and modified." **

 - B. A statement must appear that says the animal has not been fed garbage, has not been exposed to hog cholera or pseudorabies, does not originate from a quarantined herd, nor has the herd of origin had PRV within the last six months, nor have the entries themselves been vaccinated for PRV.
 - C. Gilt identification must be included on health certificate in form of validation number and ear notches.
 - D. ALL gilts must have tested negative for Brucellosis and Pseudorabies. Blood test must have been conducted within 30 days prior to the show. Results should be listed on health certificate.

All health certificates left in possession of show management at the conclusion of all Gilt Shows will be disposed of. Exhibitors must pick up health certificate in Livestock Office before leaving the fairgrounds.

- B. A statement must appear that says the animal has not been fed garbage, has not been exposed to hog cholera or pseudorabies, does not originate from a quarantined herd, nor has the herd of origin had PRV within the last six months, nor have the entries themselves been vaccinated for PRV.
- C. Gilt identification must be included on health certificate in form of validation number and ear notches.
- D. All gilts must have tested negative for Brucellosis and Pseudorabies. Blood test must have been conducted 30 days prior to the show date. Results should be listed on health certificate.

All health certificates left in possession of show management at the conclusion of all Gilt Shows will be disposed of. Exhibitors must pick up health certificate in Livestock Office before leaving the fairgrounds.

6. **Pedigreed Division:** Purebred classes will be broken by age following check-in. Gilts must have been farrowed between July 1st and September 15th, 2021. Classes will be divided equally, with not more than three classes per breed. Classes will be divided equally, with not more than three classes per breed. Purebreds will follow an 8 breed format, with these breeds being eligible: Berkshire, Chester Whites, Duroc, Hampshire, Landrace, Poland China, Spots, and Yorkshire. *Any breed that has 10 or more pedigreed animals entered will be judged as a separate breed. Breeds with less than 10 pedigreed animals entered will be judged in the OPB class.* The number of divisions/classes of the OPB's will be determined by the superintendent. In the event two breeds must be combined into an OPB class, they will follow the last purebred breed division with 15 head. Depending on the number of pedigreed gilts, show management reserves the right to establish additional classes within these breed divisions.

Hereford gilts are eligible to show in the Non-pedigreed division. Registration papers are not required.

7. **Non-Pedigreed Division:** Classes will be broken by weight following the weight card deadline. Classes will be divided as evenly as possible, with no less than 15 head per any class. Gilts will be divided into three major divisions by weight: Light, Medium and Heavy. Depending on the number of crossbred gilts, show management reserves the right to establish additional classes within these major divisions.

Non-pedigreed gilts must weigh a minimum of 230 pounds and there is no maximum weight. Weight cards must be turned in by 11:00 a.m., February 13, 2022 and all non-pedigreed gilts eligible for placing will be subject to re-weigh. There will be a 10 pound weigh-back on both the top and bottom. If a gilt does not weigh within 10 pounds of turned in weight, it will be disqualified.

- 8. **Champion Drives:** All pedigreed breed champions and reserve breed champions will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Pedigreed Gilt. All three major weight division champions in the Non-Pedigreed Division will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Non-Pedigreed Gilt. The Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Pedigreed Gilt and the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Non-Pedigreed Gilt will compete for Supreme Champion and Reserve Supreme Champion.
- 9. **Sale:** Approximately 60 gilts will be eligible to sell in the Junior Stars Gilt Sale. **All gilts selected to the sale must sell- no exceptions.** Sale order will be determined by the sale committee and judge(s). There is

no limit to the number of head an exhibitor may sell. All gilts will sell as is, the show management makes no guarantees. A 15% commission will be collected on each gilt in the sale to assist in marketing expenses for the event. **Please review the Select Gilt Sale rules page.**

- 10. **Non-Sale Gilts:** Gilts that are not selected for the Junior Stars Select Gilt Sale will be released and considered "take-home." All non-sale gilts must leave the facility one hour after the selection of Supreme and Reserve Supreme Champion Gilt. Stock Show releases will be required and may be obtained from the show superintendents or designated personnel.
- 11. **Incentives:** Each breed champion in the Pedigreed Division and each of the three (3) major division winners in the Non-Pedigreed Division will receive a \$500 incentive. Each reserve breed champion in the Pedigreed Division and each of the three (3) major division reserve champions in the Non-Pedigreed Division will receive a \$250 incentive.
- 12. Exhibitors are eligible to receive multiple incentives. Exhibitors must be present and exhibiting their animal to receive the incentives.
- 13. Exhibitors of non-pedigreed animals will be required to complete a pedigree form listing the sire and sire of dam at time of check-in.
- 14. Pens will be assigned at the staging lot. In order to pen together you must arrive together. Please haul with your club or chapter.
- 15. Gilts will be stalled in the Gandy Ink Livestock Barn. To enter the grounds for livestock unloading and loading, all trailers will enter the fairgrounds on the North side at Gate 5 off of Grape Creek Road. At the direction of officials, trailers will be allowed to back up to the West Side of the Gandy Ink Livestock Barn for unloading. Once unloaded, vehicles will exit Gate 2, circle back towards Gate 6 to proceed toward the trailer lot.
- 16. **Division Transfers:** Exhibitors will be charged a \$100 fee for any division transfers made after the time of entry up to the time of check in.
- ***Please be familiar with Rule #5 in the Texas 4-H/FFA Livestock Program Ethics Policy:
- "Animals validated for major shows may also be exhibited at other shows. Be advised, however, that if any validated animal is exhibited and SOLD at any other show, the animal will be ineligible to show at any subsequent major show. If ownership changes, regardless of method or length of time, that chain of animal ownership is considered broken."

- 2. All pedigreed animals will be required to have their original registration certificates from the appropriate breed registry. Animals must be registered in the herd book of their association in the name of the junior owner on or before December 1, the year preceding the show.
- 3. Please review Animal Health Regulations for the 2022 Stock Show for complete requirements for all gilts exhibited in the 2022 Show. These requirements should cover all main health regulations of a gilt purchased and taken to another state, however, it is the purchaser's responsibility to understand all requirements for entrance to their state and meet any additional requirements that may not be covered.

2022 ANIMAL HEALTH REGULATIONS

BREEDING GILTS

- 1. All certificates must be issued on or after January 17, 2022, with the following information:
 - A. Leptospirosis vaccination is required on breeding swine within 30 days prior to date of the sale (on or after January 16, 2021) with vaccine containing the following strains: Canicola, Hardjo, Icterohaemorrhagiae, Grippotyphosa, and Pomona. Vaccination date must appear on the health certificate.
 - B. A statement must appear that says the animal has not been fed garbage, has not been exposed to hog cholera or pseudorabies, does not originate from a quarantined herd, nor has the herd of origin had PRV within the last six months, nor have the entries themselves been vaccinated for PRV.
 - C. Gilt identification must be included on health certificate in form of validation number and ear notches.
 - D. All gilts must have tested negative for Brucellosis and Pseudorabies. Blood test must have been conducted 30 days prior to the show date. Results should be listed on health certificate.

- *All health certificates left in possession of show management at the conclusion of all Gilt Shows will be disposed of. Exhibitors must pick up health certificate in Livestock Office before leaving the fairgrounds.*
- 4. The Junior Stars Gilt Sale is open to all buyers and buyer registration will begin at 5:00 p.m. in the Sale Pavilion. All animals must be paid for in full before released to the buyer. There will be a \$50.00 service charge on all returned checks. Payment may be made by cash, check or credit card.
- 5. The San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo Association will charge a 15% sales. Animals may be bought back in the sale by the exhibitor or the exhibitor's family; however, the 15% sales commission will still be applied to the sale price.
- 6. The seller will be responsible for expenses incurred to change ownership of registered gilts. Fees associated with ownership changes will be deducted from the seller's check after commission is taken out.
- 7. The sale will begin with the Supreme Champion Gilt, followed by the Reserve Supreme Champion Gilt, followed by the remaining of the top five overall gilts, then the sale order will be determined the by the sale committee chairmen and judge(s).
- 8. Sale order will be selected immediately following the selection of the Supreme and Reserve Supreme Champion Gilt.
- 9. Sale checks will not be awarded to exhibitors until all DNA results are verified. In the event that the results prove that the animal does not meet the DNA requirements for purebred gilts the buyer will be notified as to the pedigree status and will be offered the option of refusal. If the buyer refuses the gilt, the Show will promptly refund the purchase price minus the commission. The exhibitor will be notified and must make arrangements to secure the gilt, it will be the responsibility of the exhibitor to refund the commission cost to the buyer.
- 10. There must be someone present to care for the animal as well as walk the animal through the show ring.

- 2. An exhibitor may initially start with as many as four registered or commercial Finewool ewe lambs, but is allowed to show only one pair of ewe lambs. Ewe lambs must be in possession of, fed, and cared for by the exhibitor. Ewe lambs must be halter broke. Health papers are required; please check Animal Health Regulations for complete details.
- 3. Ewe lambs must be sheared and validated on or after October 20, 2021. Each ewe lamb must be identified with a numbered tag.
- 4. Fall or spring born ewe lambs may be shown.
- 5. For purposes of records and record form, October 20, 2021 will be considered the beginning date of the Ewe Lamb Futurity project.
- 6. Each ewe lamb must be weighed at the beginning (October 20, 2021 shorn weight) and end (February 19, 2022 unshorn weight) of the project and must gain at least 30 pounds during this period. One point for every pound under 30 pounds will be deducted from the score sheets.
- 7. To enter the grounds for livestock unloading and loading, all trailers will enter the fairgrounds on the North side at Gate 6 off of Lake View Heroes Drive. There will be two lots indicated for trailer staging. At the direction of officials, trailers will be allowed to back up to the West Side of the HEB Community Center for unloading. Once unloaded, vehicles will exit Gate 2, circle back towards Gate 6 to proceed toward the trailer lot.
- 8. Exhibitors must weigh their lambs at 5:00 p.m., February 19, and turn in their record forms. At 2:00 p.m., February 20 exhibitors must tie their lambs in the arena for judging. Three judges will evaluate ewes in full fleeces, after which time they will be shorn. Judges will then evaluate fleeces and shorn ewe lambs.
- 9. Exhibitors will be required to keep records for the duration of the project. They will also be required to take a test and judge a class of Finewool ewes and a class of wool fleeces at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, February 19, to determine their knowledge of general sheep production. Record forms, and a study guide and study questions should be picked up at your County Extension office or the Stock Show office by the initiation date of October 20th.

- 1. All rules apply to the Junior Breeding Sheep Show. Please refer to the General Rules and Junior Show Rules.
- 2. Each entry form must show the full name, address, and social security number of the exhibitor, the name of the breed and number of head entered. It will not be necessary to give the name of the animal, registry number or name of sire and dam until the certificate of registry is presented to the superintendent. Certificates of registry must be furnished to the superintendent before the animals enter the ring. Affidavits in lieu of registration certificates will not be accepted.
- 3. All breeding sheep must be registered in the exhibitor's name in the Flock Books of their respective breeds, and bear such identification as that association requires, by October 1, 2021.

All Junior Breeding Sheep must have a flock tag in the ear that matches the flock tag number listed on the registration paper in addition to an official USDA Scrapie tag along with any ear tags required by the Texas Sheep Validation Program. Any sheep not having a flock tag matching the flock number on the registration paper will be disqualified and barred from showing.

- 4. To be eligible to exhibit in the 2022 Junior Breeding Sheep Show, all sheep must be validated in the Texas 4-H and FFA Breeding Sheep Validation Program. Hair follicle samples will be collected from all Breed Champions and all Reserve Champions, and a DNA analysis will be conducted on each of these hair follicle samples. The Junior Breeding Sheep Show committee may also collect hair follicle samples from any other entry for the purpose of conducting a DNA analysis. Any sheep not having a positive match from the DNA analysis of the hair follicle sample taken from it at the time of enrollment in the validation program, will be disqualified. Nose prints will also be taken on all sheep at validation and those prints may be verified at the show. All breeding sheep may be family validated in individual exhibitors' names. No partnerships allowed. Please review State Validation rules for more information.
- 5. The breeder of an animal is the owner of the dam at the time of service. If a boy or girl showing sheep in the registered class is such a breeder, his or her lamb must be registered in the boy's or girl's name by October 1, of the year preceding the show.

- 6. If a boy or a girl is showing a sheep in the registered classes that is a gift from some breeder, the transfer certificate must be dated on Association records on or before October 1, of the year preceding the show.
- 7. Classes are provided for lambs, two-tooth, and four-to-six tooth sheep. Sheep in the Lamb Classes must retain all lamb teeth and be at least 6 months of age. Sheep which have dropped one or more milk teeth, or show one or both teeth of the permanent pair of incisors, are eligible only in the Two-Tooth Classes. Sheep showing the first two pair or three pair of permanent incisors are eligible to show in the four to sixtooth classes only. In order to be able to move an entry up, you must fill the lamb class first.
- 8. Entries in the Other Wool and Medium Wool Breed Division may include any registered wool or medium wool sheep from a recognized breed registry. Other registered hair breeds will not be eligible to show in this division.
- 9. Each junior exhibitor is entitled to enter two animals per single class and only one group in each group class.
- 10. The judge making awards must have the clerk record the ear tag number of each animal awarded a prize.
- 11. Only first place winners shall compete for champion animal. The second place winner in the class from which the champion animal was selected will compete for reserve champion animal.
- 12. Pen assignments will be made by the pen stewards at time of arrival. One pen will be assigned per two entries.
- 13. The same sheep MAY compete in both Junior and Open Shows.
- 14. Livestock exhibitors will be allowed to display signs over exhibits advertising their own herds. This is only allowed in livestock barns.
- 15. All sheep entered in the Junior Rambouillet Show must be shorn on or after October 20th of the year preceding the show. No boots. Fleece length must be uniform over body.
- 16. In the Other Wool and Medium Wool Breed division, sheep may be shorn as desired by the exhibitor, or per breed registry requirements. Other stock shows may have different requirements, so if you are planning to attend and show at any other shows to know their specific rules for your breed.
- 17. Southdowns, Dorpers and White Dorpers should be slick shorn within seven days prior to the show.
- 18. Dorpers and White Dorpers will show separately.
- 19. The exhibitor of the Grand Champion Rambouillet Ewe, Delaine Ewe, Dorper Ewe, White Dorper Ewe, and Other Wool & Medium Wool Breeds Ewe will receive a \$500.00 incentive. The exhibitor of the Reserve Grand Champion Rambouillet Ewe, Delaine Ewe, Dorper Ewe, White Dorper Ewe, and Other Medium Wool Breed Ewe will receive a \$250.00 incentive. Incentive recipients may enter future shows and may receive another incentive. Exhibitors must be present to be awarded the incentive. Southdown ewe exhibitors will not be eligible for incentives.

- 20. One showmanship award will be presented in each breed division.
- 21. At the direction of officials, trailers will be allowed to back up to the West Side of the HEB Community Center for unloading. Once unloaded, vehicles will exit Gate 2, circle back towards Gate 6 to proceed toward the trailer lot.
- 22. Pay-Out. Checks will be mailed to the agent/instructor following the show.

- 1. The objective is to exhibit an animal that can place high in both body and fleece. The combined score will determine the overall winner of each class.
- 2. The exhibitors' CEA/AST must validate the goats were shorn on or after July 15, 2021, and the animal must be owned by the exhibitor on or before October 1, 2021. Angora with hair equal to or longer than 8 inches will be disqualified from the show.
- 3. Foreign material including (but not limited to) painting, powdering, oiling, artificial coloring, or adhesives is prohibited. First and second place goats may be subject to testing for any substance added to the fleece. Any fleeces found with foreign material are subject to disqualification and forfeiting prizes.
- 4. Health Certificates are required; please check the 2021 Animal Health Regulations for more information.
- 5. All goats entered must be wethers.
- 6. The show will consist of three separate weight classes that will be broken after weigh-in.
- 7. All animals exhibited will be micron tested. Samples for micron testing will be taken during weigh-in. Results will be posted prior to beginning of show.
- 8. Each class will be shown with the animal in full fleece. The judge will select the ten overall animals. These animals will be shorn and then re-judged. Each animal will then be placed accordingly. Designated shearers will be provided to shear each animal.
- 9. The fleeces will be weighed, micron tested, and analyzed objectively with scientific instruments to determine the characteristics and value of each entire fleece.
- 10. The animals will be judged both in the fleece and out of the fleece.
 - a. 1/3 of the total score will be calculated from "in fleece" judging
 - b. 1/3 of the total score will be calculated from "fleece" judging
 - c. 1/3 of the total score will be calculated from the "out of fleece" judging

11. The mohair fleeces will be placed based upon overall value. There will be price valuations given to each fleece based upon micron. The micron categories will break as follows:

28 micron or less

28 – 30 micron

30 - 32 micron

32 or greater

Based on actual marked prices each fleece will be given a value and placing based upon real market prices on the day of the show for each micron category.

- 12. A formula will be used to calculate class placings. The collective score from the three classes will determine the placing of each animal.

- 1. All rules apply to the Junior Angora Goat Show. Please refer to the General Rules and Junior Show Rules.
- 2. Each entry form must show the full name, address and social security number of the exhibitor, the number of head entered. It is not necessary to identify the animals until the registration certificates are presented to show officials at validation time. Only the junior exhibitor's name is allowed on the registration certificate. Health papers are required; please check Animal Health Regulations for complete details.
- 3. All breeding goats must be registered in the Flock Books of the American Angora Goat Breeders Association, and bear such identification as that association requires, before entering the ring. Goats not carrying recognized identification at time of showing will be barred from competition.
- 4. The breeder of an animal is the owner of the doe at the time of service. If a boy or girl showing goats in the registered classes is such a breeder, his or her kid must be registered in the boy's or girl's name by opening day of show.
- 5. If a boy or girl is showing a goat in the registered classes that is a gift from some breeder, or if the goat has been purchased from some breeder, the Transfer Certificate must be made on or before December 1 of the year preceding the show. If the goat is recorded direct to the boy or girl, the certificate of Registry must be dated before December 1 of the year preceding the show.
- All goats will show by the birth date on American Goat Breeders Association Registration papers.
- 7. Each exhibitor may show only two (2) Bucks or two (2) Does in each single class. Certificates of Registry must be furnished to the Superintendent before animals enter the ring.
- 8. The judge making awards must have the clerk record ear number, ear tag, or tattoo of all animals awarded prizes.
- 9. All Angora Goats must be machine shorn to the skin on or after July 15th of the calendar year preceding the show. Angora with hair equal to or longer than 8 inches will be disqualified from the show.
- 10. Foreign material including (but not limited to) painting, powdering, oiling, artificial coloring, or adhesives is prohibited. First and second place goats may be subject to testing for any substance added to the fleece. Any fleece testing positive for foreign substance is subject to disqualification, and forfeiting all prizes.

- 11. Only first place animals shall compete for the champion animal. The second place winner in the class from which the champion animal was selected will compete for reserve champion.
- 12. The exhibitor of the Champion Angora Doe exhibitor is eligible to receive a \$500.00 incentive. The exhibitor of the Reserve Champion Angora Doe exhibitor is eligible to receive a \$250.00 incentive. Incentive recipients may enter future shows and may receive another scholarship. Exhibitors must be present to be awarded the incentive. Please refer to the Breed Incentive Program eligibility requirements.
- 13. To enter the grounds for livestock unloading and loading, all trailers will enter the fairgrounds on the North side at Gate 6 off of Lake View Heroes Drive. There will be two lots indicated for trailer staging. At the direction of officials, trailers will be allowed to back up to the West Side of the South Livestock Barn for unloading. Once unloaded, vehicles will exit Gate 2, circle back towards Gate 6 to proceed toward the trailer lot.

- 1. All rules apply to the Junior Texas Stars Wether Doe Show. Please refer to the General Rules and Junior Show Rules.
- 2. To be eligible to exhibit in the 2022 Junior Texas Stars Wether Doe Show, does must be validated in the Texas 4-H and FFA Wether Dam Validation Program. Hair follicle samples will be collected from the first place doe in each class. The Junior Texas Stars Wether Doe Show Committee and Show Management may also collect hair follicle samples from any other doe entry for the purpose of conducting a DNA analysis. Any doe not having a positive match from the DNA analysis of this hair follicle sample, compared to the DNA analysis of the hair follicle sample taken from it at the time of enrollment in the validation program, will be disqualified.
- 3. All entries must be owned and the bona fide project of a boy or girl, regularly enrolled in a Texas 4-H Club or FFA Chapter, by October 31, of the year preceding the show, and must have been personally fed and cared for under the supervision of a County Agent or Teacher of Vocational Agriculture.
- 4. Health papers are not required.
- 5. There is a limit of three entries per exhibitor.
- 6. To enter the grounds for livestock unloading and loading, all trailers will enter the fairgrounds on the North side at Gate 6 off of Lake View Heroes Drive. There will be two lots indicated for trailer staging. At the direction of officials, trailers will be allowed to pull up to the HEB Livestock Barn for unloading. Once unloaded, vehicles will exit Gate 2, circle back towards Gate 6 to proceed toward the trailer lot.
- 7. All does must be taken to the official scales for official weigh in between 3:00 and 5:00 p.m. on the day of arrival. No weight cards will be turned in.
- 8. Superintendents will break classes immediately following the weigh-in. Classes will be broken into no more than 9 weight classes in three divisions. **The number of classes is up to the discretion of the committee and show officials based on the number of entries.** There will be no pre-set weight breaks.
- 9. The only tags does may have in their ears are state validation & scrapie tags. All others must be removed i.e. breeder tags.

- 10. Does must weigh a minimum of 50 pounds and there is no maximum. Only does may be shown.
- 11. At the time of show, does must not possess more than their first set of yearling teeth.
- 12. Dehorning of the goats is not suggested, however, horns should be tipped and rounded. Goats with horns sharper than deemed safe by the show superintendent or Show Management will be required to be tipped or rounded or the animal will be isolated and not shown. Removal of horns on grounds is not permitted. No sharp points allowed on horns.
- 13. Hair may not exceed 1 ¼ inches above the hocks and knees. The hair will be measured at weigh in with a ruler. There will be one person measuring the every goat at check in, and Kenny as Superintendent will be there to verify. The exhibitor will not be allowed to make any changes to the animal. NO clipping will be allowed on the grounds. Battery operated clippers will be allowed for touch ups only.
- 14. Blow & Show ONLY! No painting, adhesives, powdering, or artificial coloring is allowed.
- 15. No electrical equipment of any kind is allowed (excluding blowers). <u>HAY, HEAT LAMPS, ICE PACKS, OR PROPANE HEATERS WILL NOT BE ALLOWED IN THE BARNS!!</u>
- 16. GOATS MAY BE WASHED AFTER ARRIVAL.
- 17. No external parasites will be allowed. If a goat is found to have external parasites, it will be disqualified.
- 18. All division champions and reserve champions and all Top 5 scholarship does will be subject to DNA and Substance testing. The Show specifically reserves the right to have ultrasound, D.N.A., tissue, blood and/or urine laboratory analysis made on any animal entered for competition. The exhibitor, including his or her parent or guardian or AST or CEA for Junior exhibitors, must be present during the collection for testing and must witness, seal and sign the sample; thus verifying the sample to be properly collected and prepared for analysis.
- 19. All division champions and reserve champions will be automatically eligible for the sale. However, a division champion or reserve is NOT guaranteed a top 5 Scholarship.
- 20. The judge will select 15 preliminary sale candidates from each division. Any does selected as preliminary candidates must remain at the show and will be called back to determine sale order. A preliminary selection is no guarantee the animal will make the sale.
- 21. The judge will select 25 animals to sale and any and all animals selected must be sold. There is no limit to the number of entries an exhibitor may sell.
- 22. Scholarships will be awarding pending results of all DNA and Drug Testing results. To be awarded the scholarship, DNA tests must confirm a positive match and Drug tests must confirm negative for any and all residues.
- 23. Exhibitors must be present and exhibiting their animal to receive the scholarship. All other rules of the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo Breeding Livestock Show Scholarships are applicable to contestants in this show.

24. A scholarship cap of \$12,500 will be enforced per exhibitor for cumulative scholarship earnings in the Texas Stars Wether Dam Show beginning with the 2015 show. Exhibitors may continue to exhibit and participate in the sale once the scholarship cap is met, but will no longer be eligible for additional scholarships in this show.

- 2. To be eligible to exhibit in the 2021 Junior Boer Goat Show, all goats must be validated in the Texas 4-H and FFA Boer Breeding Goat Validation Program. Hair follicle samples will be collected from all Division Champions and all Reserve Champions, and a DNA analysis will be conducted on each of these hair follicle samples. The Junior Boer Goat Show committee may also collect hair follicle samples from any other entry for the purpose of conducting a DNA analysis. Any boer goat not having a positive match from the DNA analysis of the hair follicle samples, compared to the DNA analysis of the hair follicle sample taken from it at the time of enrollment in the validation program, will be disqualified. All boer goats may be family validated in individual exhibitors' names. No partnerships allowed. Please review State Validation rules for more information.
- 3. All goats must be registered in the exhibitors name with the respective flock book of the respective recognized Boer Goat Association on or before **October 1**st of the year preceding the show, as well as purchase, delivery and possession. The official ownership or transfer date must be considered as the date recorded (issued). In the event that the date of transfer and ownership date are not consistent on the Original Registration Certificate, the most recent date will be interpreted as the official date of ownership for the exhibitor. Please refer to the Texas 4-H and FFA Boer Breeding Goat Validation Guidelines for more information.
- 4. The entry must reflect the owner's name indicated on the registration paper. **Goats entered in the Junior Show must be registered in the junior exhibitor's name.** Partnerships or farm/ranch name will NOT be allowed. Health papers are required; please check Animal Health Regulations for complete details.
- 5. All goats must be registered in the respective flock books of the recognized Boer Goat Associations and bear such identification as that breed association requires at check-in. Goats not carrying such identification at validation shall be disqualified from competition.
- 6. All youth exhibitors must hold a current junior membership in a Boer Goat association.
- 7. Percentage females, full blood males and full blood female goats will be classed by birth date on certificate of registration. If birth date falls on date of show, goat will be moved to next upper age class.
- 8. Exhibitors are not allowed to enter more than three head per class in any division and may only receive premiums on two per class in any division.

- 3. All fleeces must be in place by 10:00 a.m. on Sunday, February 20, 2022 at the Gandy Ink Sale Pavilion. However, exhibitors may send their entries to the Stock Show Office as long as the fleeces arrive by Saturday, February 12, 2022. Exhibitors shall be solely responsible for their entries.
- 4. Loading and unloading is strictly prohibited on the front midway area. Please follow directional signs at location for unloading instructions.
- 5. Entries shall be judged on the following basis:

Length of Staple Character
Uniformity of fiber diameter Weight of Fleece
Yield Preparation
Color or Luster Strength

- 6. Judges shall not award a prize to an unworthy exhibit. The judges shall determine the method and points for scoring the fleeces.
- 7. **TWELVE MONTHS WOOL-** Fleeces from aged ewes shall not have over 13 months of growth. Fleece from yearling ewes shall not have over 16 months growth. Removal of bellies in fleeces is optional. Fleeces must be tied with paper twine.
- 8. MOHAIR- Fleeces shall not be over 8 inches in length. Micron Requirements:

Kid Class Fleeces- 30 Microns or Finer Yearling Class Fleeces- 30-34 Microns Adult Class Fleeces- 35 Microns or Coarser

All mohair fleeces must be spring shorn in the spring of 2020 or 2021. **FLEECES MUST BE ENTERED IN CLEAR PLASTIC BAGS.**

- 9. All wool and mohair fleeces must be produced by one animal and must be identified as fleeces of one animal. This rule will be strictly adhered to.
- 10. Exhibitors shall be disqualified for any of the following reasons: fleeces show an excessive amount of burrs, vegetable matter, discoloration by moisture, weakness of breaks, lack of due care in preparation and fleeces tied with anything other than paper twine.

11. It shall be the exhibitor's responsibility to enter the fleece in the proper class. Fleeces not meeting requirements for length and grade in the classes entered shall be disqualified from the show.

JUNIOR SHOW

Each exhibitor may enter four (4) fleeces per class, however, the exhibitor will be eligible to receive only two money placing's per class. Premium checks will be mailed following the show.

- 1. **Entry fee:** Entries must be made on an official Ag Mechanics Entry form and signed by the AST/CEA overseeing the project. Exhibitors and projects must be listed on entry form at time of entry. <u>Ag Mechanics entries are to be made under the Club Name, not the individual exhibitor(s).</u>
- 2. **Eligible Entries:** Entries must be the work of eligible exhibitors limited to Texas FFA and 4-H members. Please refer to the General Rules and Junior Show Rules. There is no limit to the total number of projects a 4-H club or FFA Chapter may enter. The San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo reserves the right to refuse any exhibit.
- 3. **Substitutions:** A \$100 project substitution fee will be charged to entries that are moved from one division to another at check in. This fee does NOT include reclassification by show officials or changes within the division of original entry. Project substitutions should be made at check in. Prior to the show you may contact the livestock office to change a project at least one week before the show.
- 4. **Projects:** must be constructed by FFA & 4-H members. FFA projects must be constructed as a part of their agriculture mechanic instruction in agriculture science or as part of their supervised work experience program. 4-H projects must be constructed under the supervision of their County Extension Agent.
- 5. **Club/Chapter Entries:** Group entries must be made in the name of the FFA Chapter or 4-H club. All group entries must include all the names of the exhibitors who participated in planning and construction of the project at the time of check-in at the show.
- 6. Individual/Group: Projects may be either individually or group constructed and owned.
- 7. **Exhibit Space:** Projects will be displayed in the Spur Arena by divisions and classes. Placement of projects will be at the discretion of stock show officials. Once project is placed in barn it is not allowed to be moved by anyone but a show official. Display space under shelter is not guaranteed. **Projects may be displayed at an alternate site if sufficient space is not available at the 1st Community Credit Union Spur Arena.**
- 8. **Construction Date:** A project may be exhibited only one time at the San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo and construction must have been started within one calendar year of the conclusion of the previous Stock Show.

9. **Types of Projects:** Any project that does not fit into one of the stated classes will be disqualified. Projects may be subject to reclassification upon arrival. Projects **MUST** be classified in one of the following division and classes:

- 11. Vehicles: No trucks, non-entered tractors or trailers are allowed in the exhibition area.

- 12. **Projects Requiring Offloading Assistance:** Projects that need to be lifted from the topside area to be fitted with lifting eyes at balance points that accommodate 1" shackles. Projects that cannot be safely unloaded will be shown at an alternate site. Additionally, projects may be mounted on a pallet for ease of loading and unloading.
- 13. Safety: All safety procedures must be adhered to when displaying projects but not limited to:
 - A. Appropriate and safe display stands provided for gates, panels and other projects needing support.
 - B. Sharp edges and points (as on feeder roofs, bale movers, etc.) must be padded or covered to prevent injury.
 - C. All trailers, **BBQ pits**, and other equipment that is operated on or transported on public roads must be equipped with safety equipment as stated in the latest DOT publication. All three-point hitch and P.T.O. operated equipment is to meet ASAE standards and specifications.
 - D. NO PAINT APPLICATION ON GROUNDS
- 14. Project completeness: All projects should be complete including finish. Projects are to be clean, free of dust and debris, and in a presentable condition even though they may have been used. Any item, necessary for use of the project must be a part of it (example: hinges and latches on gates and panels, etc.). Trailers and all other equipment are to be displayed in transport position. Ramps, extensions and operation of specific features may be demonstrated as directed by the official judges and as space allows. The project display area (including the floor under and around the project) should be neat. Floor covering will be limited to the area under the project.
- 15. Welds: No structural welds are to be ground without penalty. Grinding is to be limited to welds that should be ground for functional reasons and/or welds that would normally be ground for cosmetic purposes. Examples: top rails on trailers, fender body outside tops, side latches, etc. may be ground, but frames, cross-members, tongues, filler pipe, etc. are not to be ground.
- 16. Any equipment to travel on public highways must meet Federal DOT Standards. Current **Federal DOT** inspection stickers will be honored. Anything that does not have a current Federal DOT inspection sticker will be subject to inspection by a TXDOT inspector.
- 17. Projects that require license plate to be DOT compliant must show in the trailer division. Trailers that are designed for off road or slow speed highway use must be equipped with slow speed tires and a SMV (Slow Moving Vehicle) triangle.
- 18. Exhibitor Presentation: Exhibitors should be dressed appropriately and be with their project when it is judged. Exhibitors should be courteous and helpful to those viewing their project including the public, show officials, and judges. Exhibitors should not interfere with or shield those exhibitors next to them. Exhibitors will be allowed cleaning or preparation supplies, limited to quantities that will fit in a common 5 gallon bucket, in the exhibition area.
- 19. Exhibitors must be present to present projects. Absence must be approved by committee.
- 20. Signs: All projects are to be identified. Information should include Exhibitor(s) Name, Club/Chapter, and Project Description. Additional signs, banners, etc. must meet the approval of the committee members and cannot extend beyond the project's display space. **NO FOR SALE SIGNS.**
- 21. Cleaning of projects will be limited to the use of spray bottles and towels.

22. Loss or Damage: Every precaution will be taken to project the projects entered; however, neither the San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo nor the officials of this contest will be responsible for fire, theft, vandalism or destruction to the projects.

Mechanical will include the restoration of engine, transmission, final drive, fuel system, cooling system, cranking or starting system, charging system, hydraulic system, steering system, etc. **Aesthetics** will include the overall appearance of the tractor. This includes workmanship and finish. Items to be considered include, but are not limited to: metal preparation, completeness of sheet metal, paint and finish, detail and completeness of components such as wheels, tires, steering wheels, seats, decals, instrument panels, wiring harness, etc.

Originality will include paint color, fasteners, electrical systems, fuel systems, exhaust systems, mechanical systems, original unaltered serial places, etc.

Safety equipment will include all equipment that was original to the tractor. It also includes the provision of drip pans containing floor absorbent to collect any liquids that may drip from the tractor during display. Fuel shutoff valves under all fuel tanks must be functional and tractors are to be exhibited with the valves closed. An ABC fire extinguisher with a minimum 2.5 pounds capacity must be provided with each tractor. Extra fuel may not be stored in the arena. Tractor engines are to be started and run only at the request of judges or show officials.

Documentation must be typed or computer generated and is to include a one page description of the overall restoration project, and expense report identifying all costs of restoration, photos showing before, during and after restoration that shows safe working environment, and a complete description

of all mechanical work performed. All documentation is to be displayed in a three-ring binder, divided, and sequenced with a table of contents and page numbers. The National FFA Tractor Restoration Competition format and forms may be used.

25. **Showmanship:** Awards will be presented to schools/clubs and individuals selected as having presented the best public image by an independent judge. Judging will begin at unloading and continue until awards are given. There will be two categories: group and individual. Champion and Reserve Champion will be given in each category.

Considerations will be, but not limited to:

- a. Appropriate display and presentation of project
- b. Appropriate display of project plans, bill of materials and photographs
- c. Housekeeping around project
- d. Appropriate dress
- e. Conduct, attitude, and participation of students

- 1. All rules apply to the Agricultural Public Speaking Contest. Please refer to the General Rules and Junior Show Rules.
- 2. Age Divisions will be broken down into a Junior division, exhibitor grades 3-8 and a Senior division, exhibitor grades 9-12.
- 3. Contestants in each division will be divided into groups depending on category. Categories must be indicated upon entry by <u>January 10, 2022</u>; category changes after entry deadline will not be permitted.
- 4. Abstracts, literature cited submission page and statement of originalities all must be submitted at time of entry. There will be no exceptions. **Incomplete entries will not be accepted.**
- 5. The top two in each category will advance to the finals.
- 6. Business attire or official 4-H/FFA attire is recommended.
- 7. Contestants are required to upload the following items at the time of entry to Livestock Docs:
 - (a) Abstract (200-300 words)
 - **(b)** Literature Cited Submission Page (minimum of 5 references). Cited in APA Format.
 - (c) A statement of originality signed by the contestant, parents, and AST/CEA must be attached to each copy of the speech. This is found on the website at www.sanangelorodeo.com
 - (d) Manuscripts are not required to be officially submitted, however contestants must have a copy available on contest day to provide Show Management if requested.
 - **(e)**. If a contestant chooses to not follow the documentation guidelines outlined, point deductions will be taken at the discretion of the Superintendent, Show Management and Judges.
- 8. The use of props of any kind is prohibited. Violation will result in disqualification.
- 9. Each speech shall be a minimum of six (6) minutes in length and a maximum of eight (8) minutes. Time point deductions will be as follows:

Under six minutes – one point per ten seconds Over eight minutes – one point per ten seconds

- 10. A maximum five (5) minute question/answer period will follow each speech. At the end of five minutes, all questions will end. If time is called during the student's answer to the last question, the contestant may complete his or her answer.
- 11. Each contestant will enter their speech in one of nine **categories**. A contestant may enter in one **category** only. There are subject matters which may be appropriate in more than one **category**. Final determination of all speeches will be at the discretion of the Superintendent and Show Management. The **category** the student wishes to enter must be submitted with original entry form.
- 12. Previous 1st place winners in Junior and Senior Divisions must select a new speech topic to remain eligible to enter the contest in subsequent years. The speech may be in the same category as the previous winning speech, but the key points to the speech must be completely different. For example, if the winning speech was given on mohair, with points on growth rate, shearing, and products of mohair, other acceptable mohair speeches may include: marketability of mohair, information focusing on raising angora goats, etc.

Categories:

<u>Agribusiness:</u> Any current and future subject that deals with topics such as cooperatives, sales, service, communications, entrepreneurship, marketing, finance, commodities, hedging, advertising, etc.

<u>Agricultural Communications:</u> Any current or future subject that deals with the process or act of communicating agricultural related information to the public.

<u>Agricultural Policy:</u> Any current or future subject that deals with topics such as domestic farm issues, international trade, international competition, rural economic development, legal issues, animal rights, subsidies, price supports, etc.

Agriscience/Agricultural Technology: Any current or future subject that deals with topics such as biotechnology, biogenetics, bioengineering, mechanical engineering, new agri-technology applications, global positioning and other satellite technology, computer applications, etc.

Animal Science: Any current or future subject that deals with any aspect of the dairy, equine, poultry, sheep, goat, swine, beef or specialty animal industries.

<u>Agronomy:</u> Any current or future subject that deals with any aspect of the horticulture and/or agronomy industries including floriculture, fruit and/or vegetable production, nursery operations, turf and landscape management, crop production, or specialty crop production

<u>Natural Resources:</u> Any current or future subject that deals with topics such as soil, water, air, water quality, wildlife, forestry, aquaculture, conservation, recreation, recycling, energy environmental issues, etc.

<u>Livestock Show Ethics:</u> Any current or future subject that addresses any aspect of the ethics practiced in the livestock show industry.

- 1. All rules apply to the Junior Robotics Arena Competition. Please refer to the General Rules and Junior Show Rules. The only exception being for students entering in the school division will be exempt from 4-H and/or FFA membership requirements.
- 2. **FORMAT:** This is an arena contest with a prescribed problem. Teams will receive a set of challenge rules and specifications designed from a theme that will vary from year to year. Robots must be constructed, programmed, and tested before the contest. The official scenario will be released in early September and is available at https://tcea.org/robotics/contest/arena/. Practice game mats and pieces are available through the same website.

Teams will have **TWO** attempts at this competition. Computers will be allowed and power sources will be available, though may be limited. Time permitting, teams will be allowed to make adjustments prior to and between matches, but must report for competition when called.

- 3. Each club, chapter, or school may enter as many teams as desired.
- 4. The contest will be divided into three divisions:
 - -Intermediate- Grades 3rd -5th
 - -Advanced- Grades 6th -8th
 - -Advanced- Grades 9th -12th

4-H and FFA teams may have 3rd graders compete. Teams are subject to reclassification by show management.

- 5. **Competing teams** All teams must have one team sponsor (adult). Students are not allowed to compete on more than one team. Students will not be allowed to compete on both a 4-H and/or FFA team and a school team. All students must be from the same school, or club/chapter.
- 6. All teams (4-H, FFA, & School) will consist of a <u>maximum of 4 members</u> within the same age division plus 1 team sponsor (Adult)
- 7. Each team will submit a team name, which must be appropriate and meet common school standards.
- 8. Lego EV3 and NXT are acceptable systems for robots to be constructed.

- 9. Only registered students are allowed to touch the robot and the computer used to program it. The only exception is when technical problems with the computer occur. Live student problem solving is the spirit of the competition.
- 10. Only one robot per team will be allowed in the tournament. Backup robots will NOT be allowed. Teams found in violation will not be allowed to compete in the tournament.
- 11. Matches are 2 minutes in length. The match will begin with a 3, 2, 1 countdown, blow of whistle or some other sound. The match will end with a three second countdown, blow of a whistle or other sound. Each team will have one minute to set-up and one minute to take down.
- 12. No rematches will be awarded unless it is deemed that there is a failure of provided field materials.
- 13. No time-outs will be allowed for any reason.
- 14. All score disputing must be settled before the team leaves the field.
- 15. Lasers are not permitted.
- 16. During the competition, students may not communicate with anyone except other registered students and competition staff; all forms of communication are prohibited, including, but not limited to, live and electronic communication (talking, texting, videos, etc.). Students should request assistance from competition staff if any communication with parents or sponsors is necessary.
- 17. If students communicate with parents or sponsors in violation of this rule, or if they are caught using any communications devices, the team may be disqualified and asked to leave the competition.

- 1. All rules apply to the Junior Robotics Invention Competition. Please refer to the General Rules and Junior Show Rules. The only exception being for students entering in the school division will be exempt from 4-H and/or FFA membership requirements.
- 2. **FORMAT:** This is an inventions contest, teams will create and develop a unique invention that will solve a problem. Student teams will need to approach their problem, working together like a real team of engineers, to solve a common challenge using the Engineering Design Process. The Engineering Design Process is a particular course of action and sequence of operations intended to achieve a result or produce an outcome.
 - Research
 - Plan
 - Prototype
 - Document and Test
 - Commercialize

All teams will be responsible for keeping a logbook where they record notes each time the team meets. The logbook should describe each step of the Engineering Design Process during the creation of their robotic invention. Judging criteria will be based on student teams presenting their step by step process, as well as documentation in their logbook. Students should use the Inventions Scoring Rubric as a guide for planning their project and presentation and for providing talking points for their presentation to the judges

- 3. Entries are limited to 20 entries per division, first received. Each club, chapter, or school may enter as many teams as desired.
- 4. The contest will be divided into two divisions:
 - Junior/Intermediate- Grades 3rd 8th
 - Senior- Grades 9th 12th

4-H and FFA teams may have 3rd graders compete. Teams are subject to reclassification by show management.

- 5. **Competing teams** All teams must have one team sponsor (adult). Students are not allowed to compete on more than one team. Students will not be allowed to compete on both a 4-H and/or FFA team and a school team. All students must be from the same school, or club/chapter.
- 6. All teams (4-H, FFA, & School) will consist of a <u>maximum of 3 members</u> within the same age division plus 1 team sponsor (Adult)
- 7. Each team will submit a team name, which must be appropriate and meet common school standards.
- 8. Only registered students are allowed to touch the robot and the computer used to program it. The only exception is when technical problems with the computer occur. Live student problem solving is the spirit of the competition.
- 9. Only one robot per team will be allowed in the tournament. Backup robots will NOT be allowed. Teams found in violation will not be allowed to compete in the tournament.
- 10. Each team will have a 6 ft. table to conduct their presentation on and will be limited to a 10 ft. by 10 ft. area, which will included the table. Teams are not required to use the table. If the presentation goes outside of the designated area during the presentation, the final score will not receive 20 additional points for the "Compliance of Rules".
- 11. Presentation time is limited to 6 minutes. Teams will be notified as they approach the 5 minute mark as well as the 6 minute mark. If presentation goes over 6 minutes, the final score will not receive 20 additional points for the "Compliance of Rules".
- 12. Bluetooth is acceptable to control the Inventions category only.
- 13. The following robotic platforms are accepted for the Inventions category: EV3 and NXT.
- 14. No time-outs will be allowed for any reason.
- 15. All score disputing must be settled before the team leaves the field.
- 16. Lasers are not permitted.
- 17. During the competition, students may not communicate with anyone except other registered students and competition staff; all forms of communication are prohibited, including, but not limited to, live and electronic communication (talking, texting, videos, etc.). Students should request assistance from competition staff if any communication with parents or sponsors is necessary.
- 18. If students communicate with parents or sponsors in violation of this rule, or if they are caught using any communications devices, the team may be disqualified and asked to leave the competition.

1. All rules apply to the Junior Food Challenge and State 4-H Food Challenge Guidelines. Please refer to the General Rules and Junior Show Rules.

2. Age divisions are determined by a participant's age as of August 31 of the current 4-H year.

Junior Division: $3^{rd} - 5^{th}$ Intermediate Division: $6^{th} - 8^{th}$ Senior Division: Grades $9^{th} - 12^{th}$

- 3. Each team will consist of at least three no more than four members. Teams may not consist of individuals from various age divisions with the exception that junior members may compete on intermediate teams.
- 4. Teams will be randomly assigned to a division A, B, C, D, etc., within their age group that may represent one of the following categories: **Appetizer, Main Dish, Side Dish, or Healthy Dessert.** The number of divisions within an age group will be dependent upon the number of entries. Division assignments will not be announced until the day of the contest. A Final challenge is contingent upon entries. If there is no final challenge, the winner of each division will be champion per each age group.
- 5. Resource materials will be provided for each team at the contest. These include: My Plate Mini Poster, Fight Bac Fight Foodborne Bacteria Brochure, Know Your Nutrients, Food Safety Fact Sheet, and copies of grocery receipts. No other resource materials will be allowed. Teams may not use their personal copies of the resources during the contest.
- 6. Each team must supply their own equipment for the challenge. Teams may bring only the supplies listed in the supply box section. Supply boxes will be checked by contest officials as teams check in for the contest. Any extra equipment will be confiscated, and the team may be disqualified.

Pantry Ingredients – Each team may include in their equipment box the following "pantry" ingredients which they may use when preparing their dish if desired. There is no requirement to use these items, nor is it mandatory that teams include these in their supply box.

- Salt
- Pepper
- Oil (up to 17 oz)
- 1 jar chicken bouillon
- 1 medium onion
- 2 (up to 16 oz) cans vegetables and/or fruit (team choice)
- Rice (brown or white) or pasta (up to 16 oz) (team choice)

7. Each team will receive an information sheet with their contest category and the "key" ingredient for that category (no ingredient amounts, recipe, or instructions will be provided at the station). The "key" ingredient will be representative of one of the following categories: Main Dish, Side Dish, Appetizer or Healthy Dessert. Key ingredient examples: Main Dish (fish), Side Dish (broccoli), Appetizer (artichokes), Healthy Dessert (yogurt).

Teams will have access to a "grocery store" of additional ingredients which should be combined with the team's "key" ingredient to create an original recipe/dish during the contest. Grocery store items will include items commonly found in grocery stores and/or home pantries, including items such as produce, canned goods, etc. Teams will also have the option to use "pantry" items in supply box, in their dish.

Teams must purchase and use at least two additional items from the grocery store in their dish. Teams will also receive a pricing sheet for grocery store items at their station. Grocery store items will be "purchased" using a pricing system and "contest currency." This will enable teams to analyze the cost of their entire dish and individual serving. The currency system will be explained prior to the contest. Teams may not exceed the provided "contest currency" or trade "currency" or grocery store items with other teams. Example: teams may be provided \$5.00 in "contest currency" to spend at the grocery store; each item in the grocery store will be priced and teams must calculate cost according to total spent.

- 8. Each team will have 40 minutes to prepare the dish, plan a presentation, and clean up the preparation area.
- 9. Teams that may experience any equipment malfunction(s) may not replace the equipment with supplies from another team, leaders, volunteers, county Extension agents or contest officials. Instead, team members must work together and be creative in completing preparation without the malfunctioning equipment.
- 10. Preparation: Each team will create an entire dish/recipe (not a full meal) using the provided key ingredient and grocery store items. Dishes/recipes created should include two or more servings. Teams should present the entire dish/recipe to the judges and communicate during their presentation what an individual serving size should be. Teams will be responsible for determining the number of servings their dish provides. Teams should not create side or multiple dishes with their ingredients/grocery store items.
 - a. Teams are challenged to be creative and develop an original recipe with the ingredients provided.
 - b. Teams will determine the exact amount of each ingredient used based on their original recipe.
 - c. The key ingredient and/or grocery store ingredients selected should be used to garnish the dish.
 - d. Note cards may be used to write down the recipe that the team creates, along with notes related to nutrition, food safety, and cost analysis. Teams should be exact on ingredients used, preparation steps, cooking time, temperature, etc.
- 11. Food and Equipment Safety: A safe and sanitary working environment must be maintained during the contest. Each station will have food and kitchen safety resources. Teams should follow the steps listed to ensure proper food and equipment safety is followed. Judges will be scoring teams on food and equipment safety during the preparation phase of the contest. Teams should also discuss safety steps used during the presentation phase of the contest.

Gloves: Gloves do not have to be worn throughout the contest; however, there should always be a barrier between your hand and any food touched. A barrier includes gloves and/or cooking utensil. When wearing gloves, they must be changed between handling raw meats/seafood; handling cooked items; and ready to eat items or raw vegetables to prevent cross contamination. Hand sanitizer should be used during the preparation phase of the contest to further prevent cross contamination.

Hair Restraint: Each team member must wear a hat, hair net and/or other type of hair restraint during the food preparation part of the competition. Examples of acceptable hair restraints include hairnets, bandana with hair completely pulled back, Chef hat with hair restrained inside, or cap with hair completely tucked inside.

- 12. Each station will have a variety of nutrition resources/references. Each team should highlight key nutrients in their dish and their functions during their presentation.
- 13. Cost analysis: Price(s) of the key ingredient and grocery store items will be provided to teams. Teams will calculate the price of the dish based on the amount of ingredients used. Teams should calculate the cost of the total recipe, as well as the price per serving. Teams will determine the number of servings for their recipe.
- 14. Presentation: Following the preparation phase of the contest, each team will give a 5-minute presentation to a panel of judges. A majority of team members should participate in the presentation.

To earn maximum points, teams must use the 5-minute presentation to address the following areas of the presentation scorecard: Knowledge of MyPlate, Nutrition Knowledge, Food Preparation, Safety Concerns, and Serving Size.

At the end of 5 minutes, time will be called – additional time will not be allowed. Judges will be allowed 3 minutes to ask questions. **Judges will not ask questions related to what teams should have covered during the presentation.** Judges questions will be related to general nutrition, health, chronic disease prevention or others relevant to food and nutrition.

Please note: Once the 40 minutes of preparation time expires, team members may no longer communicate with each other. Team members may study their notes individually.

- 15. Teams must clean up their preparation areas. Clean-up time is included in the 40-minute preparation allotment. Teams should plan to not have access to a kitchen facility; therefore, dirty dishes should be placed in a plastic container, bag or box to be cleaned at home. Left-over food should be disposed of properly.
- 16. Judges are not allowed to taste the foods prepared. No left-over food should be shared with any participant or the audience.
- 17. The high point overall senior team will receive a \$1,200.00 incentive divided amongst each team member and the second high point overall senior team will receive a \$750.00 incentive divided amongst each team member. Checks will be mailed to the 4-H or FFA Club through which they entered.
- 18. Participants with disabilities. Any competitor who requires auxiliary aids or special accommodations must contact the Junior Food Challenge superintendent at least two weeks before the competition. $Supply\ Box$

- 1. All rules apply to the Open Breeding Sheep Show. Please refer to the General Rules.
- 2. Each livestock entry card must contain full name, address, and socials security number of exhibitor, the name of breed, and the number of head entered. It will not be necessary to give the name of the animal, registry number or name of sire and dam until the certificates of registry are presented to the superintendents. Health papers are required; please check the Animal Health Regulations for complete details.
- All sheep will be judged according to the classification on Breed Association score card (breed standards).
- 4. All breeding sheep must be registered in the flock books of their respective breeds, and bear such identification as that breed association requires, before entering the ring. Sheep not carrying ear tags or tattoo at time of showing will be barred from competition.
- 5. The breeder of an animal is the owner of the dam at the time of service. If an individual showing sheep in the registered classes is such a breeder, the lamb must be registered in his/her name by opening day of the show.
- 6. If an individual is showing a sheep in the registered classes that is a gift from some breeder, or if the sheep has been purchased from some breeder, the transfer certificate must be dated on Association records on or before January 15 of the year after this show.
- 7. In <u>all breeds</u> of the Open Breeding Sheep Show, classes are provided for lambs, two-tooth sheep and four to six-tooth sheep. Sheep in the lamb classes must retain all lamb teeth and be at least 6 months of age. Sheep which have dropped one or more milk teeth, or show one or both teeth of the first permanent pair of incisors are eligible only on the two-tooth classes. Sheep showing the first two pair or three pair of permanent incisors are eligible to show in the four to six-tooth classes only. In order to be able to move a ewe lamb or buck lamb up, you must fill the class first. Show management has the right to check teeth on entries at any time including in the show ring, and may move entries accordingly.

- 8. Each exhibitor may show three and place two entries in each single class but may show only one entry in a group class.
- 9. Any animal exhibited in a group class (i.e. a pair of Rams) must be entered in its respective class (i.e. Ram class) in the show, as well.
- 10. To enter the grounds for livestock unloading and loading, all trailers will enter the fairgrounds on the North side at Gate 6 off of Lake View Heroes Drive. There will be two lots indicated for trailer staging. At the direction of officials, trailers will be allowed to back up to the West Side of the South Livestock Barn for unloading. Once unloaded, vehicles will exit Gate 2, circle back towards Gate 6 to proceed toward the trailer lot.

Other stock shows may have different requirements, so if you are planning to attend and show at any other shows to know their specific rules for your breed.
- 14. All Southdown, Other Medium Wool, and Dorper sheep must be slick shorn within one week prior to show. Foretops and boots may be left on Southdown sheep. Boots may be left on the Dorper sheep and all Dorper sheep must have docked tails.
- 15. There will be two Dorper sheep shows: 1) Dorper (white with black heads) and 2) White Dorper (all white), must indicate which show on entry forms.

- 1. All rules apply to the Open Boer Goat Show. Please refer to the General Rules.
- 2. Each livestock entry card must contain full name, address, and socials security number of exhibitor, the name of breed, and the number of head entered. It will not be necessary to give the name of the animal, registry number or name of sire and dam until the certificates of registry are presented to the superintendents. Health papers are required; please check the Animal Health Regulations for complete details.
- 3. It is not necessary to identify the animals at time of entry, but the registration certificates are required at check-in. Health papers are required; please check Animal Health Regulations for complete details.
- 4. All goats must be registered in the flock book of the American Boer Goat Association or any other Boer Goat registry and bear such identification as that breed association requires at check-in. Goats not carrying such identification at validation shall be disqualified from competition. Original paper certificates are required at check-in.
- 5. The breeder of a goat is the owner of the dam at the time of service. Such a breeder must have his/her entries in his/her name and produce same registration certificates at check-in.
- 6. All goats must be registered in the exhibitor's name with the flock book of any recognized Boer Goat Association on or before **January 15** of the year of the show. Pending of approval from the ABGA or other breed registry will only be accepted for 0-3 month entries.
- 7. Partnerships will be accepted only if all partners are listed on the registration certificate and all partners are eligible. Partnership entries must remain as partnerships.
- 8. Percentage females, full blood males and full blood female goats will be classed by birth date on certificate of registration. If birth date falls on date of show, goat will be moved to next upper age class.
- 9. Exhibitors are not allowed to enter more than three head per class in any division, but may only receive premiums on two per class.

The South Central Llama Association sponsors this ALSA-sanctioned Level Two Llama Show.

- 1. This show is governed by the rules and regulations of the Alpaca and Llama Show Association (ALSA).
- 2. All llamas entering the show grounds must comply with the 20th edition ALSA Handbook and by the rules of the San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo Association. Each exhibitor is responsible for being familiar with all rules as stated in the ALSA Handbook, which has any changes posted on the ALSA Web site.
- **3.** Age of Animals is determined by the day the llama enters the show ring.
- **4.** All Youth ages are determined by January 1, 2022, except for seven year olds, who are eligible to show as of their 7th birthday.

- **5.** All <u>llamas 5 months and older entered in approved classes must be registered</u> or have passed screening in the ILR or CLRC, with the <u>exception</u> of animals in Youth Classes, Novice, Masters, or Open Performance classes and Non-breeders class with vet certificate.
- 6. COPIES OF REGISTRATION PAPERS (INCLUDING JUVENILES) MUST BE SENT WITH THE ENTRY FORM show management for verification of name and age. Exhibitors must be registered owners and make entry in the exact names of both owner and animal as shown on the registration certificate or present a "Permission to Show" form signed by the registered owner. FAILURE TO MEET THESE REQUIRMENTS PROHIBITS ENTRY IN THE SHOW.
- **7.** Completed entry forms, copies of registration papers, and proof of ALSA membership along with all fees should be postmarked no later than January 10, 2022.

Youth Classes: Llamas shown in Youth Classes may not be shown in Open Performance Classes. Detailed rules are found in the current ALSA Handbook. Per ALSA, all youth must be current 2022 ALSA youth members or must pay the non-ALSA youth fee of \$15.00. Youth ages 7 to 12 years of age will NOT be permitted to show an intact make over 24 months of age.

Sub-Junior (non ALSA): ages 6 years and younger

Junior: ages 7 thru 11 years

Intermediate: ages 12 thru 14 years Senior: ages 15- thru 18 years

All Youth ages are determined by January 1, 2022, except for 7 yr-olds, who are eligible to show as of their 7^{th} birthday.

<u>SASSRA INCENTIVES:</u> The San Angelo Stock Show & Rodeo Association awards two incentives to <u>senior</u> youth llama exhibitors. These incentives are based solely on the scoring in the performance classes on a weighted point system with high point names Junior Llama Show Champion and runner-up Junior Llama Show Reserve Champion.

The Champion winner will receive \$500 and the Reserve Champion winner will receive \$250. Incentives will be paid in full to the exhibitor and will be mailed with other premiums. Checks will go out approximately Mid-April. These champions will be named during the show on Sunday.

Payout schedule will be as follows:

Llamas: 1st place will receive \$20, 2nd place will receive \$15, and 3rd will receive \$10.

Alpacas: Payout will depend upon entries, but will not exceed the payout of the Llama Show.

<u>Pack Classes (Open and Youth)</u>: Animals must be 5 months of age or older. All exhibitors must provide their own saddle and panniers, or training pack as specified by the current ALSA Handbook.

Adult Showmanship: Adult Showmanship class is open to exhibitors aged 19 and older. (If a youth turns 19 during their final youth show season, they have the option to continue to show in the Senior

Showmanship class, but if the youth shows in an Adult Showmanship class they no longer are eligible to complete in youth showmanship class.)

Wool Divisions:

Suri Wool: Suri llamas have a natural balanced, athletic type, which may appear narrower than llamas of other fiber types when viewed from the front or rear. The fleece of a Suri Llama should have a natural luster and hang and drape over the llamas body, usually forming a natural part of the spine. The fibers are grouped into very distinct and well-defined locks with many individual separate locks of fiber formed at the skin and carrying out to the ends of each lock. The fleece should be lustrous, the locks independent and consistent in size, and the degree of wave or spiral content throughout the neck and body. The fiber is also characterized by absence of crimp and minimal loft.

Light Wool: Minimal body wool, short neck wool with smooth legs.

Medium Wool: Moderate to long body wool, minimal to moderate neck wool, smooth to moderate leg wool.

Heavy Wool: Abundant body and neck wool with minimal to abundant leg wool. (i.e., leg wool at least to knee and hock).

Produce of Dam and Get of Sire Classes: These classes are entered under the name of the Dam and Sire. Registration certificates of the Dam or Sire must be sent with the entry. If Dam &/or Sire is not present at the show, an ALSA fee of \$10.00 must be sent with the entry. There may be more than one entry for a Dam or Sire but only the top placing will earn points.

- -Produce of Dam consists of two offspring by the same dam, each shown in appropriate halter classes.
- -Get of Sire consists of three offspring by the same sire by a least two dams, each shown in appropriate class.
- -Offspring must be designated to show management before these classes or held.

Age Divisions for Animals Entries: Age determined by the age of the llama on the day they enter the ring in halter.

Juvenile.....5 through 12 months

Two Year Olds....24 through 36 months

Yearling.....12 through 24 months Adult.....36 months and older

Show management reserves the right to combine wool divisions if lack of enough entries warrants the decision.

- -Ribbons will be awarded in all classes for places 1-5. Rosettes will be awarded for all Grand and Reserve Champions
- -Additional cash premiums are offered by the San Angelo Stock Show Association.
