Exhibitor Guide Book

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General Rules

- 1. AGE REQUIREMENTS. All exhibitors' ages are determined as of January 1, 2019. Junior Livestock Exhibitors must be 9 years old as of January 1, 2019 to show and sell a market animal. This includes poultry meat pens, rabbit meat pens, and all large livestock (Market and Breeding).
- 2. Independent juniors must be registered with the Santa Barbara County Fair as of January 31, 2019 to be eligible to show and sell an animal at the Fair. This includes poultry meat pens, rabbit meat pens, and all large livestock (Market and Breeding). Application available online.
- 3. NO LATE ONLINE ENTRIES OR LATE ENTRY RECEIPTS WILL BE ACCEPTED. Submission of entries is ultimately the responsibility of the exhibitor. Failure of leader, advisor or parent to submit entries either online or signed entry receipts does not constitute a request for variance. Any and all variance requests submitted regarding late entries will be denied, and no appeal to the Livestock Committee and/or Board of Directors will be accepted.
- 4. No faxed online entry receipts or Postal Discrepancies will be accepted.
- 5. Exhibitor's Signature & Responsibility:
 - EACH EXHIBITOR, LEADER/ADVISOR AND PARENT'S SIGNATURE ON THE ONLINE ENTRY RECEIPT SIGNIFIES THEIR ACCEPTANCE OF THE RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE 37TH DISTRICT AGRICULTURAL ASSOCIATION AS PRINTED IN THE OFFICIAL EXHIBITOR'S GUIDEBOOK.
- 6. No refunds under \$10.00 will be given. Refund requests must be in writing to the Fair Management and must be received in the Administration Office no later than 5 pm, June 1, 2019. All requests are subject to a \$10.00 Administration Fee.
- 7. All Return Checks (DNA Fees, Entry Fees, or Auction Payments) for insufficient funds will be subject to a \$35.00 service charge. Any lost Premium Checks or Auction Checks will be charged a \$35.00 Replacement Fee.
- 8. Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury or damage done to or occasioned by or arising from any animal or article exhibited by him/her and shall indemnify the Santa Barbara County Fair against all legal proceedings in regard thereto. The Fair will take reasonable precautions to insure the safety of exhibits and property of description entered for competition of display or any other purpose while anywhere on the grounds. In no case will the Fair be responsible in any way for any loss, damage or injury of any character to any property, article or person, while same is on the Fairgrounds or at any other time or place, nor be liable for or make any payment for damage, loss, or injury. Presentation of online entry receipt shall be deemed acceptance of this rule.
- 9. Exhibitor Guidebook may be obtained at the Fair Administration Building, local Chamber of Commerce, online at www.santamariafairpark.com or by writing to the 37th District Agricultural Association, 937 South Thornburg, Santa Maria, California 93458. All exhibitors must enter online through the Fair's website, www.santamariafairpark.com
- 10. Due to early press deadline, all information contained in the exhibit book is subject to change or amendment by the Fair Management, Staff and Board of Directors. Any revisions will apply to the 2019 rules and regulations.
 - NOTE: All rules contained in "2019 State Rules for California Fairs" as described by the Division of Fairs & Expositions apply to this fair. Refer to pages 3 18.
- 11. All classes for the FFA, 4-H, Grange and Independents shall include Santa Barbara and the Southern Part of San Luis Obispo County included in the Lucia Mar Unified School District, excluding Horse Show exhibitors which include all of Santa Barbara and San Luis Obispo Counties.
- 12. Other Youth Divisions shall include Santa Barbara and San Luis Obispo Counties.
- 13. Open Departments shall include the Santa Barbara and San Luis Obispo Counties.
- 14. Entries and DNA will only be accepted during posted hours to the Fairpark Entries Office after issuance of the Exhibitor Handbook.
- 15. Entry fees and printed, signed entry receipts must be delivered to the Fairpark Administration Building, entries office window. (Drop-off hours will be posted online). Online entries may only be made until May 10, 2019 at midnight. Entry fees and printed, signed entry receipts must be delivered no later than 4 pm on Monday, May 13th, 2019. No entries will be accepted after this date and time, regardless of postmark or reason.
- 16. Exhibits will be accepted at the specified time for each department (see page 24 for schedule). Failure to comply will disqualify entry.
- 17. Exhibits will be assigned to specified locations by the Fair Management and must remain in the assigned location until the release date and time set by the Fair Management.
- 18. No entry, exhibit or display may be removed from the Fairgrounds, before 7:00 am, Monday, July 15, 2019, unless the Fair Management gives permission.
- 19. The Fair Management has the right to remove any exhibit if, in the Management's opinion, said exhibit is not in good taste.
- 20. Exhibitors are required to submit a signed entry receipt along with entry fees for entries to be considered complete. Entry fees must be submitted with a printed copy of the online entry receipt and must be received no later than 4:00 pm, May 13th, 2019 at the Fairpark entries office.
- 21. Judging Systems
 - a. American The Judging process to rank exhibits against one another and award one first placing, one second, etc.
 - Danish The judging process to compare each exhibit on its own merit against the scorecard or recognized standard and award as many first placing, etc. as merited.

GENERAL RULES FOR ALL DEPARTMENTS

I. DEFINITIONS

SEE ALSO JUNIOR and LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENTS.

- 1. **Amateur** A person who engages in an event or activity as a pastime rather than a profession. (Does not apply to junior organizations
 - and horse shows.)
- 2. Cash Awards Monies paid to successful contestants. (Synonymous with Premiums.)
- 3. **Class** A group of like exhibits that are judged together; a subcategory of a division.
- 4. **Competition** A contest between two or more exhibits.
- 5. **Division** A generalized category of exhibits or a group of classes.
- 6. Entry An object, animal or collection of objects or animals intended for exhibit.
- 7. **Exhibit** An entry becomes an exhibit when it is shown or judged at the fair.
- 8. **Entry Fees** A fee charged to enter a competition. All entry fees shall be included with the proper forms on or before the competition deadline.
- 9. Exhibitor The owner of the exhibit.
- a. In the senior department, members of a family are considered as one exhibitor and co-owners of exhibits. This includes mother, father, unmarried minor children (under 18 years of age) and minor foster children.
- b. In the senior department, in classes that require that the exhibit be the creative work of the owner, husband and wife are considered separate exhibitors.
- 10. **Extended Division** A division or class open to legal residents or producers in the State of California and any additional territory that may be specified in the Local Rules. Unless otherwise designated, all divisions are "extended" and limited to the State.
- 11. Judging Systems
 - a. American The judging process to rank exhibits against one another and award one first placing, one second, etc.
 - b. Danish The judging process to compare each exhibit on its own merit against the scorecard or recognized standard and award as many first placings, etc. as merited.
- 12. Junior Department A department provided for youth. See also Junior Department.
- 13. Juried Show Competition where the juror(s) determines which exhibits will be displayed and judged for awards.
- 14. Large Animals Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goats (exception Nigerian Dwarf Goats, to be desinated at local level, but
 - cannot be both Large and Small), Boer Goats, Market & Fiber Goats, Horse, Alpaca and Llama.
- 15. **Small Animals** Poultry, Rabbits, Cavies, Pygmy Goats, Avian Species and Dogs.
- 16. **Local Division** A division or class open only to legal residents or producers in the county or district in which the fair is held, and any neighboring county/district(s) that may be specified in the Local Rules.
- 17. Open Department See Senior Department.
- 18. Open Junior Class A class open to all Junior exhibitors having no Junior organization affiliation requirement.
- 19. **Exhibitor Handbook** An entry book, prize list, contest book or other publication specifying rules and awards for fair contests.
- 20. **Producer** One who, in the area specified, raises in normal marketable or commercial quantities, the specific type of animal or product entered.
- 21. Professional A person who engages in an event or activity as a livelihood rather than as a hobby.
- 22. **Senior Department** Any department not considered a junior department.

II. ELIGIBILITY

Entry Process

- 1. By signing and submitting an entry form the exhibitors and their agents, parents and leaders acknowledge and agree that they:
 - a. Understand and have read these State Rules and local fair rules;
 - b. Agree to abide by them;
 - c. Certify that all information on the entry form is true and accurate; and
 - d. Agree to comply with the fair's decision regarding any alleged violation of the state or Local Rules.
 - e. In the event that it is determined there has been unethical treatment of animals or violation of state or federal regulations or of state or local fair drug policy rules, exhibitor names will be forwarded to F&E as well as given to the Network of California fairs and to appropriate government agencies.
- 2. Exhibitors are responsible for obtaining entry form(s) & rules from fair, and submit the form(s) and any required fees by the closing date as specified by Fair Management.
- 3. No entry form or entry will be accepted after the closing date for entries.
- 4. Entry deadlines can be extended by the fair's Board of Directors only if the extension is made prior to the original closing date. See
 - also Horse Show Department.

- 5. Substitutions can only be made within a division. Substitutions must be made when the exhibit arrives at the fairgrounds, or for animal, when registration certificates are checked. In the livestock department a minimum \$5 penalty must be paid prior to judging for each substitution made by the exhibitor in excess of two in the division. See also Horse Show Department.
- 6. Requests for refunds must be made in writing to the fair, and may be granted upon approval of the Fair Management.
 - Refunds may be made only because of sickness, accident, or death, cancellation of a class or return of entries for lack of exhibit space.
 - b. Non-selected exhibits in a juried show are not eligible for refunds.
 - c. For animal classes, request must be made prior to the event. Requests involving health or soundness of an animal must be accompanied by a veterinarian's certificate.
- 7. **Ownership**. Unless otherwise allowed in the exhibitor handbook, exhibitors must be legal owners of all entries. Ownership must be maintained through show date(s). See also Junior Department and Horse Show Department.
- 8. A complete exhibit eligible in more than one division and/or class will be entered and judged only in the division and/or class for which it best qualifies. Any exhibit not properly entered may be transferred to its proper class by Fair Management, whose decision may be changed only by the judge.
- 9. The Fair Management has the right to limit entries to facilities available and/or cancel any division or class in which there are no enough entries. Any return of entries or fees under this rule will be done on a nondiscriminatory basis. The decision of Fair Management under this rule is only appealable to the Chief Executive Officer (CEO), whose decision is final.
- 10. Fair Management may combine classes of 4 or less entries for meaningful competition.
- 11. Exhibitors may not submit the same entries to two or more fairs that require them to be on exhibit at the same time unless prior written approval has been obtained from both fairs. A copy of this approval must be submitted with entry forms.

Participation

- 12. **NEW FOR 2019:** In order to participate in a youth livestock program (excluding horse, cavies & dogs) at any California Fair, all exhibitors 9 years of age and older must obtain annual certification in the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) program or a comparable fair run program approved by the California Department of Food and Agriculture, Fairs and Expositions Branch. Those not certified are not eligible to participate at a California Fair.
- 13. The Fair Management shall deny entry or disqualify and remove any exhibit or exhibitor that is ineligible for competition under State and Local Rules or endangers the public or has violated State and Local Rules. The fair may require removal of the exhibitor and/or exhibit (including animals) from the fairgrounds.
- 14. Exhibitors, leaders, advisors and parents found, after a chance to provide evidence and be heard before the Fair Management (CEO and staff) of unethical practices as set forth in the State and Local Rules or in actions inimical with the fair program shall result in the exhibit being disqualified and the forfeiture of any awards and/or privileges as may be deemed appropriate to the circumstances by the Fair Management. If the judging for the exhibit has not yet commenced the exhibitor, leaders, advisors and parents may be denied entry in any exhibitions at the fair. The Fair Management shall report any such incidences of unethical or inimical behavior established by the fair as provided for in this rule, to F&E in writing and such reports may become the basis for any fair to refuse entries from the exhibitor, leaders, advisors or parents for up to 5 years following the infraction.
- 15. Exhibits must be on exhibit as specified in the exhibitor handbook. Fair Management may allow late exhibit delivery or early removal of exhibits when it is in the best interest of the fair. Exhibits will not be removed from the fairgrounds before the release date printed in the exhibitor handbook except as determined by Fair Management in cases of sickness, accident, death, disciplinary actions requested by a youth program supervisor, or other circumstances which are in the best interests of the fair.
- 16. The exhibitor agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the fair, the county and the State of California from and against any liability, claim, loss or expense (including reasonable attorneys' fees) arising out of any injury or damage which is caused by, arises from or is in any way connected with participation in the program or event, excepting only that caused by the sole active negligence of the Fair. The Fair Management shall not be responsible for accidents or losses that may occur to any of the exhibitors or exhibits at the fair. The exhibitor (or parent or guardian of a minor) is responsible for any injury or damage resulting from the exhibitor's participation in the program or event. This includes any injury to others or to the exhibitor or to the exhibitor's property.
- 17. Exhibitors, leaders, and advisors must be in good standing with the local and state organization(s) (4-H, Grange, FFA) to be eligible to exhibit at the fair.

Conflict of Interest Avoidance

- 18. Directors, Fair Management, Chief Executive Officer (CEO), and/or their spouses are not eligible to exhibit at their own district, county or citrus fair except in timed events. Under no circumstances shall a director, fair management, CEO and/or their spouse be eligible to collect awards.
- 19. Department heads, judges, staff, anyone directly involved in the judging process, and their spouses are not allowed to exhibit or sign entry forms in any division in which they or their spouse are directly involved.
- 20. Minor children of Directors, Chief Executive Officer (CEO), Department Supervisors, staff and/or committee members may exhibit animals or articles which are the result of the child's own earnings or a gift made to the child, provided the requirements of pertinent rules are met. All other requirements for exhibiting must be met.

III. JUDGING

- 1. Judges should avoid any appearance of partiality and avoid unnecessary fraternization with exhibitors.
- 2. No person shall act as a judge in any division in which he/she or a member of his/her immediate family is an exhibitor, is in charge of an exhibit or division, in charge of a group of exhibitors, or a member of a group of exhibitors.
- 3. No person shall be allowed, under any circumstances, to interfere with the judge(s) regarding their adjudications, or with the fair's staff, or to offer any audible criticism of an exhibit or exhibitor. Violators of this rule shall be excused immediately from the competition and shall be subject to such additional penalties, including cancellations of awards, as the management shall consider proper.
- 4. The judge has the authority to:
 - a. Disqualify or transfer to the correct class any exhibit that does not meet the requirements of the division or class in which it is entered;
 - b. Disqualify any exhibit not properly cleaned or fitted;
 - c. Disqualify any exhibit that is in his/her opinion hazardous to public safety;
 - d. Examine the animals before entering the show ring; and/or
 - e. Refuse to make award to any animal that shows visible evidence of disease, deformity, or lameness. No award will be made to exhibits eliminated under any of the above instances.
- 5. The judge may not waive State Rules.
- 6. The judge's decision is final. Fair Management may not request any changes in judges' rulings.
- 7. To encourage high standards, the judge shall award first, second, third place, etc. according to merit. If without merit, the judge shall make no award under any circumstances. The judge may award championships or other awards at his/her discretion for superior exhibits. This applies whether there are one or more exhibits in class.

IV. AWARDS AND SCORING

- 1. Fair Management is not responsible for errors on entry forms. No exhibitor shall be entitled to an award that has been disallowed as the result of his/her own error.
- 2. All divisions or classes will be judged under the American system and/or Danish system as stated in the fair's exhibitor handbook.
- 3. State "Judging Standards" are to be used where applicable. Local judging standards may be used if published in the exhibitor handbook.
- 4. Cash awards will be paid only as recorded on the signed Judging Sheet or judging affidavit and only to the exhibitor.
- 5. Fair Management shall withhold the payment of awards for exhibits that are determined ineligible under State and Local Rules and may recover awards that have been paid for ineligible exhibits.
- 6. No exhibitor shall receive more than two cash awards in any one class using American judging system. (See definition of exhibitor.)
 - a. When an exhibitor earns more than two awards in a class, the exhibitor will receive the two highest cash awards, and the lesser cash awards will be moved down the placings to other exhibitors; ribbons will be awarded as placed.
 - b. Any difference in payment limits under the Danish system of judging shall be printed in the exhibitor handbook.
 - c. When the fair combines classes, an exhibitor is entitled to two cash awards per each class that was combined. Judges should determine special awards as printed before combining.
- 7. Sweepstakes shall be awarded as specified in the exhibitor handbook based upon these scoring guidelines:
- a. First award 5 points; Second award 3 points; Third award 1 point.
- b. Sweepstakes shall be awarded only when at least three separate exhibitors have achieved at least a combined point total of 30.
- c. To receive sweepstakes awards, an exhibitor must have a minimum of ten points.
- d. Sweepstakes points will be credited only to the exhibitor whose name appears on the entry form.
- e. There are separate sweepstakes or high point rules for horse shows, which may be determined by the fair.
- 8. Ties which cannot be broken by the judge will be processed as follows (See also Horse Show Department):
 - a. 2-way tie for 1st place: Combine 1st and 2nd place money and divide equally between the two 1st-place exhibitors. The 3rd highest finisher receives 3rd place money etc.
 - b. 3-way tie for 1st place: Combine 1st, 2nd and 3rd place money and divide equally between the three exhibitors.
- 9. The fair will not guarantee sponsored donations.
- 10. Placing of ribbons does not guarantee correct judging placement. Only the official placing stated on the judging sheet(s) constitutes the final placement.

V. PROTEST

- 1. Protests will be considered only if there has been a violation of State or Local Rules that have not been enforced. Decisions of judges, veterinarians, weighmasters, breed callers, tail dock officials and timers cannot be protested and are final.
- 2. All Protests must be accompanied by a deposit of \$500.00 (cash, money order or certified check made payable to the fair). NOTE: The deposit will be returned if the protest is upheld. If the protest is upheld, the violator may be held liable for any portion of the direct costs incurred by the fair in the course of the protest resolution. Failure to reimburse the fair shall be cause for disallowing future entries in any of the network of California fairs.

- 3. Given the short duration of the fair:
 - a. The protestor shall make every effort to file the protest prior to judging. All protests must be filed in writing within 24 hours of the time of the cause of the protest and before conclusion of fair.
 - b. The fair will make every effort to resolve protests as quickly as possible. All exhibitors by entering an exhibit and all persons by filing a protest agree to cooperate with Fair Management to resolve protests in a timely manner.
 - c. Protests shall be adjudicated by Fair Management and/or members of Board of Directors.
- 4. Any exhibit involved in a filed protest before or during judging is eligible to compete until the protest is resolved.
- 5. Classes that involve a protested exhibit will not become official until the protest is resolved.
 - a. In championship or special award classes that involve the protested exhibit the judge shall also select 1st and 2nd runners-up in case of disqualification.
 - b. In the case of protest, the unofficial judging results may be used to prepare the sale list and other necessary information.
- 6. At the discretion of the CEO judging can be delayed to allow time for the fair to resolve the protest if to do so does not unreasonably delay or disrupt the operations of the remainder of the fair judging and auction events.
- 7. Prior to judging the affected class, fairs may announce that an entry has been protested.
- 8. All questions concerning competition or non-protestable disputes or differences with staff or the exhibition not provided for under the State or Local Rules shall be referred to the CEO or their designee, whose decision shall be final.
- 9. Violations of State Rules may be appealed to F&E in writing.
- 10. An individual may appeal to F&E only after adjudication at the local level and only if:
 - a. The decision upholds a Local Rule that circumvents or is not in the spirit of a State Rule(s);
 - b. The individual can substantiate new and credible information that was not available at the time of the local decision; or
 - c. There was inappropriate adjudication at the local level that may have included conflict of interest, lack of due process, or a significant misinterpretation of rules.
- 11. A fair or state, national or international organization or subdivision thereof which has a significant stake in the interpretation of rules affecting the network of California fairs may make an appeal directly to F&E concerning multiple-fair issues, industry-wide issues, unavoidable conflict of interest or assistance in enforcing its own organization rules.
- 12. No protest will be accepted unless it:
 - Is filed or received, in writing, with a signed original and a signed duplicate copy;
 - b. Clearly states which rule has been violated;
 - c. States when the protestor first became aware of the facts and rule violation;
 - d. States the facts relied upon for the basis of the protest;
 - e. States that the protestor will cooperate with the investigation of the protest and that the protestor will be available and agrees to attend any hearing held to resolve the protest at the time and place directed by F&E;
 - f. Includes the names of supporting witnesses, with accessible phone numbers; and
 - g. Describes or attaches any documents relating to the protest, which must include the written decision issued by the local arbitrating body.
- 13. Fairs & Expositions Branch (F&E) must receive the appeal in writing within 24 hours from receipt of notice of local decision.
- 14. A hearing may be conducted at the discretion of F&E. The Director of F&E may consult with and/or request that members of State Rules Advisory Committee participate in any hearing.
- 15. Once the Director has ruled on an appeal to F&E, no additional protest or appeal will be considered relating to that incident.

ADDITIONAL DEPARTMENT RULES VI. AGRICULTURE, HORTICULTURE DEPARTMENT

Unless specified in the exhibitor handbook agricultural and horticultural products must have been produced by the exhibitor and exhibits

must be at the stage of ripeness required by Sections 42513 and 42515 of the California Food and Agricultural Code in order to be considered for award.

VII. JUNIOR DEPARTMENT

Definitions. See also Section I, Definitions.

- 1. Exhibitor The owner of the exhibit.
 - a. In the junior department, brothers and/or sisters are considered to be separate exhibitors.
 - In a college division market and showmanship classes the student designated on the entry form is considered the exhibitor.
- 2. 4-H, FFA, Grange Exhibitor Exhibitors who meet 4-H, FFA and Grange exhibitor requirements for the project(s) they enter.

- 3. Independent Junior Exhibitor not eligible to compete in a certain category as a member of a 4-H, Grange or FFA junior organization.
- 4. Open Junior Class A class open to all junior exhibitors and having no junior organization affiliation requirement.
- 5. Ownership The growing, construction or purchase of exhibits as verified by the adult leader, teacher, or parent/guardian signature on the entry form for non-livestock exhibits, or as otherwise stated in the exhibitor handbook.
- 6. Adult A parent, guardian, leader, instructor, or person whom the parent designates as responsible.

Exhibitor Age Requirements

- 7. FFA members may participate as members until the end of the calendar year following the year of graduation from high school. (For example, a graduate this year is eligible until December 31 of next year.)
- 8. 4-H Age Requirements: The levels of membership for 4-H are age based. Each level is defined as follows:
 - a. **Primary Level**: Must be 5 years old as of December 31, 2018 to exhibit at fair. Primary membership ends when members qualify as junior members. Exhibitors who are under 9 years of age on or before December 31, 2018 are not eligible to compete in large animal (Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goats, Boer Goats, Market & Fiber Goats, Horse & Llama) competitions at California Fairs.
 - b. **Junior**, **Intermediate**, & **Senior**: Must be 9 years old on or before December 31, 2018. Exhibitors are eligible to compete/exhibit through December 31st of the year in which they turn 19 years of age.
- 9. **Grange Members** must be at least 5 years old on January 1, 2019 to exhibit. They may exhibit until the end of the calendar year in which they reach age 19.
- a. All **Grange Youth** must be 9 years old on January 1, of 2019 to compete in large animal (Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goats, Boer Goats, Market & Fiber Goats, Horse, Alpaca & Llama) competitions at California Fairs.
- 10. **Independent Exhibitors** must be at least 9 years old by January 1, 2019 to compete in large animal (Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goats, Boer Goats, Market & Fiber Goats, Horse, Alpaca & Llama) competitions at California Fairs.
 - a. Exhibitors are eligible to compete/exhibit through December 31st of the year in which they turn 19 years of age.
 - b. Youth may be ineligible to participate as Independent if documented disciplinary action involving their project(s) has been taken against them by 4-H, FFA or Grange organizations. Length of ineligibility to be determined by fair management.
- 11. **Special Divisions** Youth under 9 years of age must exhibit in special small animal and non-livestock divisions designated by the local fair, with the exception of Pee Wee Showmanship.
 - a. Pee Wee Showmanship is a learning experience for youth 5 to 8 years of age. No premiums or monetary awards to be provided by the fair as well as no possibility of participating in the livestock auction. Participants should sign a release of liability/Hold Harmless statement provided by the Fair.
- 12. For non-livestock junior exhibitors showing in divisions and classes other than 4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent, the local Fair Management may set requirements as to age, grade, etc. If these requirements are not printed in the exhibitor handbook, Independent age rule above will apply.

Exhibit Eligibility

- 13. Junior exhibitors must own and/or grow or construct their exhibits.
- 14. 4-H, FFA and Grange Exhibitors:
 - a. 4-H, FFA and Grange animal project members must be enrolled in the project for at least 60 days (120 days for horse and market beef) immediately preceding the opening day of the fair or event if held separately from fair in the case of horse shows
 - b. Eligibility of a project according to 4-H, FFA, or Grange rules shall be determined by the exhibitor's 4-H Youth Advisor, FFA Advisor, Grange Youth Advisor, Local Leader or designee.
- 15. Advisor, leader, teacher, or parent/guardian signature on the entry form is required by the fair certifying that:
 - a. Projects have been under their supervision in accordance with the rules and regulations of the organization and the fair; and
 - The entry is the project of the exhibitor and is eligible for exhibit.
 Failure or refusal of such advisor, leader or parent/guardian to sign the required entry form will prevent the exhibitor from entering that particular class(es).
- 16. Independent exhibitors must enter an open junior or Independent class unless one is not available. If an open or Independent class is not available, junior exhibitors may enter an appropriate 4-H, FFA or Grange class. Division and/or class placement of Independents may be determined by Fair Management.
- 17. Juniors who have been 4-H, FFA or Grange project members within 60 days (120 days for horse and market beef) prior to the fair are not eligible to compete in that project as Independent juniors or enter project(s) under a different organization.
- 18. All junior exhibitors must have project management records and proof of supervision available as to the length of project.
- 19. Independent junior exhibitors entering market animals must provide Fair Management with a picture of their animal, appropriate proof of ownership, permanent tag, tattoo and/or hog ear notch information 120 days prior to the fair for beef and 60 days for sheep, swine and goats.
- 20. All junior exhibitors must have "on ground" supervision by a responsible adult.

Senior Department Restrictions

- 21. Junior exhibitors and junior organizations may be allowed to enter exhibits in senior department classes for which they are eligible only when:
 - a. "All Other" classes are not available; or
 - b. A class for the exhibit is not provided in the junior department; or
- 22. It allows participation in featured breed and/or sponsored association shows as defined by fair management. The junior exhibitor must also exhibit the project in the junior division.
- 23. Junior horse exhibitors may be allowed to enter the Senior Department horse show unless Local Rules prohibit.
- 24. Animals entered as individuals in the junior department cannot be entered in group classes of the senior department and vice versa.
- 25. When violations to rules 22-24 occur the junior exhibitor is not eligible for 12 months following the infraction to exhibit in that animal species or division (non-livestock) as a junior at any California fair.

Livestock and Horse Exhibits - Ownership

- 26. Animal and horse projects must be owned (and leased horses as specified in this document) solely by and under the exhibitor's care and management and under the supervision of the organization in which the project will be shown as specified below. The official ownership date is the date shown on the receipt of sale unless the animal was bred by the exhibitor. The days are counted prior to the opening day of the fair unless the event in the case of horse shows is held separately from the Fair. Ownership must be maintained through show date(s) of fair or event. See also VIII Livestock Department.
 - a. Market animals: Beef 120 consecutive days; and 60 consecutive days for swine, sheep, veal and goats.
 - b. Breeding and feeder animals: 30 consecutive days.
 - c. All small market animals (rabbits and poultry): 30 consecutive days.
 - d. <u>All horses and llamas</u>: leased or owned 120 consecutive days.
 Fairs will determine the ownership period requirement for any other animal species (e.g. potbellied pigs).
- 27. No animal exhibit (excluding rabbit & poultry) owned by a chapter or club, conducted as a joint project by two or more individuals, or jointly owned by two or more individuals is eligible in the junior department, unless the division or class specifically so states.
- 28. Under no circumstances may an exhibitor concurrently enter the same species of animal or bird (horses, beef cattle, dairy cattle, swine, sheep, dairy goats, meat goats, pygmy goats, poultry, pigeons, or rabbits) in FFA, 4-H, Grange and Independent classes of the junior department (refer to 4-H/FFA/Grange/F&E Agreement at www.cdfa.ca.gov/fe for more information).
- 29. No junior exhibitor may exhibit an animal in a market class once it has been sold as a market animal through a fair junior livestock auction. These animals may be shown following the 30 consecutive day ownership requirement as breeding animals only. All champion and reserve champion market animals will be permanently identified by the fair if sold through a fair junior livestock auction, unless these animals are sold at a terminal sale with no live animal pick-up.
- 30. Animals shown in showmanship must be owned (or leased for horses) by the exhibitor, entered by the exhibitor and shown in an appropriate market, breeding/conformation or performance class. If dog showmanship is the only class offered, dogs are eligible for showmanship without competing in performance or conformation classes. If the exhibitor has a market animal that does not meet the weight requirements and as a result may not show in an individual market class, the exhibitor may use this animal for showmanship if and only if this animal is the only animal the exhibitor has brought to the Fair.

31. Horse exhibits:

- a. Proof of ownership or lease must be available at check-in time.
- b. Leased horses cannot be shown for conformation in the halter horse division.
- c. 4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent exhibitors may show leased horses, provided the member has responsibility for the care and management of the horse during the period of the lease; and the signed lease between owner and member, with a clear picture of a side view of the horse or some permanent identification is filed at least 120 consecutive days prior to the fair or event/horse show if held separately from the fair, at the County 4-H, FFA, or Grange office, or with a person designated by those offices. Independent exhibitors must file with the fair office.
- d. Junior exhibitors cannot ride or show stallions unless it is specifically provided for by the breed association and in that case only in those specific breed classes at an USA Equestrian (formerly AHSA) sanctioned show.

Livestock & Horse Exhibits - Other

- 32. Junior exhibitors are expected to groom and care for their animal(s) when at the fair. They shall refrain from accepting active assistance from adults and non-exhibiting youth unless the junior exhibitor is actively engaged, and the assistance is only for instruction. Local fair rules will determine enforcement.
- 33. Junior exhibitors in 4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent classes must wear properly strapped headgear in mounted or horse-drawn vehicle competition. Headgear must be approved by American Society for Testing and Materials / Safety Equipment Institute.

VIII. LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENT

Definitions (See also Section I Definitions.)

- 1. All Other Breeds Breeds not previously listed that are from recognized breed associations within the specie.
- 2. **Breeder** Owner of the dam at conception. Also owner of the egg donor for ovum/embryo transfer.
- 3. **Drug** a) any substance intended for use in the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, prevention, or treatment of disease; and b) any substance, except food and water, which is intended to affect the structure or function of the body of any exhibit animal.
- Exhibitor The owner of the exhibit.
 - a. In the senior department, members of a family are considered as one exhibitor and co-owners of exhibits. This includes mother, father, unmarried minor children (under 18 years of age) and minor foster children.
 - b. In the junior department, brothers and/or sisters are considered to be separate exhibitors. See Section VII for definition of junior.
 - In college division market and showmanship classes the student designated on the entry form is be considered the
 exhibitor.
- 5. Grade-Crossbred Animals which do not meet registration requirements.
- 6. Nurse Cow Cow that is not the natural nursing mother.
- 7. **Pony** For non-breed horse shows, ponies are those horses standing less than 14.2 hands (56.8 inches) high. For breed horse shows and registered classes within non-breed shows, refer to the breed association rules which apply.
- 8. Purebred Animal An animal the breeding of whose sire and dam traces directly to registered animals of the same breed.
- 9. **Purebred Registered Animal** An animal that is registered with a recognized breed association and that meets the breed association's requirements of purebred.
- 10. Range Registered Animal Animals that have been issued range certificates in lieu of full registration certificates.
- 11. **Recognized Breed Associations** Organizations which maintain pedigrees, issue certificates of registration, and maintain a permanent office.
- 12. **Recorded Grade** An animal that is registered or recorded with a recognized breed association and does not meet that association's purebred registration requirements.
- 13. Veal Bovine primarily fed with milk or milk replacer. Local fair will establish guidelines for weights according to local industry standards of market animals.

Participation

- 14. Exhibitors must be able to prove ownership.
- 15. Exhibit animals will not be muzzled while on the fairgrounds.
- 16. Any animal that does not meet class requirements of weight, age, identification, etc. will not be paid premiums.
- 17. No animal may be entered in more than one division in the Livestock Department unless provided for in the specifications of the division. However, market or feeder animals may be entered in both divisions for individual and pens of market or feeder animals.
- 18. Animals entered in market or feeder divisions may not be entered in breeding divisions.

Animal Identification Requirements

It is unlawful to remove official identification

- 19. All animals (except horses or market and feeder animals) shall be identified by a permanent number (ear tag, tattoo, photo or drawing, or brand required by breed association, ear notching or microchip) on the animal which matches the number recorded on the entry form.
- 20. When identification numbers are in both ears and are different, both numbers shall be recorded on the entry form.
- 21. Registered dairy cattle shall meet their breed associations' requirements for identification.
- 22. An exhibitor may not use the same permanent marking on more than one animal of the same breed and sex during: any five month period for swine, any two consecutive calendar years for sheep, or any 12 month period for all other livestock (except that pigs may have the same litter mark).
- 23. For market and feeder animals, an identifying number will be placed or attached to the animal by the fair and must be on the animal at all times or awards will not be paid.

Market Animals

- 24. All market animals owned by Independent juniors shall not be discriminated against by the sale program.
- 25. If the fair requires a terminal sale and the Local Rules do not state it in the exhibitor handbook, exhibitors and their parents or guardians agree that upon entry into market competition and qualification by the market judge, the animal(s) will be sold and processed.
- 26. Desirable market weight will be a consideration in market animal judging.

Breeding Animals Exhibit Requirements

- 27. To qualify for exhibit and judging, the following information must be provided on the entry form by the closing date of entry:
 - a. Identification of each animal at least by
 - i. dam, birth date and ear tag, notching, tattoo, photo or drawing; or by

- ii. the registration number.
- b. Sire's registration number for Get of Sire entries.
- c. Dam's registration number for Produce of Dam entries.
- 28. If the above information is completed after close of entry, a \$5 penalty fee per entry may be required by the fair prior to judging to qualify for judging.
- 29. Individual animals shown in group exhibits need not be identified either on the original entry form or on supplementary entry forms unless required by a local rule.
- 30. Grade or Unregistered Purebred Animals By Registered Sire
 - a. Animals that have been registered as purebred by a breed association are not eligible in grade or unregistered classes.
 - b. Commercial unregistered animals including range, stocker, feeder and replacements, and Range Registered or Recorded Grade animals are ineligible in Registered or Purebred divisions.

Registered Purebred Animal Registration Certificates

- 31. All animals in "registered purebred breeding animal" divisions must be registered and recorded with a United States (U.S.) breed association in the exact name of the exhibitor (owner) as declared on the entry form, except for:
 - a. Pigs, 12 months or younger, which are still owned by the breeder. Litter registrations are acceptable if recorded with their breed association and if they identify the litter by birth date, sire, dam and ear notching; and
 - b. Animals whose breed association requires an inspector's approval before registering. The animal cannot be more than 12 months of age on the opening day of the fair. Exhibitors may present a statement by the secretary of the association stating that the animal is eligible to be registered. This statement must identify the animal by birth date, sire, dam, and ear tag, tattoo or notching.
- 32. Original registration certificates, a stamped duplicate issued by a U.S. breed association, or other documents mentioned above must be presented to the management when the animals arrive on the fairgrounds and must be kept on hand.
 - a. Original registration certificates faxed to the fair by the U.S. breed association will also be accepted and retained by the fair. Photocopies, letters, and telegrams are not acceptable.
 - b. Clerks are instructed to correct entry records exactly as shown on the certificate. (Any exceptions will be based solely upon the recognized U.S. breed association's standard practices for issuing registration certificates. A written verification from the association of any deviation in issuing practices must be on file with F&E.
- 33. When the owner and breeder names are not exactly the same on the registration certificate, the fair will hold all of the exhibitor's awards until the fair receives a statement from the breed association verifying that the various names are recognized as the owner and/or breeder, and including the owner's mailing address.
- 34. No deviation from or alteration in the information on a registration certificate will be permitted unless clearance in writing is first obtained from the breed association that issued the certificate. Evidence of any attempt to alter information on a registration certificate shall be reported immediately to F&E and may become the basis for any California fair to refuse entries from the exhibitor and/or it's agent.

IX. ANIMAL SPECIES RULES

State and Federal regulations concerning animal weighing and harvesting, and beef and pork promotion assessments also apply.

Cattle (Beef, Dairy, Veal)

- 1. Yellow transportation slips issued by the fair are mandatory when transporting cattle to and from the fair. (CA Food & Ag Code 21054).
- 2. Brand Inspection requirements for cattle ownership will be enforced (CA Food & Ag Codes 21051f, 21702, 21703).
- 3. Beef Cattle
 - a. Market/feeder beef are steers and heifers only.
 - b. All Registered Purebred Breeding females 24 months of age or older on the opening day of the fair must: (1) have a calf; or (2) show obvious signs of pregnancy; or (3) have a veterinarian's certificate of pregnancy; or (4) have a veterinarian's certificate stating that the animal is or has been an embryo producing female.
- 4. **Dairy Cattle**. Registered Purebred junior and senior yearlings in milk must be shown as two year olds in both the individual and group classes.
- 5. **Veal**. "Veal" refers to steers, bulls, and heifers.

Sheep

- a. **Tail Docking**. To qualify for exhibit market lambs must be docked such that the tail (dock) is healed and can be lifted from the exterior. Lambs that have no dock will not be eligible.
- 1. Lambs must show lambs teeth.
- 2. Market/feeder sheep are wethers and ewes only.
- 3. Registered Purebred Breeding Animals
 - a. Flock numbers, and not registration numbers, shall be used to identify all entries. Flock numbers and breeder's initials, name or association prefix shall be on commercially used tags attached to the ear or tattooed in the ear for yearlings

and lambs bred by the exhibitor. Lambs born from a purchased, bred ewe can bear the ear tag of the owner at the time of birth. They do not have to have original breeder's ear tag.

- b. An exhibitor may not use the same flock number on more than one animal during any two consecutive calendar years.
- 4. Natural Colored Sheep may show in "All Other Breeds" division when a separate division is not offered.
- 5. Certified registered and pedigree listed sheep with certificates are eligible to exhibit.

Wool

- 1. Only complete fleeces sheared from sheep owned by the exhibitor and in the grease are eligible for competition. Manufacturers and dealers are excluded.
- 2. Fleeces shall not be more than 12 months growth. The definition of "12 months" shall be the definition commonly accepted by the wool trade. Thus, if a fleece is actually slightly more than 12 months growth, due to unavoidable delay in obtaining shearers, or by weather, it shall be termed "12 months" wool.
- 3. No wether fleeces may be included.
- 4. Each exhibitor will be limited to two fleece entries in one class, except for the group class. A group of fleeces must be owned by one exhibitor, and each fleece must have been judged in individual fleece classes.
- 5. The judge may classify or reclassify fleeces before making awards.
- 6. Fleeces shall be rolled, flesh side out and placed in a clear plastic bag. Paper twine is discouraged.

Swine

- 1. Market/feeder swine are barrows and gilts only.
- 2. All Registered Purebred Breeding females junior yearling or older must have raised a litter of pigs to be eligible for exhibit.
- 3. Potbellied Pigs must be registered with the National Committees on Potbellied Pigs, Potbellied Pig Registry Service, Inc. or the International Potbellied Pig Registry.

Goats

1. Dairy Goats

- a. Registered Purebred Breeding Animals:
 - i. Animals with a "Certificate of Registry" (Blue Border) issued by the American Dairy Goat Association are eligible.
 - ii. Animals with a "Certificate of Registry" (Brown Border) issued by the American Dairy Goat Association are not eligible.
 - iii. The American Goat Society issues registration certificates for purebred animals only.
- b. Recorded Grade Breeding Animals: All animals registered Experimental (Blue Border Experimental), or Recorded (Brown Border Recorded) including Experimental, Native on Performance and Native on Appearance.

2. Pygmy Goats

- a. All animals must be registered with either the American Goat Society, Inc., or the National Pygmy Goat Association.
- b. Either horned, tipped or de-horned animals are permissible.

3. Angora Goats

- a. All animals must be registered with the American Angora Goat Breeders Association, Rock Springs, Texas.
- b. Either long or short clips are permissible.

4. Boer Goats

- a. All animals must be registered with the American Boer Goat Association, the International Boer Goat Association, Inc., the IBGA or the Canadian Boer Goat Association. Original registration certificate is required and must be in the owner's name.
- b. Either horned, tipped, or de-horned animals are permissible.

5. Market Goats

- a. Market goats are wethers and does only, no bucks allowed.
- b. Market goats must show milk teeth.
- c. Either horned, tipped, or de-horned animals are permissible.

X. ANIMAL HEALTH RULES

Fairs will make a reasonable effort to enforce state and federal animal health regulations, and they have the right to seek assistance from the appropriate agencies. For assistance or an entry permit contact the California Department of Food & Agriculture (CDFA), Animal Health and Food Safety Services (AHFSS). Headquarters: 1220 N St., Sacramento, CA 95814, (916) 900-5052.

Eligibility. See also Eligibility Rule II - 1.

- 1. Any inhumane activity to animals by the exhibitor, as determined by fair management in consultation with the fair veterinarian, may cause disqualification, forfeiture of awards, and removal of the exhibit or exhibitor from the fairgrounds
- 2. Animal health decisions will be made in the best interest of the animal and for the other animals at the fair as determined by fair management in consultation with the fair veterinarian.

- 3. No animal that shows any evidence of any active, unsightly or communicable disease, or any unsightly disease or other condition shall be admitted or allowed to remain on the fairgrounds.
- 4. No animal shall be admitted to a fairgrounds from any premises under quarantine for disease.
- 5. Management reserves the right to require health inspections and/or diagnostic tests to be performed before, during or after animals are on the fairgrounds and to implement disease control procedures, which may become necessary in the event of an emergency. The health of animals, when determined by the official veterinarian, shall be final. Exhibitors who refuse to allow their animals to be examined shall be disqualified and such violation shall be reported to F&E. No refund will be made.
- 6. All exhibitors must comply with all state and federal animal health regulations and the fair's health requirements, including submittal of the fair's certificate of animal medication.
- 7. Drench guns are not approved for use while on the fairgrounds. Anyone found to be using any type of drench gun to administer liquids or paste into any animal without the supervision and direction of the official fair veterinarian and/or designated fair official will result in exhibit and/or exhibitor being disqualified.
- 8. Castration sites shall be healed and free of inflammation.
- 9. Sellers are responsible for animals that are condemned or rejected at processing centers, unless contamination/injury occurred after the sale.

Use of Pharmaceuticals in Market Animals:

- Signature on entry form signifies compliance with all manufacturer and veterinarian pharmaceutical, biologic and chemical
 instructions and withdrawal requirements, and that all off-label treatments to market animals have been administered lawfully in
 accordance with a prescription from a California-licensed veterinarian whose statement notes dosage, date, and purpose for
 administration.
- 2. All exhibitors must advise management of any drugs and medications administered to an animal that might still be detected at the time of showing and at meat inspection. The name of the drug, its purpose, withdrawal time, route, time and date of administration must be presented to management prior to the showing and sale of the animal. Livestock treated within the specified withdrawal period cannot be sold without notifying the buyer.
- 3. Exhibitors must complete the fair's medication certificate prior to sale.

CATTLE

Cattle Entries from California

- 1. All female dairy cattle four (4) months of age and over and beef cattle twelve (12) months of age and over must bear evidence of official calfhood vaccination against brucellosis with a legible, official tattoo visible in the right ear.
- 2. Owners of Purebred Registered cattle without brucellosis tattoos must present documentation certifying brucellosis vaccination, or written documents showing the animal has an exemption from CDFA, AHFSS.
- 3. All dairy cattle and beef bulls changing ownership require an official ID eartag.
- 4. All dairy cattle born after January 1, 2017 require official ID eartags applied prior to leaving their birth premises.
- 5. Acceptable methods for Official Identification of cattle include:
 - a. Official brucellosis calfhood vaccination tags
 - b. USDA metal "silver brite" tags
 - c. Tags conforming to Animal Identification Number (AIN) system (commonly known as an 840 tags)
- 6. It is unlawful to remove official identification. Requests to remove an official ID eartag must be submitted to CDFA, AHFSS in writing at least 72 hours prior to the need to remove the tag. The request must include a photo of the ID, the reason the ID must be removed, and all other official ID eartags on the animal.

Cattle Entries from Other States

- 1. All exhibition cattle entering California require official individual identification (ID), an Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI) obtained within thirty (30) days before movement into the state listing official ID and a California entry permit within fifteen (15) days prior to entry.
- 2. Acceptable methods for Official Identification of cattle include:
 - a. Official brucellosis calfhood vaccination tags
 - b. USDA metal "silver brite" tags
 - c. Tags conforming to Animal Identification Number (AIN) system (commonly known as an 840 tags)
- 3. It is unlawful to remove official identification. Requests to remove an official ID eartag must be submitted to CDFA, AHFSS in writing at least 72 hours prior to the need to remove the tag. The request must include a photo of the ID, the reason the ID must be removed, and all other official ID eartags on the animal.
- 4. Testing and/or vaccination requirements are:
 - a. All female dairy cattle four (4) months of age and over and beef cattle twelve (12) months of age and over must bear evidence of official calfhood vaccination against brucellosis with a legible, official tattoo visible in the right ear.
 - b. All sexually intact dairy cattle six (6) months of age and over require a negative TB test within 60 days prior to entering California or must originate from a TB accredited free herd with documentation of the herd number and test date.
 - c. Cattle do not require a brucellosis test unless originating from a designated brucellosis surveillance area.
 - d. All bulls 18 months of age and over, and non-virgin bulls less than 18 months of age, require a negative PCR Trichomonosis test within 60 days prior to entry except bulls used solely for exhibition, confined to the exhibition location, and without access to mature female cattle, that will return directly to the state of origin after exhibition.

SHEEP AND GOATS

Sheep and Goat Entries from California

- 1. All sheep and goats entering fairs require official individual identification that must be kept on the animals. Acceptable official identification includes:
 - Official USDA individual identification eartags
 - Radio Frequency Identification Device (RFID) tags with 840 numbers
 - Eartags containing a premises/flock number with an individual number
 - Eartags containing a letter/number combination for serial numbers
 - b. Legible registration tattoos in the ears (or tail-web of La Mancha goats) if accompanied by breed association registration papers.
 - c. Electronic implants (microchips) when accompanied by registration papers and microchip scanner
- 2. It is unlawful to remove official identification. Requests to remove an official ID eartag must be submitted to CDFA, AHFSS in writing at least 72 hours prior to the need to remove the tag. The request must include a photo of the ID, the reason the ID must be removed, and all other official ID eartags on the animal.
- 3. Fairs will not accept:
 - a. Animals from scrapie-infected flocks, scrapie source flocks, or scrapie "non-compliant" flocks
 - b. Animals that are scrapie-positive, scrapie suspects or scrapie exposed unless they have been evaluated and approved for exhibition by the state scrapie epidemiologist.
- 4. Fairs will keep records of the consignor, buyer, and animal identification information for five (5) years when animals change ownership in a public sale at the fair.
- 5. Fairs will try to accommodate Scrapie Flock Certification Program members with separate space if practical. Breeding animals should be housed in separate enclosures or locations from animals that are not in the certification program, if practical.
- 6. Sheep or goats within 30 days pre-or post-parturition, or with vaginal discharge, shall if practical, be kept separate from animals from different flocks and in an area that can be properly cleaned and disinfected.

Sheep and Goat Entries from Other States

- 1. All exhibition sheep and goats entering California require official individual identification (ID), an Interstate Livestock Entry Permit, and an Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI) obtained within thirty (30) days before movement into the state with a scrapie statement "The animals are not scrapie positive or suspect or from a scrapie non-compliant flock" that lists the official identification.
- Acceptable official identification includes:
 - a. Official USDA individual identification eartags
 - Radio Frequency Identification Device (RFID) tags with 840 numbers
 - Eartags containing a premises/flock number with an individual number
 - Eartags containing a letter/number combination for serial numbers
 - b. Legible registration tattoos in the ears (or tail-web of La Mancha goats) if accompanied by breed association registration papers
 - c. Electronic implants (microchips) when accompanied by registration papers and microchip scanner.
- 3. It is unlawful to remove official identification. Requests to remove an official ID eartag must be submitted to CDFA, AHFSS in writing at least 72 hours prior to the need to remove the tag. The request must include a photo of the ID, the reason the ID must be removed, and all other official ID eartags on the animal.
- 4. Rams six (6) months of age and over imported into California require a negative Brucella ovis test within 60 days before entry OR originate from a Brucella ovis free flock. The ICVI must include the official ID number, test results, name of the approved laboratory, date of the test, or the "Brucella ovis free flock number".

SWINE

Swine Entries from Other States

- 1. All exhibition swine entering California require official individual identification (ID), an Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI) obtained within thirty (30) days before movement into the state. Official ID must be listed on the ICVI along with a California entry permit, which must be obtained prior to entry and is valid for fifteen (15) days once issued.
- 2. Acceptable forms of Official Identification include:
 - a. Official United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Eartags A tamper-resistant metal or plastic official identification tag with high retention rate that provides unique identification for individual animals. It must bear the US shield and conform to one of the following numbering systems: National Uniform Ear-tagging System (NUES), Animal Identification Number (AIN) or Premises Identification Number (PIN).
 - b. Ear notches or tattoos (ear or inner flank) if recorded in Purebred Registry Association Board with documentation attached to the ICVI
- 3. It is unlawful to remove official identification. Requests to remove an official ID eartag must be submitted to CDFA, AHFSS in writing at least 72 hours prior to the need to remove the tag. The request must include a photo of the ID, the reason the ID must be removed, and all other official ID eartags on the animal.

4. No brucellosis or pseudorabies tests are currently required.

EQUINE

Equine Entries from Other States

All equine require a valid Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI), issued within 30 days before entry and evidence
of a negative Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test performed at a USDA-approved laboratory within twelve (12) months before
the date of entry. An EIA test "pending" result does not meet the entry requirement. The ICVI must accurately represent the
official animal identification of each horse in the shipment. The requirements apply to horses, ponies, mules, donkeys, burros
and zebras.

POULTRY

Poultry Entries from Other States

- 1. All exhibition poultry entering California must be accompanied by an Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI) with the required statements on Avian Influenza and Exotic Newcastle Disease, unless coming from a flock participating in the National Poultry Improvement Program (NPIP) and accompanied by the documentation required by that program, and officially identified with one of the following devices or methods:
 - a. Identification devices or methods approved for use in the NPIP such as sealed and number leg bands
 - b. Group/lot identification with a group/lot identification number

RABBIT AND CAVY

Rabbit and Cavy Entries from Other States

All rabbits and cavies are recommended to have an Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI).

XI. HORSE SHOW DEPARTMENT

State Rules in Sections I-X also apply where there is no conflict.

Rules For Horse Show Management. At USA Equestrian (formerly AHSA) and/or breed association approved horse shows, association

rules shall apply. At non-USA Equestrian (formerly AHSA) approved horse shows, USA Equestrian rules will be used as a guideline unless otherwise specified in State or Local Rules.

Rules for Exhibitors

- 1. The age of an exhibitor on **January 1** shall be maintained through the calendar year. **Amateur Definition**: a person who does not give riding lessons and/or ride, train, or show horses for money or assist the spouse or immediate family in this activity. This includes a person under the age of 18 years.
 - a. The management reserves the right to question anyone's amateur standing if the question of status has been presented with reasonable cause. The decision of the horse show management shall be final.
 - b. At USA Equestrian (formerly AHSA) approved and breed association approved horse shows, their definition of amateur applies.
- 2. Exhibitors shall provide the following on the entry form for each entry if registered: (a) owner's name; (b) breed; (c) name of animal; (d) sex; and (e) year of birth. In breed classes where registration papers are required, the owner's name as listed on the registration papers must be the same as on the entry form. Registration numbers of animals and their sires and dams will be required as per breed association.
- 3. Upon approval by the Board of Directors, post entries can be accepted at double the entry fee unless a different penalty fee is printed in the exhibitor handbook.
- 4. Substitutions can only be made within a division. Substitutions must be made when the entry arrives at the fairgrounds. For horse shows, a substitution is considered the horse, not each class in which it is entered. A \$5.00 penalty per horse must be paid prior to judging for each substitution made by the exhibitor.
- 5. All riders, drivers, and attendants shall be neatly and suitably dressed on entering the show ring. Horse show manager shall have final decision.

Junior Horse Show Exhibitors in 4-H, FFA and Grange classes, including Independent exhibitors in those classes.

- 6. Junior Department rules (VII) also apply.
- 7. Exhibitors must wear properly strapped headgear in mounted or horse-drawn vehicle competition. Headgear must be approved by American Society for Testing and Materials/Safety Equipment Institute.
- 8. Junior exhibitors are expected to groom and care for their animal(s) when at the fair. They shall refrain from accepting active assistance from adults and non-exhibiting youth unless the junior exhibitor is actively engaged, and the assistance is only for instruction. Local fair rules will determine enforcement.
- 9. Ownership or Lease:

Any horse exhibited in the junior or youth division must be owned or leased by the junior exhibitor showing the horse or owned by the junior exhibitor's parent, stepparent, sibling, half-sibling, step-sibling, grandparent, step grandparent, sibling's spouse, half sibling's spouse, step-sibling's spouse or legal guardian (as evidenced by court documents), or owned by the institution in which

the junior exhibitor is enrolled as a ward. Separate legal entities, such as family corporations, trusts, or partnerships, are also authorized owners of the youth exhibitor's horse so long as all legal and equitable owners and beneficiaries of the legal entity are individuals specifically authorized by this rule. "Owned" means, in addition to other legitimate methods of acquiring ownership, the bona fide legal ownership obtained for adequate consideration in reasonable relationship with the actual market value of the horse

- 10. Horse projects must be owned or leased by and under the exhibitor's care and management and under the supervision of the organization in which the project will be shown 120 consecutive days prior to the opening day of fair or event/show if held separate from fair. The official ownership date is the date shown on the receipt of sale unless the animal was bred by the exhibitor. The days are counted prior to the opening day of the fair or event.
 - a. Leased horses cannot be shown for conformation in the halter division.
 - b. For owned horses, proof of ownership must be available at check in.
 - c. For leased horses, the lease, signed by the owner and the 4-H, FFA, Grange or Independent exhibitor, and a clear picture of a side view of the horse or some permanent identification must be filed at least 120 consecutive days prior to opening day of the fair or event/show if held separately from the fair at the county 4-H, FFA, or Grange office or with a person designated by the 4-H Youth Advisor, FFA Advisor or Grange Youth Advisor.
- 11. Horses owned as a joint project may only be shown by one designated exhibitor at an individual show.

All Junior Horse Show Exhibitors

- 12. Fair Management will not offer Lead Line classes in fair sponsored Youth Horse Shows. Lead Line classes may be offered in Open Horse Shows or according to the provisions specified in Rule 11 a, Special Divisions, ADDITIONAL DEPARTMENTAL RULES, Section VII. Junior Department, page 10.
- 13. Fair Management will not allow junior exhibitors to ride or show stallions unless it is specifically provided for by the breed association and in that case only in those specific breed classes at a USA Equestrian (formerly AHSA) sanctioned show.
- 14. Junior horse exhibitors may be allowed to enter the Senior Department horse show unless Local Rules prohibit.

Participation Rules

- 15. Ponies entered in classes in which horses are eligible to compete cannot be shown in pony classes at the same show. Fair Management can restrict ponies from entering certain classes by stating so wherever applicable in the exhibitor handbook.
- 16. Donkeys and mules cannot be shown in "all other breed" halter classes.
- 17. Eliminations, if deemed necessary by the management, may be held in classes with large entries. The exhibitor shall be expected to ascertain whether eliminations will be held.

Management

- 18. No show or contest official or his/her spouse shall enter or exhibit horses in any show or contest at which he/she is officiating, nor may any horse owned by such person be entered or exhibited. A show contest official shall be defined as any person performing the duties of a show manager, judge steward, show secretary, cutter or chariot race official, or any other horse contest. Duties include but are not limited to:
 - a. Contacting or hiring of judges; and
 - b. Acceptance of entries or entry fees.
- 19. Minor children of Directors, Chief Executive Officer (CEO), Department Supervisor, Show Manager, staff and/or committee members may exhibit horses which are the result of the child's own earnings or a gift made to the child, provided the requirements of the pertinent rules are met. All other requirements for exhibiting must be met.
- 20. Animals owned jointly by a director and his/her minor child or a CEO and his/her minor child are considered as owned by the child in junior division classes only.
- 21. Show Manager reserves the right to return entries, transfer entries or combine divisions or classes, and/or cancel any division or class in which, in its judgment, the entries are insufficient to secure adequate competition.
 - a. Any return of entries under this rule must be done on a nondiscriminatory basis.
 - b. The horse show management must divide classes of 50 or more. Separate prize money and ribbons shall be provided for each class.
- 22. Horse show management shall assign a number to each horse. The exhibitor must wear the number when showing the horse.
- 23. Photocopies of registration certificates for horse shows may be permitted for the purpose of submitting entries. However, if the fair receives any complaint or challenge concerning the registration of any animal, the fair may request an original registration certificate and may disqualify the entry if it cannot be produced.

Awards

- 24. Fair Management may withhold the payment of awards for exhibits which are in question under State and Local Rules and may recover awards that have been paid for exhibits in question.
- 25. For ties other than first place in a jumper or other individually worked competition, the prize money is split. Ties for first follow the jump off rules of the specific Table and Section for that jumper class. If there is still a tie, prize money is split between the winners (i.e. first and second place money is pooled and split evenly between the two riders). Distribution of non-money awards shall be determined by management.

Judges

- 26. The judge may judge for conformation before entering the show ring.
- 27. In halter horse classes, judges shall be expected to give reasons for their decisions, embracing the value and desirable qualifications of the animals for which premiums are awarded, whenever possible and reasonable.
- 28. Judges shall not discriminate against exhibitors wearing protective headgear.

EQUINE HEALTH RULES

- 1. All animals must be serviceably sound. The soundness of animals when determined by the official veterinarian or by the judge shall be final and cannot be protested. The horse show management may request the official veterinarian to examine any animal in competition. All penalties of the Horse Protection Act of 1970 shall be strictly enforced.
- 2. Exhibitors who refuse to allow their animal to be examined shall be disqualified from showing and such violation shall be reported to F&E. No refund can be made in these cases.

Equine Health Regulations

- 1. Equines known to be EIA positive reactors are forbidden to enter, reside, compete, or sell at any state-supported fairgrounds.
- 2. Equine Medication Monitoring Program (CA Food & Ag Code 24000-24018)
 - a. Horses are subject to random drug and medication testing specified in the Food and Agricultural Code Sections 24000-24018. The applicable fee is \$5.00 per horse per event. The following events are exempt from the Equine Medication Monitoring Program:
 - A rodeo related competition, which is strictly a timed performance with no subjective judging, held apart from a public event.
 - · A sale of solely racehorses,
 - Competitions under the jurisdiction of the California Horse Racing Board.
 - A public equine event for which the class or event entry fee is less than \$4.99 per class and other fees do not exceed \$19.99 (Other fees include but are not limited to, grounds fees, stall fees or office fees.)
 - A public equine event in which all fees for participation are less than \$19.99 (Fees include but are not limited to class fees, grounds fees, stall fees or office fees.)
 - b. The California Equine Medication Rule permits therapeutic drugs or medications prescribed by a licensed veterinarians for the treatment of a veterinary diagnosed illness or injury. All drugs or medications must be used in accordance with the California Equine Medication Rules. Prohibited substances include most stimulants, depressants, tranquilizers, anesthetics including local anesthetics, sedative analgesics, corticosteroids excluding dexamethasone, anabolic steroids, soring agents, and masking agents. Nine permissible medications (dexamethasone, diclofenic acid, firocoxib, flunxin, ketoprofen, meclofenamic acid, methocarbamol, naproxen, and phenylbutazone) are restricted to therapeutic usage as prescribed or administered by a licensed veterinarian, and test-sample levels detected must be in compliance with plasma or urine levels associated with limited dosing*. Additionally, the detection of more than one Non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drug in either a blood or urine sample is a violation of California rules. Maintaining a current listing of specific prohibited substances is impossible due to the continual introduction of new pharmaceuticals, discontinuation of old ones, off labeled prescription of human products, and utilization of foreign products. Additionally, some exemptions exist.
 - *Specific information is contained in the "EMMP Medication Guidelines Brochure" found at http://www.cdfa.ca.gov/ahfss/Animal Health/emmp/ or may be requested from CDFA/EMMP at 916-900-5045.
 - c. Horses must be withdrawn from competition for at least 24 hours after administration of a prohibited substance. A drug declaration form must be filed with an event manager for administration of any prohibited substance three (3) days before the event, to any horse entered in the event. Penalties for violations of the medication rules include fines, suspension, and forfeiture of all winnings.

3. Horse Protection Act

Exhibitors must comply with the Horse Protection Act of 1970 (P.L. 91-540) and rules adopted by the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture to carry out its provisions.

Equine Entries from Other States

1. All equine require a valid Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI), issued within 30 days before entry and evidence of a negative Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test performed at a USDA-approved laboratory within twelve (12) months before the date of entry. An EIA test "pending" result does not meet the entry requirement. The ICVI must accurately represent the official animal identification of each horse in the shipment. The requirements apply to horses, ponies, mules, donkeys, burros and zebras.

XII. JUDGING STANDARDS

Note to Fair Management: *See also IV-3*. "State Judging Standards" are to be used where applicable. Fairs may allow for additional grouping systems within the Market Ready or Market Acceptable for sale purposes.

MARKET HOG SCORECARD

GRADE

Market Acceptable: U.S. No. 1 and No. 2 hogs of average or greater conformation that are acceptable in leanness, muscularity and production traits.

Not Market Acceptable: Any hog of below average conformation including U.S. number 3, U.S. number 4 and utility grade hogs.

MARKET LAMB SCORECARD

GRADE

Market Ready: USDA Prime or Choice quality with 12th rib back fat range .16-.35, average or greater conformation and cutability.

Not Market Ready: Good or lower quality grade with 12th rib back fat range <.16 or >.35; underfinished lambs grading USDA good or

lower, below-average conformation or cutability.

MARKET BEEF SCORECARD

GRADE

Market Ready: Market steers projected to have sufficient fat deposition to meet the marbling specifications for USDA Prime, Choice, or

Select+ quality grades.

Not Market Ready: Market steers lacking evidence of sufficient fat deposition to produce a desirable consumer product. Steers projected

to grade USDA Select- or lower.

MARKET VEAL SCORECARD

GRADE

Group 1: Animals are smooth, deep, thick and compact; and the udder or scrotum shows a marked fullness. They must have youthful appearance and be in good condition.

Group 2: Animals must possess a moderately high degree of the higher quality grade characteristics. They will carry less finish, show more bone, and have less uniformity.

Group 3: Animals lack finish, are rather leggy and hippy, are rough in the shoulder, and are light in the round.

MARKET GOAT (CHEVON) SCORECARD

GRADE

Market Ready: USDA Prime or Choice quality with 12th rib back fat range .08-12 most desirable, .13-.22 back fat acceptable, average or greater conformation and cutability.

Not Market Ready: Good or lower quality grade with 12th rib back fat range <.08 or >.22; under finished goats grading USDA good or

lower, below average conformation or cutability.

Important Facts For 2019

ENTRY DEADLINES: All entries must be made online. All Entry Fees and Online Entry Receipts must be delivered to the Fairpark Administration Building, entries office window. (Drop-off hours will be posted online). Online entries may only be made until May 10th, 2019 at midnight. Entry Fees and printed, signed entry Receipts must be delivered no later than 4:00 pm on Monday, May 13th, 2019 to the Fair Entries Office. No entries will be accepted after this date and time, regardless of postmark or reason.

NO LATE ONLINE ENTRIES OR LATE ENTRY RECEIPTS WILL BE ACCEPTED. Submission of entries is ultimately the responsibility of the exhibitor. Failure of leader, advisor or parent to submit entries either online or signed entry receipts does not constitute a request for variance. Any and all variance requests submitted regarding late entries will be denied, and no appeal to the Agriculture Committee and/opr Board of Directors will be accepted.

No faxed online entry receipts or Postal Discrepancies will be accepted.

DEFICIENT ENTRIES (Incomplete) – Any Entries that are submitted by the deadline but are incomplete due to missing signature, entry fees or additional paperwork will be considered DEFICIENT. Exhibitor with Deficient Entries will have 10 days from when they are notified via phone to correct their Deficient Entries. If said Deficient Entries are not corrected within 10 days of notification the Entries will not be accepted and said Exhibitor will not be eligible to show at the 2019 Fair. NOTE: Failure to enter showmanship, or enter an animal for a showmanship class is not considered a DEFICIENT ENTRY.

ONLINE ENTRIES: Once again all exhibitors will be required to enter online. No paper entries will be accepted for any entry.

To access online entries, go to www.santamariafairpark.com and click on Application/Forms or Livestock Info, and then "Online Entries" Link. If you have any questions about the online entries process, please contact Entry Staff at (805) 346-2419 or livestock@santamariafairpark.com.

NOTE: If you do not have access to a computer or do not know how to use a computer please contact the Fair Entry Office, at (805) 346-2419 and you will be provided with assistance in entering your entries.

DNA FINGERPRINTING: Once again the Santa Barbara County Fair will require all livestock exhibitors planning to enter replacement heifers and/or market animals (Beef, Sheep, Swine, & Meat Goats) in the 2019 Santa Barbara County Fair to have a hair sample taken prior to ownership deadlines. Deadlines for receiving DNA kits and returning completed samples are listed below:

HEIFERS & MARKET STEERS – DNA Kits available for pick-up starting February 4, 2019

- March 8, 2019 Deadline to pick up DNA kit and pay \$5.00 fee
- Completed DNA Kits must be received in the Fair's Entry Office by 4:00 pm March 8, 2019

MARKET SHEEP, SWINE AND MEAT GOATS - DNA Kits available for pick-up starting April 1, 2019

- May 8, 2019 Deadline to pick up DNA kit and pay \$5.00 fee
- Completed DNA Kits must be received in the Fair's Entry Office by 4:00 pm May 8, 2019

No replacement heifer or market animal will be eligible for official entry in the 2019 Santa Barbara County Fair unless a hair sample is obtained, and a DNA Registration Form has been submitted and a Sample Fee paid (\$5.00 per animal) to the Santa Barbara County Fair Entries Office by the appropriate deadline.

LOST OR DAMAGED DNA KITS. If you lose, misplace or damage your DNA Kit, a replacement kit will be available ONLY until DNA Kit Receiving Deadlines; NO DNA Kits will be released after these deadlines. (each DNA kit is \$5.00)

NO LATE DNA KITS WILL BE ACCEPTED. Submission of DNA Kits is ultimately the responsibility of the exhibitor. Failure of leader, advisor or parent to submit DNA Kit by deadline does not constitute a request for

variance. Any and all variance requests submitted regarding late submittal of DNA Kits will be denied, and no appeal to the Livestock Committee and/or Board of Directors will be accepted.

DEFICIENT DNA KITS (Incomplete) – Any DNA Kits that are submitted by the deadline but are incomplete due to missing signature on sample fee will be considered DEFICIENT. Exhibitor with Deficient DNA Kits will have 10 days from when they are notified via phone to correct their Deficient DNA Kit. If said Deficient DNA Kit is not corrected within 10 days of notification the DNA Kit will not be accepted and said animal will not be eligible for entry into the 2019 Fair.

NOTE: This process (HAIR SAMPLE COLLECTION) does not enter your animal into the 2019 Santa Barbara County Fair; it is only a part of the necessary requirements each exhibitor must complete to enter replacement heifers & market animals. Exhibitors must enter their animals online by May 10th, 2019 and have the signed online receipt, and entry fee turned into the Fair Entries Office by 4:00 pm on Monday, May 13th, 2019 to be eligible to show at the 2019 Santa Barbara County Fair.

See General Livestock Rules for DNA Requirements.

LOCAL BRED AWARDS: Policy on "Local Bred" Awards

The Santa Barbara County Fair will recognize one local chapter of a statewide or nationwide species association for purposes of awarding a "Local Bred" award, scholarship, or combination of awards and scholarships to exhibitors at the Fair. No more than one local chapter of a species association will be recognized for each species exhibited at the Santa Barbara County Fair.

The local chapter must be currently affiliated with the statewide or nationwide association as of the arrival day for that species to exhibit at the Santa Barbara County Fair.

All awards and/or scholarships must be funded, obtained, and provided wholly by the local association.

In order to be recognized, a local producer must be a member in good standing in the local association. It is the responsibility of the local association to determine the validity of the producer's membership in the local association.

Exhibitors and their animals who advance to the Supreme Champion Drive will be eligible for "Local Bred" awards or scholarships based upon their eventual placement in the Supreme Champion Drive.

Exhibitors must provide a biography for themselves and their animal prior to the Supreme Champion Drive. Exhibitors who wish to be considered for a "Local Bred" award or scholarship must include the name of the local producer who provided the animal in their biography. Producer's will be recognized as part of the introduction of the exhibitor and animal for the Supreme Champion Drive.

After the judging and presentation of the Supreme Champion award by the judge, a representative of the local association will have no more than 10 minutes to present awards and or scholarships to the participants in the Supreme Champion Drive. (Cattle are exempt from this in 2019 and will be presented as in previous years.)

It will be the responsibility of the local chapter to ascertain the validity of the chain of ownership between the local producer and the exhibitor.

Local chapters of statewide or nationwide species associations who wish to present awards at the Santa Barbara County Fair must indicate that desire in writing no later than November 1st of the prior year and must provide proof of the chapter's standing in the statewide or nationwide association.

Only species exhibited in competition at the Santa Barbara County Fair are eligible for a "Local Bred" award.

CHAMPION DRIVE: Order of species for Champion Drive will be Swine, Goats, Sheep, and Steers. All Breed Winners for Sheep and Swine will be in Champion Drive. All 1st place Goat Class Winners will be brought in for champion drive, All 2nd place Goat class winners will be brought in for Champion Drive, announced and recognized, then placed in holding pens. Second place Goat class winners will only compete in Champion Drive if the 1st place class winner in their class is selected as a champion. For all Steers, Champions and Reserve Champions will be chosen on show day in the show ring. Selected Champions and Reserve Champions will compete for Supreme

Champion in the Champion Drive. Champion and Reserve Champion Photos will be taken following respective shows. All Replacement Heifers (Open and Local Bred) Champions and Reserve Champions will be chosen on their respective show day in the show ring. Replacement Heifer Champion Photos will be taken following respective shows.

RESIDUE AVOIDANCE PROGRAM (Drug Testing): The Santa Barbara County Fair will enforce a Residue Avoidance Program (Drug Testing) of all market animals at the 2019 Fair. All Supreme and Reserve Supreme Champions will be tested immediately following Champion Drive. All Supreme and Reserve Supreme Champion animals and exhibitors will be escorted to designated Residue Avoidance Collection Area, and along with a parent or advisor must remain in the collection area until a sample has been collected from said animal.

PEN DECORATING (Swine Barn and Sheep/Goat Barn): Backdrops for decorating in the swine barns and the sheep/goat (Marciel Barn) will be limited to open lath. The lath will be no larger than two (2) feet high and six (6) feet/eight (8) feet long, depending on the assigned pen size. There must be a two (2) foot opening between the top of the pens and the beginning of the lath piece. Only one, two (2) foot by six (6) foot/(8) foot section per club/chapter may be covered with paper or plastic for a backdrop for the educational/informational part of the display for the Clean Stall contest. All other lath sections must remain uncovered, except for stall and thank you cards. No solid backdrops will be allowed in the swine/sheep/goat barns.

QUALITY ASSURANCE & ETHICS AWARENESS TRAINING

NEW FOR 2019: In order to participate in a youth livestock program (excluding horse, cavies & dogs) at any California Fair, all exhibitors 9 years of age and older must obtain annual certification in the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) program. Those not certified are not eligible to participate at a California Fair. This is required of all Beef, Sheep, Swine, Poultry, Rabbit, Cavy, Goat (Meat, Dairy, Pygmy) exhibitors. All training is now online at YQCA.ORG. Certificates of Completion must be received with Online Entry Receipts no later than 4:00 pm on Monday, May 13th, 2019.





- 6. Non-acid foods which include vegetables must be canned under pressure.

- All entrants must be home winemakers. By signing the entry form or giving the ok online, the entrant declares that his/her
 entries were made in a home winemaking situation and not by a winery on a commercial basis. In case of question, the
 Central Coast Home Vintners' Association (CCHVA) Board of Directors will decide questions regarding eligibility.
- 3. Wines awarded Gold medals in previous Santa Barbara County Fair Homemade Wine judging's are not eligible.
- 4. Wine made in a cooperative effort by multiple winemakers shall be submitted under only one person's name. Only one bottle may be entered. Only one medal will be awarded per cooperative wine entry.
- 5. Distinctly different wines will be accepted from an entrant for each class. For example, one entry could be a 2009 Zinfandel and one could be a 2010 Zinfandel.
- 6. A wine must contain at least 75% of a single varietal to be entered in a single varietal class; all others shall be entered in the red or white "blend" classes.
- 7. All wines entered in other than fruit wine classes must be made from grapes.
- 8. Entries become the property of the judging panel and will not be returned.
- 9. All awards will be determined on a merit basis by the judging panel using a 20-point judging criteria approach.

- 4. Exhibitors must be enrolled in a Light Horse Project for 2018-2019. Exhibitors must have owned or leased their horse for a minimum of 120 days prior to the closing date of entries. A COPY of the exhibitor's project report must be emailed to livestock@santamariafairpark.com along with exhibitor's proof of ownership or lease at least one week before the show date. Failure to do so will result in not being able to show.
- 5. Only one horse may be shown.
- 6. USÁ Equestrian (formerly AHSA), California State Fair 4-H Horse Show rules will apply to the horse show classes. CHSA rules will apply to the gymkhana division.
- 7. The Judge's decision will be final.
- 8. No mechanical hackamores may be used except in gymkhana division.
- 9. Stallions will not be permitted on the Santa Maria Fairpark grounds at any time during the Santa Barbara County Fair Horse Show.
- 10. Dress Code: Exhibitors must wear long sleeves, boots, and a belt at all times. Breeches of a neutral color will be permitted for English classes, along with blue or black jeans in western and gymkhana classes. Helmets must be worn in all riding and timed events.

 - Independents will wear white long sleeved collared shirt, white pants and black tie or uniform of their independent group.
- 11. Only the youth is to handle or prepare the horse on the fairgrounds. Leaders, Jr. Leaders and other exhibitors are allowed to help or coach exhibitors. Parents are asked to refrain from any help, unless safety is at stake.

- 12. Classes will be judged under the USA Equestrian system. There will be 1st-10th placed in each 4-H, Grange and Independent class, and 1st-6th placed in each FFA Class.
- 13. One Memorial Perpetual Trophies will be given at the show

- 1. All animals must be identified by permanent ear markings conforming to the online entry upon arrival at the Fair. No tattooing or tagging will be allowed on fairgrounds. If found doing so exhibitor will be disqualified.
- Any duplication of ear markings (permanent ear tattoos) by one exhibitor in the same division must be eliminated and changed
 with the Entry Office (Administration Building) by July 2nd. Ear markings must be listed on online entry when submitted. NOTE:
 Question Marks (?) or X's do not constitute as a tattoo and will not be accepted, all tattoo must be legible, and no wet ink, nonlegible tattoos will not be accepted.
- 3. Animals will be shown and judged in the proper division and class for breed, variety and sex only. If no division is offered, no awards may be made.
- 4. Classes will not be re-judged if exhibitors fails to bring entry to the table on time.
- 5. Transfers may be made only in the same class, sex and variety as the original entry and must be made by July 2nd to the Entries Office (Administration Building). No day of show changes will be accepted, if animals do not match entry forms upon arrival, entries will be disqualified.
- 6. The age, junior, intermediate and senior, must be entered on the online entries form for each animal entered in breed divisions. Age is to be that of the rabbit on show day, July 6th.

Knowledge Bowl to consist of questions from poultry, rabbit and cavy.

Large Livestock Residue Avoidance Program (Drug Testing)

- 1. The Santa Barbara County Fair reserves the right to test any market animal officially entered in any division at any time without notice, for any foreign substance including but not limited to drugs, chemicals or feed additives. At a minimum all Supreme and Reserve Champions and; any animals suspect in terms of unusual physical appearance, demeanor or activity. As a condition precedent to accepting an entry, an entry form signed by the exhibitor, FFA Agricultural Science Instructor, 4-H Leader, Grange advisor, Parent or Legal Guardian grants the Santa Barbara County Fair permission to test any market animal.
- 2. All Supreme and Reserve Champions will be tested immediately following Champion Drive. All Supreme and Reserve Champion animals and exhibitors will be escorted to designated Residue Avoidance Collection Area, and along with a parent or advisor must remain in the collection area until a sample has been collected from said animal.
- 3. Urine samples will most often be collected, but test may be performed on any body tissue or fluid on both the live animal and the carcass.
- 4. Test samples collected from any animal must have zero tolerance for any identifiable or unidentifiable foreign substance including drugs (legal and illegal), chemicals of any kind or feed additives, unless established as permissible by the USDA or FDA or disclosed on the Santa Barbara County Fair Official Medication Declaration Form. (See Medication Form in back of handbook)
- 5. Animals testing to an unapproved foreign substance including but not limited to drugs, chemicals or feed additives, will be disqualified and declared ineligible to receive awards, premium money or sale proceeds. The live market animal or carcass that test positive will immediately become the property of the Santa Barbara County Fair and the exhibitor may be compensated for the market value (resale), less expenses, if the animal passes inspection. Carcass of disqualified animal will be disposed of per written instructions from U.S.D.A. or FDA.
- 6. If an animal is disqualified, the animal and/or the exhibitor will be declared ineligible and will not receive awards, premiums and/or any sale proceeds. Further the exhibitor will be responsible for payment of any fees, fines due or costs incurred by the Santa Barbara County Fair as result from the disqualification; The owner/exhibitor and members of his/her immediate family may not be eligible to compete in subsequent Santa Barbara County Fair Programs. The extent and degree of future eligibility shall be determined by Fair Management based upon the severity of the offense and the circumstances giving rise to the violation. If foreign substance residues including drugs, chemicals or feed additives are found in tissue of carcass of animals sold through the auction, the Santa Barbara County Fair will in no way be liable or responsible for condition of carcass or sale price of animals.
- 7. If for any reason any part of a carcass must be removed by U.S.D.A. Inspectors, the sale price will be discounted accordingly.
- 8. This policy may not be changed or deviated from without review and approval by Fair CEO and Board of Directors.
- Maximum pay weights may change as processing houses change. Final pay weights will be posted on sale day at the Junior Livestock Auction office.

DNA Requirements

- 1. For the purpose of enforcing ownership requirements, the Santa Barbara County Fair will require that all heifers and market animals (Steers, Sheep, Swine, and Meat Goats) designated for entry in the 2018 Santa Barbara County Fair must have a hair sample submitted by the exhibitor received in the Fairpark Entries Office by 4:00 pm, March 8th, 2019 for Heifers and Market Steers and by 4:00 pm, May 8th, 2019 for Market Sheep, Swine, and Meat Goats.
- 2. No heifer or market animal will be eligible for official entry unless a hair sample is obtained and an official DNA Registration Form has been completed and submitted by the deadline.
- 3. All DNA Collection Kits must be obtained through the Santa Barbara County Fair Administration Office. Exhibitors must obtain the kit before DNA Kit receiving deadlines and return completed kits with all required forms, signatures, and fees by ownership deadlines. Exhibitors will be required to ear tag their animal with designated ear tag provided in DNA Collection Kit at time of first hair sample collection. (If for any reason an animal loses their ear tag the exhibitor must contact the Administration Office

immediately, NO animal will be allowed to be weighed in without an ear tag in animal's ear (both front and back), ear tagging at the scale will not be allowed).

- 4. All heifers and market animal hair samples in the first collection will be the responsibility of the exhibitor as required in the DNA collection kit.
- 5. Designated heifers and market animals (All Champions and random selection of animals) will be required to have a second DNA collection immediately following Champion Drive or at designated time. Exhibitors and their animals must be accompanied by a parent/leader for the second collection. DNA Matching Analysis test will be run to verify that both the first sample (collected by exhibitor prior to ownership deadlines) and the second sample (collected at the Fair) match and confirm the identity of the animal. There will be no deviation from this procedure.

In the case where an animal sample of any species does not match after the DNA Analysis Test, the animal in question will be disqualified. If results are available before the Livestock Auction, the exhibitor will be blocked from the sale, and all awards and premiums will be forfeited. If the results are not available until after the Livestock Auction has taken place, all sale proceeds, and awards will be held. The exhibitor will not be allowed to enter this or any subsequent Santa Barbara County Fair competitions. There will be no appeal process and the Fair management's decision is final. Fair Management reserves the right to extend the disqualification to family members and leaders.

Pen Decorating

Backdrops for decorating in the <u>swine barns and the sheep/goat (Marciel Barn)</u> will be limited to open lath. The lath will be no larger than two (2) feet high and six (6) feet/eight (8) feet long, depending on the assigned pen size. There must be a two (2) foot opening between the top of the pens and the beginning of the lath piece. Only one, two (2) foot by six (6) foot/(8) foot section per club/chapter may be covered with paper or plastic for a backdrop for the educational/informational part of the display for the Clean Stall contest. All other lath sections must remain uncovered, except for stall and thank you cards. No solid backdrops will be allowed in the swine/sheep/goat barns. Decorating in the beef, dairy goat, and small stock barns will remain the same as in previous years.

Quality Assurance & Ethics Awareness Training

NEW FOR 2019: In order to participate in a youth livestock program (excluding horse, cavies & dogs) at any California Fair, all exhibitors 9 years of age and older must obtain annual certification in the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) program. Those not certified are not eligible to participate at a California Fair. This is required of all Beef, Sheep, Swine, Poultry, Rabbit, Cavy, Goat (Meat, Dairy, Pygmy) exhibitors. All training is now online at YQCA.ORG. Certificates of Completion must be received with Online Entry Receipts no later than 4:00 pm on Monday, May 13th, 2019.

Entries are limited to 4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent members of Santa Barbara County and the Southern part of San Luis Obispo County in the Lucia Mar Unified School District who have previously met eligibility requirements as stipulated in the Replacement Heifer Project Agreement. Entries are ineligible for showing in any other beef class except showmanship, beef lead costume or club and chapter groups. One (1) entry per exhibitor. Grade or registered.
- 3. The project member must have ownership of the heifer by March 8, 2019. Exhibitor must provide the copies of original Bill of Sale stating the markings and/or brand on the animal to verify ownership. A <u>copy</u> of the Bill of Sale must be submitted with the Project Agreement as proof of ownership along with DNA Sample. The Project Agreement does not constitute an official entry.



Scrapies Requirements for Sheep & Goats

- All sheep and goats entering fairs require individual identification. All official identification will be kept on the animals. The
 official identification may be official USDA individual identification eartags, premises eartags, Scrapie Flock Certification
 Program eartags, registration tattoos. If accompanied by registration papers or other methods approved by the California
 Department of Food and Agriculture.
- 2. All sheep and goats from out of state require official individual identification, a certificate of veterinary inspection and a California entry permit.
- 3. Fairs will not accept sheep and goats from scrapie "non-compliant" flocks, or animals that are scrapie-positive or scrapie suspects.
- 4. Fairs will not accept sheep and goats from scrapie "non-compliant" flocks, or animals that have been exposed to scrapie unless they have been evaluated and approved for exhibition by the state scrapie epidemiologist.
- 5. Fairs will keep records of the consignor, buyer, and animal identification for 5 years when animals change ownership at the fair.
- 6. Fairs will try to accommodate Scrapie Flock Certification Program members with separate space if practical. Breeding animals should be housed in separate enclosures or locations from animals that are not in the certification program, if practical.
- 7. Sheep or goats within 30 days pre-or post-parturition, or with vaginal discharge, shall, if practical, be kept separate from animals from different flocks and in an area that can be properly cleaned and disinfected.
- 8. Scrapies ear tag number is required on Country of Origin Forms at time of Weigh-In.
- 9. MUST HAVE SCRAPIES TAG AT WEIGH IN If your animal is missing a scrapies ear tag, you must contact the Livestock Office at time of arrival with your animal Sunday, July 7th, 2019.
- 10. All Breeding Sheep will be vet checked immediately following the market sheep/goat weigh-in. Exhibitors must bring breeding animals to sheep/goat show ring for vet check.

- 5. Market goats must weigh a minimum of 60 pounds. There is no maximum weight. If the animal grades for auction, payment will be adjusted to the 105 pounds maximum weight. Market Goats will be sold by the pound not by the head. See page 72 number 9.
- 6. Wethers or Does may be shown and must show kids teeth.
- 7. Goats must have been born after October 1, 2018.
- 8. Medication Declaration Forms: The Santa Barbara County Fair requires exhibitors of all market animals to complete a Medication Declaration Form for each animal brought to the scale for official weigh-in. Animal will not be weighed if form is not turned in.
- 9. After weigh-in, market goats will be divided into weight lots.

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Santa Barbara County Fair Code of Excellence Guidelines for Livestock Exhibitors

4-H

Based on the Santa Barbara County and San Luis Obispo County 4-H Membership Guidelines

1. 4-H Youth Development Program membership policies state <u>specifically</u> that a young person must have attained their 9th birthday as of December 31st, 2018 to be enrolled in a 4-H large animal project. Youth will be eligible for membership in 4-H through December 31st of the year in which they turn 19 years of age. All 4-H exhibitors must be enrolled and on the County 4-H roster (THIS INCLUDES Santa Barbara County and San Luis Obispo County), to be eligible to enter and show large livestock and meat pen animals at the Santa Barbara County Fair. 4-H entries will be verified by Santa Barbara County and San Luis Obispo County 4-H official roster.

FFA

Guidelines for FFA Exhibitors

- 1. Preparation and presentation of the FFA entries during any Fair or Show shall be limited to Junior Exhibitors with entries in that Show or Fair.
- 2. FFA members are allowed to continue showing in Fairs during one calendar year after graduation from High School, but only if they have completed their senior year enrollment in Vocational Agriculture as an FFA member. (Calendar year means Jan. 1st through Dec. 31st).
- 3. A student pre-scheduled in High School Agriculture is allowed to show at any Summer Fair immediately prior to entering High School, provided the project and record book were started 60 days (120 days for market beef) before the Fair, and he/she is affiliated with the Local, State and National FFA Organization and the project is being supervised by the Agriculture Instructor.
- 4. A FFA member must be enrolled in an Agricultural class and be supervised by an Agricultural instructor. The member must meet all requirements of their Chapter as certified by their Agricultural Advisor. The entry office will send a complete list of all FFA exhibitors entered to the regional FFA office for verification of members.

GRANGE

Guidelines for Grange Members

- 1. Grange members must meet all Junior Fair Grange criteria to be eligible to show.
- 2. Grange members must have attained their 9th birthday by January 1st, 2019 and shall not be older than 19 years of age as of January 1, 2019.
- 3. The official Grange uniform shall consist of the official red grange vest, white shirt and new blue jeans. Grange exhibitors shall refrain from wearing faded, torn or otherwise old blue jeans. No hat of any kind is to be worn with the Official Grange Uniform
- 4. A list of all Grange exhibitors entered will be verified with the State Grange.

INDEPENDENT

Guidelines for Independent Exhibitors

- 1. Juniors who have been FFA or 4-H members in that particular animal project within 60 days prior to the Fair are not eligible to compete in that project as an Independent Junior (120 days for market cattle, 60 days for market sheep, swine & goat).
- 2. All Junior Exhibitors wishing to show as an Independent for 2019 in any division that is eligible to sell through the Junior Livestock Auction, must submit an Independent Exhibitor Applications to the Fair Administration Office by January 31, 2018. All applicants will receive notification of approval from Fair Management.
- 3. <u>Age Requirement:</u> According to State Rules, exhibitors must be at least 9 years old by January 1st of the year they are showing large livestock and must not be older than 18 years old prior to January 1, 2019.
- 4. <u>Ownership Requirements:</u> Independent exhibitors need to meet all ownership requirements as outlined in the "Code of Excellence" program.

- 5. <u>Insurance:</u> Since an independent exhibitor does not have liability coverage through a sponsoring organization, a legal guardian or parent must be able to provide proof of liability coverage naming the Fair as additionally insured <u>and</u> sign a waiver. Insurance is available this year through the fair. Cost is \$40.00 per exhibitor or family no matter how many entries you have in each class. Please see Entry Office if you wish to participate in this program. (37th DAA reserves the right to change the cost of said insurance as warranted by the cost of said insurance).
- 6. <u>Supervision:</u> As stated in the State Rules, Independent Exhibitors must provide adult supervision (over 25 years old) on grounds at all times. The supervising adult must be available on a 15-minute call during Fair time activities. One complimentary wristband will be issued to the adult supervising the Independent Exhibitor.
- 7. Uniform: Independent Exhibitors must wear a uniform of white pants, a collared white shirt and a Black tie.
- 8. Showmanship and Market Classes: Independent Juniors who are 9-13 years of age will show in the 4-H Divisions. Independent Juniors who are 14-18 years of age will show in the FFA Divisions. Age is determined as of January 1, 2019.
- 9. <u>Clean Stall and Educational Displays</u>: Stalls will be checked daily for cleanliness. Each stall must have a stall card provided by the Fair. Each Independent Exhibitor needs to provide an educational display to be hung in the stall.
- 10. <u>Record Keeping</u>: All Independent Exhibitors are required to maintain project record books, for their fair entries. These books shall contain the ownership information, feeding schedules, grooming maintenance and cost analysis of project. You must present these books to the Livestock Office at time your animal project is brought to fair Sunday July 7th, by 6pm.
- 11. <u>Community Service</u>: Eight hours of community service is required of all independent exhibitors. The eight hours must be performed in the Community with a Non-Profit Organization (Examples: Food Bank, Boys & Girls Club, Good Samaritan Shelter, etc.). Documentation (Signed letter from Community Organization on Organization Letter Head) must be provide to prove community service was complete, listing date and amount of hours completed and where. <u>Community service must be completed by entry deadline</u>, and turned in with entry forms.
- 12. Please refer to the 2019 "Code of Excellence" program guidelines, and the Exhibit Guidebook for additional information. Please be advised that these Independent Exhibitor rules supersede any and all past Independent Exhibitor rules.

Livestock Ownership Requirements

- 1. It is the policy of the Santa Barbara County Fair (State Rules for all Fairs) that any livestock exhibitor must <u>own</u> the animal(s) he or she is exhibiting. All market beef and replacement heifers must be owned by the exhibitor by March 8th, 2019. All market sheep, goat and swine must be owned by the exhibitor by May 8th, 2019. It is the policy of the Fair Association that proof of ownership be established by placement of an official ear tag and collection of DNA sample prior to ownership deadline. All market animals designated for entry in the 2019 Santa Barbara County Fair must carry the Association's official ear tag (Both front & back) and submit a DNA Sample prior to ownership deadlines.
- 2. All heifers and market animals must have completed DNA Kits submitted by the following deadlines to be eligible to show at the 2019 Santa Barbara County Fair.

HEIFERS & MARKET STEERS - DNA Kits available for pick-up starting February 4, 2019

March 8, 2019 – Deadline to pick up DNA kit and pay \$5.00 fee Completed DNA Kits must be received in the Fair's Entry Office by 4:00 pm March 8, 2019

MARKET SHEEP, SWINE AND MEAT GOATS - DNA Kits available for pick-up starting April 1, 2019

May 8, 2019 - Deadline to pick up DNA kit and pay \$5.00 fee
Completed DNA Kits must be received in the Fair's Entry Office by 4:00 pm May 8, 2019

3. All market rabbits must have been owned by exhibitor no less than 6 weeks before fair, Rabbits must have a permanent tattoo in the left ear. Proof of ownership must be presented at check-in upon arrival at the Fair.

Market Animal Ownership Requirements

- 1. For the purpose of enforcing ownership requirements, the Santa Barbara County Fair will require that all heifers and market animals (Steers, Sheep, Swine, and Meat Goats) designated for entry in the 2019 Santa Barbara County Fair must have a hair sample submitted by the exhibitor on or prior to 4:00 pm, March 8, 2019 for Heifers and Market Steers and on or prior to 4:00 pm, May 8, 2019 for Market Sheep, Swine, and Meat Goats.
- 2. No heifer or market animal will be eligible for official entry unless a hair sample is obtained and an official DNA Registration Form has been completed and submitted by the deadline.

- 3. All DNA Collection Kits must be obtained through the Santa Barbara County Fair Entry Office. Exhibitors must obtain the kit before deadlines and return completed kits with all required forms, signatures, and fees by ownership deadlines. Exhibitors will be required to ear tag their animal with designated ear tag provided in DNA Collection Kit at time of first hair sample collection. Ear tags should be placed in the left ear. If for any reason an animal loses their ear tag the exhibitor must contact the Fair Administration Office immediately, NO animal will be allowed to be weighed in without an ear tag, (Both front and back) ear tagging at the scale will not be allowed.
- All heifers and market animal hair samples in the first collection will be the responsibility of the exhibitor as required in the DNA collection kit.
- 5. Designated heifers and market animals (All Champions and random selection of animals) will be required to have a second DNA collection immediately following Champion Drive. Exhibitors and their animals must be accompanied by a parent/leader for the second collection. DNA Matching Analysis test will be run to verify that both the first sample (collected by exhibitor prior to ownership deadlines) and the second sample (collected at the Fair) match and confirm the identity of the animal. There will be no deviation from this procedure.
- 6. Rabbits, Chickens and Turkeys, must have proof of ownership and/or hatch date at time of check in at the fair.
- 7. After all registration requirements have been completed, exhibitors must enter online at www.santamariafairpark.com no later than May 10th, 2019. (the entry deadline) See On-line instruction. The exhibitor's signed receipt and entry fees must be received in the Fair Entries office by May 13th, 2019 before 4 pm.
- 8. All other entry requirements, fees, rules, and regulations of the 2019 Exhibit Guidebook shall also apply.
- 9. Each exhibitor may only <u>enter and show</u> two (2) large market animals of different species. (Example: one (1) market hog and one (1) market goat), and one (1) Small Livestock entry or one (1) Beef Replacement Heifer (example: 1 market hog, 1 market goat and 1 turkey) Exhibitors may <u>sell</u> only two (2) auction animals, they can be a combination of one (1) large market animal, or one (1) Beef Replacement Heifer or one (1) Small Livestock Meat Pen.

Breeding Animals Ownership Requirements

- 1. It is the policy of the Santa Barbara County Fair and State Rules that any livestock exhibitor must own the animal(s) he or she is exhibiting. The following are the ownership requirements for all breeding Sheep, Swine, Beef, Goats, Rabbits and Poultry, designated for entry in the 2018 Santa Barbara County Fair. (Both Large and Small Livestock) the exhibitor must provide a copy of the animal's registration papers, Bill of Sale, or birthing records (if the exhibitor raised the animal him/herself). This proof of ownership documentation should include description of any permanent identification (Tattoo, Ear Tag, Brand, Ear Notching) on the animal and must be <u>submitted at Show Ring on Show Day</u>. Livestock exhibit staff will check the ownership date on the original registration papers upon the animal's arrival to the Fair. If using a Bill of Sale as proof of ownership, the Bill of Sale must contain:
- 2. All proof of ownership information submitted will be reviewed by the Association to ensure the submitted proof of ownership information (including the animal's permanent identification) matches the animal that was entered and brought to the Fair.
- NOTE No livestock (excluding rabbit and poultry exhibit) owned solely by a chapter or club, or conducted as a
 joint project by two or more individuals, is eligible in the junior department, unless the division or class specifically
 so states.
- 4. All animals in "registered purebred breeding animal" divisions must be registered and recorded with a United States breed association in the exact name of the owner as declared on the entry form except for:
 - a. Pigs, under 12 months or younger, which are still owned by the breeder. Litter registrations are acceptable if recorded with their breed association and if they identify the litter by birth date, sire, dam, and ear notching.
 -or-
 - b. Animals whose breed association requires an inspector's approval before registering. The animal cannot be more than 12 months of age on opening day of the fair. Exhibitors may present a statement by the secretary of the association stating that then animal is eligible to be registered. This statement must identify the animal by birth date, sire, dam, and ear tag. tattoo or notching.

Policies for Exhibitor Conduct

- 1. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is PROHIBITED.
- 2. Exhibitor shall use respectful language. No foul or abusive language or gestures will be tolerated.
- 3. All junior livestock exhibitors must groom and wash their own animal while they are on the fairgrounds. Any assistance must come ONLY from another junior livestock exhibitor who is exhibiting an animal at the 2019 Santa Barbara County Fair wearing a designated exhibitor wristband.
- 4. Possession of any weapons or illegal drugs on the fairgrounds, or in the Adam's Park camping area, is prohibited.
- 5. Possession of alcohol or drinking alcohol, and/or being under the influence of alcohol by any underage exhibitor minor on the fairgrounds, or the Adam's Park camping area is prohibited.
- 6. Use of fireworks or sparklers is prohibited on the fairgrounds or in the Adam's Park Camping area.
- 7. Any exhibitor whose conduct jeopardizes the health or safety of another exhibitor, animal, or the public, will be immediately expelled from further participation in the Santa Barbara County Fair for the 2019 fair, and possibly future fairs. The exhibitor is to be removed from the grounds and camping area immediately and loses the opportunity to show and sell his or her animal(s) through the Junior Livestock sale. Health or Safety issues include, but are not limited to, the actions involving weapons, alcohol, illegal drugs, or fireworks, as mentioned in items #4-6 above, and not caring for, i.e. feeding and watering, the exhibitor's animal project. All animals exhibited by the violator must be removed from the fairgrounds by 3 pm the following day of the violation.

Policies for Animal Treatment

- 1. Any effort to artificially change the conformation or appearance of an animal by treating the animal, internally or externally, with any irritant, counter-irritant, or other substance is considered unethical, inhumane, and is prohibited. Treatments that are prohibited include, but are not limited to, the use of artificial hair coloring (sprays, etc.), excessive use of common products such as fly spray, ointment or liniment or other similar products. Excessive use is defined as the use of a substance to the point that it irritates the animal.
- 2. Adding false hair or hair-like material, fleece or skin to any portion of the animal's body is illegal and will result in <u>immediate disqualification</u>. Causing the animal to ingest any liquid or substance not considered part of an accepted and normal livestock diet, or in quantities not considered normal for livestock, is deemed illegal and inhumane. For example: the use of alcoholic or carbonated beverages as a drench or filler.

NOTE: The use of drench guns in any form is illegal and will result in immediate disgualification.

- 3. The use of tranquilizers, sedatives, or depressants, which alters the physical or physiological state of the animal, is illegal. Exceptions to this rule would be a Licensed Certified Veterinarian's treatment for a recognized disease or injury, or recommendation for tranquilizing breeding animals in heat that might compromise the safety of others. The livestock office must receive notification from the Licensed Certified Veterinarian of the details of any such prescribed treatment. The substances used in this treatment must have been approved by The Food and Drug Administration for use in meat producing animals.
- 4. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to feed, water and care for any animal they have entered in the fair throughout the entire fair, including any period following the sale of the animal prior to the end of the fair. All market animals including small stock must be given a final feeding and watering at approximately 5 p.m. on Sunday, July 14th, 2019 to ensure that the animal arrives in a healthy condition at the processing plant. Market beef exhibitors are responsible for loading their exhibit animal on the shipping truck.
- 5. Any animal that appears ill or injured while at the fairgrounds must be reported to the livestock office immediately. A veterinarian must check any animals considered unhealthy. If it is determined that the animal is carrying a communicable disease, the animal will be removed from the fairgrounds at the owners expense. The fairgrounds will not assume the cost for this action. The exhibitor must assume the full expense of the veterinarian's services.
- 6. Any animal that is unmanageable or that could be a safety hazard to the public will be removed from the fairgrounds. The Livestock Superintendent/Fair Management makes this decision final.
- 7. It is considered abuse to excessively shrink or exercise an animal.
- 8. Ice may not be directly used on an animal. Only ice in a bucket of water is permitted. No cooling devices, electrical stimulation tools or shockers may be used.

- 9. Physical abuse of an animal will not be tolerated. For example: when moving hogs, care should be taken not to excessively beat or hit an animal (either by a person or with an object).
- 10. For the safety of the animal and the public, animals are not to be left unattended on fitting tables or in blocking chutes.
- 11. All lambs must be shown with their front feet on the ground as practiced by acceptable showmanship procedures. If this policy is not followed, the judge may ask the exhibitor to leave the ring, or may place the exhibitor at the bottom of the class.
- 12. During animal weigh-in, while at the scale, a certified veterinarian will check animals for any infectious disease. Those animals determined to have an infectious disease will be asked to immediately leave the fairgrounds. For example: animals found to have live Ringworm or Sore Mouth will be asked to leave the fairgrounds. It is strongly suggested that the health of each animal be evaluated prior to coming to the Fair. The Fair Association is not responsible for any costs associated with the transfer or care of these animals.
- 13. Any abuse of an animal by the exhibitor upon leaving the scale after weighing in is cause for the exhibitor and animal to be removed from the fairgrounds removed from the fairgrounds and not be allowed to compete at the 2019 fair nor the 2020 fair.

Participant's Eligibility

- Entry is limited to members of Chapters or Clubs, located in Santa Barbara County and the Southern part of San Luis Obispo County in the Lucia Mar Unified School District.
- 2. FFA Eligibility -see designated page- (State Rules Apply).
- 3. 4-H Eligibility -see designated page- (County and State Rules Apply).
- 4. Independent Juniors Eligibility- must have registered with Santa Barbara County Fair as of January 31, 2019. (State Rules Apply) See Independent Exhibitor Application on Page 116.
- 5. Grange Eligibility (Fair Grange and State Rules Apply)

Consequences for Violation of Exhibit Policies

- 1. If any violation of policy occurs prior to the junior livestock sale, the exhibitor will not be allowed to sell his/her animal.
- 2. If the violation occurs after the auction, the exhibitor will receive only the market resale value (as determined the day of the auction) for the animal. Any remaining money paid by the buyer in purchasing the animal through the auction, will be placed into a general scholarship fund or put towards educational purposes at the fair. The buyer will receive the animal.
- 3. If it is determined that an exhibitor has violated the Fair's Code of Excellence or other exhibit policies, the exhibitor will be removed from the grounds and may not exhibit livestock at the following year's fair.
 For example: An exhibitor who violates a rule and is removed from the grounds in 2019 will not be allowed to exhibit livestock at the 2020 Fair. The exhibitor may then request in writing to exhibit livestock at the 2021 fair. This request will be
- The Santa Barbara County Fair Board supports the Fair's direction to focus more on the exhibitors excelling in leadership, education, and citizenship with their livestock project.
- 5. The Santa Barbara County Fair Board has decided that minor violations of exhibitor conduct, not involving health or safety concerns, may be given one verbal warning. This verbal warning will be documented and noted by a signature from a member of the "Livestock Code of Excellence Committee" and the exhibitor. On the second violation, the exhibitor will be asked to leave the fairgrounds and any awards and/or auction check will be withheld.

THE "LIVESTOCK CODE OF EXCELLENCE COMMITTEE" shall consist of -

reviewed by the Board of Directors prior to an official entry being accepted.

- 1) Chief Executive Officer
- 2) Livestock Superintendent
- 3) Junior Livestock Auction Sale Association Designee
- 4) 2 Fair Agriculture Committee Board Members

Eligible Entries

- 1. All 4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent entries must be submitted online. After entering online, exhibitors will print out a receipt. By signing the receipt, the exhibitor agreeing to abide by the Code of Ethics and all other fair rules.
- 2. All Entry Receipts must be signed by exhibitors with entry fees attached or the entry will not be accepted.
- 3. Management reserves the right to close a Division or Class before the entry closing date if all available space has been allotted.
- 4. Limitation of Breeding and Grade Animals: Limit of 2 entries per class of Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy, or Goat Divisions, unless a group entry. Limit of 1 entry per Group Class per exhibitor.
- 5. No animal other than a legal entry will be allowed on the Fairgrounds.
- 6. Each exhibitor is limited to two market animals (one of each specie), and a small livestock market pen or replacement heifer.
- 7. Animals will not be allowed to return to the Fairgrounds if removed.
- 8. All animals must be in place by 6 pm, Sunday, July 7, 2019. PLEASE NOTE: NO ANIMALS WILL BE RECEIVED ON GROUNDS AFTER THIS TIME. ANIMALS WILL NOT BE RECEIVED MONDAY, JULY 8TH BEFORE WEIGH-IN!
- 9. Release of animals; the release time of all animals will be posted in the livestock office during the week of fair. No animal will be released without an "Animal release form issued from the Livestock Superintendent". Small Animals will be released in the same manner from the Small Livestock superintendent. All vehicles will be checked.
- 10. Due to early press deadline, all information contained in the exhibit book is subject to change or amendment by the Fair management, staff and Board of Directors. Revisions will be brought forth at the mandatory meeting and/or at the Exhibitor's Meeting prior to the Fair, Thursday, July 4th, 2019 at 6:30 pm.

Protest

- Protest will be considered only if this has been a violation of State or Local Rules. Decisions of judges, veterinarians, weigh masters and timers cannot be protested and are final.
- Protest must be filed within 4 hours of the awareness of the rule violation. The cause of the protest must be filed
 with the Chief Executive Officer of Santa Maria Fairpark. The Chief Executive Officer will present the protest to the
 Livestock Code of Excellence Committee as soon as practical.
- Protest must be accompanied by a deposit of \$150.00 (cash, money order or certified check made payable to the Fair) or \$250.00 if the protest relates to violations of the State Rules X-XI (Animal Health Rules).
 - NOTE: The deposit will be returned if the protest is upheld. If the protest is upheld, the violator may be held liable for any portion of the direct costs incurred by the fair in the course of the protest resolution. Failure to reimburse the fair maybe cause for disallowing future entries or participation in of the network of California Fairs.
- 4. All other rules will apply in accordance with the current State Rules for California Fairs 2019.

Dress Codes

- All FFA, Grange and 4-H exhibitors shall wear the official uniform of their organization while showing and selling their animals
 in breeding, market, and showmanship classes. Independent exhibitors shall wear the uniform as set forth in the Exhibitor
 Guidebook. NOTE: If the exhibitor is showing small stock animals, long sleeve shirts or uniform jacket are required,
 no exposed arms allowed.
- 2. FFA The FFA show uniform is to be worn by all FFA exhibitors and by assistants in the chapter group classes. The uniform shall consist of white or black pants and white dress shirt/blouse with a collar (long or short sleeve) NO SLEEVELESS OR COLLARLESS SHIRTS and tie or scarf; if the shirt has the FFA emblem attached to the left side, the official FFA Jacket is not required. All shirts must be tucked in. No bare midriffs allowed. Pant legs should be worn outside the boots/shoes. Exhibitors will be excused from the show ring for failure to follow dress code set forth. No chapter or individual names will be allowed on white shirts. No additional logos or adornments may be worn unless already expressly described in this paragraph.
- 3. **4-H** -The 4-H show uniform is to be worn by all 4-H exhibitors and by assistants in the group classes. The uniform shall consist of white or new dark blue jeans, white dress shirt/blouse (long or short sleeve), 4-H tie or scarf, 4-H cap worn on the head, black or brown belt and shoes/boots. NO SLEEVELESS SHIRTS. All shirts must be tucked in. No bare midriffs allowed. Pant legs should be worn outside the boots/shoes. Exhibitors will be excused from the show ring for failure to follow

dress code set forth. No chapter or individual names will be allowed on white shirts. No additional logos or adornments may be worn unless already expressly described in this paragraph.

- 4. **Grange** Grange shall wear white shirts, NO SLEEVELESS OR COLLARLESS SHIRTS, the official Grange Red Vest and new dark blue jeans. (Any old, stone or acid wash, faded or tattered jeans may jeopardize your eligibility to show). No hat of any sort shall be worn. All shirts must be tucked in. No bare midriffs allowed. Pant legs should be worn outside the boots/shoes. Exhibitors will be excused from the show ring for failure to follow dress code set forth. No chapter or individual names will be allowed on white shirts. No additional logos or adornments may be worn unless already expressly described in this paragraph.
- 5. **Independents -** Independents shall wear white or new dark blue jeans, white shirt, and black tie. All members of an identified independent group consisting of 3 or more exhibitors will wear the same uniform. NO SLEEVELESS OR COLLARLESS SHIRTS. All shirts must be tucked in. No bare midriffs allowed. Pant legs should be worn outside the boots/shoes. Exhibitors will be excused from the show ring for failure to follow dress code set forth. No chapter or individual names will be allowed on white shirts. No additional logos or adornments may be worn unless already expressly described in this paragraph.
- 6. Note: White collared polo shirts with sleeve may be substituted for the white dress shirts if they are tucked in and no midriff is exposed.
- 7. Uniforms are to be clean and neat. Exhibitor appearing in dirty uniforms may be excused from the show ring or sale.
- 8. Exhibitors who are in violation of the dress code may be excused from the ring by the judge, clerk, barn steward, or livestock superintendent only. The class will continue and not be delayed for the excused exhibitor.

Health Rules

1. The State Rules, Health Rules, and Code of Excellence Rules apply.

Stall Information

- Exhibitors will need to provide bedding during the Fair, <u>NO</u> bedding will be provided. <u>NO ANIMAL MAY BE UNLOADED</u> UNTIL BEDDING IS IN PLACE IN STALL.
- 2. All exhibitors are required to be solely responsible for the feeding, watering, and wellbeing of their livestock throughout the run of the Fair, and until the animals are loaded on the trucks for transport.
- 3. Fair reserves the right to make stall placing. Champions and Reserve Champions may be placed in designated areas.
- 4. Exhibitors should remember that the cost of the junior livestock programs are offset in part by the general public, therefore the livestock area needs to be presentable at all times. All livestock stalls/pens must be cleaned out daily before 9:00 am and exhibitors should make every effort to keep the barns clean for the public, this includes tack and fitting areas. There will be Livestock Maintenance Awards presented at the end of Fair; judging occurs each day. It should be noted that the wellbeing of the animal, (i.e., stressed) will be considered in the Livestock Maintenance Awards. At the conclusion of the Fair, exhibitors must remove all straw and debris from their stall. If exhibitors for both large and small livestock are not cleaning pens/stalls and/or caring for their animals they will receive a verbal warning from the Livestock Superintendent, if a second warning is required it will be a written warning and a \$25 fee will be charged to the exhibitors before they receive their Auction or Premium Check. If the exhibitor continues to not clean animals pen/stall and/or care for their animal the exhibitor and animal will be removed from the Fair and will not participate in the Livestock Auction. If pens/stalls are not cleaned out, at close of Fair, Fair Management will charge a cleaning fee of \$50 per stall or pen.
- 5. Exhibitors shall be responsible for security of their animals in stalls or pens. All beef cattle shall be securely tied with a neck rope in addition to a suitable halter. All sheep, goat, and swine pens shall be securely closed and fastened before the exhibitor leaves the barn at the end of the day. **Please do not put padlocks on any gate or pen.**
- 6. Blocking chutes must stay in designated areas and be kept clean. Each blocking chute must be labeled with club or chapter name in large legible letter. There may be a fee charged per blocking chute and a limitation of chutes per group, as determined by the Livestock Office. If chutes are not properly identified, kept in designated areas, or kept clean, they will be removed from the fairgrounds. All blocking chutes must be removed on Monday July 15th, 2019 or they will become property of the 37th DAA.

Parent and Leader Information

- 1. Purchase Season Passes and camping spaces from the Fair Administration Office.
- 2. There will be a parent/leader meeting scheduled the week prior to fair (Date: Thursday, July 4th, 2018 at 6:30 p.m.). Pen assignments and passes will be available at that time.
- 3. As these programs are educational in nature, parents and leaders/advisors should not handle any junior exhibitor's animals. Doing so will be considered an infraction against the Code of Excellence. Should the problem continue, the eligibility of the exhibitor will be in question, and the parent or leader may be removed from the fairgrounds. Please refer to the Exhibitor Code of Excellence, and the Leader/Advisor and Parents Code of Conduct section for more information. The exception to this rule is in any and all cases where the health and safety of people or other animals is immediately threatened

Credentials

- 1. As set forth by the Fair Board of Directors, Exhibitor "Passes/Credentials" will be issue as followed: Club Leaders/ Chapter Advisors: 2 Season Wristbands per specie group (wristbands may be limited to size of specie group). Species groups with 5 or less exhibitors will only receive 1 Season Wristband).
- 2. Each livestock exhibitor receives one wristband (valued at \$40.00) which provides access to the fairgrounds through the run of the Fair July 10-14, 2019. Wristbands are issued to each exhibitor for the sole purpose of caring for their entries (animals). Therefore any exhibitor who does not have an animal on the Fairgrounds will have his/her wristband removed. Exhibitors should not remove their wristband and give it to other exhibitors. The wristbands should not be stretched, as they will break. If a wristband breaks, the exhibitor must bring the wristband with the identification number to the Livestock office. Replacements will only be given with return of the original wristband. If an exhibitor doesn't have the original wristband, there will be a \$20.00 replacement charge. Wristbands must be worn starting Monday July 8th, 2019.

Leader/Advisor and Parents Code of Conduct

As a Leader/Advisor or Parent of a Livestock Exhibitor of the Santa Barbara County Fair you are expected to adhere to following Code of Conduct, failure to do so will jeopardize the participation of your clubs exhibitors, and/or your child.

- 1. As a Leader/Advisor or parent I acknowledge that the child must demonstrate his or her own ability, knowledge, and skill as an exhibitor of show animals, and that the assistance of an adult in the washing, grooming, fitting, handling or showing of his or her animal while at the fair is prohibited. The exception to this rule is in any and all cases where the health and safety of people or other animals is immediately threatened
- 2. As a Leader/Advisor or parent I acknowledge that direct criticism or interference with the judge, show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is PROHIBITED. All judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect, and as a Leader/Advisor or Parent I will not allow any person connected with my exhibitors or child's animal project to direct abusive or threatening conduct toward any show official.
- 3. Leader/Advisor and Parents shall use respectful language. No foul or abusive language or gestures will be tolerated in the Livestock Area.
- 4. Possession of any weapons or illegal drugs on the fairgrounds, or in the Adam's Park camping area, is prohibited.
- 5. As a Leader/Advisor or Parent I am aware that responsible alcohol use is allowed on the fairgrounds, and I will limit my use of alcohol so that I set a proper example for my exhibitor, child or children of others around me. Any abuse of alcohol or public drunkenness by Leader/Advisor or Parent in or around the Livestock Area or in Adams Camping is PROHIBITED.
- 6. As a Leader/Advisor or Parent I acknowledge that the use of fireworks or sparklers is prohibited on the fairgrounds or in the Adam's Park Camping area.
- 7. Any Leader/Advisor or Parent whose conduct jeopardizes the health or safety of an exhibitor, animal, or the public, will be immediately expelled from the 2019 Santa Barbara County Fair and will jeopardize the participation of their clubs' exhibitors or child. The Leader/Advisor or Parent is to be removed from the grounds and camping area immediately and could jeopardize their clubs exhibitors or child's opportunity to show and sell through the Junior Livestock sale.

Rules and Guidelines

2019 AUCTION WILL BE A TERMINAL SALE

NO LIVE PICKUPS FOR ANY MARKET ANIMALS GOING THROUGH THE SALE

Buyers will have the option to re-sale or process their purchases, of Steers, Sheep, Goats and Swine. No resale available for Rabbits, Chickens and Turkeys. Replacement heifers will be live pick-up or resale.

Selling at the auction is a privilege, not a right. The Fair's goal is to provide the seller with an avenue to sell <u>and</u> to provide the consumer/buyer with quality, healthy, safely-produced products. Sellers must be knowledgeable and responsible producers.

- 1. The 37th DAA grants the Junior Livestock Auction Sales Association authority of the Junior Livestock Auction.
- 2. The Junior Livestock Auction Sales Association is contracted by the 37th DAA to run the Junior Livestock Auction. Policy, not in violation of State and Local rules as permitted in this Exhibitor Guidebook, may be made by this Association. Failure to comply with any of these rules may result in disqualification, loss of premiums or other disciplinary actions as determined by the Fair Board or recommendation of the Sale Association. The committee shall recommend rules and regulations for conduct of the Auction Sale and the conditions under which animals may be sold. The Sales Association recommends all changes which would affect the operations of the Fair to be made to the Fair Management.
- The legality of tax deductions for purchase of Auction Animals is a matter for consideration by the nearest IRS office, or your own tax accountant.

United States Department of Agriculture Rules:

- 1. Exhibitors selling Large Livestock through the Auction Sale will be required to bring a completed and signed Animal Medication Form to the scale at time of animal weigh in. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor and the seller of any animal sold through the Junior Auction Sale, from which the carcass or any part thereof is condemned due to detection of traces of dangerous drugs or chemicals, to replace to the buyer another satisfactory carcass of equal weight and grade.
- 2. All meat producing livestock must be withheld from slaughter for at least 21 days after inoculation with biologics.
- 3. Small Livestock, i.e. Turkeys, sold through the Junior Livestock Auction Sale, will sign a Turkey Feed Form provided by the Fair stating ingredients of feed fed said animal. This form must be returned to Small Livestock Fair personnel at time of weigh in. Animals will not be weighed until form is turned in.
- 4. All Large Market Livestock will be required to provide Country of Origin Forms for swine, sheep and goats are provided in the back of the handbook, page 107. Country of Origin Forms for beef will be available at the mandatory meeting July 4th, 2019. Country of Origin Forms must be turned in at scales during weigh-in. No animals will be weighed without form.

Eligibility to Sell

- 1. Animals (Replacement Heifers, Rabbits, Chickens, and Turkeys) must grade the following to be eligible to sell: Groups 1 and 2. All Group 1 and Group 2 Replacement Heifers MUST SELL in the auction
- 2. Market Sheep, Market Beef, Market Goats and Market Swine must be placed by the judge of the species and grade "Market Ready" & "Market Acceptable" to be eligible to sell.
- 3. Animal must have been shown by the owner/exhibitor in the proper market class.
- 4. All Champions and Reserve Champions including Breed Champions and Local Bred Champions MUST sell at auction.
- 5. If an exhibitor owns more than one animal qualified for sale, the exhibitor may only sell a combination of two (2) of the following auction animals. One (1) market animal (beef, sheep, swine and goat), and either one (1) replacement heifer, or one (1) small animal meat pen (rabbit, chicken, or turkey), unless said animals are Champions(s), in which case the Champion(s) must sell.
- An exhibitor must notify the Auction Committee through the Auction/Entry Office by Thursday July 11th, before 10 am that he/she does not desire to sell or risk ineligibility to sell the following year. If the exhibitor fails to notify the Auction Committee (Auction Trailer) regarding which animal will sell by 10am Thursday July 11th, neither animal will sell. NO CHANGES WILL BE PERMITTED AFTER THE SALE LIST IS COMPLETED. NO EXCEPTIONS. Exhibitor in Champion Drive have until ½ hour after champion drive to notify the Auction Committee if they are not selling. All Champions must sell.

- 7. Animal must be free from contagious disease (i.e.: lamb fungus, ringworm, respiratory disease) and any signs of genetic disease syndrome (i.e.: Porcine Stress Syndrome, Ovine Callipyge Syndrome) at all times during the fair and auction. If animal is suspected of having any contagious disease, the animal will be removed from the fairgrounds and disqualified from the show and sale.
- 8. Animal may be sifted at any time including arrival at the fair, weigh—in, market class, showmanship class, costume/specialty classes, championship drive, auction day and load out. Livestock Superintendent will make decisions prior to sale and Auction Coordinator will make decisions after the sale. Animal must be able to get to and from the auction block on its own power, exhibiting no severe lameness or inability to move.
- Animals who exhibit problems following the auction will be dealt with at the discretion of the JLA Auction Coordinator and JLA Executive Board and exhibitors may forfeit earnings.
- 10. MANDATORY meetings will be held Thursday July 11th and Friday July 12th at 7:30 am at the auction trailer. One representative from each club/chapter/independent MUST attend.
- 11. The Livestock Office Trailer must have on file for all large market animals and turkeys selling, a Declaration of Medication Form or Declaration of Feed Form. Forms must be turned in at time of weigh-in or animal will not be weighed. (See USDA Rules #1)
- 12. The Auction Office must have on file for all large market animals selling, a Country of Origin Form. Forms must be turned in at time of weigh-in or animal will not be weighed. (See USDA Rules #4)
- 13. No replacement heifer will sell without the official brucellosis tattoo or proof of Purebred Registration Papers verifying brucellosis vaccination.
- 14. Exhibitors with purebred registered heifers need to turn in registration papers to the JLA Office by 5pm, Monday, July 8th, 2019, otherwise the heifer will be sold as a grade animal.
- 15. Sellers must be from a club in "good standing" with JLA as well as their affiliated organization and the Fair. Chapter/Club and independents are strongly encouraged to have:
 - A. At least one representative at each of the three yearly JLSA meetings.
 - B. To have signed up for a job for a portion of the auction.
 - C. To send a representative to the mandatory morning meetings to be held at 7:30A.M. Thursday and Friday of the Fair.

Weigh-in Guidelines for Large Stock

- 1. All animals are required to have a Santa Barbara County Fair ear tag in the ear at weigh-in. THERE WILL BE NO TAGGING AT THE SCALES. Any animal without said ear tag, (both front and back) or incorrect ear tag will not be allowed to weigh-in and will be removed from the fairgrounds by 6 pm Monday July 8. If ear tag is lost the exhibitor must notify FAIR ENTRIES OFFICE immediately to make arrangements to re-tag animal as soon as possible. A livestock release must be obtained from the Livestock Superintendent for release of animal from fairgrounds.
- 2. Market animals not making minimum or maximum stipulated weight requirements will not be allowed to compete in market classes, and may NOT remain on the Fairgrounds to compete in showmanship and other special classes. They must be removed from the fairgrounds by 6 pm of weigh-in day. Market beef exhibitors selling their animals must, at weigh-in, submit documentation showing ownership by March 8, 2019, date and place of purchase, brand and its location, name, address and phone number of exhibitor by providing the following Yellow Slip (movement slip as required by California State Law) separate slip for each animal transported, Bill of Sale. If the animal was dropped from the exhibitor's cow and raised by the exhibitor, a signed statement stating such may be substituted for the Bill of Sale. All exhibitors must be present to weigh their animal unless written variance is granted by Santa Barbara County Fair Chief Executive Officer.
- 3. No large animal or small animal scales will be allowed on the Fairgrounds except the "Official" Fair scales.
- 4. There will be only one Official Weighing of Livestock. Any protest of weight must be made BEFORE the animal leaves the scale. Animals will be re-weighed immediately. Official weight of the animal will be that of the second weigh-in. Animals will be sold on the basis of scale weight. Re-weigh for goats, sheep & swine will only be granted in the animal is within 5lbs over or under.
- 5. **BEEF:** No wet or blanketed animals will be weighed. Halters will not exceed 5/8" in diameter and not exceed 10' in length. Lead chains will not be allowed at weigh-in.
- 6. SHEEP: No wet or blanketed animals will be weighed. No leading devices will be allowed on the scale.
- 7. GOAT: No wet or blanketed animals will be weighed. No leading devices will be allowed on the scale.
- 8. **SWINE:** No wet or excessively dirty animals will be weighed. No leading device will be allowed on the scale.

9. The maximum pay weight is as follows: See page 76 number 9.

SWINE: 260 Pounds SHEEP: 145 Pounds GOAT: 105 Pounds

1300 Pounds

10. If any animal is questioned at the scale regarding health, paperwork, and/or ear tags, said animal will be put aside in a holding pen for examination by a veterinarian and/or Livestock Superintendent. The animal will remain in the pen until a decision is made concerning the issue.

BEEF:

Seller's Responsibility

- 1. <u>ALL ANIMALS MUST FOLLOW THE SALE ORDER.</u> Failure of the exhibitor to be present and ready to enter the ring with their animal(s), or when the lot number is called, will automatically disqualify them from the sale. Exhibitors are ultimately responsible for being in the correct order.
- 2. All Animals being sold at the auction must be sold personally by the owner. All proxy sales request must be PRE-Approved in writing by the Santa Barbara County Fair Management up until July 4, 2019 any requests for Proxy after July 4th must be submitted to JLA Auction Coordinator and JLA Board of Directors, if a situation cannot be resolved in the appropriate manner than the matter will be referred to the Livestock Code of Excellence Committee consisting of the Fair CEO, Livestock superintendent, 2 Fair livestock board members and 1 member of the Auction Sales Association. In the event that an exhibitor has someone else sell their animal without prior approval, the Committee may rule to suspend exhibitor from exhibition at future fairs for a specified period of time or withhold sale revenue. All sellers requesting a proxy sale must have an approved letter from Fair Office on file with the JLA Auction Trailer, or a completed request for alternative seller form on file with JLA Auction Trailer prior to sale.
- 3. No advertisement of animals will be permitted. This includes placing of items on auction tables and/or advertising on actual animal. DO NOT ASK THE AUCTIONEER FOR SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENTS. Adornments are permitted on Champion and Reserve Champion Market animals and Champion and Reserve Replacement Heifers only. No Glitter is allowed on any animal.
- 4. All exhibitors must write Thank You letters to their auction buyers, which will be coordinated with exhibitor's leaders. Failure to write and submit a thank you letter will result in a delay in receiving payment for animal. (See #2 under Auction Check Distribution)
- 5. <u>Exhibitors selling livestock through the Auction are solely responsible for the feeding, watering and general well-being of their own animals until the animals are loaded onto the trucks for transport.</u>
- 6. There will be no change in the shipping order once Buyer Sales Slips are signed. NO ADD-ONS ALLOWED
- 7. No parent/leader/advisor/ exhibitor shall contact buyers for the purpose of buying or giving back an auctioned animal.
- 8. Lot lists (Sale Order) will be posted for a specified period of time prior to the Auction sales book's going to print.

 Sellers are ultimately responsible for checking that they are on the list and that all information is correct prior to the posted deadline. There will be no changes/additions/deletions to the sale order once it is set. If you are not on the list and you have not notified the entry office by the designated deadline you will not sell. NO EXCEPTIONS
- 9. Each seller is responsible for RUNNING at least once for each animal they sell, and responsible for getting checked off the list for running. Failure to do so will result in a \$25.00/animal fine that will automatically be deducted from your check.
- 10. NO BUYER GIFTS WILL BE ALLOWED DURING AUCTION. IF YOU WISH TO GIVE YOUR BUYER A GIFT, IT MUST BE DONE AFTER THE FAIR. THANK YOU CARDS ARE ALLOWED DAY OF AUCTION, BUT DO NOT REPLACE THOSE MAILED TO BUYERS.

Replacement of Animals

- The Association will replace an animal lost or condemned after being loaded for transport to the processor with a carcass or
 portion of equal weight and grade. In the case of a lost or condemned (except when the condemned carcass is due to drug
 or chemical contamination contagious disease or signs of genetic disease syndrome) resale animal, only the market price will
 be repaid.
- 2. In the case of a condemned carcass due to drug or chemical contamination, contagious disease or signs of genetic disease syndrome exhibitors may forfeit earnings.

Solicitation of Buyers/Non-Sale Market Animals

- 1. No "For Sale" signs will be allowed until the day after the sale.
- 2. Any exhibitor found soliciting buyers for non-sale market animals before or during the sale will be subject to disciplinary action as determined by the Code of Excellence Committee. Individual sale of market animals must be reported to the Livestock Office. No responsibility is incurred by the Association or the Fair for non-auctioned animals sold by exhibitors.

Release of Animals

- 1. All Junior Division animals are to be removed from the grounds no later than NOON Monday, July 15, 2019, as there will be NO SECURITY after this time.
- 2. No animal may be removed without a release from the Livestock Office. Release forms will be checked at the gate by Security. All animals will be subject to verifications against release form.
- 3. Heifers will be live pick up only and buyer must obtain a release form.

Fee for Sale

- 1. The Auction Sales Committee will charge a fee for each animal going through the Junior Livestock Auction. This fee will be determined prior to fair and is subject to change. The fee for 2019 shall be 6% of the total sale for swine, sheep, goats and beef. The fee for Turkeys, Rabbits, Chickens and Replacement Heifers is \$45.00.
- 2. The selling fee is automatically deducted from each seller's check and covers the operational costs of conducting the Auction. Expenses include, (but are not limited to), transportation of live animals to processing plants, process costs and carcass return, sales catalog, buyers thank you advertisement, buyers meals, snacks and letters, informational flyers, color photos, postage, sales invoices and billing supplies.

Auction Check Distribution and Buyer Thank You Cards

- 1. Auction checks will be distributed Wednesday, August 21, 2019 from 2 pm to 4 pm, at the Fair Entry Office Window. **Only leaders/advisors may pick up checks at this time.** Those checks being held for any reason will be distributed as payments are made or thank you cards are received. Leaders/Advisors need to notify JLA/Fair staff if any checks being held are not to be released to exhibitors.
- 2. Buyer addresses will be available to leaders and advisors only, Sunday July 14, 2019 between 10 am and 12 noon in front of the Auction Trailer. Buyer thank you letters, written, addressed, stamped and ready for mail, must be turned in to the auction trailer by the project leader between 3 pm and 5 pm, Sunday July 14, 2019. With this the leader must present a list of those exhibitors within their group that did not turn in thank you letters. Those exhibitors failing to turn in their thank you letters by the deadline will have their auction check held for at least 30 days from check release date, or until thank you letters are received in the Fair Office.
- 3. In the following cases the Fair Association reserves the right to hold auction checks: if exhibitors violate the Code of Excellence guidelines, if exhibitors fail to produce buyer thank you notes, or if the exhibitor's past or present auction buyer is a relative or related entity who still has an outstanding balance from prior or current auctions, or if exhibitors animals are purchased by family members or relatives, the seller's check will not be released until full payment is made by the buyers. The Fair CEO Reserves the right to hold back any exhibitors check, if during the process of collections it is learned that an exhibitor's relative(s) was the purchaser of their animal or other animals and they have not paid at time of check distribution.
- 4. Any exhibitor that has a relative that has any outstanding balance with the fair for the current or previous years fairs will not be eligible to enter the 2019 Fair until all outstanding balances are cleared.
- All Return Checks (DNA Fees, Entry Fees, or Auction Payments) for insufficient funds will be subject to a \$35.00 service charge. Any lost Premium Checks or Auction Checks will be charged a \$35.00 Replacement Fee.
