Class 1

4-H Market Swine – 192 lbs.

1st – Dane McGuire – Knight’s 4-H - This chromed up lightweight market hog best combines leanness and muscle to the highest degree. More specifically, she is more packer preferred having a proportional ham and a strong back. Ideally, I would like to open her up and make her wider chested. Furthermore, I’d make her wider based as she goes away from me with more squareness.

Class 2

4-H Market Swine – 215 lbs. – 225 lbs.

1st – Lucy Martin – Nipomo 4-H - This is a really nice chromed up barrow that best combines balance, correctness, and meat animal shape. More specifically, he is wide based and tracking and offers a lot of muscle throughout all proportions of his ham. In addition, he works the greatest dimension of muscle expression down the more correctly turn top. Furthermore, he is wide chested and wide based as well as being fairly sound in his structure. If I could change his pig, I would correct him on his rear leg set from Stifle to hock and hock to the ground. In addition, I would make him more fluid in his movement off of his rear legs.

2nd - Zack Lamb – Nipomo 4-H - The black belted gilt is wide in her chest floor and stout in her makeup. I appreciate her leanness down her top and her volume of muscle from behind. Ideally, I would like to correct her in her width of base. She’s too wide when she tracks a way for me. Furthermore, I would like to smooth her at her ham loin junction. She is a nice combination female that just needs to be sounder in her structure off of a rear legs.

3rd – Tyler Costa – Lompoc Valley 4-H - The spotted gilt has a decent amount of muscle expression down her top and throughout her ham. Ideally, I would like to make a wider chested in blend her in nicer at her front shoulders. She does appear to be straighter in her shoulder but flexible in her rear legs. Furthermore, I do appreciate her length and extension up through her head and neck.

4th – Mackenzie Eames – Vineyard 4-H - This wide belted market hog is more restricted in motion off of her rear legs. I do appreciate her length of neck and extension in her front one third. Yet, she needs to be more powerfully constructed with more meat animal shape. Furthermore, she needs to be sounder and motion and deeper body.

Class 3

4-H Market Swine 230 lbs. – 235 lbs.

1st – Logan Zurliene – Knight's 4-H - This solid black barrow best combines structure imbalance to the highest degree. I appreciate his extension up to his head and his neck and his squareness. In addition, he is powerful in his muscle mass over his top and throughout his ham. Ideally, he could be stouter in his bone and better in his rear legs set to the ground. On a side note, he is hard to evaluate with the video turned sideways.

2nd – Leila Martin – Nipomo 4-H - This Duroc appearing barrow best combines leanness and meat animal shape. I admire his width of base and volume of muscle throughout his ham. In addition, he is extended throughout his head and neck and works a greater volume of muscle down a more correctly turned top. If I could change him, I would correct him on his rear leg. He needs to have a better angulation from stifle to hock and hock to the ground.

3rd – Blane Cerda – El Camino 4-H - This gilt best combines eye appeal and muscle expression. I appreciate this gilts levelness of top and extension up through her head and neck. Furthermore, she works a greater volume of muscle down her top and through all portions of her ham. Ideally, I would like to make her sounder in motion as she is too wide and her width of base. Yet, I appreciate her leanness and her muscle mass as she is packer preferred.

4th – Peyton Townes – Lompoc Valley 4-H - This spotted hog is athletic within motion and offers a ton of muscle shape. Ideally, I would change her on her rear legs and give her a better angulation from Stifle to Hock and Hock to the ground. Furthermore, she could be deeper about her flank and ribs shape. Yet, I do appreciate her meat animal shape and leanness which makes her packer preferred.

5th – Andie Devey – Vineyard 4-H - This belted market hog best combines leanness and extension. Ideally, I would like to make this hog sounder within motion and correct them in their angulation from stifle to hock and hock to the ground. In addition, I would like to make them square on all four corners and track away more correctly. Furthermore, the hog is very pinched at the Ham loin Junction and needs to be deeper within their flank.

6th – Bryce Eames – Vineyard 4-H – This belted market hog is certainly athletic. In addition, has some muscle down her top and from behind. This is hard to evaluate as she is running in the video. I believe, she is packer preferred being lean and heavy muscled. I might change her structure off of her rear legs.

7th – Tanner Costa – Lompoc Valley 4-H – This spotted hog is wide chested and athletic on the move. Ideally, he needs to be wider tracking and based. Furthermore, I appreciate his boldness of body and muscle shape down his top and from behind. I just wish he was sounder within his structure.

Class 4

4-H Market Swine 240 lbs. – 245 lbs.

1st - Carter Ortega – Vineyard 4-H - This Berkshire appearing barrowing is deep about his body and is powerfully constructed. He works a greater volume of muscle down his top and from behind. Ideally, I would blend him in smoother at his shoulder top junction. Yet, I appreciate his flexibility, meat animal shape and stoutness.

2nd – Maria Medina – Independent - This chromed up barrow is deep bodied and heavy muscled. In addition, he is wide chested and wide based. Ideally, he could be more flexible off of his one rear leg and be leaner down his top. Yet, I appreciate his meat animal shape as he is packer preferred. Furthermore, I like his extension up through his head and his neck.

3rd – Landon Hart – Knight's 4-H - This solid white market hog is heavy muscled and stout boned. I appreciate the volume of muscle down this top and from behind. This hog is certainly packer preferred. Ideally, I would change this hog in his structure and make him more flexible off of his rear legs. In addition, this hog could be more attractive from a profile.

4th – Karlee Cullen – Old Town 4-H - This Berkshire appearing gilt best combines leanness and extension to the highest degree. Ideally, I would like to make her wider chested and wider based. In addition, I appreciate her flexibility and soundness of structure. If I could change her, I would make her heavier muscled and deeper body.

5th – Charlie Wilks – Oak Valley 4-H - This spotted hog best combines balance and correctness to the highest degree. Ideally, I would like to see more muscle expression down their top and more width from behind. Yet, I do appreciate their eye appeal and balance from a profile. I need to see more meat animal shape and definition to place them higher in the class. I do appreciate her soundness of structure and flexibility.

6th – Esteban Castro – Los Alamos Grange - This barrow best combines extension and eye appeal to the highest degree. Ideally, I would like to make him track squarer and wider from behind. In addition, he needs to have more meat animal shape and definition. Yet, I do appreciate his flexibility and attractiveness from a profile.

7th – Savannah Daltorio – Oak Valley 4-H – This black belted barrow is fairly sound in structure. He offers us a lot of muscle shape down his top and from behind but lacks in leanness. Ideally, I would make them stouter and in bone and leaner throughout his top. He certainly is packer preferred being pounds heavy.

Class 5

4-H Market Swine 250 lbs. – 255 lbs.

1st – Frankie Velazquez – Los Alamos Grange - This solid black barrow is square on all four corners and heavy muscled. I appreciate his squareness from behind and ham shape. In addition, he works a greater volume of muscle down his top. Ideally, I would like to make him stouter within his bone and correct him in his angulation from stifle to Hock and Hock to the ground. I appreciate, his extension of head and neck and power of muscle.

2nd – Paola Castro – Los Alamos Grange - This duroc barrow is bold down his top and powerful from behind. In addition, he is boulders muscle shape and fairly flexible within structure. I might correct him a little bit off of his rear legs. Furthermore, he is a nice complete type of a market hog that is packer preferred.

3rd – Ashley Benitez – Los Alamos Grange - This belted gilt best combines muscle and power to the highest degree. More specifically, she works the greatest dimension of muscle expression down her top and from behind. Ideally, I would like to make her stronger in her pasterns and not so pinched at her ham loin junction. This hog needs to be sounder in structure to move her up higher in the class.

Class 6

4-H Market Swine 260 lbs. – 265 lbs.

1st – Cash Gamble – Orcutt/Sisquoc Grange - This belted barrow best combined structure, muscle, and eye appeal. I appreciate his squareness of structure and level top. In addition, he is wide chested and wide base and stands down on the bigger circumference of bone. Furthermore, he is complete and attractive from a profile. Furthermore, I admire his extension up through his head and neck. This is a really nice barrow.

2nd – Andrea Velazquez – Los Alamos Grange - This predominantly solid white barrow best combines structure, balance and eye appeal. I really appreciate his width of base and correctness coupled with his meat animal shape. Furthermore, he is long spined and extended up through his head and neck. In comparison to our class winner, he is larger frame and slightly finer bone. But this is being critical on a really good barrow.

3rd – Keegan Sapp – El Camino 4-H - This belted barrow best combines muscle and width. He is wide chested and wide based. In addition, he works a greater volume of muscle down a more quickly turned up. Furthermore, he is proportional in his ham shape from behind. Ideally, I would like to make him more structurally correct off of his rear legs. He is a complete hog in a tough class.

4th – Kylee Jorge – Old Town 4-H - This ruggedly designed Chester appearing Barrow is stout and heavy muscle. In addition, he works a greater volume of muscle over his top and from behind. Ideally, I would like to make him sounder in structure off of his front and rear legs. I do admire his width underneath, but he needs to be more flexible on the drive.

5th – Anthony Soares III – El Camino 4-H - This belted gilt is extremely heavy muscled and naturally lean. I appreciate her width underneath, but she needs to be more structurally correct. Ideally, I would change her rear leg structure and make her flexible on the drive. She certainly is packer preferred but needs to have more depth the body and structural integrity.
